James P. Dean Seeks Election Chancery Court Chancellor



Tuesday, April 4th, will be a special election for Chancery Court Chancellor in the First District of Alcorn, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Tishomingo, and Union Counties.

James P. (Jimmy) Dean, a Chancery Judge for 15 years is asking to be elected to Chancery Court of Mississippi's family

long resident of North Mississippi, educated in Mississippi Schools and colleges, he feels he is one of the people and understands their problems.

As a past Board Member and a Trustee of the First Baptist Church of Corinth, he is a member and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Northeast Mississippi Community College, former member of the Mississippi State Bar Association, and a member of the Mississippi State Athletic Commission.

He is in active practice of law in the State of Mississippi, U.S. Federal District Court, and the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans and handling over 1,000 cases per year in Municipal Court, he feels he understands people and day to day family problems. He holds the opinion of a person who can help people.

He and his wife Carolyn, a classroom school

teacher for more than 20 years who now owns and operates the family Greenhouse/Nursery and Factory Outlet businesses, have two daughters, Ellen, a registered nurse, whose husband has farming interest in Alcorn County and a daughter Sara, who teaches at a base school in England where her husband, an Officer of the United States Air Force, is stationed.

Jimmy Dean, a Korean War Veteran with service with the Army Security Agency, has held every major office in the American Legion in the State of Mississippi including Department Commander and was elected in 1989 to serve as National Commander of the American Legion, a Congressionally chartered war time Veterans organization with a membership of 2.9 million members.

Registration At Iuka Elementary

Pre-school registration for all kindergarten and new first grade students attending Iuka Elementary School for the 1989-90 school year will be held Friday, April 7, at the Elementary School Commons Building from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

According to state law, a student must be five years of age on or before September 1 to enter kindergarten and a student entering first grade must be six years of age on or before September 1.

Students presently enrolled in the elementary kindergarten do not need to pre-register for the first grade since these students are already enrolled.

Each child entering Iuka Elementary School this fall must have a certified copy of his or her birth certificate and a Certificate of Immunization, which can be obtained from the Health Department or local physician. Parents do not need these two certificates to pre-register their children; however, the forms must be submitted to the school before the child can begin in the fall.

If, for any reason, a child cannot be registered at the given time, please contact the elementary school office at 423-9290.

Election Tuesday For Six Judicial Judges

Tuesday, April 4, Tishomingo County electors will be given a voice in the selection of judicial court judges. This will be the first time in six years that the voters will have the opportunity to express their choice.

The positions of Chancery Court and Circuit Court judges will be filled. Tishomingo County is included in District I along with Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss, and Union in the Chancery race.

The Circuit Court judge race includes all the above counties except Union.

All precincts will be voting in this special election. Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Possibly some confusion surrounds Tuesday's elec-

tion, which is a special election ordered by the Federal Court as the result of a lawsuit.

Tuesday's election has nothing whatsoever to do with the statewide municipal elections in May.

The judicial judge election was supposed to have been held in the Spring of 1986. Prior to then, elections for all judges were held the year before county and state office elections.

In late March of 86, one week before the scheduled election, a Federal Court in the Southern District of Mississippi ordered the election stayed and out of that arose a law suit which was filed concerning the method of selection of judges in some parts of the state. The suit stated the existing method

was unconstitutional in that it denied certain groups a fair representation of the votes.

The law suit was finally settled in late 1988 between the parties contesting the existing procedures and the State Attorney General's office.

The position of Chancery Judge and Circuit Judge are very important and voters are urged to take advantage of their rights in this special election.

The present judges have been held over from the previous term or either were appointed by the Governor without any approval from the voters.

A Chancery Judge hears

matters in equity as opposed to the Circuit Judge who hears matters of law.

The Chancery Judge deals with matters of the family such as divorce, child custody, wills and estates, land matters, adoption and domestic relations.

A Circuit Judge duties involve criminal law, personal injury claims, property damage and contract disputes.

The present salary of each position - Chancery and Circuit - is \$61,200 plus office expense and travel expense. In July that salary will see an increase when a \$5,000 pay raise takes effect.

Saturday Is Deadline Register To Vote!

Secretary of State Dick Molpus today gave final notice of the registration deadline to Mississippians who intend to vote in the May 2 municipal primary elections. People who have not registered to vote but who wish to participate in the upcoming municipal primaries must register to vote with either the municipal clerk or the county circuit clerk before 12 noon on Saturday, April 1, 1989. On May 2, registered voters will determine party nominees for the offices of city mayors, aldermen of city council members, and in some cases, municipal clerks and chiefs of police. Run-off elections, when needed, will be held on May 16, with the general elections following on June 6.

Because municipal primary elections are regularly scheduled elections, both county circuit clerks and clerks in municipalities which are conducting primaries are

required by law to observe extended voter registration hours this week. In doing so, the law requires that they keep their offices open until 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. until 12 noon on Saturday. These extended hours represent a significant change from previous municipal primary elections. Molpus stated, "Like the elections for local county offices, the elections for municipal officials are the most basic building blocks to democracy in Mississippi. The process of registration is no different than registering to vote for any other election. I urge each unregistered voter to take the time during the next six days to insure that he can fulfill his responsibility as a citizen."

In order to qualify to vote in municipal elections, a person must be 18 years of age on or before the election and be a resident of the municipality at the time of registration.

Judge Timothy Ervin Asks For Vote On Tuesday



Chancery Judge Timothy E. Ervin announced his candidacy to be retained as one of the three Chancery Judges of the First Chancery Court District which is comprised of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tishomingo, Union, Pontotoc, Lee, Itawamba and Monroe Counties. The First Democratic Primary will be held on Tuesday, April 4.

Judge Ervin has served as a Chancery Judge for over two years. He was appointed a Chancery Judge by former Governor Bill Allain.

Judge Ervin was engaged in the private practice of law from 1973 until he became a Chancery Judge. He served as City Attorney for the City of Aberdeen, Mississippi; Prosecuting Attorney of Monroe County for over six years and was a Municipal Judge for four years. He is a 1971 graduate of Delta State University and received his Juris Doctor degree from the University of Mississippi School of Law in 1973.

Judge Ervin is 39 years old and lives in Aberdeen, Mississippi. He is married to the former Sandi Tisdale and they have two children, Chad, age 13 and Whitney, age 10. Judge Ervin and his family attend St. John's Episcopal Church where he has been a

church officer and Sunday School teacher. Judge Ervin has been a member and director of the Aberdeen-South Monroe County Chamber of Commerce; Aberdeen Rotary Club, past-president of the South-Monroe County American Cancer Society and South Monroe County Heart Fund; the Monroe County, First Judicial District and Mississippi State Bar Associations; Mississippi Municipal Attorneys' Association; and is a former Chairman of the City of Aberdeen Democratic Executive Committee and Vice-Chairman of the Monroe County Democratic Executive Committee.

"Because I have been presiding in sessions of Court every work day, I have not been able to see as many of the voters as I would like to. The duties of this office are such I cannot personally meet with and talk to all the people of the First District.

I have the desire and the willingness to continue to serve as a Chancery Judge. If I felt that I did not have the experience, compassion and firmness to carry out the responsibilities of this position, I would not have accepted, nor would I continue to seek to serve the people in the eight counties of the First District as a Chancery Judge. Unlike some politicians, Chancery Judges cannot straddle the fence on problems presented to them. The decisions are often hard and complicated, but then, that is where experience and training are important. I have that training and experience.

I need the support of each voter in our District. If you do not personally know me, ask those people who do about me. I earnestly solicit your vote and support in the upcoming election on April 4th.

William W. "Bill" Smith Announces For Judge's Post



Booneville attorney William W. "Bill" Smith has announced his candidacy for Chancery Judge of the First Chancery Court District, in the April 4th Democratic Primary Election.

The District serves Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Tishomingo and Union Counties.

Smith presently serves as attorney for the Booneville School District, is the Municipal Attorney and Prosecutor for the Town of Tishomingo, Prosecutor for the City of Booneville and City Judge for the City of Baldwin.

He is married to the former Patsy Petty of Alcorn County and the father of one child. He is the son of Mrs. Katye Smith and the late William Arvil Smith of Wheeler.

He is a member of the United Methodist Church and the Booneville Rotary Club where he served as President 1979-80, the Board of Commissioners of the Tennessee Valley Regional Housing Authority, the Booneville-Baldwyn Airport Board, the Prentiss County 4-H Advisory Council, Mississippi State University Alumni Association, and Mississippi College School of Law Alumni Association.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

STOP! THINK AND MAKE YOUR WILL

As a citizen of Mississippi, you have the privilege of distributing your worldly goods as you want. You decide. If you die without a will, the state will, in effect, provide for distribution of your assets among your heirs at law. Someone will be appointed to act as your administrator or administrators, as a bond will be necessary.

Your property made will let you decide where your property will go and who will

manage your affairs.

You spare your family the burden of delays in access to your estate, loss of money through legal proceedings, and emotional strain of confusion.

If there are minor children, you decide who will be their guardian; otherwise the court will decide.

Your survivors may realize worthwhile tax savings, state and federal, through a well-planned will.

A will is the way a person now living can provide for those people left after his death. It is the only way the wishes of the deceased have any legal authority, except where the testator may have made dispositions through trusts during his lifetime.

Reduce the time and cost

of settling the estate.

DOES A WIFE NEED A WILL?

Even though the husband has a well-planned will, it ordinarily will be planned on the basis of his wife's surviving him. She may receive all or part of the estate. If she dies without a will, the original plan for the estate is defeated. There is the possibility of both parents dying at the same time; or she could become incompetent to make a will.

STOP AND PLAN YOUR WILL

You are probably no better qualified to write your own will than to fill your own teeth. Legal counsel can help you make better, safer judgments and avoid common pitfalls. He can advise you on legal and tax problems of which you may not be aware. Your attorney's time is valuable. You will save time and money by preparation and planning. The fee charged by your attorney will be determined by the time and effort required. Ask him the cost!

WHAT INFORMATION WILL YOU NEED

*A list of what you own (indicate how title is held) and the value.

*State to who you want what you own to go. Value of things may change. Consider percentage distribution rather than dollar distribution.

*A list of debts you owe and a list of debts owed you.

*Be specific about names, addresses, and relationship of persons named in your will.

*You can name an executor to manage your estate. Consider his ability to manage financial affairs. You may also name an alternate executor to serve in case the primary executor is unable to serve.

*Executors can be named without bond. The general rule is that the executor should be bonded and only in exceptional cases should the bond be waived.

*Couples with children can name a guardian to care for their children and to manage their affairs in case both parents die in a common accident or other causes.

MAKE YOUR WILL

*Make and check the rough draft of your will. Let your attorney put into legal terms the wishes you have written in your own language.

*Check your attorney's rough draft, think about it a few days and make any

changes you feel necessary.

*The attorney should make final copy meeting your desires and needs.

*Have properly executed (signed and witnessed). Sign only the original copy. The witnesses acknowledge your signature and that the document is your will. They should not be named as beneficiaries. It is not necessary for them to know the contents of the will.

*If there is more than one sheet to the will, all pages should be carefully attached with your signature or initials on each page.

Place original copy of will in a safe place with other valuable papers. The executors and some of the beneficiaries ought to know where it is.

*Keep your will up to date. Review it from time to time.

*Any testator of sound mind may alter or modify his will - but it must be correctly done. In Mississippi, the change may be made by codicil - a little will tacked to the primary one. It must be signed, witnessed, and all of the formalities followed as in the original will.

CRUMB-COATED CHICKEN

1 T. butter or margarine
1 t. parsley flakes
1/8 t. poultry seasoning
8 oz. chicken pieces (thighs, legs, breasts or wings)
3 T. cornflake crumbs
1/4 t. garlic salt
Dash pepper

Microwave on High butter in uncovered 9-inch microwave-safe pie plate 30 to 45 seconds or until melted. Combine crumbs, parsley, garlic salt, poultry seasoning and pepper on waxed paper; mix lightly. Coat each chicken piece with butter, roll in crumbs to coat evenly. Arrange skin-side-up in pie plate. Cover with paper towel. Microwave on Medium-High (70%) for 5 to 6 minutes or until no longer pink, rotating plate once. Yield: 2 servings, 170 calories each.

TIP: Toasted dry bread crumbs can be substituted for cornflake crumbs. Add 1/8 teaspoon paprika with seasonings.

PINE BEETLES

Southern pine beetles will be active in our ornamental pine trees after cold temperatures disappear in Tishomingo County. Look for small, dark beetles that bore holes directly into inner tree bark. These beetles leave small pitch tubes of resin about midway up tree trunks.

Prevent these insects from breeding by burning dead trees killed by the beetles. Fertilize and water infested pines to increase tree vigor and pitch flow. Trees that can recover usually force the beetles out of the inner bark.

Apply an insecticide such as dursban or lindane. Follow label directions.

WHEAT DISEASE CHECK

Scouting wheat for septoria disease in late March and April could keep Tishomingo County producers from losing money.

This group of diseases can cause severe damage to wheat fields. The first step in controlling these diseases is to identify them. The Tishomingo County Extension Office has information on identification of septoria disease.

Know the signs of these diseases which attack wheat leaves and head. If wheat heads are afflicted, kernels often become shriveled and light-weighted.

Several methods of disease control are available to Tishomingo County producers. Genetic control is a good and economical choice. This means using disease-resistant or disease-tolerant varieties at planting time.

Cultural control includes adherence to soil analyses, planting dates/rates recommendations and proper nitrogen levels.

Chemical control is the last line of defense against septoria. Carefully scout fields to determine extent of damage before applying chemicals. Also consider yield and cropping history of the field, severity of disease and weather conditions before starting treatments.

If septoria disease goes unchecked, the Tishomingo County wheat crop may be hurt and profits could be

reduced.

MONEY FOR TIMBER

Who needs a consulting forester? You do, if you

ASCS Farm News

GRAZING PERIOD CLOSES MAY 1, 1989

The grazing period on land designated as acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation use (CU) acreage for pay (including the required 8%) will close May 1, 1989. Farmers participating in the 1989 acreage reduction programs are not authorized to graze these acres between May 1, and September 30, 1989.

Under the wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice programs, designated acreages can not be hayed or grazed during the principal growing months. Haying of designated acreage during the remaining seven months of the year is not permitted unless approved by the State ASC committee.

Program participants who fail to comply with haying and grazing restrictions could lose program benefits.

Additionally, cropland designated as ACR must have been devoted to row crops, small grains or other crops planted annually in two of the last three years, except for land in a summer fallow rotation, in which case the cropping requirement is for only one of the previous two crop years. Land designated as ACR or CU for pay (including the required 8%) is considered to have been planted in the year designated for the purpose of meeting the cropping requirements. However, the CU must have been eligible to be designated as ACR in the same year to receive considered planted credit.

To qualify for full benefits on their 1989 program crops, farmers must maintain their designated acreages in accordance with the program contract. Farm program participants are required to

protect designated acreages from wind and water erosion by planting approved cover crops or establishing approved conservation practices on the land. They are also required to carry out control measures to guard against weeds, insects and

rodents.

Producers will be out of compliance if they do not carry out proper conservation measures, or fail to comply with grazing, haying or vesting restrictions.

The strongest influence in Spring/Summer '89 is fashion is color. Clothing colors can have a big impact on the way you look and the way you feel. Color influences body size, appearance, body temperature and even your mood. Light-colored clothes make the figure appear larger and dark clothes make the figure appear smaller. If you want to look five pounds thinner without having to lose any weight, wear black, navy, burgundy, dark brown, charcoal gray and other dark colors. If you are small on the top and large on the bottom. Wear light colored blouses or sweaters with dark colored skirts or pants. Bright colors can also add weight to the figure because they advance and stand-out to the eye. Dull colors do the opposite, they recede from the eye and take weight off the figure.

Body temperature can be slightly raised or lowered when outdoors simply by the color of your clothes, white and very light colors reflect sunlight away from the body making it cooler. Black and very dark colors absorb light from the sun and make the body warmer.

Yellow, orange and red colors create a psychological feeling of warmth. These are also active colors that can make people feel lively, joyful, cheerful and exciting. Blue, green and purple are cool colors. They are passive and receding colors that can make people feel quiet, restful, somber and solemn. Learn to choose the colors that will make you look and feel your best.

These are costs such as oil changes, tune-ups, tires, brake checks, etc. Many young people don't realize the expense of owning a car until it's written down. The cost usually overwhelms most people. Other activities in Unit I include comparing cars, knowing what to look

for in new and used cars, financing car loans, determining type, and how much insurance needed and what to do in case of an accident.

The second unit of the Automotive project deals with driving. Rules of the road are discussed including road signs and their meanings, defensive driving strategies, map use and effects of alcohol and drugs on driving. Activities for project members to practice with include identifying road signs in use around the community, looking for possible hazards, listing steps to take in an emergency, determining mileage from map information and surveying others on safety belt use.

The 4-H Automotive project is a fairly comprehensive project with lessons which cover most things new drivers need to know. The project books along with the Mississippi Drivers Handbook teaches 4-Hers most of what is needed to drive on Mississippi roads. The only thing missing is driving experience. 

"It was just one of those games where they were better than us," Long said.

"Jackson Central is the biggest school in Jackson, TN. Maybe we learned something over there," he said.

Iuka was victorious in the second game played Tuesday night at Selmer. They beat McNairy Central with a score of 11-1.

"This was our second time to win over them," Long noted.

He pointed out that Shaune Holiday was the winning picture, Richie Harrelson blasted two home runs, and Timmy Osborn belted two base hits.

Iuka was to return to the Selmer tournament at 3:00 p.m. Wednesday to meet Jackson, TN Southside. From there the team was to go to Adamsville, TN to play Chester County.

Iuka's record to date stands at 17-4.





Therapist, Timber Hills; Randi Remkus, Tishomingo Hospital; and Debra Orrick, Social Service Aide, Iuka/Burnsville Headstart.

Ms Barnes states, "The purpose of social work is to help the resident deal with their feelings about illness, their altered relationship with their family and friends, and their new relationship within the nursing home." At Pickwick Manor, she provides services to help restore the resident to their previous

community if all possible. The family also receives help in adjusting to the family member's new environment. Ms Barnes encourages families of residents to continue involvement in the life of their family member which is crucial to the resident's emotional well-being.

Ida Ann Bean identifies social work in the department of public welfare to encompass the full range of adult and child welfare services designed to strengthen, rehabilitate and preserve the family unit. "Our primary concern is directed toward providing services to protect children from neglect and abuse," she said. The agency recruits, studies, and recommends for approval, foster homes for children needing temporary alternate placement.

As social worker at Tishomingo Hospital, Randi Remkus duties include discharge planning, which may include nursing home placement, home care services, or financial assistance. Ms Remkus assists with arrangements for equipment at home, and activities for the swing bed unit. She works closely with all community services and is available to assist families of the ter-

minally ill with the grief process.


Mental health therapist, Shelia Castleberry has duties that include individual and group therapy and marital and family counseling. Counseling services are also provided to adolescents who are having problems coping with school, family, or friends. Duties also include providing group services for the chronically mentally ill in a partial hospitalization day treatment program.

Debra Orrick has been employed by MAP Inc. Headstart Agency for sixteen years. Presently she works with the Burnsville and Iuka Headstart Centers. She works with approximately 107 families and attended the March 2 & 3 seminar in Jackson for National Association of Social Workers. Debra states, "My job consists of recruitment, enrollment, home visits, referrals and whatever needs that the families might have. Most important, helping families help themselves."

Part of Mississippi's Statewide Testing Program, the BSAP establishes minimum performance standards for basic skills in reading, mathematics, and written communication and tests student performance in relation to these standards. Report To The People

By Parents For Quality Education

As reported in last week's paper, 17 questions were submitted to the School Board by our group. The Board has responded to our questions in writing as requested. We feel that some of the answers were excellent or at least acceptable while others were either very evasive or did not even qualify as answers. In this article we will deal with the acceptable answers. The other answers will be further evaluated, discussed, clarified, and reported at a later time.

Question #1 was asked because many people had expressed a concern that either they or their children might be harassed in some way if they were involved in our group.

Question #1: Many school employees have voiced an interest in talking to our group, but are in fear of harassment and being fired if they do so. Can you guarantee that no school employees will be fired or harassed for cooperating with our efforts to help improve our school system?

Answer #1: The Iuka School District has adopted policies concerning the firing or harassing of school employees. Those policies will be strictly adhered to by this Board.

Our fears were supported when a petition in support of the administration was started and passed at the school. While we would not be opposed to an anonymous opinion poll of the school faculty, it was reported to us that the petition was passed with an implied threat if teachers did not sign. If this is true then the petition was illegal. We reported this to the School Board. They removed the petition from the school. We want to thank them for their prompt action on this matter. A second problem occurred last week. We plan to report this to the School Board and hope that they will deal as promptly with it.

Question #4 asked who the curriculum coordinators for our schools are.

Answer #4: The Superintendent assumes these responsibilities.

Question #6: When will we get the asbestos out of our schools?

Answer #6 was lengthy, but basically it said, "We are working on it."

Present evidence indicates that they are.

Question #8 concerned the purchase of computers and insurance for the school since apparently no bids were taken for these items.

Answer #8 stated that the computers were on State Contract and that insurance is exempt from the state bid laws.

Question #9: What percentage of our students go on to either a 2 or 4 year college?

Answer #9 was excellent,

but somewhat lengthy. From a review of the answer it would appear that about 60-70% of our students attempt to get some form of advanced education.

Question #12: What ever happened to Physical Education classes in the high school? Is it not required in this state?

Answer #12 was again lengthy, but it implied that Physical Education is no longer required. However it also stated that we are going to hire a Physical Education teacher for the high school next year.

Question #13: Why is there no school nurse in our school system?

Answer #13: The Board of Trustees supports an attempt to employ a nurse in the school system with the appropriate State funding.

Question #16: What percentage of our students come from outside the city limits?

Answer #16: This information is not known.

As stated these are acceptable answers to the questions listed. Some of these answers dismissed things that we thought were problems. Other answers confirmed things that we perceive to be problems. It is our hope that we will be able to work with the School Board and find a way to resolve these problems.

As was also stated, the other nine answers were not totally acceptable for various reasons. We will be attempting to get further clarification of the answers before reporting the

questions and answers to the public.

As stated in the last article we hope that everyone who is concerned about our schools will attend the next few School Board meetings. It will not be necessary for you to sign or do anything. Just being present will show the Board that many people are concerned about our schools.

Midway Homemakers






