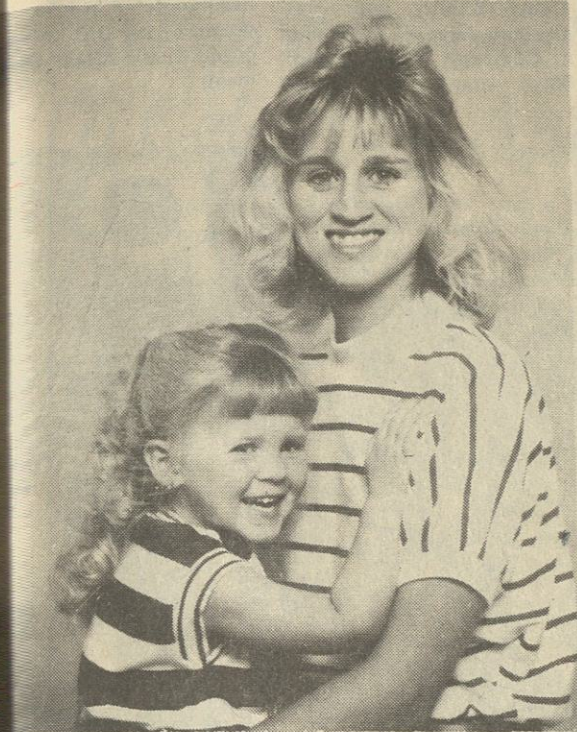

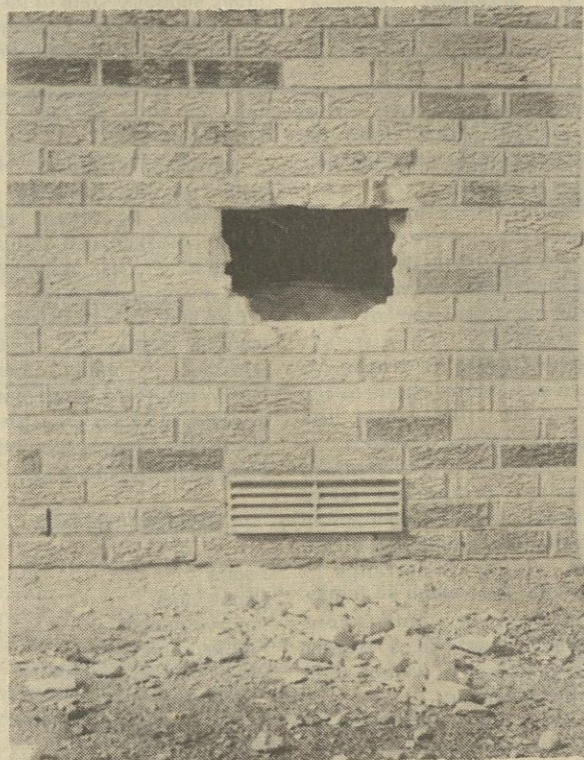

3 Escape From County Jail Facility

Three prisoners knocked this small hole in the wall at the front of the Tishomingo County Jail and escaped early Monday morning.

Two escaped prisoners have been recaptured after breaking out of Tishomingo County Jail early Monday, July 17. One escapee is still at large.

Daryl Banister, 18-year-old capital murder suspect was arrested in Alcorn County Monday evening according to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Fugitive Ricky McAlister, 24, of Corinth surrendered to authorities Monday evening at approximately 5:00 p.m., reports indicated. McAlister was being held at the jail on charges of grand larceny.

Dickie Hopkins, 23, of Memphis, TN, remains at large, authorities stated. Hopkins, jailed on charges of grand larceny and attempted escape, is described as being approximately 5 ft., 8 in. tall and 150 lbs. He has short blond hair.

Anyone who might have information on the whereabouts of Hopkins is asked to contact the Tishomingo County Sheriff's

Department at 423-6185.

The three inmates knocked through the wall of the Tishomingo County Jail and escaped between 3:00 and 4:00 a.m. Monday morning. A piece of angle iron was removed from a cell bunk and was used to chisel out a hole from behind a vent leading to the outside at the front of the jail, authorities explained. "They (the prisoners) used mattresses to muffle the sound," Sheriff Dobbs commented. "They also disconnected the light where they were working."

The three men apparently left the facility on foot. The 11:00 p.m. - 7:00 a.m. shift dispatcher was the only employee at the jail during the escape and discovered that the men were missing when checking on another inmate.

The jail is presently under repair with steel panels being installed into the walls, stated a Sheriff's Department spokesman. This is being done to deter any future escape attempts.

NASA Funds Approved By House Committee

Start-up Funding of \$121 million was approved Monday, July 17 by the House Appropriations Committee for the National Aeronautics & Space Administration's (NASA) rocket production facility to be located at Yellow Creek near Iuka.

Congressman Jamie Whitten, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, stated that the ASRM project has funding approved, along with other projects including the Department of Veterans

Affairs and the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Whitten went on to explain that although the initial money is there it will be up to the committee on Science, Space & Technology to authorize the program and direct the spending of the money.

"The Committee of Science, Space & Technology will also determine the fate of the termination liability insurance that has been requested by Lockheed-Aerofjet, private

contractors chosen to spear head the ASRM project," said Whitten. He feels sure, however, that this will pass legislation and be acted upon by the Science Committee soon.

The usual course taken in Federal programs begins with legislative approval and then financial commitments are made by the Appropriations Committee, but in this case, funding was first approved and is awaiting final legislative approval.

Since the Lockheed Cor-

poration is a private contractor, termination liability insurance is needed to ensure them that if the NASA project is cancelled by the Bush administration they will be compensated for any investments they have made toward the project.

At press-time Congressman Whitten was returning to committee meetings in Washington but stated that he believes that final congressional approval for the project should go smoothly.

State Health Officer Alton B. Cobb, M.D., M.P.H., approve four certificate of need (CON) applications at a special meeting Thursday, July 6.

Section 41-7-191, Mississippi Code of 1972, details health facilities activities which require a CON. The State Legislature in its 1986 session directed that the CON authority become the responsibility of the State Health Officer.

County Agent's Notes

LAWN TIPS

Mowing too closely, particularly when temperatures are high, can stress lawns. Remember to raise cutting height of the mower a notch to avoid "shaving" your lawn.

Weeds in the lawn usually grow faster and taller than turfgrass. Control them with herbicide sprays, but choose a material recommended for your particular type of lawn. The turfgrass may be damaged if the wrong chemical is applied.

Shallow, frequent irrigation can cause turfgrass to develop a poor root system. Water early in the morning, soaking deeply. Let the soil surface dry before repeating.

LIVESTOCK FLIES

House flies and stable flies are major problems in Tishomingo County livestock operations during the summer. The key to good fly control is management of manure.

Manure and other rotting organic matter should be removed and disposed so that flies can't breed. Insecticides contained in long-lasting residual sprays, short residual aerosols, baits, mists and feed-throughs can be applied to control these flies.

FLOWERING PLANT CARE

Snip or pinch faded flowers and seed pods from annuals and roses so the plants will produce more buds. If garden mums are long and leggy, lightly prune them so multiple flowers stalks will form for fall.

Do not move or divide bedded plants at this point in the summer. Stem cuttings can be rooted to provide more plants for flower gardens. Annuals such as caladiums, begonias, zinnias and ornamental peppers need a little fertilizer boost to keep them producing into the fall.

SUMMER VEGETABLE GARDENS

Garden vegetables don't improve in quality after they are picked. Pick them at the peak of quality, then eat or preserve as soon as possible.

Maintain quality by decreasing field heat from just-picked vegetables. Immediately put them in shade, air conditioning or refrigeration.

Also maintain quality by watering and by controlling weeds, insects and disease. Cultivation and mulching are good methods for weed control.

Certain herbicides such as Treflan, Dacthal and Poast can be used on some vegetables. Follow instructions.

Cover black plastic mulch with pine needles to reduce heat. Or spray the plastic with white latex paint.

Try to stay out of the garden when plant leaves on vegetables are wet from dew, rain or irrigation. This slows spread of disease.

MAKING HAY

If pasture forages such as bahiagrass, dallisgrass and bermudagrass have adequate soil moisture, they can be fertilized to produce more hay. About 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre of grass is needed to produce a good cutting of hay.

Make sure enough phosphate and potash are added to keep pasture grasses healthy and winter hardy. If you have a question about adding fertilizer or what type is needed, have soil tested first.

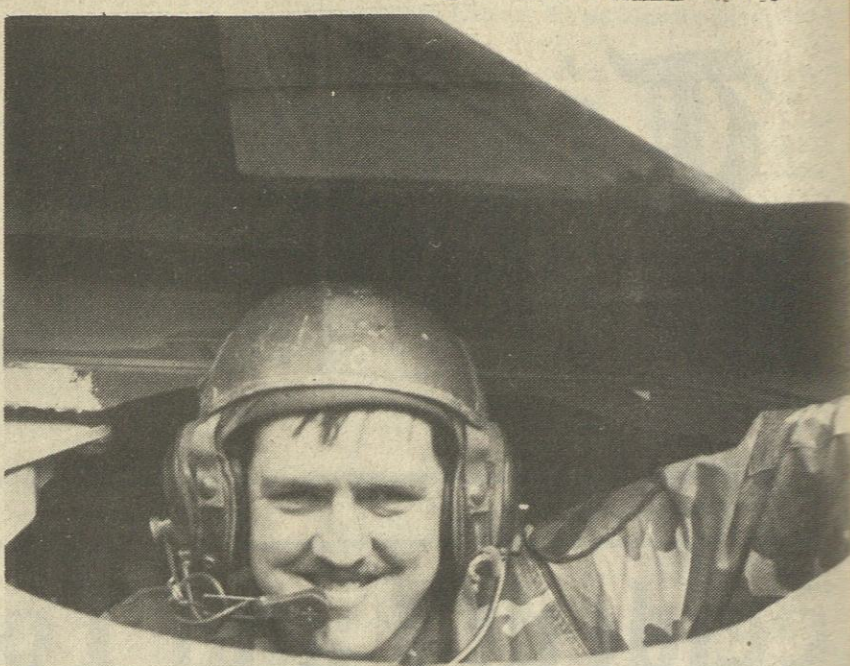
If these grasses are used for grazing rather than hay making, they may still need fertilizer. Some nutrients are recycled through animal manure and urine, so fertilizer rates for grazing probably won't be as high as they are for hay. Your soil sample should indicate if the forage will be used for hay or grazing.

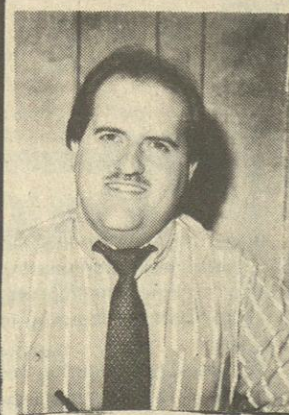
Personal

HOW CATARACTS AFFECT VISION

As you get older, the chance that a cataract may develop in one or both eyes becomes more likely. A cataract is any imperfection in the clarity of the lens of the eye. This condition usually comes on very gradually, so gradually that you may not know you have a problem until it begins to interfere with your ability to see clearly.

The lens of your eye must be clear so it can allow light to pass through to the retina at the back of the eye. It is the retina that sends the image of what you see to the brain. When a cataract begins to form, this causes a blurring of

vision that progresses slowly in most people. When it impedes your ability to see clearly, surgery is recommended to remove the lens. Contact lenses and/or lens implants are then prescribed to compensate for the loss. Cataracts are one of many eye problems that can be detected by an eye doctor. If you have had your eyes examined recently, call your doctor for an examination.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

COMMUNICATING ABOUT MONEY

Money is a common problem for a family, regardless of income, age or

education of its family members. Sometimes a lack of income to meet basic needs causes the money hassle. But, more often, inadequate communication about money is the root of financial problems.

When family members have different values and attitudes toward spending and saving money, or when families strive for unrealistic goals, there is potential conflict.

When family members do not "talk things out," even the most workable spending plan may face ruin.

Communication among family members is not always the easiest thing to do, but it is important if you want to get the most satisfaction from financial resources. Generally, the more open the communication about family finances, the better the quality of those decisions.

Preventing and overcoming money problems takes honest, open communication. It also takes time and effort. Be willing to arrange a specific time when all family members can talk about money. Meet on a regular basis instead of waiting until problems occur.

There are several ways to increase the quality of communication about money matters in your family.

First, recognize that whoever earns the money does not also earn the right to dictate how it should be spent. Family members, including children old enough to understand, need to make decisions about money as a team. Allow everyone to have input in financial decisions. Family members will be more satisfied with decisions if they helped to make them.

Clearly identify the issue at hand. Do not drag other points into the discussion that do not address the problem, concern or dissatisfaction. Is the problem one of spending too much money, spending it at the wrong time or spending it on something you consider unnecessary or unimportant?

Let each family member freely state his or her wants, needs and personal feelings. Avoid judging or criticizing others. Encourage communication beginning with "I think" and "I feel." Talk about the present. Avoid phrases

such as "you always" and "you never."

Listen carefully to the other person. Respond to statements by others with some indication that you understand. Or, ask questions until you do understand.

Be willing to negotiate for a realistic settlement of differences. In many cases, family members must compromise. Thoroughly discussing an idea may help avoid misunderstandings.

ZUCCHINI BREAD

3 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 cup vegetable oil
1 tablespoon vanilla
2 cups coarsely grated unpeeled zucchini
3 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup raisins or chopped nuts

Beat eggs until light and fluffy. Slowly add sugar and beat well. Add oil and vanilla. Add grated zucchini. Sift flour and other dry ingredients together. Mix well with zucchini mixture. Add nuts or raisins. Pour into 3 medium loaf pans which have been well greased. Bake in a 325-350 degree oven for 1 hour. Yield: 3 loaves.

NOTE: Sugar in this recipe can be reduced by 1/3 without effecting the product.

Jack Wadkins Named Chairman

Representative Mack Loyd Wadkins of Iuka has been named Chairman of a special House of Representatives committee to study proposals for an advance tuition payment plan to assist Mississippi's young people in the rising costs of a college education. The appointment of the member committee was announced by House Speaker Ford. In addition to Representative Wadkins, the committee includes Representatives Rick Fortenberry of Meridian, Miriam Q. Adams of Columbia, Ray Echlo of Gautier, and Ned Walker of Columbus. Wadkins, who also serves as Chairman of the standing House Universities and Colleges Committee, said a number of bills were introduced during the 1989 legislative session to create a Baccalaureate Education Trust program to encourage students to attend institutions of higher learning and provide for advance payment of tuition over a period of years. This is a very complicated

issue that should be dealt with during the interim instead of during a regular legislative session," Wadkins said.

Under the proposal, a special fund would be established to receive payments from parents or others on behalf of qualified students. The students must be under age 14 at the time the advance tuition contract is entered into on their behalf.

The terms of the contract would spell out such conditions as the amount of payment or payments, provisions for late payment charges, the number of college credit hours covered, and terms under which the contract may be terminated and amount of refund to be paid.

"When the student is ready to enroll in an institution of his or her choice, the tuition costs would have been paid in advance and parents wouldn't have this big initial expenditure facing them," Wadkins said.

The program would be administered by a separate board appointed by the Governor, to operate under the auspices of the state College Board. Along with other responsibilities, the

board would be empowered to solicit and accept gifts, grants and loans from private enterprise or governmental agencies to help carry out the program.

The study committee is scheduled to hold its first meeting on July 25 at the State Capitol. The panel will be meeting jointly with members of the Senate Universities and Colleges Committee.

All members of the interim study committee also serve on the House Universities and Colleges Committee.

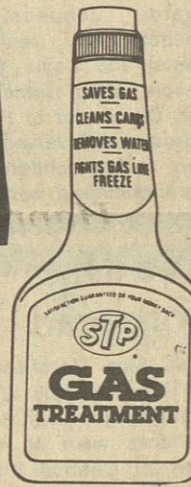

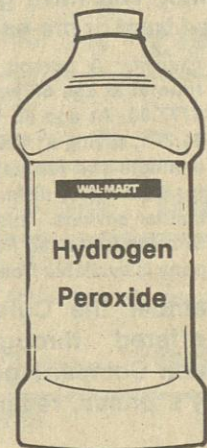

Ask Ochsner

Q. What is Lyme disease and what are its symptoms?

A. Lyme disease is difficult to diagnose because its symptoms are like many other diseases, according to Dr. Laurence M. Cortez of the infectious disease section at Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans. Symptoms of such ailments as arthritis, heart and neurological diseases can occur with the presence of Lyme disease, he says.

Lyme disease is caused by the deer tick and the bites are painless and can go unnoticed if there is no visible rash. Current research indicates that symptoms may not appear for several years after the bite.

Lyme disease usually occurs in three stages, though not everyone who is bitten experiences all three:

Stage One: A few days after infection, a round, red rash may appear near the site of the bite. There may be flu-like symptoms of fever, chills or

extreme fatigue.

Stage Two: Two weeks to three months after the bite, a patient may experience temporary facial paralysis; joint and muscle pain; visual, emotional and memory impairment; and in rare cases, heart problems such as rhythm disturbances or congestive heart failure.

Stage Three: Several months to years after infection, arthritic symptoms in one or more joints and symptoms of neurological diseases such as multiple sclerosis or Bell's palsy may appear.

While most cases result in only mild illness, and early treatment with antibiotics can prevent and successfully treat major symptoms, if unrecognized and untreated Lyme disease can cause serious and painful symptoms and permanent damage. A blood test is available to detect the presence of antibodies to the disease.

Prudent attention to preventive measures, however, is your best line of defense. If you are going to be in or near a wooded area wear long-sleeve shirts and long pants tucked into socks; use tick repellent on yourself, clothing and pets. If you find one on you, use sharp tweezers and slowly pull it out at the head, closest to the

skin. Clean the wound with an antiseptic and be aware for the development of a rash; save the tick in a jar to show your doctor.

The best safeguard against Lyme disease is to remain alert to its dangers and for its early symptoms and to seek medical attention promptly once these symptoms appear.

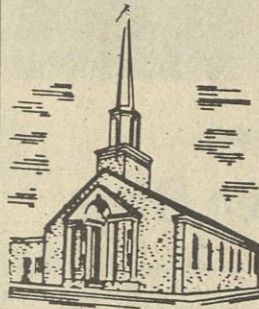

Good Barbecue A Tradition In Bishop, Alabama

o summer would be complete to Southerners without traditional "ole timey"

cookout and no Southerner would be complete without enjoying "ole fashioned"

pork barbecue.

L.O. and Grace Bishop have made it their business to see that Southerners can enjoy both during their annual Barbecue Picnic, held on Saturday, July 15, at their homeplace they lovely call Bishop, AL, in the Allsboro community just across the MS/AL line.

Both L.O. and Grace were born and raised in the Northwest corner of Alabama. They now run a large facility there where they cook, package and sell barbecued meat, by the shoulder or by the pound, to local grocery stores, restaurants and individual within Alabama and Mississippi.

The barbecue picnic is held by the Bishops each year allowing friends, relatives, customers or anyone else who wishes to attend, to get acquainted, enjoy good company and sample their mouth-watering southern delicacy. The new facility, built recently by the Bishops to

house their business, is a spacious 32 x 106 ft. building that contains two large pits capable of cooking 84 shoulders each. The new building was constructed to replace the former one, which was destroyed by fire earlier this year.

This year's cook-out brought a gathering estimated at 900-1,000 guests. "Everyone is always invited," said L.O. "and all the food and drinks are free." He estimated that more than 200 lbs. of barbecue was served this year.

Among those on hand for the event this year were Alabama Governor Guy Hunt and his wife Helen, Alabama Senator Bobby Denton, the President of the Alabama Farmers Federation and various other county officials. "We even had friends come from as far away as Mobile, Dothan and Ft. Payne," remarked Bishop. He went on to comment that the event was the result of the hard work of a lot of people and he wanted to thank them all with a special thanks going out to Mary Jane Waldrep, who prepared the desserts.

L.O. explained that he holds the picnic each summer as a part of a family tradition started by his father. As far as L.O. knows, it began around 1922, according to a newspaper article he has from the Sheffield Standard, documenting the event approximately 13 years before his birth.

L.O. and Grace Bishop are certainly pleased when guests ask about their barbecue and they are more than happy to sell them any amount they wish to purchase. "We sell to individuals as well as supermarkets and restaurants," Grace explained. "We put our address on all our products," L.O. went on to say "so if our customers are not completely satisfied with our products, they can let us know and we'll refund their money." The Bishops want to let their customers know that with them, customer satisfaction is as traditional as the barbecue they prepare.

Uncompensated Care Numbers Continue

The decade of the 80's has seen uncompensated care grow at a horrifying rate in Mississippi's hospitals. In fact, the uncompensated care total for 1988 is 23.93% higher than that of the previous year.

The Mississippi Hospital Association's annual survey on uncompensated care shows that the total figure for the state's hospitals in 1988 was \$548,623,569 up from \$442,699,441 in 1987. The uncompensated care rate in Mississippi is growing at a rate of interest that is nearly twice that of total patient revenues.

Uncompensated care is the uncollected part of patient revenues earned by hospitals for providing health services. The types of patients are different. They include Medicare, Medicaid, bad debt, and charity. Some patients have health insurance, but many do not have any coverage at all.

A major concern among hospital providers is the rising number of patients who are either uninsured or underinsured. That number in Mississippi is about 600,000 people. The uncompensated care deduction for Medicare in 1988 came to \$255,478,409 while the amount of bad debts totalled \$130,477,505.

"The uncompensated care figures in Mississippi have gone up almost \$106 million dollars in one year," states W. Dale Sautters, Administrator

of Winston County Community Hospital in Louisville and 1989-90 Chairman of the Mississippi Hospital Association. "Medicare and bad debts contribute to just over 60% of the uncompensated care total."

Charity care rendered totalled \$74,349,648.

This 1988 survey was concentrated on those hospitals providing general acute care hospital services. The response rate was 96.41%. Rehabilitation, mental care, chemical dependency and federal facilities were not included.

According to survey findings, 42 of the 121 surveyed hospitals in Mississippi (34.7%) indicated that they experienced a net loss during 1988.

The Mississippi Association represents 120 hospitals statewide.

Wetlands Again Eligible For CRP

Farmers with wetlands need to look at options on Conservation Reserve Program. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will be accepting bids for entry into the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) during the ninth sign-up from July 17 through August 4, 1989. Eligible lands include wetlands and lands subject to wind or water erosion that were in row-crop production any 2 years during the period 1981 to 1985. CRP eligibility was expanded earlier this year to include wetlands and lands subject to scour erosion caused by out-of-bank flows of water.

Under CRP, landowners have the option to bid eligible lands into the program for 10-year period. The ASCS pays annual rental payments throughout the contract period of the bid price plus a one-time cost share to establish cover on the CRP acreage. The highest CRP bid price accepted in Mississippi to date has been \$45 per acre. Landowners can also lease CRP lands for hunting and receive additional monetary benefit.

Nationwide about 31 million acres have been enrolled in CRP, much of this highly erodible land in the Midwest. Agriculture officials hope to get 45 million acres enrolled by 1990. In Mississippi, about 650

thousand acres have been enrolled into the program and, of this, about 7 thousand acres are wetlands.

Expansion of the program to include wetlands is expected to improve enrollment in Mississippi and other states in the Lower Mississippi River Valley where over 2 million acres of eligible wetlands exist. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has agreed to assist the Soil Conservation Service personnel and landowners develop conservation plans for the enrolled lands. Two of the most popular conservation practices eligible for ASCS cost sharing on wetlands enrolled in CRP are Bottomland Timber Establishment on Wetlands (CP14) and Shallow Water Areas for Wildlife (CP9). Wetland restoration under CRP fits into the private lands initiative of the North American Waterfowl Management Plan.

Hay Harvest Slowed By Continued Rains

The more things change, the more they stay the same for hay growers in Mississippi. Heavy rains have limited the 1989 hay harvest to about the same small amount as last year's harvest during the drought.

Dr. Lamar Kimbrough, agronomist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, said the main difference this year is in the large amount of hay farmers have accumulated in the fields. The potential is greater this year, providing farmers eventually have enough dry weather to cut and harvest hay.

"On of the main concerns is that a lot of growth from summer grasses such as dallisgrass, bahiagrass and bermudagrass has accumulated and aged during wet weather," Kimbrough said. "As weather permits, this should be harvested, even though much of it will be

low in quality.

"If the weather trend changes in the middle of the summer, like last year's swing to wetter weather, cattlemen will not have to worry about hay amounts," Kimbrough said.

"The first cutting will be a poor quality-high in fiber, low in protein," he said. "The regrowth will make the second harvest a much better quality."

The agronomist said farmers need to realize much of the fertilizer nutrients will be removed with this growth and will need to be reapplied to the soil for later hay. He recommended growers take soil samples to make sure of exact fertilizer and lime needs.

Kimbrough said farmers who planted ryegrass had about three weeks of good harvesting weather in May, allowing for some of this year's hay in barns. But the summer grass hays are a different story.

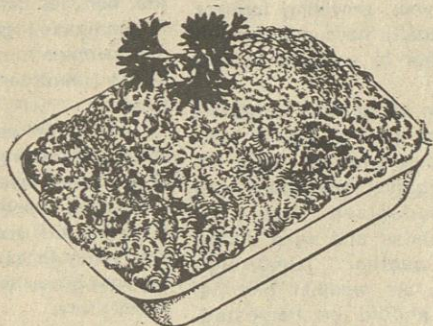

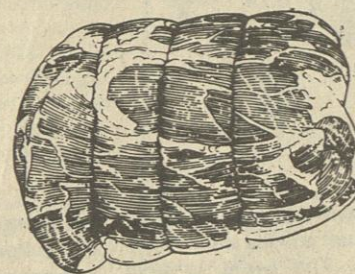

Cong. Whitten Gets Drug Bill Passed

"Mr. Speaker, this action was monumental, for among other provisions, it makes a concrete start to support law enforcement officials at the local level and to regain some control over the terrible drug situation which, if not corrected, will wreck this country," Congressman Whitten said.

The bill, now the law, provides \$75 million "To strengthen Federal domestic drug law enforcement at the local level for additional Assistant U.S. Attorneys, Deputy United State Marshals and other agents, including necessary equipment and supplies; initiate plans to acquire available military facilities for use as prisons or Civilian Conservation Corps type use for drug offenders; speed up planning for not less than three prisons in areas where most needed; and expedite the purchase of automatic data processing equipment to improve the exchange of information...and for fees of jurors and commissioners to strengthen drug law enforcement at the local level."

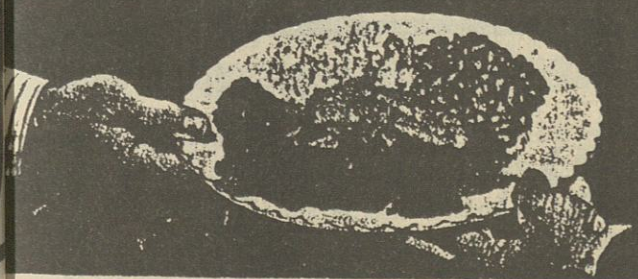

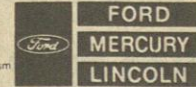

Beware! Sunshine Lovers

Folks used to buy sunburn lotions. Today, more and more, we buy "unburn" lotions -- about \$390 million-worth last year.

We're using sunscreens more as we see the cost of tanning getting a bit too steep, including a 93 percent increase in an often-fatal skin cancer called malignant melanoma, a kind of cancer that spreads from a mole-like patch on the skin. It killed nearly 6,000 people last year.

The sun's rays (or those of a tanning booth) can damage the elastin fibers of the skin, causing sagging, wrinkling and a weather-beaten look. More serious, however, is the link to cancers:

--Basal cell carcinoma, with some 400,000 a year, is in-

dicated by raised translucent nodules, often on the face, that crust, ulcerate and sometimes bleed.

--Squamous cell carcinoma, with 100,000 cases, is marked by pink nodules or patches.

--Malignant melanoma, the most deadly, appears as a brown-black patch, which eventually may crust or bleed. It's the most deadly, by far.

Generations ago, people wore hats in the sun and clothes of some coverage on the beach. And malignant melanoma, in particular, was less common. Doctors seldom saw people under 40 with the condition. Nowadays, patients in their 20s with melanomas are not unusual.

All skin cancers should be removed. Malignant melanomas are most likely to require extensive follow-up, including chemotherapy if the cancer has spread.

As a preventive measure, parents are using sunscreens on children -- and teens and adults are smearing it on, too. And SPF's, or sun protection factors, are becoming familiar: Used in sufficient quantity, a sunscreen with a 2 SPF permits no more sunburn in two hours than would occur in one hour with no sunscreen.

A 10 SPF extends safe exposure by ten-fold. The scale endorsed by the Food and Drug Administration goes up to an SPF of 15, according to a report in the June FDA Consumer magazine. Some manufacturers claim more, and FDA is evaluating whether these higher numbers are meaningful.

The federal Center for Disease Control has reported

that eye doctors, as well as skin doctors, are seeing patients burned by tanning booths. FDA does not recommend these booths, but recommends important precautions for those who nevertheless use them. One of the most important is the wear the protective goggles -- whether or not you keep your eyes closed.

The invisible ultraviolet rays in sunlight, as well as in tanning booths, can damage eyes. Manufacturers, in cooperation with FDA, are now labeling sunglasses regarding their degree of protection from these rays.

Pesticides, Germs & 'Licking The Pan'

If your biggest food worry is pesticides, you're probably worrying about next to nothing.

The Food and Drug Administration has just reported a year's tests on foods for pesticide residues:

More than 95 percent of the foods tested contained no violative or illegal residues.

Four out of five of the "violations" were technical -- an okay level of pesticide but found on the wrong crop, for example.

Less than 1 percent of the raw foods had residues above federal tolerances. Built-in margins of safety should ensure that even these breaches are not significant.

There's a myth that our foods are loaded with pesticides, and there's a myth that every residue is unsafe," said FDA Commissioner Frank E. Young, M.D., Ph.D. "Both myths are

false."

The newest findings are in a report compiled for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1987. That is the latest year for which complete figures on FDA's pesticide monitoring programs have been tabulated.

Besides checking raw foods, FDA each year analyzes foods cooked and otherwise prepared for consumption. FDA buys the foods in supermarkets, prepares them as they would be consumed, and then analyzes them in what is called FDA's Total Diet Study.

It shows that food preparation further reduces pesticide residues. In fact, they are so diminished they are generally less than 1 percent of the acceptable daily intakes established jointly by the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization and World Health Organization.

So what should you worry about? Germs: bacteria and viruses. They are naturally present in foods -- and grow when the food is not properly handled. The germs produce illness, FDA points out, when foods aren't fully cooked, or haven't been kept cold.

Unpasteurized milk should be avoided. Raw eggs, meats and seafoods pose a risk for many. The consequences -- again contrary to myth -- are not just an upset stomach and diarrhea. Food poisoning can produce arthritis, stillbirths and fatal liver damage.

Worry about that, and review your food handling and eating practices. (For example, because of Salmonella organisms increasingly being found in raw eggs, it's good to keep your kids from an old-fashioned treat -- the eating of the raw cookie dough, what we used to call "licking the pan.")

Worry too about eating too much, especially too much fat. Calories, along with germs and excess saturated fats -- these, not pesticides, are the real "Gotchas" in foods.

Impetigo & Children

How Contagious and How Serious?

Our newborn baby has developed several small blisters on her bottom. Her pediatrician said it is impetigo caused by staph bacteria and prescribed antibiotics for her. How serious is this infection? Can it spread to my older children?

Impetigo is a superficial infection of the skin that most often is caused by staphylococcus and less likely by streptococcus bacteria.

Staphylococcus is one of several types of bacteria that normally inhabits human skin, particularly in the nose and mouth. Most strains of staphylococcus are harmless, but under certain conditions, some can become pathogenic -- or harmful to the body -- and can cause a "staph infection."

Impetigo can range in appearance from a slight redness of the skin to oozy, crusty sores. The typical pattern of the infection in a child past infancy is that it begins around the nose or mouth in the form of blister-like lesions that break and dry up, forming honey-colored crusts. Antibiotics are usually necessary.

In a newborn baby, impetigo begins with a very delicate, small blister surrounded by reddened skin, usually in a moist place, such as the armpit or diaper area. The blister contains yellowish or white fluid and breaks easily, leaving a small raw spot. It is less likely to crust over in infants as it does in older children.

A person can get impetigo when an open cut or sore is exposed to bacteria. It can be contracted from someone else with impetigo or from bacteria that may be harmless to one person and harmful to another. In fact, impetigo in a newborn often

is caused by staph bacteria present in a hospital nursery. Members of the hospital staff who don't have an infection themselves nonetheless may transmit a virulent strain of the bacteria to their patients.

Once a child has impetigo, it spreads by direct contact with infected sores or anything touched by the sores, including linens and towels. The more raw the sore is and the more often a child touches it, the more easily the infection will spread to other parts of the body and to other people. That's why an older child with certain types of impetigo is probably considered more contagious than an infant with the infection. Older children aren't likely to get impetigo from a baby, however, unless they are helping with diaper changes or sharing the baby's towels.

Pediatricians usually obtain a culture of the infection by wiping the area with a cotton swab and sending the sample to a laboratory, where technicians identify the bacteria and determine which antibiotic is best suited to fight the infection. Occasionally, the infection will resist the antibiotic chosen, then either several others must be tried, or a long period of treatment must be followed before the infection will disappear.

In addition to administering oral antibiotics prescribed by a pediatrician, parents can help their baby's infection subside by keeping the blisters clean, applying antibiotic ointment and exposing the area to air as much as possible. One should be sure to carefully wash the hands before and after touching the infected area or wear gloves.

Impetigo disappears a few days after antibiotics are begun in most cases. However, it is still essential to finish the full course of treatment to make sure the infection is completely gone. In rare instances, a staph infection can settle in the bloodstream or an internal

organ, such as the lung, and cause serious illness.

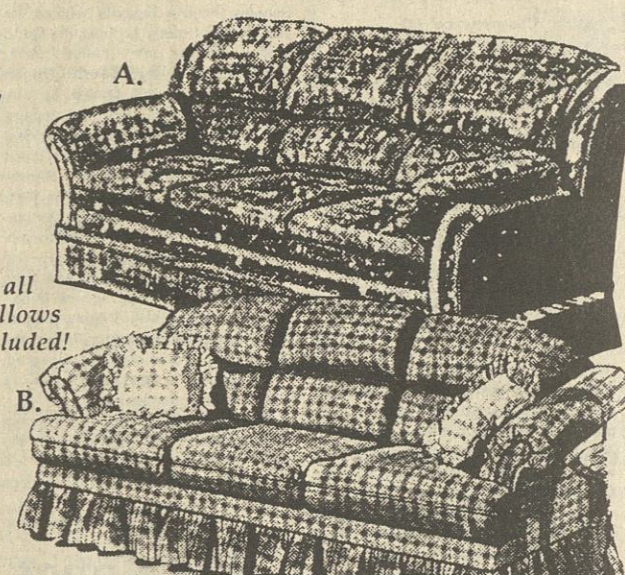
