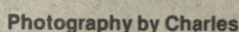

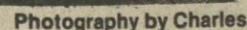
You are eligible to take the tests if you are not enrolled in, and have not graduated from, high school and you meet the requirements set by the state in regard to age, length of time since you left school and residency.

POTATOES FROM A TO Z

There are many potato lovers in Tishomingo County, so plan this nutritious vegetable into your meals. Potatoes are so versatile you could use them everyday, without repeating the same recipe. In fact, potatoes are as versatile as the alphabet is long. Try these suggestions:

A is for Amandine - sliced, blanched almonds, browned in butter, atop hot mashed potatoes.

B is for Potato Bread - an old fashioned favorite made with

mashed potatoes. Packaged instant mashed potatoes would be handy.

C is for Country-fried - sliced or diced boiled potatoes fried in butter or drippings; plus a bit of minced onion perhaps.

D is for Delmonico - diced potatoes in a white sauce, topped with buttered crumbs.

E is for Escalloped - vary your standard recipe by using, in place of milk, undiluted evaporated milk or a canned condensed cream soup plus 3/4 can milk.

F is for fried - French fried - cottage fried - American fries - you take it from there.

G is for Grated - fresh potatoes in potato pancakes.

H is for Hash Browns - a man's favorite.

I is for Irish Potato Dumplings - both grated, un-

cooked and riced, boiled potatoes in these fluffy dumplings.

J is for potatoes de Jour - however you decide to fix them, they are the potatoes of the day.

K is for Kid Pleaser - hot dogs, split lengthwise and stuffed with mashed potatoes, topped with grated cheese and paprika and heated in the oven.

L is for Loaf - mashed potatoes mixed with cooked celery, butter, an egg, seasonings (including a bit of onion) and chopped meat leftover or chopped peanuts; baked.

M is for Mashed Potatoes - perhaps with dairy-soured cream and chives instead of milk and butter.

N is for Nests - a hollowed heap of mashed spuds, filled with buttered peas.

O is for Omelet - butter fried, diced cooked potatoes and a bit of minced onion tucked into the omelet fold.

P is for Patties - mashed potatoes made into little cakes, dipped in flour, browned in butter. Try egg, then cornflake crumbs for dipping.

Q is for Quick potato

products - the amazing variety of these convenience items will broaden your repertoire greatly.

R is for Roasted - pared or just scrubbed, cut or whole, add to roaster 1 to 1 1/2 hours before meat should be done; baste occasionally.

S is for Salad - another style with loads of variations - hot, cold, molded, with meat, etc.

T is for Twice-Baked - baked potatoes scooped out of the skins, mashed and seasoned, then returned to the skins; may be frozen on a cookie sheet and packaged individually in foil.

U is for Unusual - impress the family with some of the fancy names of ordinary dishes, such as, Gnocchi (a type of potato dumpling), or Lyonnaise (slightly underdone soiled spuds cooked in fat and seasonings and sprinkled with parsley).

V is for Vichyssoise - a rich cream of potato and leek or onion soup; served hot or icy cold.

W is for Whipped cream topping - 1/2 cup heavy cream whipped, with 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese folded in, piled atop a

casserole of hot mashed potatoes, browned quickly in a hot oven.

XYZ is for the exciting assortment - you'll find once you start collecting and trying out potato recipes!

TWICE-BAKED POTATOES

8 medium baking potatoes
2 T butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 can (11 oz.) condensed Cheddar cheese soup
1 T chopped dried chives
Paprika

Bake potatoes until done. Cut potatoes in half lengthwise; scoop out insides leaving a thin shell. With electric mixer, mash potatoes with butter and salt. Gradually add soup and chives; beat until light and fluffy. Spoon into shells. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in 2 1/2-quart shallow baking dish (13x9x2") at 450°F. for 15 minutes or until hot. Makes 8 servings.

New Device Makes Breathing Test Easier

A new pulmonary testing device at the Ochsner Medical Institutions makes the taking of a breathing test as easy as "blowing out candles on a birthday cake".

Through the use of special computer software, patients can actually test their ability to breathe by simply blowing out the candles on a birthday cake which is seen on a video screen. If enough air makes it through the device, all the candles will be blown out.

Dr. Michael Blaiss, an allergy and asthma specialist at Ochsner, says that although many types of breathing devices exist, this new and improved version of the traditional spirometer breathing device provides patients with incentive to perform well on tests.

"Patients, especially children, liken the birthday cake concept to a video game," says Blaiss. "While they are enjoying themselves, we can more effectively and more accurately measure their breathing difficulties."

To perform the test, a patient firmly places his or her lips over the rim of a breathing tube and exhales as hard as possible. This air is fed directly to a special unit which processes and measures the volume and speed of the air. This information is then converted into signals that activate the birthday cake and into language that can be read on a computer screen. If the patient exhales 110 percent or more of his or her breathing capacity, the candles on the birthday cake will all be extinguished.

After tests are complete, the results are evaluated by the patient and doctor. "I first show the patient what a normal test should look like, then I show them what their test says about their breathing ability," says Blaiss. "It gives us an objective measurement to determine potential breathing difficulties."

Blaiss says the computer-driven spirometer/color graphics system is used primarily for those patients who suffer from asthma. "It helps us recognize the severity of an asthmatic's condition and allows us to track a patient's progress over a period of time," he says. The device also determines

if a person has asthma at all. "Many times patients come to me with a chronic cough. They think they have asthma. But, when pulmonary function studies are performed and the indication is negative, it gives the patient peace of

mind and allows us to prescribe appropriate treatment."

Blaiss is convinced of the device's effectiveness and its ability to convince patients to do better on breathing tests. "I think it is imperative that

physicians be able to use device such as this. With it, they can get an objective measurement of the severity of a patient's breathing problems," concludes Blaiss.

The touch of personal care

AMALGAM

Q. What is a dental amalgam?

A. It is a combination of metals; the silver-colored material most often used as the filling to restore a cavity once the decay is removed.

Developed in France in the 1800's, the amalgam is an alloy of silver, tin and copper. Mercury mixed with these metals hardens them for durable, long-term use. That is why the amalgam is the usual choice for fillings on biting surfaces of the back teeth. Amalgams are less costly than gold inlays and more durable than the tooth-colored composite resins. However, amalgam fillings, like everything else, can age and deteriorate. That's why checking the integrity of each filling is a normal part of routine dental care. If there are signs that old fillings are beginning to crack or loosen, appropriate repair or replacement should be undertaken.

REFLECTION-FREE LENSES

4-H Communicates

MARCH IS NATIONAL FOOD & NUTRITION MONTH

March has been declared National Food and Nutrition Month. In recognition of this, Tishomingo County 4-H is holding their first annual Foods Contest Day on Saturday, March 4.

4-H members from across the county will be gathering to show off their skills in Food-Nutrition Judging, Poultry Judging, Breads Judging, Food Preservation Judging, Meats Identification and Dairy Products Judging.

The winners of these contests will then be eligible to participate in District or State Contests.

The Food-Nutrition Contest teaches 4-H'ers to judge a set of 4 menus based on nutrition, and a variety of color, texture, taste, and preparation method. Contestants must also be able to perform a task, such as measuring a liquid or solid. To score well, the 4-H'ers must be able to select the correct measuring utensil and measure the amount specified. Finally, a written test is given with questions that relate to nutrition, and food preparation.

The Poultry Judging Contest tests the knowledge of 4-H'ers in Ready to Cook Poultry, Classifying Broken Out Eggs, Classifying Shell Factors, and a Consumer Test. Ready-to-Cook Poultry is graded by the U.S. Consumer Grades A, B, and C. Broken out eggs are graded by the quality of the yolk and the white. Shell factors which are graded are shape, texture,

and cleanliness.

In the Breads Contest, 4-H'ers must be able to judge a set of 4 muffins, biscuit or yeast bread. Factors to look for are texture, color, taste, and shape. They must also take a test on mixing procedures and nutrition found in bread products.

The Food Preservation Contest teaches 4-H'ers what to look for in packaging materials, and canned goods. They must also be able to perform a task, such as packaging fruit for freezing and identify equipment used in preserving food. A test of their knowledge of food preservation is also given.

The Dairy Products Judging Contest teaches 4-H'ers how to identify off-flavors in milk, ice cream, cottage cheese, and cheddar cheese. The products are scored based on what flavors are tasted in the product. Participants are also given a test on their knowledge of Dairy Products.

The Meat Judging Contest teaches 4-H'ers how to identify cuts of meat and the quality factors to look for, such as amount of fat covering, marbling, muscle size, and color.

As you can see, the 4-H'ers in Tishomingo County have the chance to learn and practice their skills with all types of food products. If you would like to know more about any of these 4-H project areas call the County Extension Service at 423-3616.

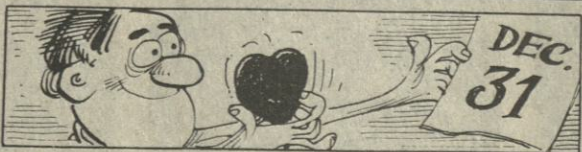

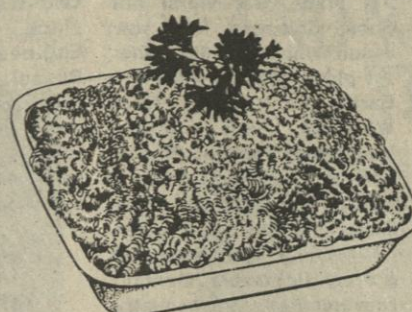

For All The People

Last weekend, I completed the most recent series of community meetings. I want to thank you for your support, participation, and hospitality. Working in Jackson is sometimes difficult and trying, but I truly appreciate your giving me the opportunity to represent your views concerning the issues of today.

Education, fire protection, economic development, and highways were the major topics that people raised. With the prospects for the NASA plant looking better with each passing day, we know we must prepare our area for the high-tech jobs it will bring. Due to the large infusion of people the NASA plant will bring, for instance, our schools will face many changes. I currently support a bill that I believe will help our area deal with these changes. This legislation provides an extra million dollars to every school district within 50 miles of any project expected to bring more than 12 million

dollars in development. This new education money would certainly give our area a boost in competing with school systems in surrounding states.

In a related effort, we passed legislation last week that increased funding for special bonds to create an economic development highway fund. Some of the money will go to the Columbus area to prepare roads for the forestry plant. In the future this special project fund could help to four-land the roads in our area, particularly Highway 25.

In other House business, a number of us participated in floor action aimed at substantially changing the current practice of water quality testing analysis. As it stands now, all communities in the state are charged \$700 per water source. This practice has number of unfair consequences -- it discriminates against rural areas in general and northeast Mississippi in particular. Jackson, for instance, with a population of 60,000 and only one water source pays an annual water quality testing fee of \$7.00 under the current system. Areas like Tremont or the Northeast Itawamba Water Association, however, which represent populations of roughly 250 people, pay over \$1400 each year. Belmont, Fulton, Mantachie and Tishomingo pay annual fees of between \$2500 and \$6500. In other words, Jackson residents pay as little as nine cents per month to have their water tested, whereas some rural areas must charge residents a monthly rate of several dollars.

During debate on this issue, I offered a floor amendment which would have paid for all water quality testing out of the general budget of the state. This is much more equitable, not only because all citizens would pay the same amount, but rural areas would no longer be subsidizing big cities. Although this amendment did not pass, I will continue to fight for these changes and have not given up hope for getting results in this legislative session.

The House, in other action, voted last week to exempt churches from the state's 6 percent sales tax, to take effect in July 1990. This legislation passed overwhelmingly and represents and endorsement of the state's long-held belief in the

separation of church and state. We also established a Children's Trust Fund under the State Welfare Department to assist programs for prevention of child abuse and neglect. Another House-passed bill delays the 1991 primary election from August to September in an effort to allow more time for county and state reapportionment following the 1990 federal census. Any plan of this nature will have to be submitted to the Justice Department for clearance under the federal Voting Rights Act.

ASCS Farm News

FARM PROGRAM SIGNUP UNDERWAY

The Tishomingo County ASCS Office began accepting applications for the 1989 farm programs. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is requiring acreage reductions of 10 percent for 1989 wheat, corn, sorghum and barley; 5 percent for oats and 25 percent for upland cotton.

Farmers who meet the acreage reduction requirements and comply with other program provisions will be eligible for price support loans and deficiency payments. Producers may request 40 percent of the estimated total deficiency payments for wheat and feed grains, and 30 percent of these payments for upland cotton when they sign up for the 1989 programs. The payments will be issued in cash.

Estimated per bushel deficiency payment rates are: wheat, \$.50; corn, \$.89; sorghum, \$.90; and barley, \$.12. The rate for upland cotton is \$.214 per pound.

Except for oats, limited cross compliance requirements will be in effect for all 1989 program crops. This means to participate in the program for one crop on a farm, the producer will be prohibited from planting in excess of the crop acreage base for each other program crop on the farm. The programs also prohibit farmers from producing non-program crops on land removed from production by the acreage reduction requirements.

Program participants will be eligible for national average price support loans at \$1.65 per bushel for corn, \$2.06 for wheat, \$1.57 for sorghum, \$1.34 for barley, \$.85 for oats, \$.50 per pound for upland cotton.

Further clarification and additional provisions of the 1989 acreage reduction programs may be obtained from the Tishomingo County ASCS office.

We encourage all producers to study the programs and consider the benefits in relation to their farm operations. The regular signup period ends April 14, 1989.

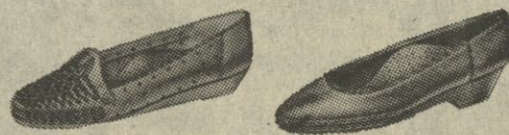

seases such as Blackleg, malignant edema, and brucellosis. This chore could be done when calves are 3-4 months of age. All heifer calves should be vaccinated for brucellosis.

Implanting. Many studies have shown that implanting calves with a growth stimulant can increase weaning weights 10-30 pounds. A good time to implant is when working calves for other purposes, generally at 3-4 months of age. However, calves could be implanted at birth and again at 3-4 months of age.

Records. Identifying calves with their "mama" will aid in the culling process next fall. No need to keep cows around that wean lightweight, low quality calves which receive low prices at the market place.

Creepfeeding. There is no correct answer each year and under all conditions on whether to creep or not. It depends on many conditions such as pasture quality, grain prices, cow herd, market prices, etc. But it is something to look at and it may give calves the extra pounds and bloom needed to bring the top dollar at market time. Take a look at creep-feeding the last 90 days before marketing.

PECAN PROTECTION
Phylloxera is an aphid-like insect causing tumorous growth on stems and leaf-stalks of pecan trees. Because this pest can attack trees early in the spring, timely control is crucial.

Insecticide applications should be timed to protect pecan trees during the "crawler" stage of the insect's life cycle. The eggs hatch just before the buds break, and the larvae crawl to find food.

A foliar application of Iordan, thiodan, lindane, pydrin or sevin should be made in commercial pecan orchards. Trees that had a 70 percent infestation rate last year will need two insecticide applications from seven to 10 days apart.

Homeowners may use sevin for effective phylloxera control. If applications are made after the start of gall growth, they won't be successful. Once a gall has formed, the damage is done.

FIREWOOD INSECTS
Tishomingo County homeowners may be alarmed to see carpenter ants and termites around their firewood. There is no cause for worry, however.

The cutting and splitting of wood usually disturbs the colony of ants or termites already established. To assure that the infestations don't become a problem, never stack firewood inside or against a house.

Upcoming Peak Wildfire Period

Whether the month of March begins like the roar of a lion or with the meekness of a lamb is immaterial to Mississippi Forestry Commission employees and hundreds of rural volunteer firefighters across the State. What's more important to them is what the rest of the month will be like.

Will the well-distributed rainfall pattern of recent months continue to dampen wildfire danger? Or will March be dry, windy, and highlighted by headlines about great numbers of serious forest and brush fires that traditionally have blackened the rural scene and threatened life and property in Mississippi through past

"March, and sometimes February, have been peak months for wildfire destruction in our State for as long as I can remember", says State Forester Robert S. "Sid" Moss.

"People begin to get outdoors more as Winter gives way to Spring. If you have low humidity to go along with wind from frequent cold fronts that pass through the State at this time of year -- plus plenty of dead grass and leaves -- then you have two of the basic ingredients for potential wildfire disaster. All it takes to trigger destructive fires," Moss explained, "is for someone to supply the heat. That can come from carelessness in burning household trash, garden spots, ditchbanks, etc."

The State Forester said that woods arson is also a major cause of wildfires, particularly in the Southernmost one-third of the State.

To help heighten public awareness of the annual Spring wildfire danger Governor Ray Mabus recently issued a proclamation naming the month of March as Forest Fire Prevention Month in Mississippi.

State Forestry officials are hopeful that wildfire losses will continue at the relatively low level of recent months. Forestry Commission records show statewide losses thus far in the fiscal year (through February) are running well

below a five year average in both number of fires and acres burned.

CATTLEMEN MUST BE BUSINESSMEN
Cattlemen can no longer just think survival, but must become fulltime

businessmen to prosper in the beef cattle industry today and in the future. Efficiency and getting every dollar possible out of our calves at market time is the key. Below are some tips to consider on managing your cows and calves during the coming months:

Castrating. Steer calves will generally bring \$4-\$5

more per hundredweight than bull calves. Castration should be done before calves are 6 months old to prevent a "staggy" appearance and a lower price. This chore should be done soon after birth or at about 2 months of age.

Vaccinations. All calves should be vaccinated to prevent losses from certain

Although spring-like weather is still a few weeks away, the Tiger's baseball season is already in full swing. They traveled to Montevallo University for three pre-season games and opened their regular season this past weekend in Corinth with a double header against Wallace State.

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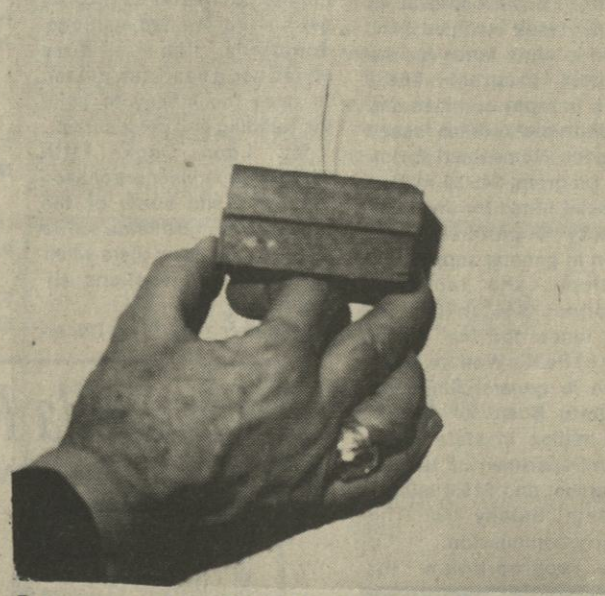

House Of Representatives

A record-high ap-
propriation for public
schools, a proposed tax break
for churches, and a con-
troversial tort reform bill were
among the key measures
gaining approval in the House
of Representatives over the
past week.

The House voted to
allocate \$792.2 million for
general support of public
schools under the state's
Minimum Education Program
in the coming year. The
Minimum Program funding
bill is traditionally the largest
single general fund ap-
propriation handled by
Legislature, reflecting the
high priority given by
lawmakers to education.

Approximately 65 percent
of the state's general budget
is earmarked for educational
programs, from kindergarten
through graduate school.

The measure was among
several funding bills passed
by the House prior to last
week's deadline for original
floor action on legislation in-
volving appropriation and
revenues. Lawmakers faced
another key deadline on
Tuesday, February 28, for
committee action on general
bills previously approved by
the other chamber.

In other major action, the
House voted last week to
exempt sales to churches
from the state's 6 percent
sales tax, to take effect in
July 1990; authorize an ad-
ditional \$100 million in bonds
for low-interest loans under
the state's housing finance
program; permit the issuance

of \$17 million in bonds for an
economic development
highway fund created last
year; and set up a Children's
Trust Fund under the State
Welfare Department to assist
programs for prevention of
child abuse and neglect.

Another House-passed bill
would delay the 1991 primary
elections from early August
to the third week in Septem-
ber. Supporters say the delay
would allow more time to
prepare a legislative reapportion-
ment plan following the
1990 federal census and
submit the plan to the Justice
Department for clearance un-
der the federal Voting Rights
Act.

The House gave final ap-
proval last week to a sharply
contested Tort Reform bill
which, among other things,
will reduce the general
statute of limitations for
filing damage suits in
Mississippi from six to three
years. The House voted to
accept Senate amendments
to the proposal, rejecting an
effort to send the bill to a
conference committee to
resolve House-Senate dif-
ferences.

Tort reform has been one
of the hottest issues of the
1989 session. Backers say the
bill which won final approval
is not perfect but feel it's a
fair compromise that can
bring significant im-
provements in the civil justice
system. Others contend the
legislation has serious de-
fects that must be straightened
out later.

Key provisions would:
reduce the general time frame
for filing damage suits from
six to three years; prohibit
out-of-state lawsuits from
being filed in Mississippi if
the statute of limitations has
expired in the other state;
modify joint-and-several
liability in cases involving two
or more defendants so that
liability for damages shall be
joint only to the extent
necessary for the injured party
to recover up to 50 percent
of the judgement from a co-
defendant who is minimally
liable; and allow trial judges
to set interest rates on a
judgement.

Another controversial
provision specifies that the
two-year period for filing a
lawsuit in a medical malprac-
tice suit involving a child will
start to run after the child is 6
years old, rather than 16 un-
der existing law. The original
House bill would have set the
age at 12.

Other major funding bills
winning House approval in
the past week included \$113
million in state funds for the
Medicaid program; \$66.2
million to repay counties and
school districts for tax losses
under the Homestead Exem-
ption program; \$450.9 million
in special funds for the State
Highway Department; \$47
million in general support for
vocational and technical
education; \$45 million in
state funds for the Depart-
ment of Public Welfare; \$20.3
million in general funds for
the State Board of Health;
\$18.6 million in state funds
for the Department of Natural
Resources; and \$15.4 million
in state money for the
Forestry Commission.

The appropriation for

public schools includes an
extra \$2 million to help defray
school transportation costs.
It also contains the money
necessary to fund the teacher
pay raises which took effect
last December 15, as
authorized in the 1988
legislative session.

The House gave final
legislative approval last week
to bills designating most of
Interstate Highway 55 in
honor of the late Senator
James Eastland and a
segment of Mississippi
Highway 39 in honor of for-
mer Senator John Stennis.

In addition, the House
voted to allow counties to
levy up to one mill on taxable
property to support the
Mississippi Fire Fighters
Memorial Burn Center in
Greenville; provide a tax
exemption for municipal
firemen and policeman
retirement systems; reduce
the amusement tax from 10
percent to 5 percent on events
at Veterans Memorial
Stadium in Jackson; au-
thorize the State Health
Department to certify sources
of bottled drinking water for
meeting health standards;
permit issuance of up to \$15
million in bonds for equip-
ment purchases by the
state's universities; reenact
laws for the regulation of in-
dividual on site wastewater
disposal systems by the
State Health Department;
permit paving of roads in
subdivisions with costs to be
paid by property owners;
revise procedures to amend
birth certificates and provide
criminal penalties for misuse
of vital records for
establishing a false identity;
and boost annual renewal
fees for medical licenses.

The Legislature observed
Higher Education Appreci-
ation Day/Working for
Academic Excellence
(HEADWAE) last week.
Seventy outstanding students
and faculty members from
throughout the state received
special recognition during
the year's observance.
