NASA Selects Contractor To Develop Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Near Iuka

Lockheed-Aerofjet Team Wins NASA's ASRM Contract To Build Safer, More Powerful Boosters For Shuttle

The news release received from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration dated April 21, 1989, stated: "NASA today announced selection of Lockheed Missile Systems Division, Sunnyvale, Calif., for final negotiations leading to the award of a contract to design, develop, test and evaluate a Space Shuttle advanced solid rocket motor (ASRM) and a contract for construction of facilities for production and testing of the ASRM hardware. The effort also will include an option for production of up to 44 motor sets. The new motor will replace, in the mid-1990's, the current Shuttle redesigned solid rocket motor."

People in Tishomingo County and especially in Iuka are ready to celebrate following NASA's official announcement which named the contracting team of Lockheed-Aerofjet to develop the advanced solid rocket motor plant at Yellow Creek.

"I am very excited about the announcement and also am anxiously awaiting for the final negotiations to be completed and activity at Yellow Creek to begin," said Iuka Mayor John Biggs as he offered his congratulations to Andy Lowery, Director of New Business Development for Lockheed at his Iuka office.

"The people in Tishomingo County have been awaiting this contract selection and now we're ready to get on with the project," Mayor Biggs said.

Mack L. Wadkins, director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation expressed his happiness that

the selection has been made as he visited the Lockheed Iuka office. "We're looking forward to a long relationship with the Lockheed-Aerofjet folks," he said.

"We're happy to be here and are totally committed to the people of Iuka and Tishomingo County," responded Lowery. "We want to be a part of the community and a good neighbor."

Final negotiations leading to the award of the advanced solid rocket motor project for the Space Shuttle should begin this week, according to Lowery.

Lowery, along with Howard Trudeau, Lockheed ASRM project manager and Aerofjet vice president, Chuck Levinsky are scheduled to meet with NASA's Lowell Zoller for the initial negotiations to be held in Huntsville at the Marshall Space Flight Center.

Among questions most frequently being asked locally are "When is con-

struction going to begin at Yellow Creek?" and "Where can I apply for work?" Mayor Biggs pointed out.

Well, as of press time, no contract papers have been signed between Lockheed, the prime contractor for the project and NASA officials, said Lowery. Everything presently is on hold pending those negotiations, he said.

"We did not win the contract," Lowery said. "We have been chosen as the contractor to negotiate with NASA on the contract," he affirmed.

"The next thirty days will be relatively quiet," he predicted.

The negotiation issue is money.

NASA estimates \$1.1 billion for implementing the project over a seven-year period. This capital is supposed to come from both federal and private financing. The timing for release of the funds depends largely upon Congress, according to Lowery.

Before Lockheed spends any capital in the project, the corporation wants "termination liability" for its investments.

"If we spend \$300 million on this project, we want to know we'll get our money back if the government decides to end the project,"

Lowery said.

A bill providing for the Government's assumption of termination liability to contract on this basis is pending Congressional authorization, according to the announcement for NASA.

Addressing the topic of job applications, Lowery said, "We have employment interest survey forms at the Iuka office if people feel compelled to fill one out."

Coming by the office and filling out a form will not get anyone any closer to a job, Lowery cautioned. "We are waiting for the formal announcement of the awarding of the contract," he emphasized.

When the time arrives for job applicants to apply, advertisements will appear in the Tishomingo County News as well as other area papers and on the local radio stations, Lowery stated.

"There will be hundred of job opportunities for Tishomingo County residents associated with this construction project, but all of these employment opportunities are going to be handled through the Mississippi State Employment Service office," Lowery said.

"It excites me to see the excitement that has been shown in Northeast

Mississippi," the company official said. "Enthusiasm goes a long way in making a project successful."

Lockheed officials plan to keep the Iuka office open five days a week, eight hours a day, Lowery said.

Once Lockheed-Aerofjet and NASA officials negotiate and a contract to construct the facilities at Yellow Creek has been signed, Tishomingo County workforce will become actively involved in the project, it was stated.

RUST International Corporation of Birmingham, Alabama, has been named as Lockheed's construction subcontractor and will use local area construction firms to build the facility. Construction employment opportunities will be with those local companies.

It's possible that initial construction could begin within the next 30 - 45 days, all depends on the negotiations between the contracting team and NASA officials.

"However, right now, nothing is better than that official release from NASA," concluded Lowery.

Lockheed To Develop Solid Rocket Motor Near Iuka

Huntsville, Alabama, April 21 -- NASA today selected Lockheed and Aerofjet to develop and produce the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM).

"The win reflects our team strengths -- Lockheed in systems design and integration and Aerofjet in solid rocketry," Howard Trudeau, the Lockheed ASRM project manager, said. "NASA's decision signals a major improvement for America's space flights well into the 21st century."

ASRMs will replace the Space Shuttle's solid twin motors that were redesigned after the loss of the shuttle Challenger in 1986. The ASRM's power will add 12,000 pounds of payload per flight, letting NASA achieve its goal of 65,000 pounds to orbit.

Based on 14 flights annually, this ASRM-restored payload is like adding 2.4 flights a year with a cost payback in four years.

The overall cost of design and development, including the cost of motors for six shuttle flights, is estimated at just under \$1 billion, exclusive of facility costs which are estimated at \$200 million to \$300 million.

Lockheed Missiles & Space

Co. of Sunnyvale, California, will be the prime contractor and systems engineer/integrator, with overall responsibility for the project.

Aerofjet, the production subcontractor and major employer, will design the motors and do some manufacture at its plant in Sacramento. Aerofjet is a subsidiary of GenCorp whose technology is in aerospace, automotive and polymer products.

The manufacturing plant will be built at Yellow Creek, an arm of the Tennessee River in northeastern Mississippi near the borders of Alabama and Tennessee. To prepare for the plant's impact, civic leaders from northeastern Mississippi recently made fact-finding visits to Lockheed and Aerofjet in California.

The numbers of construction and production jobs will be refined after contract negotiations are completed.

There will be more jobs east of New Orleans -- for related production at the Michoud Assembly Facility and for static firing tests at the Stennis Space Center.

Lockheed's construction subcontractor is RUST International Corp. of Birmingham, Alabama. RUST will start construction work this summer and will complete it by late 1992.

RUST also will expand test installations at NASA-Marshal and will build a static firing stand at Stennis Space Center, Bay St. Louis, Mississippi. RUST will build facilities at NASA's Michoud Assembly Facility, Slidell, Louisiana, where some ASRM

components will be produced.

Chuck Levinsky, Aerofjet ASRM vice president, said that as construction ends at Yellow Creek "we'll transfer a small core of start-up people from California. But two-thirds of the ASRM workforce will come from the region around Yellow Creek."

In 1993 Aerofjet will start manufacture, leading to a production rate of about 32 motors per year. Propellant will be poured into steel casings made by Babcock and Wilcox, whose headquarters are in New Orleans.

Starting in 1994, ASRMs will be barged down inland waterways and route to Kennedy Space Center in Florida for shuttle launches.

ASRMs will be safer, more reliable and more powerful because:

--Aerofjet's continuous mix process maximizes propellant consistency and, by advanced technology, constantly assesses all propellant rather than just sampling it.

--Each 128-foot-long, three-segmented motor will have better and fewer joints than the motor it replaces.

--Each ASRM will deliver more thrust because the motor's diameter will increase from the current 146 inches to 150 inches, adding 200,000 pounds of propellant per motor.

--ASRMs will adjust thrust as the ascending space shuttle passes through maximum aerodynamic stress, or Max Q, eliminating safety problems caused by varying the power levels on the shuttle's liquid main engines.

Congressman Whitten Notifies News Office

Congressman Jamie Whitten notified The Tishomingo County News Office early Friday morning via phone conversation with editor John Biggs of NASA's selection of the contract team Lockheed-Aerofjet for the proposed Yellow Creek advanced solid rocket motor booster plant.

The following news release was received:

Washington, D.C. -- Congressman Jamie Whitten said NASA has informed him of a determination to place the advance solid rocket motor plant at Yellow Creek with a mixture of private and government financing and that Lockheed-Aerofjet has been selected as contractor for the project.

The Congressman, who is Chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations, pointed out Yellow Creek as the most

desirable location for the plant in 1987, citing the Yellow Creek Port and Tenn-Tom as assets for the large shipments that will be made from the plant. Later, NASA agreed that Yellow Creek was the best location.

"We are pleased at the decision to proceed with the Yellow Creek project for solid fuel rockets," Congressman Whitten said. "By all means, we should proceed with research and development of technology."

The Congressman said the plant will be a tremendous asset to the local economy, to the development of Northeast Mississippi and to increase use of the Tenn-Tom Waterway and the port facility.

Congressman Whitten added that some time ago President Bush had also approved the proposal.

City Elections Set For Next Tuesday

Democratic Primary Elections will be held Tuesday, May 2nd, in Iuka and in Burnsville. If a run-off is necessary, May 16th is the date for a second primary.

Iuka voters will elect a mayor, chief of police, and five member board of aldermen. Also, appearing on the Iuka ballot the names of two candidates seeking election

to the Democratic Executive Committee.

Voting in Iuka and Burnsville will take place at the respective city halls. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m.

In the race for mayor, if no one of the four candidates (either Iuka or Burnsville) receives 51% of the votes, the two having the largest amount of votes will run

again in the Democratic Primary Run-Off on May 16th.

In the election for Chief of Police in Iuka, if no one receives 51% of the votes cast in the first primary, the top two majority will be in the run-off May 16th, in the second primary.

In an election for a five member Board, if five candidates receive a majority vote in the first primary, they are nominated.

If fewer than five candidates receive a majority vote in the first primary, those receiving a majority vote are nominated, and the remaining nominations must be determined in the second primary. The number of candidates to participate in the second primary is based on how many nominations are NOT determined in the first primary. For each nomination to be determined in the second primary, two candidates must participate.

For example, if one nomination is to be determined in the second primary, the two candidates who received the most votes in the first primary without getting a majority would be on the ballot in the second primary. If two nominations are to be determined in the second primary, the four candidates who received the most votes in the first primary without getting a majority would be on the ballot in the second primary, and so on.

If more than five candidates received a majority vote in the first primary, the five candidates who received the most votes would be nominated.

In Iuka, the following positions will be filled from the list of candidates:

FOR MAYOR: The incumbent, John H. Biggs, David Nichols, David Smith, and David Yarbrough.

FOR ALDERMEN: Marvin Baker, James A. Bonds, Jackie Bryant, Don Cowell, Leroy Dean, (James W.

Freeman Jr., withdrew) Buddy James, Charlotte Kramer, Aubrey "Pat" Patterson, Cecil Phifer, L.T. Robinson, and Scotty Skinner.

FOR CHIEF OF POLICE: Ricky Cornelson, Joel Hollman, and the incumbent, Floyd Whitaker.

FOR DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: H.T. "Diddle" Lomenick and Charlene Bates.

Those seeking the office for mayor in Burnsville include incumbent, Bobby Johnson, Andy (Buck) Lovelace, A.T. Marlar, Jr., and Truman South.

k) We received \$21,841.00 EPA grant to help repair the sewer system.

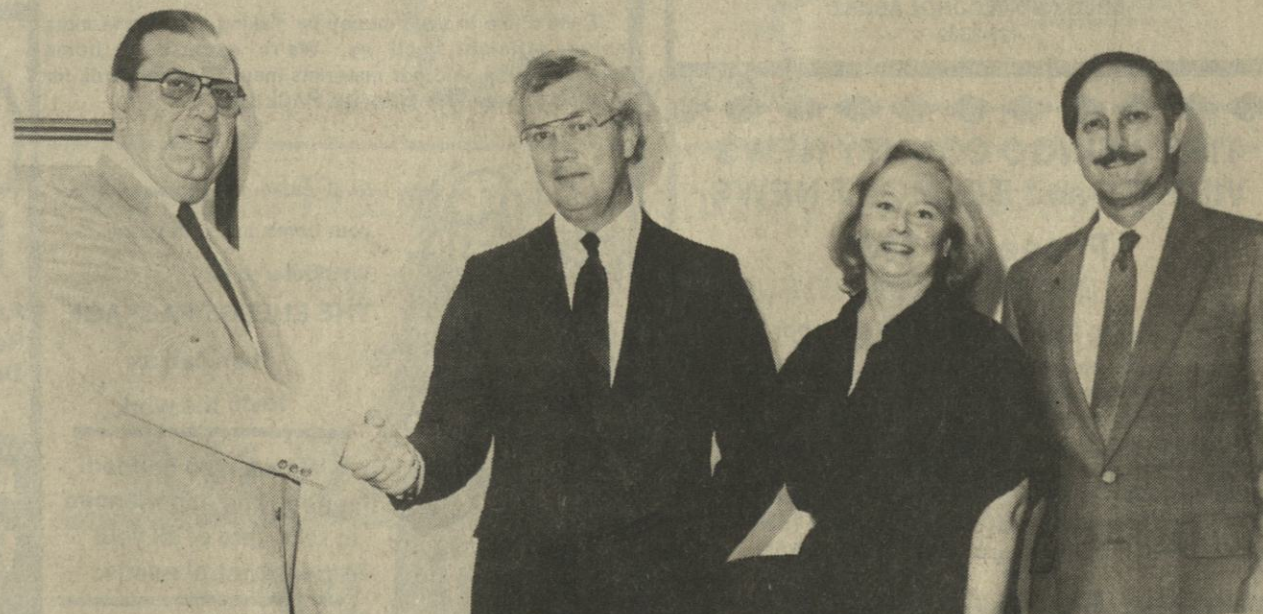
l) We were able to attract Multi-vision Cable Company of Dalton, Georgia to install cable for the city.

n) We extended approximately 2 1/2 miles of water lines to residences of north Burnsville because their wells went dry due to the digging of the Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway.

swim ashore ... and then there were five. REMEMBER, sized boats rarely sink. Stay with the boat until help arrives.

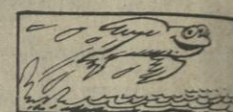

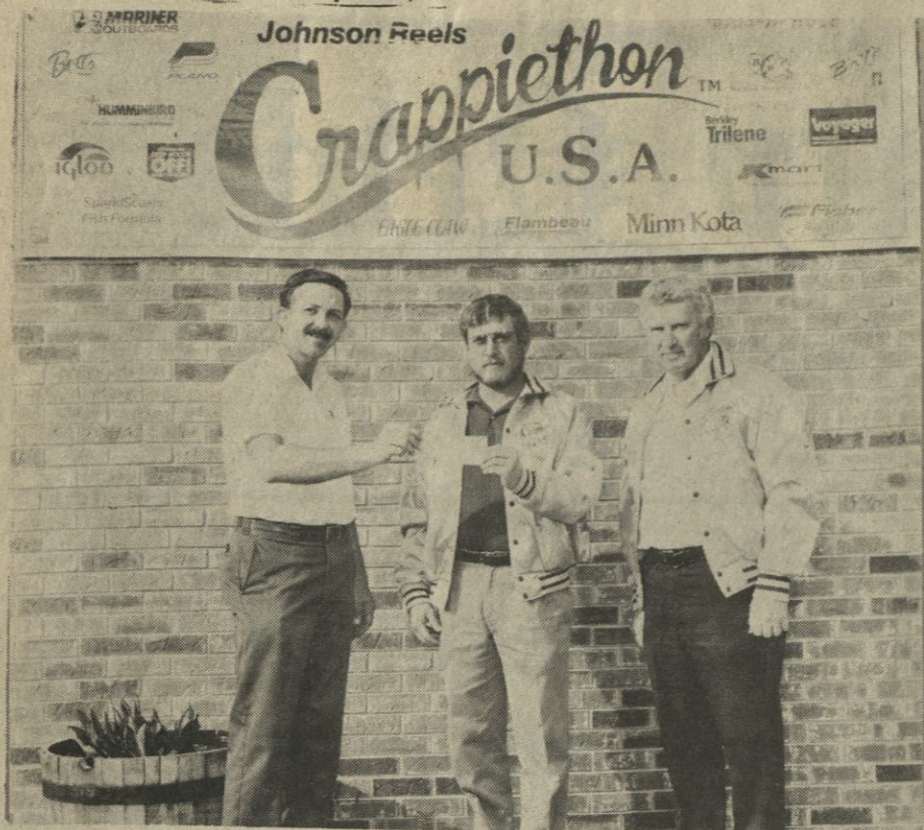

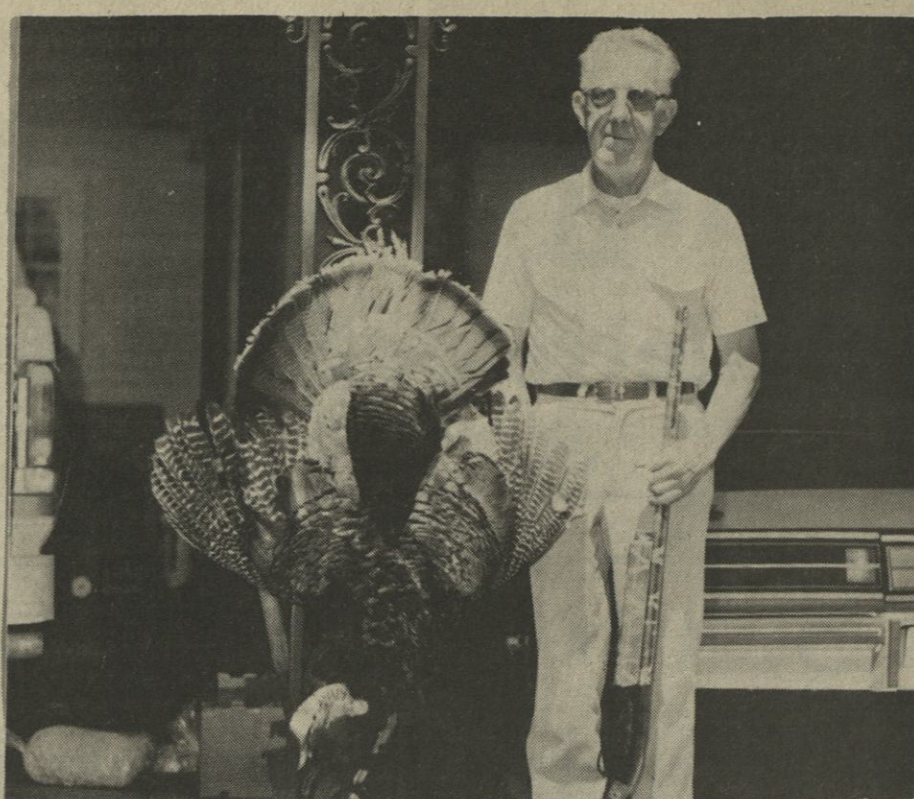

plans for the weekend. Let's look at what's behind these gloomy moods.

Out of the mass of information about depression one thing is clear; depression is highly complex.

The National Association of Mental Health defines depression as "an emotional state of dejection and sadness, ranging from mild discouragement and downheartedness to feelings of utter hopelessness and despair."

Classifying the forms and concepts of depression leads to a confusion of words. In its simplest form, the American Psychiatric Association suggests that all depression can be classified as mild, moderate or severe.

For most of us, feeling mildly depressed is a matter of having a "bad day" or a negative outlook on events. Sometimes the cause is apparent and at other times the mood seems to come from nowhere.

Mild depression is the emotional state of feeling sad, lonely and dejected, often accompanied by fatigue that rest doesn't help, overeating or loss of appetite, headache, early morning insomnia and a decrease of in-

terest in people and surroundings.

Moderate depression is characterized by many of the symptoms of mild depression, but it's felt more intensely, to such a degree that it may interfere with the person's home life or job. Usually, however, the person is able to carry on most normal activities.

When the degree, depth and duration of depression becomes really severe, there are marked changes in behavior shown by total loss of interest in the outside world.

For the ordinary blues or mild depression, you don't need outside help if the dark mood is neither persistent nor intense. There are ways to help yourself. When you can't handle your low moods on your own, it may help to talk it out with your family doctor, your minister or a psychiatrically oriented social worker.

There is no quick cure for moderate or serious depression, and professional help is needed. When doctors treat a depressed patient, they start by giving a thorough physical examination to see if there is physical problem aggravating the depression.

To cope with either mild depression, use your own favorite techniques for improving fallen spirits. Perhaps you listen to music, go out to see a comedy film or window shop to admire beautiful things. Expanding physical energy is perhaps the best way to eliminate or to elevate your mood. It's effects are most seen most consistently in moments of anger. The angry person who uses physical energy tends to calm down, and the depressed person who busies himself feels relief. So take a long, brisk walk, ride a bike, go bowling or play golf.

Do some soul searching -- not only to review what happened but to understand why it saddens you. Is your ego bruised by a mistake you've made? Are you over-tired? Are you reacting to some bad news you've heard? Bugged by in-laws? Are you angry because of what someone else did or didn't do? Do you have doubts about your self-worth?

Consider whether you're overreacting, magnifying a trivial disappointment or making a mountain out of a molehill. Try to recognize that mild sadness is normal and will soon pass. If you can accept the fact that to have problems is human, you'll probably feel better.

Remember that you're in charge. You basically are the creator of your own happiness and unhappiness. Your

thoughts determine how you feel. It's not just what happens to you that causes your feelings and actions. Rather it's your way of looking at things and your thoughts that determine how you feel and what you do.

Avoid the irrational ideas that cause unhappiness, anger and depression. Irrational ideas include:

1. I must have the love and approval of others;
2. I should do everything well;
3. I must have control over people and events;
4. I have the right to be dependent on others;
5. I am not responsible for my behavior;
6. The world is fair and just.

Think positive thoughts. Thoughts are like mental magnets. What you dwell upon, you attract. Realistic, positive thinking produces a pleasant state of mind. While it is often good to be aware of the negative, it isn't good to dwell on it. When you think too much about the negative aspects of life, you drain away your capacity to choose happiness.

VEGETABLE-MEAT SOUP

1 lb. stew meat
1 qt. water
salt and pepper to taste

County Agents Notes

TICKS ON DOGS

Ticks are out in high numbers in Tishomingo County. They've been appearing on dogs that run in fields or wooded areas.

Once the female tick is engorged with blood from her dog host, she drops off the animal and may lay as many as 6,000 eggs. When the eggs hatch, the "seed" ticks will attach to a host.

Treat dogs with a formulation of sevin or malathion. Check label rates. Make sure the dog is at least 4 weeks old before these chemicals are used.

WATERMELON PESTS

Check watermelon fields and patches in Tishomingo County for striped and spotted cucumber beetles. These beetles attack melon seedlings, stripping them of leaves.

Use sevin, thiodan, Guthion, pydrin or asana for control. Refer to precautions and restrictions before use.

Seedcorn maggots continue to be a problem in some watermelon fields. They prefer melons grown in soil of high organic matter. Applications of diazinon 14G, diazinon 50WP or diazinon AG500 may be used at label rates at planting or replanting. Work the insecticide around the seed area.

HOUSE PLANT DISEASE

Fungi and bacteria cause leaves of house plants to spot or scorch, especially if the plants are placed outside in summer. Plants grown inside are not exposed to as many diseases as those left outside.

Avoid sprinkling the foliage when watering house plants. Increased air circulation will help prevent some problems.

Remove diseased leaves as they appear. Spray foliage with maneb, zineb or benlate. Repeat as needed, following directions.

Remember--to prevent spread of disease, isolate diseased plants from healthy ones.

FARM MEDIATION PROGRAM

Since November, more than 4,000 delinquent notices were sent Mississippi farmers, mediators with the state Farm Mediation Program have been working with farmers and lenders to find acceptable solutions.

The program's success rate in solving problems is 85 percent. U.S. Department of Agriculture is using the Mississippi program as a model for other states because of the success rate.

The mediation process begins when a lender or farmer contacts the state mediation office for help. A decision to participate is made by the farmer and lender, not the mediator. Participants choose mediators they meet with a program mediator to work out a solution.

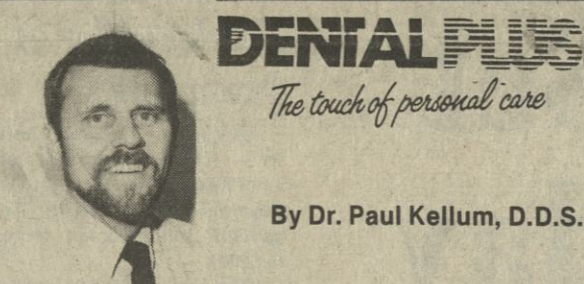

GUM TROUBLE

Q. How common is periodontal disease?

A. It's more widespread that it should be, even though there has been improvement in the 1980's.

Back in 1980, the United States Public Health Service set certain objectives for dental health. One was to reduce the prevalence of destructive periodontal disease. In the mid-1980s a national survey found that almost 25 percent of employed adults age 18 to 64 had some periodontal disease. For those over 65 the rates were higher.

Now the Federal Centers for Disease Control report that progress is being made -- only about one in five adults has periodontal disease. The CDC report noted: "Many adults can maintain an acceptable level of periodontal health over a lifetime through a combination of personal and professional care." That means regular brushing and flossing to control plaque, and regular visits to the dental office for professional cleaning, scaling and checkups.

Farmers Call For Support Of AG Weather Stations

Storm clouds are building over the government's lack of emphasis in the area of agricultural weather forecasting.

A special Agricultural Weather Committee has been formed by the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation to address the problems of funding and upgrading the existing Agricultural Weather Centers. Four centers, including the one at Stoneville, MS, operate across the country under the U.S. Department of Commerce.

Don Waller of Oxford, federation president, in forming the committee, said, "To make efficient management decisions and to cope with many environmental concerns facing them, farmers need the best weather information possible. We are definitely concerned over the never ending battle to gain funding for the agricultural weather centers and the need to upgrade their systems."

The Agricultural Weather Committee, chaired by J.R. Carter of Rolling Fork, a federation vice president, conducted its first meeting in Memphis, TN, where the group toured the Federal Express weather headquarters. The focus of the tour was the Man-Computer Interactive Data Access System

Swimming Lessons Offered At NEMCC

Members of the committee, along with a number of agricultural and weather representatives, heard a report on the current situation in regard to the U.S. Department of Commerce's desire to rid its National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) of specialized weather services. It is apparent that NOAA wants to be involved in only severe storm or short term forecasting.

The group was told that yearly efforts are required to secure the \$250,000 operating budgets for each of the weather centers. For almost 15 years, ag weather has not been a budgeted service, but thanks to the efforts by Mississippi Congressman Jamie Whitten and others, the funds have been made available to continue their operation.

While the committee is just beginning its study, a recommendation was made for all farm and commodity groups to support and work for needed appropriations. It was also recommended that efforts be undertaken which would lead to the development of a national weather information system, such as the McIDAS, to provide accurate and timely weather information to farmers across the country. The committee would like to see such a system in place by 1991.

Other members of the Farm Bureau Agricultural Weather Committee are: Travis Satterfield, Kenneth Hood and Ed Hester, all of Bolivar County, Sykes Sturdivant of Tallahatchie County and Boyd Eifling of Washington County.

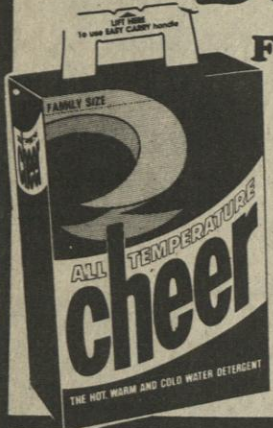

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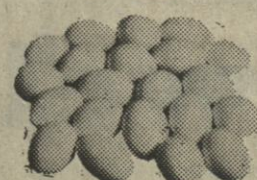

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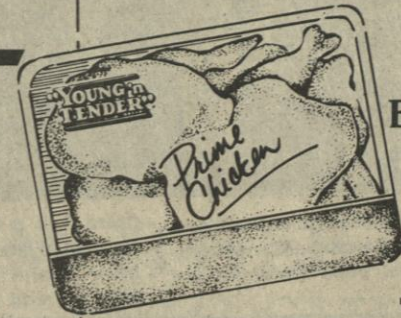

Employment Still Rising In Tishomingo County

Since the first of the year unemployment in Tishomingo County has declined. Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, stated that the rate of unemployment in Tishomingo County at mid-March was estimated to be 21.0 percent, compared to 21.1 percent in February and 12.1 percent in March, 1988. The civilian labor force for the county was estimated to be 7,890, down 110 from last month but 590 above the estimate for one year ago. An estimated 6,230 Tishomingo County residents were employed at the reporting period, 80 below the February figure and 190 below March, one year ago.

Manufacturing employment for the county was estimated to be 2,640, 50 below the previous estimate and 170 below one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment at 2,870 rose minimally from last month but climbed 150 above the estimate for March, 1988.

CCC loans are available
Mississippi for wheat,

3. The commodity must be
free and clear of all liens,

brances. If not, lien waivers

Commodities must be
stored in CCC approved on-
farm storage, or in

CCC for the storage of the

Loans must be requested
before the final loan
availability date for the crop.

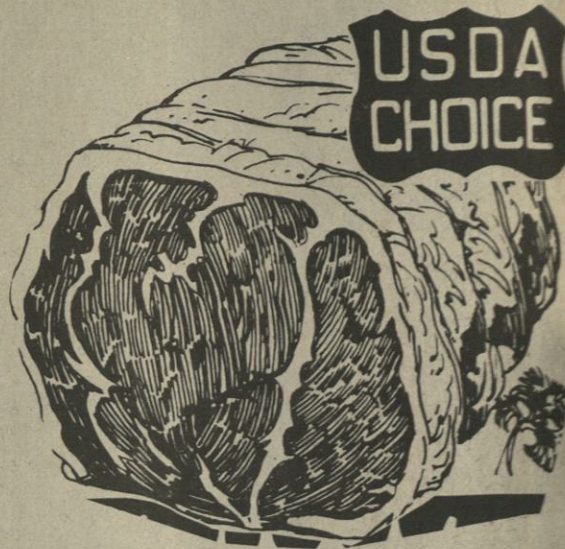

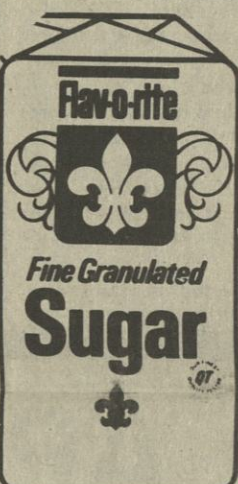

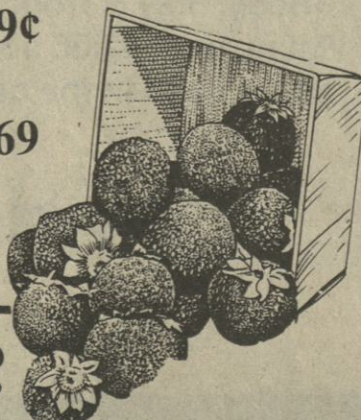

H.I.S. Manufacturing To Open In Belmont

On April 21, was a great day for Tishomingo County. With the announcement that Lockheed was selected as the ASRM Yellow Creek, an announcement was also made that H.I.S. Manufacturing plans to locate in Belmont to manufacture

Chic jeans. Officials of Henry I. Siegel Company, H.I.S., joined local officials in making this announcement. Roland Kimberlin, Siegel's Executive Vice-President, said that the company hopes to start production in mid-May. The New York-based company will invest about \$800,000 in new equipment.

H.I.S. Manufacturing Company has eight other plants in West Tennessee with about 3400 employees. The Belmont facility is expected to employ 300 to 400 people. The average hourly rate in the Tennessee plants is \$6.05 per hour. Some employees earn in the \$8.00 to 19.50 per-hour range depending upon their production rate. Mr. Kimberlin said they were attracted to the former Blue Bell plant in Belmont because of the existing building and the available trained work force.

Mack L. Wadkins, Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation said, "The plant location was possible because of the cooperation of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. We had tried unsuccessfully for several months to find a tenant for a plant. The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors made a commitment about two months ago to purchase the facility from Blue Bell. If we had a company ready to move in, Blue Bell in turn gave the county a two-month option to purchase the facility. We had one week left on the option when we located the plant. H.I.S. has applied for in-lieu funds to purchase the building which will be repaid over a 15-year period."

The plant is the fifth to locate in Tishomingo County since mid-December. Master Wear Inc. of Tennessee took over the Tishomingo Blue Bell plant earlier this year with plans to employ between 120-150 workers. Richard Bath Apparel, R.B.A., a lingerie manufacturer moved into the luka plant left vacant by Garan with plans to employ 50-75 workers. A furniture manufacturing company based in Okolona, 20 Century, expanded its operation into the Golden area and expects to employ

80-150 workers.

A new plant for the luka Industrial Park, Just In Time Manufacturing Company, will begin construction very soon with plans to hire 80-150 workers. Just In Time will produce canteen covers for the military.

These five plants have the potential to create over 900 new jobs for Tishomingo County. None of these five plants are connected in any way with the NASA project at Yellow Creek, but Wadkins said he does expect spin-off industries to locate here in the future.

Search Continues For Missing Elderly Lady



The search continues in the area of Highway 25, north of luka, for an elderly lady who has been missing since Friday afternoon.

Annie Inez Flynt, 80, of luka, was last seen around 3 p.m. Friday, according to her daughter, Mrs. Barbara Allen. Mrs. Flynt and her husband, R.C. Flynt had been working around shrubs in the yard when she apparently wan-

dered away.

A neighbor, Janice South, reported last seeing Mrs. Flynt about 2:50 p.m. Friday. Mrs. Allen said W.T. Carson reported that he had seen Mrs. Flynt when he was taking his children home from school. Carson's sighting of the missing lady was on the embankment of the road as she crossed Hwy. 25 North going West into a wooded area.

Mrs. Flynt is described by family members as 5 feet, 5 inches tall, with a slim build of 125 lbs. Her skin tones are more yellowish, not fair, said Mrs. Allen, and she has hazel green eyes. Her hair is more white than grey and her left arm tremors, the after effects of a stroke. She was wearing her upper denture, no lower plate. She was dressed in a green sweat shirt and had on a darker shade of green gabardine slacks. Jewelry in-

cluded a five-stone Mother's ring on her right hand, a small engagement ring, and a gold watch.

No foul play is suspected in Mrs. Flynt's disappearance based on a past similar incident; however, any bit of information which could be helpful to authorities or family members should be reported.

In an unrelated report from the Sheriff's Department, it was stated that an unidentified woman had recently turned in several marijuana plants to the sheriff.

These plants, which ranged in size from 6-8 inches, were reportedly found in an luka residence in the bedroom of the woman's 18-year old son.

Sheriff Dobbs stated the luka mother had set a good example by turning in the illegal plants and hopefully her efforts would deter her son from further drug involvement.

No names were released in the case.

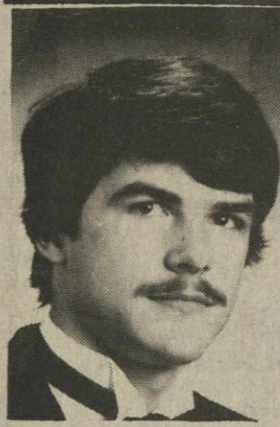

4-H ELECTRIC PROJECT
The 4-H Electric Project is a good way to help youth learn the basics of electricity and steps they can take to help conserve energy in their homes.

In the beginning stages of the project, 4-H'ers learn the fundamentals of electricity and it's history.

Electricity is not an invention of man but is a part of nature. As Benjamin Franklin proved, the brilliant flashes of lightning in a thunderstorm are electricity. Through the work of inventors, man has harnessed electricity to enable it to do the work of

thousands of men.

The 4-H project also explains how electricity "flows" much like water flows. The "flow" of electricity is called the current. Two kinds of current are direct current and alternating current. (DC and AC) DC is the current produced by batteries and always flows in the same direction. DC is the current found in your car, flashlights, portable radios and other things need batteries.

AC is the type of current used in your home. The current is produced by generators and the voltage can be changed by transformers nearly anywhere along the circuit.

The 4-H Electric Project teaches 4-H members many

facts about electricity and its uses such as how conductors work, the purpose of resistors, how light works, how to choose electric appliances, how to read your electric meter, sources of electricity, transmitting power, and the basics of electronics.

4-H members enrolled in the Electric Project have several sources of information from the most basic world of electricity to the complex world of electronics. The project is designed to last several years and to give 4-H'ers a small look at a career choice. The State Bond Com-
mission has been authorized

to issue up to \$78.5 million in
general obligation bonds for

construction, repair and
maintenance, purchase of

land and other purposes
for a massive capital im-

provements bill approved

during the special legislative
session.

The compromise bill was
recommended by a House-
Senate Conference Commit-
tee assigned to work out dif-
ferences after separate ver-
sions of the bill were passed
earlier by the two chambers.
It was one of the two main
bills at the three-day special
session called by the Gover-
nor.

Lawmakers also approved
a compromise bill calling for
creation of a five-member
fulltime State Parole Board to
replace the present five-
member parttime board in an
effort to help reduce a large
backlog of cases and better
protect the public. The bill
was sent to a conference
committee to settle differ-
ences between the House and
Senate.

One of the main points of
disagreement was a House
amendment to keep anyone
from being named to the
board who contributed more
than \$500 to the political
campaign of the appointing
governor. A similar provision
was included in a House-
passed bill which died in the
closing days of the regular
1989 session. The restriction
on making appointments will

not take effect until January
1992 under the bill finally ap-
proved.

The Parole Board measure
also includes a House
provision requiring the Board
to notify local law enforcers
and the victims of a crime prior
to the release of a parolee.

Backers said the capital
improvements bill is an effort
to meet the pressing needs of
institutions and agencies
for new or additional
facilities and renovation of
existing buildings.

The measure includes \$20
million for the Institutions of
Higher Learning; \$10 million
for community and junior
colleges; \$5.3 million for
mental health facilities, in-
cluding eight community
group homes for the mentally
retarded; and \$3.9 million for
Educational Television for
transmitters and antennae.

Another \$10 million in bonds
was authorized for a new
office building for the State
Highway Department if a
study indicates the project is
a good investment. These
bonds will not be issued if the
Highway Commission deter-
mines that money is available
from other sources for the
building.

A total of \$3 million was
earmarked for removal of
asbestos from public
buildings, and \$2 million will
be used for roof repairs and
waterproofing of various
facilities.

The Legislature authorized
\$3 million for purchase of
property located near the
State Capitol in downtown
Jackson. The bill did not
include the purchase of prop-
erty and buildings on Highway
18 south of Jackson, as
provided in an earlier bill. In-
stead, the measure
authorizes the same amount
of money, \$6,575,000 for con-
struction of new facilities on
state-owned land for the
Department of Rehabilitation

Services.

While there was general
agreement that additional
construction work and
repairs are needed, a number
of legislators voiced strong
reservations about the overall
cost of the bond issue and
the impact it could have on
the state's general fund in
coming years. Lawmakers
also differed on certain items
contained in the bill.

Proponents said the total
cost may run around \$148
million over the projected 20-
year life of the bonds, depend-
ing on the total number of
bonds sold and interest rates.
However, it was estimated the
cost would be partially offset
by an anticipated savings
of \$86 million in rent now paid
by various agencies now
housed in privately owned
buildings.

Separate bond bills were
passed by the House and
Senate during the regular
legislative session which en-
ded April 2, but the measure
failed to win final approval.

The bill approved in the
special session specifies that
no member of the
Legislature, elected official,
or appointed official will
derive any income from the
bond issue or disposition of
any property in violation of
the ethics provisions in the
State Constitution.

Boswell Retardation Center,
\$280,000 for group home,
\$511,000 for sewer system;
East Mississippi State
Hospital, \$280,000 for group
home, \$950,000 renovate care
unit; Ellisville State School,

Also, each employee will be wearing a badge designed to depict this year's theme - "Tishomingo Hospital...At the Heart of the Community".

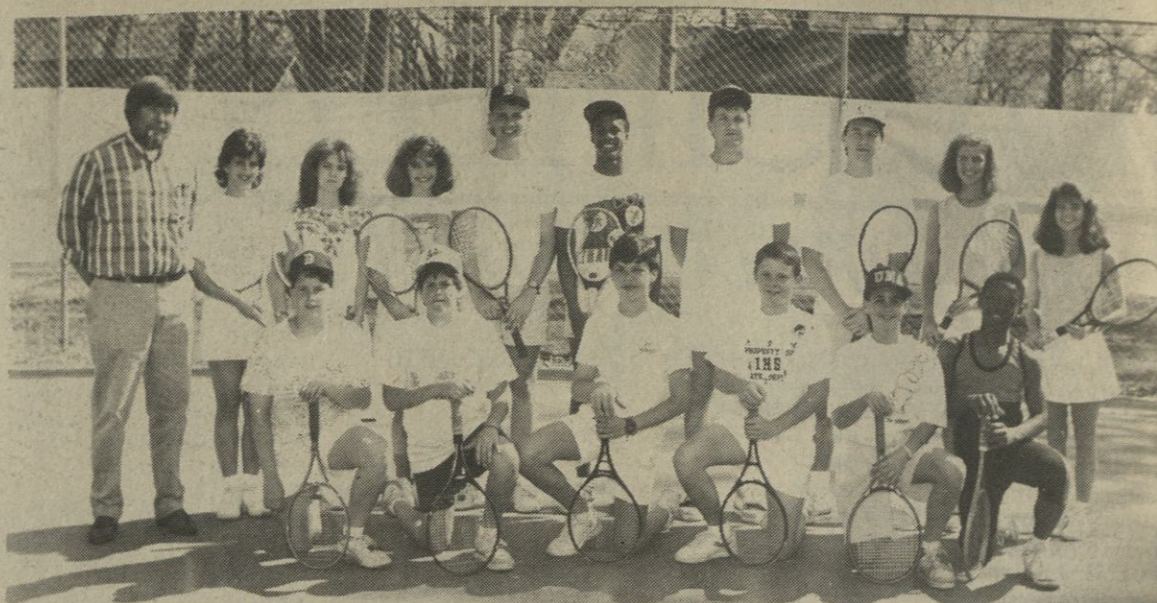

causes pain along the outside portion of the elbow and even down into the forearm and wrist.

Dr. Charles Johnson, a specialist in orthopedics and sports medicine at Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans, says that although tennis elbow is more commonly associated with racquet sports, you need not play tennis to get it. In addition to the pain experienced when playing tennis, other motions of the hand, such as a handshake, picking up a telephone or a heavy book can cause pain in this area.

For those "weekend" tennis players who do experience tennis elbow, it is usually caused by a faulty swing technique, particularly with the backhand, inadequate racquet or string tension, wrong grip size or, the material which the racquet is made of, that is, whether wood, metal or plastic.

Treatment of tennis elbow sometimes can be long and very frustrating for the tennis player. Since tennis elbow is an inflammatory condition, rest of the elbow is essential. In addition, ice compresses are applied and anti-inflammatory medications by mouth may be prescribed.

Occasionally, the injection of cortisone into the affected muscles and tender areas is helpful. Too many cortisone injections, however, can cause damage to the affected muscles and actually work against the tennis player trying to rehabilitate. After an appropriate trial of conservative treatment, surgery is

sometimes considered, adds Dr. Johnson.

Rehabilitation of tennis elbow includes restrengthening of the affected muscle group as well as stretching exercises for the elbow. The best medicine, however, is to avoid use of the elbow if possible. Skipping a few tennis matches now can help a person with tennis elbow return to pain free tennis in the future, and also avoid developing a chronic condition, concludes Dr. Johnson.

Foundation Renews Alzheimer's Financial Assistance Program

A national program providing monetary assistance to Alzheimer victims and their families for care and

medical expenses is being renewed for a second year by the American Health Assistance Foundation of

Rockville, Maryland.

The foundation's Alzheimer's Family Relief Program was established in 1988 to provide immediate assistance to families facing the catastrophic expense of around the clock care for an Alzheimer victim.

Jean Butts, coordinator of the program said, "Awards of up to \$1,000 are made to Alzheimer families based on their financial need and family stress. The grant can be used for short term nursing care, personal hygiene supplies, medical supplies or other Alzheimer's related expenses not covered by other sources such as Medicare, Medicaid and medical insurance," she said.

"Because Alzheimer patients do not recover from the illness and eventually require 24 hour care, expenses place a heavy burden on the financial resources of most average families affected," Butts reported.

She said the program is not an end to meeting the costs for caring for an Alzheimer victim and family get a handle on the expenses that can

overwhelm most average families.

Alzheimer's disease affects some 2.5 million individuals and costs the country an estimated \$80 billion. It is the fourth leading cause of death among adults.

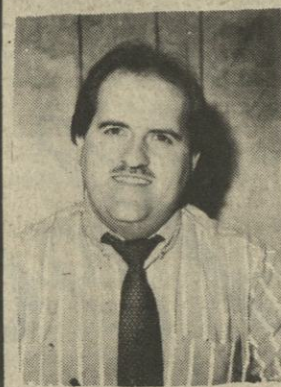

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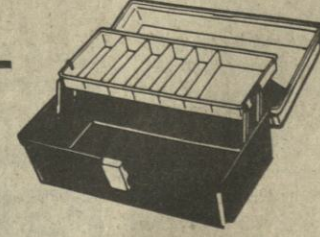

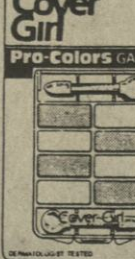
