Four Arrested In Local Drug Raid

Approximately twenty-seven grams of white powdery substance, believed to be cocaine, has been delivered for analysis to the State Crime Lab in Batesville by Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs. The delivery followed an early morning raid made by the sheriff and his deputies of a Tishomingo dwelling early last Wednesday.

Four subjects were arrested on drug charges

during the raid. Taken into custody and charged were:

Robert Alexander, 32, Rt. 1, Tishomingo - possession of controlled substance with intent to sell.

Rita Steward, 24, same address - possession of controlled substance with intent to sell.

Diane Luster, 26, same address - possession of controlled substance.

Willard Ray Friar, 33, same address - possession of con-

trolled substance.

The sheriff estimated the value of the drugs seized to be near \$3,000, depending on the quality, he said. An assortment of drug paraphernalia, along with an undetermined amount of cash was also confiscated from the scene, he said.

Two of the accused have met bail bonds and have been released. Alexander and Steward were freed after posting \$10,000 bail bond

each. Bonds for Luster and Friar were set at \$5,000 each. They remained in the country jail at press time.

Sheriff Dobbs commended deputy Mike Higgenbottom, who spear-headed the lengthy investigation, which eventually led to the arrests. He praised Higgenbottom and deputy Joel Holman for their good work and the thorough way in which the raid proceedings were carried out.

Local Delegation Visits Arkansas

A group of local citizens and officials visited Camden, Arkansas last week to assess the impact the Atlantic Research Corporation's facility has had on that community. The delegation arrived at Highland Industrial Park late Wednesday and enjoyed dinner at Cope's Cajun Kitchen that evening.

The group visited Fairview School District, Camden School District, City Hall and the ARC facility. Keith Mullin, Plant Manager, gave the welcome address and ARC presentation.

Mr. Mullin stated that one ARC facility, Arkansas Propulsion Division, at present has an annual payroll of \$50 million. An approximate three hundred artillery missiles are made per day at the facility and include both MRS and ARS missiles. ARC in East Cam-

den has attracted several Fortune 500 companies which have had a tremendous impact on the community. Mr. Mullin stressed the importance of an attractive area which will acquire technical workers. Based on facts he gave during his presentation, ARC should expect to have two hundred employees prior to construction start-up at the luka location pending NASA's contract awarding. Critical zoning would be essential, he said.

Jesse McHenry gave a presentation on LTV which is also a defense contractor who works with ARC, and Rodney Zachry, Assistant Superintendent gave a presentation and tour of the Fairview School District.

The group then traveled to the Camden Country Club for lunch. Following lunch, Ken Grove, an employee of ARC

conducted a plant tour. After the plant tour the group met with James Lee Silliman, Mayor of Camden and Charles Bell, City manager, to discuss the impact the facility had on their city. The group then drove to Highland Guest House for a delicious meal.

The following day was spent at Camden School District for a tour and presentation by Dr. Reginald Cooper. Jim Mullins, Office Manager and Director of Human Resources for the luka office of Hercules Atlantic served as host for the visit.

The group consisted of representatives from luka School District, Tishomingo County School District, Mayor of luka, T.C.D.F. and

the luka Chamber of Commerce. The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors were unable to attend.

Information gathered by the group during the tour should be of great benefit in preparing the community for NASA. Camden, Arkansas was chosen as a site to visit because it was once a small southern town that has experienced tremendous growth over the past few years as a result of defense contractors.

Social Security Benefits To Rise

The nation's 38.4 million Social Security recipients can count on a 4% increase in their benefits, starting next January. This will boost the average of retired workers' pensions by \$21.00 per month. The size of the increase was determined by the latest change in the Consumer Price Index.

This 4% increase will show up in the January 3 benefit checks. Hugh Tigrett, District Manager, Social Security in Tupelo, stated that in Tishomingo County, this increase will amount to \$52,960 per month in Social Security benefits and \$5,956 per month in Supplemental Security Income benefits.

Some other important changes beginning in January, 1989, are:

- (1) Retirees age 65-69 will be able to earn \$8880 without losing any benefits. This is up from \$8400 currently.
- (2) Beneficiaries under 65 will be able to earn \$6480 without losing any benefits. This is up from \$6120.
- (3) Effective January, \$48,000 will be taxable. This is up from \$45,000.
- (4) The tax rate on employees will remain at 7.51%.
- (5) There will be an increase in Medicare premiums. The increase is \$7.10 a month, which will raise the Medicare premium to \$31.90 per month, starting in January. These amounts are deducted directly from the monthly benefit checks.

Hunting Gets Underway

The hunting season is in full-swing in Mississippi. And just around the corner is one of the most awaited of all the seasons.

Deer hunting with the aid of dogs gets underway Saturday, November 19. This 13-day season will last through Dec. 1.

As most hunters already know, the bag limit on deer during this season is one buck with antlers visible above the natural hairline per day, not to exceed five during the license year.

The most recent figures from the Department of Wildlife Conservation in Jackson indicate that last year over 195,000 hunters took nearly 210,000 deer during all of the gun seasons on deer. They spent over 2.7 million man-days hunting. That's enjoying your sport.

Conservation enforcement officials in Jackson are reminding shooters that all deer hunters must wear in full view a minimum of 500 square inches of unbroken continuous daylight fluorescent hunter orange material during all deer seasons, except the archery season.

A deer camp permit must be obtained from the DWC before beginning operation. Of course, landowner permission is required to hunt, three shells.

fish, or trap on the land another.

Shooting hours during season are one-half before sunrise until one hour after sunset.

"We can't stress enough that hunters should exercise courtesy to all landowners in the community where they will hunt," executive Vernon Bevil said.

"Hunters need to remember that it's illegal to hunt on all public roads. If you hunt where they're not to, we can go a long way solving a big part of the ethics problem."

Meanwhile, another deer to wing shoots second dove season this coming Saturday and snipe hunting derby on Nov. 14 through Feb. 28.

Don't forget. It's illegal to hunt after sunset. And make sure your shotgun is plugged with three shells.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

"THANKSGIVING"
As Extension Home Economist for Tishomingo County, I would like to wish each of you a happy and safe Thanksgiving Season. This is a time when all of us should give thanks for the many, many opportunities life has to offer. With this in mind, let us not forget the meaning of this all important holiday season.

"HOLIDAY FOOD SAFETY"
Food-Fun-Holiday Time. Entertaining family and friends around the dinner table is part of the traditions of holiday fun. But, some

holiday favorite foods are highly perishable.

Take the roast turkey-the favorite holiday entree, or scalloped oysters or roast beef-other favorite treats-all must be carefully prepared and served safely.

Thaw turkey in the refrigerator. If you must thaw it more quickly, put it in a waterproof plastic bag, seal tightly, and defrost in cold water. Thawing frozen poultry at room temperature gives bacteria a chance to grow. This is especially true with large frozen turkeys because of the long time it takes them to thaw completely.

Cook turkey thoroughly, to an internal temperature of 180 to 190 degrees F. Never partially cook it and finish cooking later. Bacteria can survive in partially cooked poultry.

Cook turkey stuffing completely. It's safest to cook it separately from the turkey, because stuffing inside a warm turkey is a breeding place for bacteria. It's also easier to serve a crowd when the stuffing is cooked separately. If you must cook stuffing inside the turkey, cook until the meat thermometer inserted into the stuffing reaches at least 165 degrees F. Never stuff turkey the night before cooking.

Do not thaw commercially frozen stuffed poultry before baking - put it right in the oven.

Refrigerate turkey leftovers immediately. Remove all stuffing from bird (if you stuffed it this way)-and store separately.

Scalloped oysters are also highly perishable. Keep them refrigerated or frozen until just before cooking. In serving, keep them hot, above 140 degrees F. Serve quickly; refrigerate leftovers immediately.

Roast beef-rare, served with pan drippings, is another family favorite that is considered perishable. Even if your family must have rare beef, cook it at least to an internal temperature of 140 degrees F. Pan drippings must be heated to the boiling point before serving. Meat should not stand more than 2 hours at room temperature. Refrigerate leftovers promptly.

Remember-bacteria can cause food poisoning; all they need to grow is the right time, temperature and moisture. Vomiting, stomach cramps, and other unpleasant symptoms which can last several hours or even days can be severe-more so in young children and elderly people. Food improperly handled, prepared or served is often the cause of such symptoms. Remember holiday meals are fun-but only if you make them safe!

PUMPKIN BREAD

2/3 cups shortening
2 2/3 cups sugar
4 eggs
1 pound can (2 cups) pumpkin
2/3 cup water
3 1/3 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking soda
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
2/3 cup nuts, chopped
2/3 cup raisins (optional)

Cream shortening and sugar well. Add eggs, pumpkin and water. Blend in sifted dry ingredients. Add nuts and raisins.

Bake in 2 greased and floured loaf pans (9 1/4" x 5 1/4" x 2 3/4") for 50 to 60 minutes at 350 degrees F. (Note: This recipe may also be baked in 4 loaf pans (7 1/2" x 3 1/2" x 2 1/4") or three 1-pound coffee cans. Baking time may need to be shortened to about 45 minutes.

*Use fresh pumpkin, boiled as potatoes or turnips or use canned pumpkin.

Phone Bill Gets New Look

Beginning next month South Central Bell telephone bills will have a new look.

"When South Central Bell was divested from the Bell System, we were required to put a great deal of information on our bills that was not included before. Consequently, our bills lost some of the brevity and clarity they'd always had," Bailey said. "Our customers let us know they didn't like those bills, so we resolved to improve them. The new bill is the result."

He said that for most residential customers the new bill will have one or two pages, instead of the current five or six. The pages will be larger, and color has been added to enhance their appearance.

"We think that our customers will approve of the new bill design," Bailey said. "They told us what they like, and we've tried to give them just what they want."

do I need to do to remain eligible for USDA program benefits under the conservation compliance provision of the 1985 Farm Bill?" To maintain eligibility you must develop a conservation plan on all fields that have been determined to be highly erodible and are used to produce annually tilled crops. This includes fields planted for summer or winter grazing for cattle in addition to regular row crops. In many fields, a terrace system is the key practice that unlocks the door to conservation compliance. Terrace systems, in combination with other con-

servation practices, are effective in reducing and tilling erosion. How terraces do their job protecting highly erodible cropland, depends on they are farmed and tained. The USDA Soil Conservation Service is available to help you determine fields on your farm are erodible, and to help develop and implement a plan that will keep you in compliance with the 1985 Farm Bill. Disclosing Agents

Q. What is meant by the term "disclosing agent"?

A. It is a useful tool for revealing, or "disclosing," plaque on the teeth. Plaque is the sticky film that constantly accumulates on teeth. It is the leading cause of tooth decay and gum disease. Because plaque is colorless, it doesn't advertise its presence.

Disclosing agents, available at the dentist's office, are tablets or solutions that "colorize" the plaque. They can be used before or after brushing and flossing to reveal the extent of plaque. When an agent is used before brushing and flossing, absence of color after the cleaning indicates that plaque has been removed.

But that is just today's victory. Plaque forms every day. It takes daily brushing and flossing, plus periodic professional cleaning in the dental office, to remove difficult areas of plaque.

Tinted Window Law

Mississippi motorists have only a few short months left to make sure their vehicles comply with the new tinted window law passed by the 1988 session of the Mississippi Legislature.

The second phase of the two phase law governing the density of darkening materials allowed on the windows of motor vehicles goes into effect on January 1, 1989. The first phase, which went into effect on July 1, mandated certain regulations for installers of tinted material.

"After January 1 no Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker will be issued for a vehicle with tinted or darkened material on its windshield or windows unless it meets the density specifications of the

law, and bears a label certifying that it complies with these specifications," said Lt. Col. Billie T. Hughes, assistant chief of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol.

"Any motorist with a vehicle currently meeting the new standards must obtain a compliance label from any professional window tint installer before the first of January.

"On that date state troopers and municipal police officers will begin to cite drivers for violations of the new law," said Hughes.

Persons who drive a vehicle in violation of the new law, if convicted, may be fined up to \$100 and/or imprisoned for up to 10 days for the first offense. A second time offender, within a year of the first conviction, may be fined up to \$200 and/or im-

prisoned for up to 20 days, while a person who violates the law for the third time, during the same year, may receive a fine of up to \$500 and/or be imprisoned for up to six months.

Hughes said there are many sound reasons to ban window tint that hides the vehicle's occupants, and thus their actions, from view.

"Most importantly," he said, "is the safety of all motorists. Often eye contact between drivers at intersections and other such situations is a critical factor in accident prevention.

"Also, when a vehicle has windows so dark that the driver cannot comfortably see out during daylight hours, the vehicle becomes unsafe for nighttime driving or for driving in the rain," Hughes said.

Another factor to consider is that dark tinting allows criminals to carry passengers against their will and without anyone being made aware of their dilemma.

Law enforcement officers will also benefit from the new law, Hughes pointed out.

"The law enforcement

profession is hazardous enough without officers having to deal with possible unseen assailants making unknown preparations behind the shield of windows that are too darkly tinted.

"Mississippians have been given a liberal grace period in which to get their vehicles in compliance with this new law. The law went into effect on July 1 and we will not begin writing citations for violations of this law until January 1," said the assistant chief.

"We certainly hope that by January all Mississippians will lighten up the windows of their motor vehicles," Hughes added.

Fishing Tournaments

One of the Nation's most popular sport fishing tournaments will take place on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway next spring with a total value of potential prizes exceeding \$250,000, according to a recent announcement by the Tenn-Tom Waterway Authority.

Crappie, USA of Decatur, AL, will hold one of its 20 tournaments scheduled for next year throughout the nation on Aliceville, Columbus, and Aberdeen Lakes from March 1 to April 30. Tagged crappie with different prize values, depending upon sponsorship, will be released

in the three lakes.

"We are very pleased with the response to next spring's tournament so far, with national and local sponsors already sponsoring about 1000 fish with a total potential value opportunity of about one quarter of a million dollars," said Don Waldon, Administrator of the Authority. "However, more local businesses and organizations are needed to sponsor more tagged fish if this event is to be a great success", he said.

Any business, organization or individual may sponsor one or more fish with a minimum value of \$50. The sponsor may also dictate what location within the tournament area the fish should be released. The sponsor only pays if the tagged fish are caught during the period of the tournament and by a registered participating fisherman.

All of the sponsors will be listed in a brochure published for the event. There is a \$100 fee for sponsors but businesses may sell tickets or registration fees for the tournament. The \$5.00 fee is valid for the entire two month tournament with those businesses selling the tickets, retaining \$1.00 of each ticket sold.

The Authority is encouraging more local participation, especially in sponsoring a larger number of tagged fish at lower value to help ensure the tournament becomes an annual event. "It could prove to be one of the major attractions the waterway offers to local fishermen and visitors. With no expensive equipment involved and a very reasonable entry fee of only \$5.00 required for the entire two months of the tournament, every member of the family or anyone with a cane pole and jig can enjoy this unique fishing experience. The chance of catching a tagged crappie, one of which could be worth as much as \$50,000 should bring crappie fishermen from near and far", Waldon said. The deadline for signing up as a sponsor is September 21, 1988. The Chambers of Commerce of Columbus, Aliceville, West Point, Aberdeen and Amory are promoting the tournament along with the Authority. Anyone interested in participating as a sponsor of one or more fish should contact their local Chamber of Commerce office or the Tenn-Tom Authority in Columbus, MS at 601/328-3286.

What's Ahead For The Duck Season

Considering the serious drought conditions that have persisted in many parts of the country, and the poor year for duck production, this may not be Mississippi's best year ever for duck hunting.

In light of all this, Mississippi's 30-day duck season will get underway Dec. 10 and continue through Jan. 8. The basic daily limit is three ducks and the possession limit is six.

Hunters should know that the daily limit on ducks may include no more than two mallards (no more than one of which may be a female), one black duck, two wood ducks, one pintail, and one redhead. The possession limit is twice the daily bag limit.

For shooters who hunt Canada geese on Sardis Reservoir, the season there runs from Dec. 5-14, reopening Jan. 12 and ending Jan. 31. The daily limit is one and the possession limit is two.

In areas around the state other than Sardis, the Canada goose season will extend

Goose hunters should know that there are a number of areas in Mississippi closed to Canada goose hunting. For more information on this contact your local conservation officer or the game division at the state Department of Wildlife Conservation in Jackson.

Duck hunters will soon discover two other important changes to duck hunting this year. First, shooting hours have changed. The legal hours this year are from sunrise to sunset, unless further restricted on some state or federal areas.

Also, duck hunters will not be using the point system this year. The conventional limit of three ducks in the daily bag will apply to all ducks except the merganser

group.

Shooters hunting mergansers will want to remember that the daily bag limit is five, and only one of which may be a hooded merganser. The possession limit is twice the daily bag limit.

Conservation enforcement officials in Jackson are reminding hunters that to hunt ducks in Mississippi

they must have shotguns plugged capable of holding more than three shells.

Hunters 16 years and over are required to chase a federal duck stamp. In addition, hunters 16 and 65 must have a state duck stamp. On valid hunting license required.

many signs are needed, what
types of signs, and site
locations for signs becomes
a legitimate and complex
question for local, state and
government agencies.

The Corps of Engineers is
presently implementing a
standard sign program that
will apply to all Corps projects
nationwide. This new
signage program will assist
the visiting public in various
ways. Signs will be better
organized, easier to interpret
and convenient for travelers

who use Corps facilities. For
instance, signs used at a
Corps campground in
Mississippi will have the
same type of signs that a
Corps campground in any
other state would have. In the
past each Corps of Engineers
District had authority to
determine what color,
message format, letter style,
and materials that could be
used for signs at that par-
ticular project. Hopefully, the
new program will create a
uniform appearance and
correspond to the visitors

needs.
There are many different
categories of signs for which
the Corps is responsible at
each project. Identification,
recreation, traffic
regulations, symbols, aids to
navigation, and safety signs
are only a few of those.

Certain signs are required
to be installed at each project
while others are placed ac-
cording to a specific need
and at the discretion of the
Resource Manager.

Signs are installed for a
number of reasons, some of
which include information,
directions and regulations.
For instance, everyone is
familiar with the meaning of a
"STOP" sign and speed limit
signs. Any individual who
may have been caught
violating those signs soon
understand that the signs are
strict regulation type signs
and are enforced by various
law enforcement agencies.
There are numerous
regulation signs on public
lands and should be observed
since most of them carry a
stiff penalty when violated.

On many occasions a
common and legitimate
question arises when a Park
Ranger confronts an in-
dividual for violation of rules
and regulations. The
questions is as follows: "How
come ya'll don't put up a
sign?" In many cases there is
no sign prohibiting a specific
violation. This situation tends
to annoy the violator
especially if the Ranger
issues a citation for the of-
fense. Usually this type of in-
cident creates a tense
moment for both the Ranger
and the violator since the
violation may feel that there is
some degree of injustice and
the Ranger realizes that it is
his/her duty to enforce Title
16, Chapter III, Part 327 of
Rules and Regulations
governing public lands and
waters.

To resolve and prevent this
type of situation there are
some very important aspects
to understand. First of all the
goal of the Ranger is to

manage the resources at the
project for not only present
users, but for future
generation as well. Proper
resource management in-
cludes a wide range of items
such as preventing in-
dividuals from harming them-
selves and from harmful ac-
tions to others, or the en-
vironment. Second, the place-
ment of signs at Corps
projects for every specific
rule or regulation is not prac-
tical nor feasible. There are
over 80 rules and regulations
pertaining to public lands
stated in Title 36. If there
were signs posted at each
boat ramp or campground
area stating each specific
rule, they would soon become
meaningless. That many
signs at each park would ruin
the natural aesthetics, create
safety problems, and
possibly cause a tax because
signs are very expensive
items!

Individuals visiting a Corps
park must also accept some
responsibility for their ac-
tions. The Corps wants to
assist the visitor in this effort.
At each recreation area there
are bulletin boards placed
conveniently for anyone who
visits a Corps park. The
bulletin boards may have a
variety of information in-
cluding safety tips, lost and
found items, emergency
telephone numbers and last
of all a condensed copy of
Title 36 rules and regulations.

The Corps does have a
responsibility for installing
useful signs and will continue
to upgrade and modify signs
as necessary. The visitor
must also share some
responsibility for actions on
public lands. By doing this
you, the public, are helping
the Corps to manage public
lands for everyone to enjoy.

Bill Of Sale Required For Boats

Due to the increase in
Marine theft, the Department
of Wildlife Conservation is
now requiring a valid bill of
sale on all boats being trans-
ferred or issued a new num-
ber.
"Presently all a person has
to do is fill out an application
for a boat certificate of num-
ber and return it to our office
with the proper fee in order to
register or transfer a boat,"
explained branch director
Shirley Jordan.
"But this current

procedure offers inadequate
protection for the boat
owners in preventing
someone from transferring a
boat from the proper owner
into the name of someone
else."

Requiring a valid bill of sale
anytime someone transfers a
boat or purchases numbers
for a new or used boat, Mrs.
Jordan said, virtually assures
her and her staff that they are
dealing with the rightful
owner.

The new bill of sale
procedure will not apply to
renewals.

The club will meet again Monday, December 19, at 6:00 p.m. for our "Christmas Carol Sing." Members are ask to bring Christmas refreshments.

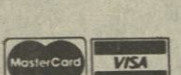

for a newly issued license bearing the words insulin dependent," Jones added. Jones said all driver's license examining stations open five days a week are equipped to issue the insulin dependent licenses. The stations that are open one or two days a week will be equipped to issue the license by December.

"The insulin dependent medical form to be filled out by a physician may be obtained from any driver's license examining station or may be mailed upon request. Requests for the form to be mailed should be made by telephoning the Highway Patrol at 987-1200 in Jackson," he said.

kill. Guns should always be transported unloaded in vehicles and unloaded prior to climbing fences or other barriers.

Tree stand accidents cause hundreds of injuries each year. Always use safety belts when climbing. Be sure your stand is sturdy enough to hold your weight. Also, unload all weapons before ascending or descending a tree.

Below are the 10 Commandments of Gun Safety. These should be followed by every hunter in the field.

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.
2. Watch that muzzle! Carry your gun safely. Keep the safety on until ready to shoot.
3. Unload guns when not in use. Take down or have actions open; guns should be carried in cases to shooting areas.
4. Be sure the barrel is clear of obstructions and that you have ammunition only of the proper size for the gun you carry.
5. Be sure of the target before you pull the trigger. Know identifying features of the game you hunt.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay.
7. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun. Never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
8. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water. At target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.
9. Store guns and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children.
10. Avoid alcoholic beverages and drugs before or during shooting.

Take the time to teach a youth safe hunting practices. Show them the great rewards found in a successful and safe day in the woods. Actions speak louder than words, so be a good example of a safe hunter.

Hunting is a sport rich in heritage and personal reward. Let's keep it a sport that we can be proud of and pass on to our children.

Tenn-Tom Today

With the beginning of another hunting season upon us, safety in the woods becomes crucial to everyone. A pleasant day hunting can be tragically marred by just one unsafe act. Although hunting, compared to other causes of accidental injury or death, is basically a safe sport, one accident or death is too many.

Education is the key to making the woods safe for everyone. If you are hunting with a novice hunter, teach them how to be safe. Better yet, enroll them in a safe hunter course. It wouldn't hurt any of us adults to take a refresher course either. Many states require some age groups to have hunting safety certificates and all southeastern states offer this course free of charge to anyone who is interested.

Misidentification is the greatest cause of hunting accidents. Don't be trigger happy! Positively identify the game before you shoot. Know where your hunting partners are and stay in your designated hunting area.

Teach all beginning hunters how to handle a firearm safely (loading, unloading, transporting, storage). So called "unloaded guns" can

While she boiled out the pot, she burned off her iron skillet, then you take 1 1/2 buckets of shelled corn (they used a 5 gallon bucket), add 3 or 4 tablepoons of lye, cook until the lye begins to eat the husk off of the corn. Wash the corn

insulin users, the background of the license holder's photograph will be yellow instead of blue.

"To have a driver's license stamped 'INSULIN DEPENDANT,' the individual must have a physician fill out a medical form which is provided by the Driver License Examining Branch of the Mississippi Highway Patrol," said Major Jerry Jones, director of the patrol's Driver Services Bureau.

"The physician, who should be licensed to practice medicine in the State of Mississippi, must certify on the form that the individual is an insulin dependent diabetic. The form should then be given to licensing personnel when the individual applies for or renews a driver's license," Jones said.

He said the cost of the license will remain \$13 for a regular operator's license and \$21 for a commercial operator's license.

"A \$5 fee will be charged if a duplicate license is issued in the middle of a licensing period. Persons obtaining a duplicate must surrender their current license in return

Beware Drivers!

The Mississippi Highway Patrol has something for all Mississippians to be thankful for this Thanksgiving. It is a new, non-radar detectable, speed monitoring computer called VASCAR that has been installed in the patrol cars of state troopers.

"Mississippians should be thankful for this new device as it will make the highways of Mississippi a safer place to travel during the holidays," said Lt. Col. Billie T. Hughes, assistant chief of the highway patrol.

"Since VASCAR gives off no signal it makes radar detectors useless, thus enabling our officers to catch even the 'professional' speeder."

"Common sense dictates that the only reason to operate a radar detector is to circumvent the speed laws. By equipping our troopers' cars throughout the state with VASCAR we will be able to combat the ever-increasing use of the radar detection units," said Hughes.

In conjunction with the use of VASCAR, the highway patrol will have 54 additional troopers working the roads during the four-day Thanksgiving holiday period.

"The 432 extra man-hours will augment our normal traffic force in an effort to keep our highways safe for traveling Mississippians and visitors," said Col. David Huggins, assistant commissioner of public safety and highway patrol chief.

The supplemental man-hours will be funded by a federal grant established to finance the 'call back' details. "Also included in our special enforcement efforts will be the use of surveillance aircraft to spot drunken, drugged or other reckless drivers, speed law violators and stranded motorists," said Huggins.

"The use of air surveillance

units, VASCAR and extra manpower will substantially aid us in reaching our objective of reducing the needless loss of lives and human suffering that results from automobile crashes," he added.

Thanksgiving was the deadliest holiday in 1987 when 14 people were killed on Mississippi's highways in 11 fatal motor vehicle crashes. Records indicate that nine of the 11 accidents were one-vehicle accidents.

The Thanksgiving holiday period begins at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, November 23 and ends at midnight on November 27, 1988.

Lifetime Sportsman Licenses Offered For First Time

For the first time, Mississippi sportsmen will be able to purchase a lifetime hunting and fishing license, according to the Department of Wildlife Conservation.

"We wanted to offer hunters and fishermen in our state the option of buying a one-time license, something of real value and convenience to them," said Vernon Beville, executive director of the wildlife agency. "The Lifetime Sportsman License is a great deal, because while it saves the sportsman money and the time and trouble of annual renewals and purchases, it also helps our wildlife programs."

"The money from all Lifetime License purchases will go into a special Wildlife Endowment Fund. We'll use only the interest from that fund to help pay for wildlife management, enforcement, research and education," Beville said.

Three types of the new licenses are available: the Lifetime Sportsman License for \$500, plus a \$25 administrative fee; the Youth Lifetime Sportsman License (under 16 years-of-age) for \$200; and the Gold Lifetime Sportsman License for \$1,000. All Lifetime Licenses are available only through the Jackson office of the Department of Wildlife Conservation.

The new Lifetime Licenses allow holders to fish and hunt during any legal season and to take any game, except waterfowl, without buying additional licenses or permits. Waterfowl hunters must still purchase both state and federal waterfowl stamps.

Only Mississippi residents can purchase a Lifetime License. However, if you buy a Lifetime License and later move from the state, your license will be valid if you come back to Mississippi to hunt and fish.

"I really can't think of a better investment in Mississippi's wildlife than buying one of these special licenses. Sportsmen will be helping guarantee generations of hunting and fishing opportunities. And there isn't better gift for someone who loves to hunt and fish in Mississippi or for some young person learning to love it too," Beville said.

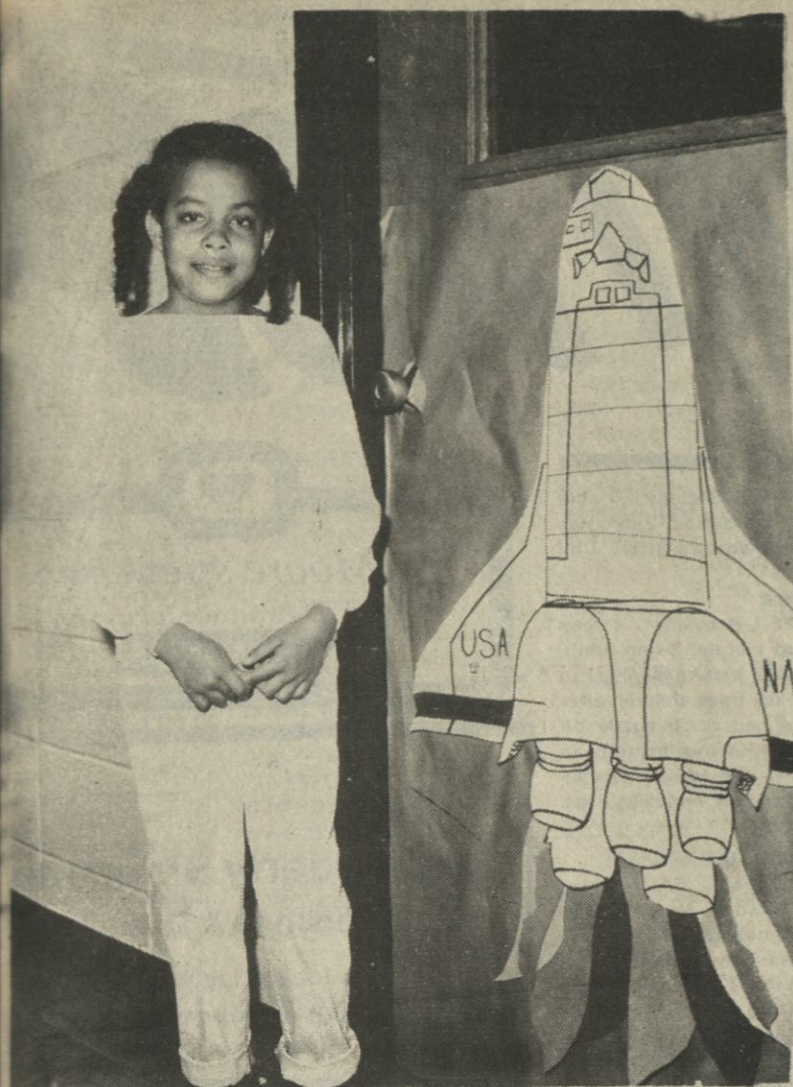

County Agent's Notes

MOVING MISTLETOE

Many think of mistletoe as a Christmas decoration. It is really a tree parasite, having root-like structures that penetrate into limb for water and food.

Many herbicides used to kill mistletoe can damage the tree because of the penetration of the "roots" into healthy tree tissues. Use a handpruned pole pruner to remove heavy infestations of mistletoe from your trees.

For safety's sake, you might want to hire a professional tree worker if pruning is involved.

SEEDLINGS

Forestry agencies in Mississippi and other states are offering

many different species of trees from their nurseries for the 1988-89 planting season. Most agencies will give first priority to orders within the state.

Before you place an order, write or call for an application and seedling order form. Also inquire about availability, method of payment and shipping charges. I suggest you contact the Mississippi Forestry Commission first, and order from their nurseries if possible.

If you order from out-of-state nurseries, be sure you purchase seedlings grown from a source adapted and recommended for the area

where you intend to plant.

Tree characteristics vary according to the climate and conditions where the trees have evolved. That is why geographic origin of seed is important to you.

When ordering from out-of-state, ask the nursery to notify you when they ship your seedlings so you can pick them up immediately. Seedlings that stay at a bus terminal or post office for a week or two will dry out and probably die.

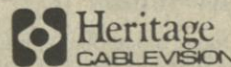

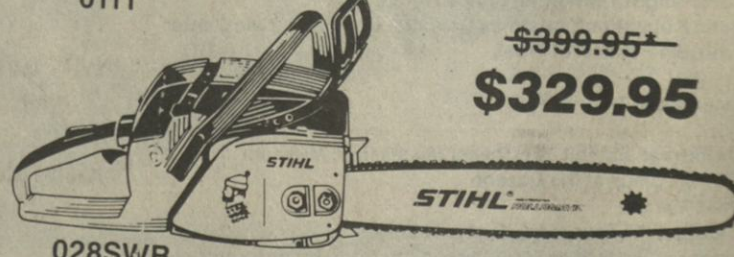

Unemployment Rate Up Slightly

Mississippi's unemployment rate for October rose to 8.0 percent, Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director Linda Ross Aldy announced Monday. This rate is seven tenths percentage point above September when the rate stood at 7.3 percent. This compares to a national unemployment rate of 5.0 percent for the same period.

"Even though this rate is

higher than last month's figure, it follows a pattern of consistently being lower than corresponding 1987 rates," said Aldy.

In a labor force of 1,144,800 there were 1,053,300 Mississippians working, 2,000 more than both last month and October, 1987.

Manufacturing provided 234,500 jobs, up 300 from September and 2,200 more jobs than a year ago. Non-manufacturing provided 661,200 jobs, up 3,400 from last month and 10,700 from October, 1987. Most of the increase in nonmanufacturing was due to seasonal gains in public and private education.

Jobs in public education numbered 94,700, an increase of 2,000 above September and

2,900 above last year's October figure.

Lafayette County, where the University of Mississippi is the largest employer, had the state's lowest unemployment rate at 3.1 percent, up three tenths percentage points from September. Green County, a rural area of traditional high unemployment had the highest rate at 19.0 percent, down two tenths percentage point from last month.

"October's rate reflects the ninth month this year that the unemployment rate has been less than ten percent," said Aldy. "We expect this trend to continue for the rest of this year," she added.

65 MPH Pushes Fatalities Up

More people are dying in auto accidents on rural interstates where the speed limit has been increased to 65 mph, recent research indicates.

In 1987, during the months after 38 states posted 65-mph speed limits on rural interstates, automobile fatalities rose 22% over the previous five-year average for the same months.

"The increased speed limit has made our highways less safe. For the few minutes saved, our citizens are going to pay with their lives and increased costs," American Insurance Association

Southeast Regional Vice President Cecil D. Dorsey said.

Insurance losses are only a part of the cost, according to Dorsey. "Property losses, productivity losses, medical and emergency costs hurt more than just the victim; they hurt the population as a whole," Dorsey said. Even in 1986 under the 55-mph speed limit, the U.S. Department of Transportation figures show that vehicle crashes cost Americans more than \$74 billion.

New figures released by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety in Washington, DC, also show that during 1987 vehicle occupant deaths fell by almost one percent on rural high-

ways where speed limits were not increased.

Forty-one states have increased their speed limits to 65 mph on their major roads as permitted by a law enacted in April 1987. The American Insurance Association represents property casualty companies which write more than \$100 billion in premiums and have assets of \$100 billion. The AIA is headquartered in Washington and has representatives in every state.
