Unemployment In County Dropped

The rate of unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to its lowest figure this year at mid-July. Charles Smith, Manager of the Employment Service, stated that the most recent statistics revealed that 16.2 percent of the civilian labor force was unemployed in Tishomingo County. This compares to 19.1 percent in June and 11.8 percent in July, 1988. There were 6,520 county residents employed at the reporting period, 70 more than in June but 130 less than in July, one year ago.

turing employment stood at 2,800, representing a slight decline over the month and a minimal increase over the year. Smith commented that a total of 57,500 workers were employed in the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo in July. This total was up 790 from June and 1,930 from July, 1988. The unemployment rate for the six-county area dropped to 9.6 percent, as compared at 11.6 percent last month and 10.7 percent one year ago. The civilian labor force was estimated to be 63,630, a decrease of 560 from June and 1,380 from July, 1988.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area experienced a decrease of 170 from June with a slight gain noted from one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment decreased by 100 from last month, experiencing a substantial increase of 880 from July, 1988.

All Night Detail — State law enforcement officers from throughout North Mississippi swarmed the Iuka Truck Scales Monday evening in an

effort to crackdown on trucking violations with spot checks on trucks both entering and leaving the state. The combined forces of the

Miss. Highway Patrol, Public Service Commission, State Tax Commission and State Narcotics Bureau were on hand to inspect in their particular fields. Some 100

tickets were written to 52 truckers in violation of state laws. Two drug detection dogs from Parchman and one dog from the M.H.S.P. were used to sniff out illegal drugs.

State Agencies Check For Truck Violations

Four law enforcement agencies of the State of Mississippi conducted a surprise roadblock at the Iuka Truck Scales on Hwy. 72 east near the Miss./Ala. State Line on Monday evening, August 28. Representatives of the Miss. Highway Safety Patrol, the State Tax Commission, the Public Service Commission and the Bureau of Narcotics assisted by a dog team from Parchman (Drug Detection Dogs) pulled over some 112 trucks for inspection.

The objective was to insure safety on Mississippi highways.

According to Staff Sergeant Mickey Baker, Public Affairs Trooper with the M.H.S.P., the truck inspection check came about after Lieutenant W. H. McGregor of the Tax Commission, Captain Johnny Kerr of the Highway Patrol and Major Mike Jones of the Public Service Commission joined their forces to conduct the two night spot checks,

which also included the Fulton Truck Scales on Sunday evening.

The roadblock and inspection of numerous trucks crossing the scales both at Iuka and Fulton led to 8 drug arrests including the confiscation of cocaine and some 40 grams of marijuana. During the six hour safety inspection in Iuka, officers were looking for equipment violations, improper license, drugs, alcohol, over weight, over length, improper fuel

permits, smugglers, and various other violations. Some 100 tickets were written to 52 drivers.

The four law enforcement agencies which work independent of each other in their own expertise areas with some functions overlapping will continue to work together to effectively enforce laws and will from time to time conduct roadblocks on both 4 lane and 2 lane highways.

Iuka Participates In Child Find Project

The Iuka School District is participating in a "Child Find" program for handicapped children. The program seeks to offer equal opportunities to children from birth through the age of 21 who may be handicapped. Handicapped children include those with developmental delays, mental retardation,

emotional handicaps, hearing impairments, language or speech impairments, physical handicaps, visual impairments of specific learning disabilities.

Any person or agency with knowledge of a handicapped child not receiving educational services should contact the district's child

find person, Jerry W. Harrelson, Program Developer, Special Ed Services, Iuka High School, 507 W. Quitman, Iuka, MS 38852, or phone 423-3206. The duties of the child find officer include coordinating the search for handicapped children, compiling a listing of those found and supervising the evaluation placement and providing of free and appropriate public education.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by the school district and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the Family Rights and Privacy Act. Parents are guaranteed the right to inspect any information about their child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without the parents' consent.

When a child is referred, the Local Survey Committee will gather information which enables them to determine whether the child needs additional evaluation and observation. This information will include vision and hearing screening results, a teacher narrative, and/or available information obtained from parents or agencies. The Local Survey Committee will meet to review this information and make one of three decisions. Either the child will remain in regular education, suggestions for a specific instructional intervention will be given the principal, or the child will be referred for a Comprehensive

Assessment. After a Comprehensive Assessment has been conducted, the Local Survey Committee will decide whether the child is handicapped. If it is felt that the child is handicapped, the Local Survey Committee will submit its recommendations along with the necessary documentation to a Regional Screening Team. If the Regional Screening Team decides that the child is eligible for a class for the handicapped, an Individualized Educational Plan will be developed, parental permission for placement will be obtained, and the child will be placed in an appropriate class within 30 days after the eligibility ruling.

Your assistance in helping the Iuka School District locate children, birth through 21 who may be handicapped will be greatly appreciated.

4-H Communicates

Extension 4-H Youth Agent FASHIONS FOR LARGE FIGURE TYPES

As the season begins to change and you look for that fall and winter wardrobe, these fashion tips may help you select outfits you will be pleased with for sometime to come.

Teenage girls with larger figure types can still be fashionable. The 4-H clothing project helps youth develop a positive image through careful use of styles and colors. These suggestions should help large girls find the styles appropriate to their size.

Avoid bulky fabrics. Choose fabrics that have enough body to avoid clinging, yet are smooth and drapable. Ideal fabrics are soft tweeds, challis, gabardines, poplins, stretch wovens and crepes.

Know how to choose prints and plaids. Avoid the largest and the smallest of prints and plaids. Neither extreme will be appropriate. Select subtle, simple designs of medium scale.

Keep surroundings in mind. Wear colors that blend with the background rather than those that stand out and define shape. Avoid extreme color contrasts in the fabric design; they create a spotty effect.

Select fabric and accessory colors that flatter personal coloring. Avoid stark colors such as all-white and all-black. Remember that light colors make the figure appear larger and dark colors make the figure appear smaller.

Create an illusion of height. Select fabrics and styles that have vertical emphasis. Avoid contrasting tops and bottoms and contrast at the waist. Use flattering contrasts near the face to create an illusion of height.

If short and plump, don't choose fuzzy, fluffy styles that add bulk. Loosely fitted, softly tailored fashioned provide a flattering fit.

If large and tall, choose loose fittings styles with simple lines that outline rather than define the body. Softly layered styles can be ideal for tall girls.

Keep clothes defined, but loosely fitted. Uncontrolled fullness exaggerates size because it creates a larger silhouette.

Simple trimmings and flat laces around collars and cuffs are appropriate. Tucks and pleats at the bust and hips cause an illusion of fullness and should be avoided by larger figure types.

the water passes. Depending on the type of water desired, the mineral content can be varied with certain additives.

NATURAL SPRING WATER seeps or "springs" to the earth's surface from underground aquifers. The water can be pushed upward by underwater pressure or through a bored hole. Spring water is quite flavorful as a result of the minerals it contains.

NATURAL WATER is bottled or vended spring, artesian well, or well water unmodified by mineral addition or depletion. However, natural water may be filtered and treated.

SPRING WATER comes from the same source as above. May have undergone some processing such as the addition of minerals.

ARTESIAN WELL WATER comes from a confined underground aquifer. Underground pressure forces the water to the surface in pipes drilled through the upper layer of rock.

MINERAL WATER usually contains large amounts of dissolved mineral salts, such as calcium, sodium, magnesium, or iron. Some mineral waters are tap waters with mineral and carbon dioxide added. Controversy exists among scientists about the benefits of drinking mineral water.

DISTILLED WATER is processed by heating and condensing the vapor. This product is free of most mineral water.

SPARKLING WATER is carbonated water which can be spring, well, or municipal tap water.

NATURALLY CARBONATED WATER means that the water is effervescent in its underground source. Club soda, seltzer, and other sparkling mineral waters are carbonated by manufactured carbon dioxide.

CLUB SODA is tap water that has been filtered and carbonated and to which minerals and mineral salts have been added.

SELTZER is usually tap water that is merely filtered and carbonated. Some brands claim to be "salt free", meaning that they contain no sodium ions.

PURIFIED WATER is water produced by distillation, deionization, reverse osmosis

or other methods.

SOFT WATER is water with a low mineral salt content.

HARD WATER is water with a high mineral salt content. It is determined by the amount of dissolved mineral particles (particularly calcium and magnesium) in the water. More than 100 parts per million indicates that the water is hard.

DEMINERALIZED WATER has been purified by any of a variety of processes, with the result that the mineral count is less than 10 parts per million.

ITALIAN STEAK & VEGETABLES

1 cup (8 oz.) Italian dressing
2-pound boneless chuck steak, 1-inch thick
1 can (16 oz.) whole tomatoes
1 pound fresh green beans
1 medium eggplant, cut into 1/2-inch slices
1 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced

In shallow baking dish, pour 1/2 cup Italian dressing over beef; cover and marinate in refrigerator, turning occasionally, at least 3 hours. Repeat procedure with remaining Italian dressing and vegetables.

In large skillet, brown beef; add beef marinade and simmer covered 45 minutes. Add tomatoes, beans and vegetable marinade and continue simmering, covered, 40 minutes. Add eggplant and simmer covered 20 minutes. During last 10 minutes of cooking add mushrooms. Makes about 6 servings.

ASCS Farm News

1989 DISASTER ASSISTANCE

County farmers suffering from 1989 crop losses due to disaster conditions beyond their control will soon be eligible to sign up for crop disaster benefits. Applications will be handled through the County ASCS Office. The date the sign-up is to begin has not been announced, but is expected in the very near future. Farmers should watch for this announcement in news releases and in newsletters published by the County ASCS Office.

Disaster application may be filed once a farmer has completed harvest of his crops and upon announcement of the beginning sign-up date. If his crops failed or if he was prevented from planting his crops and a later crop was planted on the same acreage, a disaster application may be filed upon completion of harvest of the later crop. In cases where the

entire crop failed or was prevented from being planted and no later crop was planted, an application may be filed immediately upon announcement of the beginning sign-up date.

Once the sign-up begins, County ASCS Offices will process payments as quickly as possible after producers provide the following forms and information:

1. CCC-441, Application for 1989 Disaster Benefits.
2. ASCS-578, Report of Acreage.
3. ASCS-574, Application for Disaster Credit.
4. ASCS-658, Record of Production and Yield.
5. AD-1026, Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation Certification.
6. CCC-440, Certification of Crop Insurance.
7. CCC-502, Farm Operating Plan.

Expedited payments will be issued by the later of 15 days after the complete application was filed or September 15, 1989, to producers who have harvested their 1989 crops or who did not replant failed and prevented planted acreage to another crop. These expedited payments will be issued to producers who provided the information listed above by September 30, 1989. Producers who sign up after September 30, 1989, will be paid within 30 days of the date the County Committee is furnished all necessary documentation and determines all eligibility requirements are met.

Producers will qualify for disaster payments if losses exceed:

- 35% of expected production for participating crops and peanuts with 1989 crop insurance,
- 40% of expected produc-

tion for participating crops and peanuts without 1989 crop insurance.

45% of expected production for soybeans and sunflowers,

-50% of expected production for nonparticipating program crops and non-program crops.

Producers must contact the ASCS Office before any

disaster affected destroyed.

Other specific details of this program will be made through County newsletters and the media as soon as possible.

THE GLAUCOMA RISK

If you are over 35 years of age, you should make it a point to have your eyes examined more frequently because of the risk of glaucoma. This eye disease usually occurs after middle age and is more easily detected than some other eye diseases. Left untreated, it can lead to blindness.

Basically, glaucoma is a disease in which the pressure inside the eye is higher than normal. This pressure may increase very slowly or may suddenly increase very dramatically, depending on the type of glaucoma. As the pressure increases, it affects all parts of the eye, in particular the delicate nerve fibers and blood vessels at the end of the

optic nerve. Prolonged pressure eventually kills the fibers of the nerve, the vital connection between your eye and your brain, resulting in blindness.

Your sight is important for many reasons and you should protect it. If you haven't had an examination recently, call your eye doctor for an appointment.

Cavity-Free Forever?

Q. Once someone has gotten past the teen years with few or no cavities, does that mean the danger is over?

A. No. First, there are long-term reminders of early decay. New decay often appears in later years around the edges of fillings, and longtime fillings sometimes wear out or fracture.

Other conditions in adulthood may lead to tooth decay:

- Eating sugary foods sets the stage for the decay process.
- People with dry mouth (xerostomia) are very susceptible to dental decay. Xerostomia may result from disease, medications, radiation therapy or may accompany aging.
- Receding gum tissue that exposes root surfaces can lead to decay.

Young adults who are going through the process of taking charge of their lives should bear in mind the need to schedule regular dental checkups. Even if they have gotten through the teen years with only one or two cavities - or none - regular checkups can help to keep their teeth and gums in sound condition and avoid major problems as the years go by.

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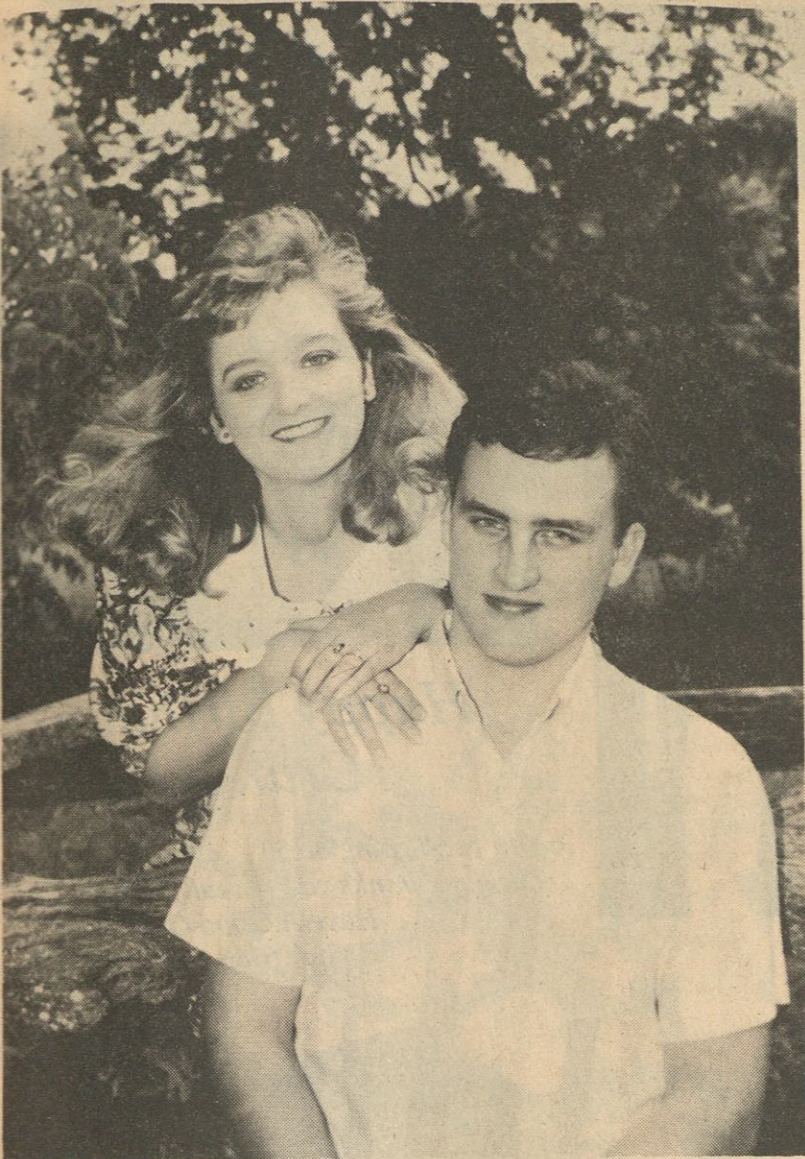

Little did Carol Austin realize as she slipped a shoebox full of old papers under her bed that she was handling the key to her future. It was a box that had come from her foster mother's estate. For several months the box remained unopened until one day Carol decided to have a complete carpet cleaning job.

Out came the shoe box and before throwing it away Carol began to check the contents. She came across an obituary of her blood mother's sister. Carol recognized the family name of her real mother. It was a touch of inspiration that caused her to show the card to her husband, Aubrey. "Check it out," he said.

Income Tax Course Popular Adult Education

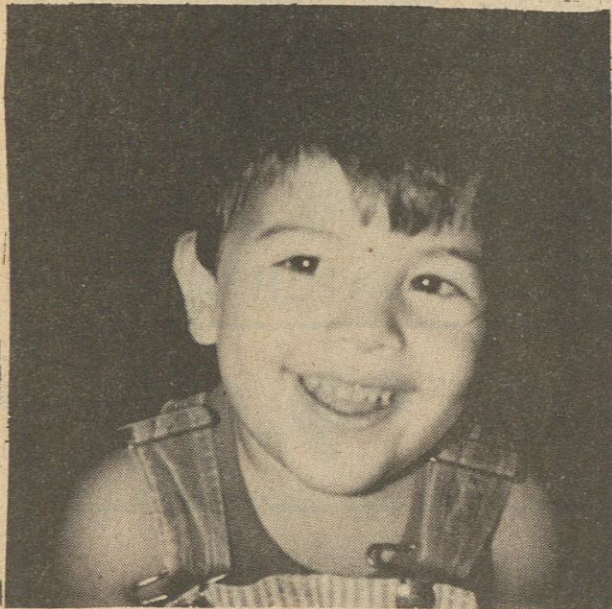

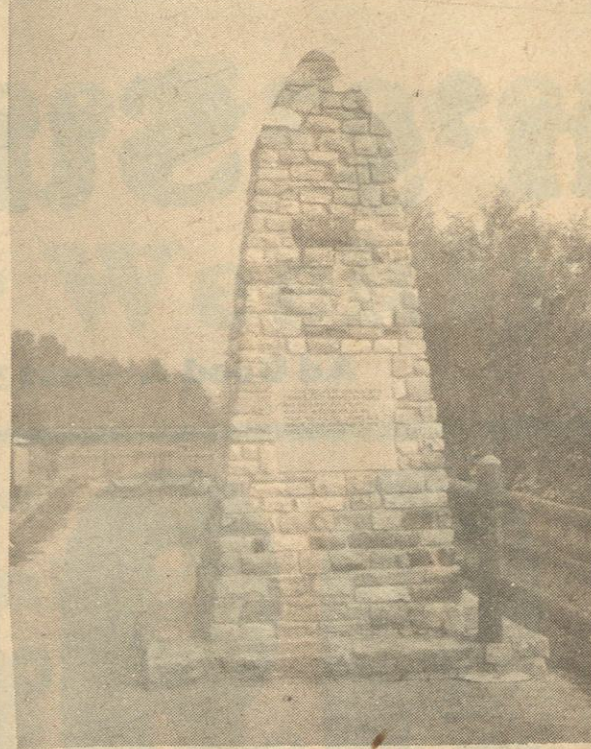

A topographic divide, is the technical term used to describe the Divide Cut on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway near the historic site of Holcut in Tishomingo County. It does not, however, fully define the magnificent view from the overlook of the Divide Cut of the Tenn-Tom.

Holcut gained a place in history, as the only town displaced by the construction of the Waterway. Former citizens of Holcut have acquired through diligent effort, as a memorial to the town, a picnic area for the enjoyment of all who venture to see the beautiful scene from atop the overlook situated where Holcut once stood.

The monument erected on the site gives a terse but complete history of the town of Holcut citizens. The dedication statement on the monument acknowledges the courage and love of its former citizens and expresses a wish that the loss of the town will benefit the entire area through greater opportunities for development. The small park is a great place for a family picnic.

Nearby is an area where viewing of the 175 foot deep cut through the red hills of Tishomingo County give a dynamic view of efforts to excavate for the waterway. Over 150 million cubic yards of earth were moved from the 39 mile long Divide Cut section - more than that excavated for the Suez Canal. A total of 350 million cubic yards were removed from the entire waterway, or nearly twice that removed for the construction of the Panama Canal, making Tenn-Tom the largest earth excavation project in history.

These two interesting sites are truly a requirement to see for those who are interested in the points of historic and scenic value. For those residents and visitors to Tishomingo County who have not already seen the Divide Cut Overlook and the Holcut Memorial, these sites offer a great opportunity for a pleasant afternoon outing.

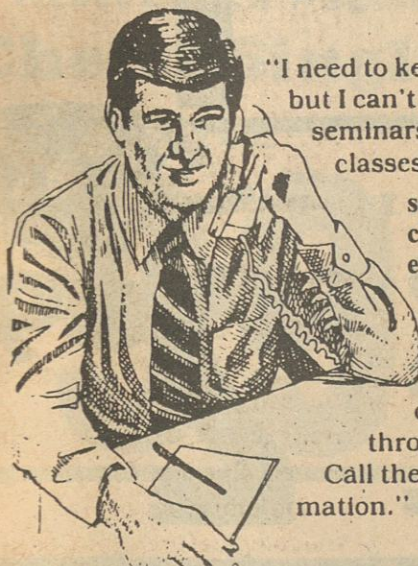

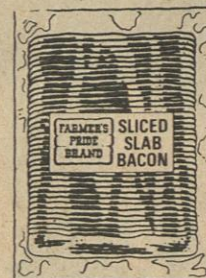

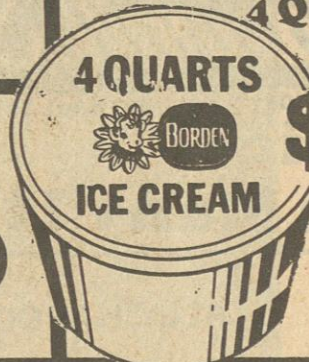

County Agent's Notes

TOO MUCH WATER
A tree can never have too much water, right? Wrong. It can, and in many cases will die from too much water. The unusually wet spring

and summer we have had in Tishomingo County this year has caused a decline in the health of many of our shade trees. Most trees and shrubs cannot sustain growth in waterlogged soil. Their roots use up all available soil oxygen. While the amounts of soil oxygen quickly go down, the levels of carbon dioxide rapidly build up. Iron and

manganese in soil become highly soluble and frequently reach toxic levels. Amounts of other toxic organic compounds accumulate when soil is waterlogged.

Tree and shrub roots lose their ability to absorb water and minerals, so the plant's uptake of these nutrients is severely hampered. It's ironic that even with plenty of water around, trees and shrubs exhibit symptoms of drought stress.

Trees and shrubs injured by excessive water also become more susceptible to disease. Water damage to roots makes an attack by the root rot fungus phytophthora easier to accomplish.

The Soybean Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Act, or SPARC, may soon become a reality.

Many of you may have heard our Tishomingo County

soybean farmers talk about SPARC, and have wondered what SPARC is.

SPARC is the result of a two-year study by soybean producers within the American Soybean Association. Legislation creating SPARC has been introduced in Congress this year. The bill would authorize a national soybean check-off program, much like the ones in the cotton, beef, pork and dairy industries in this country.

Soybean farmers would pay one-half percent (0.005) of the net market price per bushel of beans they produce to find a national research and promotion campaign for American-grown soybeans. If the bill is passed by Congress, soybean farmers would vote in a national referendum to decide the fate of SPARC.

A SAFE HARVEST
Even if it's a bumper crop in Tishomingo County, it's

still a bust if someone is hurt while trying to harvest it. Make safety a priority, from the first swath until the last kernel is dropped in the bin.

Read and heed the words-to-the-wise in safety manuals and instructions. Equipment should be serviced and repaired before starting, not when you're already in the field. Check fuel lines, filters and other systems for leaks and potential malfunctions.

Train new workers so they know proper procedures for safe operation of equipment. Many accidents occur during the first few days of harvest, so be especially careful while getting harvesting equipment to function.

Remember to wear the appropriate protective clothing to reduce injury and health risk. Take occasional breaks to fight fatigue. You'll have better energy and concentration. You'll find you can work longer hours without so much strain.

Mississippi Ranks Second In CRP Tree Planting

Mississippi ranked second only to Georgia in tree planting under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), according to a recent report released by the U.S. Forest Service Region 8 headquarters in Atlanta. Georgia ranked tops nationally in CRP tree planting with 569,000 acres.

Landowners in Tishomingo County signed up for planting trees on 1415 acres of highly erodible, former cropland out of a total of 371,358 acres since the CRP program began. An additional 340 acres enlarged that total after completion of the ninth sign-up period, July 17 - August 4.

The federally funded CRP program is administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). The Mississippi Forestry Commission

provides on-the-spot technical forestry assistance for landowners in the program.

The Forest Service showed that 58 percent of CRP acres accepted in the program in Mississippi involved reforestation. State signed up a total of 664,256 acres in the program. Owners will receive an annual rental on retired acres for ten years.

"We are very pleased the way Mississippi landowners have responded to the CRP program," said Forester, Sid Moss. "The soils will now begin to erode and highly erodible soils will now begin to fill in our bottoms with silt. These planted forests provide a tremendous source of income for their owners."

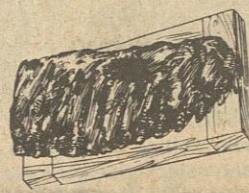

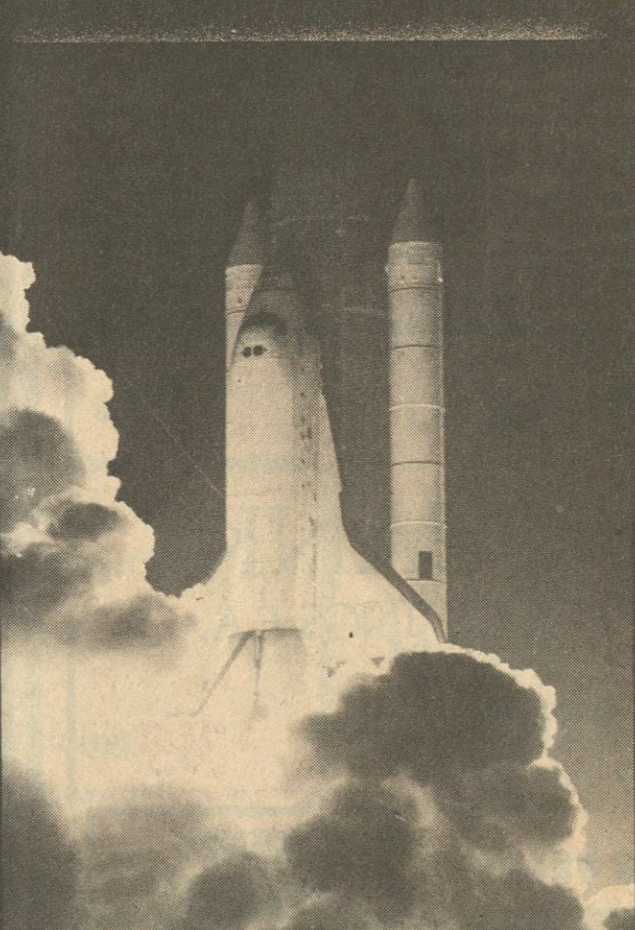

"Write More, Learn More"

The University of Mississippi is among the first in the nation to host a "Write More, Learn More" workshop, an innovative new program designed to improve student performance in all academic subjects through writing.

Thirty teachers representing 13 public school districts across North Mississippi attended the three-day workshop held recently at the Oxford campus. Represented were DeSoto, North Panola, South Panola, Tunica, Union, Tishomingo and Lafayette county schools as well as Holly Springs, Water Valley, Senatobia, and Grenada city schools.

The workshop was sponsored by the Ole Miss School of Education Staff Development Consortium in collaboration with area school districts. Phi Delta Kappa national education honorary disseminates the "Write More, Learn More" program and provides the necessary training for teachers who buy into the program.

"A central idea of 'Write More, Learn More' is that writing is an excellent teaching tool. Whereas students can tune-out a class discussion, they must be fully engaged in a topic in order to write about it. They also remember what they write more easily than they remember what they hear. Writing more frequently also helps improve the students' writing skills," said Dr. Lucius Williams, associate dean of education and program coordinator.

Dr. Williams saw the program demonstrated in New Orleans and was so impressed that he initiated steps to bring it to North Mississippi.

"I was able to get Phi Delta Kappa to send a representative here to demonstrate the program to area school superintendents. As a result of their demonstration, several of the school districts agreed to pay the costs for a three-day training program," said Williams.

Dove Season Begins Sept. 2

The Labor Day weekend signals a time of rest and recreation. For many, recreation comes in the form of dove hunting, and if efforts are successful, cooks who might be at rest will be put to work.

According to statistics from the Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation, hunters harvested more than 3 million morning doves during the 1988 season, and that's a full measure by anybody's measure.

For Mississippi hunters, the 1989 dove season opens 30 minutes before sunrise on September 2. The first of three seasons will close Sept. 24. The second season runs from Oct. 14 through 28. The third season is Dec. 24 through Jan. 14.

Hunters need a valid state hunting license, permission to hunt on private land, current regulations for hunting on public land in their area and a shotgun that will hold no more than three shells. There is a daily bag limit of 15 birds.

The cook who is trusted with the day's harvest will need, depending on the method of cooking, various spices and food staples.

Nelda Starks, nutrition education specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, said doves are a versatile meat for

cooking. "Before cooking, though, the birds should be thoroughly cleaned and soaked in a solution of salty water 15 to 20 minutes," Starks said. "If the birds are shot up pretty badly, add about 1 tablespoon of vinegar per quart of water when soaking."

"After soaking, wash in cold water and dry well. If you don't plan to cook the game immediately, wrap in foil and freeze. But plan to cook the meat within three months," she said.

The most popular methods of preparing and serving doves are fried, roasted, baked, barbecued, braised or baked in foil with vegetables.

Starks said to fry doves for six to eight people, the preparer will need 14 to 16 doves, salt and pepper, flour, salad oil and vinegar or sherry.

"Salt, pepper and flour doves. Brown them in oil in a heavy skillet until crisp on both sides. Sprinkle about 1 tablespoon of vinegar or sherry over each bird and cover the skillet," she said. "Reduce heat and simmer until tender. Remove cover and cook a few more minutes. Take birds out of skillet and drain well. Brown gravy can then be made from the oil."

Baked doves is a simple but tasty method of preparation too. For "Dove Delicious," split birds down the back. Boil them for 15 minutes, then place a sliced of butter and one-half slice of a 1 1/2-inch slice of onion inside each dove. Salt and pepper to taste. Wrap each dove in foil and cook for 30 to 45 minutes at 400 degrees F. Serve in foil.

This recipe can be taken a step further by placing the unwrapped doves in a saucepan with gravy and let simmer until gravy is thick enough to serve.

More information on preparing Mississippi game is available from local extension home economists.

TVA Board Freezes Rates

Electric rates in the Tennessee Valley will remain stable in 1990, the first time in 18 years that TVA rates have remained unchanged over a two-year period, the TVA Board announced today.

"Stable electric rates are perhaps the greatest contribution TVA can make to the economic well-being of this region," TVA Chairman Marvin Runyon said. "The reaction of the ratepayers to our success has been overwhelmingly positive. Every TVA employee should be proud of this accomplishment."

The TVA Board met in Chattanooga today to approve the "no rate increase" plan for the second consecutive year as part of the agency's three year goal to keep power rates stable.

TVA Chief Financial Officer William F. Malec made a brief statement which confirmed data presented during last month's preliminary rate review, when he recommended no rate increase. "I am pleased to report that no adjustments are required to our existing rates," Malec said.

In a live address broadcast by satellite to TVA facilities across the Valley, the Board congratulated employees for their contributions in fulfilling the second installment on TVA's three-year goal not to raise rates.

"When we set our three year, no-rate increase goal, many thought it would be impossible to meet it for even one year," said TVA director C.H. Dean, Jr. "But our employees proved them wrong and have come up with key suggestions that contributed to making our goal."

"With two years down and one to go, we know we can count on TVA employees to help meet the third year of our no-rate-increase goal," TVA Director John Waters said. "This shows what you can accomplish through teamwork."

"The results of our success are evident in the response we are seeing in the business sector," Runyon said. "Since we set TVA's three year rate goal, more than 400 firms have announced plans to locate or expand in the Tennessee Valley. That adds up to an estimated \$5.9 billion in new investment...and more

than 28,000 new jobs."

In his 1990 rate review presentation to the TVA Board last month, Malec reported that:

"TVA power revenue will be about \$5.4 billion - an increase of about 2 percent over this year."

"Operating expenses are expected to be almost \$3.4 billion \$43 million more than this year's. This is a 1 percent increase in operating expenses to achieve a 6 percent increase in power generation."

"Fuel and power supply costs will decline from this year's 1.26 cents per kilowatt-hour to 1.22 cents."

"Interest charges will be \$1.7 billion, \$112 million less than 1989 interest charges."

TVA's power program is completely financed by power revenues and receives no funds from the Federal government.


TVA has 11 coal-fired plants, 29 hydroelectric plants, five licensed nuclear units, and a total installed generating capacity of about

32,000 megawatts. Four additional nuclear units are in various stages of completion. TVA serves 3.2 million customers in an 80,000 square mile service area comprised of Tennessee and portions of six other states.

Vocational Rehabilitation's Independent Living program assists Mississippians with severe disabilities in reducing their physical and psychological dependence on others. The primary means of achieving this is by mainstreaming these individuals into society by providing services that allow people with

disabilities to participate in varied community activities (including employment) as well as to take greater control of their lives.

But how does Independent Living do this?

Independent Living stresses the development of basic skills needed to function self-sufficiently - skills such as money management, social adaptation, disability acceptance, independent medical management, and self-advocacy skills. Independent Living Centers also help with attendant care, devices to assist those with misshapen or missing limbs, housing modifications like wheelchair ramps and widened doorways, and therapeutic recreation.

A major benefit of the Independent Living Program is the peer counseling and guidance provided by staff members who themselves are disabled. The personal experiences that a counselor brings to the client/counselor relationship are unique yet pave the way for common ground that the two share with all people with disabilities. As Daryl Dunaway, Director of the Division's Skilled Training Program and a previous counselor with the Independent Living Program, points out, "We are here to provide a positive role model. We are

living proof that we (disabled people) can have successful, productive, and content lives."

Genesco Celebrates 65th Anniversary
Genesco celebrated its 65th anniversary on Saturday, August 5, 1989. The Iuka Plant (formerly known as the

Tishomingo Shoe Company) began training operations Wednesday, November 2, 1955 with 10 employees learning the first steps in making shoes. Actual production

began on Monday, November 7 with approximately 35 employees. The plant was one of the most modern shoe manufacturing plants in the United States, with ap-

proximately 50,000 square feet of manufacturing space. Today, there are approximately 295 people employed at Genesco in Iuka, with 26 original employees still in the plant.

Genesco Celebrates 65th Year In Business

1924-1989

On Saturday, August 5, Genesco celebrated our 65th year of operation. From those early days of the Jarman Shoe Company, to the General Shoe Corporation, to Genesco—we've been through a lot. There have been some good times and bad times. But, I believe the best is truly yet to come.

Looking back over the past three years, in particular, we've seen Genesco make tremendous progress in improving our operations. We've made several organizational changes, such as our decentralization, which have strengthened Genesco and our divisions.

I see a new Genesco today. We've successfully combined our rich heritage and tradition with new ways of operating and managing our company.

I'm proud that this company, in an industry that has changed significantly over the years, can celebrate reaching 65 years. I hope you are too.

And, I'm proud of each of you who are directly responsible for our past and recent successes. You all are to be commended for your loyalty and commitment to this company and the results you have achieved.

I salute each of you. Please accept my congratulations for what we've accomplished together.

I am full of optimism for Genesco as we move into a new era. While 65 is a year of retirement for some, for Genesco it's a beginning.

Enjoy our 65th Anniversary Celebration. And keep in mind... this is a new Genesco...and the best is yet to come.

1924-Jarman Shoe Company

Jarman Shoe Company was founded in Nashville, TN in August 1924, as a partnership, by James Franklin Jarman and William Hatch Wemyss.

In July 1925, the Company was incorporated under the name of Jarman Shoe Company.

1930-1932 In the early part of 1930, the first company-operated Jarman retail store opened in Louisville, KY.

Our trucking operation began in 1930 as a scheduled short haul fleet operation between Genesco plants. This was the forerunner of our GTS/Gencon operations.

1933-General Shoe Company In 1933, with the new Fortune line having been added the year before, and with other additions in mind, the decision was made to change the name of Jarman Shoe Company to General Shoe

Company. J.F. Jarman became Chairman of the Board of Directors, and W. Maxey Jarman (his son) became President.

The Dominion line was introduced in 1935 to handle private brand orders for large concerns.

In a new vacation plan, employees with five years of service received a week's vacation with pay. We also started work on our hospitalization and group insurance plans. A Credit Union was organized.

In 1938, James Franklin Jarman, the founder, first President and Chairman of the Board of Directors of General Shoe Company, passed away.

In 1939, the common stock of General Shoe Corporation was listed on the New York Stock Exchange, and the Company became a public company.

1940-1949

A plant was constructed in Hohenwald, TN in 1940 to manufacture children's shoes.

Whitehall Leather Company was purchased in 1944 from Eagle-Ottawa Leather Company.

In August, 1945, we produced our 100 millionth pair of shoes, after 21 years of operation.

Production started in the completed Waynesboro, TN plant in 1948. General Shoe had progressed to the point of making 15,397,203 pairs annually. Where it once required 21 days to complete a pair of shoes, we could now do it in 5 days. By this time, there were approximately 11,000 employees.

1950-1959 Plans were made and a new location acquired for replacing our small plant at Danville, KY with a new modern one.

In August 1951, the Johnston & Murphy Company of Newark, NJ was purchased. This company had been in business for 101 years and had a splendid reputation for producing the best quality men's shoes in the country.

The Company began to feel that its future operations would be covering such a wide area of producing and retailing of various types of merchandise that its name should be changed, so in 1959 we became:

GENESCO

Also in 1959, we acquired one of the country's leading manufacturers of men's clothing in the upper middle-price bracket—L. Greif & Bros. of Baltimore.

1960-1969

To meet the needs of ever growing demands during 1963, Genesco continued to improve and enlarge present manufacturing facilities and

constructed new ones, including a men's clothing factory in Verona, VA and a shoe manufacturing plant in Waynesboro, TN.

W. Maxey Jarman retired in 1969. He had been with the Company since its founding and had served as Chief Executive Officer since 1932. As a result of his retirement, Frankling M. Jarman (grandson of James F. Jarman, founder) was appointed Chairman of the Corporation.

1970-1979 Tennessee Leather Company (what is known presently as Volunteer Leather) in Milan, TN was acquired in 1970.

In March of 1971, Genesco made apparel history when it introduced the first laser beam cloth cutter in its L. Greif plant in Fredericksburg, VA. This new machine, known as the Lasermatic, has been called the most important advance in apparel manufacturing since the development of the sewing machine. It would ultimately be used in all types of apparel and footwear.

In 1978, Genesco was organized in three sectors: footwear, non-footwear, and men's apparel. The primary emphasis in the wholesale business was on the development of our own brands.

1980-1989

The next few years saw Genesco becoming a smaller Company with the sale of several companies. In April, 1980, Richard W. Hanselman joined us as president and chief operating officer, and would ultimately become Chairman of Genesco in 1984.

Also in 1981, Genesco acquired certain assets of Mitre Sports (U.S.), giving us exclusive rights to manufacture Mitre soccer shoes and market them along with Mitre balls and related athletic equipment.

John L. Hanigan retired from the chairmanship of the board of directors of the Company on April 30, 1984. Richard Hanselman, who subsequently became chairman, resigned in 1985 and William S. Wire, II became our new Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer.

Hello - I hope everyone is tolerating the summer heat all right. I have been extremely busy this summer. In the last week and a half I have been back and forth to Jackson three times. My once new, three & half year old car now has 123,000 miles on it. So I have been traveling to meetings. I am enjoying the work, and we are preparing legislation for the upcoming session in January. If any of you have legislation or ideas for legislation - give me a call. We will get it prepared and pre-filed. We are all hoping for a productive year.

This summer several new laws took effect that were past in the 1989 legislative session. Drug peddler arrested within 1500 feet of elementary and secondary school buildings now face double the criminal penalties/or violating drug laws. If there is a subsequent violation, a drug seller could suffer three times the normal penalty. In addition, the law provides that anyone who is 21 or over will face a mandatory life sentence, without parole, if convicted of two large-scale drug sales within a 12-month period.

On the economic development side, income tax credits are offered to business for creating new jobs in Mississippi. This series of economic development bills

has been held by economic development specialist as the most aggressive set of economic programs set forth by any state.

The general statute of limitations for filing damage suits was released from six to three years. The doctrine of joint and several liability in cases involving more than one defendant was limited to 50 percent liability. The legislation now allows judges to fix interest rates on a judgement and provides for a two-year statute of limitations for medical malpractice cases involving children to start to run when the child reaches age 6 rather than 16. Furthermore, the law prohibits filing, out-of-state suits in Mississippi if the statute of limitation has expired in the state where the alleged wrong occurred.

Other laws: make it illegal in Mississippi to operate an automatic telephone dialing-announcing device for the purpose of making a sales pitch; crash down on car theft-

ts by making it a felony to operate "chop shops" where vehicles are dismantled and parts then sold; require insurance companies to give at least 30 days written notice before canceling liability or fire insurance policies and establish a student loan program to assist people wishing to study nursing and other health care fields where a critical need exists.

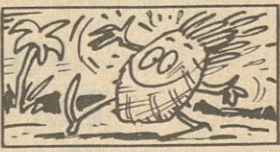
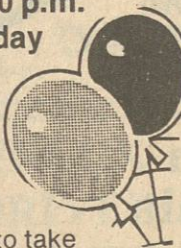

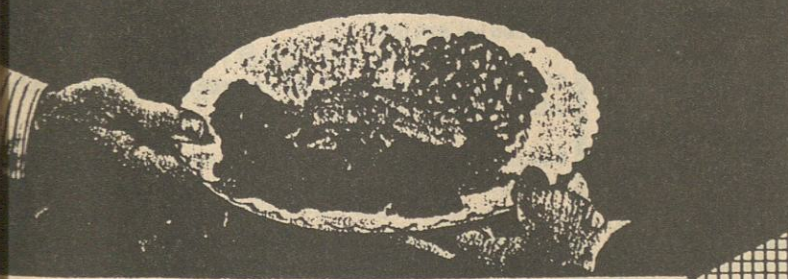

Beware Holiday Drivers

More than 100 extra troopers will be on the road over the Labor Day weekend to help ensure the safety of Mississippians as they celebrate the holiday.

"We will have 104 additional troopers augmenting our normal force during the Labor Day observance," said Col. David R. Huggins, assistant commissioner of public safety and chief of the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

"This will result in approximately 1,650 additional manhours being worked during the 78-hour holiday period," he said.

"These officers will be vigorously enforcing the

posted speed limits and Mississippi's amended driving under the influence (DUI) law which provides stricter penalties for violators. Under the amended law a violator may be charged with felony upon a fourth or subsequent DUI conviction," said Huggins.

During the Labor Day observance in 1988 the patrol arrested 316 persons for DUI.

The stepped up manpower is being made available to the patrol through federally funded 'call back' details. Under the call back program, officers who would normally be off duty are paid with federal funds secured through the Public Safety Planning division of the Department of Public Safety.

These funds will also provide fuel for the aircraft that will be used during the Labor Day holiday period to

aid in speed enforcement.

"Our trooper-pilots will use surveillance aircraft during the weekend to identify speeding vehicles through the time-distance principle of detection," Huggins said.

Identifying speeding vehicles from aircraft involves clocking the number of seconds it takes a vehicle to travel between the airplane silhouettes painted on specific highways. There are more than 40 sites across Mississippi where troopers can detect speeding motorists from aircraft using this method of measurement.

"Also included in our enforcement efforts will be the use of a device that may bring a shock to motorists who rely on radar detectors or other innovative means to get away with exceeding the speed limit," said Huggins.

"Our troopers will be using

a speed monitoring computer during the Labor Day weekend called VASCAR (Visual Average Speed Computer and Recorder) which is non-radar detectable.

"Since VASCAR gives off no signal it makes radar detectors useless, thus enabling our officers to catch even the 'professional' speeder," said Huggins.

Records show that during the 1988 Labor Day observance seven people lost their lives in automobile crashes. Six of the seven fatal accidents which occurred were one vehicle accidents and six of the seven people who were killed were not wearing seat belts.

"Studies show that the use of seat belts is 50 to 60 percent effective in preventing death and serious injuries that result from automobile crashes. We hope that

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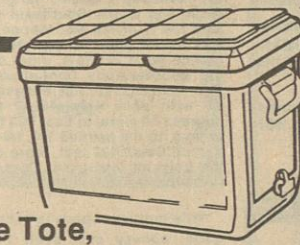
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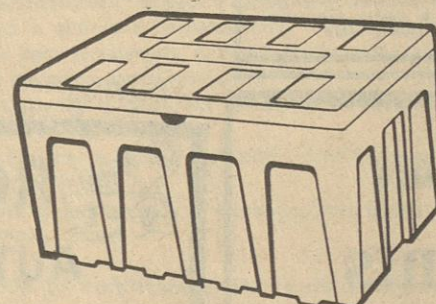


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
