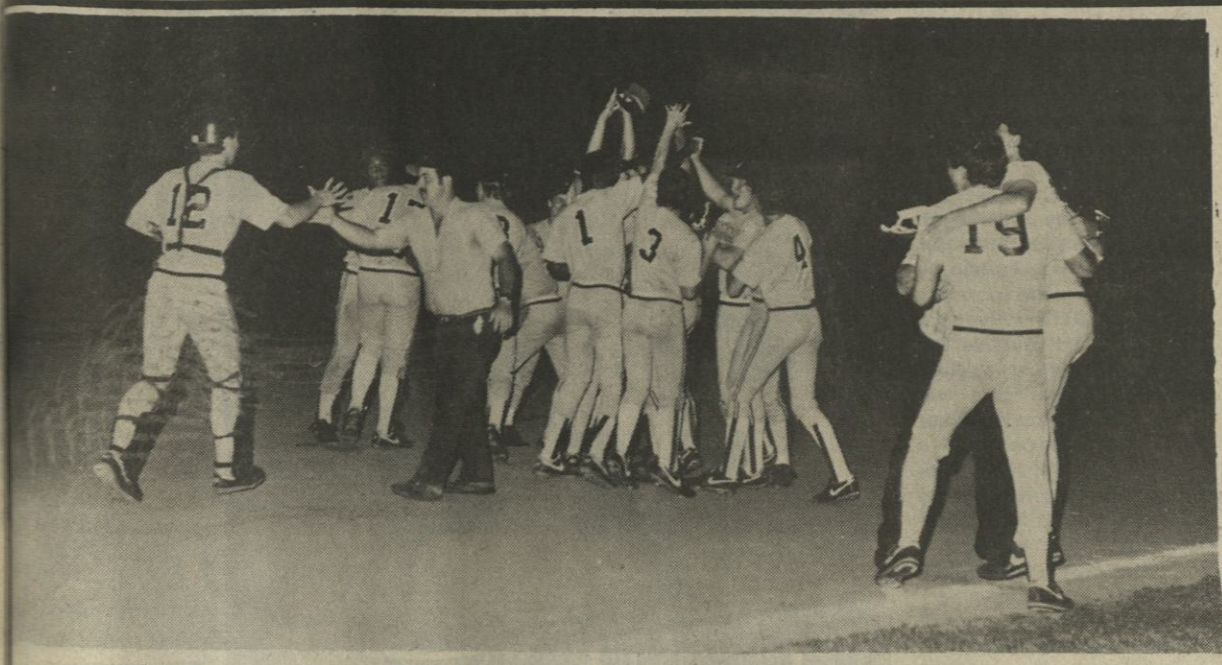

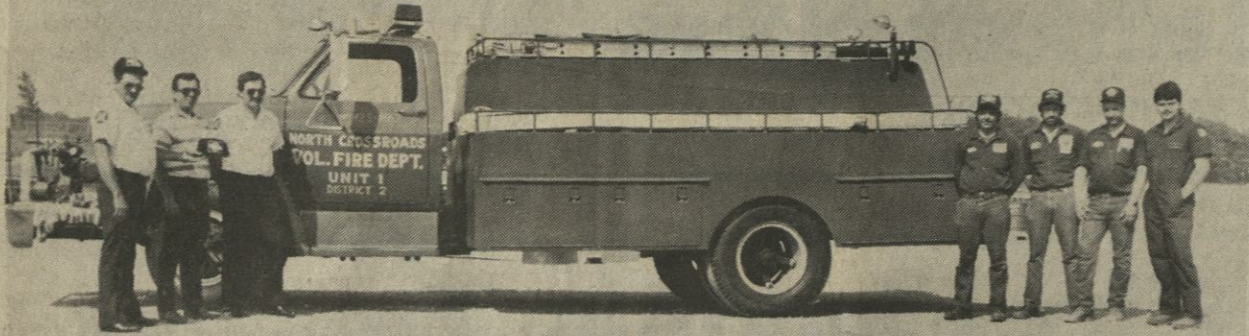
Crow's Neck Fishing Pier Opened

Volunteers Build New Tanker

In the true spirit of volunteerism, Monotech of Mississippi and North Crossroads Fire Department, recently joined together. The common link was provided by a group of Monotech Employees who are also Volunteer Fire Fighters. They are: Brian Harrison, Randy Dill, Roger Burns and Stanley Cox. Other employees who contributed time are: Ellis Floyd and Darrin Clark. The Fire Department identified a need to upgrade the undersized tank on its vehicle. Monotech provided the materials, facility and equipment for the tanker truck. The employees volunteered many hours of their time and labor; and the project succeeded. No cost was estimated for the

materials, but the lights, valves and fittings used for the tanker exceeded \$700.00. The end result of this joint effort is an increased capacity for the Fire Department to serve the needs of the community. The new tank has a capacity of 1525 gallons with several compartments. The old tank carried only 1200 gallons. Because of the design of this new tank, it can be filled from a 4" water hydrant in approximately 3 minutes. Said Doug Allgood of Monotech, "It was truly the dedicated effort by all these people that made it possible. Monotech was pleased to have the opportunity to be a part of this voluntary spirit. We wish the North Crossroads Fire Department much success with their future endeavors. The calibre of volunteer service is only as

Chatting With Your Home Economist

SPRUCING UP THE BATHROOM

If your existing bathroom is a boring little space with fixtures that cannot be moved or changed, there are several cosmetic changes you can put into effect without spending a fortune.

Here are some instant facelifts that will give a dull bathroom a new lease on life.

*Cramped space--Remember the power of mirrors. Panels will open the most confined space even if you only mirror the back of the door.

*Dull dark room--Paint everything white from top to bottom. If possible install white tile or sheet vinyl on the floor. A white, washable cotton rug would be an alternative solution to new flooring. Next bring in an array of healthy green plants. This will make even the dreariest of rooms look fresh

and airy.

*Ugly windows--Pretty them up by covering with a permanent blind or shutter, or drape with a soft fabric. Choose an appropriate window treatment, considering the need for privacy, light and ventilation.

*Humdrum walls--Cover them with a wall covering that might be too expensive to use in a larger space or cover with fabric. A less expensive alternative is to paint the walls a rich color providing a background for prints, drawings, photographs, collections, or whatever you like, to add interest and impact.

*No atmosphere--Create it. Add a small set of shelves to hold objects and collectibles. If the area is roomy enough, bring in small table and/or chair (wicker always looks good in the bathroom). The table may hold extra towels, soaps, magazines or a pretty plant.

*Lacks luxury--Pile a glass container high with soaps of the appropriate color, or keep bath salts and oils in beautiful, but inexpensive, glass containers. Even if you can afford only a few really

luxurious deep-pile towels and a few brightly colored glass accessories, you'll be amazed at the difference small touches make.

*Tired old towels--Jazz up old white towels you cannot afford to replace by adding a border of contrasting color. Create a border by adding washable trim or strips of colorful fabric.

Keep your color scheme in mind when adding these new touches of color. This will restore the chic to towels with frayed and dog-eared edges; the results of many washing.

*Unightly plumbing--Hide unsightly plumbing below basins by shirring fabric onto a rod, gathering tape, or hook and loop tape. Adjust the fabric to fit around the basin. Choose a fabric that is in keeping with your design and color scheme.

*Unattractive shower curtain--Frame the shower/tub area by adding an attractive curtain. Make the curtain by hanging fully gathered panels from an extendable (tension) rod placed just outside the shower rod. Hang a clear shower curtain from the shower rod to serve as a liner for the decorative panels.

The shower and extendable rods may be hidden by adding a top treatment. Coordinate all fabrics with the overall color and design scheme of the bathroom.

CARROT-APPLE SALAD

4 c. shredded carrots
1 medium apple, peeled and grated
1/2 c. raisins
1/4 c. orange juice
3 tbsp. honey
3 tbsp. mayonnaise

Combine carrots, apple and raisins; set aside.

Combine orange juice, honey and mayonnaise, mix well. Pour over carrot mixture, tossing gently to coat.

Refrigerate for several hours.

4-H RECORD KEEPING CAN BE A LEARNING EXPERIENCE

In the world of 4-H the year begins on July 1 and ends on June 30. This means we've only 30 days left in this year. It also means we only have 30 days left to complete our records and get them turned in.

Records are an important part of the complete 4-H experience. By filling our records, 4-H'ers learn to keep better track of their activities and experiences. There are over twenty-five project areas in which members can complete records. To have a blue ribbon record, members must be able to show growth in their project as well as their ability to assume leadership roles in their club, school and community.

During the month of June, 4-H members should be gathering pictures for their project records, as well as getting the rough draft of their stories written and corrected. June is a busy time on the 4-H calendar, so while 4-H'ers are planning all their summer activities, remember to schedule time to complete a 4-H record.

each child in planting his/her own plant. While marigolds have added beauty to the school, the children have enjoyed watching them grow and bloom.

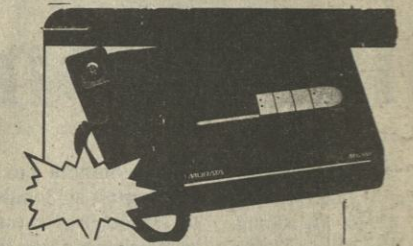

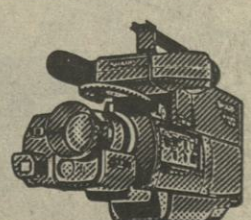

INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

FAVORING ONE EYE

If you have a youngster who seems to be favoring one eye, you should have his or her eyes examined as soon as possible to find out if this condition is caused by amblyopia, also known as "lazy eye." Among the signs of amblyopia are blurred near and distance vision and a tendency to bump into objects on one particular side.

This condition usually occurs in only one eye. The eye that is functioning properly takes over the seeing for both eyes. Left untreated, the "lazy" eye becomes progressively weaker and more difficult to correct. The treatment recommended by your

doctor will depend on how severe the condition is.

In some cases the eye doctor may recommend that a patch be used over the eye that is functioning normally so as to stimulate use by the lazy eye. In other cases corrective glasses may be recommended along with other forms of vision therapy so both eyes can learn to work together to give the child good vision.

Golden-Year Cavities

Q. Why are new cavities common among older people?

A. Many people 50 and older did not benefit from fluoridation of water in their younger years. As a result, most of these mature adults have a number of existing fillings. Two out of three cavities in older people develop around the edges of existing fillings, the American Dental Association reports.

Root caries is another type of decay that affects many older people. Receding gums that expose the root surface leave them especially susceptible to decay, because the root surface is softer than tooth enamel. The American Dental Association estimates that 70 percent of people over 60 have this type of decay pattern.

Regular brushing and flossing helps to control decay-causing plaque and keep gums in good condition. Scheduling dental checkups at regular intervals can turn up developing decay while there is still time to save teeth.

What is white, four stories high, has a steamboat in the backyard, and looks like it's over 150 years old? It's the Tom Beville Visitor Center on the Tenn-Tom Waterway, located near Pickensville, Alabama. School groups are encouraged to visit the center

and to make use of its many educational resources.

The following facilities are available to groups visiting the Visitor Center complex. A magnificent 1830's style antebellum home complete with tall white columns, marble flooring and antique furnishings. A meeting room with seating for 50 people complete with audio visual equipment, including a film library covering topics such as water and boating safety, wildlife conservation, historical and cultural subjects. Exhibits, displays, pictures and artifacts that illustrate the animal life in this region from prehistoric times to present day, how a lock operates, the geography along the waterway, and the waterway's connection to over 16,000 miles of navigable inland waters. We also have a new and extensive Indian and pioneer artifact display. This collection spans the time period 15,000 BC to 1830. Tools, pottery, weapons, jewelry, village and settlement maps are all on display.

A Snagboat MON-TGOMERY, a fully outfitted 1920's style steam powered sternwheeler. The MON-TGOMERY worked for nearly 60 years on the waterways of the South. This 180-foot boat has its own displays and informational exhibits.

Groups are encouraged to visit the Tom Beville Lock and Dam, immediately adjacent to the Visitor Center, where you can go into the control room and watch as the tugboats and barges loaded with coal, wood chips, sale, scrap iron or soybeans lock through bound for the markets of the world.

We also have available near the Visitor Center, facilities for the family looking for a place for an outing. Group picnic shelters, bank fishing, complete with paved parking lots, walkways to the water's edge, and a concrete fishing deck. Camping at Cochrane park where sites are furnished with tables, grills, rest rooms, lighted boat ramp, bank fishing and a 24-hour day entrance gate attendant is nearby.

All this is available 7 days a week, from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM Monday - Friday, 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM weekends, located 1 mile south of the junction of Alabama State Highways 14 and 86, near the Alabama-Mississippi border. It is less than an hour's drive from Meridian, Starkville, Columbus, Tuscaloosa and Demopolis. So what is white, four stories high, has steamboat in the back yard, and looks like it's over 150 years old? Come see for yourself and enjoy it.

sun and cool water. To really enjoy your visit is to have a safe visit. The safest places for you to swim are the designated swimming areas or beaches on the Waterway specifically designed for that purpose. Some of you might be thinking, "Well I can go somewhere else besides the beach and swim. It's less crowded and closer to home!" It may be closer or less crowded but you might be taking a big chance. You never know what the bottom of the lake is like; you may step on a broken bottle, sharp snag, or slip off that sudden drop-off. Areas around boat launching ramps where it may look safe to swim are very dangerous. Swimming is also prohibited there because of the incoming and outgoing boat traffic. Swimmers, can't take a chance on the bottom of the lake - go to the designated beach and have a safer and more enjoyable visit.

There are two beaches available for day use by the general public; Old Bridge Beach, located on Bay Springs Lake just off of Highway 4; and Blue Bluff Beach, located outside of Aberdeen on the Lock and Dam road. If you're camping, there is a beach located in the

Fulton Camping Area, just off the North Road on C Pool. Please take note that this beach is available to people camping in the Fulton Campground and is not available to the general public. Please observe the posted regulations at the beaches.

Ask Ochsner

Q. What is hay fever and what can be done for it? During the spring, I have such a severe problem with watering eyes and sneezing, it is almost unbearable.

A. Hay fever is a very common condition that can occur in about 10 percent of the

population, says Dr. Michael S. Blaiss, head of the allergy and immunology department at Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans. The words "hay fever" were coined in England by those who experienced it about the turn of the century. It refers to the reactions suffered by those persons "exposed to hay",

but no fever was experienced. It was later determined that the reactions were actually caused by mold spores growing in the hay.

The medical term for hay fever is allergic rhinitis. There are two types of hay fever: seasonal and perennial. Seasonal hay fever is caused by tree pollen in spring, grass pollen in summer, and weeds such as ragweed, during the fall. Hay fever experienced year round is caused by dust, mold and hair of animals usually house pets like cats and dogs.

The usual symptoms are watery and irritated eyes, sneezing and in the worst cases, asthma and skin hives. Dr. Blaiss says that the first line of defense against hay fever is avoidance of those which causes your symptoms. In spring and summer, keep windows closed and avoid cutting the grass, if possible. If symptoms are experienced year round, you may have an allergy to your pet or dust mites, which grow in the carpeting in your home.

Several over-the-counter medications are helpful to alleviate symptoms, including antihistamines and decongestants. People suffering from more severe symptoms should see a physician who may prescribe stronger medications not available for general purchase. An allergist might be consulted to determine the cause of the allergy and, if needed, the person may receive allergy shots for relief of the symptoms.

Mississippi Needs A Seat Belt Law"
The purpose of the contest is to tell everyone the importance of wearing a seat belt and that it can save lives. Statistics show that Mississippi has one of the highest traffic fatality rates in the nation and has one of the lowest seat belt use rates. According to recent reports, over 100 people were killed in Mississippi traffic accidents in 1988, nearly twenty five were injured, and over five hundred were seriously injured. Dispelling the myths and presenting the facts concerning seat belt safety could stop this high death and senseless destruction. For example: Myth - "It won't happen to me; I'm a driver and never travel home or drive fast."
"Everyone can expect to be in a crash once every

ten years. You may be an excellent driver, but this does not protect you from events beyond your control or from poor drivers."
Myth - "Seat belts are unnecessary; you can brace yourself with your hands."
Fact - "In a collision, the speed of force would be too great to brace with your hands. The force of impact at ten miles per hour puts a force twenty times greater on occupants in the front seat."
Myth - "With a seat belt, one could be trapped in a burning car."
Fact - "Less than three percent of all injury producing collisions involve fire or submersion. With seat belts, you are likely to be unhurt, alert, and can escape more quickly."
Myth - "It's better to be thrown out of the car in an accident."
Fact - "Being thrown free is twenty five times more dangerous. You could be thrown through the windshield, thrown out the door and through the air, or pulled along the ground and crushed by your own car. In almost

any collision you're better off being held inside the car by safety belts."
Myth - "Children need not wear safety belts because they are generally in the back seat and are in less danger."
Fact - "Serious or fatal injury for a child is just as great as that of adults. In fact, it's the law now in every state for children to be protected by a seat belt or safety seat when riding in a vehicle."

There are numerous other myths and facts concerning seat belt safety. The main issue to remember is that seat belts are for everyone. That's no myth.
Sometime ago, I had the opportunity to travel in Europe. Highways there are called autobahns with four lanes on each side. Speeds on the autobahns exceed well over one hundred miles per hour. Seat belt laws are mandatory there. Anyone failing to abide by these laws are subject to a steep fine.
I once saw a five vehicle pile up with all cars involved crumpled and crushed. Everyone walked away uninjured. All wearing seat belts. Even though at this time I had not been a seat belt wearer, I quickly learned that safety belts were a habit I could live with.
Later when I was old enough to take drivers education, the first thing we were taught was to buckle up. It makes good sense to buckle up. Seat belts save lives-maybe your own or someone close to you.

"Seat Belts: The Intelligent Choice for Intelligent People"

Intelligence is the safety belt of your future. The Funk and Wagnalls Standard Dictionary defines intelligence as "the faculty of perceiving and comprehending meaning; active intellect; understanding." When you hear someone speaking of an intelligent person, what do you imagine them to look like? Are they neatly groomed? Do they have the typical horn-rimmed glasses? Most younger people have the tendency to associate the word intelligence with "nerdy."

When I think about someone being intelligent, I imagine them to be safety belt users. First of all the intelligent person "understands" how the seat belts work. Let me remind you that the word "understanding" was one of the key words in the definition mentioned earlier. They are aware that safety belts were designed to allow you to move freely in your car. They were also designed with a latching device that locks the safety belt in place if your car should come to a sudden halt. This latching device keeps you from hitting the inside of the car or being ejected. It's there when you need it.

The fact is that every one of us can expect to be in a crash once every ten years. For one out of twenty of us, it will be a serious crash. For one out of every sixty children born today, it will be fatal. The intelligent person doesn't stick to the traditional myth, "I just don't believe it will ever happen to me."

Another myth that the safety belt user does not believe in is the excuse that most people give, "I don't want to be trapped in by a safety belt. It's better to be thrown free in an accident." You know that intelligence is being used when he realizes that being thrown free is twenty-five times more dangerous and fatal. Consider plunging through the windshield, being thrown out the door and hurtled through the air, scraping along the ground, and being crushed by your own car. In almost any collision, your better off being held inside the car by safety belts.

A myth that virtually everyone is guilty of is not asking someone to put on their safety belt in your car, simply because they are afraid of offending them. But according to the "Protect Your Dreams" S.N.A.P. Pamphlet, an "overwhelming majority of passengers would gladly put their safety belts on if only you, the driver, would ask them."

No matter how good a driver you may be, you can't control the other car. When another car comes at you, it may be the result of a mechanical failure; and there's no way to protect yourself against someone else's poor judgement and bad driving.

Everyone has his own mental images of what an intelligent person looks like; I imagine him to be seated in a car with a safety belt on since this is the "intelligent choice for intelligent people." Funk and Wagnalls Standard Dictionary gave a second definition to the word intelligence, "the ability to adapt to new situations." Are you willing to become an in-

telligent person and start wearing your safety belt?

SAFETY BELTS CAN SAVE LIVES

People often form opinions about many things and they never bother to find out the true facts. There are many opinions concerning safety belts, but the true fact remains that safety belts can prevent injuries and save lives.

You've probably said that you don't need safety belts or that you don't believe you'll have a wreck. The fact is that in a seventy-five year lifespan you will experience a traffic collision. With a safety belt you could reduce an injury or save a life. Last year 9,140 lives were saved, 327,000 injuries were reduced or prevented just by buckling up.

Most people only wear their safety belts in long trips or while traveling at high speeds. The facts are that 80% of deaths and injuries occur in cars traveling under forty miles per hour and 75% occur within twenty-five miles of home.

Maybe you belong to another group of people who are afraid of being trapped in the car. These people would rather be thrown from the vehicle. The fact is that it is twenty-five times more dangerous and lethal to be thrown from the vehicle. If you wear a safety belt it could help keep you from being thrown through the windshield, or hurtled through the air. Suppose you are thrown out of your car and onto the pavement face first or thrown out of your car and then ran over by the car! We are talking about being in a lot of pain or maybe even being killed.

You ask what if the car or truck catches on fire or becomes submerged in water? The fact is that less than one half of one percent of injury producing collisions involve fire or submersion. Just by chance that you fall into this group, a safety belt could save your life by keeping you from being stunned or knocked out so that you could escape faster.

Do you think that you are a good driver? It doesn't matter how good a driver you are you

can not control the other car or mechanical failures. Nothing can protect you from someone else's poor judgement or bad driving, but a safety belt can reduce a fatality to an injury from occurring altogether. Don't think that you can brace yourself by using your arms and legs it won't work! The force of an impact at ten miles per hour is equivalent to the force of catching a two hundred pound bag of cement from a first story window.

People think that because they can touch their head to the dashboard that a safety belt will not help them. The fact is that safety belts were designed to allow you to move freely in your car. They were also designed with a latching device that locks the safety belt in place in case of a sudden halt or a collision. There is more to a safety belt than what meets the eye.

Many people think their guest in the car would be of-

fended if they asked them to use their safety belts. Polls show that the overwhelming majority of passengers would willingly put on their safety belts if only the driver would ask them. The next time you get in a car buckle up! Or it could be the last ride you take!

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 273, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO PROVIDE THAT AMENDMENTS MAY BE UNLIMITED IN SCOPE; TO PERMIT ANY PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO BE DIVIDED INTO SEPARATE PORTIONS SO THAT THE PEOPLE MAY VOTE SEPARATELY ON SUCH PORTIONS, OR TO PROVIDE THAT THE PEOPLE SHALL VOTE FOR OR AGAINST AN ENTIRE PROPOSED AMENDMENT, AS SPECIFIED IN THE RESOLUTION OF THE LEGISLATURE PROPOSING THE AMENDMENT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, WHICH TWO-THIRDS CONSISTS OF NOT LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, That the following proposed amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on Tuesday, June 20, 1989:

Amend Section 273, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows:

Section 273. By a concurrent resolution adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of each house of the Legislature, which two-thirds (2/3) shall consist of not less than a majority of the members elected to each house, the Legislature may propose an amendment to this Constitution. Public notice shall then be given

by the Secretary of State at least thirty (30) days preceding an election, at which the qualified electors shall vote directly for or against such proposed amendment. If at the election more than one proposed amendment is submitted, the proposed amendments shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each proposed amendment separately.

Any proposed amendment may be unlimited in scope. A proposed amendment may amend and/or repeal one or more sections or articles. A proposed amendment may propose one or more new sections or articles.

The Legislature may provide that any proposed amendment may be divided into separate portions for the purpose of permitting the people to vote separately on such portions, or the Legislature may provide that the people shall vote for or against the entire proposed amendment. The manner and form of submission to the people shall be specified in the resolution of the Legislature proposing the amendment.

If it shall appear that a majority of the qualified electors voting directly for or against the proposed amendment or portions thereof, as the case may be, shall have voted for the proposed amendment or portions thereof, as the case may be, shall be inserted as a part of the Constitution by proclamation of the Secretary of State certifying that the proposed amendment or portions thereof, as the case may be, received the majority

vote required by the Constitution. The resolution may fix the date and direct the calling of elections for the purposes hereof.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, for the purpose of submitting this and other proposed amendments to the Constitution to qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection, such election to be conducted and held on Tuesday, June 20,

1989, in the manner provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment provides that a proposed amendment may be unlimited in scope and may amend, repeal or add one or more sections or articles. The amendment also permits the Legislature to provide that any proposed amendment be divided into separate portions to permit the people to vote separately on such portions, or that the people shall vote for or against the entire proposed amendment, the manner of submission to be specified by the Legislature."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Attorney General of the State of Mississippi is hereby directed to submit this resolution, immediately upon adoption by the Legislature, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 6

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890 BY REPEALING SECTION 197 RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF LICENSES AND PERMITS TO FOREIGN CORPORATIONS TO OPERATE RAILROADS IN THE STATE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN, WHICH TWO-THIRDS (2/3) CONSISTS OF NOT LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, That the following proposed amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on Tuesday, June 20, 1989:

Amend the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 by repealing Section 197 which reads as follows:

"Section 197. The Legislature shall not grant to any foreign corporation or association a license to build, operate, or lease any railroad in this state; but in all cases where a railroad is to be built or operated, and the same shall be partly in this state and

partly in another state or in other states, the owners or projectors thereof shall first become incorporated under the laws of this state; nor shall any foreign corporation or association lease or operate any railroad in this state, or purchase the same or any interest therein. Consolidation of any railroad lines and corporations in this state with others shall be allowed only where the consolidated company shall become a domestic corporation of this state. No general or special law shall ever be passed for the benefit of any foreign corporation operating a railroad under an existing license from this state, or under an existing lease; and no grant of any right or privilege, and no exemption from any burden, shall be made to any such foreign corporation except upon the condition that the owners or stockholders thereof shall first organize a corporation in this state under the laws thereof, and shall thereafter operate and manage the same, and the business thereof, under said domestic charter."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the

manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, for the purpose of submitting this and other proposed amendments to the Constitution to the qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection, such election to be conducted and held on Tuesday, June 20, 1989, in the manner provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment repeals the prohibition on the Legislature from granting any foreign corporation or association a license to build, operate or lease any railroad in this state."

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 206, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO DELETE REFERENCE TO A POLL TAX, A FOUR-MONTH SCHOOL TERM, AND A COUNTY COMMON SCHOOL FUND.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN, WHICH TWO-THIRDS (2/3) CONSISTS OF NOT LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, That the following proposed amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on Tuesday, June 20, 1989:

Amend Section 206, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows:

"Section 206. There shall be a state common-school fund, to be taken from the General Fund in the State Treasury, which shall be used for the maintenance and support of the

common schools. Any county or separate school district may levy an additional tax, as prescribed by general law, to maintain its schools. The state common-school fund shall be distributed among the several counties and separate school districts in proportion to the number of educable children in each, to be determined by data collected through the office of the State Superintendent of Education in the manner to be prescribed by law."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, for the purpose of submitting this and other proposed amendments to the Constitution to the qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection, such election to be conducted and held on Tuesday, June 20, 1989, in the manner provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment deletes provisions in the Constitution referring to a poll tax, a four-month school term and a county common school fund."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Attorney General of the State of Mississippi is hereby directed to submit this resolution, immediately upon adoption by the Legislature, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

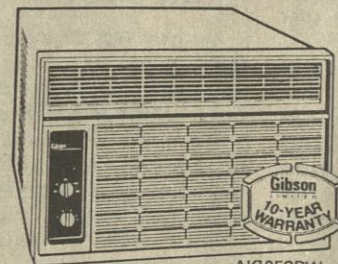

OPEN THREAT
Aphids are causing serious
damage in Tishomingo
gardens, particularly
garden peas. Check peas
for aphids and remove them
if found.

pesticide for aphid control.
Use a malathion spray,
making sure coverage is
thorough.
CATTLE EARTAGS
Two types of insecticide-
dispensing eartags have
created interest among
Tishomingo County cattle
producers.
Producers use these ear-
tags to control hornflies.
These eartags dispense in-
secticide over a specified
period of time. Hornflies can
build resistance to many in-

secticides that contain a syn-
thetic pyrethroid, so
producers constantly search
for eartags with more effec-
tive control.
The eartags stirring up talk
among our cattle producers
contain an organophosphate-
based insecticide. They are
the terminator tags, which
contain diazinon, and the
tomahawk tags, which con-
tain pirimiphosmethyl.
Come by the Tishomingo
County Extension Office for

more information.
FESCUE UPDATE
Many of our cattle
producers are seeding
fungus-free fescue. They will
need to maintain good stands
this summer because
management is critical for a
cool season perennial like
fescue.
Fescue should be
overgrazed during hot, dry
periods. Allow the plants a
residual growth of 3 to 6 in-
ches to cool soil and retain
soil moisture.
Clip seedheads in late
summer to thicken stands.
Never apply nitrogen fertilizer
to fungus-free fescue during
the hot months of summer.
More harm will be done than
good.
Nitrogen fertilizer can be
applied to fungus-infested
fescue containing ber-
mudagrass, bihiagrass or
dallisgrass. Apply according
to soil test results.

TORNADO SHELTER
The following suggestions
could save your life if a tor-
nado threatens in
Tishomingo County.
Go to a designated tornado
cellar, basement, cave or un-
derground excavation. Make
sure the shelter has an air
opening and is free from
water, gas and debris. Take a
pick, shovel or crowbar and a
lantern and first aid kit with
you. You can also store these
items in the shelter
beforehand.

If you are in open country,
move away at a right angle
from the tornado's path.
Do not stay in your car if a
tornado approaches and you
have no time to escape. Lie
flat in the nearest ditch,
ravine, depression or culvert.
Or, go under a bridge.
Watch for flying debris.
