The Pilot Club will be on hand to assist with the paperwork and questions during these hours. By assisting the Tishomingo County Welfare office per-

sonnel in the completion of the paperwork and preparing a list of the needs of the citizens of Tishomingo County, the Pilots hope to ease the burden and provide a much needed service to the county. The Pilot Club plans to sponsor an "Angel Tree" for needy children this year, similar to the trees sponsored by the Salvation Army in larger cities. With the cooperation of the churches and other interested citizens in the county, the Pilots hope that all needs of the county citizens can be provided.

Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Department of Human Services announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture Surplus Commodities will be distributed Wednesday, October 18, 1989, beginning at 8:00 A.M. Households receiving Food Stamps receive their food stamps with their food stamps. All other certified households (self declared income) will have their food stamps mailed October 3, 1989, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households that do not receive a voucher will need to come to the Welfare Office to have their certification updated. Anyone

wishing to make an application may apply anytime between now and the 18th. Eligibility is based on income. Misrepresentation of need, or sale or exchange of USDA Commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex or handicap. The following items are scheduled to be distributed, but is subject to change: 2 Butters, 1 Meal, 2 Canned Pork, 1 Peanut Butter, 3 Veg. Beans, and 2 Egg Mix. Those receiving the Surplus Foods are requested to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

School Boards Adopt Resolution Of Intent To Merge Two Districts

Board Resolution Of Tishomingo County School Board

WHEREAS, NASA has authorized a space project to be located at Yellow Creek in Tishomingo County, Mississippi and the U.S. Congress is in the final stages of initial funding of that project; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that Tishomingo County will experience a substantial growth in population in the near future which will place heavy demands on the existing county school system; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Economic and Community Development has tentatively proposed to offer Tishomingo County \$7.7 million dollars upon satisfaction of certain conditions by Tishomingo County, including 30% matching money, for the construction of a regional educational complex and the upgrading and renovation of a second high school; and

WHEREAS, a combining of the county's educational resources would substantially strengthen the Tishomingo County School System and thereby enhance the educational opportunities offered to the children of Tishomingo County by that system, including a broadening of the available curricula to include accelerated tracks and programs for the gifted and for honors students; and

WHEREAS, such a consolidation of the school system's resources would better enable the Trustees of the Tishomingo County schools to utilize most effectively any minimum foundation program funds, and/or economic impact funds, that become available;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Tishomingo County School Board:

1) That it is the intent of the Tishomingo County School Board that the two school districts of Tishomingo County be merged into a single, county-wide district with a high school begin located in both the North and the South portions of the county, and to cooperate with the Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District toward the goal.

2) That such merger shall be accomplished in a manner to be decided upon by the Tishomingo County School Board, the Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, the State Board of Education and the Major Economic Impact Authority and in accordance with applicable laws.

APPROVED, this 9th day of October, 1989.

The Tishomingo County School Board and Iuka City School board both recently voted to adopt a resolution of intent to merge the two school districts.

In separate meetings held Monday night, the boards unanimously approved proposals to merge the districts into a single, county-wide district with a high school located in both the North and South portions of the county.

The merger is part of a plan for Tishomingo County to receive a \$7.7 million grant under the state's Major Economic Impact Program. The funding was offered after the National Aeronautics and Space Administration authorized a space project at Yellow Creek.

Funding for the proposed rocket plant is awaiting approval in a House-Senate conference committee in Washington.

The county school board had already passed a similar measure last month but voted again Monday night on a revised version. The city and county's final proposals were almost identical.

"It is anticipated that Tishomingo County will experience a substantial growth in population in the near future which will place heavy demands on the existing school systems," the resolutions said.

The Department of Economic and Community Development has tentatively proposed to offer the county \$7.7 million upon satisfaction of certain conditions by the county," the resolution continued. These include 30% matching money to construct a regional educational complex and to upgrade and renovate a second high school.

According to the resolution, a combining of the county's educational resources would strengthen Tishomingo County schools and thereby enhance the educational opportunities offered to children. Included would be a broadening of the available curricula to include accelerated tracks and programs for the gifted and

honor students.

Consolidation of the schools' resources would also better enable the trustees of the schools to utilize most effectively any foundation program funds and/or economic impact funds that become available, the resolution continues.

With the resolution of intent passed, both school boards will begin working together to outline the steps in the proposed merger. It is anticipated that planning will continue until early next year, at least.

Nick Phillips, elected chairman of the board for the city schools Monday night, said that there was a "multitude of details" to be handled before anything was done.

"This is a process that will require total county and city involvement and commitment to succeed," Phillips said.

Public input will be essential in the planning stages, Phillips added. He is one of four newly-appointed board members. Two former board members resigned stating that they had hesitations about the consolidation issue.

The question has been raised as to how the county will meet the 30% matching funds requirement if the impact money is granted.

Mack L. Wadkins, director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, said that Tishomingo County was in a much better position than other counties to provide matching funds.

"Tishomingo far exceeds other counties in the amount of in-lieu funds it receives from the government," Wadkins said.

Wadkins is referring to Tennessee Valley Authority, an agency of the federal government, which makes in-lieu-of-tax, or in place of tax, payments on its investment in a county. Wadkins explained that both schools received portions of these funds based on the number of students enrolled in each school. In 1988, Tishomingo County Schools received \$306,997 and the Iuka city

schools received \$168,194 of these in-lieu funds.

In addition, Tishomingo County is the only county in the TVA service area that has a trust fund. The schools receive interest from this fund for educational purposes, Wadkins said.

Under the state's equity education act passed earlier this year, a consolidated school district would qualify for a \$34 per student bonus subsidy, Wadkins explained.

He went on to say that there was no truth to rumors about losing in-lieu funds. "School consolidation will have no effect on the amount of in-lieu funds coming in to Tishomingo County," he said.

While the location of the proposed new high schools is not definite, the resolution stated that one would be established in the North part of the county and the other in the South portion. Individuals have questioned whether the new educational complex built outside of Iuka, as planned, would better benefit citizens in the northern half of the county.

According to Wadkins, projections indicate that because of the influx from the NASA facility, there would be three times as many students in and around the northern portion of the county, thus creating a greater need for better facilities. However, if the schools are united into one system, students in the county could choose whichever school they wanted to attend, he said.

The Tishomingo County Development Foundation submitted the proposal for educational improvements to attempt to obtain a share of the \$20 million in impact funds approved earlier this year by the state legislature. This money, set aside in state bonds, is designed to support projects to help attract NASA workers who are expected to settle in the area.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

COOKING WITH SWEET POTATOES

The sweet potato has been used for food since prehistoric times in tropical America and some South Pacific Islands. Columbus found it being eaten in the West Indies and probably brought it to Europe about 1500. The Spanish used the native American Indian name "batata" or "padada."

The word "yam" comes from the African word "Nyami" and refers to the starchy edible root of a different genus of plants. Some people distinguish sweet potatoes and yams by the degree of moisture. It is generally thought that the yam is a more potato while the sweet potato is dry. Varieties vary in degree of moistness. The yellow Jersey is a dry type whereas the centennial, jewel and other yam varieties are more moist.

Actually all yams grown in the United States are sweet potatoes, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture requires that they be labeled as such. In general usage, however, the terms are used interchangeably.

NUTRITION FACTS

Sweet potatoes are one of the most nutritious foods available in supermarket today. They are excellent sources of vitamins and minerals.

One medium sized sweet potato provides more than twice the recommended daily adult requirement of vitamin A, 40 percent of vitamin C, 10 percent of the iron and 10 percent of the required thiamine and high levels of other important vitamins and minerals. Despite its sweet taste, a 3 1/2 ounce potato contains only 141 calories.

SELECTION AND HANDLING

When buying sweet potatoes, select clean, smooth and well shaped roots that are firm, dry and bright. Handle carefully to prevent bruising. A dry unrefrigerated storage bin kept at 55 to 60 degrees F is excellent for maximum shelf life. Do NOT refrigerate as cold injury leads to an undesirable taste when cooked.

BASIC COOKING PROCEDURES

The delicious, nutritious sweet potato can be baked, boiled, fried, broiled, prepared in microwave oven, candied and frozen. It can be used in making breads, salads, pies custards and cakes. Before cooking scrub skin and trim off any bruised or woody portions.

TO BOIL--Cook unpeeled sweet potatoes, covered, in

small amount of boiling salted water 20 to 30 minutes or until desired doneness. For use in salads where cubed or sliced, cook until just barely tender.

TO BAKE--Place in 350 degree F oven and bake 45 to 50 minutes. Again time will depend on use and size of potato.

TO CHARCOAL BROIL--Wrap medium size sweet potatoes individually in heavy duty aluminum foil. Place on grill, about 5 inches from coals. Cook for about 45 minutes or until tender. To hasten, boil 10 minutes before wrapping in foil and bury in coals.

TO PAN ROAST--Boil for 10 minutes. Drain, peel and add to pan one hour before meat is done, basting 4 to 5 times.

TO FREEZE--Cook using any method. Dip cooled sweet potato sliced into a mixture of 1/2 teaspoon ascorbic acid to 5 cups water. For mashed or pureed potatoes, add 2 tablespoons fresh lemon or orange juice to each 4 cups. For candied, dip pieces or whole potato in brown or granulated sugar. Pack in freezer containers, leaving 1/2 inch head-space.

MICROWAVE: For best results, choose sweet potatoes which do not vary in width from center to ends. Pierce washed sweet potatoes. Cook on high turning each potato 1/2 turn halfway through cooking time.

1 medium: 3 to 4 minutes; 2 medium: 5 to 6 minutes; 4 medium: 7 to 8 minutes; 6 medium: 8 to 9 minutes.

If ends become soft before center is finished, wrap ends in little pieces of foil. Wrap potatoes in foil to keep warm while cooking remainder of dinner. Potatoes should rest three minutes before serving.

Many recipes call for cooked sweet potatoes, meaning either baked or boiled. Canned sweet potatoes will also fill this need. They generally are smaller in diameter because of their better canning qualities. Six to eight canned sweet potatoes are about the equivalent of four medium

fresh sweet potatoes.

One can use the measurement relationship below as a guideline.

FRESH 2 medium - 3 to 4 sweet potatoes - COOKED & MASHED 1 1/4 cups.

FRESH - 3 medium, CANNED 1 pound can, COOKED & MASHED - 2 cups.

FRESH - 4 medium, CANNED - 3 quart cans (23 oz.), COOKED & MASHED 2 1/2 cups.

SWEET POTATO TIPS
Sweet potatoes may be cooked in their jackets (skins) to protect flavor, vitamin C and natural sugar. The skins of boiled or baked sweet potatoes slip off easily after cooking. It is better to cook sweet potatoes quickly and to serve them immediately in order to preserve vitamin C. To cook without jackets, peel just before cooking.

When mashing sweet potatoes, small amounts of milk or fruit juices may be added to enhance flavor and to make a better texture. The natural goodness of sweet potatoes also can be accentuated with a variety of spices, fruits, nuts and sweeteners such as molasses and honey.

Through planning and carrying out a project, youth learn to apply critical thinking skills to real-life problems.

For example, in a project involving raising any animal, a youngster must do the following:

1. Compare and contrast animals as the basis for deciding which to keep or cull, to breed or buy. Basic training of this nature is done in livestock judging.

2. Identify characteristics of individual animals that qualify or disqualify as certain breeds or species.

3. Learn nutritional ration ingredients needed for health and growth and identify

4. Use previous experience and subject matter learned to recognize health problems and courses of action needed.

5. Identify errors through recognizing and correcting mistakes. (Incorrectly identifying the breeding cycle or gestation period of an animal can cause a loss of productivity and money.)

6. Identify the main idea and generalize from the particular animal project to the entire food ecosystem as the youth determines profit or loss at the market place.

Facts About Our Forests

Products Made From Trees
Every day, Americans use thousands of products made from the forest -- from computer paper and lumber to rayon and cosmetic by-products.

It takes good soil, air, water, sunlight, temperate climates and time to grow the wood needed for these products.

Different products require different kinds of trees, but in general, a cord of wood (a stack of wood 4' x 4' x 8') can produce any of the following:
7,500,000 toothpicks; 1,000 to 2,000 pounds of paper (depending on the process); 942 one-pound books; 61,370 standard #10 business envelopes; 4,384,000 commemorative-size postage stamps; 460,000 personal checks; 89, 870 sheets of bond stationery (8-1/2 by 11); 1,200 copies of National Geographic magazine; 2,700 copies of the average daily paper (36 pages); 250 copies of a typical Sunday New York Times; 30 Boston Rockers; 12 dining room tables (each table seats 8).

Wood for Construction
Building an average 1,900-square-foot home uses 11,000 board feet of lumber and up to 5,000 board feet of panel products. (A board foot is a one inch board, 12" in width and one foot in length.) Some Little-Known Wood Products

There are some products and by-products that most people would never guess came from wood, including vanilla extract, tall oil, and

rayon. Your food could even contain wood products, such as high-protein torula yeast in baby foods, cereals and baked goods. Wood by-products appear in such varied items as vitamins, plastics, paints and varnishes, cosmetics, explosives and toothpaste, sausage casings and photographic film.

Your Water - An Important Forest Product

Most people don't think of water as a forest product, yet our forests collect, clean, regulate and recycle the water we drink and use every day. Southern Californians use about 180 gallons of water per person per day -- enough water to fill a pool a quarter-mile long, a quarter-mile wide, and a quarter-mile deep. New Yorkers use even more water - 220 gallons a day.

Most of us take our water for granted. Yet, the water used by the residents of Los Angeles is drawn from 800 to 1,000 miles away. And 85 percent of the water Californians drink comes from forested areas.

Forests are natural water regulators. Forest soil can absorb up to 18 inches of water from rain or melting snow, then slowly releases the water back into natural channels and watercourses. Picture the difference between watering your lawn and watering your sidewalk. And the forest soil cleanses the water too, removing the impurities. That's why the closer water is to the forest, the cleaner it is -- which explains why so many municipal reservoirs are located as close as possible to forests.

The Left-Overs
There really aren't any

"left-overs." Today, every part of a tree is utilized. Bark is sold as mulch, helping to beautify your lawn. Pulping liquors, sawdust and other waste wood are often converted to energy to power our plants, and sometimes excess energy is even sold to power companies in the communities around our mills.

Dr. Stephen Blair, D.M.D. The Fluoride Shift

Q. With the fluoridation of water supplies and the use of fluoridated tooth-care products, are dental checkups still so important for children?

A. Since fluoridation of drinking water began in Grand Rapids, Michigan, in 1945, there has been a dramatic decrease in cavities among children. In the 1970s alone, the overall rate declined by one third. But many children still develop cavities, although fewer than in previous generations.

What we are seeing today is a greater awareness of the benefits of regular checkups to detect small problems before they become severe. Children in need of restorations are more likely to be taken to the dentist at an early stage than in the past. At the same time, parents are more informed about the need to detect and treat other tooth and gum problems. With fewer cavities to deal with, they are more attuned to procedures that can have a long-term effect on the child's teeth -- from the application of sealants to protect tooth crevices from decay, to space maintainers, braces and retainers that enhance bite and appearance. Even if the good news is "no new cavities," a child's regular dental checkup is a step that can pay dividends in later life.

Bowater Reaches Safety Mark

For the first time in its 35-year history, employees of Bowater Incorporated, Southern Division Woodland (formerly Hiwassee Land Company) have worked one million hours consecutively without experiencing a lost time accident. (A lost time accident is one serious enough to prevent an employee from working his or her next regular shift.)

Commenting on the achievement, Tony Gant, manager for the luka area, said, "This safety milestone is especially significant when you consider the things our employees accomplished in the past 22 months. We have eight employees in luka who contributed to this achievement."

Don Kettenbell, Woodland manager, said, "we have 260 permanent employees (and nearly 300 during planting season) spread out over five miles in our division. Em-

ployees drove 4.3 million miles, produced 1.7 million cords of wood, and planted 25.2 million trees on 33,000 acres. Each working day many of our employees are exposed to the rigors and risk of outside work."

"We are extremely proud of our woodland employees and hope to continue setting a new record each day," said Kettenbell.

Southern Division Woodlands Safety Coordinator Ross S. Bernhard cited the commitment of employees to the safety system employed as the key to success.

"We do not subscribe to the theory that we're conducting a safety program but rather that safety is a fundamental element of our management system. A program implies a beginning and an end. For us, safety is an on-going process," said

Bernhard.

"The luka compartment has worked 5 years without a disabling injury," said Tony Gant.

The company's Southern Division Woodlands is the former Hiwassee Land Company, the forest management organization for Bowater Incorporated's Southern Division newsprint mill at Calhoun, Tennessee. Woodlands employees are charged with the responsibility of ensuring a long term supply of wood for the mill as well as the multiple use management of some 590,000 acres of forest land.

Bowater Incorporated, Southern Division and its woodlands employ some 1900 people. Coincidentally, the Calhoun Mill recently achieved one million safe worker hours. Bowater Incorporated is headquartered in Darien, Connecticut, and is a major producer of newsprint in the United States and Canada.

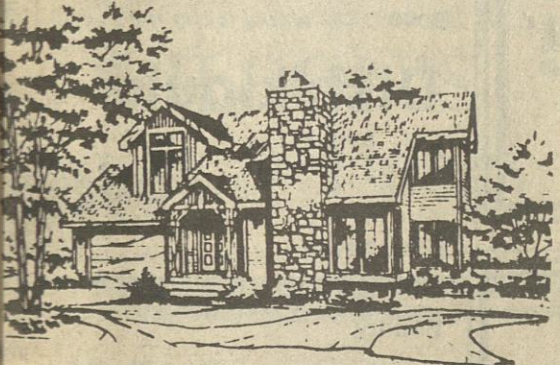

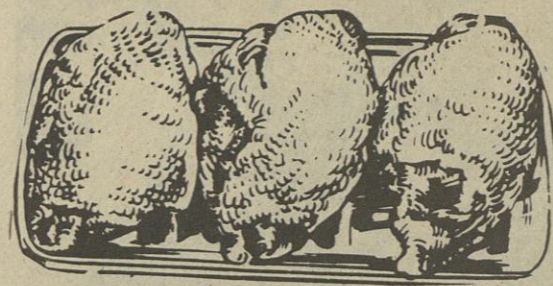

County Agents Notes

TOUR OF FOREST WEED CONTROL DEMONSTRATION

Everyone interested in forestry are invited to participate in a tour of a weed control demonstration on the Earl Burns Farm near Dennis. The tour will begin at 5:30 in the afternoon and conclude before dark.

In this demonstration, newly planted pine seedlings were band sprayed over the top with weed control chemicals (Quest, Atrazine, Velpar, Arsenal) in varying rates and combinations to reduce the weed competition with the planted trees. There are already differences in survival rates and growth in the treated and untreated plots.

To get to the demonstration site, turn West at Dennis Florist and follow the black top road about 2 miles. The site will be on the side of the road to your left.

Hope to see you there. **TRACTOR SAFETY CHAINS** About six weeks ago in Columbus, a trailer came loose from a pickup truck and

struck an oncoming car. The driver of the car was killed. The owner and the driver of the pickup face criminal liability as a result of not using safety chains.

This type of accident could have occurred in Tishomingo County. There is no reason for these accidents to happen if they can be prevented with safety chains.

Farmers, wood haulers, boat owners and recreational vehicle drivers in Tishomingo County should install and use safety chains. It's the law, not a choice.

TRACKING FARM COSTS Farmers in Tishomingo County must keep production up and costs down to make a living from farming. They must know what their production costs are and when to cut them.

A record of production costs can tell county farmers what their break-even price is and where the profit potential may be. It helps farmers decide if they can afford expenses such as new farm machinery.

The Tishomingo County Extension Office has information on farm record keeping and budgeting that can help farmers keep a better handle on costs. Come by or call for more information. **SPRING FLOWERS**

Home gardeners in Tishomingo County want beautiful flowers next spring should start their fall bulb planting now.

A common mistake gardeners make is to plant fall bulbs in sites that drain poorly and have no sun. Flowering bulbs such as daf-

fodils, tulips and Dutch iris perform best in full sun and well-drained soils.

With proper site selection and adequate maintenance, these flowers will bloom without much trouble. Yards in Tishomingo County will be much prettier next spring, as a result.
