The facility is a non-profit corporation and an agency of the North Mississippi Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The Miracles have inspired and challenged audiences in states and in Mexico and Canada. Some of their most memorable performances throughout the United States include a program at the White House; a program in the Rotunda of the Senate Building; the Nation's Bicentennial; Oral Roberts University; Marble Collegiate Church in New York City where Dr. Vincent Peale is pastor; Crystal Cathedral in California; a meeting of the World Council of Churches in Mexico City and for the International Kiwanis

Convention in Toronto, Canada. They have been featured on the "700 Club", in Guideposts magazine, Good News, Saturday Evening Post, and Mississippi. The choir has released two recordings, available in album, cassette, or 8-track.

When The Miracles sing, they awaken the sensitivity and arouse the curiosity of their audiences toward mentally retarded persons. Anyone caught throwing eggs or anything that could cause damage or harm, or other destructive acts of mischief will be prosecuted according to officials.

The following list of common sense tips are provided to help you and your children have a safe and enjoyable Halloween.

Limit driving speed to 15 miles per hour in residential areas between 5 and 9 p.m. Watch for children darting out from between parked cars, and use extra caution when pulling in or out of drive-ways. Use headlights as soon as it gets dusk. Come to a complete stop when making

a right turn on red, after determining that there are no costumed creatures in the crosswalk who might be unaware of your presence.

Trick-or-Treat early, while it is still daylight. Have a parent or older child go with youngsters.

Stay in your own neighborhood. Don't crisscross the street when going house to house. Cross the street only at corners. Parents should inspect all food given to children. Throw away candy and food not commercially wrapped or if wrapper has been tampered with.

Costumes should keep children warm and dry, be short enough to avoid tripping, and include reflective tape. Masks should have large eye holes, allowing full vision, to prevent falls and other injuries. Use flashlights, not candles to light pumpkins.

Ducks Unlimited To Host Annual Meeting October 27th

The Tishomingo County Chapter of Ducks Unlimited will hold its annual banquet at J.P. Coleman State Park on Thursday, October 27, 1988, at 6:00 P.M. There will be door prizes, an auction and a raffle following the meal. Membership is available to children as well as adults, both hunters and non-hunters.

Ducks Unlimited was founded in 1937 to help restore and rehabilitate prime waterfowl breeding grounds in Canada, where over 70 percent of North America's waterfowl are hatched. These grounds were nearly destroyed as a result of the sudden and massive westward expansion of civilization after World War I and the subsequent draining and cultivation of the land. The severe drought of the 1980's also contributed to the decline of continental waterfowl populations.

Since its inception, DU has completed more than 3,200 wetland restoration projects. These projects have benefited man as well by creating a stabilized water supply for agriculture, industry and municipalities. More than \$387 million has been raised in DU's fifty year history, \$300 million of which has been spent on wetland improvement and management. This means that the greatest percentage of every dollar contributed to DU goes directly into project construction.

Presently, DU membership stands at approximately 587,000, many of whom have

been enrolled by the more than 3,816 DU committees nationwide. DU's Greenwing program, initiated in 1973 for boys and girls under the age of 18, now boasts a membership of well over 60,000.

DU has reserved some 4,000,000 habitat acres which provide over 16,350 miles of vital nesting shoreline for waterfowl, while at the same time offering refuge to hundreds of other species of wildlife. In 1986 DU raised over \$59 million for wetland habitat restoration and has set a \$66.7 million goal for 1987.

motors. Mr. Zoller will, also, be conducting a program at the Iuka High School the afternoon of October 21, for the students. The purpose of this meeting is to make the children aware of the opportunities which will be

available to them in the future as a result of the ASRM project and the effects it will have on their lives. Both meetings are being sponsored by the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

Blue Bell, Inc. Announces Closing

Due to the ever changing market demand and foreign competition, in jeans, the Blue Bell (Wrangler, Inc.) plants in Tishomingo and Belmont, Mississippi are closing. The 2 plants could close within 6 weeks, as each assembly line completes their duties. Approximately 400 employees will be without jobs. A spokesman for Wrangler gave comments on the excellent quality of work that has been provided

over the years and had only the highest regards for the employees of these plants. Along with the mayors of Tishomingo, Belmont, and the county Board of Supervisors, the Tishomingo County Development Foundation has offered their assistance in promoting to prospects the soon-to-be vacant buildings.

An official corporation spokesman made the following statement: Wrangler, a division of VF

Corporation, has announced the closing of two (2) Mississippi plants in Belmont and Tishomingo. The closings will occur over the next several weeks.

"We deeply regret having to decide to close these facilities," said Bob Hendrix, Vice-President of Manufacturing for Wrangler. "But we feel it is necessary in order to maintain the company's competitive posture in a world market and its com-

mitment to operating the most efficient U.S. jeans plants."

Hendrix said that every effort will be made to find a buyer for the facilities, and that Wrangler will assist employees in finding other jobs. Severance arrangements will be provided.

Wrangler also announced that a plant in Comer, Georgia is being closed.

County Health Department To Give Flu Shots October 28th

"Shots are not just for kids," affirmed State Health Officer Dr. Alton B. Cobb. "Adults need immunizations too."

County health departments statewide have begun the annual influenza immunization effort. Recipients will pay \$5 per shot to cover the cost of the vaccine.

The Tishomingo County Health Department has scheduled flu shots to be given Friday, October 28, 8:30 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 3:30. This year's influenza vaccine provides protection against the current prevalent strains of flu: A/Taiwan/1/86, A/Sichwan/2/87, and B/Victoria/2/87. State Epidemiologist Dr.

Ed Thompson says those who do not want to get "the flu" should be immunized. He believes this is especially important for certain people.

Influenza is an acute disease of the respiratory tract spread by person-to-person contact through droplet infection. Symptoms include fever, chills, headache, muscle pain, tiredness, mild sore throat, and inflammation of the nasal passages; cough is often severe and long-lasting. Most patients recover on their own in about seven days.

"Influenza poses particular problems for the elderly or those with chronic heart or lung diseases," the State

Health Officer said. "The influenza virus can cause major epidemics of respiratory disease, as we see nearly every winter, and it causes thousands of excess deaths nationwide among this population."

The Surgeon General reports that 10 thousand or more deaths have been associated with influenza epidemics in 17 of the years from 1957 to 1984. More than 80 percent of the excess deaths attributed to influenza epidemics occur among persons 65 years of age or older. Attack rates during outbreaks in nursing homes are as high as 60 percent, with fatality rates of 30 percent or higher.

CONFUSION OVER CHOLESTEROL

Are you confused about cholesterol? With all the talk about lowering cholesterol levels, more people are concerned about cholesterol content in foods. Many people don't realize that cholesterol food sources should not be confused with all foods containing fats.

One simple way to explain the foods that contain cholesterol is that cholesterol comes from animals with feet, fins, wings or claws and not from foods that grow in the ground (plants). Red meat, butter and milk all come from animals with feet and contain cholesterol. Corn oil and vegetable oil are made from plants that grow in the ground. Neither product contains cholesterol, although both are high-fat foods.

Because of the confusion that exists about cholesterol, a National Cholesterol Education Program has been established by the National

Institute of Health.

Research has shown that eating a diet high in saturated fat and cholesterol directly increases the risk of coronary heart disease. The goal of NCEP is to reduce illness and death from heart disease by educating consumers and professionals about the risk of high blood cholesterol and the benefits when cholesterol is lowered. This program suggests that all adults over age 20 have their total cholesterol measured at least once every five years.

Because cholesterol levels below 200 milligram/deciliter are considered desirable, 200-239 milligrams per deciliter are borderline-high, and over 24 milligrams per deciliter are high. People with desirable levels should be checked again in five years. The other two groups require more careful assessment and repeat checkups. Diet changes are the primary treatment for all people at risk. The goal is to reduce the intake of total fat in the diet to 30 percent and to reduce the intake of total fat in the diet to 30 percent and to reduce the total dietary cholesterol intake to 300 milligrams per day or less.

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Most bifocal glasses have a visible line separating the two kinds of eye correction. Others have no visible line, just a blending separation that only the wearer can discern. Which is the best kind for you?

Some people feel self-conscious when they first start wearing bifocals. For a long time they've only had one vision problem, such as nearsightedness or farsightedness. But with middle age, many people need help reading because their eye-focusing mechanism is not as efficient as it used to be. So they need glasses that correct for both problems.

If you don't want the world to know you're

wearing bifocals, you wear the kind that look like ordinary glasses, dividing line between two sets of vision correction is ground down so it's not noticeable to people. You'll notice blurred area when you look from the upper to lower part of your lens vice versa. It's all a matter of personal preference.

MDET Award Grants

The Tishomingo Hospital was among twenty-five hospitals, colleges, universities, and school districts throughout the state of Mississippi which received an Institutional Conservation Program Grant from the Mississippi Department of Energy and Transportation.

On hand for presentation of the grant awards were Mr. Andrew Jenkins, Executive Director, Mississippi Department of Energy and Transportation; Mr. Warren Zurn, Mississippi Program Manager, U.S. Department of Energy, Atlanta, Georgia; Mr. Fred Heindl, Energy Division Director, MDET; Mrs. Dot Lambert, Energy Financing Branch Manager, MDET; and Mrs. Deborah Parks, Grants Administrator, MDET.

The grants, totaling in excess of \$530,000 (five hundred and thirty thousand dollars), were awarded through the Institutional Conservation Program, a National Energy Conservation Program.

The Institutional Conservation Program is a concept whereby qualified institutions may receive Federal and State grants to complete technical assistance and energy conservation projects.

Technical Assistance (TA) grants are available to schools and hospitals. These grant monies provide a minimum of 50% of the cost of a TA engineering study, which is a proven and valuable tool for future energy management planning. Additional grant funds are available to severe hardship cases as identified in the Mississippi State Plan.

Technical Assistance studies identify energy-using equipment and current operating procedures which cost very little, if any, money to implement and save the average institution around 10-20% in annual energy costs when completed.

Technical Assistance studies also identify energy conservation measures (ECM's) which would require some type of capital investment. These ECM's are very valuable in an energy management program and provide substantial returns

on investment. For example, a typical energy conservation project may require an investment of \$5,000, such as installing an energy management system in a small facility.

This type project saves an average of \$2,000 per year, providing approximately 28.4% return on investment in five years. And the project will continue to make money for you for the rest of its useful life.

Energy conservation measures (ECM) grants are available to Mississippi's

schools and hospitals at a minimum of 50% of the ECM cost, further increasing the rate of return on investment.

The Institutional Conservation Program has always been available to assist Mississippi's institutions in making the most of their energy dollars. Through technical assistance and energy conservation measures grants, your facility can take advantage of the financing opportunities available. Your consideration of these options is critical in your energy management program.

Awareness Month

For the first time since 1945, the accomplishments of people with disabilities and recognition of employers for their record of providing job opportunities for workers with disabilities will encompass the full month of October, 1988, nationally.

National Disability Employment Awareness Month (formerly National Employ the Handicapped Week) was recently changed by the U.S. Congress to allow more time

Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Annual Report 1988

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District would like to present their annual report of activities to the people of Tishomingo County. They sponsored many activities during fiscal year 1988. Among the most significant accomplishments were:

- (1) They developed and successfully completed an annual plan of work for 1988.
- (2) Sponsored two beaver trapping seminars and demonstrations: Entire 6th grade of Tishomingo Elementary and one adult group.
- (3) Participated in tree planting week at all four county elementary schools.
- (4) Sponsored a forestry tour and seminar with Tennessee River Pulp and Paper and Wesvaco timber company. Thirty people attended the tour of Jourdan's pallet factory and Shook's sawmill in Alabama.
- (5) Sponsored a pasture tour that featured working sheep dogs.
- (6) Sponsored a wildlife seminar with 125 people attending a Rainbow Trout and Crawfish supper.
- (7) The commissioners were supported by county supervisors and the mayor of Iuka by proclaiming May 13th as Soil and Water Conservation Day in Tishomingo County.
- (8) Soil and Water Conservation Day (Open House activities) - 300 people passed through Jaybird Park and the SCS office to view conservation displays.
- (9) The commissioners supported the area Soil and Water Conservation Commission by attending a 2-day winter meeting in Jackson.
- (10) Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District commissioners won the Outstanding District in Woodland for 1988.
- (11) The Soil and Water Conservation District worked closely with the USDA, Soil conservation Service and the ASCS office in putting under the Conservation Reserve Program 123 contracts.
- (12) Thirty six miles of Sunshine Bluebird Trail was completed on Highway 25 this year. The trail was started at the Alabama State Line and continues along Highway 72 to Burnsville. It will be completed when Highway 72 is completed.
- (13) Sponsored a poster contest in county schools on conservation. Sara Johns, 6th grade student at Tishomingo, won the county award and also the Area IV award. Area IV is made up of 12 counties in Northeast Mississippi.
- (14) Sponsored an essay contest with winners receiving awards.
- (15) Sponsored an annual awards banquet where 85 people saw local farmers honored: Otas McDonald, Wildlife; Gifford Page, Cropland; Pat Allen, Woodland; Elwood Daily, Pasture; and James Browning, Outstanding Cooperator.
- (16) Sponsored three demonstrations: Tree planting with fertilizer pellets, crosscut saw and Rainbow Trout in Tishomingo County.
- (17) Sponsored a lady and minority landowners meeting, explaining programs available to them.
- (18) Recruited 22 volunteers that have given 289 hours of service to District and SCS.
- (19) Moved to new location at 915 Highway 25 South.
- (20) Received the outstanding District Conservationist and Outstanding District Clerk for Area IV.
- (21) Appointed a new deputy lady commissioner, Mrs. Angela Long.
- (22) Sponsored a 3-day Soil and Water Conservation Youth Camp that included 3 tours: Kenneth McRae's dairy farm; TVA headquarters at Muscle Shoals, AL; and Richard Starkey's sheep farm.
- (23) Assisted with 163 ACP requests for cost share assistance in installing conservation practices.

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District is supported financially through an annual appropriations from the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. We greatly appreciate their support because without it we could not carry on an active conservation program.

State Unemployment Falls to 7.3 Percent

Mississippi's unemployment rate for September fell to 7.3 percent from 7.8 percent in August, Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director Linda Ross Aldy announced Tuesday.

This compares to a national unemployment rate of 5.2 percent for the month.

"We are continuing a pattern of slow, steady growth," said Aldy, noting that there have been no major industry deaths or start-ups in the last month to cause sharp changes in the employment picture. The annual return to school was the major factor.

In a labor force of 1,137,700 there were 1,054,800 Mississippi working, the largest number of people ever employed during the month of September.

There were 16,900 jobs added to employers payrolls, 13,200 in public education. Included in the figures are new teaching positions and

education support jobs such as teacher aides, crossing guards, lunchroom personnel, bus drivers and office aides. Returning teachers are considered year-round employees.

Manufacturing provided 234,200 jobs, up 100 from August and 2,000 more than a year ago. Nonmanufacturing, which includes schools, provided 657,900 jobs, 16,800 more than last month and 10,800 more than last year.

Lafayette County, where the University of Mississippi is the largest employer, had the lowest unemployment rate at 2.8 percent. Greene County, a rural area of traditional high employment, had the highest rate at 19.1 percent.

"I expect more improvement in the employment picture next month as schools complete their hiring and retailers gear up for the Christmas season," Aldy said.

Day Care For Children

Mississippi is taking the lead in removing one of the obstacles many job seekers face -- finding quality day care for their children.

The Mississippi Employment Security Commission this week unveils its Child Care Information Network, which will provide job-seeking parents with information on licensed day care centers.

"This is a first in the nation," said MESC Executive Director, Linda Ross Aldy. "We are tying the job hunt and the need for child care together."

Aldy credited Mississippi's first lady Julie Mabius with the impetus for the program.

"If it had not been for Julie Mabius' emphasis on quality child care, none of this would have come about," said Aldy. "We have never before considered child care part of our mission, but it is a logical step for an agency that deals with the workforce."

Each of the state's 76 employment offices will have access to a statewide list of licensed day care centers. Anyone may request a computer printout of centers for any area of the state. The printout will show the name, address and telephone number of each center, the number of children for which the center is licensed and whether it is a privately-owned or church-run center.

One Stop VA Claims Service

Jeff R. Ryker, Jackson VA Regional Office Director, announced a new program in Mississippi to allow action on certain veterans claims within one hour after filing. "The very first claim processed under this new system was for a widow in financial need," said Ryker, "and 40 minutes later she knew how much she would receive and when the check

Last year crops marketed by the association for its members were spring cabbage, bell peppers, and trellis cucumbers. The drought seriously affected the yields of these crops but some of the cabbage producers netted as much as \$700.00 per acre.

Crops which will be marketed next year include cabbage and at least one other crop which will be decided upon later.

Growing Strawberries

Strawberries may well be an upcoming alternative crop in Mississippi. Many farm families have already found that growing blueberries or muscadines can supply extra income.

A few individuals who have tried to grow strawberries have found that they can be profitable. Home gardeners are also interested in growing this fruit. As a result of all this interest, strawberry production in Mississippi has increased.

Strawberries can be a success story for you, but only if you're willing to develop a good production program. Your choice of plants and a bed to plant them will determine whether or not you will be successful.

Some strawberry diseases may destroy your planting, while others may weaken your plants and reduce their yield. These diseases may appear on the plants at certain times, or they may remain invisible yet do their damage.

If you have decided to plant strawberries, order the plants well in advance of planting time. Many nurseries require you to place your order as much as six months in advance. Don't wait until the last minute.

Always order your plants from a reputable nursery. We have a list of these nurseries at the Tishomingo County Extension Office, so do come by. Information on weed control, diseases and irrigation is available.

Cockroach Problems

We've had an increase in our cockroach population in Tishomingo County. Cockroaches are always a major problem in our households. The five kinds that give us the most trouble are the German, American, oriental, brown-banded and smoky-brown cockroaches.

The key to successful control is prevention.

Chemical control may also be necessary. Residual sprays such as chlorpyrifos, diazinon, resmethrin or

synergized pyrethrins can be used. Dust insecticides containing bendiocarb or boric acid can be used too.

You might want to consider using baits that contain propoxur, chlorpyrifos or boric acid. Aerosols may be used, but they have less residual activity and thus control time is shortened.

Wood Ashes

Those of you who burn wood in fireplaces may follow the practice of using the ashes as mulch around your plants.

Wood ashes have a relatively strong liming effect on soil. They should be scattered when used around plants, never dumped.

Do not apply wood ashes to plants that prefer slightly to moderately acid soils. If you're planning to use your ashes around particular plants, have the soil tested first.
