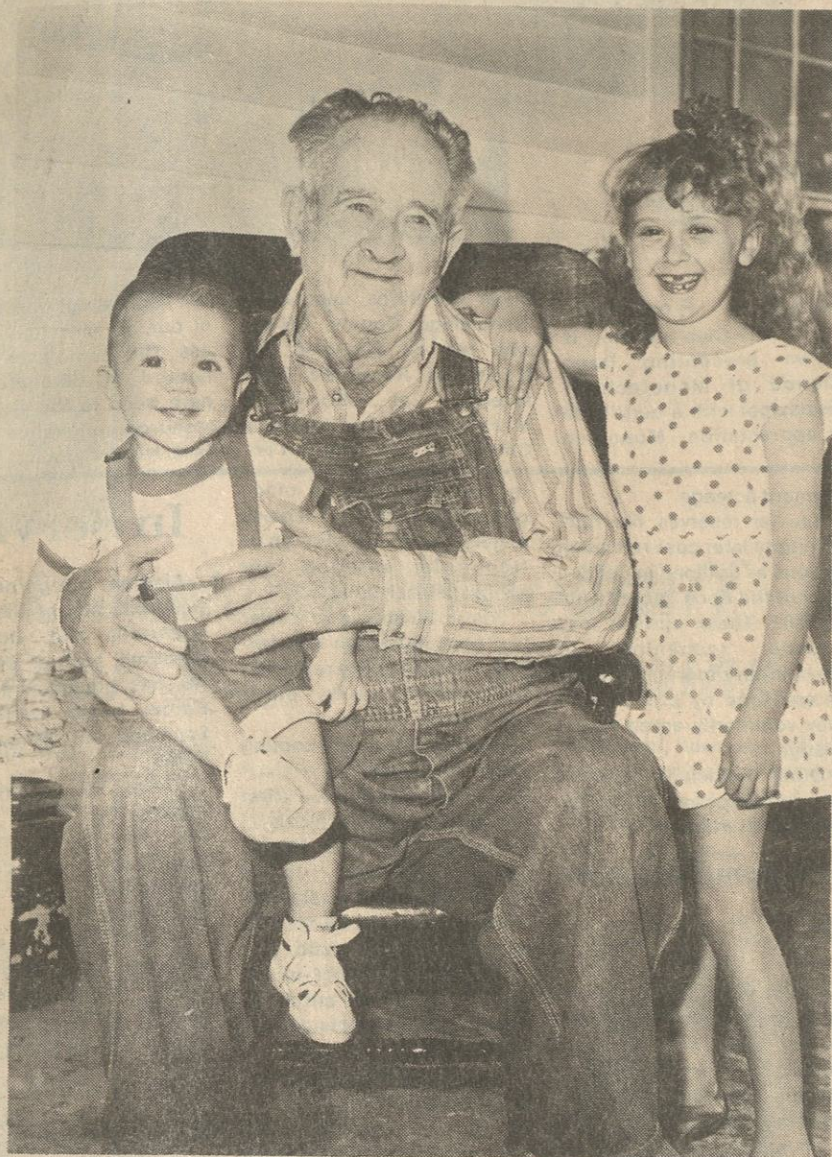

## County-Wide Election Tuesday, June 20th

Voting precincts will open county-wide again Tuesday, June 20, as Tishomingo voters give final approval to the Democratic Party judicial court nominees.

Also, the fate of three constitutional amendments will be decided by Mississippi voters during the judicial general election.

This is a State of

Mississippi General Election and all precincts will be voting. Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

First District Chancery Court Judge Democratic Party nominees are: George F. Adams, Timothy E. Ervin, and James L. Roberts, Jr. These three judges serve the eight counties of Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Tishomingo, and Union Counties.

The Chancery Judge deals with matters of the family such as divorce, child custody, wills and estates, land matters, adoption and domestic relations.

For Circuit Court Judge First District: Thomas J. Garner III, Frank A. Russell, and Fred Wicker. These three

judges will serve Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss, and Tishomingo County.

The Circuit Judge duties involves criminal law, personal injury claims, property damage and contract disputes.

Three proposed constitutional amendments will be on the ballot when voters go to the polls.

The first amendment on the ballot would repeal the constitutional prohibition against the Legislature granting any foreign corporation or association a license to build, operate or lease any railroad in the state.

A second amendment would delete constitutional references to a poll tax, a four-month school term and a county common school fund.

The last amendment would allow the Legislature to submit constitutional amendments that are unlimited in the number of sections they amend, repeal or add. The Legislature would decide whether such amendments are divided into portions and voted on separately or voted on together as a whole.

The Secretary of State's Office will make available copies of the text of each of the three amendments for posting in voting precincts on election day.

## NASA Impact Fund Proposal

A public meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. on June 20 at the Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka to discuss possible proposals which might improve the quality of life in our area and qualify for funds available under the Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority (MEIA) Act.

Dr. Richard Boyd, State Superintendent of Education, and Dr. Tom Saterfield, Deputy Superintendent of Education, will be present to discuss ideas related to education since providing the best education possible for our existing students should be at the top of our list of goals. Also, having a top notch educational system will certainly be among the most important considerations for new families moving into the area.

Under the MEIA Act, an Authority, as part of the Mississippi Department of Economic Development (MDED) can be created to direct the issuance of up to \$20 million in bonds for investing in the quality of life in a targeted area impacted by a project having an initial investment of not less than \$300 million. NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor plant to be constructed in the Yellow Creek area of Tishomingo County is such a facility and the MDED plans to analyze the project impact for possible use of money available through the authority.

The stated intent of MDED is to ensure that funds are applied in a manner to attract the most number of additional residents to locate in

the project area. The project area includes the site and an in-state five-mile radius from the site.

On May 25, Mac Holladay, Director of MDED, met with leaders from counties within the project area to provide information related to developing proposals for obtaining the impact funds under some type of matching fund arrangement. According to Holladay, timing is a critical element if the desired impacts are to be achieved and projects submitted should be able to be completed within about 18 months. He asked that only those projects be considered which can have a serious impact on the project area and for which the communities and counties are willing to commit local funds. Project proposals should be submitted to MDED by July 10, 1989.

MDED has met with a cross-section of community leaders and residents from the project area. Based upon this input and further review the following are key issues for consideration with education heading the list:

1. Education (K-12, vocational-technical education, and post secondary)
2. Health Care
3. Highways
4. Airports
5. Housing
6. Water and Sewer
7. Fire Protection
8. Amenities

If you are interested in taking advantage of this one time opportunity for available funds please plan to attend.

Salt & pepper to taste  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 T all purpose flour  
1 cup milk  
1/2 roll garlic cheese, cubed  
1/2 roll japapeno pepper cheese roll, cubed

Boil potatoes in jacket until tender but not too soft. When cool enough to handle, slice and layer in buttered 2-quart casserole with the slivered pepper and pimento. Salt and pepper each layer. Melt butter in saucepan; stir in flour until well blended. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly. Add cheese to milk mixture. Stir until melted. Pour over potatoes. Bake until hot and bubbly, about 45 minutes, at 350 degrees.

## County Agent's Notes

### COTTON UPDATE

Weather has delayed the progress of the 1989 cotton crop in Tishomingo County, and producers are doing what they can to avoid further problems.

A cotton crop takes about 130 days from seeding to harvest. It takes about a month from emergence for a cotton plant to produce a square. Then it needs another month to set blooms and 40 more days for those blooms to

mature.

The weather in July, August and September will dictate how much of the Tishomingo County crop will mature and be harvested. Farmers can help their cotton crops by avoiding over-the-top herbicide applications used as directed sprays, practicing early insect control, properly adjusting cultivators and spray equipment and avoiding late or excessive applications of nitrogen.

### BOLL WEEVIL

Boll weevil traps have been catching large numbers of weevils in both North and South Tishomingo County. This means that a pin head square application of an insecticide will be extremely important this year.

If you need a 1989 Cotton Insect Control Guide, we have them in the County Agents Office and will be glad to mail one to anyone who needs it. Just call 423-3616.

### FIRE ANT ALERT

Fire ants readily start new mounds at this time of year in Tishomingo County. They may become widespread after the recent heavy rains in the county.

Effective insecticides for controlling fire ants are available in granular form, baits and liquids.

The risk of injury to humans and damage to plants is great if dangerous materials such as gasoline and scalding water are used on fire ant mounds.

### PLANT PUMPKINS

The last two weeks of June are recommended for planting pumpkins and hard-shelled squash such as butternut, hubbard, acorn and spaghetti. If planted in late June, these vegetables should mature in early October.

## ASCS Farm News

### USDA ANNOUNCES 1990 WHEAT PROGRAM PROVISIONS

Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter today announced a required 5 percent acreage reduction and the following other provisions of the 1990 wheat program:

--A price support loan and purchase rate of \$1.95 per bushel, a 20-percent reduction from the basic loan and purchase rate of \$2.44. This is the statutory minimum and five percent below the 1989 land and purchase rate of \$2.06 per bushel.

--The established target price is \$4.00 per bushel, the statutory minimum, and down about two percent from the 1989 target price.

--A paid land diversion will not be implemented.

--No marketing loan or related program provisions will be implemented.

--Producers will be required to maintain in acreage conservation reserve an acre equal to 5.26 percent of program

Yeutter reserves the right to initiate later cost-reduction options as outlined in Section 1009 of the Food Security Act of 1985. These options may include reopening or changing a program contract entered into by producers if they voluntarily agree to the change.

Other provisions common to program crops will be announced at a later date.

### 4-H Communicates

One of the most popular 4-H projects with young children is the 4-H Dog Care Project. The project covers subjects from obedience to breeding to showing and grooming.

Through study of the 4-H Dog Care manuals, project members begin by learning to tell one breed of dog from another. They also learn what group each breed belongs in, according to the purpose of the breed. The six groups include: sporting dogs, hounds, the working breeds, the terrier breeds, the toy breeds, and the non-sporting breeds.

The 4-H'er then learns the parts of the dog, as well as terms describing those parts. The responsibility of owning a dog is discussed in great detail.

When selecting a dog, 4-H members learn the difference in owning a mixed-breed and purebred. Other considerations to be made when selecting a dog are:

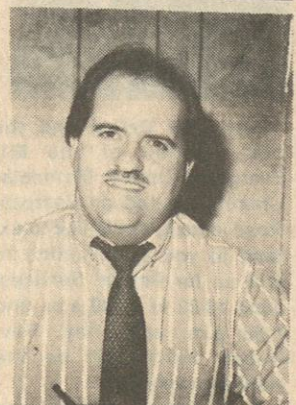
- (1) Will the dog stay inside or outside?
- (2) How long is the dog's hair?
- (3) Will the dog fit the size of home and exercise area?
- (4) Does the size of the dog fit the age and stamina of the owner?
- (5) Will the general personality traits of the breed fit the family's lifestyle?
- (6) Will a male or female dog best fit the family's needs?

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### FOOD SAFETY ALERT

As temperatures begin to rise as summer months approach, it presents a greater challenge to food safety. The commissioner for health affairs for the Food and Drug Administration reported recently that from 30 to 50 percent of all diarrhea cases in the United States are of foodborne origin.

The following suggestions can help you prevent food-

borne illness in your family this year:

\*Wash hand thoroughly in warm soapy water before preparing food. Wash utensils, cutting boards and surfaces that have come in contact with raw meat and poultry thoroughly. This keeps bacteria in raw meat and its juices from spreading to other foods.

\*Foods should not be thawed on the kitchen counter. Any bacteria in food can multiply rapidly at room temperature to disease-causing levels.

\*Refrigerate to keep foods safe. This includes all perishable foods. If meats and poultry will not be used in two or more days, they

should be kept frozen and thawed in the refrigerator when ready to use. Refrigerators should register 40 degrees F and freezers at zero.

\*Cook meats and poultry thoroughly. Visual danger signs are red meat looks brown, poultry juices run clear and fish flakes when raked with a fork.

\*When cooking foods in the microwave, read the manual carefully for recommended standing times outside the oven. This is important in completely cooking food. Use a temperature probe or thermometer as needed. Do not use a metal thermometer inside the microwave oven.

\*Refrigerate or freeze leftovers promptly. Perishable foods should not stand a room temperature for more than two hours. Divide larger quantities so they can cool quickly. When serving refrigerated foods, heat to 160 degrees F.

Your family can enjoy the warm months ahead without the threat of foodborne illnesses if caution is used in handling foods.

### SCALING FOR PREVENTION

Q. What does the term "scaling" mean?

A. Scaling is an important part of the personal and professional care necessary to prevent gum disease.

Personal care is the daily brushing and flossing to remove plaque, the sticky film that is formed continually on the teeth by bacteria that normally are in the mouth. Plaque that remains despite brushing and flossing sometimes causes gum inflammation. Also, a cement-like substance known as tartar, or calculus, forms on the teeth at the gumline, trapping more bacteria-laden plaque. If neglected, the tartar buildup will hasten serious gum disease.

Scaling is performed in the dental office to remove the tartar, as part of the periodic visit for a professional "cleaning." The rate at which tartar accumulates varies from one person to another. That is why it is necessary, for example, to schedule two cleaning visits a year for some people and four visits for others.

### COSMETIC ADVANTAGES

If you've been thinking about changing from glasses to contact lenses, probably the first thing that came to mind was the cosmetic advantage of contacts. They fit so closely to your eyes no one would know that you are wearing corrective lenses. However, this is just one of several advantages that contacts offer.

Another advantage is that contacts permit a wider field of vision than eyeglasses. There is no lens frame to get in your line of sight when you look to the left or right, up or down. Because they fit so closely, they also present a less distorted and more realistic size in the ob-

Water is something most people take for granted whether it's for bathing, dishwashing, laundering, or brushing teeth. But water is a necessary resource that must be conserved. Water is readily available, but the situation is changing with constant new demands on our water supply. Wise water-use methods in home can benefit you and your community. One can easily reduce indoor water consumption by about 30 percent through the installation of water conserving devices. Displacement devices such as bricks, bottles, or bags are low-cost modifications that are effective in reducing the flush capacity of a toilet. Each device displaces about one or two quarts of water and reduce the flush volume accordingly. The following checklist is designed to help you see how effectively you are using water and to suggest ways to conserve. Install low volume flow control devices on showerheads and tub faucets. Check faucets for drips, make repairs promptly. Check toilet for continuing flow after flushing. Wash only full loads of laundry. Limit shower time to three minutes or less. Wash only full loads of dishes in the dishwasher. Wipe up floors after small spills as they occur to avoid frequent mopping of floors.

Two educational reports were given - Caring for Sterling Silver by Willie Mae Robinson and Safety belts by Marie Lynch. The best way to keep your sterling silver clean is to use it. Store silver in tarnish-proof cloth. Use a polish with a tarnish-preventing agent. Don't let stainless touch sterling, it

may leave a mark. Hand wash hollow-handled knives as the dishwasher may jolt handles loose.

Safety belts can keep you from: plunging through the windshield, scraping along the ground, being thrown out the door and hurtled through the air, or being crushed by your own car. More than 80 percent of all car crashes occur at speeds less than 40 mph. Fatalities involving non-belted occupants of cars have been recorded at as low as 12 mph. That's about the speed you'd be driving in a parking lot. Three out of four crashes causing death occur within 25 miles of home. Buckle up before driving to your shopping center - just as you would for a long trip.

# Iuka School District Scores Higher Than State Average

Students in the Iuka School District scored higher than the state average on the basic skills tests of the Basic Skills Assessment Program given in April, 1989. According to the report of the Mississippi Department of Education's Summary Reports of the Iuka School District, students ranked the state averages in all three states.

The BSAP was given to students in grades 3, 5, and 8. The Functional Literacy Examination was given to grade 11. The tests measure essential skills of reading, mathematics, and written communication and are used as part of the accreditation process for schools. The test results are reported on the percentages of questions answered correctly and on scale scores.

The third graders who took

BSAP exceeded the state average 383.5 scale score in reading with a scale score of 387.6. In math, our pupils scored 387.8 compared to the state average of 380.5. The third graders scored 388.7 in written communication compared to the state average of 383.7.

The composite average scale score for all three test areas was 387.9 for the school district and 382.5 for the state.

The Iuka fifth graders scored 578.8 in reading while the state average was 575.3. In math, our fifth graders got 581.9 compared to a state average of 578.1. In written communication our students scored 577.9 compared to the state average of 572.7.

The composite results of our fifth graders was 580.1 scale score while the state

average was 575.9.

The scores for the Iuka eighth grade were well above the state average. In reading, the students scored a 880.4 scale score compared to a state score of 870.9. In math the school district's scale score was 882.9 compared to a state average of 870.6. The students scored 879.5 in written communication while the state average was 876.6.

The composite scale score for the eighth grade students was 880.9 and the state's scale score average was

872.2.

On the Functional Literacy Examination the eleventh grade students in Iuka scored a 275.7 scale score on the reading portion while the state scored 272.3. In math, our students exceeded the state with a score of 274.4 compared to the state of 271.2. In written communication, the Iuka students scored 264.8 compared to the state average of 266.7.

The composite scale score for the grade locally was 815.0 compared to a state average score of 810.3.



D.D. Haines, formerly of Iuka, recently received the award for graduating with the highest grade point average in Political Science-Secondary Education at the University of North Alabama. She received her BSDE degree in English and Political Science at UNA and graduated Cum Laude. D.D. is presently working on her Master's degree in English-Secondary Education. While at UNA she was a member of the English Club and Phi Kappa Phi, the school's honor society. D.D. now resides in Florence with her husband, Jim Haines. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Jim Walker of Iuka.

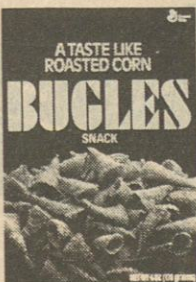

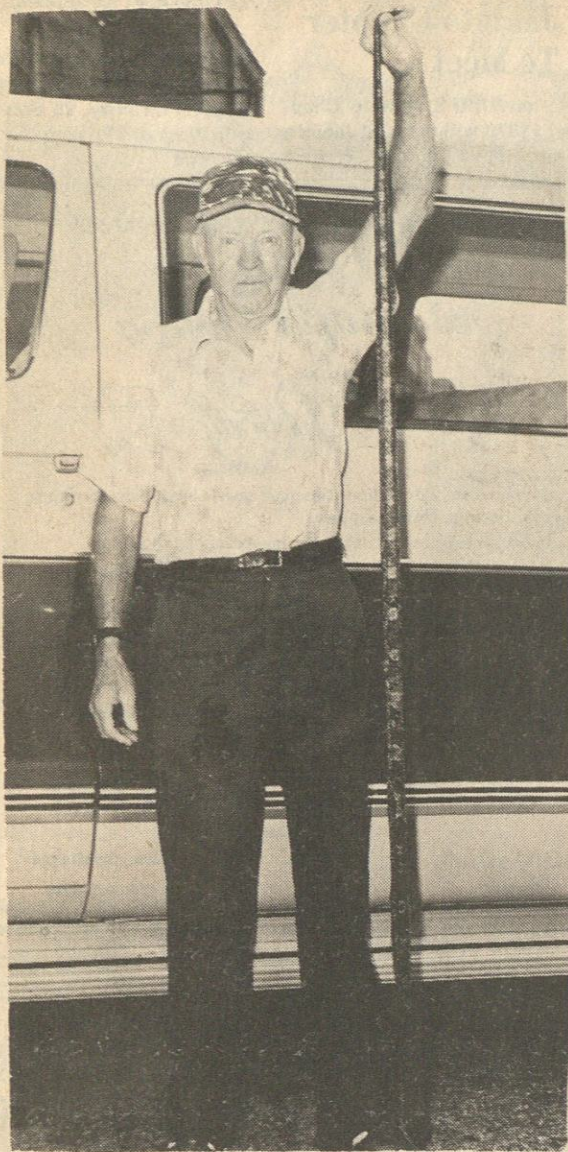

### "Fathers Are Competent Too!"

The traditional belief is that mothers are more competent at taking care of children and thus should have the major responsibility for child care, especially for very young children.

Fathers often are seen as "second" to mothers, as though they do not have the same capacity for nurturing. They are viewed as less sensitive to the needs of children. Such beliefs have roots in the view that nurturing and sensitivity are solely maternal instincts.

There is surprisingly little research to support this explanation of paternal roles.

Research finds that fathers have the potential to be as capable as mothers in nurturing children. The ability to love and respond to infants is a characteristic of humans rather than of females alone.

When differences do occur between mothers and fathers, they probably are due to the interaction between biological factors and differences in experience, social expectations and socialization.

Studies of father-infant attachment are all consistent in stating that children beginning around 6 months of age show attachment behaviors to their fathers in much the way as they display them toward their mothers.

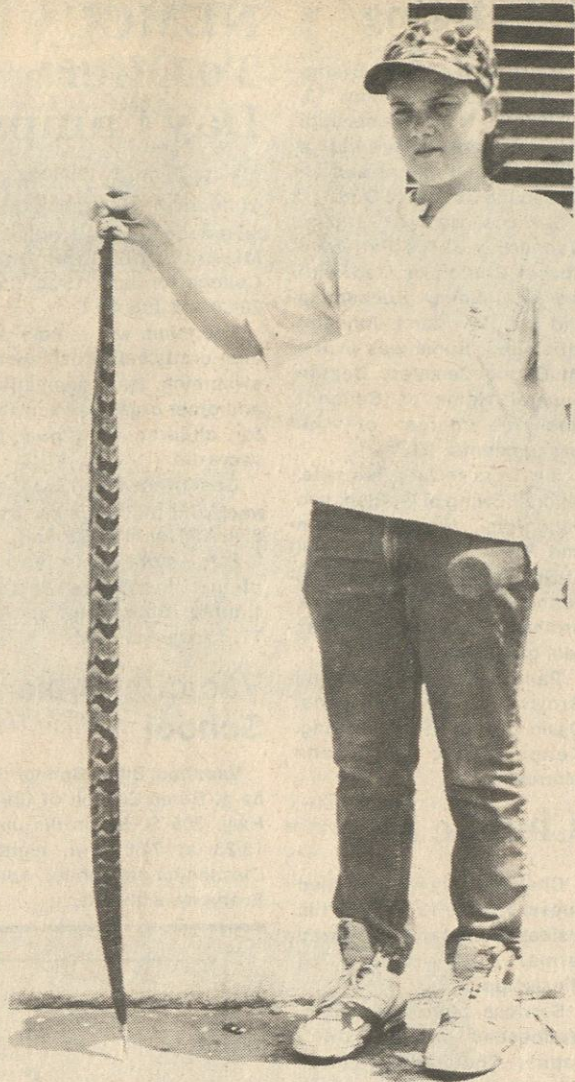
Fathers can and should be prominent figures in children's development. Biological disposition is minimal in explaining why so many fathers are not involved in child care. Lack of experience with infants, social expectations and socialization are more likely to play a major role in the tendency.

Although, fathers and mothers are equally capable, and infants develop strong relationships with both parents, parents probably don't have the same experience with the same influences on their children. Researchers have found differences between fathers and mothers in the style of interaction with their children.

The strongest possible nurturing is provided when both parents are active in caring for their children.

gate attendant when they register their campsite that they are expecting visitors, how many visitors are expected and the visitors' names.

2. Visitors must stop at the gate attendants station upon their arrival to obtain a visitor's pass, and to pay the \$2.00 user fee.

3. Visitors are not allowed in the campground before 7:00 AM or after 9:00 PM.

4. Visitors must obey all campground rules and all applicable local, state and federal regulations the same as other park users.

5. Whichever is less of 1 vehicle or 6 visitors maximum

or a total of 12 people maximum per campsite (including campers) allowed at any given time for any given site.

In other words, if 6 registered campers were on a site and 6 visitors wished to visit those campers, this would be permitted since 6 + 6 = 12 is the maximum number of people allowed on a campsite at any given time. However, if 8 people were camping and 6 visitors showed up, 2 of the visitors would not be allowed to enter since 6 + 8 = 14, which exceeds the 12 person limit. Or, if a group of visitors

showed up in 2 vehicles, only 1 vehicle would be allowed to enter, even if there was only 1 person in that vehicle, because only 1 visitor's vehicle is allowed per campsite at any time.

However, if 2 visitors are expected to arrive at different times in separate vehicles, and the registered camper could inform the gate attendant of this situation, both visitors can still be accommodated. The first visitor must obtain a pass and pay the \$2.00 user fee. When the next visitor arrives, he or she will be allowed in on a 20 minute sight-seeing pass to inform the registered camper that they have arrived. The first visitor can then follow the 2nd visitor back to the gate attendant station to let the attendant change the number of visitors on the visitor pass. The extra vehicle can be parked at the Piney Grove Boat ramp and the late-arriving visitor can ride back to the campsite with the first visitor.

### Belmont Teacher To Attend MSU Workshop

More than 20 high school biology teachers from throughout the state will take part in a July 3-14 professional development workshop at Mississippi State University. Joe Chumbley of Dennis teaches biology at Belmont High School and will be participating in the MSU workshop.

The in-service training session is part of a massive, long-range teacher development program announced in April by the state Board of Trustees, Institutions of Higher Learning. With sup-

port from a combination of funding sources, the program will stress the higher academic requirements high school students must soon meet for admission to state universities.

In addition to biology, the program will focus on chemistry, French, mathematics, and physics.

The MSU workshop is one of four being held this summer for biology teachers. Biology workshops are also being held at Alcorn State, Delta State and Jackson State universities.

"Each session is designed to acquaint teachers with the

most current information in biology," explained MSU project director H. Wyman Dorrough, head of the biological sciences department.

The workshop experience is intended to be fully adaptable to high school teaching and participants are expected to become lead teachers in their school districts," he added.

The workshop curriculum is rigorous. Class lectures and discussions will go from 8 a.m. to noon each weekday. During the afternoon, participants do laboratory work or take part in field exercises.
