## County To Receive \$19,857 In Receipts

Tishomingo County will receive \$19,857 from the national forest system receipts, according to Congressman Jamie Whitten.

The county has 26,476 acres of national forest land. Congressman Whitten said the Forest Service will return 25 percent of all receipts to states in which National Forest System lands are located. The states are

required by law to use their shares of the receipts for public schools and roads.

Congressman Whitten, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, which provides funds for the program, said that the payment helps the local government make up for the loss of revenues that tax-exempt federal property causes.

## 37 Indictments Handed Down By Grand Jury

Tishomingo County grand jury last week reported a total of 37 indictments, involving 57 offenses and 33 defendants according to assistant District Attorney Richard Bowen. He also stated that in addition to the grand jury action, 15 defendants scheduled for trial during the September Term entered guilty pleas and most were sentenced.

Those indicted were Billy R. Brown for manslaughter, in the death of Anita C. Lambert on May 13, 1987. Hester Lambert, 34, Glen, was indicted for accessory after the fact of murder and kidnapping.

William Foreman, 38, Iuka, was charged with grand larceny from De-Bugg Transmissions, Iuka.

Anita Fay Skelton, 26, Cherokee, AL charged with accessory after the fact of grand larceny in connection with the theft of a all terrain vehicle.

Myra Milam, Belmont, charged with three counts of possession of codeine, chlordinazetoxide and marijuana.

Donald Robinson, 29, Iuka, charged with burglary and larceny.

Steven Gildewell, 23, Burnsville, was charged with possession of marijuana with intent to sell.

Myra Lovelace, 30, Iuka, charged with two counts of possession of controlled substances and two counts of simple assault.

Jackie Foster, 26,

Tishomingo, charged with two counts of embezzlement involving thefts from Belmont Video and Belmont Mighty Mart.

Billy Phifer, 47, Belmont, charged with grand larceny in connection with theft of a boat and motor belonging to Bill and Dottie Newman.

William L. Bass, 36, Michie, TN, charged with possession of marijuana and possession of a concealed weapon.

Calvin Davis, 27, Iuka, charged with simple assault on a police officer.

Richard Joe Cartwright, Iuka, charged with embezzlement from Sonic Drive-In.

Johnny O. Whitfield, 41, Iuka charged with possession of marijuana.

Jeanna Lynn Blanton, 29, and sister Kathie Sue Blanton, 35, charged with possession of marijuana with intent to sell.

Wayne Robinson, 46, and wife Angela Robinson, charged with possession of marijuana with intent to sell.

Willis R. Walker, Iuka, charged with embezzlement from W.H. Jones Pool Company.

Sandra Atkins Lambert, 24, North Fulton Street, Iuka, charged with possession of cocaine.

Of 18 true bills listed, 5 cases were presented by the City of Iuka Police Department.

## Grand Jury Report Released To Public

Following the September session of the Tishomingo Grand Jury, sufficient evidence was found to warrant criminal charges with 37 indictments being returned.

The official report released by the grand jury is:

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI  
SEPTEMBER TERM, 1988  
GRAND JURY REPORT

Comes now the Grand Jury for Tishomingo County, Mississippi, being duly impaneled on the 15th day of March, 1988, for the April, 1988, Term of the Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, and submits this Report.

We were recalled into Active Session for 3 days, on the dates of September 13, 14, and 15, 1988. We examined 17 witnesses and are returning herewith into Open Court 37

True Bills. We also examined the Tishomingo County Courthouse and the County Jail and submit herewith our findings and recommendations.

### COURTHOUSE

We found the Courthouse and its grounds to be generally in good condition, clean and well-maintained. We again recommend that more fire extinguishers be installed in the basement of the building and that all aerosol cans be removed from the vicinity of the basement and that the area be thoroughly cleaned. We also recommend that the bathrooms throughout the building be kept cleaner.

### COUNTY JAIL

We found the Sheriff's Office and County Jail to be clean, well-maintained, and sufficient for the safekeeping

of prisoners. We recommend only that a better system for cooling or ventilation be installed in the cell area.

Now having submitted this Report, we ask to be discharged subject to recall at a later date as circumstances may require upon further Order of this Court.

## Sentences Handed Out In Circuit Court Action

Circuit Judge Frank Russell accepted pleas of guilt and handed out sentences for defendants during the September term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court held Monday, September 26.

One Iuka man, James R. Moss, 32, was sentenced to five years in prison after pleading guilty to grand larceny. He was involved in the theft of jackets that were taken from the Wrangler Division Blue Bell Plant.

Barbara Simpson, 41, of Burnsville, pleaded guilty to forging a prescription for diazepam at Iuka Discount Drugs on September 21, 1987.

A Corinth man, Timothy R. Maddox, 20 pleaded guilty to two counts of burglary and larceny of a dwelling involving personal property thefts at two residences. He was sentenced to 10 years on each count, but suspended the concurrent sentence pending good behavior.

Harold Sipes, 62, who

pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of simple assault on a law enforcement officer was sentenced to five years in prison with the five years suspended.

James C. Lambert, 27 pleaded guilty to grand larceny in connection with the theft of personal items taken from a residence. He was

sentenced to serve three years in prison.

Jackie D. Roach, 23, pleaded guilty to possession of marijuana. The prosecution recommended a three-year suspended sentence.

## Iuka Police Officers Seize Marijuana

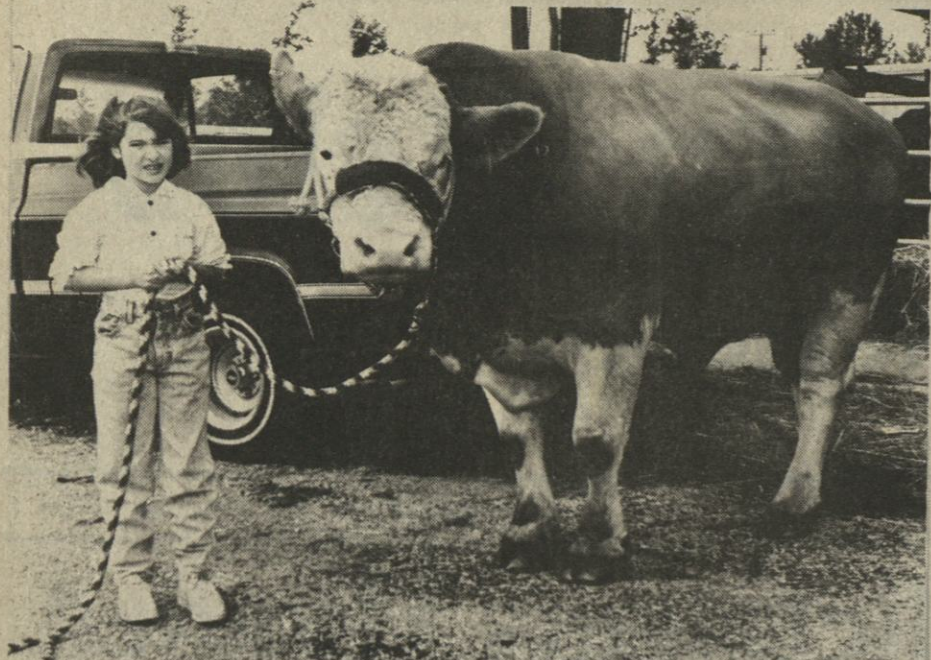
On Monday, September 26, 1988 at 10:45 p.m. a vehicle was stopped by Iuka Police Officers for having no tail lights on Highway 25 bypass. After arresting the driver and occupants, a box containing 5 oz. of marijuana was found.

The new controlled substance law states, anyone caught with a felony amount of a controlled substance in their vehicle, that vehicle will be subject to seize.

In a separate case, a Burnsville woman was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance, Hashish, possession of a concealed weapon and public drunkenness. She was released on a \$5000.00 grand jury bond. Bobby Flynt and Rick Cornelison were the arresting officers.

One officer stated, all weapons found during a narcotic charge will be seized.



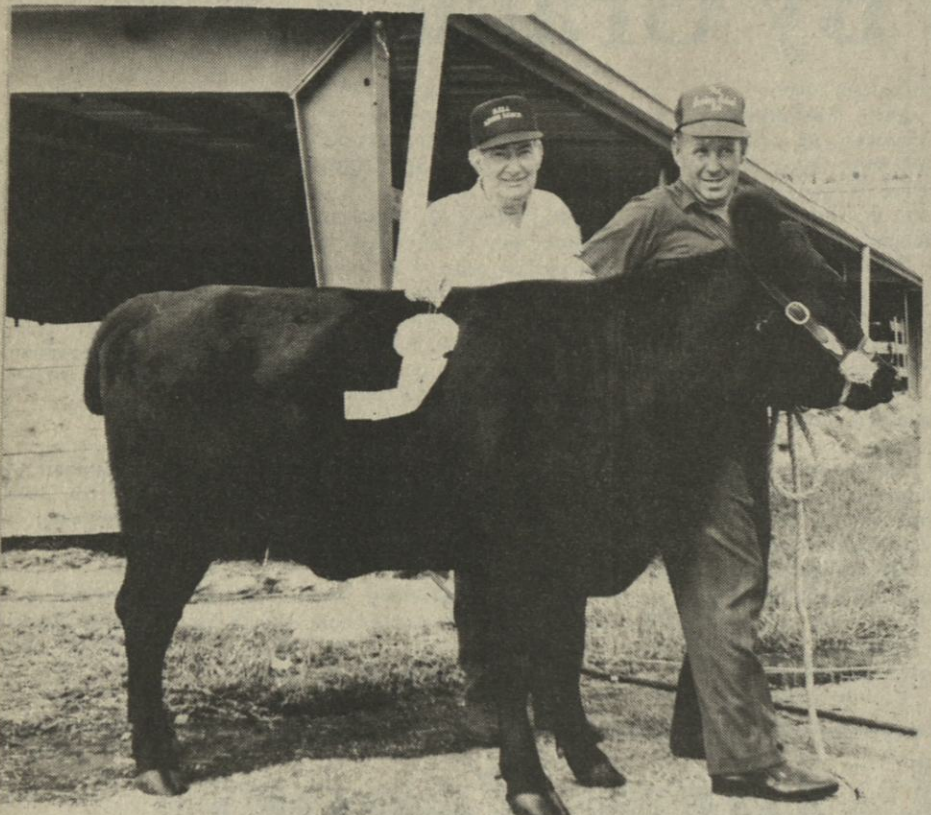

### Chatting With Your Home Economist

#### What Are You Wearing?

By law, all clothes sold in the United States must contain a label specifying the names and percentages of all fibers in the garment.

Fiber content is listed in order of predominance by weight. Fibers present to the extent of less than 5 percent may be listed as "other fiber" or "other fibers."

The fiber content of clothes is important to know because that determines the garment's wear characteristics, uses and care requirements.

Rayon fabric is very popular, especially 100 percent rayon challis skirts. Rayon is also used in

dress, suits, pants and blouses. It is highly absorbent, soft and drapable. However, some rayons wrinkle easily. Remember to follow care instructions precisely. Some rayons must be dry cleaned, while others can be washed and drip dried at home.

Acrylic is used a lot in knitted garments like sweaters and socks. It is soft, warm and has bulky properties resembling wool. It usually retains its shape, dries quickly and is wrinkle-resistant. Acrylic is usually machine washable and dryable at medium to low temperatures.

Wool is the classic fall/winter fiber, because it is a natural insulator. This fiber is also absorbent, resilient, wrinkle-resistant long-wearing. Wool is used in sweaters, socks, sportswear, dresses, suits and more. Most wools must be dry cleaned. Some fabrics are made

from a blend of two or more fibers. Keep in mind that the fiber making up at least 50 percent of the blend will most influence fabric characteristics.

#### PORK CHOPS CREOLE

8 pork chops, about 3/4-inch thick  
1 can tomato soup  
2 onions, sliced  
1/2 t. Tabasco  
1/4 t. powdered oregano  
1/2 t. salt

Trim off excess fat from

pork chops and place in a large baking dish. Arrange sliced onions over chops. Mix Tabasco, salt and oregano with tomato soup. Pour over pork chops. Bake at 350 degrees from 1 hour or until pork is fork tender. Serve with seasoned rice, baked potatoes or buttered noodles. Yield: 4 generous servings.

Dear Dr. Scott,

You hear so much these days about Stress, and I've really become interested in the role it plays in my life. Do you think it affects all the things you read about? Please use this topic in your column.

Dear Reader,

You have chosen a good topic and one that is in the public eye very much these days. It can be a lengthy subject, so I've decided to address this in the next few weeks.

Spice of Life - or Kiss of Death

Stress may be the greatest single contributor to illness in the late 20th century. Approximately two-thirds of office visits to family physicians are related to unrelieved stress and its effect on the mind and body. What is Stress?

It is an internal stimulation

that results from a mismatch between your expectations and the likelihood of achieving them in the real world. If the gap between expectations and the real world is small, you can mobilize your energies and use your skills to bridge it.

If the gap is too wide, however, you tend to mobilize the energy anyway-but you find no way to release it. Instead, you may become frustrated and turn all of this psychic energy against yourself. You lose the sense that you can control or influence your environment.

If you repeat this process frequently, you may begin to feel that life has become a joyless struggle. In this situation, a "softening up" process occurs in which you become increasingly susceptible to the whole range of physical and mental disease - from tension headaches, heartburn and anxiety attacks to ulcers, heart disease and severe depression.

Later stressful events acting on an already weakened constitution may be more serious or even fatal. Recent research shows that stress may set the stage for heart attack and sudden death caused by the heart's stopping - both of which occur in increasingly younger men and women.

#### STRABISMUS "CROSSED EYES"

Strabismus, sometimes called "crossed eyes" by the layman, is an eye problem in early life. It describes two eyes that are not perfectly parallel when viewing an object. If left uncorrected, and one eye is used all the time to the exclusion of the other, the "lazy" eye will fail to develop normal vision.

Although a certain amount of random divergence is common in infants, children past the age of one or one and a half should be able to hold both eyes in alignment. Although strabismus is often very obvious, it is frequently impossible to spot with the naked eye. Only a complete eye exam will ascertain its existence.

Sometimes a combination of eyeglasses and eye exercises will take care of the problem or the use of an eye patch if only one eye is involved. In more serious cases, surgery to reposition the eye muscle may be required.

It will not cure itself and is more than a cosmetic problem. If not corrected by age six, it may be too late for the child to learn to use both eyes together for normal vision.

I hope it doesn't take a few burned down houses or barns or valuable young stands of pine trees to bring this reality home to you folks.

Please call the firetower before you burn off your fields or ditchbanks, windrows, etc. this year. Ask the

dispatcher if it's safe to burn. Give him the location of your planned burn so we won't have any units tied up checking legal burns when a real wildfire gets started somewhere and needs quick action. Will you help us hold down fire losses in the county this year? We're counting on you!

You know we'd lots rather be doing tree planting or some other kind of positive, constructive activities with our thinned ranks this year.

Fighting wildfires can be dangerous too, and it just doesn't have to be that way. We can stop wood fires!

Who Knows - maybe this time next year that "early Fall feeling in the air" will find us all ready to enjoy it to the fullest instead of again dreading what might be ahead on dry, windy days.

### New Median Signs To Warn Motorists

Mississippi State Highway Department Director John R. Tabb said that Highway Department maintenance crews are erecting additional median signs to warn motorists of upcoming speed changes on interstates where speeds slow from 65 mph to 55 mph.

The new signs, which read "Reduced Speed Ahead" and "Speed Limit 55" are to be placed in the median across from existing speed limit signs. In addition, two 24 inch square red flags are to be attached to the new signs as well as the existing signs.

According to Tabb, these improvements will occur at eight sites across the state where the 65 mph Interstate Highway speed limit slows to 55 mph.

Currently, the signs are in use on the westbound lanes of I-20 at Brandon.

Tabb said interstate speed limits change from 65 mph to 55 mph in urban areas due to federal law. He said it is very important that motorists comply with the 55 mph speed limit since non-compliance could result in a loss of \$4.1 million in federal highway money.

Tabb encourages all drivers to be alert while traveling and to obey all traffic signs.

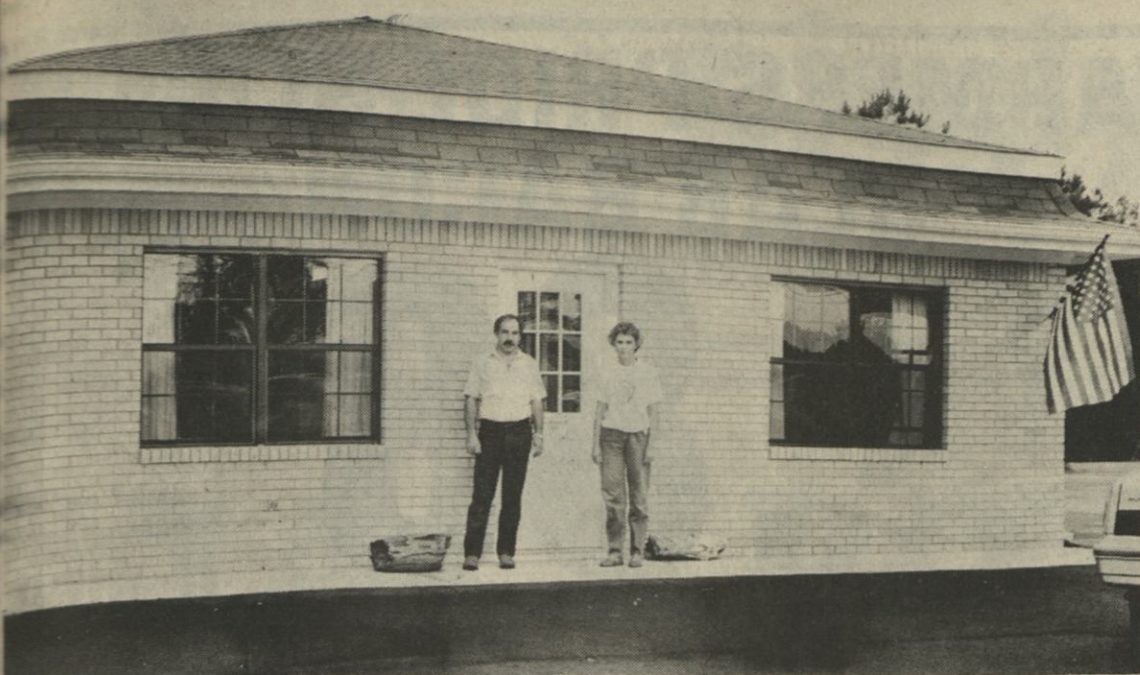

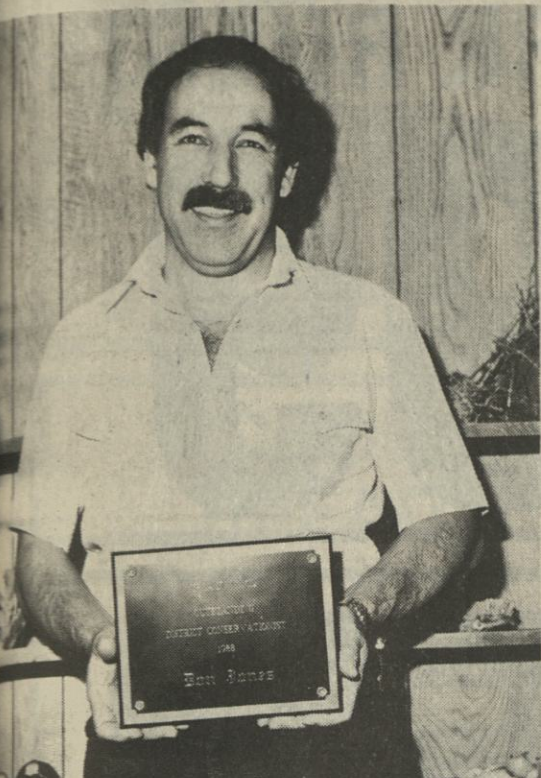

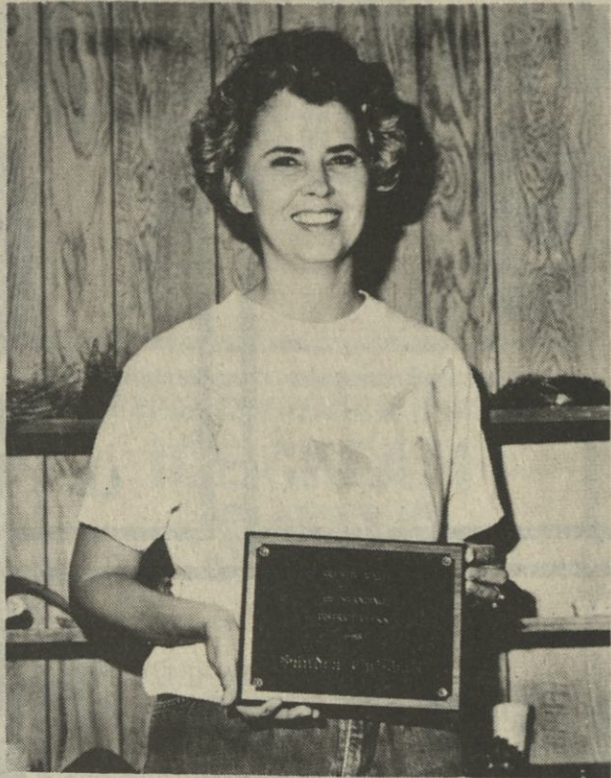




**Open House**

## ASCS Farm News

### WHEAT PROGRAM PROVISIONS

The 1989 wheat program requires a 10 percent acreage reduction by farmers who participate. This means that program participants will be

required to maintain an acreage conservation reserve area equal to 11.11 percent of their planted acres. The 1988 wheat program contained a 27.5 percent acreage reduction requirement.

The lower acreage reduction requirement for the 1989 wheat program points to wheat's improved performance in both world and domestic markets. Farmers who participate in the

program will be eligible for price support loans at \$2.06 per bushel and target price protection at \$4.10 per bushel. The program does not have paid land diversion or marketing loan provisions. Offsetting compliance will not apply. That is, eligibility for a program payment or loan for a commodity on another farm. However, limited cross compliance will be in effect for 1989-crop wheat meaning that the

acreage planted for harvest on a farm may not exceed the crop acreage bases, to be eligible for program benefits.

### FARMERS ARE ASKED TO MAKE NOMINATION FOR THE ASC COMMITTEE

Farmers are asked to nominate candidates to their choice by October 31 to be on the ASC community committee ballot. The ASC community committee election will be conducted from November 25 to December 5 by mail ballot. The two ASC communities in Tishomingo county are: (Midway and Paden) LAA No. 2

ASC committees are responsible for managing federal farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals. County farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve the farm community. Farmers will receive petition forms by mail and should return them to the county ASCS office before November 1, 1988.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible farm voters in the ASC community, and must be received in the ASCS office the October 31 deadline.

Farmers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASCS office for full details, including eligibility requirements for office holders.

The county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, handicap, or national origin.

## County Agents Notes

### DO-IT-YOURSELF CONTROL

Homeowners in Tishomingo County who want to do their own termite control are limited to the number of products they can buy over-the-counter. These limitations have been imposed by the Environmental Protection Agency.

In my opinion, termite control should be left to commercial applicators. Homeowners generally don't have an understanding of termite identification and biology, specialized equipment for control or elements of building construction. Their lack of understanding may do more harm than good.

However, two termite control products that can be bought over-the-counter are Termi-chlor Termite Concentrate and Orthoklor Soil Insect and Termite Killer. Each of these products contains 12.6 percent chlorpyrifos.

You can use these products yourselves, and perhaps have adequate control. But it's preferable (and safer) to hire a professional, and let that person to the job.

Thanks to Mainland China, Tishomingo Hospital was able to purchase a new Nuclear Medicine camera last month at a cost that would do any bargain hunter proud! Made by Raytheon, a major manufacturer of medical equipment, the camera was one of four ordered by China at a cost of \$140,000 each.

According to Tishomingo Hospital Administrator Bill Rutledge, the cameras actually cost \$76,000 to build. For reasons unknown to the Asian country cancelled its order for the machines, which prompted the manufacturer to offer them at a price that was to Tishomingo's advantage. The luka facility was able to purchase the camera for \$56,000.

Rutledge says that this hospital was in the market for a replacement for its obsolete, 10-year-old camera. "Ours was pretty well outdated," said Elmer Hunt, RT, Radiology Director.

A nuclear medicine camera is used for organ and bone scans to detect such abnormalities as fractures, tumors, blood clots, arthritis, and other diseases. According to Hunt, prior to the scan, a very small amount of radioactive material is injected into an artery; the camera acts like a large Geiger counter tracing the radioactive material as it travels through the artery. At the site of an abnormality (such as a tumor), the material will collect in greater or lesser amounts than are normal; this alerts the physician to the exact location of a specific problem and helps him to identify it.

The camera records the results of the test on X-ray film. Rutledge says that the hospital has been performing five to ten scans monthly. Hunt is optimistic that this number will increase to 30-40 monthly with the more efficient and modern camera. Nuclear medicine scans usually take about an hour; they can be done on both an inpatient and an outpatient basis by physician referral only.

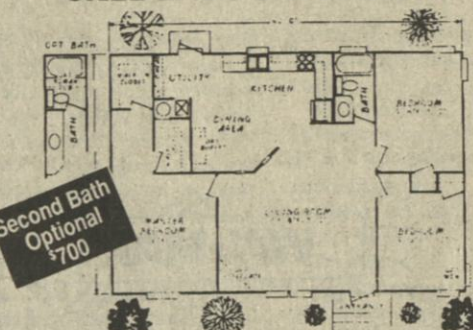

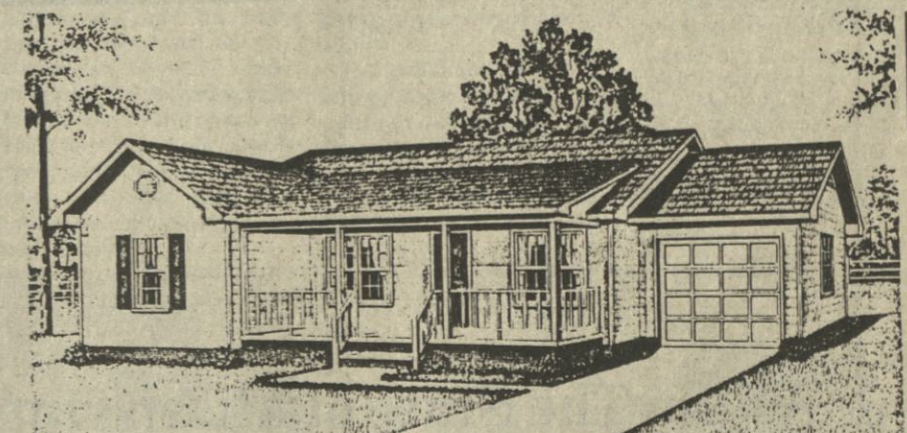

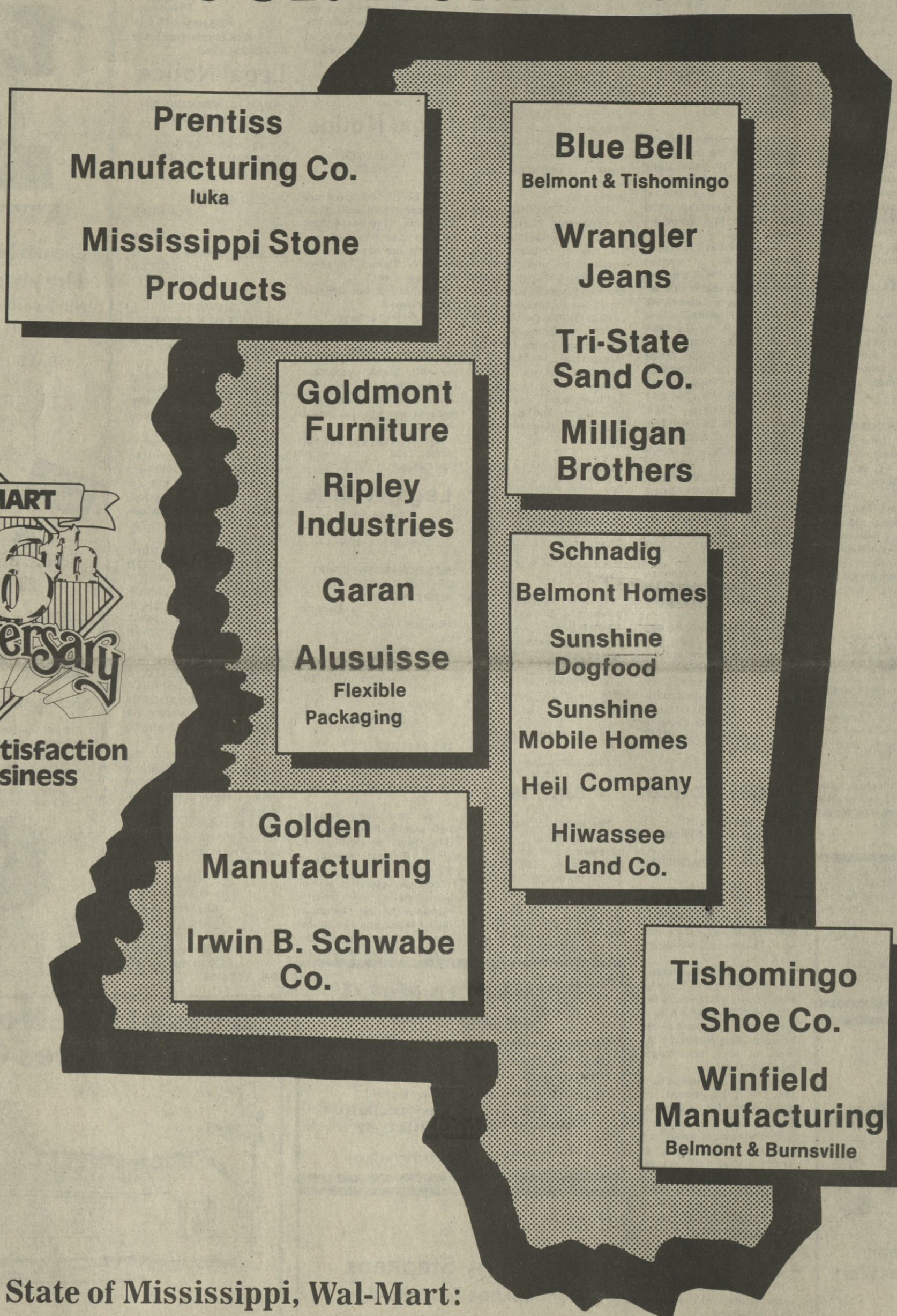
