Area voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, November 8, to cast their ballot for candidates ranging from the President of the United States to County School Board Members, as well as Mississippi's all important United States Senator.

Voting is the responsibility of every eligible citizen, as well as a right and privilege. Take advantage of this privilege, exercise your right, assume your responsibility...VOTE!

In the General Election there will be only one ballot. The Democratic Nominees and the Republicans will be listed on the same ballot, and voting may be split, if the voter so desires.

The official ballot will include the following:

Whitlock and Tommy Williams. District IV, Harold Oswald and Mike Richardson. District V, Harold C. Sparks.

Two Rocket Plant Proposals Submitted

Two proposals from contractors bidding on the proposed solid motor plant were submitted Monday to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. However, NASA officials and contractors remain silent on whether or not a private site is still in the bidding.

According to J.R. Thompson, director of NASA's Marshall Flight Center in Huntsville, the two contractor teams whose bids were received are Lockheed Aerojet and Hercules Atlan-

tic. Lockheed Aerojet officials did not nominate a private site and said their only bid would be on Yellow Creek.

Hercules/Atlantic officials have retained the option of also bidding on a private site in Montgomery, Alabama.

NASA officials are now in the process of going through the submitted proposals. Thompson indicated there will be a public announcement on the question of the alternate site in the next day or two.

NASA's choice for a government-owned, contractor operator facility was made July 26 when Tishomingo County's Yellow Creek site was named. This property is owned by the Tennessee Valley Authority and was originally purchased for a nuclear plant.

State Representative Mack Wadkins, who also serves as executive director of Tishomingo County Development Foundation, has worked closely with officials from a local standpoint

and remains optimistic that Yellow Creek will be selected. "I'm confident that when the smoke all clears that Yellow Creek will be the chosen site because of the infrastructures and facilities available here," Wadkins said.

"It would be very difficult for any site which is basically raw land to compete with us (Yellow Creek) in view of the fact that we were chosen over the Stennis Space Center and Cape Canaveral, as well," Wadkins concluded.

Lockheed Submits Proposal To NASA

A 190,000 page proposal weighing over three tons and filling 140 boxes was submitted to NASA Monday, October 31 by the Lockheed/Aerojet team for the Space Shuttle Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) contract. It was shipped in five DC-10 cargo containers.

The ASRM will be a significantly improved version of the solid rocket motor used during Shuttle launches.

A 358-person team of Aerojet and Lockheed employees have been working on the proposal and supporting project plans for months. The work was done in a dedicated 30,000 square-foot ASRM Project Facility at Aerojet's Sacramento facility.

The proposal was created with a highly innovative desktop publishing network designed by Aerojet and Lockheed solely for the project. The network linked more than 80 Macintosh computers and 40 DecMate III and IBM-compatible personal computers into a nine VMS VAX computer cluster.

The ASRM is one of the largest projects Aerojet has

ever bid on. NASA has said the development contract alone will exceed \$1 billion.

The Lockheed/Aerojet proposal was submitted to NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, in Huntsville, Alabama. The agency is scheduled to award the contract in early 1989.

Lockheed and Aerojet teamed in the program in May of this year. Lockheed -- as prime contractor -- will provide systems engineering and integration and will have overall responsibility and accountability for the project. Aerojet will be the principal subcontractor for the motor design, development and production.

The ASRM will be built in a government-owned, contractor-operated facility at Yellow Creek in northeast Mississippi.

Aerojet is an industry leader in the design, development and production of large solid propellant rocket motors. Aerojet is a wholly-owned subsidiary of GenCorp, a technology-based company headquartered in Fairlawn, Ohio.

Lockheed is a leader in

systems engineering and integration. It refurbishes Space Shuttles at the Kennedy Space Center. Lockheed also is prime contractor for

NASA's Hubble Space Telescope, for the Navy's fleet ballistic missiles and advanced strategic defense projects.

The theme for this year's parade is "CHRISTMAS - U.S.A."

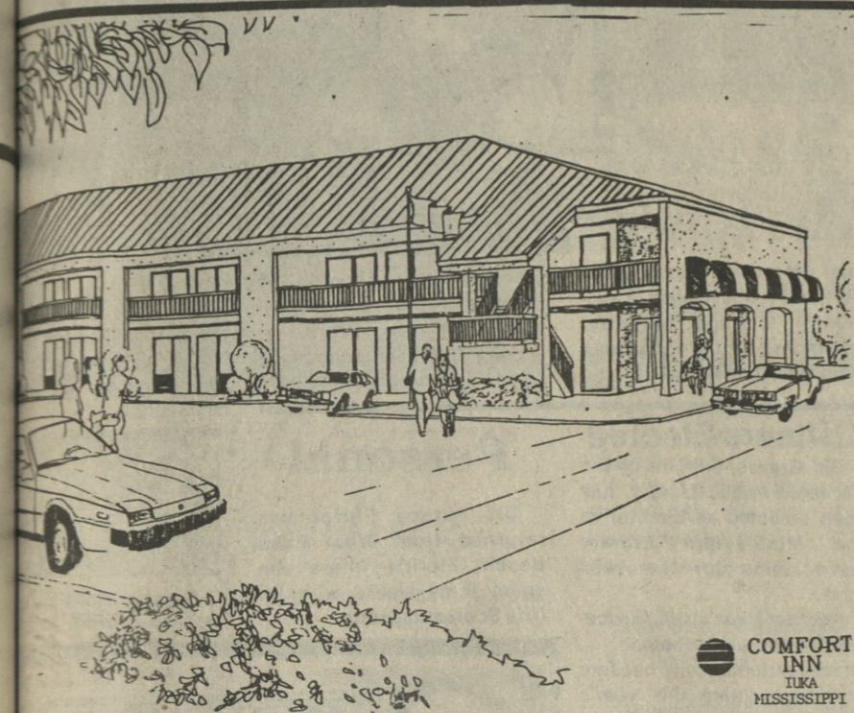

County Agent's Column

FIRE ANT ACTIVITIES

We're getting cooler days and nights in Tishomingo County, now that fall is here. But as long as soil temperatures in the county are above 60 degrees, fire ants will stay active in their mounds.

A good time to treat those mounds is NOW. If you treat, you will reduce overwintering ant populations. Drench the mounds, using one gallon of treatment mixture per mound.

You can use Diazinon 25 E at 2 tablespoons, Dursban 2 E at 1 tablespoon, Orthene 75 SP at 1 teaspoon or Sevin 50 WP at 1 tablespoon for adequate control. Continue to treat any new mounds that may form.

HOUSE PLANT CARE
Homeowners in

Tishomingo County will soon be carrying their potted plants inside for the winter. Before bringing plants inside, inspect them for insects and other pests.

Check your pots for sowbugs, centipedes and millipedes. Check your plants for aphids, scales, mealy bugs and spider mites. Spray your plants with an approved insecticide, such as malathion, before you put them inside.

MORE ARMYWORMS

The potential for armyworm infestations in Tishomingo County's oat, barley, wheat and ryegrass fields is good right now. Scout your forages before the worms get there first.

Look for small worms around the base of your plants. If you find five to seven worms per square foot, apply Dylox (either EC or WP) or Sevin XLR (80 WP or 50 WP) for control.

Don't assume your forage crops are free from invasion.

A half dozen reasons to vote for Wayne Dowdy for the U.S. Senate

1. Wayne Dowdy supports education. Trent Lott has not.

Wayne Dowdy, a strong supporter of education has been awarded a 100% rating by the National Education Association. Lott has the worst record in Congress for education. Although he went to college on a student loan, he received a "0" from both the Student Financial Aid Administration and the National Education Association. Lott was the only Mississippi Congressman with a "0" rating for his total lack of support.

2. One Republican senator from Mississippi is enough.

Realizing Democrats will control the Senate after Nov. 8th, Mississippi must have a Democrat in the U.S. Senate to get the heavy-duty funding and federal installations that we have had in the past. Thad Cochran realizes the danger of a second Republican in the Senate. Cochran, speaking to the Taft Institute in Jackson in July stated that Mississippi would be better off with one Democrat and one Republican in the U.S. Senate.

3. Wayne Dowdy has a better record against unemployment than Lott.

Wayne Dowdy's 4th Congressional District definitely has a lower unemployment percentage than Lott's 5th District in spite of Mississippi's largest employer (Ingalls) being located in Lott's 5th District. Ingalls was brought to Mississippi by the influence of Democratic Senator John Stennis. As of July 1988, the two counties with the highest unemployment in Mississippi are in Trent Lott's District - Greene County with 20.1% and George County with 18.1%.

4. Dowdy voted for social security benefits. Lott voted no.

NEMCC Attracts High ACT's

Better Quail Hunting Ahead

In late August a meeting was held between the state Department of Wildlife Conservation and organizations interested in developing habitat for bobwhite quail along powerline and utility right-of-ways.

Held at the Mississippi Power and Light lodge in Jackson, the meeting got underway with an overview by the Department of Wildlife Conservation on current plans to developing a statewide quail management program.

Department biologists outlined programs for implementing small game habitat development, conducting quail management short courses, developing food plots, and more intensively managing quail on selected state wildlife management areas.

Biologists say that habitat for bobwhite quail and other small game animals have been declining in recent years. Changing land use, forestry practices have and for fewer suitable quail.

Those attending the day event heard biologists discuss a number of vegetative management techniques that improve wildlife food plants.

Other topics discussed included herbicides, mowing and tenance schedules, tillage, plant species, cost-sharing, all geared toward wildlife right-of-ways management.

Those in attendance represented Mississippi State University, U.S. Forest Service, gas and utility companies, timber companies and Quail Unlimited.

Figures from the Department of Wildlife Conservation in Jackson show quail hunting each year attracts over 40,000 hunters who harvest in excess of 600,000 birds.

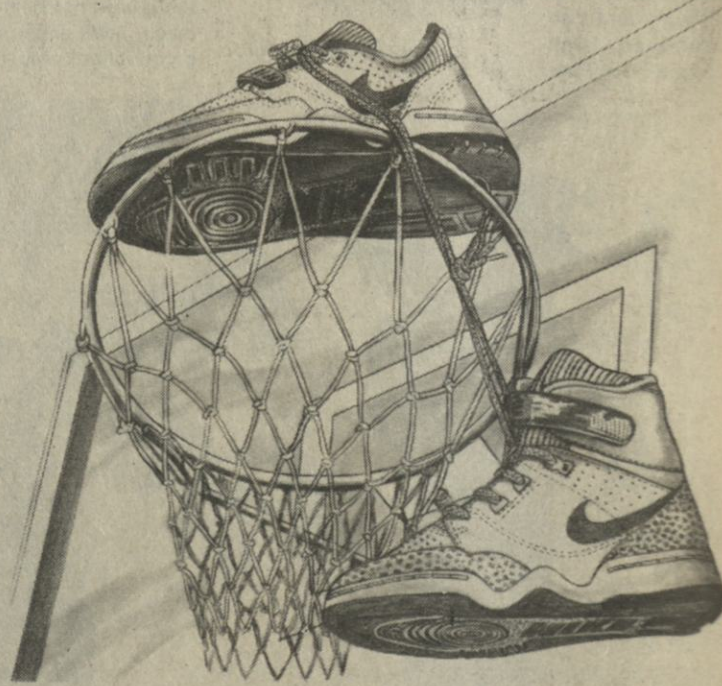

Tenn-Tom Today

One of the most thrilling sites to see around the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway is the "King of Fisherman". The osprey hovers over the water until it sees its catch, then plunges down feet first, sometimes fifty to sixty feet, until it reaches the water and catches its prey. This has become a familiar site among bird watchers along the Tenn- Tom Waterway, with some

twelve different sightings of these birds reported.

For those who have not yet learned how to identify these birds, here are some field guide characteristics. The osprey is a bird of prey that is approximately two feet from bill to end of tail with a wing span of four and one-half to six feet at maturity. The wings are blackish above and white below. The head of the osprey is mainly white, like the bald eagle, but with a broad black cheekpatch. The bill is a grayish color with a black tip. The osprey's distinctive characteristic is its flight pattern in which it uses an angle in the wing allowing it to show its black patch at the "wrist of the wing". It hovers over the water on beating wings and plunges feet first for fish.

The sound of an osprey is a series of sharp whistles which could like "cheep, cheep" or "yewk, yewk". Near the nest it has a frenzied "cheereek" sound.

The osprey diet consists almost totally of fish. This is the reason for its habitat

being around rivers, lakes, and coast lines. Osprey also need open areas, so the size of these bodies of water dictate whether they are used for osprey habitat or not. These birds have been seen around lakes located in highly populated areas, but for the main part it likes the inland lakes and coastal areas with a low human population. The only limit to the ospreys habitat is food and space. Ospreys are somewhat territorial. During the nesting season they have been known to have a pair nesting for every ten to fifteen acres. This is of course dependent upon the food supply.

The osprey mates for life and usually uses the same nesting area each year. These birds nest in trees or poles ranging in height from fifteen feet up to sixty feet, but most nests are found below forty feet. The nest is ap-

proximately fifteen inches in diameter and is lined with limbs, bark and leaves. The osprey usually lay three eggs, but sometimes two or four occur. Incubation is performed solely by the female and lasts for twenty-eight days. The male, during this time, brings food to the female which seldom leaves the nest. The osprey raise only one brood per year, but may reneat if the first nest is unsuccessful. The egg laying period ranges from late April until mid June.

At birth the young are covered with down and in about five weeks they begin to feather. The young remain in the nest until they are able to fly. During this time they are fed fish by their parents. The osprey doesn't have

many enemies which endanger their lives. The main one being the gunner who shoots at anything. The other enemies are the egg eaters such as crows, raccoons and snakes. Other enemies of the osprey, such as the southern bald eagle which robs the osprey of its hard earned food, are mainly a nuisance to its way of life.

The Corps of Engineers hopes that this article will give you an incentive to look for and help you identify these magnificent birds. SBA Reminds Of Loan Deadline

October 11, 1988, Jack K. Spradling, U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) District Director, advised that November 2, 1988, is the deadline for filing Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) Applications for the following Mississippi Counties:

Amite, Benton, Bolivar,

Clay, Kemper, Lowndes, Neshoba, Sunflower, Tallahatchie, and Tishomingo.

According to Spradling, "This designation was made following the Secretary of Agriculture's determination that farmers may apply to FMHA for emergency loans as a result of severe drought and high temperatures which occurred August 1, through October 3, 1987."

Non-farm/agri-dependent businesses that have suffered substantial economic injury from the effect of the agricultural losses which caused the designation by the Secretary of Agriculture may apply for an SBA EIDL. These loan funds are to be utilized by those non-farm/agri-dependent businesses, which were impacted by this disaster, to meet financial obligations that could have been met had the disaster not occurred. However, due to the passage of the Consolidated Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985 (PL 99-272), Agricultural En-

terprises, as defined in Section 18 (b)(1) of the Small Business Act, are not eligible for Disaster Loan Assistance from the Small Business Administration. To qualify for an EIDL, a non-farm/agri-dependent business must be unable to obtain funds from other sources and must meet SBA's definition of a small business. EIDLs are direct loans from SBA and cannot exceed \$500,000.00. The case-by-case basis with a maximum maturity of thirty years.

ASCS Farm News

1989 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

The 1989 Feed Grain Program calls for a 10 percent reduction in corn, sorghum and barley acres, one half the 1988 acreage reduction requirement. The program contains a 5 percent acreage reduction for oats, the same as in 1988.

Feed grain producers who meet these requirements will be eligible for target prices per bushel at \$2.84 for corn, \$2.70 for sorghum, \$2.43 for barley and \$1.50 for oats. Program participants will be eligible for national average price support loans at \$1.65 per bushel for corn, \$1.57 for sorghum, \$1.34 for barley, \$0.85 for oats and \$1.40 per bushel for rye.

The program does not contain marketing loan or land diversion provisions. Except for oats, the 1989 feed grains will be subject to limited cross compliance provisions. Under cross compliance, the acres planted for harvest on a

farm may not exceed the crop acreage bases to be eligible for program benefits.

As in 1988, the 1989 Feed Grain Program prohibits the production of nonprogram crops on land idled under the acreage reduction provisions.

Program participants will not be authorized to upwardly adjust any crop acreage base with a corresponding downward adjustment in other crop acreage bases with crop acreage bases on the farm. However, adjustments in crop acreage bases on a farm will be considered when producers need to change cropping practices to carry out conservation compliance requirements on highly erodible land.

Signup dates and other 1989 Feed Grain Program details will be announced later.

CRP PAYMENTS

Tishomingo County farmers received \$110,000 in cash for removing 2,596 highly erodible acres from crop production to USDA's Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

The annual rental payments are for cropland accepted into the program during fiscal years 1986, 1987 and 1988.

ASCS began issuing CRP payments October 1 to 117 program participants in the county.

Under the CRP, farmers

sign a 10-year contract with USDA in which they agree to take eligible land out of annual crop production and put it into perennial grass, wildlife planting, windbreaks or trees. USDA agrees to provide annual rental payments based on a bid; to cover up to one-half the cost of establishing permanent cover on the land; and to provide technical assistance for establishing permanent vegetative cover.

When the bid is accepted by USDA, the land cannot be used for crop production hayed or grazed for 10 years

and must be planted to trees, grass or other approved vegetative cover.

We have made a study and evaluation of the central purchasing system of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as of and for the year ended September 30, 1987. Our study evaluation included a test of compliance of the purchase clerk records and such auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. Our study evaluation did not constitute an audit of any financial statements prepared.

The Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, is responsible for establishing and maintaining a central purchasing system in accordance with Sections 31-7-101 through Section 31-7-127, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). This system is required for the road and bridge funds. It is optional for the other county funds. In addition to the required central purchasing system, any county may, in the discretion of the Board of Supervisors, establish and maintain an inventory control system on the road and bridge funds of the county. The Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, has established a central purchasing system for all funds of the county. An inventory control system has not been established. The objective of the central purchasing system is to provide a reasonable but not absolute assurance that purchases are executed in accordance with applicable state law.

Because of inherent limitations in any central purchasing system, errors, irregularities may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the procedure may deteriorate.

In our opinion, except for certain findings that have been referred to the Investigation Division of the State Auditor's office for further review, the central purchasing system of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, taken as a whole, provides reasonable but not absolute assurance that purchases are executed in compliance with the aforementioned sections.

The accompanying schedules of (1) purchases not made from the lowest bidder emergency purchases and (3) purchases made noncompetitively from a sole source, listed in the table of contents, are presented in accordance with Section 31-7-115, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). The information contained on these schedules has been subjected to procedures performed in connection with our aforementioned study and evaluation of the purchasing system, and, in our opinion, is fairly presented when considered in relation to that study and evaluation.

This report is intended solely for use in evaluating the central purchasing system of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and should not be relied upon for any other purpose. This restriction is not intended to limit the distribution of this report which is a matter of public record.

Check Insurance Needs

Farmers who plan to put in winter crops with Farmers Home Administration emergency loans based on this year's drought should take steps immediately to see if they need crop insurance for 1989 crops, according to John H. Arthur, FmHA State Director for Mississippi.

The "Disaster Assistance Act of 1988" requires any farmer with a production loss exceeding 65 percent of normal to agree to purchase insurance for 1989 crops, with some exceptions, as a condition for obtaining an emergency loan to help pay 1988 losses.

Mr. Arthur said the open season for obtaining multi-peril crop insurance for winter crops expires October 31, and certain Northwestern counties where it is November leaving farmers little time to obtain insurance. Although some extensions to

deadline may be granted, an individual bases. Arthur said farmers should be in touch with their insurance representatives without delay. Proof of insurance will be required before disaster loan application can be processed.

Exceptions to the requirement include where insurance is available and where costs would impose a hardship as determined by FmHA county committee.

been kept since 1960. From 1960-1978, more than \$225 million worth of timber was killed in the South.

Major epidemics occur about every 10 years, but not all across the beetle's range at the same time. The beetles are in an epidemic stage somewhere all the time.

An epidemic usually runs its course in two years or less. Pine beetles have lots of enemies. They are infected by bacteria, attacked by parasitic mites, and eaten by other insects and birds (especially woodpeckers).

In years when there aren't many pine beetles, there aren't many of these other creatures either, because they don't have much to eat (pine beetles).

When the Southern Pine Beetle population suddenly mushrooms, the population of these other creatures does likewise. But the pine beetles have a head start, and are so productive -- they can have up to nine generations per year -- that it takes awhile for predators to get them under control.

Buy, you may ask, "Aren't Southern Pine Beetles worse now than they used to be?"

Yes, because we have more pine trees than we used to. Many of our modern forests consist of acre after acre of pine trees, crowded as close together as we can get them.

The trees of the virgin forest were much more widely spaced, and interspersed with stands of hardwoods.

But with proper managem-

ent, it is possible to have highly productive pine forests, and keep Southern Pine Beetles to a minimum. We'll explain how in future articles.

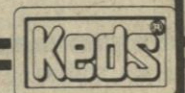
