Development Foundation Plans Leadership Program

Tishomingo County Development Foundation at its regular monthly board meeting Saturday, January 14, plans to establish a leadership program for Tishomingo County. David McLean, chairman of a committee set up by the Foundation, presented an outline of the program and goals for the leadership program. A committee consisting of participants of the Leadership Conference from Tishomingo County has met to begin the "Leadership Development" program. The program will be to provide leadership training for twelve to twenty-four Tishomingo Countians yearly, thereby, providing a wider leadership base in the county for use in development of the area both in civic programs and economic development.

Iuka Chosen For Satellite Program

Beginning in January, four Tishomingo County high schools will participate in a pilot program using interactive video.

Iuka High School in Iuka, South Panola High School in Batesville, Iuka High School in Iuka and Norcross High School in Norcross will receive the live satellite instruction with educational courses, technology and Statistics and Education to the Japanese language.

In addition to these classroom instructional courses for students, in-service conferences and teaching of Advanced Placement Calculus will be provided for teacher professional development.

Four pilot schools were chosen on the basis of need for the language and mathematics courses as well as their technical ability to receive live instruction via satellite. They have also met requirements outlined by the National Educational Resource Consortium (SERC), an organization of 18 state members, including state departments of education

and state public television networks, and four associate members. Mississippi ETV and the State Department of Education are members of SERC and are coordinating the pilot project in Mississippi.

For the 1989-90 school year, 10 additional schools will be receiving the equipment necessary to receive the live satellite instruction with funds from the Star Schools Program of the U.S. Department of Education and administered by SERC.

Spanish III also will be available to these 14 schools, which will be receiving the instruction during the 1989-90 school year.

All courses provide for two-way interaction between students and the television teacher and classroom tutors, illustrating one of the major advantages of interactive video: the possibility of live interaction between the video teacher and students.

Also, live courses by satellite offer schools that show a particular need for some courses that they cannot provide themselves the opportunity to have these courses.

U.S. Senator Trent Lott Visits Proposed NASA Plant Site

U.S. Senator Trent Lott, on his first trip back to his home state since being sworn in, came to Iuka last Wednesday and was greeted by a large crowd of supporters at a reception held in his honor at

the Old Tishomingo Courthouse. Inclement weather failed to dampen the spirit with which Senator Lott conveyed his message to the audience pledging his support to NASA's proposed Yellow Creek solid rocket

United States Senator Trent Lott's visit to Iuka Wednesday, January 11, was a huge success in spite of flash flood weather with over four hundred in attendance and standing room only at the reception held at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse.

The trip Wednesday was planned in order for the newly elected Senator to tour the Tennessee Valley Authority's abandoned nuclear plant site which has been named for location of a National Aeronautics and Space Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant.

The visit to Northeast MS by Sen. Lott came on his first trip back to the State after being sworn in to replace retiring Democratic Senator John C. Stennis.

At a news conference, Senator Lott pledged his commitment to helping north Mississippi and said he will actively support the Yellow Creek NASA project and other programs for Northeast Mississippi. He emphasized that he will be a hard-working,

aggressive senator all over the State. He stated that the remainder of Congress appears to be behind the space theme.

During the visit, Sen. Lott met with representatives of both Lockheed-Aerofjet and Hercules-Atlantic, the two contracting teams bidding on the \$1.5 billion space project. Also present for the meeting with the Senator was J.R. Thompson, director of NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center at Huntsville, Alabama.

At the meeting, Senator Lott discussed funding which will be necessary for the local area highways and airport facilities. He noted the county's legislative delegation's efforts in seeking improvements of these programs as well as local educational institutions. He vowed to work with local officials, state representatives, and private civic leaders to meet these needs.

Senator Lott said that all 82 counties are now under his care and promised that Mississippi won't be forgotten.

Officers Flynt and Parrish Honored With Plaque

Iuka Police Officers Bobby Flynt and Benny Parrish were each presented plaques of special recognition Monday by Iuka Mayor John Biggs and members of the Police Commission, chairman L.T. Robinson, Marvin Baker and David Yarbrough.

Officers Flynt and Parrish are responsible for the quick apprehending of three suspects who were charged with the murder of an elderly Tishomingo County man last week.

Tishomingo County Prosecuting Attorney and Iuka City Attorney, Richard Bowen commended the two law officials for their al-

tness and conscientious work. Through their efforts, the possibility of Mr. Solomon's murder becoming another Tishomingo County "unsolved mystery murder" was suppressed.

Three subjects were stopped on traffic violation charges by Flynt and Parrish while they were on routine P.M. patrol, the night Mr. Solomon was robbed and murdered. Further investigation following the arrest of the three, led to evidence of the capital crime. Iuka Police Officer, Ricky Cornelson assisted Flynt and Parrish in the matter.

Officer Bobby Flynt has

been employed by the Iuka Department for two years. Prior to this, he served as county deputy.

Officer Benny Parrish has worked with the Iuka Department since March 1988. He worked as county deputy and for the Belmont Police Department in the past.

Both officers are graduates of the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officer's Training Academy at Jackson, MS.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

DRIED BEANS PROVIDE VARIETY, PROTEIN

Looking for an economical, lower calorie, low fat, "stick to your ribs" protein source? Many varieties of dried beans are great protein sources for a wonderful cold-weather meal.

The dry bean family is large and colorful -- over 180 varieties. The most common beans are pea beans, red kidneys, limas, marrows, yelloweyes, pinto, Great Northern and garbanzos or chickpeas.

Pea (navy) beans are small, white, oval beans. Different kinds vary somewhat in size. They are used for baked beans, soups and casseroles.

Great Northern beans are larger than navy beans, but have the same white color. They are somewhat flat in shape. They are used in soups, salads, casserole dishes and home baked beans.

Lima (butterbeans) are broad and flat. Baby limas are smaller than standard limas but similar in shape. These are used in many delicious and inexpensive dishes. This bean is both eaten green and

used dried.

Kidney beans come in two types: the "dark red" and the more common "light red." Some Kidney beans are white. They are used for baked beans, in chili con carne and other Mexican dishes and add zest to salads.

Yelloweye beans are white, medium-sized beans with brown markings.

Pinto (Indian beans) are the same species as the kidney and red bean. They are the beige-colored and speckled bean from the Western United States -- the bean of Mexico.

Garbanzo (chickpeas) look like a large misshapen pea, are nutflavored and commonly pickled in vinegar and oil for salads.

Nutritional Value

Dry beans are among the least expensive sources of protein, iron and two of the B vitamins -- thiamine and riboflavin.

Beans are good pinch-hitters for meat, especially if combined in the same meal with some protein-rich food from an animal source such as milk, eggs or cheese. The protein from these other foods helps make the protein from beans more useful to the body.

The size of a typical serving of cooked dry beans is three-fourths cup. Servings of cooked dry beans of different colors and shapes are similar in food value. Baking beans with tomatoes, pork or molasses changes their food value slightly, depending upon the amount added. Bean soup usually has less food value than a similar amount of cooked beans.

Uses

Dry peas and beans should be soaked, preferably overnight, before cooking. Cover each cup of beans with three cups of water, bring to a boil for two minutes, then soak in same water overnight. The two-minutes of cooking tenderizes the beans and prevents souring during the soaking period.

After soaking, cook gently (in the same water they were soaked) with a minimum amount of stirring until tender. You will have two and one-half cups of cooked beans for each cup of dry beans.

Cooking Beans

1. Cooking time varies according to the size of beans and the length of time in storage. Peas and smaller beans usually need less than one hour. Larger peas need 2 to 3 hours and soybeans 3 to 4 hours. Large dry limas may tenderize in less than an hour, however. Bring beans to boiling in soaking water, cover, and reduce heat to simmer. Test for tenderness by tasting.

2. Add 1 tablespoon of fat to cooking beans to control foaming.

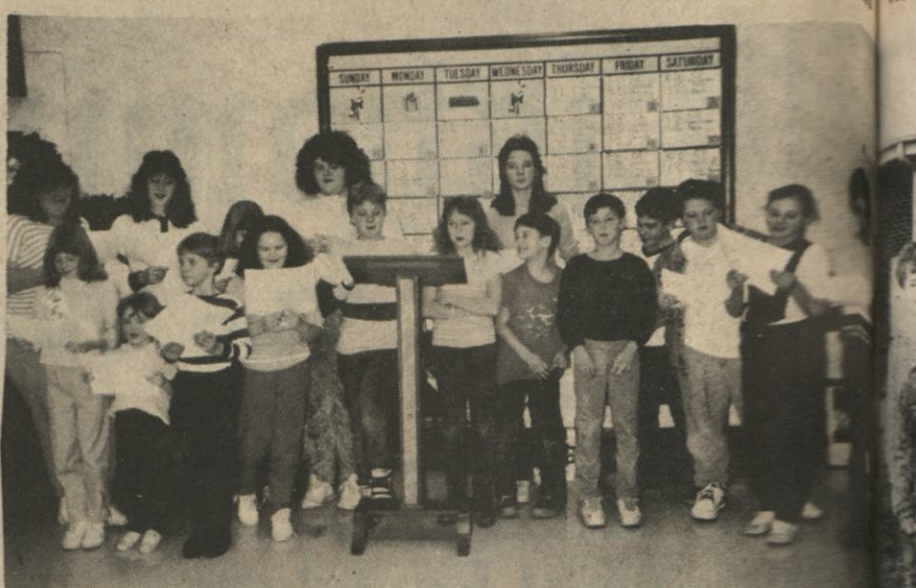
3. Cooking beans 20 to 35 minutes in a pressure cooker is possible, but some authorities warn against this because beans tend to splutter and foam which can clog the vent. Never fill a pressure cooker more than three-fourths full.

A time table for pressure cooking beans is:

*Small beans, split beans, lentils -- 20 minutes;
*Kidney and navy beans -- 35 minutes;
*Soybeans -- 40 minutes.

4. Since beans require long cooking, cook several pounds at once and freeze them to conserve energy. Frozen cooked beans have almost the same convenience as canned.

Thaw them quickly by setting the container in hot water. Drop a frozen chunk of beans directly into boiling soup, or place chunk in casserole in

hot oven and add baked bean seasonings. Stir half an hour later and continue baking.

5. Cook beans just until they begin to tenderize. Add seasonings and liquid and bake slowly for 4 to 8 hours for a wonderful browned-in flavor. Native Americans taught New England colonists how to make these famed "Boston Baked Beans" in earthen pots. Use that oven heat to good advantage. Bake rice pudding or plain rice, make granola or roast soybeans.

6. Avoid using soda in the cooking or soaking to make beans more socially acceptable because the soda destroys some of the nutritional value of the beans.

CHICKEN & CHEESE CASSEROLE

1 cup macaroni
1/4 cup green pepper, chopped
1/4 cup onion, chopped
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning
Dash of black pepper
1 cup milk
1 cup chicken broth
3/4 cup processed American cheese, shredded
1-1/2 cup chicken or turkey, deboned

Cook macaroni until done. Rinse and drain. Mix Butter, pepper, onion, salt, black pepper and cook. Add flour, milk and broth and cook until bubbly. Add chicken, macaroni and 1/2 cup cheese. Put in 1-1/2 quart baking dish and bake 30-35 minutes at 350°. Top with 1/4 cup cheese and bake until melted.

Fishing Limits

Fishermen can get set for new fishing regulations to take effect in early March on four flood control reservoirs in northern Mississippi.

Beginning March 1, 1989 a 15-inch length limit will apply to black bass caught in Enid, Grenada, and Arkabutla reservoirs.

"This means that if a fisherman on these waters catches a black bass less

than 15 inches long - and this includes largemouth and spotted bass - the fish must be returned immediately to the water," explained state fisheries chief Ron Garavelli of Jackson.

Garavelli said that on Sardis Reservoir a 14 to 18-inch slot limit will apply to black bass caught there.

"Black bass between 14 and 18 inches may not be in a fisherman's possession on Sardis beginning March 1," Garavelli said.

After the date only bass smaller than 14 inches or larger than 18 inches will be legal for harvest."

In addition Sardis crappie anglers must comply with a 10-inch minimum size limit and a 25 fish daily creel limit beginning March 1.

Garavelli said that many of the new changes to fishing regulations on these four reservoirs were discussed

and received a positive response at a recent hearing in Batesville.

Northern Mississippi fisheries biologist Meals of Oxford said several years of low levels and increasing fishing pressure on reservoirs have helped creel limits.

Meals said that the regulations have no termination date and in effect until further notice.

Brightening Stained Teeth

Q. What can be done about discolored teeth?

A. The basic alternative are a procedure known as bleaching to restore the color, or making caps or veneers to cover the affected teeth.

There are two methods of bleaching -- external and internal. In external bleaching, the dentist applies a whitening agent to the tooth surfaces and usually employs an infrared or ultraviolet light to stimulate the process. The procedure is repeated in several visits to attain color comparable to surrounding teeth. This method is quite effective for dealing with stains caused by tobacco and certain foods.

Internal bleaching is done when discoloration is caused by medication or by tooth disease or injury. Apply a bleaching agent internally involves a root canal procedure.

Mildly discolored teeth often respond well to bleaching treatment. For more severe cases the dentist may recommend caps or veneers.

House Of Representatives

The State Tax Commission and State Personnel Board would remain intact but several other significant changes would be made in state government under a modified reorganization bill recommended by a select committee in the House of Representatives.

The special committee completed work last week on the massive proposal, sending it to the full House for consideration. It was not expected to be called up for floor action before the later part of the current week, giving legislators a chance to study the measure and prepare any amendments they may want to offer.

A separate reorganization bill triggered prolonged debate in the State Senate during the past week before finally being approved.

The House bill is a modified version of the 227-page proposal submitted by the Governor's Office, but did not include a hotly contested plan to close the charity hospitals at Laurel, Meridian and Vicksburg. This was expected to be presented later in another bill.

The Governor's proposals have drawn a mixed reaction in the House. Certain recommendations appear to have the support of many lawmakers, but there has been concern that other proposals may be unwise or ill-advised for various reasons.

Legislators generally are in favor of reorganization when it will mean improved efficiency and save taxpayers' dollars. In fact, several bills

have been approved by lawmakers in recent years providing for reorganization of various agencies and departments including the Department of Education, Department of Natural Resources, Corrections Department, and Department of Economic Development.

The latest proposals are strongly backed by some lawmakers and opposed by others.

In other major action last week, the House Insurance Committee approved a bill to strengthen the state's Financial Responsibility laws to try to keep uninsured motorists off the highways. The bill requires proof of financial responsibility or payment of a \$300 fee prior to getting a car tag, and officers would check for financial responsibility when motorists are stopped for moving violations or at road blocks. The bill was awaiting House action as the current week began.

A comprehensive waste minimization program was recommended by the legislative Environmental Protection Council. Key proposals include stricter control of medical wastes and establishment of a Waste Management Trust Fund, with advance disposal fees to be collected on tires, lead-acid batteries, newspaper and beverage containers.

The House gave overwhelming approval to a bill to provide a 5 percent increase in retirement benefits to thousands of public officials throughout Mississippi, both at the state and local level. The bill also calls for a change in the formula for computing future benefits, a small increase in the contribution rate by employers and employees to the public

employees retirement fund, a supplemental retirement allowance for legislators on an optional basis, and a provision allowing public employees to retire at 55 without penalty if they have at least 25 years of service. The bill still faces Senate action.

A joint session was held during the week for an address by former Governor William Winter and Dr. Jesse L. White Jr., a native Mississippian now serving as director of the Southern Growth Policies Board. The chief topic was a report by the Commission on the Future of the South, listing 10 regional objectives which Winter said are becoming "a kind of long-range game plan for the South."

Several legislators took part in a workshop on the problem of teenage pregnancy; health officials met with the House Penitentiary Committee to discuss the possibility of AIDS testing of state inmates; and the House Agriculture Committee received a briefing on the feasibility of a new farmers' market in northeast Mississippi.

Government reorganization has been among the hottest issues since the session began earlier this month. The House reorganization committee agreed to go along with many of the Governor's recommendations, including creation of a Department of Finance and Administration to assume duties now performed by the Fiscal Management Board; a

Department of Human Services to include the current State Welfare Department; and a new Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

The House committee, following lengthy discussions, narrowly rejected a proposal to set up a Department of Revenue which would take over most of the present Tax Commission's duties. The director of the department would have been named by the Governor, subject to Senate confirmation. Originally, the panel voted for the change but later reversed itself and deleted it from the bill. Under the final recommendation, the Tax Commission would not be changed except for switching the truck-weight scales operations to an expanded Department of Public Safety.

The Emergency Management Agency also would be placed under the Department of Public Safety if the bill becomes law. A proposal wins narrowly defeated by the committee to shift the State Fire Marshall's Office and State Fire Academy to the Public Safety Department.

Committee members decided to recommend that no changes be made at this time in the Department of Public Health, Personnel Board, Department of Mental Health, Central Data Processing Authority, Forestry Commission, Library Commission, and Department of Archives and History.

Under the bill, the Attorney General's office would be authorized to charge a fee for certain legal opinions; greater flexibility would be allowed in investment of state funds; management of the Schools for the Deaf and Blind would be transferred to the State Board of Education; and the Animal Diagnostic Clinic's duties would be shifted to the College of Veterinary Medicine at Mississippi State University.

Hello. This week in Jackson was filled with committee meetings and preparation of legislation. Former Governor William Winter spoke to a joint session of the

legislature concerning the future of the South. One of the great problems we face, he argued, and I agree, is the emerging differences between the urban and rural South. The cities in the South are growing in population, incomes are increasing, and the number of jobs are expanding. On the other hand, many rural areas are losing population, incomes are stagnant, and each year there are fewer and fewer jobs for the new high school graduates.

Our area is different! While most rural areas in Mississippi are losing population, we are gaining. Our incomes are slowly increasing. The people of this area have dedicated themselves to making this a thriving and dynamic area of growth in the state of Mississippi. I believe and certainly hope that we are in a new and exciting era of development.

I have argued for several years that the only way to move our area ahead is to invest in education, build more and better highways, and provide health care to all our people. These are the three factors that lead to economic expansion. These are the three areas on which I focus my committee and legislative work. I believe that people must make investments, take some risks, and try new ideas to outsmart and outcompete other areas. The NASA plant and other plants moving into northeast Mississippi can truly provide us with the opportunity to build an economic edge.

As I am sure most of you know, a group of northeast Mississippi legislators introduced a bill during the special session last fall to study the educational systems in Tishomingo, Itawamba, Prentiss, and Alcorn counties in an effort to gain more state funding for the schools in our areas. The purpose of this legislation was to compare our schools to the schools in northwest Alabama and west-central Tennessee. More money is not always the answer; however, students cannot learn computer if there are not enough computers in the classroom. Students can not learn geography without

maps. History, languages, and high technology can not be taught without the adequate resources. The responsibility lies with all of us to see that our children receive the proper training for the jobs of tomorrow. We hope this legislation will help us to obtain more financial assistance from the state.

Earlier this year, I introduced an equity funding bill. Equity funding is based on the idea that a child should have the same educational opportunity whether he is born in a monetarily poor district or a monetarily rich district. Today, some school districts spend as much as \$4,100 per child while others spend as little as \$1,900 per child per year. The annual state average is almost \$2,600 per child while our area spends around \$2,250. This legislation would bring all districts in the state to within 90% of the highest districts within five years. The money to accomplish this goal would come through the state minimum foundation program. Thus, every district in the state would share in the state's resources and no child would be punished because he was born in an area that was not rich.

Equity funding is an important ingredient in building those three factors of good education, good transportation systems, and good health care which are the foundations for economic prosperity.

Price Moves Forestry To Record High

Another productive year best describes Mississippi's 1988 forestry industry. Productive enough to reach an estimated value of \$624 million. The industry topped 1987's record value of \$600 million.

million.

Forestry is Mississippi's second leading income producer among the state's major agricultural enterprises, outranked only by cotton.

While the drought of 1988 was scorching fields and torturing livestock, state timber harvesting crews were experiencing some of the best harvesting weather in years.

"The drought during the spring and summer made harvesting conditions excellent and resulted in a good supply of wood for the market," said Bob Daniels, forestry utilization specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

"During the first half of 1988, the strong wood supply was coupled with good market prices," Daniels said. "But, by mid-year an oversupply in the market caused hardwood and pine lumber prices to fall, and they didn't bottom out until late September and early October."

Even though pine lumber prices weakened, competition for pine stumpage, particularly in south Mississippi, pushed stumpage prices higher into early fall as mills tried to build winter inventories.

"Good harvesting conditions also resulted in high supplies of pulpwood that kept prices depressed until fall," said Dr. Bob Martin, an extension economist.

According to Martin, year-end results showed a slight increase in volume and price—enough of an increase to top 1987's record value for the industry.

Other factors that were positive included a strong export market for hardwood and pine lumber; good demand for hardwood lumber from the furniture industry; a steady housing market; and several announcements of new wood-using mills to be built in the state.

The Mississippi Christmas tree industry also continued to grow and expand in acres and number of producers. The estimated value of this yuletide industry was \$8 million.

"We expect another strong year for the overall industry in 1989," Daniels said. "Interest rates are expected to stay down and this should keep the housing market steady. We also expect the export market to stay strong."

Forest Is Rich With Treasures

What do vanilla flavoring, railroad ties, computer paper, a dulcimer, and this newspaper have in common? They're all products of the forest, among the thousands of things that have their beginnings in trees.

They fall into such categories as paper, packaging, paperboard items, lumber and plywood products, pressed boards, bark products, wood sugars used in foods, wood flour and resins used in plastics, chemical-based cellulose used in films and plastics, spent pulping liquids used in pharmaceuticals and other compounds, and turpentine and tall oil used in products ranging from soap to carbon paper.

Take the yield of one cord of wood, for example. One cord equals a pile of wood 4' X 4' X 8' - 80 cubic feet of solid wood. One cord yields:

*460,000 personal checks, or; * 100,000 IRS 1040 forms, or;*4,000 one gallon milk cartons, or;*4.4 million commemorative-size postage stamps, or;* 942 one-pound books, or;*30 Boston rockers, or;*7.5 million toothpicks, or;*12 dining room tables, each seating eight people Building an average 1800

square-foot home uses 10,000 board feet of lumber -- equivalent to 20 cords.

Twenty percent of a cord of wood might be bark. Bark, wastewood, and pulping liquors provide more than half of the forest products industry's energy needs. Bark is also a source of many chemicals and is used for mulches and soil conditioners.

Mississippi's timberland is really a vast storehouse of essential materials that are renewable forever. At the same time, our forests provide protection for soil

and watersheds, wildlife habitats, and recreational opportunities for hunters, hikers, skiers and others.

Conservation News

CREATING A BACKYARD WILDLIFE OASIS

Would you like to hear the
songs of cardinals and
mockingbirds in the morning
air? While looking through
your kitchen window, would
you like to observe a young
robin's first flight? How
about seeing brightly colored
butterflies dancing from
flower to flower? If you an-
swered yes to any of these
questions, then you might
want to consider creating an
oasis for wildlife in your yard.
Interested? If so, begin by
developing a plan. Your plan
must consider the four basic
needs of wildlife: food, water,
protective cover, and places
in which to reproduce and
raise young. A successful
plan will provide a year round
supply of these habitat
elements. This can easily be
achieved with proper plan-
ning and planting.

Begin by making an inven-
tory of the habitat elements
that already exist for wildlife
in your yard. Next, draw a
base map showing your
property's dimensions, the
area covered by your house
and other structures, and the
location of the plants already
growing in your yard. Now,
keeping in mind the four
basic needs of wildlife,
outline a planting plan. Don't
try to do everything at once.
Do a little each year for the
next few years.

Birds prefer natural foods.
Therefore, plant a variety of
trees, shrubs, and other plan-
ts that produce acorns, nuts,
berries, buds, catkins, fruit,
nectar, and seeds wherever
possible. Feeders stocked
with suet, cracked corn, or
sunflower, millet, and thistle
seed can be used to sup-
plement natural food sources
during the winter months.
During the summer, use a
sugar water feeder to sup-
plement the hummingbird's
natural diet.

Providing fresh, clean
water for drinking and
bathing is one of the most
reliable methods you can use
to attract birds and improve
wildlife habitat. A birdbath,
small pool, shallow dish, or
dripping hose can be used to
supply water. Just remember
that the water source should
be dependable all year long.

Cover provides wildlife
protection from predators
and adverse weather. A com-
bination of dense shrubs,
hollow logs, rock piles, brush
piles, stone walls,
evergreens, tall grass, and
water will provide cover year
round for a wide variety of
animal species. Cover should
be located near all food and
water sources.

Wildlife also needs specific
kinds of cover to produce and

raise young. Some food and
cover plants also provide
nesting areas for wildlife.
Make sure your yard has plen-
ty of mature trees. They
provide nesting areas for
many species of wildlife. If
your just beginning, you can
use nest boxes to compen-
sate for the lack of big trees.

Don't plan a clipped, ar-
tificial garden that will en-
slave you. Plan your backyard
habitat so that nature does
most of the work. Your major
jobs should be limited to
pruning and minor main-
tenance. Happy planting.

If you would like more in-
formation on landscaping for
wildlife, contact your local
USDA Soil Conservation Ser-
vice field office. Services of
the USDA will be provided
regardless of race, color, sex,
age, religion, handicap, or
national origin.

Small Game Hunting Areas

The Corps of Engineers at
Bay Springs Lake will be
opening two small game hun-
ting areas on the lake. The
areas will be open on Thurs-
day, January 19, 1989. To be
opened are Jackson Camp
Peninsula and Crows Neck
Environmental Area. These
areas are open for small game
only, no deer hunting is per-
mitted. All remaining land
around the lake will still be
closed to hunting (between
Mississippi Highways 4 and
30 with the exception of
Jackson Camp and Crows
Neck Environmental Area).

A state hunting license and
a Corps of Engineers permit
is required to hunt these
sites. Hunting will be allowed
only with shotguns loaded
with number 4 shot or
smaller. All state hunting
regulations apply concerning
bag limits, seasons, etc.
