City Of Iuka To Expand Lagoon-Sewer Facilities

1986 Federal Clean Water Act Requires Improvements

The City of Iuka will be accepting bids through December 2 for the construction lagoon site preparation, wastewater facility improvements, Mayor John Biggs announced today.

"Bids received at this time are strictly for the clean-up portion of a proposed project which will eventually more than double the size of our water sewer system," he said.

The job description consists of preparing the site for expanding the existing lagoon for two cell operation. An approximate twenty-five acre area needs clearing and grubbing.

The present twelve-acre lagoon, located northeast of Iuka at Indian Creek, was built to serve 3,600 customers. Near future plans call for an intake of an additional four acres which will increase the

existing site to a sixteen acre facility. A separate twenty acre lagoon will also be built just north of the existing one. When the two commence operation together, one will filter into the other with the second to be filtered into the stream. This will result into a doubled filtered system as compared to the one in use now.

"The proposed new lagoon will be designed for up to

twenty years growth," according to Mayor Biggs. The project is identified as part of a 1986 Federal Clean Water Act.

With these improvements to the water sewer system, rates are expected to increase to help defray expense.

Advertisements for bids on building the lagoon will be announced in the near future.

Iuka Police Officers Make Several Arrests

Stolen Vehicle Recovered From Texas Fugitives

Two Texas men traveling in a stolen vehicle were caught by Iuka Policeman, Ricky Cornelson early Monday night. The men were identified as Walter Clyde Boykin, Jr., 35, and Jack Lynn Greer, 35.

Patrolman Cornelson was alerted to the pair following their making an improper turn at the Hwy. 25/72 Intersection. The officer immediately recognized that the car matched a description the dispatcher gave of one wanted for driving away from a local service station without paying for gas.

Both occupants of the car

were charged with public drunkenness. The driver was placed under arrest for driving with suspended license due to driving under influence.

During the time the two were being held, an N.C.I.C. check on the registration plates of the 1988 Oldsmobile revealed it to have been stolen around 8 a.m. of the same day from the post office in Vicksburg, Mississippi.

Boykin and Greer will be released to Vicksburg authorities where they face charges of grand theft. It was reported that both were on parole at the time of their arrest locally.

Vehicle Taken By Fraud Recovered By Officers

Two Memphis, TN, men are each under a \$7,000 bond and await action of the Tishomingo County grand jury following their arrests in Iuka early Saturday morning by Iuka patrolmen, Red Taylor, assisted by Benny Parrish.

According to file reports, Timothy Hill and Philip Danata, both listing Memphis addresses, were apprehended when officer Taylor stopped the vehicle they were in after observing it to be traveling in an irregular manner in the vicinity of Mineral Springs Park. The driver, Hill, was driving under influence and refused the intoxilizer test, which is automatic admission of guilt.

A search of the car uncovered a small amount of marijuana and an approximate two grams of cocaine, the report stated.

Charges levied against the pair include: possession of marijuana in a motor vehicle, possession of a controlled substance, possession of whiskey, and public intoxication.

Further investigation by the officers revealed the vehicle involved, a 1987 Ford Mustang, was registered to someone other than the occupants.

The report said that Ford Motor Credit of Memphis had been looking for the car which was reported to have been taken by fraud.

After The Tishomingo

County News contacted Detective Mark Montgomery with the Douglasville County Sheriff's Department, the following report is given:

A subject has been held in

the jail there for the past three months on traffic and false name charges. His physical description is similar to that given of K.D. Sanders, but also could be matched to dozens of others. Detective Montgomery said based on physical description you can make people match. However, a process of elimination is on going.

The information given to Georgia officials is being handled like any other case, the officer said.

Officer Montgomery expressed that more than anything his department would like for their subject to be K.D. for a two fold reason. It would identify their subject and aid Mississippi law officials.

The detective especially stressed that he would regret seeing this information sensationalized to the point of getting hopes up and especially the let down it could be to the mother of K.D. should it prove futile.

Sanders was wanted by Tishomingo authorities for the December 29, 1985 slaying of his grandparents, W.D. and Ella Crawford.

Iuka Police Officers Seize Poker Machines

Three video poker machines and an undisclosed amount of money were seized by Iuka night patrolmen, Ricky Cornelson, Benny Parrish, and Bobby Flynt, Friday night during a search of an Iuka convenience store. Charges of possession of illegal gambling devices have been placed against Carol E. Sanders, 50, in the case.

According to the Police Department report, the officers searched the premises of Handy Sandy, located on East Quilman Street, following information alleging that illegal gambling devices were being operated in the business.

The machines have been housed at the Iuka Police Department as evidence pending a hearing of the case. A

hearing date has been set for November 28.

Sanders was released under a \$1,000 appearance bond.

The night patrolmen have also made several raids of cars and homes in the city within the last few months, according to reports. Arrests in these instances include charges for possession of illegal drugs.

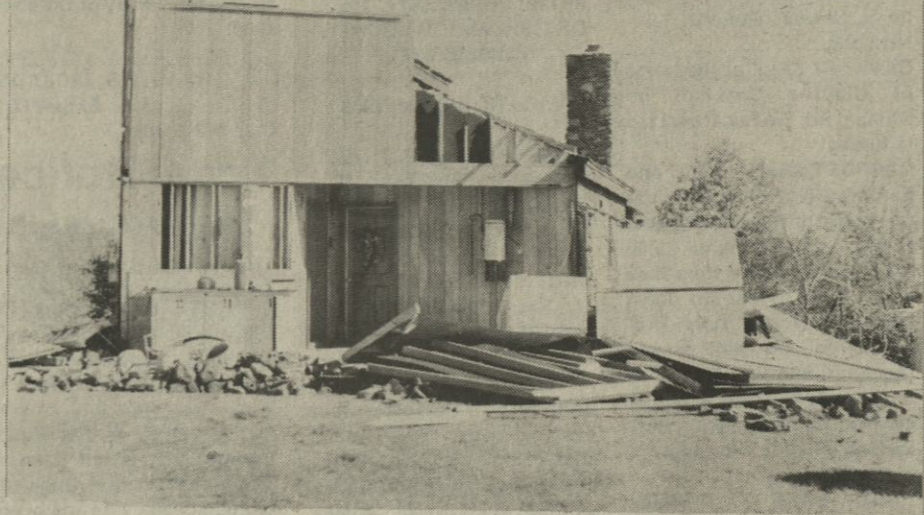


A back view, south and east sides, of Jackie and Jane Dean's house following last week's storm shows where the chimney top was blown away, windows shattered out, and bricks completely felled from the house portion. The Dean's were not at home during the impact. Mrs. Dean reported glass had to be "scooped" from the interior of her home and pieces of glass embedded in the walls and inside furnishings. A favorite chair for relaxing belonging to Mr. Dean and the one he normally sits in was split in half, she said.

Six Tishomingo County residents have been selected to participate in the 1988-89 George A. McLean Institute for community development headquartered at The University of Mississippi.

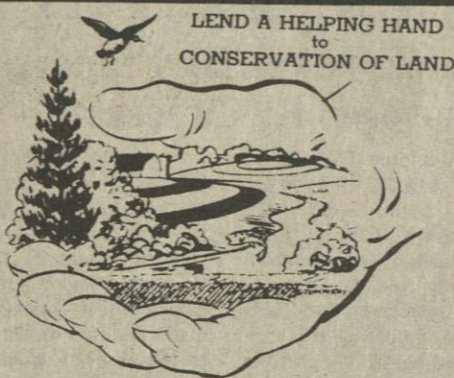
Chosen to take part in the year-long series of seminars were David Bonds of Iuka, vice president of Bonds Company Inc.; John Castleberry Jr. of Iuka, assistant vice president, Iuka Guaranty Bank; Ted Day of Tishomingo, president of Deposit Guaranty National Bank; Janet Gann Fulton of Iuka, owner/operator, Piggy Wiggly; Jimmy Stephen McAnally of Belmont, owner, Redmond Ready Mix Inc.; and William Wheeler Jr. of

The McLean Institute is designed to "raise the quality of life in a 15-county area of Northeast Mississippi and then to transport this model for use by other regions."

Named for the late Tupelo publisher and philanthropist George A. McLean, the McLean Institute was founded by McLean's widow, Anna Keirsey McLean, The Northeast Daily Journal and the development organization CREATE Inc. The Institute annually selects about 30 community leaders from the region to attend the seminars to develop local leadership skills.

Dr. Vaughn Grisham, an associate professor in the Ole Miss Department of Sociology and Anthropology, directs the institute.



LEND A HELPING HAND TO CONSERVATION OF LAND

Crop residue management is one of the most economical and effective ways to reduce soil erosion on cropland during the winter months. By leaving the crop residue on the soil surface soil erosion will be held to a minimum from harvest until planting next spring. All crop residue should be left on the soil surface after harvest; not burned, removed or plowed under. On land subject to flooding residues should be left standing.

Even distribution of crop residue will be more effective in reducing soil erosion than residue that is wind rowed or left standing. Effective shredding and distribution of crop residue can be accomplished by, flail-type mowers or rotary mowers for standing

cotton or grain sorghum. Chopper spreaders or double spin spreaders attached to the combine are also a good way to spread crop residue.

It fall tillage is needed it should be done with a chisel plow or subsoiler on the contour. A disk or bedder should never be used in the fall. According to most research chiseling or subsoiling in the fall is only beneficial on loamy soils that have developed a hard pan or plow plan. Most all research indicated that fall tillage has little or no benefits on clay soils.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

SWEATER SELECTION
Sweater weather has arrived so it's time to open the cedar chest, get out your old favorites and maybe purchase a couple of new sweaters for the season.

Sweaters are made from a wide variety of fibers. Some of the most popular fibers are polyester, acrylic, nylon, cotton, wool, mohair, angora and cashmere. The last four are the warmer fibers.

Natural fibers (cotton, wool and the specialty fibers - mohair angora and cashmere) are comfortable to wear. They resist wrinkling and absorb moisture. The absorbency will lengthen the drying time.

Unfortunately, the weight of these natural fibers may cause stretching when they are wet and during wear. Keeping the sweater in its original shape may be further complicated because natural fibers may shrink when washed.

To maintain their original shape, outline new sweaters on a large sheet of paper. After hand-washing the sweater, block the fabric back to the original shape using the outline to minimize shape changes.

While all natural fibers require a certain amount of insect protection, wools are generally more susceptible to insect damage.

Man-made fibers (acrylic, polyester and nylon) are lightweight, yet warm. They may pill from abrasion and may have static electricity. Most are easy to wash, dry quickly, need no blocking and resist insects.

Natural and man-made fibers are sometimes used in blends. A blend combines the strength, shape retention and easy care of man-made fibers with the durability, absorbency and luxuriousness of natural fibers.

When purchasing new sweaters look closely at the knit. Knit fabrics gave grain just as wovens. With a closer look, vertical and horizontal directions are easy to see. In knits vertical grain is called wales. Horizontal grains are called courses.

Check the knit fabric carefully. Was it cut on grain? Is it a close knit? Is the ribbing firm? Does the ribbon spring back to shape quickly after being stretched? A close knit will hold shape better and keep its elasticity longer than will loose knits.

Also look carefully at construction details and notice the following:

*A double thickness at the neckline will resist stretching out of shape more than a single thickness.

*A knitted band or grosgrain ribbon may be used to finish the edge. Ribbon is less bulky, prevents stretching and is stronger but it may not have been preshrunk. The knitted band matches the sweater and requires the same care but is bulkier.

*Any trim used should either require the same care as the sweater or be detachable.

*Buttonholes should follow a wale or a course. Be sure the stitches are even and close together. Vertical buttonholes come unfastened easily.

*Check buttons to see if they are smooth and securely sewn. Usually an extra button and yarn is included with the sweater.

*Wrist seams should be on the outside of the sweater if it has turned back cuffs.

Last, but not least, check the sweater for fitting points. The neckline should fit snug and lie flat. Shoulder seams should not droop. Armholes should be comfortable when you move. The fit should be roomy unless specially designed to fit snugly. There should be no gaping between buttons when sweater is closed. The top and bottom openings should be even. Zippers should lie flat and

ribbing should fit snugly.

CREAMY SPINACH DIP

1(10 oz.) package frozen chopped spinach
1 cup mayonnaise
1(8 oz.) carton commercial sour cream
1 medium onion, chopped
1(8 oz.) can water chestnuts, chopped
1(15/8 oz.) Package vegetable soup mix

Thaw spinach; place on paper towels, and press until barely moist. Combine spinach, mayonnaise, sour cream, onion, water chestnuts, and vegetable soup mix; stir well. Cover and chill mixture several hours. Serve dip with raw vegetables. Yield: about 3 cups.

County Agent's Column

FALL COLORS

"Someone took a brush and painted the forest in Tishomingo County." I've heard that remark made several times in the last month.

Yes, the changing color of the leaves makes our county beautiful in late fall. Despite appearances, nature doesn't paint with brushstrokes. Why do leaves change color, then?

Trees change leaf colors according to complex chemical formulas. Each tree has its own fall color which is bound-up in the chemical composition of the sap. The sap instructs the leaves on what color to turn.

The color the leaves turn depend on how much iron, magnesium, phosphorus or sodium is in the tree. It also depends on the acidity of the chemicals in the leaves.

What prompts the change? The weather has nothing to do with it.

As the days grow shorter and the nights longer, a chemical clock inside each tree releases a hormone which restricts flow of sap to leaves. Diminishing sap flow also causes chlorophyll, the chemical that makes leaves green, disappear. The sap left in the leaves dries, creating the colors of fall.

And that is why fall is so beautiful in Tishomingo County.

decide whether your bull has done the job you intended him to do. Your bull should be better than the cows he has been with in the pasture. Therefore, the calves you weaned this year should be better than their mothers. If not, you need a new and better bull. It is important to remember that a bull's influence on the herd is both immediate and long range through the heifers he produces which are kept for replacement.

Ask yourself these questions:

1. Is my bull young enough to breed cows he is with?
2. Is my bull structurally sound (no feet or leg problems)?
3. Is my bull reproductively sound (has he been semen checked and all organs in working order)?
4. Is my bull the breed I need?
5. Am I pleased with my calf crop?

If you answered "NO" to any one of the above questions, you need a new bull.

MACULAR DEGENERATION

The macula is a small area at the back of the eye that's responsible for fine or distinct vision. When the macula degenerates, there's a loss of central vision. You can't see things directly as well as you used to. All you get is a blur.

Your side vision or ability to see clearly around an object may still be good. But the object itself is out of focus.

Macular degeneration is one of the major causes of visual disability among older people. It's the result of damage to the blood vessels that nourish the retina, the nerve network at the back of the eye

that sends images to the brain. But, help may be available.

If the condition is treated early enough, you may benefit from photocoagulation. In this procedure, an intense beam of light from a laser is used to seal off or "coagulate" the affected blood vessels. You can also benefit from the many low-vision aids available, such as high-intensity reading lamps and stronger eyeglasses or bifocals. The key phrase is "treating it early enough".

Waterway Video Produced

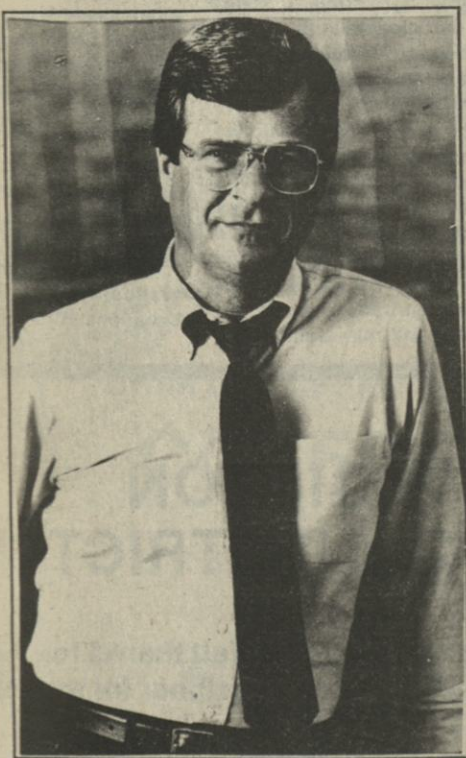

Are School Buses Safe?

Few disasters stir more emotion than a fatal school bus crash like the May, 1988 crash in Carrollton, Kentucky that claimed the lives of 27 people.

This tragedy threatened to damage public confidence in the pupil transportation system in this country. Concerned parents everywhere expect both an explanation of how something this awful could happen and what is being done to prevent it from happening again.

The simple answer to what happened in Kentucky is that the driver of the other vehicle had too much to drink, drove the wrong way down a highway at a high rate of speed and subjected a bus full of children to the horrible consequences of his irrespon-

sibility.

Drunk driving is, unfortunately, an everyday occurrence in this country. Most of the time, the victims are killed one by one in hundreds of cities and towns from coast to coast. The effect is diluted and few people take notice except, of course, the families and friends who are left behind. In Kentucky, the consequences of a single drunk driver created a catastrophe that made front page news. Everyone took notice. And yet, every day in this country, drunk drivers kill more than twice the number of victims of that one horrible crash.

It seems almost disrespectful to the families of the victims of the Kentucky crash to explain that school buses are the safest form of motor vehicle transportation and that a crash like the one that claimed the lives of their children has never happened

before.

The big, yellow school bus is an American institution that rolls through our neighborhoods every morning and afternoon transporting millions of children over 3.3 billion miles each year.

Are school buses safe? Yes, they are extremely safe. Most of the relatively few school bus-related fatalities each year are occupants of other vehicles or children who are killed while getting on or off the bus -- not the occupants of the bus itself. Until the Kentucky crash, there had never been a school bus passenger death due to fire.

Over the past ten years, the occupants of school buses have sustained fatal injuries at an average rate of 15 a year. It would be much better to report that no one is ever hurt in a school bus but fate isn't that kind. Mile per mile school buses are at least four times safer than automobiles. These are several reasons: because they are larger, school buses tend to get the upper hand in most crashes. There are special traffic laws for school bus safety. The buses must meet rigorous federal safety standards especially written for school buses and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reviews these standards regularly to make certain the pupil transportation system in this country is as safe as possible. Parents should not believe there is any safer way to send a child to school. Even walking to school is more dangerous than taking a bus.

We are looking for ways to make this safe form of transportation even safer. For example, we are testing new and improved materials that are more flame retardant, examining the number and placement of additional emergency exits, and taking a careful look at the location of the fuel tank.

But all the safety standards conceivable could not possibly provide a 100 percent guarantee against tragedy, especially when someone drinks to excess and subjects a school bus or any other motor vehicle to the

kind of assault that occurred in Kentucky.

How can a community help avoid future tragedies? First and foremost, we need to keep the pressure on to combat drunk and drugged driving. But we can take extra steps for school bus safety too. Local school boards are responsible for administering pupil transportation under criteria adopted and monitored by the state governments. Citizens should become better informed on school bus safety issues. They should monitor and press for enforcement of laws and regulations on school bus driver selection, training and licensing, maintenance, evacuation and safety drills. The laws on not passing stopped school buses are particularly important and should be strictly enforced.

What about older buses? A number of stricter safety standards for school buses went into effect in 1977. Many buses pre-dating those stan-

dards are still on the road. But even the pre-1977 buses have an excellent safety record -- they're not dangerous vehicles. If a local board of education can find the funds to replace an older, it's always preferable to have the safest school buses available.

What's the bottom line? Your children are very safe in school buses. There is no safer means of transporting them to school. With your help, we can fight the drunk drivers who are responsible for half of all fatal accidents including the tragedy in Kentucky. Together, we can make the excellent school bus safety record even better.

FORESTRY INCENTIVE PROGRAM SIGN-UP

A sign-up for cost-sharing under the Forestry Incentive Program will begin November 14 and continue through December 2, 1988.

The purpose of the

Forestry Incentive Program is to increase the Nation's supply of timber products. It is a production program with emphasis on increasing the future supply of softwood saw timber. Funds authorized for this program are in addition to those normally used for forestry under the regular conservation program. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will pay landowners 65 percent of their cost for the following practices: Tree Planting; Improving a Stand of Forest Trees; Site Preparation for Natural Regeneration.

Cost-share agreement are limited to eligible ownerships of not more than 1,000 acres of forest land, unless a waiver is approved. All applications must be for at least 20 acres. Applications for less than 20 acres will be approved under the regular Agricultural Conservation Program. A forest management plan developed by the Mississippi Forestry Commission will also be required. Interested landowners should contact the ASCS office by December 2.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, physical or mental handicap.

No. 1 THREAT TO TEETH

Q. Is there a serious problem when gums become red, tender and swollen?

A. Most often it's periodontal disease, the major cause of tooth loss in adults. Irritated gums are just one stage of periodontal disease. It develops slowly, at first without noticeable irritation of the gums, and worsens over time.

Plaque, the sticky film that builds up on the teeth, is the chief culprit. Neglected plaque buildup makes gums pull away from teeth. Small pockets form, filling with pus and plaque. In time, bone supporting the teeth erodes and teeth fall out.

It's estimated that 57 percent of people over 45 have gum disease to some degree. Yet, the damaging plaque buildup can be controlled by daily brushing and flossing and periodic professional cleaning. Moreover, periodontal disease can be controlled if detected and treated by the dentist in its early stages.

Help For The Disadvantaged

The 1987 Farm Bill stipulates that Farmers Home Administration will make an exerted effort to help socially disadvantaged Americans. The ethnic groups that make up the Socially Disadvantaged are: Blacks not of Hispanic Origin, American Indian or Alaskan Native, Hispanic and Asian or Pacific Islander. Program goals are to make the FmHA's Farm Ownership loan program and the purchase of farm inventory farm land more accessible to this group, to correct problems or obstacles that prevent Socially Disadvantaged Americans from receiving Farm Ownership loan funds and buying inventory property, to provide guidance to increase production levels, to promote the sale or lease of farm inventory to Socially Disadvantaged Americans, to provide all information available to all interested parties and provide necessary assistance to Socially Disadvantaged Americans in expediting application processing.

In Fiscal Year 1988, 11.6 million dollars are available Nation wide for funding Farm Ownership loans to Socially Disadvantaged Americans. The State of Mississippi has \$650,000 available. Additional funds are anticipated for Fiscal Year 1989. Credit Sales of inventory property are also available.

Family Community State Institute

Mrs. Pat Stephens, County Council President, and Nellie R. Horton, Extension Home Economist, attended the first State Training Institute of the Family Community Leadership program.

Family Community Leadership (FCL) is an educational program jointly sponsored by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and the Mississippi Extension Homemakers Council. The program, funded by a \$50,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation and the Mississippi Extension Homemakers Council, offers involvement in community leadership.

The goals of FCL are threefold. First is education - to understand the issues affecting families and communities and to become competent in decision-making skills. The second goal is participation - to involve participants who have learned to lead effectively in solving community and family related issues. The third goal is organization - to develop resources within Cooperative Extension and the local communities which support the leaders and groups.

Because FCL teaches skills with the purpose of in-

creasing leadership and involvement of families in community affairs, it is innovative. Volunteers and Extension staff work as teams in all parts of the program.

Participants in FCL are taught by peers. They practice skills related to citizen participation and learn to become teachers themselves. In this way the impact of the program is multiplied.

For most participants at this workshop there was something almost magical about being at the FCL training institute. The spirit that was slowly created over the three day workshop is one of wonder, self-expression, self-awareness and self-confidence. The personal reward from the FCL workshop is much more than most trainers ever anticipate.

What people seemed to unanimously agree upon is the personal growth that takes place with FCL. Ann Melton, an Extension Homemaker from Ackerman, MS, and a certified FCL trainer, says, "FCL is so valuable to me because of how I have grown. Over the years with Extension Homemakers, I've learned valuable homemaking skills but FCL has taught me valuable personal skills."

Mrs. Stephens and Ms. Horton agreed the "Family

Community Leadership Training" was the best leadership program they have received.

Mrs. Horton states she and Mrs. Stephens will be available to any group in Tishomingo County for "Leadership Programs." You may call Miss Horton at the Tishomingo County Extension office - 423-3616.

Rededication Ceremonies Held For 75 Year Old Trace Marker

Ceremonies in Tishomingo Tuesday afternoon marked the rededication of a marker erected in 1908 by the Mississippi Daughters of the American Revolution to denote the original path of the Natchez Trace.

Located at the intersection of Highway 25 and Trace, the marker, which was the first of fifteen to be located statewide along the original path of the Trace.

The original marker which fell victim to vandals some three years ago was restored through efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and donations of local citizens.

Lighting of the Eternal Flame by Tishomingo Mayor Bertha Tidwell and

Mrs. O.W. McClure, Regent of the Corinth DAR Chapter, told of her Charter's role eighty years ago in erecting the marker, which was the first of fifteen to be located statewide along the original path of the Trace.

The original marker which fell victim to vandals some three years ago was restored through efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and donations of local citizens.

Lighting of the Eternal Flame by Tishomingo Mayor Bertha Tidwell and

Tishomingo Chamber of Commerce President James Tennyson climaxed the ceremony and marked the town's commitment toward preservation of the history of this unique street corner.

Joint efforts of Chamber of Commerce President, James Tennyson, local historian, Eloise Southward, and a host of local citizens, correlated the restoration ceremony, which was followed by a reception at the First American National Bank.

Earlier in the day, a similar ceremony eight miles northeast of Tishomingo on the Mississippi/Alabama Stateline, rededicated a marker erected jointly by MS/AL DAR's in 1913.

This massive monument located on a little traveled portion of the Old Trace, in the Carter's Branch Community, became virtually hidden from view by trees and brush, and was remembered only by local citizens.

A road paving project several years ago exposed this marker and brought it to the attention of the State's DAR.

The Iuka DAR Chapter cleaned and polished the monument and cut the grass and brush in readiness for the Saturday ceremony.

Representatives from Mississippi and Alabama DAR were on hand to witness the rededication of the seventy-five year old marker by Mrs. Kelly Love of Hattisburg, State DAR Regent.

State DAR Historian, Mrs. Etoile Hopkins of Forrest read excerpts from old records which revealed that each state society paid \$150 for the monument marking the spot where the original Trace crossed the state line.

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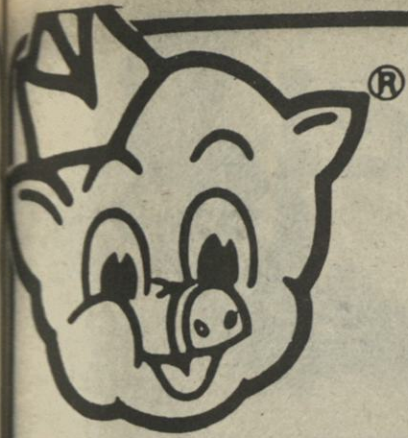
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
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
