Area Leaders To Visit Stennis Space Center

Representatives from Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, Tishomingo, and Union counties, members of an area technology transfer team, will be visiting the Stennis Space Center November 27 and 28. Administered through NASA at the Stennis Center, the "Technology Transfer" program was established to disseminate technological information from a combination of private and public sources (including a federal consortium of more than 600 laboratories) to an end user. According to Giles McDaniel, project specialist with the Energy and Transportation Division of the Department of Economic Development, housed at Northeast Mississippi Community College, "the purpose of technology transfer is to assist private industry in

meeting the increased challenge and competition from both national and international markets. "In the technology transfer program, information on both new and existing developments in technology is stockpiled within the data base of a NASA computer," McDaniel said. "Participants in the program will be able to compare their own situations with similar, or even identical, challenges faced and solved by other industries." McDaniel added that NASA engineers and consultants will be available for consultation in specific applications. Tishomingo Counts on the area team are M. Wayne Mitchell, David Moody, David L. Volunteer Fire Department For Eastport-Mill Creek

Residents of the Eastport-Mill Creek area in the process of establishing a Volunteer Fire Department. One acre of land is being purchased from Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Co. for \$500.00. It is to be located at the old 4-mile board next to Jerry Booker's house on Eastport Road.

Plans are to construct a 40'X50' all-metal building approved by the EMCVFD. The building cost is expected to be \$15,000.

This will not only give fire protection to the residents, but will decrease insurance premiums approximately 30 percent when approved for a class 9 rating.

It is expected to take 4 to 6 weeks for the deed to be processed and the land to be cleared off.

Donations are now being taken to raise the money for the building. Everyone in this area will be contacted. Donations can be mailed to Wayne Underwood, Treasurer EMCVFD, Route 5, Iuka or given to anyone on the board of EMCVFD. People in the Mill Creek area may give their donations to Mr. Kimberly at home or mail them. All donations will be greatly appreciated.

South Central Bell Files For Rate Plan

South Central Bell announced today that the company has filed a rate stabilization plan with the Mississippi Public Service Commission (PSC) to become effective January 1, 1990.

According to Kelly Allgood, vice president for South Central Bell operations in Mississippi, the Commission has ordered South Central Bell to participate on a task force to look at different regulatory approaches. The rate stabilization plan filed today is the final result of this participation.

"The rate stabilization plan is designed to provide greater stability in local service rates and provides for a 50-50 sharing arrangements between the company and its customers should the company earn returns outside of a specified range. This sharing will be accomplished through revenue increases or decreases based on a prioritized schedule approved by the PSC," Allgood said.

Allgood added that the company has proposed a three-year trial for the plan and an independent audit at the end of the first two years to evaluate the plan and identify and recommend any needed changes.

"A key feature of the rate stabilization plan is a review every six months of the company's financial performance based on twelve months of data, nine months actual and three months forecasted. The PSC and its staff will have complete access to all supporting data for the financial reports provided each quarter by South Central Bell. If earnings are outside the approved range, revenues will be adjusted, either upward or downward, but never more than 2% of net revenues," Allgood said.

"Today's rapidly changing, competitive environment requires a new form of regulation that responds more quickly to the needs of the company and our customers. The rate stabilization plan we have proposed will drive us to operate more efficiently and to have the incentive to compete more aggressively, develop new products, generate additional revenues, and control costs," Allgood said. "This rate stabilization plan allows for this to happen and, at the same time, provides both a potential benefit to the customer as well as built-in safeguards," he added.

"This new form of regulation would allow us to continue to make the kinds of investment in Mississippi that are necessary to provide the Information Age telecommunications infrastructure needed to attract and retain businesses and to provide services residence customers need and want," Allgood said. "South Central

Bell has a net investment of over \$2.2 billion in Mississippi, and we need to spend approximately a billion dollars over the next five years to keep Mississippi on the leading edge of technology. Like any competitive business, we need to earn at levels that will support continued capital investment in the state.

"Mississippi has a great future, and South Central Bell has worked in partnership with government and business on both economic development and education improvements in our state. We look forward to staying on the leading edge of technology to provide the telecommunications needs for this future. A rate stabilization plan will help us achieve this," Allgood concluded.

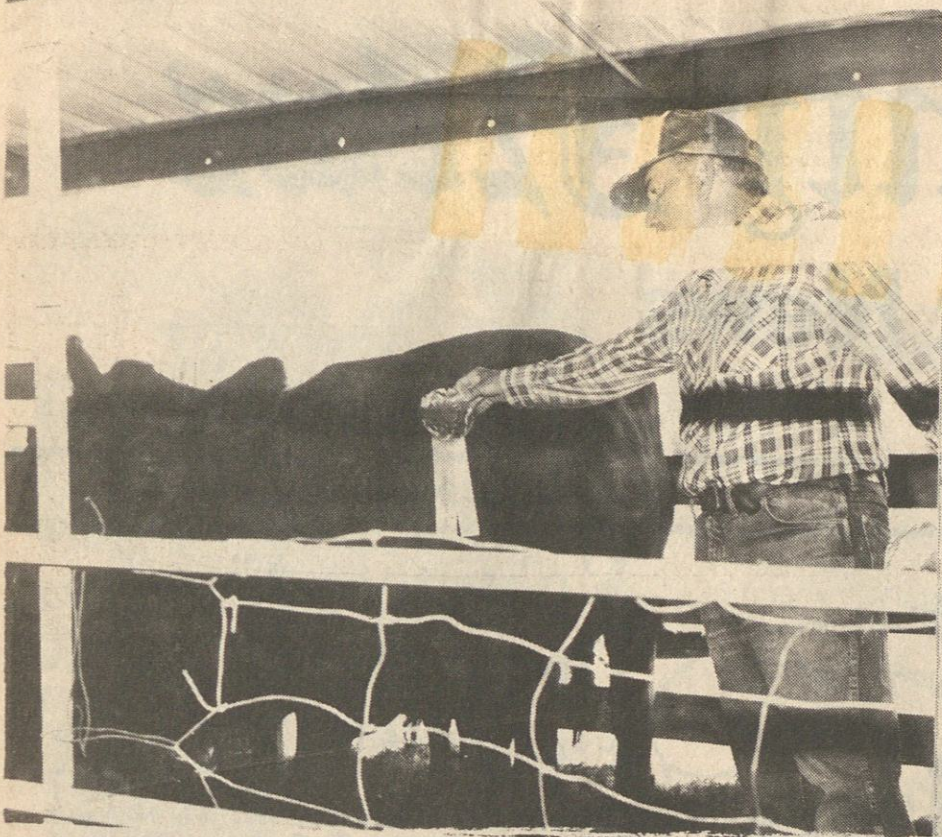

BAKED STUFFED POTATO
4 baking potatoes, about 1/2 lb. each
3 T. Skim milk
1/8 t. pepper
1/2 cup lowfat cottage cheese
1 t. dried chopped chives
Paprika, as desired
Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. (hot). Wash and dry potatoes. Prick skins with a fork. Bake potatoes until tender - 50 to 60 minutes. (Potatoes may be baked in a microwave oven. Use the directions that came with your oven). Beat cottage cheese until smooth. Slice tops off potatoes; scoop out insides of potatoes and add to cottage cheese. Add milk and seasonings; beat until well blended. Stuff potato skins with potato-cheese mixture. Sprinkle with paprika. Return potatoes to oven. Bake about 10 minutes or until heated and tops are lightly browned. NOTE: Since cottage cheese contains salt, there is no need to add more salt to the recipe. Fresh chives may be used in place of dried chives.

Yield: 4 servings. Calories: 155 per serving.

HOLIDAY PLANT CARE

Many people in Tishomingo County will be receiving beautiful poinsettias and other greenery for the holidays. Here are tips to keep those plants looking their best.

Place holiday plants where they can get as much bright light as possible. Windows are often several degrees cooler than room temperature, so keep plant leaves several inches from the windowpanes.

Heaters take much of the humidity out of indoor air. Prevent plants from drying out too quickly by keeping them away from heaters and out of drafts. Water plants as needed, but don't overwater.

Remove gift wrap if possible. Cut any wrap covering the bottom of the container so the plant won't hold too much water.

LANDSCAPE CARE

Rake leaves as needed to prevent lawns from smothering. Use the leaves for compost, piling them in an out-of-the-way spot.

Sprinkle a little soil and fertilizer over each 6 or 8 inch layer of compost. A light dusting of lime or wood ashes will neutralize organic acids given off by the decaying leaves.

Moisture is important for compost piles. Make the tops of the piles slightly concave to collect rainfall.

Leaves or pine straw can be used to mulch shrubs if such material is piled in a 6 or 8 inch layer around the plant. The mulch insulates soil, protects plant roots from extreme temperatures and conserves water.

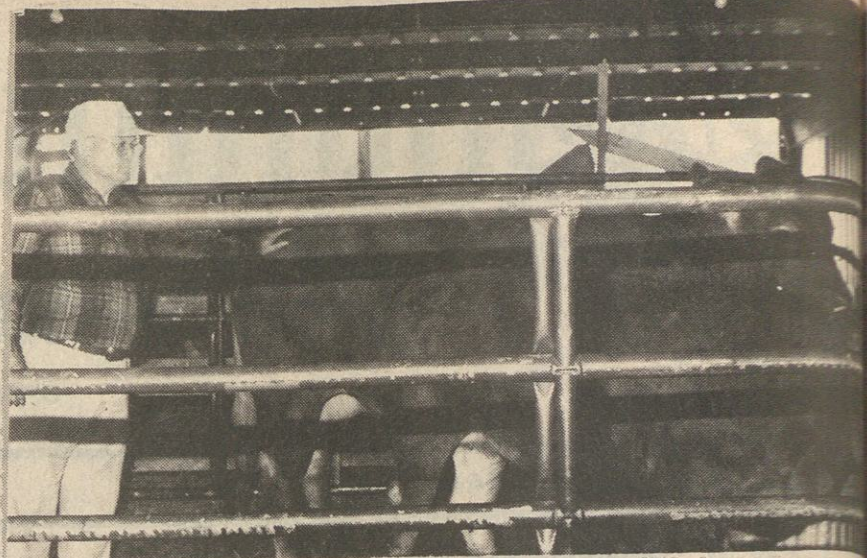
Wait until later winter or early spring to prune roses, crapemyrtles, hydrangeas and other summer blooming plants. Do not prune spring bloomers such as azaleas, hollies and forsythias. Shoots from these spring plants can be removed for holiday decoration. Be careful not to ruin plant shape by random cutting.

From Stains To Smiles

There are alternatives to capping discolored teeth in order to improve their appearance. Using the newest techniques, a dentist can transform stained teeth in less time and at less cost than capping or crowning them. Depending on the individual condition, the dentist may recommend:

- Bleaching. This is done by applying an especially formulated warm solution to the stained teeth. Several visits may be necessary to achieve the desired brightness.
- Bonding. A composite resin is painted onto the tooth surface. The coating then is hardened, sometimes under a special light, and the dentist shapes and polishes "the new look." This process also is used to restore the shape of chipped or eroded teeth.
- Veneers. A very thin layer of porcelain or plastic is customized to fit a tooth and then is bonded to the surface.

Whatever method is chosen, the result is a brighter smile.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

"HOLIDAY LEFTOVERS"

The holidays are going just like you planned. All the family is home, some from very far away. It is truly a time of happiness and thanksgiving. The table is set with the finest dishes and a feast of all feasts. A mouth watering turkey is the focus of all eyes as the juicy slices are carved. As the holiday feast comes to a close the leftovers are placed in the oven, on the stove and the kitchen counters just in case anyone needs a snack before supper.

Six hours later family members are beginning to get hungry again and head for the turkey and dressing waiting in the cold oven. The leftover turkey is not complete without a small serving of all the leftovers being held on the kitchen counters.

All of the sudden the perfect holiday is struck by tragedy-the "flu"-and the worst case in the history of your family. It hits the whole family. You try to count your blessings because at least the epidemic didn't hit until the day after Thanksgiving.

Is it really the flu? Probably not. More than likely the epidemic is foodborne illness

or food poisoning. But what went wrong? All the food was freshly prepared and all tasted good. Could it have been the method of cooking the stuffed turkey? The next door neighbor told you of a new method. A long cooking method at a very low temperature (250 degrees F).

The dreaded error was most likely a combination of the method of cooking the turkey and the storage of the leftovers.

This "new" method of cooking turkey is not recommended. Because of the low temperature, the turkey and stuffing might take more than four hours to reach a high enough temperature to destroy bacteria and could result in a turkey that is unsafe to eat. The oven temperature should be at least 325 degrees F.

Handling cooked food properly is just as important as properly handling raw foods. Think of the post-cooking stage as a countdown beginning when you take the food out of the oven or out of the refrigerator. From that time, you have about two hours to serve it, then refrigerate or freeze the leftovers. Bacteria that cause food poisoning can multiply to unsafe levels on perishable food at room temperature for longer than two hours.

Take out all the stuffing from the turkey as soon as you remove the bird from the

THE DRY EYE

The normal eye is kept moist by a thin film of tears on its surface. Most of these tears are produced by glands under the upper lid and are spread across the cornea with each blink. If the tear production is reduced for any of a variety of reasons, you will suffer symptoms of hot, burning dry eyes. In very severe cases, the cornea may dry, become cloudy and affect your sight.

Your optometrist can check how much tear fluid you have by placing special strips of paper under the lids and noting

the amount of wetting produced in a given time period. If the amount is moderately low, you can gain comfort by using drops of artificial tears. For a critical shortage of soft contact lenses may be indicated to keep the eye moist.

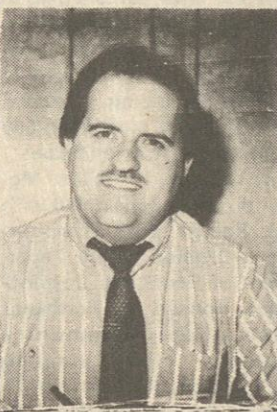
A dry eye can also result if the tear production is normal, but the blink reflex is missed. When this occurs, the tears cannot be spread across the eye.

7 percent, or 1700 acres of Tishomingo County cropland was diverted from production to the ACR and CU for payment under the 1989 programs. Program participants are required to plant certain grasses, legumes, small grains or other approved cover crops on these acres, or to maintain various conservation practices on the acreage. "This protection is required to guard against wind and water erosion. Farmers are also required to carry out control measures to prevent weeds, rodents and insects on the ACR land.

To maintain farm program benefits, producers must protect their ACR and CU for payment land in accordance with conservation requirements through the end of the year. Those who fail to do so will be out of compliance and could lose payments and other program benefits.

Would you like to have a place to hunt at no cost? Are you aware 45,000 acres of Corps of Engineers hunting lands are available on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. Would you like to know more about obtaining a hunting permit to hunt on Corps of Engineers property? If the answer is yes to these questions then this article is for you.

The process for obtaining a hunting permit has changed from last year, in that you must first fill out an application prior to receiving your permit. You may pick up an application at the businesses listed below and

each individual must sign their own application. Next sent them to the Resource Office stamped on the application. When we receive your application we will send the permit along with any maps that you request showing the areas open for hunting. Please allow one week from the time you send your application in the receive your permit.

Once you have received your permit and have decided where to hunt, you need to know how to identify the areas that are open for hunting. All Corps of Engineers property is marked with two red slashes and all areas that are open for hunting are designated with an appropriate sign stating the type of hunting that is allowed, which is also shown on your hunting maps.

Now that you're ready to

hunt, all hunters, regardless of age, are required to have a valid Corps of Engineers hunting permit in their possession and for safety reasons, hunters less than 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult (21 years of age or older). Here are some simple rules that you should follow:

-No hunting within 1000 feet of any lock, dam building, dredge, construction site or public use area.

-Motor vehicles are not permitted off designated roadways.

-No ATV's are allowed.

-Hunter orange is required.

-Antlerless deer may be harvested only during archery season.

-No high powered rifles are allowed.

-No dogs are allowed in the all game areas prior to January 31, 1990.

-Only portable tree stands will be allowed and must be removed daily.

-Only floating blinds will be allowed and must be removed daily.

Please review the regulations printed on your permit. All federal, state, and local laws governing these activities also apply. Demonstrate that you are a responsible and ethical hunter by obeying these laws and safety rules, and report any game violations to your local conservation officer. Remember that hunting is a privilege, not a right. Make your hunting trips safe ones.

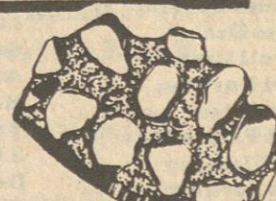

DISASTER PROGRAM

CHANGES

On October 30, 1989, a law was passed which changed provisions for replacement or second crops. Under these provisions, only the heavy displacement production of a field which exceeds 50 percent of the county average yield will be considered. Only 75 percent of the value of this excess production will be counted against the disaster benefit for the initial crop. Several other policy

changes are being put into effect which will determine whether a second crop is considered double-cropped or replacement acreage based on the historical cropping pattern on a particular farm and also on the cropping pattern for the area. Also, the replacement crop determination may be waived if it can be determined that suitable idle acreage on the farm would have been planted to the second crop had the initial crop not been disaster affected.

Reductions due to replacement crop value will be applied only to the acreages that are replanted. For example: if the replacement crop value per

acre exceeds that disaster benefits per acre, the reduction in overall disaster benefits will be limited to the amount of disaster benefits that would have been paid on the affected acres. Benefits to other acreage on the farm that was not followed with the replacement crop will not be reduced.

ACR NOW OPEN FOR GRAZING

The official grazing period opened October 1, for acreage conservation reserve (ACR), or land designated as conserving use (CU) for payment under the 1989 acreage reduction programs. Farm program participants are now authorized to graze their ACR and CU acreage.

The cover crops must not be overgrazed because sufficient cover must be maintained to prevent wind and water erosion.

Program participants are not permitted to graze ACR or CU for payment land during the 5-month nongrazing period set by the State ASC committee. The nongrazing period in Tishomingo County runs from May 1 to September 30.

I have finally accomplished that to a certain extent. I haven't had an attack that bad in about 4 to 5 months, but I still have small ones every now and then and then depression and anxiety that I feel lots of times has never went away, although I have been able to hide it most of the time. The person that I show people and my private self are very different, because my private self is very quiet and afraid of everybody. I never can show that! When I can't help it and my private self shows people hate it, so I "put on a happy face" again. A lot of times I wish that I could just die! I just feel like exploding! 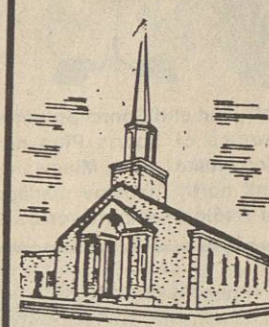

Ask Ochsner

Q. What can I do to help prevent my annual weight gain during the upcoming holiday season? Do you have any tips to help someone who has little willpower?

A. Thanksgiving is traditionally the start of the holiday season of food and parties. For some, it means a gain of an extra ten pounds. Debbie Kern, a registered dietitian at the Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans, says that a lot of people eat because of emotions - either they have negative feelings about the holidays because of stress, or they are excited and happy. It is important, she says, to know why your eating habits may be different during the holiday season.

Choose the foods which are your favorites and allow yourself to eat those foods, but in small portions. The most important thing is to enjoy the holidays and not feel deprived. Before a party, eat something at home so you may not be as tempted to eat

the hors d'oeuvres.

Remember to ask yourself why you are going to the party. Make sure you go to socialize with the guests rather than focus on the food table. Avoid the "I'm on a diet" response to the hostess when turning down food. Sometimes a persistent hostess can persuade you to eat it anyway, so just tell yourself you really don't want it and just say so, or say that you're too full.

Stay away from fried foods and cheeses at office or cocktail parties. Both types of foods have a high fat content, which add calories even

if they are eaten in small quantities.

Alcoholic beverages are also high in calories, so when drinking spirits, choose lite beers or dry wines as they have the least amount of calories. Kern suggests alternating the alcoholic drink with a non-alcoholic one, such as fruit juice, club soda or mineral water.

Don't forget that exercising is one way to help burn off excess calories during the holiday glut. Get a big group together after a meal and go for a walk - you may start another tradition.
