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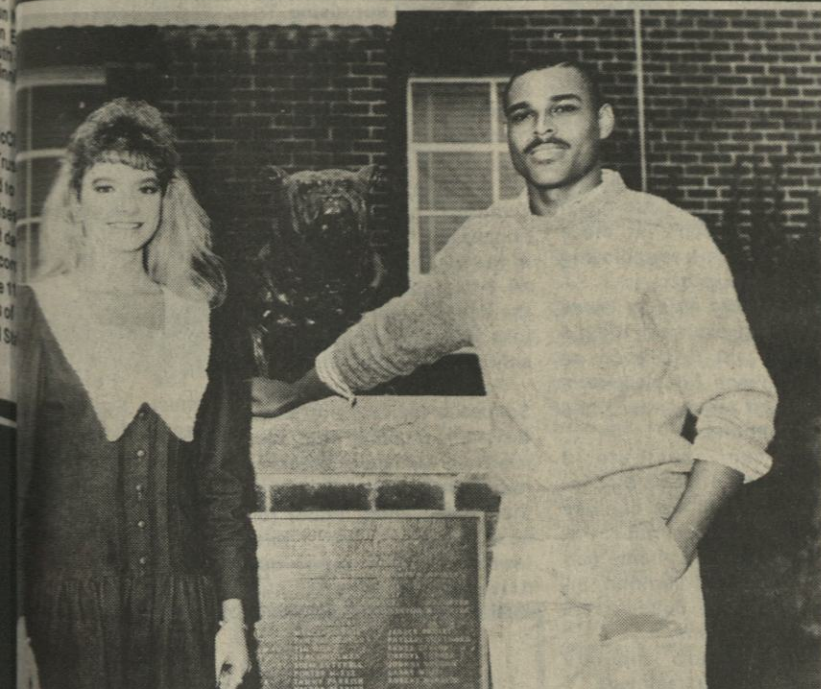

Apparel Plant To Open In Iuka

A ladies lingerie manufacturer announced Monday it's plans to begin operation as early as next week in Iuka.

Richard Bath of Malden, Missouri said his company, which operates as Richard Bath Apparel, has arranged a long term lease and will locate in the building vacated last month by Garan Inc. on Pearl Street next to First American Bank. Mr. Bath said his was a private company which will employ between 50 - 75 people. Applications are expected to be taken next week at the former Western Auto building, owned by Rueben Grisham.

The company official plans to be in Iuka tomorrow with other representatives to set

up and install equipment. Some workers already have been hired, he said. He named Ann Park as general manager and Charles Manley as maintenance supervisor. Both, Park and Manley, are former Garan employees.

Initial work will be made up on contracts received from the R.B.A. Manufacturing Corporation. Work at the facility will primarily be sewing and finish jobs. Pre-cut items will be put together at the Iuka location he said.

Different types of ladies lingerie including sleep shirts, pajama's and other sleep wear and day wear will be manufactured at the local factory, Bath said.

Richard Bath Apparel is represented in a variety of ladies garments under the

brand name Soft Touch, the company owner said.

Contract work also is done by the company for K-Mart, WalMart, Sears, and Penny's to list a few, he said. R.B.A. is also sold under name brands such as Gloria Vanderbilt, Saks Fifth Avenue, and Avon.

Mack L. Wadkins, executive director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, has worked closely with Mr. Bath for several weeks in securing the factory for Iuka.

Mayor John Biggs welcomes the plant and views it's coming as a positive sign to offset the unemployment rate increase realized by Garan's shutdown. About 80 workers were laid off when Garan closed the Iuka satellite plant.

County Unemployment Climbs To 21.7 Percent

Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, announced today that unemployment in Tishomingo County climbed to 21.7 percent at mid-January. This compares to 20.2 percent in December, 1988, and 15.1 percent in January, 1988. The civilian labor force for the county, estimated to be 7,920, rose by 190 from the previous estimate and 590 above the estimate for one year ago. An estimated 6,200 county residents were employed at the reporting period, representing a monthly gain

of 30 and a yearly loss of 20.

Manufacturing employment in the county was estimated to be 2,650, 60 above the December estimate but 30 below the figure for January, 1988. Nonmanufacturing jobs in the county totaled 2,870, compared to 2,860 in December and 2,670 in January, 1988.

Smith also noted that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo rose to 61,310 at mid-January. This represents a monthly increase of 250 and yearly increase of 1,060. Approximately 7,950 individuals were unemployed in the six-county area at mid-January, representing 13.0 percent of the labor force. One month ago the rate was estimated to be 11.3 percent while one year ago it stood at 11.5 percent. Of the labor force, 53,360 individuals were employed, 800 below the previous estimate but 20 above January, 1988.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area was estimated to be 18,420, 240 below the December, 1988, figure but 380 above January, one year ago. The number of individuals employed in non-manufacturing jobs, totaling 22,350, also declined at mid-month by 150 but experienced a yearly increase of 950.

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Attention Taxpayers

As of January 31, 1989 all unpaid Real, Personal, and Mobile Home taxes become delinquent. Interest accrues at 1% per month on unpaid taxes.

Pilot Club Plans Spring Pageant

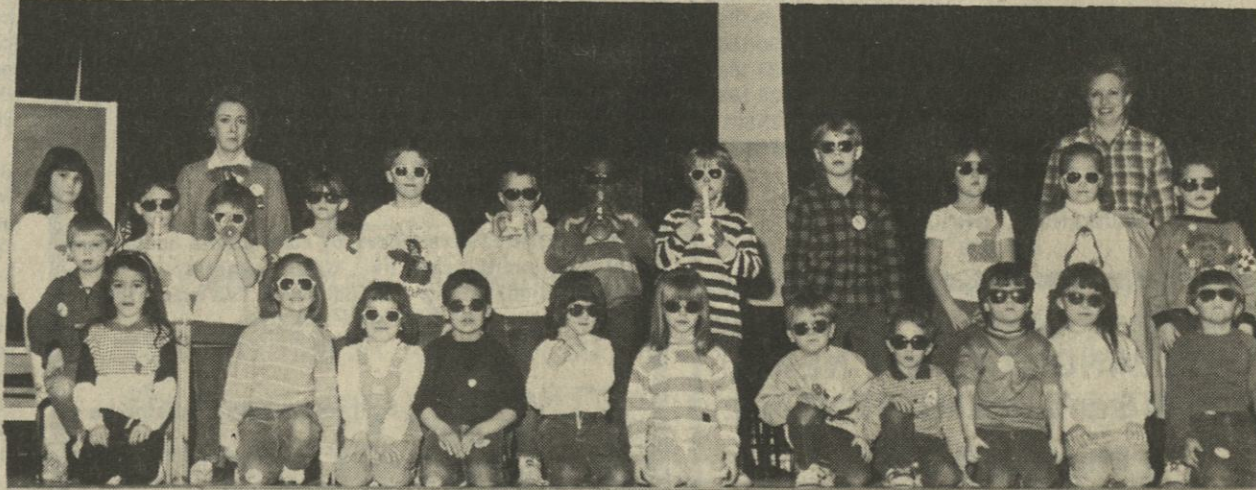

Chatting With Your Home Economist

FAMILY ROOMS

They have been around so long, it's hard to realize that the family room is an American creation. The family room was added to homes soon after World War II at a time when the emphasis was on togetherness. Families wanted a room where adults and children could relax together, while the formal living room remained ready for guests.

Homes built between the 1950s and the late 1970s almost automatically had a family room included in the plans. First located in the basement, then just off the garage or the kitchen, today's family room is often rolled into one, that may also include the living and dining rooms.

Wherever the family room is located, what matters is that you have an informal, at-home space somewhere in your home and that you fill it with equally relaxed furnishings. Even when there are no children, adults will appreciate a special place to live casually.

Planning your family room calls for a study of the people who will be using it, and how it will be used. Ask yourself these questions:

- *What will be going on in there? TV? Meals? Parties?
- *What special furniture do you need?
- *How much storage? For what?
- *Will the space be in use mostly during the day or at night?
- *How informal do you want the room to look?

The answers to these questions will help you focus on how to go about choosing the right furnishings.

A casual atmosphere in the family room does not mean you must sacrifice all sense of style. Nearly everything comes worry-free today from washable wall coverings to velvets of man-made fibers, treated to shrug off household mishaps. Shop smart. Look for:

- *Soil-repellent-treated fabrics carpets and rugs;
- *Tabletops treated to resist damage from water and alcohol;
- *Furniture with tightly woven fabrics and slightly nubby surfaces for long wear; and
- *Slipcovers to lengthen the life of upholstered pieces.

Some experts suggest that television, not togetherness, gave rise to the family room. Certainly, that's where most TV sets end up along with audio equipment, video games and the family computer.

Decide whether or not the entertainment center is going to be the center of attention in your family room. If so, make it the focal point. Arrange furniture around the entertainment center. Include flexible furnishings so you can shift focus occasionally from the TV to the fireplace, or perhaps the view from the windows.

three days. Check weather forecasts to see if outlook is favorable for a 5-day period.

A front can bring rains that can lower soil temperature and reduce the potential for adequate cotton stands.

SOYBEAN SEEDS

The Mississippi State Seed Laboratory reported that seed for this year's soybean crops has good germination and vigor qualities. I'm told that seed for most varieties planted in Tishomingo County is in good supply.

If your seed germination falls below the 80 percent range, consider applying a fungicide treatment to encourage good stand development. The best practice is to plant soybean seed testing above 80 percent germination and showing good seed vigor.

FIRE ANTS

Warming soil temperatures this month will cause fire ants to increase in number and activity, but don't let these pest keep you from enjoying springtime weather.

Control fire ants in lawns by treating each ant mound with fire ant bait, such as Amdro. Place 5 tablespoons of the bait around the edges of each mound.

You can substitute 3 tablespoons of Logic bait for the Amdro. You also can use Affirm bait at label rates. For fire ant mounds in home gardens, treat with diazinon, or thene or sevin. Follow label recommendations.

Don't disturb mounds before or during treatment.

Selecting Better Homesites

Many youth may know more than their parents when it comes to selecting a homesite location.

Youth involved in the 4-H land judging program are learning which soil factors make favorable locations for homes and which factors will cause problems in the future.

A soil that has a fine texture may contain too much clay for a building foundation. The shrink-swell potential increases with too much clay which can result in a foundation shifting and cracking over time. Fine textured soils will feel sticky or plastic when wet.

A course texture indicates a high sand content in the soil. Foundations in sandy soils are sometimes unstable and need more soil. Coarse textured soil feels extremely gritty when rubbed between the fingers.

Shallow soil may cause foundation problems since excess water may be held in the upper part of the soil.

Slope and erosion affect foundations only during construction. The foundation will be more difficult to construct as the slope increases and the erosion is more severe.

When selecting the placement of the septic tank, choose a nearly level to moderately sloping area. Also make sure the soil has a high sand content so liquids will filter through rapidly. This will keep the tank from overfilling. A soil too steep may cause liquids to move too fast. Shallow soils or soils containing too much clay may cause slow water movement, resulting in an overfilled tank.

The evaluation skills 4-H members learn in the land judging program will help them as adults when selecting their homesite.

4-H members interested in land judging should attend the workshops on March 7 at 3:30 p.m. and on March 15 at 10:00 a.m. The March 15 workshop will be conducted by Mack Roberts, District Soil Scientist for the Soil Conservation Service.

TRI-COLOR BEAN SOUP

- 2 large onions, sliced
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 4 cups water
- 2 potatoes, cubed
- 3 carrots, cut in 1/4-inch slices
- 1 19-ounce can pinto beans, drained
- 1 19-ounce can kidney beans, baby lima beans, or black-eyed peas, drained
- 1 19-ounce can chick-peas (garbanzo beans), drained
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 2 teaspoons basil
- Salt and freshly ground pepper

In large saucepan, combine onions, garlic water, potatoes and carrots; bring to a boil, cover, and simmer for 20 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add all beans, oregano, basil, and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer for 5 to 10 minutes to blend flavors. Makes 12 servings (1 cup each).

County Agent's Notes

YELLOW WHEAT

It is not unusual to get a lot of calls concerning yellow wheat at this time of year. These plants may show some type of nutrient deficiency symptoms, but primarily the lower leaves will turn yellow and then finally die. In most cases this year, it has been caused by "wet feet". As growing conditions improve, these symptoms should subside.

As a reminder, now is the time to fertilize the 1989 wheat crop if it hasn't already been done.

COTTON UPDATE

Our cotton growers are putting the final touches on plans for the 1989 crop. Extension information sheets for 1989 are available at the Tishomingo County Extension Office. I urge growers to pick up copies and read them.

Many growers have questions about incorporation of herbicides and optimum dates for planting, when doing pre-plant tillage, avoid incorporating pre-plant herbicides too deeply. Incorporate your herbicides on a bed after rows are formed and knocked down.

The depth of a disk is almost impossible to regulate on light-textured soils. Consider using other types of equipment on these soils.

Common sense must apply for planting dates. The soil temperature at a 2-inch depth should be at least 65 degrees, measured at 8 a.m., for two to

WHEN FARSIGHTEDNESS IS A PROBLEM

You may have had some degree of farsightedness for years, but your eyes' focusing ability made it possible for you to see objects close up without any problem. However, if you now have difficulty in concentrating and maintaining a clear focus on near objects, you may have farsightedness problem that needs correcting.

Farsightedness or hyperopia is a vision problem in which a person can see objects at a distance clearly but not when they are close by. Someone who has a high degree of farsightedness, moreover, has trouble seeing things

clearly at a distance as well as close up. His vision is blurred at both ends of the spectrum.

Only a comprehensive eye examination can determine the degree of farsightedness or whether some other visual condition is causing the problem. Whatever the condition or the cause, early diagnosis and treatment are your best protection.

PLAQUE AND CALCULUS

Q. Is plaque the same as calculus?

A. No, but they are related. Plaque is the colorless, sticky film that forms every day on the teeth. Plaque that isn't removed by regular brushing and flossing will thicken and produce calculus, a hard deposit that is also known as tartar. When neglected, plaque and calculus build up and cause gingivitis, in which gums become inflamed and may begin to pull away from the teeth.

While daily brushing and flossing are the first line of defense against the plaque-calculus-gingivitis sequence, some plaque remains and builds up - between teeth, under the gumline and elsewhere. Removing that stubborn buildup requires periodic professional cleaning in the dentist's office. Some people develop calculus faster than others and need professional cleaning more frequently.

responsibility for the safety and protection of children from physical, emotional and sexual abuse. She stated emotional abuse by parents can destroy a child as well as physical or sexual abuse. Never say or do anything that would make a child feel unloved, worthless or ugly. The following are ways we as partners can make our children feel secure and have a good feeling about themselves:

Listen to your child, always be there for them, Say "I love you" often, praise your kids "good job", Give your child easy jobs they can do well, Help make them proud of themselves, Don't make fun of the way a child looks, and let your kids know they are important to you. She stated 90% of criminals have been in an abusive situation and that abuse can happen in any family, rich, poor or middle class.

Tishomingo County has only two Family Social Workers and they desperately need volunteers to help. She reminded us that everyone has a responsibility to report any type of child abuse. Mrs. Little stated that 22 children were removed from their homes last year by the Welfare Department because of abuse but only as a last resort are children removed from their homes because of the emotional effect on the child. Mrs. Little discussed the Volunteer Program and some of the ways a volunteer would work with families in

need of help. She will be working with all volunteers in Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties. The next club meeting will be on March 9th with Mrs. Zenobia Oaks as hostess.

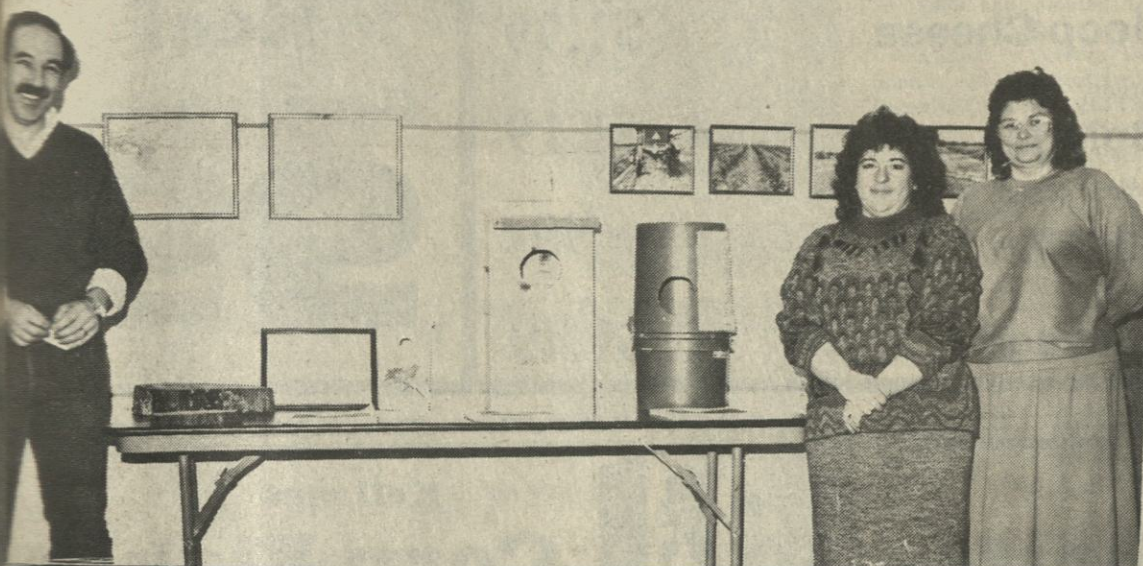

seen hummingbird, robin, sparrow, bluebird, red-wing blackbird, black-capped chickadee, blue-gray gnatcatcher, and orchard oriole. Other items of interest are beaver, coyote, and raccoon

skulls, box and snapping turtle shells, blue bird and woodduck boxes, and early woodland pictures. The USDA, Soil Conservation Service urges all to come by and enjoy the display. Pictured are Don Jones, District Con-

Turn Trees The Leaves

One of the most important natural resources is trees. By knowing the characteristics of trees, youth can make decisions about management and use.

To make sure which trees have compound leaves, refer to Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service publication 146, "Know Your Trees."

Leaves must be dried and pressed before they are mounted. First, flatten the leaves between two pieces of newspaper or paper towel. Then place them between the pages of an old magazine or catalog. Several leaves can be pressed in one magazine.

Place a flat board on top of the magazine. They place a heavy weight (about 10 pounds) on top of the board. The weight will force the leaves to dry smoothly and evenly.

After the leaves have been dried and pressed, they can be mounted. Put a thin, even coat of glue on the under side of the leaf. Place the leaf on the mounting board and press down firmly. Make sure when using pine and cedar that all the needles have a thin coat of glue so they will all be fastened securely to the board.

Write the common name of each tree below the leaf. The county Extension office can provide more information on preparing leaf collections and the 4-H forestry project.

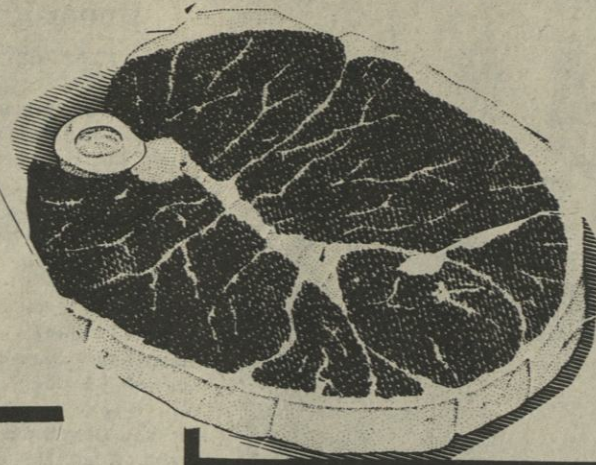

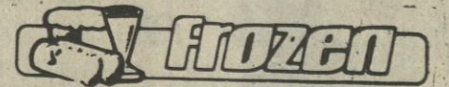

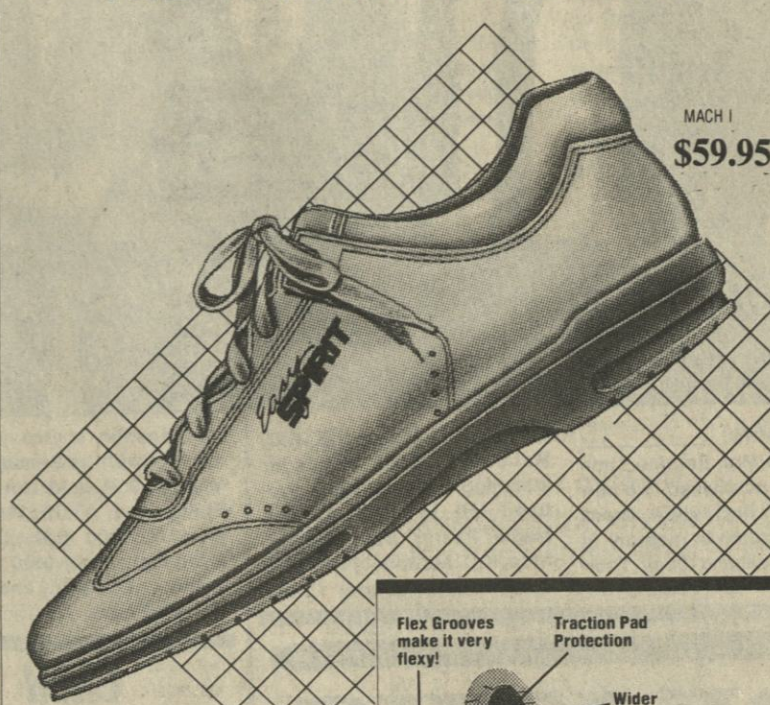

TVA Requests Project Proposals

TVA's Agricultural Institute is seeking proposals for commercial ventures designed to create jobs, promote economic growth, and protect the natural environment through the development of agricultural opportunities in the Tennessee Valley.

"This year, TVA has increased its potential matching funds to \$300,000 for competitive bid projects designed to improve agriculture in our region," said John G. Stewart, Vice President of Business Operations of the agency's Resource Development Group.

In 1988, TVA offered \$150,000 in matching funds.

According to Stewart, TVA welcomes joint proposals from private firms, public organizations, or private-public teams in the 201 counties comprising the Tennessee Valley. Interested parties that submit proposals must match or exceed TVA's

contribution, which is financed with appropriated funds.

Depending on the project, TVA could provide up to \$30,000 per year. However, multiyear projects likely will be limited to a maximum total of \$90,000 over a three-year period.

Proposals will be accepted by TVA's Agricultural Institute until 3 p.m. (CDT) April 7, 1989. Contracts for competitive bid projects will be awarded in June and July 1989.

TVA has conducted programs to improve Tennessee Valley agriculture for more than half a century, usually in cooperation with other public and private sector organizations. The TVA region encompasses Tennessee and parts of Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, and Virginia.

FMHA Offers Loans For Disadvantaged Persons

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has new loan program designed to

help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming in counties in Mississippi, O. Harold Shows, Acting FmHA State Director, said today.

Under the new program, FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency is prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if any are available in their county, or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Mr. Shows said.

FmHA can also provide

other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

Eligible counties in Mississippi are: Jefferson, Madison, Holmes, Claiborne, Tunica, Marshall, Chickasaw, Nodaway, Kemper, Jefferson Davis, and Pearl River.

Socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Persons who think they might be eligible and who are in farming or who would like to become farmers are urged to contact the Farmers Home

Administration county office serving their area, Mr. Shows said.

ASCS Farm News

ASCS OFFERS ADVANCE FARM PROGRAM PAYMENTS

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is offering advance payments during the 1989 farm program sign up for wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and rice. Farmers who sign up may request 40 percent of the estimated total deficiency payment rates for wheat and feed grains, and 30 percent of such rates for upland cotton.

Deficiency payments are made to farm program participants when the average market price falls below the established target price for a crop. Prices for 1989 are \$4.10 per bushel for wheat, \$2.84 for corn, \$2.70 for sorghum, \$2.43 for barley, \$1.50 for oats and \$0.734 per pound for upland cotton.

Estimated deficiency payment rates per bushel are: wheat, \$.50; corn, \$.89; sorghum, \$.90; and barley, \$.23. The rate for upland cotton is \$.214 per pound. "Advance deficiency payments for wheat and feed grains will be equal to 40 percent of the estimated deficiency payment rate, and 30 percent of the rate for upland cotton."

Acreage devoted to conserving uses under the optional 0/92 acreage diversion program will not be less than these rates.

Acreage reduction requirements for the 1989 programs are 10 percent for

wheat, corn, sorghum and barley; 5 percent for oats and extra long staple cotton; and 25 percent for upland cotton.

A farmer who accepts an advance payment and later does not comply with the 1989 farm program provisions, must refund the amount of the advance with interest, plus liquidated damages. Program applications may be filed through April 14th.

DISASTER PROGRAM DEADLINE: MARCH 31, 1989

Producers who have made an application or those considering making applications for the 1988 Disaster Program should remember the deadline is March 31, 1989. This means that all forms must be signed and submitted to the ASCS office on or before this date. Other documentation such as production evidence, Proof of 89 Insurance, 1988 Insurance information etc., must also be submitted by this deadline.

ASCS OFFICE TO CLOSE WEDNESDAY AFTERNOONS

On January 25, 1989, the Tishomingo County ASCS Office began closing to the public every Wednesday afternoon. The office will be open on Wednesdays from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon.

The Mississippi State ASC Committee has determined to close all offices in the state on Wednesday afternoon to allow county office employees the opportunity to complete loan disbursements process disaster deficiency and diversion checks, and in general improve County Office service to the farmer and agri-business public.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

ASCS will provide measurement service at a reasonable cost to any producer that wishes to have crop acreage or set-aside acres determined prior to filing the annual report of acreage. The office will also measure an area prior to planting the guarantee acreage for 1989 if crops are planted within the area staked and referenced by the county office.

House Of Representatives

Drug Abuse, additional nursing home beds, and protection for state timberlands ranked among the top issues during the past week as the House of Representatives focused its attention on a stack of Senate-passed bills.
Lawmakers were facing another major deadline this week in the drive to conclude the 1989 session by the April 2 target date for final adjournment. Thursday, March 9, is the last day for floor action on general bills previously passed by the other chamber.
Among the major bills winning House passage last

week was a measure that would legalize wiretapping by the State Bureau of Narcotics under certain conditions to aid in the fight against drug violations. The bill was passed earlier by the Senate but goes back to the Senate for concurrence or nonconcurrence in House amendments.
Under the proposal, wiretapping would be allowed only with the permission of the courts after a formal request by a district attorney at the request of the Narcotics Bureau director. An order would have to be issued by a State Supreme Court judge or a circuit court judge, and the wiretapping would be restricted to suspected felony drug violations.
Some lawmakers took issue with certain features of

the bill, including a provision that would let agents enter a home or business to install a wiretap. An attempt to delete these provisions was rejected. Backers say the bill contains ample safeguards to protect private citizens, and predict it will help narcotics officers do a more effective job of cracking down on drug dealers.
Earlier in the week, plans were announced by House Speaker Tim Ford and Lieutenant Governor Brad Dye for a joint legislative study of drug problems in the state.
Another bill approved by the House would amend the state's Certificate of Need law to expand the number of nursing home beds authorized in the state and, among other things, allow for

conversion of existing hospital beds to nursing home beds in several hospitals.
Supporters said the additional beds are badly needed in many areas. Other lawmakers cautioned the extra beds would boost Medicaid costs at a time when the state's budget already is sorely strained. Differences between House and Senate versions must be ironed out before the bill reaches the Governor. If finally enacted, any additional beds still would be subject to approval by the State Health Department.
The House passed a revised bill to increase the forest acreage tax from 2 cents per acre to 6 cents per acre on timberland, with the proceeds to be used by the State Forestry Commission for the purchase of fire equipment. Proponents say the bill is needed to help protect the state's forestry industry from fires and is backed by the State Forestry Association and the Farm Bureau Federation.
Initially, the bill called for additional increases of 2 cents per year, ranging up to 12 cents an acre by the fiscal year ending September 30, 1993, but the House voted to remove these provisions.
Other Senate-originated bills passed by the House last week would bring state laws involving court procedures in line with the rules of procedure adopted by the State Supreme Court; allow cities to levy an additional 25 percent penalty when required to clear private property; authorize the Department of Corrections to establish an administrative review procedure in compliance with new federal laws; clarify legal technicalities in a 1988 law allowing arrests to be made without a warrant in domestic violence cases; increase the maximum daily allowance for jurors in circuit and chancery court cases from \$22.50 to \$40; conform certain state laws on child support with federal requirements; revise the state law on handicapped parking; and set up a special fund for the training of district attorneys and other prosecuting attorneys.
Junk dealers would be required to keep detailed records regarding the purchase of aluminum construction material, explosive devices, and certain railroad materials under another

House-passed bill. The legislation is aimed at helping combat the theft of such items. Junk dealers already must keep records on various other items including copper wire, cable and tubing.
Dozens of other bills were approved by various House committees and were awaiting floor action at the close of the past week, including an amended version of the Senate-passed equity funding bill for school districts and a measure to establish a waste minimization program.
Several House-passed bills were approved by the Senate last week, including proposals to establish a beaver control program in the state, impose additional penalties for displaying unlawful car tags, and set up a seed arbitration council. Many of the bills now return to the House because of amendments.

A bill passed by the House to crack down on uninsured motorists died in a Senate committee. Other House-passed bills which died in Senate committees included a measure that sponsors say was aimed at helping prevent abuse of people in nursing homes and other health care facilities, an alcohol boating safety act, and a bill to require state inmates to pass a literacy test before they are eligible for parole.
A hotly debated Tort Reform bill was signed by the Governor last week, to take effect July 1, 1989. Among other things, the new law reduces the general statute of limitations for filing damage suits in Mississippi from six to three years, modifies the doctrine of joint-and-several liability in cases involving two or more defendants, and prohibits out-of-state lawsuits from being filed in Mississippi if the statute of limitations has expired in the other state.
