Milt Burton Announces Candidacy For Alderman

I, Milt Burton, announce my candidacy for alderman of the City of Iuka. I was born in South Carolina in 1940. After high school, I entered the U.S. Marine Corps and after serving my term was honorably discharged in 1960. Immediately after leaving the Marine Corps, I began working for General Dynamics Astronautics on the Atlas Missile and Underground Silo Program. Being involved with the interconnect hardware of that project, I traveled between San Diego, Nebraska, and Kansas. I attended San Diego State University and the University of California at San Diego at the same time I was working at General Dynamics. In 1965 I leased a Jack-In-The-Box Restaurant and in 1970 went into management with that same company and coordinated the management of 23 restaurants involving several hundred employees. After moving to Mississippi in 1973, I have lived in Iuka since 1975 operating a restaurant

and floor covering business. I am a charter member of the Lion's Club, a Rotarian, a Mason, a member of Iuka Methodist Church and served on the administrative board, a member of Iuka Chamber of Commerce, a member of Parents for Quality Education, a member of the Tishomingo Development Foundation and the Local Planning Council for the 5 counties in North Mississippi.

When elected, I will continue to work for the growth of Iuka and the people. I pledge to work for the businesses and a better school system. I will work for a better relationship among the city departments and a more useful distribution of funds provided for our city. I will fill a missing link in our city government and provide continuity between our State and National Levels.

Eleven-Year-Old Killed During Fishing Trip



A Monday evening fishing trip on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway ended in the accidental death of a Tishomingo County youth.

Eleven-year-old Casey Clay, son of Travis and Carol Clay of Route 1, Dennis, was pronounced dead at the

scene, said medical examiner investigator, Dale White.

According to the coroner, young Casey was on a fishing trip with friends on the west bank of the Tenn-Tom Waterway in the Holcut area at the time of his death. White stated that the youth got into a spillway, his feet slipped out from under him and he struck his head on the spillway. The accident happened at approximately 6:30 p.m.

A family spokesman identified Casey's fishing companions as Terry Smith, minister of the Tishomingo Church of Christ, and a visiting friend of Bro. Smith's, Chris Fowler of Tennessee.

Following the accident, Bro. Smith ran nearly two

miles to the nearest residence to alert authorities while his friend stayed with the victim, who didn't regain consciousness, it was reported.

Casey was a student at Tishomingo Elementary School and was in the fifth grade. His homeroom teacher was Barbara Parker. Mrs. Parker described him as "A popular little boy, a good student, above average." He also had classes under Angela Long and Gene Tension.

Extracurricular activities that he was involved in included 4-H Club and little league baseball. He played for the Cardinal team.

Casey attended Tishomingo Church of Christ and as of late was very ac-

tively involved in the youth group.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, May 24, at the Deaton Funeral Home Chapel in Belmont with Bro. Perry Taylor and Bro. Steven Hodgkin officiating. Burial was in the Lindsey Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, Travis and Carol Clay of Rt. 1, Dennis; one sister, Cindy Guice of Tupelo; one brother, Chris Clay of Oxford, MS; his grandparents, Edward and Juanita Massey of Memphis, TN; Mrs. Winnie Carr of Dennis; his great-grandmother, Mrs. Viola Barrett of Paden.

Serving as pallbearers were Larry Webb, Tim Wright, Kenny Hodgkin, Todd Hodgkin, Don Lee, and Jerrell Bates.

The last time Iuka went to State was in '73 and '74 when they won back to back State Class BB trophies.

Volunteers Needed To Stop Local Child Abuse

Child Abuse and neglect is a growing problem in Tishomingo County. More than any other social problem, child abuse leaves lasting scars in the lives of individual children and in our community. The effects of child abuse diminish the quality of life for us all. Studies have shown that almost all of those currently in prison were victims of child abuse.

Last year in Tishomingo County, 22 children were removed from their parents due to child abuse or neglect. Thirty-seven Tishomingo County children are currently placed outside their own homes, in foster homes, group homes or institutions. The Tishomingo County Welfare Department handled 92 reports of child abuse and neglect. These numbers have continued to grow each year.

Positive action is needed from the community in order to help these children and families. Individuals, groups, clubs, organizations, or classrooms can become a supportive part of this effort by enlisting in a volunteer

program being initiated by the social work staff of the Tishomingo and Prentiss counties welfare departments.

Volunteers are needed to do a variety of tasks in Tishomingo County. Many people do not know how to accomplish simple things to survive everyday living. A knowledge of personal hygiene care, housekeeping skills, and everyday medical care, and the desire to share that with others, would enable the volunteer to work with a family. As the program grows there will be numerous other avenues in which volunteers can be utilized.

All homes are screened and are safe for the volunteers to go into.

Areas help is needed include: personal hygiene, housekeeping skills, budgeting, child care, parenting skills, basic medical care, cooking, grocery shopping, counseling, health care, discipline alternatives for children, limited medical transportation, and foster children visits.

Who can volunteer?

Anyone willing to give of themselves, their time and their efforts.

How much time is involved? As much time as the volunteer would like to give.

What are the qualifications? Anyone with a willing desire to help folks.

How does a person volunteer? Call: Tishomingo County Welfare Dept., 423-9241; Prentiss County Welfare Dept., 728-3118; Rita Little, 287-2225; or Barbara Murphy, 728-8205.

Many individuals and groups may not feel they have the extra time to devote to this project, but still would like to be supportive of the program. Donations would be very helpful in preparing a sample package of housekeeping supplies and personal hygiene items for the families being worked with.

County Agents Column

PSEUDORABIES MONITORING

Pseudorabies herd monitoring is becoming mandatory in an effort to allow pigs sold through Mississippi Feeder Pig Sales to be moved to states that prohibit non-monitored pigs from entering. Hopefully, this will add new out-of-state buyers and increase the demand for feeder pigs.

Producers selling pigs in any of the Mississippi Feeder Pig Sales must have had their breeding herd tested for pseudorabies and have a negative test to present at each sale where pigs are sold. These regulations are in effect for all sales after May 25. The test will be good for 12 months.

Producers should contact their local veterinarian and have him test the proper number of sows and boars (1-10 head breeding animals, test all; 11-35 head, test 10; 36 head or more, test 30%). Veterinarians will submit samples and proper papers to Ms. Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory and return copy of results to producer. Testing will be at the producers expense.

A copy of the Diagnostic Lab Report must accompany the pigs to the sale, or they cannot be sold.

Gardening is at full speed in Tishomingo County. Home gardeners are busily planting, weeding and controlling insects.

Lima beans, southern peas, eggplant and okra are being planted now that garden soil is warm. Before planting sweet potato slips, cut about 1 inch from the root end to remove possible disease contamination carried from the plant bed. Potato slips establish quickly in warm,

moist garden soil.

Control seedling weeds around tomato, eggplant and pepper plants with an organic mulch. Remove weeds that are present before applying the mulch.

FIELD OF BUTTERCUPS

Many of the pastures in Tishomingo County literally have turned yellow because of flowering buttercups. A rapidly growing weed, buttercup competes with forage grasses for nutrients. It can prevent early emergence of bermudagrass and bahiagrass.

Buttercup is easy to control if herbicide is applied in early March before flowering begins. Once flowering starts, buttercups are hard to control. If you haven't begun control measures, you're too late. Make buttercup control your New Year's resolution for next March. Plan to apply Weedmaster next March to control these weeds.

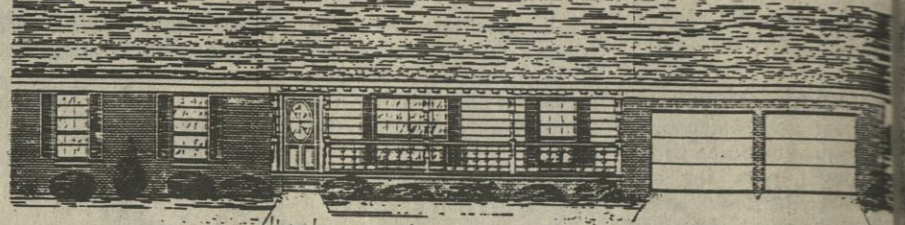

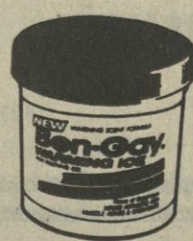

Chatting With Your Home Economist

ANNUITIES

Annuities are often an appealing source of income of people in or approaching their retirement years.

An annuity is a contract written by an insurance company to provide you with a regular income through periodic payments. Generally, you receive the income monthly with payments arranged to continue for as long as you live.

An annuity contract is classified as either an immediate annuity or a deferred annuity, depending on when the payment of the annuity's

benefits is scheduled to begin.

Immediate annuities are generally purchased by people of retirement age and provide income payments at once. They are usually purchased with a lump sum payment.

Deferred annuities are plans under which you arrange to have income payments start at some future date. Interest builds up on the money you pay.

If you die before your annuity payments begin, the amount accumulated under the contract will be paid to the beneficiary you have designated.

The cost of an annuity depends on how much monthly income you want to receive. Annuities, like life insurance policies, are purchased with premium

payments. The amount of the benefit

that can be purchased for a specified premium amount depends upon the length of time guaranteed to receive the payment, the interest the company can earn on the premium money invested and the expenses the insurer will incur in administering the annuity.

UNDERSTANDING LABEL CODES

There are many food labels that list the amount of cholesterol in a serving of food. Cholesterol is measured in milligrams or "mg." The recommended amount of cholesterol per day is not to exceed 300 milligrams.

The following provides the maximum amounts in milligrams for various cholesterol label terms:

If the label says "low cholesterol" it means there must be no more than 20 milligrams of cholesterol per serving. "Reduced cholesterol" means there must have been a 75 percent reduction from the original product. "Cholesterol free" indicates there is less than 2 milligrams cholesterol per serving.

QUICK HAMBURGER SKILLET

3/4 lb. hamburger meat
2 onions, chopped or sliced
2 tbsp. bacon fat
1 c. cooked rice
1 1/2 c. canned tomatoes
1/2 tsp. prepared mustard
1/2 tsp. chili powder
1 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1 pkg. frozen cut green beans

Saute hamburger meat with onions in bacon fat. Add cooked rice, canned tomatoes, mustard, chili powder, salt and pepper. Stir in green beans. Cover and simmer until beans are just tender but still a bright green.

SQUASH BUGS

Check young squash, cucumber and melon plants for squash bugs. These grayish, hardbacked insects gather around stems at ground level.

These insects leave copper-colored egg masses on older plant leaves. Remove the eggs by hand, and destroy them. As plants begin to

bloom, apply insecticides late in the afternoon to avoid killing pollinating bees.

Regular applications of insecticides are necessary to control not only squash bugs, but also striped cucumber beetles and squash vine borers.

COTTON CARE

Most Tishomingo County cotton producers have completed their planting for 1989. The ones that haven't will probably wind things up by May 25.

Existing skips in cotton stands should be replanted as soon as possible to maintain crop uniformity. Uniformity is important to cultivation and direct spraying.

Control thrips and cutworms as cotton emerges to keep the young plants from being stressed. The key to weed control in young cotton is the first postdirected spray made. Avoid using over-the-top sprays with herbicides other than Fusilade or Poast.

DOUBLECROPPING

We have many acres of wheat and oats in Tishomingo County that will see soybeans planted behind them in late June. The most common practice in Mississippi is to burn the wheat stubble and plant into the "charcoal."

The riskiest practice is to disk the standing wheat and then follow with the soybean planter. Whatever the method used, remember to:

*Plant the soybeans as quickly as possible.
*Disturb the soil as little as possible.

PORCH PESTS

Slugs, pillbugs and sowbugs may be a problem around many porches and patios this spring because they feed on the surrounding plants.

Check flower beds for slime trails and leaf damage from these pests. Use baits containing metaldehyde or mefenthrin to control slugs. Control pillbugs and sowbugs with diazinon as recommended on the label.

LAWN CARE

New lawns-seeded, plugged, sprigged or sodded-require slow, deep soaking every week or so, depending on temperature, rainfall and drying conditions. Water lawn slowly and deeply, and then allow the surface to dry before soaking again.

Lawns should be watered in the mornings or early evening to allow leaves to dry before dark. Fertilize lawns to increase vigor and color. Slow-acting fertilizers promote steady, even growth.

CERTIFY FALL-SEEDED CROPS NOW

Tishomingo County farmers had until May 1, 1989 to report their wheat, oats, barley, rye and other fall-seeded small grains to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Fall-seeded crops that are not certified by this deadline will be ineligible for program benefits.

The sign-up period for 1989 wheat, feed grain, cotton and rice acreage reduction programs ended April 14. Farmers who enrolled in the programs must report the actual planted acres on a field-by-field basis to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other program benefits.

If your life covers the normal span and you give your eyes proper care, you can expect to see about 24 billion images of the world around you. Your eyes must have the care and protection they need, however, and that should include regular checkups by your eye doctor.

You should pay close attention to any disturbing changes in your ability to see clearly, no matter how slight they may seem at first. If you don't wear glasses or contact lenses now, you will probably need some kind of vision correction eventually. If you've been wearing glasses or contacts, have them

checked to see if you're getting the correction you need to see sharply and clearly.

There are many other aspects to vision problems in addition to the ability to see objects clearly, whether they are near or far away. Your eye doctor will also want to assess your eye coordination, eye muscle control, your color and depth perception and the range of your field of vision. If you haven't had your eyes checked recently, it might be a good idea.

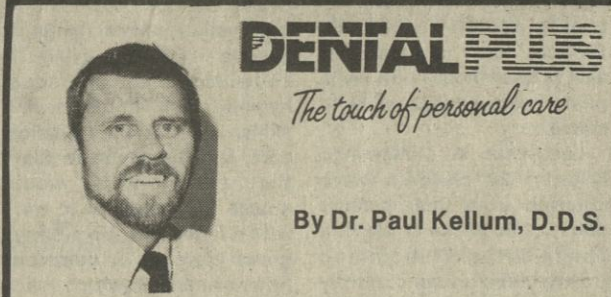

THE VALUE OF FLOSSING

Q. If one brushes regularly and thoroughly twice a day, what more can flossing do that the brush can't?

A. The brush can't reach between the teeth. It is necessary to use floss to remove the plaque and debris that accumulate between the teeth.

Tooth decay and gum disease often begin in the between-teeth areas near the gum line. Plaque -- the sticky film -- continually builds up on our teeth. If it isn't controlled by brushing and flossing, it leads to inflamed gums (gingivitis) and then to periodontal disease.

Flossing regularly is one of the most important steps you can take to prevent serious dental problems. Some people find it awkward at first to get the hang of flossing on their own, but it's easy and satisfying once you learn the simple routine. Ask for a demonstration of the effective technique at your next dental checkup.

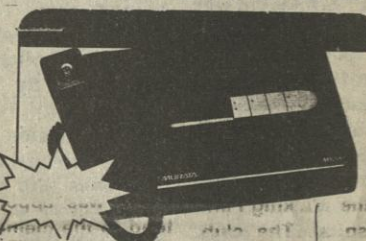

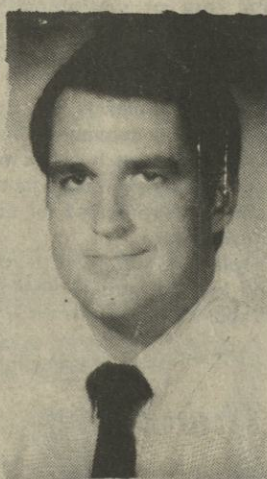

'Go Mississippi' Song
Still \$2388 in Debt

It was revealed today that a \$2388 bank loan negotiated by Gov. Ross Barnett and a couple of friends was renewed after the legislature's refusal to pay it.

Other efforts will be made to pay off the note with state funds.

Expecting the Legislature to appropriate the money later, Barnett, State Rep. James Neal of Jackson and Baxter Wilson, president of Mississippi Power and Light Co., borrowed the money to distribute the state's new official song, "Go Mississippi."

An appropriation to meet the payment was overwhelmingly approved in the House but narrowly defeated in the Senate on the last day of a recent legislative session.

Neal said he felt sure the Senate would have passed the measure had not so many of its members already departed for home when the vote was taken.

He said lawmakers may be asked to approve the appropriation soon in a poll by mail. If not, he said, the bill might be paid by the Agricultural and Industrial Board.

NEMCC Offers Youth Enrichment Program

The environmental science program will meet from 9 a.m. til 4 p.m. June 10-14 for ages 10-14 only. Enrollment is limited to 15 students and a \$65 fee will be charged.

A registration deadline of two weeks prior to the beginning of each program has been set.

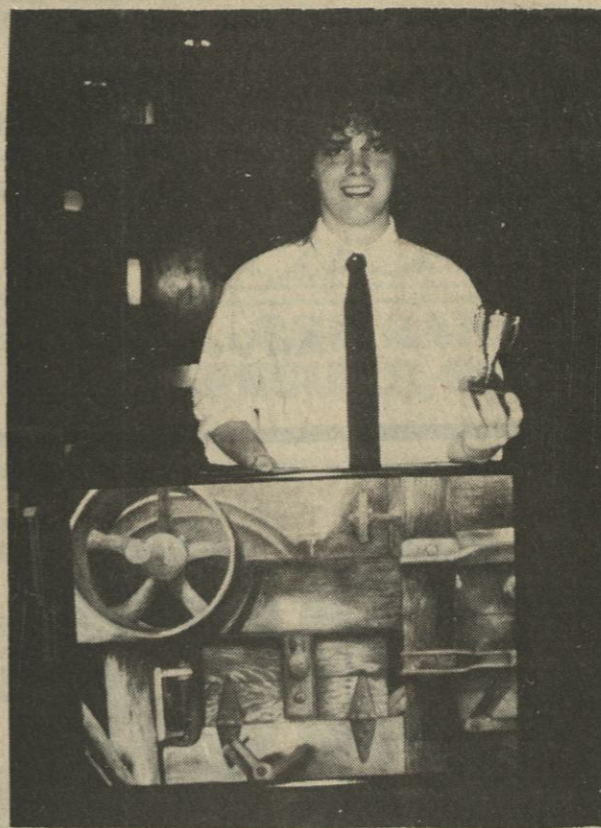

Judicial General Election June 20

Mississippi voters will decide the fate of three constitutional amendments in the judicial general election June 20.

The Secretary of State's Office is constitutionally required to notify the public of the pending amendments at least 30 days before the election.

The first amendment on the ballot would repeal the constitutional prohibition against the Legislature granting any foreign corporation or association a license to build, operate or lease any railroad in the state.

A second amendment would delete constitutional references to a poll tax, a four-month school term and a county common school fund.

The last amendment would allow the Legislature to submit constitutional amendments that are unlimited in the number of sections they amend, repeal or add. The Legislature would decide whether such amendments are divided into portions and voted on separately or voted on together as a whole.

The Secretary of State's Office will make available copies of the text of each of the three amendments for posting in voting precincts on election day. Additionally, the full texts will be published in newspapers across Mississippi two weeks before the election.

Parallel Lives Of Two Brothers

The following article was written by the late Rev. David Harris of Tupelo and dedicated to Mrs. Daisy Biggs of Tupelo before his recent death, May 24, 1989. Rev. Harris was the brother of Rev. Paul Harris of Iuka, who preceded his death October 9, 1988.

Paul & David Harris

There are many interesting parallels in the lives of the Rev. Paul Harris of Iuka and his brother, the Rev. David Harris of Tupelo. They were born and grew up in the farming village of Iuka in Simpson County. They helped their father and two other brothers, John and John, work the farm in early life. Their mother and younger sister, Mildred, completed the family unit.

There was always plenty of work to be done in the fields of cotton, corn and soybeans. All the family members also in taking care of farm animals and flocks. The work was done there often time left for hunting, hiking and the boy's favorite game, baseball. Paul was the team leader while Edison was the pitcher and David played the field.

Somehow, the three oldest brothers, Edison, Paul and David, got together in the eighth grade and went all the way through high school together. They graduated from Harrisville High School in 1939.

When in these early years, Paul had a great love of public speaking. While in high school he was on the debate team. He was often asked to produce speakers at the community political rallies. Paul spoke of desiring to become a lawyer, but those who knew him well were aware of the fact that he was winning a long struggle with the call to the Christian ministry. David had great

admiration for Paul and felt that he also would be used by the Lord in some type of church service.

Soon after graduating from high school, first David and then Paul enrolled in Jones County Jr. College in Ellisville. Both worked in a hosiery mill in the mornings to pay their way and went to school in the afternoons. They roomed together in the dormitory.

The brothers lost no time affiliating with the Ellisville Methodist Church and becoming active in the Youth Fellowship. Religious activity had been very much a part of their lives from early childhood. Through the church, they soon became good friends of the Carter family. There were several Carter brothers and a sister, Myrtis. The friendship between Paul and Myrtis blossomed into courtship in the years that followed.

After Junior College, Paul and David both went to Meridian to work. While there Paul joined the Air Force and left David in Meridian. Shortly thereafter, the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, so David also joined the Air Force. While they never served together in the service, both became members of heavy duty bomber combat crews. Paul flew as a navigator in the South Pacific and David served as a radio operator in Europe.

Paul came back from combat first and soon claimed Myrtis Carter as his bride. During his final weeks in the Air Force, David answered the call to the Christian ministry and came home to attend Millsaps College. Paul had decided to employ his talents as a traveling salesman and he and Myrtis built a new home in Jackson. It looked as if the two brothers were going their separate ways at last. However, Paul became more

and more aware of the call of God upon his life. He answered that call in 1948 and began to serve as pastor of the Camden-Thomastown Charge in the Mississippi Conference of the United Methodist Church. Meantime, David had married Irma McBroom of Batesville and while attending the School of Theology at Emory University joined the North Mississippi Conference of the Methodist Church.

Although the brothers served in separate conferences for forty years, they were in the same state and same Episcopal Area of the United Methodist Church and served on many joint committees of the two Conferences. Some of these were: the Mississippi Church Council of Alcohol Education of which Paul was Executive Director; the Joint Councils on Finance and Administration with David as chairman of this part of the time; and the Joint Committee on the Episcopacy of the two Conferences. Several times they held revivals and training schools in each other's churches. David took retirement in 1985 and he and Irma moved to their adopted hometown of Tupelo to serve Lee Acres United Methodist Church as a retired supply. Paul retired from St. Luke United Methodist Church in Jackson in 1986 and he and Myrtis moved to their lovely new home in Iuka where their son, Glen Ray, serves as Superintendent of J.P. Coleman State Park. The brothers were near each other again in beautiful Northeast Mississippi.

The two Mississippi Conferences of the United Methodist Church in Mississippi voted to merge into one Conference in June, 1988, so at last Paul and David were together in the same Conference.

In July, 1988, Paul and David had the pleasure of riding to Jackson together, picking up their sister, Geraldine, and riding to the old home place at Harrisville. They spent about three hours walking, looking and reminiscing. This was a most meaningful and historic moment for these three.

Early on Tuesday morning, October 18, David and Irma called Paul and Myrtis and made plans to have a picnic outing in the afternoon at J.P. Coleman State Park. This outing did not come to pass. Paul suffered a fatal heart attack while working in the front yard of their home on Gann Street around 11:00 a.m. that day. The shared earthly experiences of the remarkable parallel lives of the two Harris brothers, Paul and David, were over.

Byrom Retires After 20 Years At NEMCC

Harmon Byrom of Iuka retired after the close of Northeast Mississippi Community College's forty-first year after 20 years of criminal justice at the institution. Byrom received his Bachelor of Laws from Cumberland University in Lebanon, TN, in 1939. In 1969 he received a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree from the University of Birmingham. Byrom never practiced law. "I didn't like law," he said. "I don't want other people's problems and that's basically being a lawyer is all

about." "However, I do think law is the best educational background a person can have."

After graduating from law school in '39, Byrom was offered a job as principal of a small, country school. "If I'd taken that job," Byrom said, "I probably wouldn't ever have done anything else."

"Instead, I thought I had to stay in the city like any good college graduate."

Before accepting a teaching position at Northeast, Byrom worked in a variety of areas - banking, insurance investigating, and financial insurance and reporting. He served four

years in the U.S. Army ('41-'45), serving the European theatre, and received five battle stars and the Bronze Star Medal. For twenty-five years Byrom was self-employed in the retail and wholesale parts business.

"There's not any place as ideal to work as Northeast," Byrom said. "I was always allowed to do my work without interference and with total cooperation."

His many church and civic activities will likely keep him busy. A deacon at Iuka Baptist Church, he has taught Sunday School there for 30 years. Byrom has served as President, Zone chairman and Deputy District Governor of Mississippi District 30A-Lion's International, and is a charter member of the Iuka Lion's Club.

Byrom and his wife Edith have two sons, Edward of Iuka and Gregory of Scottdale, Alabama.

Corps Confirm Lock Closure

Bay Springs Lock will be closed on schedule as announced in early March. Bay Springs is one of five locks being closed by the Corps of Engineers for routine maintenance.

Bay Springs Lock: Close - 8 a.m., July 12, 1989 - Open - 8 a.m., July 17, 1989.

Officials said the closure at Coffeeville Lock on the Black Warrior-Tombigbee Waterway will be the longest. This closure will affect both the Tenn-Tom Waterway and the Black Warrior-Tombigbee system.

The Corps said earlier that river stage forecasts would be monitored on the Mississippi River through early May to insure that the BWT/Tenn-Tom systems would be available should the lower Mississippi suffer a low water situation similar to that experienced in 1988. Forecasts now indicate that adequate depths will be available through July.

A. Unfortunately, no. Because of extremely limited parking, visitors are not allowed on any holiday weekend, or at any time the campground reaches 2/3 capacity.

Q. Can "gray water" (dishwater, etc.) be emptied on the ground?

A. No, gray water - including dishwater - must be kept in holding tanks and disposed of in proper sanitary facilities.

Q. Can we put our boat trailers on the grass near our campsites?

No. Vehicles of any kind (except bicycles) must be parked in the designated parking area of that site. Vehicles that cannot fit all wheels on the campsite's pavement must be moved to overflow parking areas. For that reason, campers are encouraged to limit their number of vehicles as much as possible.

Special Note: Beginning Friday, May 26, the Bay Springs Resource Office and Visitor Center hours will be 7:30 AM - 6:00 PM, Monday through Friday and 10:00 AM - 6:00 PM, Saturday and Sunday.

Attention

The Department of Wildlife Conservation is now requiring a copy of a valid bill of sale on all boats being transferred or issued a new number.

"It used to be that all a person had to do was fill out an application for a boat certificate of number and return it to our office with the proper fee in order to register or transfer a boat," explained branch director Shirley Jordan.

"But this old procedure offered inadequate protection for the boat owners in preventing someone from transferring a boat from the proper owner into the name of someone else."

Requiring a copy of a valid bill of sale anytime someone transfers a boat or purchases numbers for a new or used boat, Mrs. Jordan said, virtually assures her and her staff that they are dealing with the rightful owner.

The bill of sale procedure will not apply to renewals.
