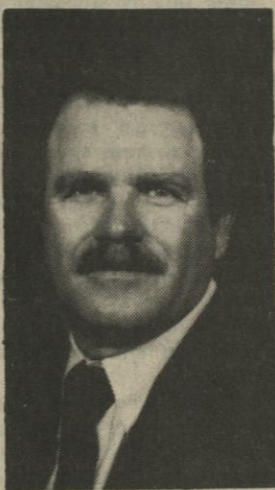

## City Elections Tuesday, May 2

Tishomingo County's six incorporated governments will conduct elections this year to select town officials to serve for the next four years. The first democratic executive primary will be May 2nd with May 16th open if a run-off is necessary. The

general election will be held June 6th.

The six municipalities within the county include Belmont, Burnsville, Golden, Iuka, Paden, and Tishomingo.

A mayor and a five member board of aldermen will be chosen to serve in each town.

### Floyd Whitaker Seeks Re-election To Office

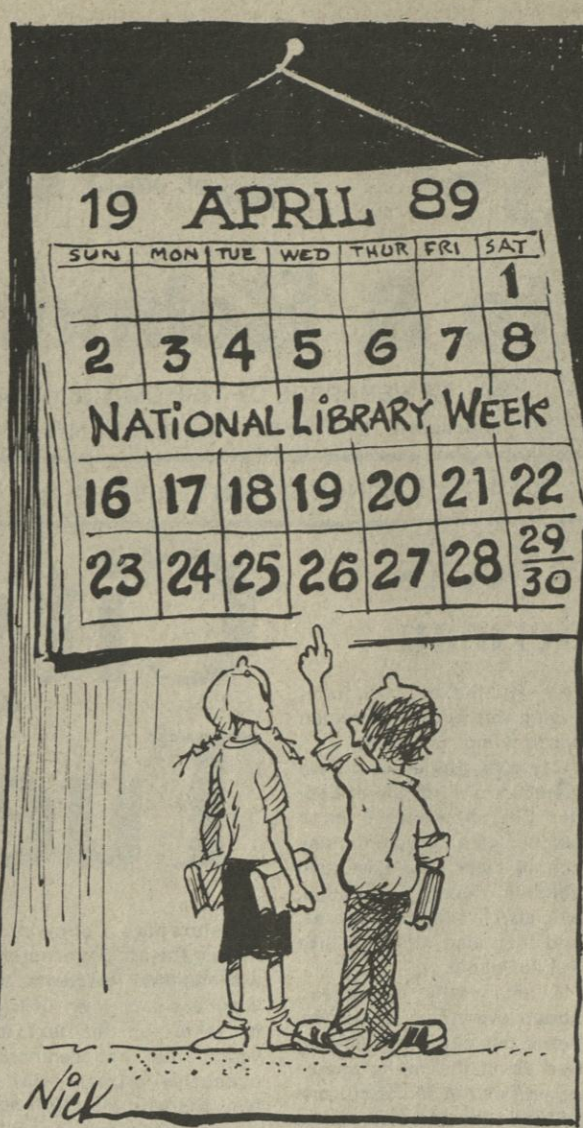

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

**WHO GETS PAID FIRST?**  
You are legally obligated to pay all of your creditors. But, when your income is suddenly cut and you are faced with bills you cannot pay, you must decide how much to pay to which creditors.

There are two ways you can make this decision. Using the debt adjustment method, you divide up your available money and pay every creditor a fair share of what you owe. This is probably the fairest way, but it doesn't always work, since each creditor must agree to reduce the amount paid or extend the time for payment.

Another way to decide which creditors to pay is to set priorities. First, decide which debts will have the worst consequences for your family if you don't pay the bills. Usually these are house, utilities, food, medical in-

surance and car (if you need an automobile for work or to look for a job).

It is tempting to let medical insurance slip when money is tight, but it is very important to keep up your payments. If anyone in your family becomes ill, uninsured medical costs would be devastating. Pay these high-priority bills, or contact the creditors at once to work out smaller payments.

Next, ask yourself what you will lose if bills aren't paid. You can lose your purchases if the creditor holds the title of the property as security, as with a home mortgage or car loan. If you aren't sure which loans are "secured," check the credit contract.

Unsecured debts, like doctors' bills, may have to take lower priority, although you are obligated to pay them too.

Another step to take is to determine your debt. When deciding which bills are most important, ask yourself how much you have already paid and how little you still owe. If you have only one or two payments to make on a bill, it is probably a good idea to finish them and get that debt out of the way. You may be able to return newer items or sell them and pay off the debt.

Finally, check what interest rate you are paying on each outstanding bill. Finance charges in Mississippi vary and can run as high as a 36 percent interest rate annually. Compare the annual percentage rate of each of your bills. It is probably best to pay off the bills with the highest rates to reduce the finance charges you are paying.

## LAWN AND GARDEN SEASON IS HERE AGAIN

This program mainly involves lawn mowers, garden tractors and rotary tillers. The project begins with a discussion of the different types of equipment available, their uses and other general information. Next the 4-Hers enrolled in this project learn 10 steps for Lawn Mower Safety. These steps are:

- \*Know how to operate your mower.
- \*Inspect the lawn before you mow to be sure all debris is removed.
- \*Inspect the mower for loose nuts and making sure all shields are in place.
- \*Wear long pants and good sound shoes.
- \*Keep others away from the area of operation.
- \*Service the engine before starting.
- \*Handle gasoline with extreme caution.
- \*Adjust the height of the cut with the engine off.
- \*Disengage clutches and

## IS MYOPIA INHERITED?

It is estimated that a full 25% of our population is myopic (nearsighted). Some say this is an inherited condition. However, statistics disprove this.

Before age 10 approximately 4 to 6% of the population is nearsighted. By the time these same children finish college, the number varies from 80 to 80%, with a higher percentage among the honor and graduate students. Evidently, there is a connection between the amount of reading we do and nearsightedness.

In a survey of Eskimo families, only 2% of the children who could not read or write showed myopia. Yet among their

children who were attending school, approximately 65% were nearsighted. This happened in a single generation in a population known to be somewhat farsighted.

Yet, some still cling to the false assumption that nearsightedness is inherited, that it tends to run in families, although this example shows massive reversal in a single generation. Genetics certainly cannot account for it.

## Students Take Top Honors At Contest

Not one-but TWO--of instructor Larry Brown's METAL TRADES students returned from the February 24 district level Vocational Industrial Clubs of America Contest at Senatobia with Second Place honors!

Competing against students from seven Mississippi counties, DAVID BROWN and JOEL HAYES undoubtedly did some impressive work to place second. David competed as a precision machinist and Joel as a welder.

In making the decision to send Joel and David to the contest, Mr. Brown chose from a field of nineteen students in his department. He said that most of the students worked hard to qualify, but on the basis of academic test grades and accuracy, as well as attitude and speed, Joel and David earned the right of representing the Metal Trades Department at Senatobia. Both boys feel honored to have been chosen.

At the district contest,

Joel's competition involved electric arc and mig welding in all positions (flat, vertical up, vertical down, horizontal, and overhead) plus setting up oxyacetylene equipment and cutting metal with the torch.

Working from blueprints, David machined to specified tolerances and did layout work. In addition, he was required to take a written test.

David, a junior at Burnsville High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Haymond Brown. Becoming interested in metal trades through the influence of his dad who does this type work, David is completing his third year in this Vo-Tech department. He says he enjoys using the shop machines, like lathes and mills, every day, and he describes his instructor as "one of the best teachers I know."

Joel, a senior at Iuka High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Joe Hayes. Joel decided to come to the Vo-Tech Center this year after hearing that he could learn to

be both a machinist and welder in one shop area. He also enjoys all of the different phases of the shop work. Of Mr. Brown, Joel says, "He's as much a friend as a teacher." Next year Joel expects to continue his training in metal trades in college while working.

Both boys say that the opportunity to combine school and actual "hands-on" work in vocational education is an excellent way to learn. ## Veneer Provides A New Look

Q. What are dental veneers, and how are they applied?

A. Veneers are used to cover tooth surfaces that have chips, cracks, stains and other imperfections. An otherwise sound tooth can take on a much improved appearance with a veneer.

In one method, the dentist applies a composite resin directly to the tooth, then sculpts the material in a thin coating to the desired shape.

Now, new methods make it possible to create thin porcelain veneers with a translucence like that of the natural teeth. To produce a custom veneer, the dentist makes an impression of the tooth, and then the porcelain veneer is fabricated from that one-of-a-kind impression. A minute layer of tooth enamel is buffed so that when the porcelain veneer is applied, the tooth doesn't look bulky. The result is a new tooth surface that is more natural-looking and more durable than was attainable with other materials.

### Mississippi Ranks Above Average

The number of Mississippians placed in jobs between July and December, 1988 rose to 42,390, representing a 5 percent increase over the previous quarter, according to Linda Ross Aldy, executive director of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission. "The increase is significant as it is 2 percent

above the total average for our eight-state region," Aldy said. The only states in the southeastern region that exceeded Mississippi in placements were Alabama and Georgia.

Mississippi showed a tremendous increase of 30.2 percent in the number of Targeted Jobs Tax Credit (TJTC) certifications processed this year. Through the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit

program, employers were eligible to receive up to \$2,400 in tax credits for each employee hired from certain disadvantaged groups.

Other areas of improvement for Mississippi included an 8 percent increase in job openings received; a 4.4 percent increase in applicants available and an increase of 5.9 percent in total placement transactions, which includes secondary placements of the same person. Mississippi was also up 9.3 percent in the number of individuals placed per staff year worked, which is determined by the number of placements made, relative to the number of staff in each office. These accomplishments were achieved despite cutbacks in staff and maintained a cost per placement of \$98.00 compared to the regional average of \$131.43.

"Mississippi's continued efforts to serve all applicants and meet their goals have been instrumental in the increase of productivity by the region," said Jim Latham, acting regional administrator of the U.S. Department of Labor.

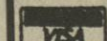

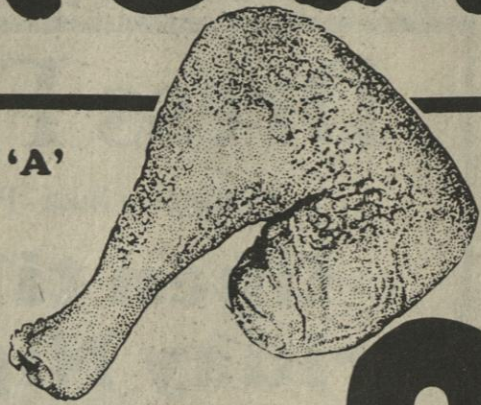

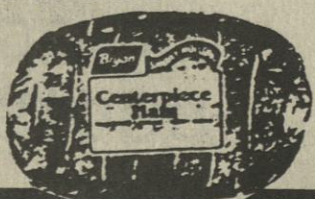

## Leadership Tishomingo Projects Underway

Leadership Tishomingo teams are already underway with projects selected for the program's first year of service to Tishomingo County. Participants have begun to lay the groundwork to complete projects of varied interests and wide scope. The steering committee noted with interest that each team held meetings within the first week following the initial two-day retreat held in Tupelo just last week.

Following is a brief account of each team's projects:

Team #1: Youth Leadership for Tishomingo County

Team #2: Evaluation and Advancement of the School Curriculum in the county.

Team #3: Beautification of Tishomingo County.

Team #4: Voter approval for implementation of an Emergency 911 telephone system.

Team #5: Welcome centers, tourism promotion and a positive image for Tishomingo County.

Team #4 - has chosen for

its project to obtain voter approval for the implementation of the Enhances' 911 telephone system for all of Tishomingo County. With Enhanced 911 in operation, in an emergency you simply dial 911, a dispatcher picks up the receiver, a computer terminal immediately displays the house number, address and name of the listing from which the call is placed. Without delay some emergency workers will respond, if the caller can speak to tell the dispatcher the problem (fire or other emergency) then proper equipment is dispatched. If the caller is unable to speak, then emergency response will be made by the closest emergency source. This system promises to provide the best protection that modern technology can offer at a very low cost and will extend the 911 lifeline to all county residents within reach of a telephone.

Further information will be made available or if you are interested you may contact

team members: Steve Cain, Belmont, Cornelia Emmons, Iuka; David Moody, Iuka; Willie Robinson, Tishomingo or Betty Young, Iuka. This team has elected to be called the E-911 Team and this name will be used in future articles.

Team #5 - has a stated objective to try to locate a welcome center on Highway 72 East and also a welcome center on the Natchez Trace at the Tishomingo State Park. They will also work to improve tourism in the county and work toward a positive county image.

The welcome centers were chosen because there are no welcome centers in the northeast section of Mississippi. With the impact of NASA, and an increase in tourism, the team felt the welcome centers would be a great addition to our county. Since the building of these centers would have to be accomplished through state and federal agencies, the team will work diligently to secure a commitment for at least one of the centers before the end of the project term.

The positive image campaign will be a main thrust of this team and it is hoped that all citizens of the county will join in a publicity campaign to boost tourism within the county. An increased awareness of citizens of the county's natural beauty; historical significance and recreational facilities will enable all citizens to enjoy our county to the fullest.

Team #3 of Leadership Tishomingo adopted "Beautification of Tishomingo County" as their project. The team's objective is to make everyone in the County aware of the need for county-wide beautification through beautification. Tishomingo County will be a more desirable place to live, work and for industries to locate and will also build pride in the county and individual communities. The team hopes to educate everyone to the importance of a cleaner environment by combating the problem of litter we now have throughout the county.

Team #3 will begin their project by conducting a poster contest in the four

Elementary Schools in the county to select a "logo" and "slogan". Prizes will be given in each Elementary School with the grand prize being a 10-speed bicycle for the winning boy or girl. The Team will furnish each school with poster board and rules for the contest which will end April 21. Contact you School Principal or your teacher for further information about this contest.

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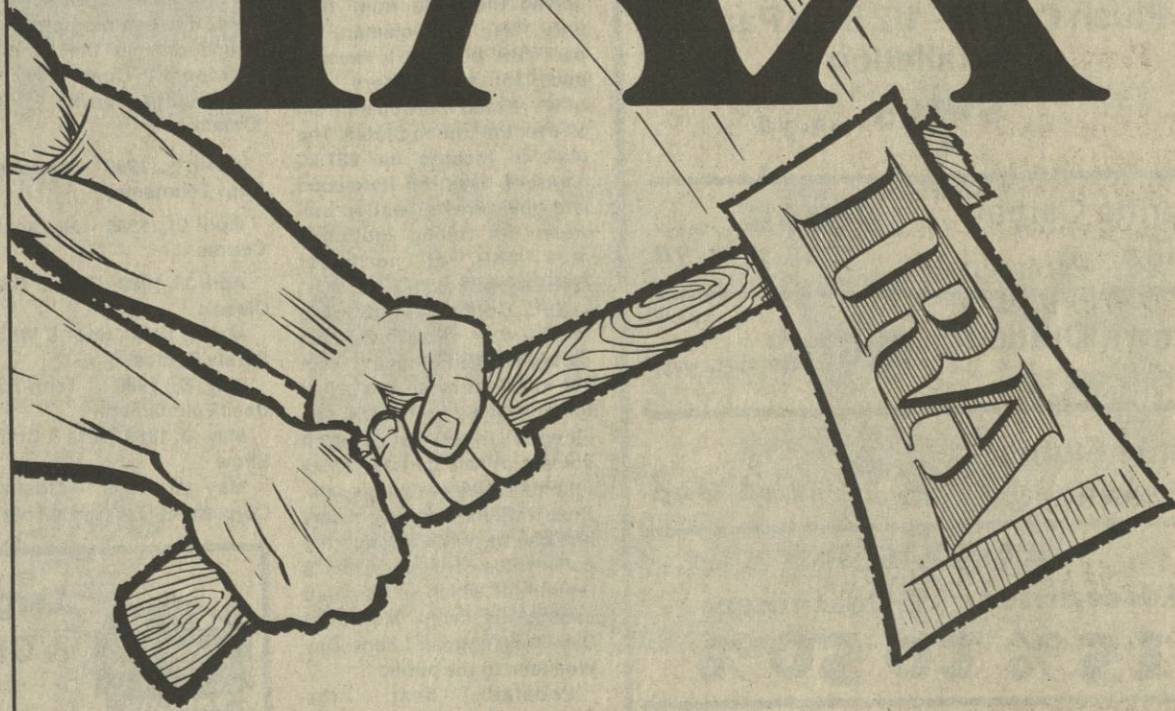

Worn daily by many older women, the handmade Choctaw dresses have full skirts hanging up to six yards of material. Bright and decorative aprons and necklaces adorned this costume, added necklaces added to the occasions.

Colorful shirts for men, trimmed with ribbon and with ribboned black felt and ribboned belts at tribal events. Beaded carry on design ideas to the Choctaws, which trace their to the fabled Mississippian period in the eastern Indian history.

lying area of east-central Mississippi gave Choctaws a plentiful supply of the best basket material, and the making of baskets with cane is among tribal crafts practiced today by Choctaw people.

Choctaw women produce both single and double weave baskets. Double weave baskets, using one of the most difficult and tedious

techniques of plaited basketry, requires skillful weaving of one basket inside another with one continuous weave of material.

The Philadelphia-based tribe will also be exhibiting handmade items throughout the day, including beads and baskets. These items will be available for sale. The Indians always enjoy explaining their crafts and their culture to visitors.

## Legislation Geared Toward County

1989 session of the Mississippi Legislature ended Sunday, April 2. A package of bills, including economic development, should be a great boost to Tishomingo County. Legislation which will have a major impact on Tishomingo County is as follows:

1. \$5 million for Highway 25 to the NASA site.
2. \$20 million to be used in a 50-mile radius of the county for any facilities related to the project such as roads, airports, streets, buildings, etc.
3. \$5 million for Chickasaw lands.
4. \$200,000 for start-up of the NASA Project.
5. Approval of 36 nursing beds for Tishomingo Hospital.
6. \$7,000 for historical study of Tishomingo County.
7. \$2,000 job tax credit annually for each full-time employee for any industry locating in Tishomingo County which will create 10 or more jobs.
8. Turned back to the Highway Department for maintenance the section of Highways 72 and 25 bypassed by the four-lane roads. Prior to this legislation, the county was responsible for maintenance.
9. Established a special division in the Department of Economic Development to assist in attracting industrial or commercial projects having an initial capital investment of at least \$300 million from private or

## Kindergarten Registration

Federal funds. The only project which currently qualifies is the NASA Project at Yellow Creek.

10. Provide for equity funding for the schools.
11. Allow for the transfer of students outside the school district.
12. A bill which provides an extra \$36 per student for any county having only one school district.
13. Allow for off-campus college courses to be offered at the NASA site.
14. Established a program for gifted students under guidelines developed by the Mississippi State Department of Education. All local school districts are required to have approved program by the 1992-93 school year.
15. Provide three-mill tax levies for counties in support of community colleges.
16. \$30 million for infrastructure, which had previously been approved for the NASA project, is also available.
17. Companies that provide child care for six or more of their employees will be granted a 25% income tax credit.
18. A 25% income tax credit is also available to any company providing basic skills training or retraining programs designed to increase opportunities for employee advancement within the company.

Representative Mack L. Wadkins stated, "This has been a very busy session. I am glad to be back home to try out some of the new legislation."

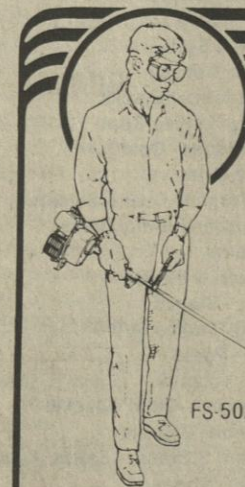

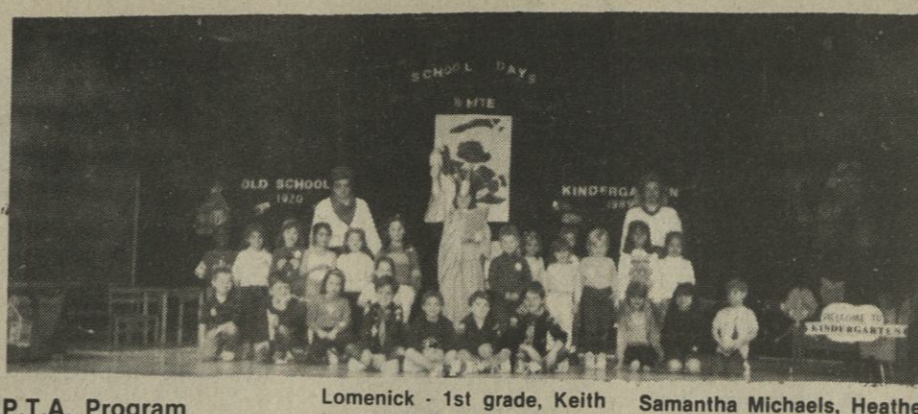

#### Conservation News

##### CRP LANDS BENEFIT LANDOWNERS AND SPORTSMAN

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) benefits landowners and operators of highly erodible cropland by conserving and improving the soil and water resources on their farms or ranches. CRP lands benefit sportsman by improving wildlife habitat. Would you like to learn more? If so, read on.

When signing up for CRP, a landowner enters into a 10-year agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The landowner agrees to establish and maintain permanent cover on lands enrolled in CRP. In turn, the USDA guarantees the landowner annual rental payments for 10 years plus 50 percent cost sharing for cover establishment. Maximum rental payments in Mississippi have been \$45.00/acre/year. Additional

farm income may be possible by charging access or lease fees to hunters.

With proper planning and consideration, the wildlife resources on CRP lands can greatly be improved. Establishment of permanent introduced grasses and legumes will improve nesting, brood-rearing, and feeding habitat for quail, turkey, rabbit, mourning dove, and deer. Tree planting will benefit forest wildlife such as deer, turkey, and squirrels. Annual food plots can be established to help sustain and attract wildlife. Annual

plots are especially attractive to deer, turkey, rabbit, quail, and mourning doves. And of course, all of these practices improve the hunting on these areas.

Are you still unsure? Are you still not convinced that the CRP is for you? If so, maybe some real life examples might help. Two successful quail hunting preserves in North Mississippi have land enrolled in the CRP. They are Prospect Farms Shooting Preserve, which is located between Okolona and Amory, and Towns Plantation, which is located in

Holly Springs. Quail habitat has been enhanced on these areas by managing CRP lands for bean fields, partridge peas, lespedezas, and native vegetation.

Are you interested? Would you like to learn more about what the CRP could do for you? There is no obligation, so contact your local Soil Conservation Service office to learn how you can improve your farm lands through CRP. Services of the USDA will be provided regardless of race,

color, sex, age, religion, handicap, or national origin.

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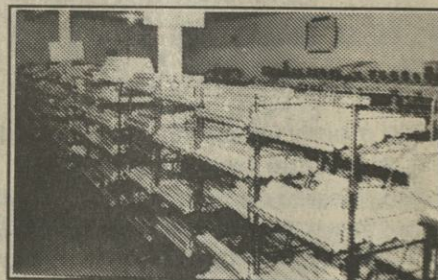
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
