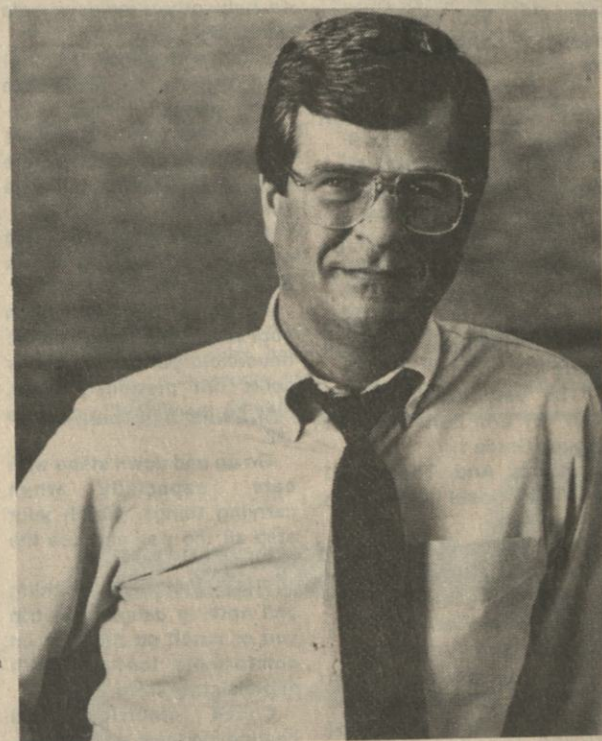

## Senator Trent Lott To Tour Yellow Creek

Public Invited To Attend Reception At Old Courthouse

Tishomingo Countians will have the opportunity to visit with U.S. Senator Trent Lott in Iuka next Wednesday



following his tour of the proposed government site for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant at Yellow Creek.

Senator Lott will be honored at a reception to be held at 4 p.m. Wednesday, December 11, at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse. The general public is invited to attend the reception along with local elected officials, corporate officials, industrial leaders, and news media representatives. Refreshments will be served.

The support of our entire congressional delegation is extremely important to assure the appropriation of funds on an annual basis to continue construction and implement production at the advanced solid rocket motor plant.

Senator Lott was elected to fill the vacancy left at the retirement of Senator John C. Stennis, chairman of the Senate Appropriations

Committee. He was sworn in Tuesday.

NASA made the announcement in July of 1988 that the abandoned TVA nuclear power plant site had been selected as it's prime choice for a government-owned, contractor-operated plant or privately-owned plant.

The biggest obstacle remaining for Yellow Creek in landing the facility is for Congress to appropriate money for the plant, officials say.

Tishomingo County is located in the home district of Rep. Jamie Whitten, chairman of the powerful Appropriations Committee of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Congress appropriated \$27 million for startup costs in 1988 for the Yellow Creek space project.

Only two contractors submitted bids by the October 31 deadline. The contract is expected to be awarded early this spring with construction to commence soon after.

### TIPS FOR CHILDREN'S POST-HOLIDAY "BLUES"

A concern for children, as well as adults, at this time of year may be post-holiday "blues."

When the holidays are over, there may be a big letdown. Children may be grumpy, tired or withdrawn. They may seem especially unable to find activities that amuse them, even when they have a

whole array of new toys or games to explore. Parents may get upset when all the holiday gifts do not bring days of obvious pleasure and endless play.

This is a good time to enjoy quiet times together. It is a time to build a fire in the fireplace and cuddle, to listen to favorite records, to look through the family album, to sip hot cocoa, to take a walk on a quiet morning or to read some books aloud. You might select from some of the following:

### EASY SAUSAGE QUICHE

Pastry for 9" pie shell  
1 lb. bulk pork sausage  
3 eggs  
1 teaspoon salt  
Dash of pepper  
Dash of cayenne pepper  
1 1/2 cups (6 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese, divided

Line a 9" quiche dish or piepan with pastry; trim excess pastry around edges. Bake at 400 degrees for 3 minutes; remove from oven and gently prick with a fork. Bake 5 minutes longer. Let cool on a rack. Cook sausage until browned; drain. Combine eggs, milk and seasonings in a medium mixing bowl; beat lightly. Stir in sausage. Sprinkle 3/4 cup

cheese over pastry shell; top with sausage mixture. Sprinkle with remaining 3/4 cup cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 50 minutes or until set. Yield: One 9" quiche.

## 4-H Communicates

Winter -- you can love it or hate it. After a sizzling summer that saw much of the nation baked and dry, the brisk northern winds may not feel all that bad this year.

On the other hand, cold weather means we must feed a hungry furnace, engines are harder to start, and we must allow extra time to bundle up before heading to work or school. Worse yet, snow and ice are added hazards when driving and walking, and early darkness forces revisions in the way we drive and go about our business.

Take advantage of the upcoming school holidays to make your room and house safe for you and the rest of your family.

And, here are some reminders I hope you'll pass along to help others enjoy a safe winter season.

There's no place like home! And there's no place like home when it comes to accidents, as more people are hurt at home than anywhere else. Make home safety a family affair.

Have a place for everything and keep everything in its place when not in use.

Provide ample light. Watch your step, even along familiar household paths. Objects or spills not previously there, may be there now to cause a fall.

Go up and down stairs with care, especially when carrying things. Watch your step all the way and use the handrail.

Wear well-fitted clothing and nothing dangling to trip you or catch on fire. Put on comfortable footwear with slip-resistant soles.

Check electrical and heating systems and appliances, making needed repairs.

Make your house safe for children and for elderly or handicapped family members and guests. Make a room-by-room inspection to correct any potential hazards.

## Ask Ochsner

Q. Each year I make up a list of New Year's resolutions which always includes losing weight, quitting smoking and drinking. Will it really make that much difference in my health if I take off my excess ten pounds and stick to my other resolutions?

A. Losing an extra ten pounds can be beneficial to your health in helping to prevent other diseases. According to Dr. Thomas Feagin, head of community internal medicine at Ochsner Clinic, New Orleans, people can actually prevent or delay the onset of 51 percent of the things likely to hurt them, simply by changing their lifestyles.

There are five general areas, he says, where an individual's own efforts can reduce his or her health risks: (1) seatbelts (2) micro-environmental pollution, ie., smoking and drinking (3) nutrition (4) physical fitness and (5) mental well-being.

The single most controllable health risk is smoking. There is no good derived from smoking, and the harm it does is well documented, from cancer to heart disease.

There is some theoretical benefit to be derived from a low level of alcohol intake. It can increase the level of a beneficial cholesterol called high-density lipo-protein. But the risks of alcohol are so great that most physicians hesitate to recommend its use at all.

There are three components to exercise - cardiovascular endurance, flexibility and strength. Cardiovascular endurance is the chief benefit of many popular exercises, from jogging to aerobics. But very strenuous running may not be the most advisable for some people. The goal is slow, long distance training. Walking is ideal, swimming and stationary bicycling are good.

The first step in proper nutrition is to calculate your body weight. The ideal body weight can be calculated as follows: For men, to a base weight of 106 pounds, add six pounds for each inch over five feet. For a woman, the base weight is 105 pounds, plus five pounds for each over five feet.

Reduce the proportion of animal fat in your diet from the American average of 50 percent of caloric intake to about 25 to 30 percent. Avoid fried foods, reduce consumption of red meat and whole milk dairy products. Eat more poultry and fish and increase your intake of dietary fiber, which is contained in fresh fruits and vegetables, whole

wheat breads and bran cereals.

Some aspects of life that contribute to a person's mental well-being are management of stresses in life (particularly during holiday seasons) and a support network of family and friends. Anything from music and laughter to finding comfort in your spiritual beliefs can help reduce tensions.

Although we cannot always control some health risks that are inherent in today's society, we can try to maintain our health as best we can. Some prospective medical specialists feel the average span of years in which an individual could reasonably expect to live longer and function at full potential could be increased by a change in lifestyle. This is reason alone to adhere to your New Year's resolutions.

## Tenn-Tom Today

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway has been experiencing a problem that many lakes in the south face. The problem is aquatic weeds. They spread from the lower to the upper reaches of the waterway.

Two particularly noxious weeds are hydrilla and Eurasian Watermilfoil.

Hydrilla has been found on the lower Tenn-Tom. Many consider hydrilla the most problematic plant in the aquatic environment.

Reproduction of this weed is by seed, stolons (stems which grow along the ground or lake bottom and root), rhizomes (a horizontal underground stem), fragmentation, turions (winter bud that becomes detached), and tubers (a reproductive structure grown on an underground stem).

It is bad enough that aquatic weeds can reproduce in so many ways but compounding the problem is their ability to grow with very little sunlight and in waters up to 45 feet deep. Once gaining a foothold they can restrict the growth of other beneficial plants and form large mats. They can almost be considered an underwater kudzu.

In the last couple of years Eurasian Watermilfoil has been found on Pool E and Bay Springs Lake. This weed reproduces by seed and fragmentation. It roots in the lake bottom and grows to lengths of 15 feet. As with hydrilla, the ability of this plant to regenerate through fragmentation is troublesome. Wave action can break pieces from the plant and cause them to float in another location. Eurasian Watermilfoil also grows in thick mats restricting the operation of boats.

Unwary boaters may assist in the spread of these weeds when pieces cling to the motor. These water weeds are reported to have the ability to be out of water for a week, then begin to grow when placed back in the water. Boaters going from a lake which is infested may carry the plant to another lake or, if returning to the same lake, begin new colonies compounding the problem.

All boaters can help slow the spread of these weeds if they remove the vegetation from their boat motors at home and do not throw them into a water body. For more information contact the Bay Springs Resource Office at (601)454-3481 or the Waterway Management Center at (601)327-2142.

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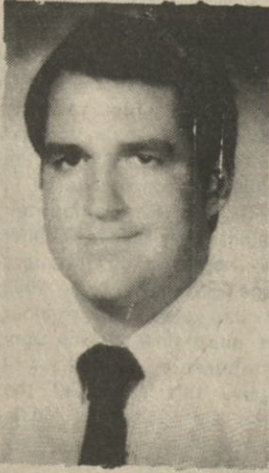

rainfall, and temperature, is from seven to twenty percent. Smoke management becomes an important consideration along highways and near populated areas.

Fire weather forecasts we receive from the National Weather Service help us to plan our prescription burning so as to avoid smoke management problems. Perfect burning weather sometimes only occurs four or five days during the winter.

The most important point to remember in prescribed burning is to get professional help. This is not a "do-it-yourself" project. Qualified crews with adequate equipment are required. When burning permits are not being issued during severe fire danger periods no prescribed burning should be attempted. Also, remember that prescribed burning should never be used where hardwoods are being managed as the main crop. Fires, whether planned or unplanned, are taboo in hardwood forests.

ficient method of achieving a diversity of forest management objectives, but it must be done under very carefully "prescribed" conditions.

One of the most important reasons we use prescribed burning is to reduce potentially hazardous "fuels", thus decreasing the risk of wildfire damage. The avalanche of October-November wildfires we had would not have caused near the damage it inflicted if the burned areas had been carefully prescription burned in prior years.

Prescribed burning can also be used to prepare sites for seeding and planting. Burning exposes the mineral soil, controls competing vegetation, and removes debris that may impede new growth.

Through burning, wildlife habitat can be improved by increasing the amount of quality herbage, legumes, and browse from hardwoods. It also creates openings for wildlife feeding and travel.

Other objectives prescribed burning can achieve are controlling disease; improving the quality and quantity of grasses and flowering plants; enhancing appearance for recreation purposes, and improving efficiency in harvesting.

Prescribed burning should

always be done under correct time and weather conditions. Timing is especially important when fire is used to prepare sites for seeding and planting.

If hardwood control is the objective, sites should be burned during the spring and summer. More than one burn may be required to control hardwood. Otherwise, burns should take place in fall or winter.

Fall and winter burning is best for spring sowing, and summer and early fall burns are used on areas targeted for natural regeneration or direct seeding.

The most important weather considerations when planning a burn are wind, relative humidity, temperature, rainfall, and smoke dispersion.

Generally, winds should be not more than two to ten miles per hour for most terrain. Relative humidity should be from 30 to 50 percent. Preferred air temperature for winter burns is 20 to 50 degrees F.

For summer burning air temperatures of 80 to 95 degrees are recommended. The soil should be moist. One half to one inch of rainfall is desired one to three days before the burn. The preferred range of actual fine fuel moisture, which is influenced by relative humidity,

to federal property located on the Tenn-Tom Waterway. Let me also point out that you cannot hunt geese on the Tenn-Tom Waterway within the State of Mississippi. There are currently no Corps restrictions on the harvest of geese on the Alabama portion of the Waterway, however consult the state regulations for open areas.

Next, I hate to put a damper on those of you who have stocked up on fireworks for the holiday season,

especially the ones intending to hold their very own fireworks display at one of the Corps recreation areas. It is against federal regulations to possess fireworks on Corps property without having a special events permit to do so. Check with your local police or sheriff's office for safe, legal areas to enjoy your fireworks.

Last, but not least, there have been a few boaters, who, periodically, decided to leave

their vehicle, along with their trailer, parked on the launch ramp itself at some of the Corps' public use areas. Maybe it was just for a short period of time, just to test the new boat out, besides there was not another soul to be found in the area. No harm done, right? Wrong! Your vehicle has been left unattended, in a no parking area, and in violation of posted restrictions. It is now subject for a very possible

citation....the law is the law you know. If you don't see a sign, check the park bulletin board for a listing of all rules and regulations.

Mr. Phillips erroneously states that under two different Executive Orders, 11625 signed by President Nixon in 1971, and 12138 signed by President Carter in 1979, there is money specifically set-aside for women and minorities. These Executive Orders do direct federal agencies to make available all of the resources of the agency, on a fair and equitable basis, to women and minority business owners but do not provide for a special financial set-aside program.

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has received hundreds of calls in offices all over the country. While SBA does provide assistance to people who own small businesses and those who are considering opening a business, the type of grant or award money mentioned on the show does not exist at SBA.

SBA provides financial assistance primarily through its Guarantee Loan program. In this situation, SBA becomes a guarantor on a loan made by a commercial lending institution. Management and technical assistance is also available free of charge in most instances. The Agency can provide assistance to small businesses who want to do business with the federal government.

### Fight Consumer Problems With Complaint Letters

Don't push those shrunken jeans to the back of the closet or call another mechanic to fix the problem the first auto shop left untouched. Don't write it off—write a letter.

The complaint letter is an infrequently used means of expressing a consumer problem. One survey showed that while two of every three consumers detected product defects within a year of purchase, only three out of 100 actually wrote to the manufacturer.

Dissatisfied buyers should write to the manufacturer, dealer or trade association about the problem. A letter is an effective way of registering a complaint and getting satisfaction.

Consumers should be sure complaints are valid. Many problems result from improper care or use of the product by the buyer. But if the consumer followed the care instructions for those "preshrunk" jeans that came out of the dryer a size too small, a letter is in order.

If the address cannot be located somewhere on the product or sales receipt, finding out where to write can be the most difficult part of the problem. Librarians should be able to help find the manufacturer's address and the name of its president or consumer service representative. Consumers who are unsure of the product's maker should check with a local better business bureau or consumer protection agency.

Letters should be brief and informative with all the facts on one page. The first paragraph should include the consumer's name and address; the name of the product; and any serial, model, or identification numbers; when and where the item was purchased; its price; and the consumer's method of payment. Then the problem should be described in detail but without sarcasm or outrage. Venting anger is not likely to help.

Just as important as the description of the problem is a statement of the consumer's objective in writing the letter. They should tell the manufacturer exactly what they want done about their problem. Usually they want the item repaired or replaced, or they expect a refund.

Finally, consumer's should explain what they will do if they don't get an appropriate response to their complaint. Their alternatives are to write to the attorney general's office, contact the appropriate licensing agency or call the consumer protection agency.

If consumers don't get a reply within a month, they should follow through on their promise.

Never send an actual warranty or sales receipt with a complaint letter. It could be lost. It is a good idea, however, to attach copies of pertinent papers to the complaint.

Not every complaint brings the desired result, but a well-written letter often resolves the problem.

Louie is the nephew of Mrs. Rena Nunley of Iuka and has a host of relatives and friends in Tishomingo County. He is a former maintenance supervisor for the Winfield Company.

On October 16, the opening day of deer season, Clinton hadn't yet hooked his safety strap around his waist when he began to climb into his tree stand. There was nothing to guard him from a fall and he lay paralyzed on the ground for at least six hours.

"After the fall, my main thought was to remain calm. I would holler and just hope that someone would hear me," Clinton said.

Clinton's hunting partner was shocked to find him hurt when he arrived to pick him up.

"He immediately went to

get an ambulance. When the ambulance arrived, the technicians had to cut through the brush with machetes so it could get through," he said.

Clinton was rushed to Jones County Community Hospital and later transferred to Forrest General Hospital. His diagnosis: paralyzed from the waist down.

Dr. Ralph Wicker, Hattiesburg neurosurgeon, said "He was in very serious condition." Clinton broke his seventh thoracic vertebrae, damaged his spinal cord and had multiple rib fractures, the doctor reported.

Forrest General Hospital Head Nurse of the neurosurgical unit, Betty Revette said, "When Clinton was informed of the severity of his condition, he never showed anger or hostility. He was very cooperative and always had a smile for everyone."

Clinton's nurse, Juaneese Davis, said that whatever happened Clinton never complained. "Usually patients

get angry and upset and lash out, but Mr. Clinton never did that," she said.

Peggy, Clinton's wife, said that he would keep fighting and continue to be optimistic. She said he plans to continue his hobby of woodworking.

"His good attitude will make recovery easier," said Dr. Wicker. Clinton, 59, should be able to do many things from his wheelchair, he said.

Clinton said he plans to continue hunting and fishing. "I think I might put mud-grips on my wheelchair," he said with a grin. "I want to encourage all hunters to use safety straps in their stands, so they won't end up in my situation," he said.

Clinton said "I plan to get on with my life the best way I can. I want to take care of my own self in every way possible. But most importantly, I want to live the rest of my life for the Lord and fulfill his every wish for me."

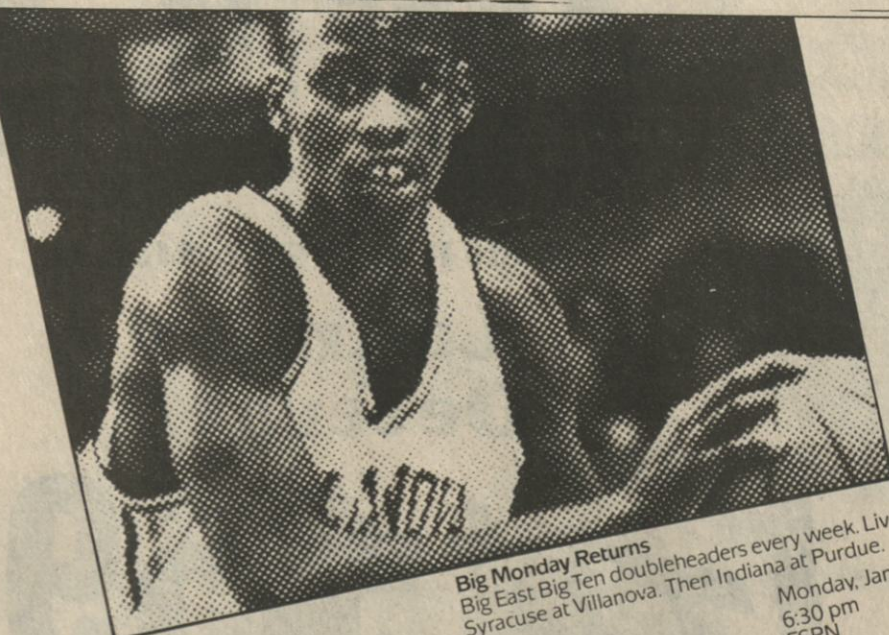

every woman has a right to a garden. It's natural to want a garden and dig in the dirt and watch things grow and pick flowers and vegetables.

And especially the woman on the farm, if I was a woman on a farm, I'd have a garden or have a fight. And it wouldn't be a little old weedy corner, next to the hedge, but a nice, big clean piece of ground, the best land on the farm, fenced hog and chicken tight, and plowed and harrowed by the men folks first thing in the spring.

And above all, a woman is entitled to good first class tools to work the garden with. Honest now sister, what kind of tools have you got to tend your garden with? Show 'em up. I know just about the list, anyway. It's an old common hoe, probably rusty and dull, a rake with several teeth broken or bent and a handle loose and probably an old butcher knife and maybe a spade that the men wouldn't use to dig post holes with.

And you plant the seed by hand in a row made with the corner of the hoe or the end of the rake handle, stooping along and dropping the seed by hand and then coming along and covering them with your feet. It looked like sin, but it was the only way you could do.

Do your men folks plant and tend their corn that way?

No Ma'am. They have the latest two row edge drop planters and riding cultivators. Several generations ago they used to plant and tend corn with a hoe, but men don't put up with that kind of tools very long, at least not in their own work. They get machines with wheels and seats on them, even if they have to go in debt for them.

But when it comes to paying out \$12 for an up-to-date tool that will plant easily and perfectly everything in the garden and tend it 10 times as easy and fast as it can be done by hand in the old style - why then he'll holler like a stuck hog. Can't afford it - all foolishness - mother never had nothing of that kind - wouldn't work no how, a woman don't know nothing about machinery anyway.

All right brother, I hope

when you get yours in the hereafter it'll be humping your back over an old dull rusty hoe, in a weedy, lumpy, crooked rowed garden with a sunbonnet on your head and the thermometer 97 in the shade.

A good garden is half the living, and it is a mighty hard matter making a good garden without good tools. It can be done, but it's uphill business.

With the wheel hoe you can tend the garden 10 times as fast as you possibly could by hand, and you do much better work besides. When the ground is just right to work, you can get over the whole garden in one forenoon and kill the weeds before they come up. That is the secret of tending a garden easily.

Yes, of course you can get along with it. You can get along without washing machines, too, and sewing machines, and incubators and complainers, and riding cultivators and self binders, combined listers and lawn mowers. But would you? The garden is the best paying piece of ground on the farm. Why not make it more profitable yet by using modern tools there too?

Honest sister, if you don't throw away that old rusty hoe and get a wheel hoe this spring I'll think you haven't the spunk of a mouse. If the old man won't let you have the money, don't feed him any garden stuff till he comes across. Starve him to it."

Since this editorial garden tools and women's rights have changed dramatically. The development of the power tiller has all but replaced the wheel hoe, and gardening is no longer just woman's work. But there's a lot of good garden advice in that editorial that is as applicable today as it was when written 74 years ago. I know what it is, and so do you, so why not follow it?

## Ask Ochsner

Q. Should children be immunized to protect them from getting the flu? I've heard pros and cons on the subject, and I'd like to get your

opinion.

A. Flu epidemics typically occur in winter; so November is the best time for children to get the influenza vaccine, suggests Dr. Lois Gesn, pediatrician at the Ochsner Clinic of Baton Rouge.

Children at high risk should definitely be immunized; that group would include any chronically debilitated children, such as those with heart disease or cystic fibrosis, as well as children who have no spleen and children who are on long-term aspirin therapy.

Immunization is also strongly recommended for children at moderate risk—those with diabetes, kidney disease, or sickle cell anemia and those whose immune system is suppressed (because, for example, they are on chemotherapy).

"The flu vaccine is made with egg protein; so children who are allergic to eggs should not receive it," Gesn cautions. Children under six months old should not be

immunized, but "it is safe for pregnant women to take it."

If your child does get the flu, the best treatment is supportive care, Gesn explains: Tylenol for the fever, aches and pains; increased water intake; rest; a decongestant if the child is coughing and congested; and a clear liquid diet if he is vomiting or has diarrhea.

"Usually the severe illness will last five to seven days," she says, and for perhaps a week afterward the child will

still seem fatigued and not quite himself."

Dr. Gesn strongly discourages giving aspirin to children or adolescents with symptoms of the flu because of the danger of Reye's syndrome. Though the cause of Reye's syndrome is unknown, it usually follows a viral infection, such as the flu or chicken pox, and causes swelling of the brain cells, convulsions, disorientation, vomiting and headaches. It can be fatal.

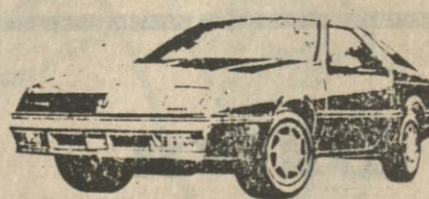

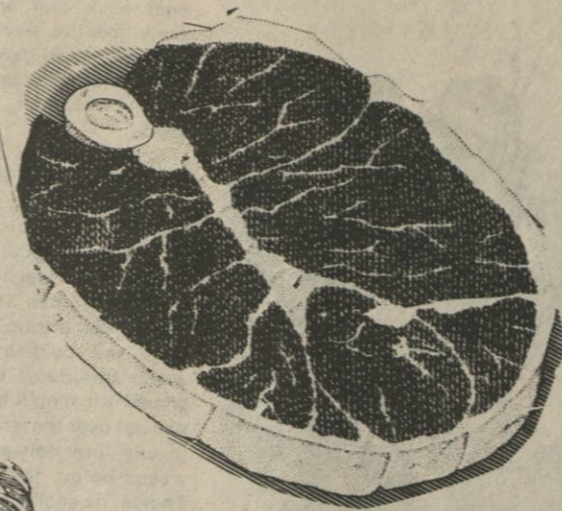

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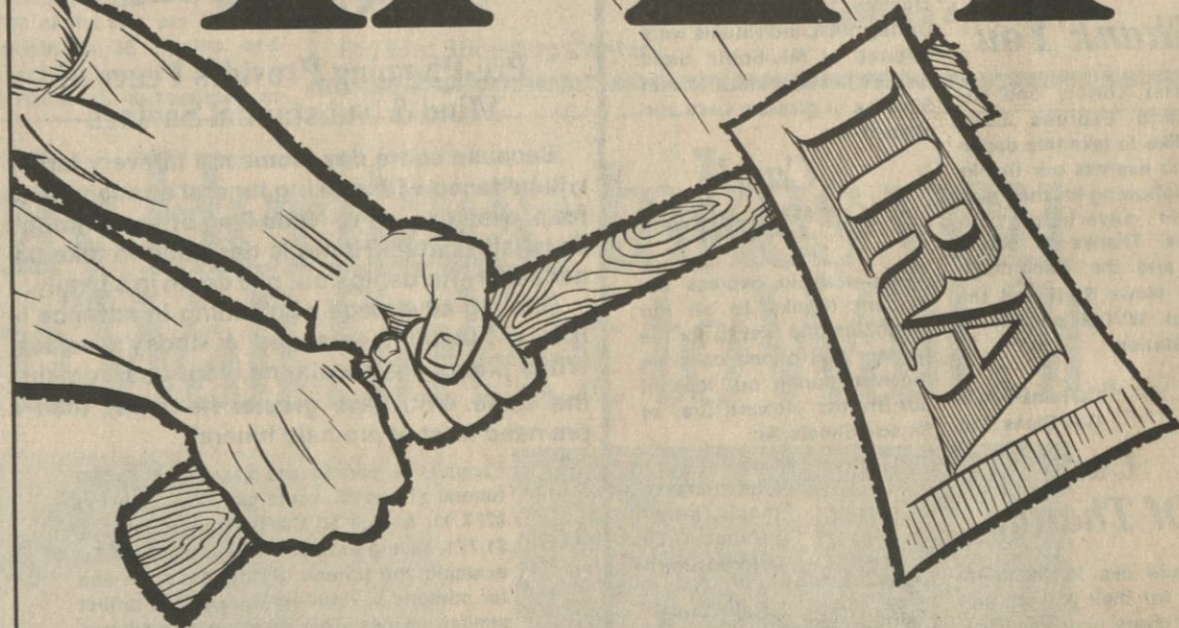

## Matters Of Health

### skin cancer- Detection and Treatment

**Q.** I am in my 70's and concerned about developing skin cancer, which runs in my family. How can I tell if skin changes on my face are cancerous? Do skin cancers really result from too much sun exposure?

**A.** Experts agree that exposure to the sun appears to be the leading cause of skin cancer. Chronic sun exposure starting at an early age may result in skin cancer years later because the damaging effects of the sun are cumulative.

Skin cancer is more prevalent in the sunny climates of the United States. Its victims are most often fair-skinned people, many of whom enjoy outdoor recreational activities.

The three major types of skin cancer are basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma, and malignant melanoma. Basal cell carcinoma is the most common form of skin cancer, while melanoma is the most lethal.

Basal and squamous cell carcinomas grow slowly and usually remain local in nature. On the other hand, with melanoma, a significant chance exists for the cancer to "metastasize"—a condition when the cancer cells break away and enter the bloodstream or lymphatic system. Through this process, melanoma is capable of rapidly traveling to another part of the body, such as the lungs, liver or brain.

Skin cancer appears most often on exposed skin, such as the skin on the face and arms. Basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas may begin as a dry, scaly red patch or a small lump that bleeds and crusts, while melanoma appears as a brownish-black spot or mole on the skin that enlarges and sometimes bleeds. Unlike normal moles, its circumference usually is irregular and it may have an uneven surface. Occasionally, melanomas arise from moles that were present in childhood.

If melanoma skin cancer has been present in your family, you're at risk and should receive regular checkups by a dermatologist—a physician who specializes in skin care. Notify your doctor if any area of the skin, however tiny, changes color or texture or begins to bleed easily. Be aware of any

suspicious changes in your skin because it can prevent a possible cancer from becoming serious. If your doctor suspects skin cancer, a biopsy will be performed to determine if the growth is cancerous and what, if any, treatment is needed.

The good news about skin cancer is that it is eminently curable in the early stages. Basal and squamous cell carcinoma can be removed by excising, scraping, or burning with an electric needle, x-ray treatments, freezing, or direct application of chemotherapy drugs.

A method known as Mohs surgery carefully removes cancerous tissue with microscopic control to ensure complete removal of any residual cancer roots. The procedure is done two or three times to maximize the cure rate and minimize damage to the surrounding, healthy skin.

It's generally reserved for difficult or recurrent skin cancer, when a simpler, quicker method isn't adequate. The surgery is particularly helpful when the cancer occurs on an eyelid, nostril, or other cosmetic or functionally critical area.

When the cancer is melanoma, the lesion and the surrounding area must be thoroughly removed. The smaller the lesion, the better

the prognosis. Plastic surgery sometimes is necessary after treatment to improve any scarring. When melanoma is removed before it invades more deeply than a millimeter, it's virtually cured.

Protect your skin against cancer by wearing a broad-brimmed hat and protective clothing when you are outside during sunny weather. Apply sunscreen rated SPF (Sun Protection Factor) 15 or higher to exposed areas. Older individuals should be sure to include plenty of vitamin D and calcium in the diet (found in fortified

milk, tuna, salmon and sardines) to compensate for the lack of sunlight.

## Unemployment Rate Increases In County

Just released by the Mississippi State Employment Service revealed an increase in unemployment in Tishomingo County at mid-month. According to Smith, Manager of Mississippi State Employment Service, 19.0 percent of the civilian labor force was unemployed, compared to 18.5 percent in October. This increase was due to the closing of the county. The labor force was estimated to be 7,410, 240 above the previous estimate of 7,170. There were 6,000 Tishomingo County residents at mid-month, showing a decline of 330 from October and 180 from one year ago. Manufacturing employment in the county was

estimated to be 2,360 down 240 from the previous estimate and 250 from one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment at 2,830 declined slightly from last month but gained 110 from one year ago.

Smith also commented that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo experienced an increase of 120 at the mid-November reporting period with a loss of 510 experienced from one year ago. Approximately 6,810 individuals were unemployed in the area, 860 more than in October and 420 more than in November, 1987. This number represents 11.2 percent of the civilian labor force, compared to 9.8 percent last month and 10.4 percent one year ago. There were 53,990 residents employed at the reporting

period, down 740 from October and 930 below November, one year ago.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area experienced a loss of 350 from the previous estimate and 470 from one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment had a minimal increase from last month with gain of 170 from last year.

## New GI Bill Brings Vets To Campuses

Veterans Administration and education officials expect more than half a million veterans to enter college during the next few years under new laws that provide "GI Bill style" education benefits to those who joined the armed forces since 1985 and extend them, for the first time, to members of the national guard and reserve force.

The American Council on Education reports that the number of people using "new" GI Bill benefits to go

to school will double from 150,000 to more than 300,000 a year by 1993. The council's report, "Joining Forces: The Military's Impact on College," predicts that these new GI Bill students will be a significant source of enrollment for many schools, particularly public institutions, facing a dwindling student pool.

Under the Montgomery GI Bill, named for its sponsor, U.S. Rep. G.V. "Sonny" Mon-

gomery, active duty military personnel, covered by Chapter 30 of the law, are entitled to basic education benefits of \$300 per month for 36 months in exchange for three years of service and a pay reduction of \$100 a month for 12 months.

Benefits for reserve force members, covered by Chapter 106 of the law, are \$140 per month for 36 months, contingent upon a six-year enlistment. Reservists can

begin using their benefits during their service period.

The Jackson VA Regional Office reports that 1,198 Mississippi reserve and guard members are using the Chapter 106 program and that 51 veterans are enrolled in Mississippi colleges and universities under the Chapter 30 program.

"We are seeing a lot of interest in the new benefits for reservists," said Jeff R. Ryker, VA Regional Office Director. "It is bringing a whole new group and generation of veterans into the VA education program. They can stay at home and serve in the reserves while pursuing their educations with VA help."

## Ask Ochsner

Q. I am 39 years old and have had a number of ear infections and several surgeries, but I still can't hear. Is there anything that can be done to help me?

A. For those individuals who have suffered hearing loss of the conductive type, that is, eardrum damage or middle ear problems, there is a new device which may allow them to hear again, says Dr. Seth Lowell, an ear, nose and throat specialist at the Ochsner Clinic of Baton Rouge.

The bone conductor, called the Xomed Audiant (tm), is a magnet that helps conduct sound waves through the skull bone. The operation to insert the device is a simple one performed in the hospital

under general anesthesia. The bone conductor is surgically implanted beneath the scalp behind the ear. The patient usually has recovered by the next day.

Ten weeks later, a device the size of a hearing aid is fitted to attach to the outside of the ear. It adheres to the surgically-implanted magnet which allows the bone to conduct sound waves. "The bone conductor can increase hearing to normal range," says Dr. Lowell. "It can also help those that have one-sided nerve deafness because the device can transmit sound from the deaf ear to the hearing one."

The bone conductor hearing device does not help those with total nerve deafness and cannot be implanted in patients under five years of age. "However, it does give new hope to those patients who are unable to use hearing aids because of constant ear infections," he concludes.
