NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK

President Bush has declared September 17-23, 1989 as National Farm Safety Week. In recognition of this proclamation, today's column concerns farm children and their safety.

Farm parents need to be aware of the special safety and health hazards their children face. These hazards include powerful machinery, tools and chemicals, animals and vehicles traveling at high speeds on rural roads.

The main factor which produces a potentially dangerous environment for farm children is the close proximity of workplace hazards to the home. Farm children face virtually the same workplace dangers their parents face.

To help farm parents prevent injuries and deaths to their children, the National Safety Council offers these safety tips:

- Don't allow unsupervised children around tools, machinery, large animals or other potential dangers.
- Place warnings decals in all dangerous areas and explain to children that the labels mean they should stay away.
- When you drive, fasten children into approved child

safety seats.

- Install smoke detectors and fire extinguishers in your home.

- Never leave a small child unsupervised in or near water.

- Keep such toxic chemicals as cleaners, medicines, paints, pesticides and animal care products locked up.

- Consider young workers' limitations when assigning jobs.

- Provide young workers with personal protective equipment like safety goggles if the job conditions call for it.

- Learn first aid and CPR, Post emergency numbers near every telephone and teach children how to call for help.

Teaching children a common sense approach to potential dangers can improve their response in an emergency. The 4-H safety project helps 4-H'ers to recognize safety hazards around the home and farm. Chatting With Your Home Economist

NUTRITIONAL AFTER-SCHOOL SNACKS

Schools are back in session and after-school snacks are a daily routine. Nutrition studies indicate that the diets of our school-age and teenage children are often low in several very important nutrients. These nutrients include vitamins A and C, calcium and iron. Through careful planning, after-school snacks can be an ideal way to increase these nutrients in their diets.

With many dual career households, an adult may not be at home in the afternoon. It is important to leave a note as to what snacks are available. Young people need direction and encouragement to select nutritious snacks and develop sound nutritional habits.

Have a "snack spot" in the refrigerator so the children know where to look for snacks or ingredients to prepare their own snack.

Limit snacking on foods such as candies, chips, rich pastries, cakes, pies and soft drinks. It is not necessary to eliminate these foods entirely—just use moderation and establish rules as to how often they can be eaten.

After-school snacks should be eaten as early as possible. The snacks may be nutritious and help in increasing the nutrients low in their diets, but if the child in turn does not eat supper, you may not have helped their daily nutrient intake.

Some examples of nutritious after-school snacks include:

Fresh Fruit: Fruits are good sources of vitamins A and C. Use sliced or whole apples,

oranges, peaches, melons, grapes, bananas, apricots, berries or pineapple. Prepare a yogurt dip, or serve with cottage cheese. This not only adds variety but also adds calcium.

Vegetable Snacks: Vegetables are good sources of vitamins A and C. Cut up fresh, raw vegetables such as celery, carrots, green beans, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower or whatever they like. Raw vegetables and dip are a good way to get children to eat vegetables they won't eat cooked. Served with a favorite dip, they may even consider them better than chips and much more nutritious.

Milk Products: The milk group is an ideal way to increase the calcium in the daily diet. Fruit milkshakes or frozen yogurt-fruit juice are a way to increase the calcium and vitamins in their diet. Cheese of all types also makes excellent snacks.

Meat Group: Meats, although not the only food source, provide the needed iron for the diet. Leftover meats from dinner cut in chunks and served with cheese squares is an all-time favorite. Hard cooked eggs are convenient and provide an excellent source of dietary iron.

Breads and Cereals: The bread and cereal group can provide a significant source of protein, vitamins and minerals. Encourage the use of whole-grain breads and crackers. Serve plain or with cheese or peanut butter. Try a variety of quick breads and muffins with whole grains and/or fruit or vegetables. Pumpkin, zucchini or sweet potato breads are examples of vegetable breads. Fruit breads might include banana, strawberry, apple or blueberry muffins.

Twice-Baked Potatoes

8 medium baking potatoes
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 can (11 ounces) condensed cheddar cheese soup
1 tablespoon chopped dried chives
Paprika
Bake potatoes until done. Cut potatoes in half lengthwise; scoop out insides leaving a thin shell. With electric mixer, mash potatoes with butter and salt. Gradually add soup and chives; beat until light and fluffy. Spoon into shells. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in 2 1/2 quart shallow baking dish (13x9x2") at 450°F. for 15 minutes or until hot. Makes 8 servings.

Farm Borrowers Invited To Meeting

Tishomingo County farmers with loans from the Farmers Home Administration are invited to a meeting on September 21, 1989 on how FmHA's computer program is used in considering loan servicing options such as rescheduling and writedowns, FmHA County Supervisor Billy D. McClure, said today.

The meeting will be at 1:30 p.m. at the Courthouse in Ashland, Mississippi. Billy D. McClure said the meeting is particularly important for FmHA borrowers behind in their payments and those having difficulty with their loans.

"We will go over all the options available to those borrowers and explain how to go about finding one that will keep them in operation," Mr. McClure said. "We will be putting emphasis on the Debt and Loan Restructuring (DALRS) computer program that was developed just for this purpose."

Mr. McClure said DALRS

does many mathematical calculations quickly and in a number of combinations in helping in the analysis of farm financial plans.

"If a restructuring plan exists that will keep the borrower on the farm, DALRS will find that plan, and that plan will minimize the cost of

WHAT IS VISION THERAPY?

Vision therapy refers to any type of treatment procedure geared to correct faults in the vision system. Such a fault may be a conspicuous crossed eye, an unsuspected amblyopic ("lazy") eye, reading difficulties, poor eye coordination, marginal depth perception, etc. The treatment may involve nothing more than spectacles worn as directed, or it may require prism glasses, bifocal glasses, eye patching, light stimulation, or eye exercises.

The term "exercise" is used for lack of a better one, but it should not be

thought of as calisthenics. Since eyes are never at rest but always moving, twelve muscles innervate the eyes. (Even during sleep there is much movement.) Vision therapy eye exercises are designed to alter the way the eyes work. Gradually, the signals are sent in the right order, and proper interpretation.

The First Permanent Teeth

Q. When do a child's first permanent teeth begin to appear?

A. The lower front teeth, or central incisors, may erupt as early as age 6 or 7. Upper front teeth usually follow at age 7 or 8. Among the earliest permanent teeth are the first molars, upper and lower. They may erupt at age 6 or 7. By age 13 most children generally have all of their permanent teeth, except for the third molars (wisdom teeth) which typically emerge between age 17 and 21.

Periodic dental checkups are important throughout these stages, to determine if the teeth are coming in straight and in proper position or if they present any problems that need early attention. The early appearing first molars, for example, help shape the lower part of the face and can affect the position and health of other permanent teeth soon to appear.

Despite agriculture's high work-accident death rate, traffic accidents are still the leading killer of farm workers. Drinking and driving, failure to wear safety belts, increased speed and unsafe road conditions cause this problem.

Make every mile in Tishomingo County a safe one. Keep cars and trucks in good operating condition. Buckle safety belts regardless of whether you are a driver or passenger. Give other drivers the benefit of the doubt at intersections.

Give signals when turning and obey traffic laws. Moderation and good judgement should be the rule when alcohol is consumed. Decisions to avoid drinking and driving can promote safety for everyone.

Drive with care every day of the year.

CHAIN SAW SAFETY

It's almost fall, and that means many homeowners in Tishomingo County are

making plans to cut wood for the winter.

Lumberjacks and professional chain saw operators know that correctly using the saw helps get the job done faster, easier and safer.

Practice the correct and safe use of a chain saw. The saw is dangerous when used improperly. Risking a saw cut or a felling accident is just not worth it.

Prepare for the job at hand. Know how to operate the saw before it is used. Read and understand the operator's manual. Know what types of safety clothing to wear.

Heavier, tighter-fitting clothes, safety shoes, a bump cap and eye goggles go a long way in protecting the operator from harm. Ear plugs also help because they guard against hearing loss when the saw is operated for a lengthy period.

Avoid saw fires by fueling the saw away from other fires or cigarettes. Never put fuel in a hot saw. Wipe spilled fuel before cranking.

Carry the saw with the motor stopped, blade to the

rear and muffle away from the body. These precautions help the carrier avoid and burns while moving saw.

Correct saw operation does not come naturally. Follow these tips can help you using a chain saw become a "pro" at it.

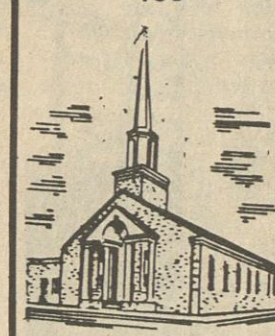

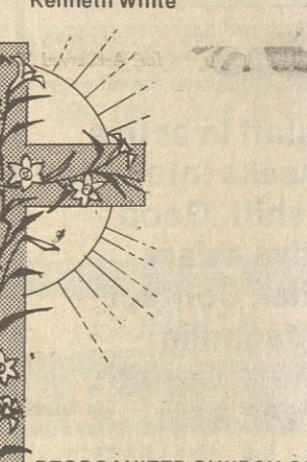

Mrs. Mary Williams was appointed Empathy Chairman. The door prize was won by Mrs. Patsy Pace.

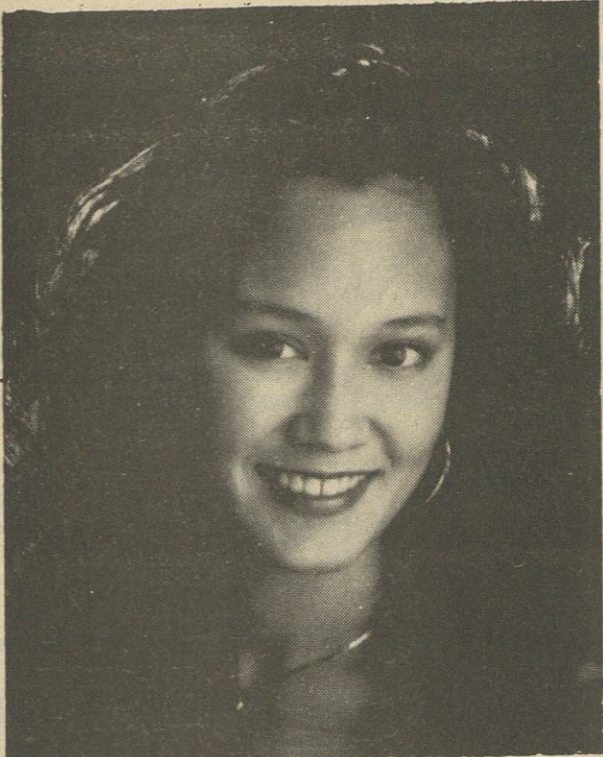
