### Iuka Man Killed In Car - Train Collision

An Iuka man was pronoun-  
ced dead at the scene when  
his vehicle collided with a  
Southern Railway train Satur-  
day night on U.S. 72 west of  
the Natchez Trace Parkway.

Stanley Durham, age 44, of  
Iuka, sustained fatal chest  
and internal injuries as the  
result of the impact, said  
Colbert County investigating  
Coroner, Jim Morrison.

The accident occurred at a

small crossing which leads to  
a couple of houses just north  
of the railroad tracks and U.S.  
72 around 9:50 p.m. From all  
indications the train was ap-  
parently west bound.

Details remain unclear  
concerning the car/train  
collision but, it was reported  
that the 1978 Cutlass was  
"probably pulled on the  
track,...possibly turned

toward the train."

The vehicle was spun back  
onto the asphalt and the vic-  
tim was thrown out, Morrison  
said.

in Colbert County, Alabama.

Martin officiating. Burial was  
in the Providence Cemetery.

Survivors include his  
mother, Easter Durham of  
Iuka.

### Nichols and Johnson Seated As Mayors

A heavy turnout of voters  
was reported in Iuka's second  
Democratic primary with  
more than 50 percent of the  
city's registered voters  
casting ballots.

There were 1,073 votes cast  
out of 2,073 registered Iuka  
voters in the mayor's runoff  
race.

David L. Nichols, who led  
the one-man ticket in the first

primary, grasped the runoff  
victory Tuesday over incum-  
bent Mayor John Biggs.

Unofficial but complete  
returns showed Nichols with  
736 votes over Biggs 337  
votes.

Biggs has served as mayor  
of Iuka for 17 years and earlier  
served as alderman.

"People have been mighty  
nice to me," he said, "And  
that's what you've got to  
remember."

Nichols, 35, is active in  
several civic organizations.  
He is a Certified Public Ac-  
countant and has practiced  
accounting in Iuka since  
1979. He presently serves as  
city accountant.

Nichols stated "It is my  
pledge to you to pursue every  
avenue possible to insure  
that the citizens of Iuka share  
in the prosperity of the years  
ahead."

Iuka voters nominated two  
incumbent and three new  
members as Board of Alder-  
man during the first primary.  
Those nominated include  
Leroy Dean, Cecil Phifer,  
Jackie Bryant, Buddy James  
and Scotty Skinner.

These five Democratic  
nominees will be challenged  
by Republican candidate, Milt  
Burton in the June 6th  
General Election.

Only five positions will be  
filled.

### BURNSVILLE

Unofficial but complete  
returns from Tuesday's runoff  
election in Burnsville showed  
incumbent Mayor Bobby  
Johnson winning his bid for  
re-election.

Johnson showed 310 votes  
to win over former mayor A.T.  
Marlar, who garnered 206  
votes in the second primary.

Johnson must face in-  
dependent candidate Allen  
Lambert in the June 6 general  
election.

City officials said there  
would be a recount of votes  
between aldermen can-  
didates Toney Thorn and  
Darryl Gaines. Thorn received  
246 votes, one vote ahead of  
Gaines, 245.

Incumbent aldermen Bon-  
nie Bobo and David Nixon  
were re-elected to their posts.  
Bobo received 264 votes.  
Nixon claimed 254 votes.

Other candidates in  
Tuesday's runoff aldermen  
race and their vote counts  
were incumbent Junior  
Carroll, 162, and Eugene  
Lovelace, 211.

Winning seats on the  
town's five member board  
during the first primary were  
Tommy W. Epperson and  
former mayor Michael D.  
Lambert.

### Blood Drive In Iuka May 26th

United Blood Services will  
be in Iuka, May 26, 1989 to ac-  
cept voluntary blood  
donations. The blood  
drive, from 2:00 to 6:00 at the  
National Guard Armory is  
sponsored by Tishomingo  
Hospital. Those who want to  
donate may schedule an ap-  
pointment by calling LeAnn  
Harber at 423-4147.

"There is absolutely no risk  
of getting AIDS or any infec-  
tious disease by donating  
blood," said Ginger Davis,  
Donor Resources Director of  
United Blood Services. Only  
Sterile and disposable  
equipment is used during the  
donation process. Every-  
thing, from the swabs to the  
blood bags to the needles, is  
used just once and then  
thrown away.

United Blood Services is the  
non-profit community  
blood provider, serving  
patients in 22 hospitals  
throughout North Mississippi

Since blood cannot be  
manufactured or synthesized  
and can be stored only 42  
days, a safe and adequate  
supply of blood must be  
available to meet the needs of  
local hospital patients.  
Currently, more than 1800  
units of blood must be col-  
lected each month to meet  
demands.

Blood used by patients in  
the United Blood Services  
System is freely provided by  
volunteer blood donors, so  
there is no charge for blood  
itself. United Blood Services  
charges a processing fee to

recover the operational costs  
of the blood center, including  
collecting, testing,  
processing, storing and  
delivering blood and blood  
components. Health insur-  
ance usually covers this fee.

Healthy people over 17 may  
donate blood. Each donor  
receives a thorough pre-  
donation interview, including  
a careful review of medical  
history and a check of tem-  
perature, pulse, blood  
pressure and blood iron level.  
After the blood is collected, it  
is typed and tested for  
diseases which could be  
transmitted to the recipient.  
Should any of these tests in-  
dicate the need for medical  
attention, the donor is  
notified.

The actual donation takes  
about 10 minutes. The donor  
relaxes in a comfortable chair  
while one unit (about a pint)  
of blood is collected in a  
special container. Afterward,  
donors enjoy a light refresh-  
ment before returning to their  
normal routine.

### TOLERANCE TO BRIGHT LIGHT

If you wear glasses or contact lenses and have a low tolerance to bright light, you may want to consider getting properly prescribed sunglasses for your vision comfort. Your eyebrows, eyelids, and the iris, or colored part of the eye, offer some protection from sunlight and glare, but if bright or glaring light bothers your eyes, you may need the added protection of sunglasses.

Sunglasses may be recommended if your occupation requires you to work outside in the sun or if you are often driving into the sun. Sunlight provides the light we need to see objects clearly, but it also

emits two invisible forms of radiation, ultraviolet and infrared rays. A low tolerance to bright light or over-exposure to the rays of the sun may cause minor eye irritation. Prolonged exposure may cause more serious problems.

You want to be able to see clearly and comfortably no matter what the light conditions. You also want to protect your eyes. Ask your eye doctor about the quality sunglasses he has available.

### Crowning Success

Q. When should one consider getting a tooth crowned?

A. Crowns, or caps, are recommended by the dentist when teeth need strengthening or protection, and they often are the answer for transforming the appearance of a tooth.

Crowns can be made of natural-looking white porcelain, or gold or silver-colored metal. First the tooth is prepared so that the crown fits precisely over the tooth and covers it entirely. Then the crown is firmly cemented to the tooth.

Beyond giving the tooth an improved new look, a crown can be the means of preserving a tooth that is badly broken and others that may be weak or brittle. In the latter category are teeth with very large fillings and those that have received root canal treatment.

Ivy is the son of Cheryl G. Keeton of Rural Route 3, Cherokee, AL.

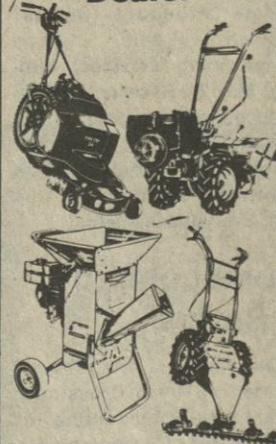

**DRESSING YOUR WINDOWS**  
Have you stood in a room in your home and thought how you would like to have the chance to change it some how without a great deal of expense?

Many times young people consider their bedroom as their own safe hide-a-way or their home within a home. However, most of the time they don't have much control over the choice of color on the walls or the type of furniture in the room.

A change in window treatment may be just the thing to give a room that personal

touch. This change can be done with or without a great deal of expense depending on the creative ability of the young person.

The four sources for window treatment are (1) custom-made, (2) made-to-measure, (3) ready-made, and (4) do-it-yourself. When choosing a window treatment style as well as source, you should consider services and quality along with the cost.

A custom-made window treatment is especially made for a certain window. A specialist takes measurements, constructs the treatment and then installs it, making adjustments if any are necessary. This is the most expensive treatment but should also be the highest quality of the four.

A made-to-measure window treatment is also especially made for a specific window, but the consumer provides the measurement at the installation. This method is a little less expensive than the custom-made treatments and the quality of the whole should be as high.

Ready-made window treatments have a limited choice in size, fabrics and styles. Even though most windows are a standard size occasionally a window's measurement may be off the standard size, making ready made treatments difficult to fit. Price depends on quality of fabric and construction.

Do-it-yourself treatments are usually the least expensive available. Fiber content labels on window treatment fabrics are required and should be studied to make the best choice for your window. Firm, closely woven fabrics are more durable and admit less heat and cold than loosely woven ones. Linings are optional, but worth considering in a new window treatment as they help

the treatment to hang smoothly, add a little insulation to the window treatment, protect the treatment fabric from sun damage, and they make the treatment more opaque.

Another thing to consider in a window treatment is how they appear from the exterior of the home. Lining can help

to give the windows an uniform appearance.

Through their choice of window treatment, youth can add a personal touch to their bedroom and their home. If you would like more information on the 4-H Home Environment Program, call the County Extension 4-H Agent at 423-3616.

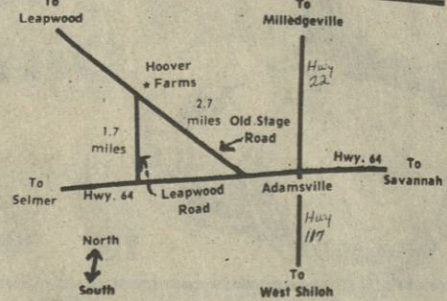

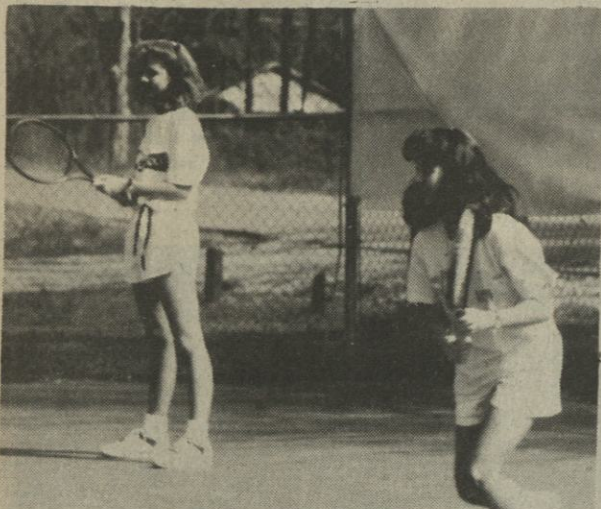




## Congratulations Iuka High School Tennis Team For A Great Year

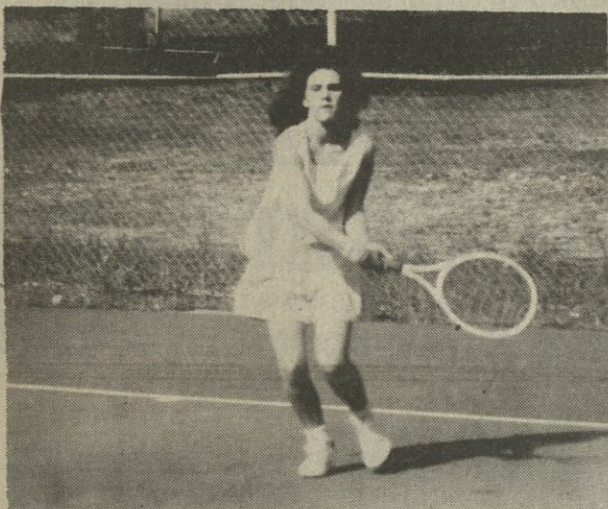

## ASCS Farm News

Farmers participating in the 1989 acreage reduction programs may be eligible to receive an additional 10 percent of their projected deficiency payments for wheat, feed grains, rice and upland cotton. The extra federal assistance is authorized by USDA to help last year's drought-stricken farmers.

This brings the total advance payments up to 50 percent for wheat and feed grains, and up to 40 percent for rice and upland cotton.

Under the 1989 farm programs, wheat and feed grain producers were allowed to request 40 percent of their projected deficiency payments at sign-up, and upland cotton and rice producers were allowed to request 30 percent. The programs closed April 14. The additional advance deficiency payments will be issued in commodity certificates in May.

Deficiency payments make up the difference between the established target price and the higher of the market price or the loan rate. Advance deficiency payments are made ahead of the normal payment date.

The advance deficiency payment rates for 1989 crops will equal \$.25 per bushel for wheat, \$.445 for corn, \$.45 for sorghum and \$.115 per bushel for barley. For upland cotton, the advance payment rate is \$.0856 per pound.

Only those producers who requested advance payment under the 1989 programs are eligible for the additional 10 percent in advance deficiency payments.

Pre-Measure Before Planting, ASCS Says

Before planting spring crops that may be covered by the 1989 acreage reduction programs, farmers may want to request pre-measurement of their acreages.

Pre-measurement is important in helping producers plan which land to devote to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and which fields to plant. The ACR is cropland removed from production and put into conserving uses under the 1989 farm programs.

Before crop planting time, ASCS will stake and measure any type of acreage, or portions thereof, that a farmer requests. To be assured that acreage reduction requirements are met, farmers must plant within the stakes that are placed when the land is pre-measured.

Farmers should never take a chance on losing program benefits by failing to comply with acreage requirements. To be eligible for price support loans and deficiency payments, farmers are required to report actual planted acreages.

Pre-measurement is available for farmers and includes measuring, referencing and marking out fields with stakes prior to planting. After planting, farm program participants are required to report their crop acreages to ASCS.

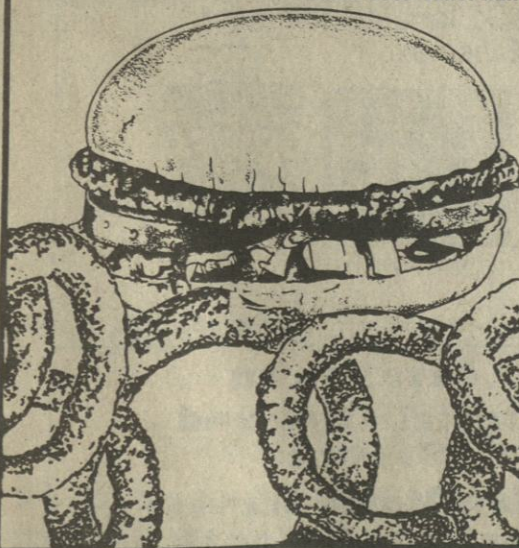

### Poultry And Egg Week

The 1989 celebration of Poultry and Egg Week is May 14 - 20. It's a time that we salute the poultry and egg industry for the economic contribution it makes to our state.

Chickens are in high demand by consumers for a number of reasons: They represent one of the lowest cost items in the meat counters. They fit well into modified diets due to their high protein, low calorie, low fat and low cholesterol content.

Because of its mild flavor, chicken is very versatile and can be prepared in numerous ways using many seasonings and flavor combinations.

According to the Mississippi Poultry Association, there have been major changes in consumer demand for various forms of chicken at the retail level. From 1965 to 1985, the percentage of whole chickens sold fell from 80 percent to 28 percent. However, the percentage of cut-up parts decreased from 20 percent in 1965 to 52 percent in 1985. Further processed chicken increased from 3 percent to

20 percent. By the year 1995, it's predicted that the whole chicken sales will be reduced to 18 percent, cut-up will share 43 percent of the market and further processed (sold primarily to food chains) will have a 40 percent share of the market.

Eggs are also a versatile high protein food. Eggs add flavor and nutrition to a number of foods and perform many functions: a binding agent to meat loaves, an adhering agent with battered food, a leavening agent with omelets, and a blend for ice creams and some spreads.

There are many other uses and functions provided by eggs.



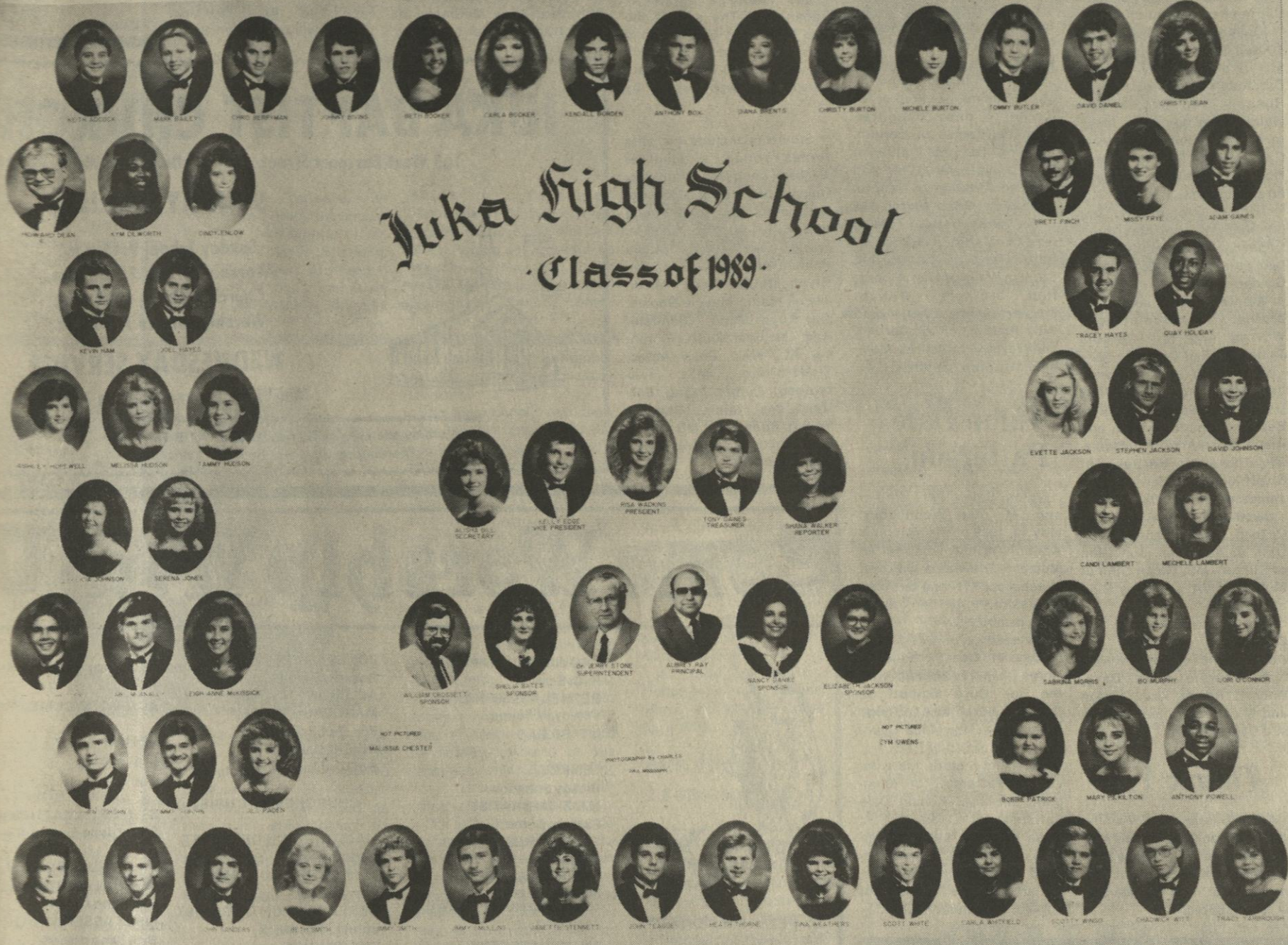

1. The mailbox should be placed so that the carrier can serve it without leaving the vehicle.

2. The mailbox should be placed on its support so that the door opens all the way and the carrier should be able to open and close the door easily.

3. Supporting posts should be strong enough to support the mailbox, but not so massive that if it were hit by a vehicle they could cause serious injury to driver or damage to the vehicle.

4. The path the carrier drives in approaching and leaving the mailbox should be kept filled and graded.

5. Tall grass and brush should be kept away from the path the carrier drives up to and away from the box.

To improve the appearance of your mailbox and to prevent rust, your mailbox should be kept painted and your box number should be
