## Raid Uncovers Illegal Bingo Game

25. The Crown Royale and Lottery type tickets were only a part of the items seized. Four pick-up loads of machines, boards, video

monitors and game cards were confiscated by law officials, according to a Sheriff's Department spokesman.

Investigators raided a skating rink located south of Iuka recently where apparent illegal gaming activities were being conducted by Tennessee and Alabama promoters, yielding several thousand dollars weekly.

Authorities arrested eight persons during the raid conducted Sunday, September 25, including seven who were said to be organizers of the operation and the owner of the rink, Harold W. Enlow, who leased the building and was arrested for interfering with seizure, stated officials. No participants of the games were arrested, although it is a criminal offense.

The operation, carried on from Funland Skate Center, located on Highway 25 S., went by the title L.E.T.S. Bingo and drew crowds amounting to 600 to 800 people. Most of the participants were brought to the games by bus or van from the surrounding Alabama and Tennessee areas, said reports.

More than just Bingo was being played during the Sunday night games, stated Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs who revealed the numerous "pull-tab" cards that were found strewn after the raid.

Monday was spent sorting through garbage cans full of "pull-tab" cards by Tishomingo County officials. These lottery type cards, which sold for \$1.00 or \$2.00, consisted of games such as Crown Royale (a poker type game) and Black Jack or 21. The cards were represented as possibly being worth up to as much as \$1,000 each however, in sorting through the opened stubs, lawmen found only a few \$1.00 winners.

"Almost \$17,000 was confiscated in cash and checks by lawmen Sunday night, during the raid," stated County Attorney Richard Bowen. Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigator Jim Wall and a Sheriff's Deputy participated in the raid as undercover agents. Sources revealed that tip led to the investigation of the bingo game.

It was noted that flyers, that had apparently been distributed by use of mailing lists and other means, were sent to out-of-town residents advertising the L.E.T.S. Bingo. "The people participating were led to believe that the games were on the up-and-up," said Bowen. L.E.T.S., which is said to stand for Lincoln Employment Training Shop, was claiming to be using its proceeds to benefit a non-profit organization aiding mentally handicapped individuals.

It was stressed by both Bowen and Dobbs that bingo is legal in Mississippi if all of the proceeds are going to a non-profit charity or a religious group. However, this operation was not found to be non-profit by authorities. Bowen roughly estimated that only 25% of the profits were being returned in prize awards, based on the information given on the flyers as to cash payed in each game.

The flyers also stated that to enter the establishment, you must be a player. A \$20.00 book of bingo card

sheets had to be purchased at the door, reports said.

Gambling devices seized during the raid included random number pick, machines, bingo number display boards, video monitors, numerous pull-tab cards and bingo card booklets.

Suspects arrested during the raid of the operation Sunday were all released on \$1,000 bond and included Thomas E. Wiser, 45, and his wife Reba Wiser, 50 Route 1, Fayetteville, TN; Robert S. Storey, 60, Main St., Elkhart, TN; Stoney R. Green, 25, Route 1, Ardmore, TN; Brian Walden, 20, Route 6, Fayetteville, TN; Rufus Rutledge, 59, 145 Smith Dr., Harvest, AL; and Leslie L. Barnes, 19, Route 1, Ardmore, TN.

Harold W. Enlow owner of the building was also released on \$1,000 bond.

A spokesman reported that prior to the Sunday night raid, information was collected concerning the upcoming game. The establishment was put under surveillance for approximately 12 hours before it was raided.

## Bay Springs Lake Area Sought By Developers

The Bay Springs Lake area, located in the southern end of Tishomingo County is being sought by developers as a possible location for privately owned recreational facilities.

Rep. Mack Wadkins, Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, is working with the Tennessee Valley Authority, the Corps and with waterway and state officials to help in attaining the project.

Wadkins stated that he will travel to a meeting in Atlanta in mid-October along with interested developers and Corps officials, to promote the Bay Springs Area.

If the area is chosen, it will be completely financed by private investments, stated officials.

"We are looking at all possibilities for the area," said Wadkins, which includes theme park rides, motel-hotel convention center, marina, cabins, recreational vehicle camping areas (R.V. Park) museum, fishing piers, etc., as a part of the possibilities. "We believe it (Bay Springs) has a lot of potential with the recreational boats that are

traveling on the waterway, along with expected traffic on the Natchez Trace and the influx of people that the NASA plant is expected to pull into the area. The four-lane construction of U.S. Highway 72, along with available air service into Tupelo and Muscle Shoals, Alabama, will make the proposal attractive," said Wadkins.

Wadkins is very optimistic that the resort will become a reality. He stated that it is not a matter of IF, but a matter of WHEN.

After proposals are submitted, the Corps hopes to lease the land in June of 1989, according to reports.

## Murder Suspect Denied Bond

On Monday, September 26, murder suspect Alvin Meeks was denied bond by Circuit Judge Frank Russell.

Meeks is charged with the slaying death of Linda Meeks, 29 of Corinth (his charged wife's sister-in-law) on August 7.

Court-appointed attorney Garretty represented Meeks at the hearing held at the Tishomingo County Circuit Court session this week.

It was reported that Tana Meeks was staying at the home of her brother Ricky Meeks with her two small children by a previous marriage, when Alvin Meeks, killed his way thru the front door. Linda Meeks made an attempt to call Law Enforcement officers, the assailant continued, as she ran

outside away from the doorway, there were two shots fired. Meeks then dragged her (Tana) from the house and into his car.

Meeks' sister Hester Lambert, 34, of Glen was charged with accessory after the fact of murder. Officials said she drove the couple to Alabama on August 8 and returned August 9 to pick them up.

Officials stated that Alvin Meeks turned himself in after his wife escaped at a roadside park on the Natchez Trace near Cherokee, AL on August 9, as they were returning to Tishomingo County.

Meeks has been held without bail since his arrest on August 9. Officials said Meeks faces possible grand jury charges for kidnapping his wife.

The Alcorn County Grand Jury is expected to report on Monday.

## Oldest County Resident Dies

James Farlar Belue, 105, died Tuesday, September 27, at the Tishomingo County Hospital. He was a retired farmer.

Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. W.T. Dexter officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include one granddaughter, Janie Belue of Iuka.

## Two Sentenced In Rape Case

Two Tishomingo County men entered guilty pleas Monday, September 26 during Tishomingo Circuit Court to two counts each of kidnapping. The two men had been charged with capital rape and kidnapping, and had been held without bond since the August 30, 1987 offense.

The 49 and 22 year old Tishomingo County men were accused of abducting two girls, a 13 year old and her 14 year old friend near downtown Iuka. According to law enforcement officials, the girls were forced at gunpoint into a vehicle, the 14 year old girl later jumped from the car. It was reported that the 49 year old Tishomingo County man forcibly raped the younger girl, then the girl was driven back to her home.

The 49 year old who was accused of the actual rape was sentenced to two 10-year terms, six years suspended. The other man faced the same charge because of his involvement. He was sentenced to two 10-year terms, with four years suspended pending good behavior.

Officials said that the 49 year old Tishomingo man was on parole from Tennessee on an attempted rape charge when this offense occurred. When he is released in Mississippi, he faces serving out the remainder of the time on the Tennessee charge.

Both men will be credited for time served while awaiting trial.

Circuit Judge Frank Russell ordered the defendants to be returned to custody to await transport to Parchman. Russell also accepted the prosecution's recommendation to banish both men from Tishomingo County for 10 years.

## Hercules Atlantic, Inc. To Open Office In Iuka

Hercules Atlantic, a partnership formed by Hercules Aerospace Inc. and Atlantic Research Corporation to bid on the Space Shuttle Advanced Solid Rocket Motor, is planning to open an office at 155 Front Street in early October.

In anticipation of the opening of the office, Hercules Atlantic plans to have a display at the Exhibit Building at this week's Tishomingo County Fair.

In response to a suggestion from Mack L. Wadkins, a Hewlett Packard Vectra desk top computer and printer has been provided to the Tishomingo County Development Foundation. The computer will be used to

assist new workers in finding housing in the area.

"We are glad to have the opportunity to extend to you this solid indication of our commitment to become a good neighbor," said Len Parkinson, ARC's Director of Government Relations. "We are proud to have been the company that recommended the Yellow Creek site to NASA last year. Since then, we have been repeatedly encouraged and supported by local Tishomingo County citizens."

On July 26, NASA selected the abandoned TVA Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant facility north of Iuka as the government-owned site for the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor.

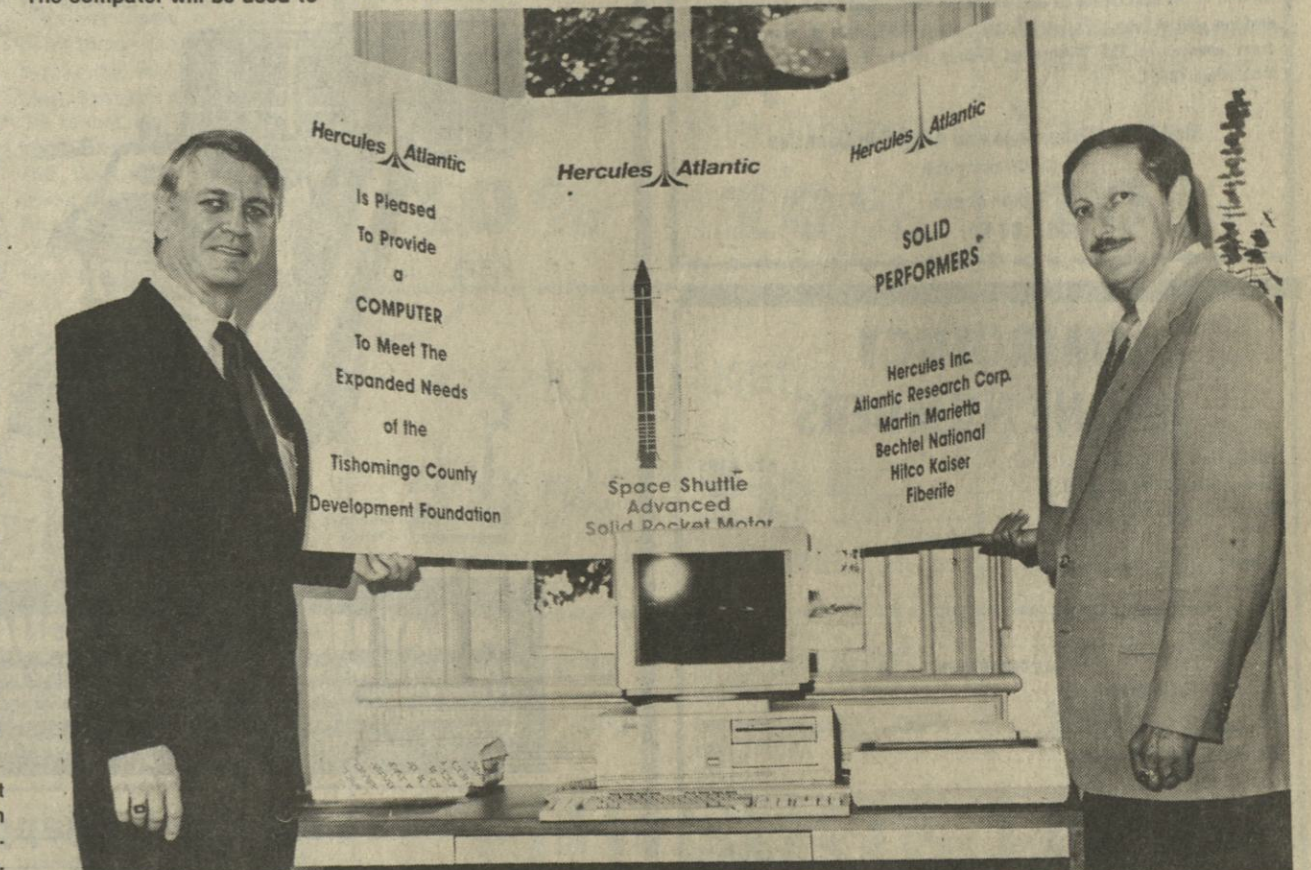
The ASRM program involves the design and construction of a new, modern, highly automated factory. NASA has testified such a new facility is required to achieve the high reliability and safety specified for the new, more powerful boosters.

In addition to the decades both companies have been in the solid rocket business, Hercules Aerospace brings to the new partnership recent experience in the construction and start-up of an automated factory in Magna, Utah to produce large space boosters. Atlantic Research, at its East Camden, Arkansas facility, is the largest producer of the type of propellant to be used in the ASRM.

Hercules Atlantic's bid for the ASRM is supported by a team consisting of Martin Marietta, Bechtel National, Hitco Kaiser, and Fiberite.

## ASCS Farm News

Before farmers can receive payments on their 1988 disaster-affected crops, they must certify that they are in compliance with the sod-buster and swampbuster provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985.

In order to receive disaster payments, farmers are also required to furnish ASCS with acreage and crop production reports showing the intended uses for each crop.

The 1988 disaster program authorizes payments on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sugar beets, sugarcane and tobacco; and on all commercial nonprogram crops. Crops not eligible for disaster benefits are seed corn for which the producer elects not to consider as corn for any purpose, and the crop planted after initial failed or prevented plantings, except in recognized double cropping situations.

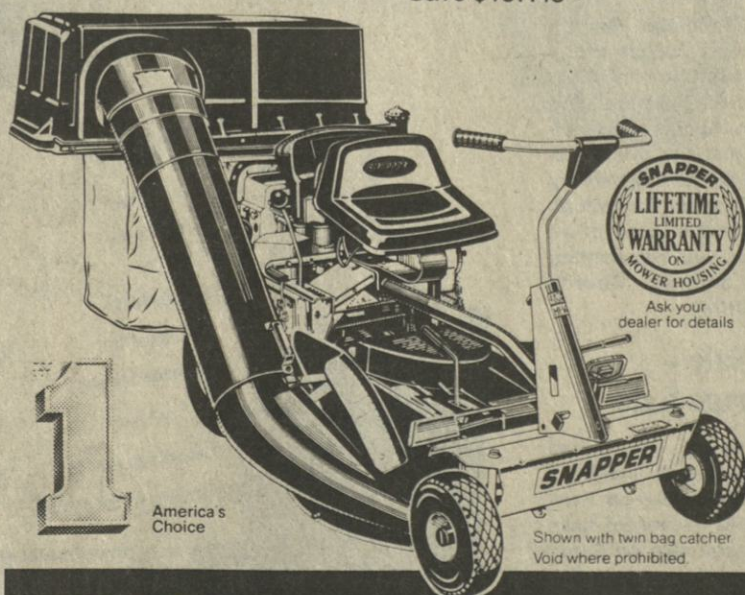

## PAYMENTS BEGIN OCT. 3 FOR USDA DROUGHT AID PROGRAMS

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng today announced that producers may begin receiving drought aid payments October 3 at Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices.

The aid was made available by the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 which was signed August 11 by President Reagan.

Lyng reminded livestock and crop producers to organize their production data and evidence in advance to speed payment for qualified drought-related damage.

"ASCS will administer the programs for the Commodity Credit Corporation and everything will be in place by the end of September," Lyng said. "The forms, regulations and procedures, computer software, and training of ASCS employees are nearing completion."

Program details will be published in the Federal Register, Lyng said.

## Landowners Command Good Timber Prices

Mississippi landowners should have a favorable seller's market this fall because of increasing pulpwood demand and improving sawtimber prices.

Prices for pine sawtimber stumpage ranged from \$110/MBF Doyle (per thousand board feet) to \$210/MBF throughout Mississippi in August. Oak sawtimber stumpage for the same period ranged from \$70 MBF to \$180/MBF.

Timber mills begin building their winter log inventories in fall. Their goal is to build up their timber supplies before the state's wet weather season sets in about mid-November. Rain greatly slows timber harvesting, and mills must then operate on existing inventories.

"Now is a good time to make a timber sale, particularly if the timber is pine and the landowner has good timber to sell," said Bob Daniels, forest products utilization specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

Dry weather throughout much of 1988 kept cutters busy harvesting logs in Mississippi, thus increasing timber supplies and lowering selling prices.

Many mills intentionally kept inventories low when log supplies were plentiful. Some of those mills are having problems finding adequate log supplies.

"Some mills are faced with buying timber in a seller's market and selling lumber in a buyer's market," said Dr. Bob Martin, an extension economist. "This has created a favorable situation for timber owners who have timber to sell."

Many mills in the state have also increased their inventory quotas for pine pulpwood and hardwood pulpwood. Pine pulpwood prices have ranged from \$30/cord to \$39/cord. Hardwood pulpwood prices have ranged from \$25/cord to \$35/cord.

In other agricultural news, county agents across the state reported most of their cotton and soybean fields are in fair to good condition.

"A month or more of ideal harvesting weather is needed now," said Sunflower County Agents John McCaskill.

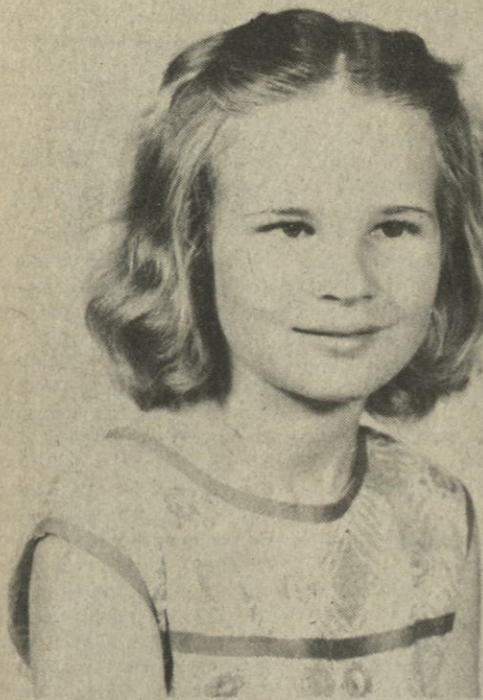

Timberline

Our forests of today provide raw wood for our factories, recreation, watershed protection, wildlife habitat and wilderness. People like yours truly work with the forest, and are often able to enhance production of these benefits.

This is important to know, since a lot of Mississippians own individual tracts of woodlands; many have shared in companies that manage forests, and we all own the public lands managed by government agencies.

We members of the forestry profession try to help all the different types of landowners to obtain the benefits they want from the forest, but forests do have limits to the amount of benefits we can derive from them without adverse effects.

Originating, growing, and tending stands of trees is called silviculture (silva is the Latin word for forest). Without exaggeration, silviculture is the heartbeat of forestry.

Silviculture is essential when we humans want to manage the forests -- to accelerate the production of wildlife, timber, forage or to

increase recreation and watershed values. On almost any land, whether tree-covered, or bare, nature will practice her own silviculture if left alone.

She may take hundreds or thousands of years to do it, though, and she will do it without consulting us as to our preferences. Whether we like to admit it or not, we often become impatient with nature's way. Then silviculture must be practiced.

But even as we use our tried and true silvicultural practices we must still work within the natural conditions imposed by a tree species and by the required environment.

The great number of tree species found in Mississippi -- multiplied by all the possible growing conditions and all the stand histories -- yields an infinite variety of forest scenes or situations.

We have to think in terms of forest types. For example, in Mississippi we have the pine-hardwood type, the oak-hickory type, and in many cases the pure pine type.

Even though dominant timber types, such as pine-hardwoods, are used as names a forest is actually a community of hundreds of

plant and animal species. A stand of old trees may appear to be timeless, but all forests are constantly changing. Change is most obvious in young stands where the trees are growing rapidly.

Such stands are ideal habitat for certain species of wildlife. As the trees grow, environmental conditions change so much that some species of wildlife no longer thrive there while other wildlife species may find the new conditions excellent.

As the stand continues to age, still other wildlife species become favored in the continuously changing environment. These dynamic changes are natural in all forests.

They can't be prevented. They can only be accelerated or slowed by our activities. We foresters use silvicultural practices that work with the natural processes in producing timber, wildlife and other values.

It all sounds complicated; but it's really pretty simple -- we can speed up or slow down mother nature, but we can't make her stop or change altogether.

And, in spite of the popular T.V. commercial of several years ago -- it does pay to "mess" with mother nature when you do it right. Can we help you improve your forestland? Call us.

Ochsner

Tobacco Kills over one thousand people a day in the United States--a figure that is equivalent to the number of human deaths that would result if two full-loaded jumbo jets were to collide head-on in mid-air everyday. Jim Troxler finds that statistic shocking and wants to tell young people why.

As the Cancer Control Coordinator for the Ochsner Cancer Institute, Troxler spends much of his time in schools throughout the New Orleans area, explaining to teenagers the hazards of smoking. Some listen. Others ignore him.

"Nationwide, over 4,000 people become new smokers everyday--85 percent are teenagers," says Troxler. "I think there's a strong need to get a message to the youngsters about the dangers of smoking and do it

now, because they are our future."

Troxler often quotes the words of the late Dr. Alton Ochsner, Sr., who said: "Tobacco is a loaded, often lethal weapon. Time pulls the trigger." Dr. Ochsner, one of the founders of the Ochsner Medical Institutions, was the first physician to connect cigarette smoking to lung cancer.

In a typical learning session, students are shown a pair of freeze-dried human lungs. One lung is clean and white, the other is coated with a dark and spotty substance that indicates someone who has been smoking for several years and has lung cancer.

"That scares them," he says. "These kids are raised with images of super heroes who are going to last forever. Suddenly, they realize...maybe not."

Why are teens so susceptible to picking up the cigarette habit? That reasons vary by individual and may represent many influences from everyday living. One of the biggest influences is life at home.

"Seventy-five percent of the kids who start smoking come from families where one or both parents smoke," says Troxler. "Since the majority of learning cues come from parents, a child will see a parent smoke and automatically feel that it is okay, despite the warning."

Peer pressure is another influence that persuades teenagers to light up, says Troxler. "These kids take chances and will do just about everything to fit in. Smoking is just one of many patterns of behavior found in this age range."

Advertising is probably the most visible of influences. "Each year, tobacco companies make nearly 30 billion dollars from the sale of cigarettes, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. To stay in business, a large number of new smokers must be created everyday." To accomplish this, cigarette producers create glossy, multi-million dollar advertising campaigns aimed at a variety of audiences.

Although the campaigns are not allowed on TV or radio, they do find placement in newspapers, magazines, billboards and other media that teens are exposed to on a daily basis.

"The message is clear," says Troxler. "If you smoke cigarettes, you're cool, macho, independent and beautiful. These are images

that are appealing to teens hungry for attention and a sense of identity in today's world."

Troxler's presentation to school groups is broken into two to three sessions. One session covers the adverse effects smoking has on the body. Another consists of a film or slide presentation. Audio visuals include medical graphs, tables and various advertising campaigns aimed at youngsters. The question and answer period, which concludes each lecture, quite often will reveal disturbing feedback from the students, says Troxler.

"Some students tell me they smoke a pack of cigarettes a day. One case in particular, a 14-year-old teenager, has been smoking a pack a day for seven years!"

The nicotine in cigarettes is such a powerful drug, says Troxler, that a teen can develop a dependency for it within a short period of time. The number of cigarettes required to develop an addiction is not known, but once trapped, breaking the habit could be the biggest struggle a teen has ever faced; a struggle more intense than that experienced by the average adult.

"Adults are more aware of their own mortality," says Troxler. "You know that one day you will die. Heavy breathing, troublesome coughs and generally feeling under the weather, all serve to motivate us to quit. The teenager, however, views dying as something that happens to the elderly."

In one recent session, a student asked, "why not ban tobacco altogether?" Troxler took a deep breath and recited the response he has given in lectures many times. "Tobacco has been with us ever since there has been a country. It's been a part of the fabric of this country, woven into everyday life. It's been accepted for so long that it's hard to turn off. The Revolutionary War was financed with tobacco money. In both world wars, soldiers were supplied cigarettes as an item of comfort. We didn't fully appreciate its dangers to society until the last several years. Now, it's time to do something before it's too late. Cigarettes kill. That message needs to get into the schools. Even if we've only discouraged a handful of kids from smoking, we've made our future a little brighter."

## Unemployment Declines In Tishomingo County

According to figures just released by the Mississippi State Employment Service, the number unemployed in Tishomingo County declined at mid-August. year ago. An estimated 2,840 individuals were employed in nonmanufacturing jobs, down 90 from last month but 80 above one year ago.

## New Program To Lower Health Care

More than 900 Mississippi physicians from throughout the state have already joined forces with Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Mississippi in a dramatic new program designed to help protect the working men and women of Mississippi against the rising cost of health care.

Aaron J. Johnston, president and chief executive officer for the health care organization, called the program, Key Physician Network, "one of the more innovative health care cost containment programs ever created for the benefit of the people of Mississippi."

He commended the physicians who are already partners in the Network for their dedication to cost containment and their willingness to "do what is necessary to help relieve patients' financial problems as well as medical problems."

"The Key Physician Network is a prime example of our state's upward movement, of the way our people are working together, using our resources, expertise and imagination to improve the lifestyle for all Mississippians," Johnston added, "and more physicians are coming into the program every day."

He said the Key Physician Network will enable members to secure more affordable health care services since Key physicians have agreed to accept the Blue Cross and Blue Shield professional allowance as payment in full for all covered services.

Johnston said the Blue Cross and Blue Shield professional allowance was based on physicians' charges from throughout the state. A fair and reasonable payment for each covered service was determined from these

charges.

He said subscribers will also have predictable and manageable out-of-pocket expenses since they will only be responsible for their normal deductible and coinsurance. They will not be billed for additional charges by Key physicians and will have no claims to file since the physicians will be paid directly by Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Mississippi.

Johnston emphasized that Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Mississippi subscribers may choose any physician for their care, but the subscriber gets the additional advantages by choosing a Key physician.

All physicians in Mississippi have been invited to join the program which will become effective October 1. Johnston said a Directory, listing all physicians participating in the program as well as other providers, will be published and distributed to Blue Cross and Blue Shield subscribers early in October. Updated directories will be provided as the Network continues to grow.

## Snoring And Sleep Apnea

My husband always has been a snorer, but now that he's in his 60's his snoring seems worse and he's very sleepy during the day. Could this be a serious problem?

Snoring, especially loud snoring, may indicate that a person has sleep apnea—a condition in which breathing stops for 10 seconds or longer during sleep.

Sleep apnea is potentially life-threatening because the level of oxygen in the blood drops during those seconds when breathing stops. After several years, this chronic oxygen shortage can lead to high blood pressure and heart strain. If coronary artery disease already is present, apnea could trigger a heart attack.

If a person's sleep is characterized by periods of silence followed by loud, raspy snoring and gasping sounds he or she may have sleep apnea. Other nighttime symptoms of apnea include abnormal movements while asleep, choking sensations, and headaches and confusion in the morning.

Equally important as the nighttime sleep disturbances are the daytime consequences. The person with apnea is tired during the day because he or she isn't sleeping well at night. He may nap involuntarily during the day or fall asleep while driving. Also, the lack of oxygen is "short-

circuiting" his brain, which causes him to become forgetful, inattentive and irritable. He also may experience a decreased tolerance for alcohol.

Anyone who has any of these symptoms should have a complete medical and sleep evaluation. A physician may refer the patient or the patient may contact a sleep disorders center himself for an all-night study of his breathing patterns and heart rate during sleep.

If apnea is diagnosed, or if the snoring is serious enough in itself to warrant treatment, a variety of corrective measures can be taken. The doctor may prescribe medication to help keep the breathing passages open or recommend a specially designed breathing mask to wear over the nose while sleeping. By applying a little air pressure to the nose the mask will help keep the passageways in the throat open.

Sometimes there's an anatomical cause for excessive snoring. The muscles may be unable to keep the upper airways open, or the area where the back of the nose and mouth connect to the trachea (the pharynx) may be abnormally small. Nasal deformities and enlarged tonsils or adenoids also may obstruct air flow and cause

snoring. If any of these conditions are present, surgery may be recommended.

Some tips to remember: Alcohol before bed should be avoided—it not only aggravates snoring, but also has an exaggerated effect on someone with apnea. Sedative medications also may worsen apnea. Fore those who are overweight, getting more exercise and losing weight may improve apnea, the patient's overall health as well as his or her sleeping habits.

For denture wearers, sleeping with them in place

may help to prevent snoring. A humidifier also can help, since dry air contributes to this problem.

## Mathcounts Begins Sixth Year

In a room 30 feet long, 12 feet wide, and 12 feet high, there is a spider in the center of one of the smaller walls, 1 foot from the ceiling; and there is a fly in the middle of the opposite wall, 1 foot from the floor. What is the shortest possible route along which the spider may crawl to reach his prey? Junior high students

from all over Mississippi will be studying problems like this in preparation for the upcoming MATHCOUNTS program.

Over one hundred schools are expected to enter and try to dethrone defending state champion, Jackson Prep. The top students winning the competition will get a free trip to Washington, D.C. to compete against students from all of the other forty-nine states for the national championship.

Junior high mathematics teachers have received information about entering the program. These teachers will serve as "coaches" for the "mathletes" from their school. School competitions are held in December or January, regional competitions in February, the state competition in March and the national finals in May.

Last year North Delta won the regional competition in our area held in Oxford. Other schools who participated and will be out to knock off North Delta include Alcorn Central, Biggersville, Charleston Middle, Houlika, Lafayette, Lawhorn, Marshall Academy, Milam, New Albany Middle, North Pontotoc, Oxford, Sallito, Southaven, and South Pontotoc.

All junior high schools in the area are eligible and are invited to participate.

MATHCOUNTS is administered in the state by the Mississippi Engineering Society.
