School Boards Vote For Consolidation

The boards of the Tishomingo County School District and Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District have adopted orders to merge into a single district.

Both Boards met Monday, December 11 specifically for the purpose of voting on the proposed merger.

Trustees of the Iuka schools voted unanimously to adopt the order while the Tishomingo board voted four to one on the consolidation issue.

Under the order, each school board will abolish itself and merge into a single, countywide school district with a high school located in both the North and South portions of the county.

The proposed merger is set to take effect July 1, 1991. Both city and county boards will continue to govern their school districts until that date.

Both boards had adopted resolutions of intent for the merger on October 9. Since then, public opinions, many of them from certain parts of the county, have been raised against consolidation of the schools.

Last week Governor Ray Mabus announced that Tishomingo County would receive \$7 million from the state Major Economic Impact Authority for educational improvements. Mabus said that funding for Tishomingo Co. schools, as well as for other school districts in surrounding counties impacted by the NASA plant, depended upon consolidation.

The motion to adopt the order was carried by unanimous vote at the city school board meeting, according to chairman Nick Phillips. Affirmative votes were cast by members Carolyn Dilworth, Robert Grisham, Dr. James Perkins, Nicholas Phillips, and Earl Walker.

Tishomingo County board members voting for the order were Larry Bonds, Harold Oswalt, Virgil Rhodes, and Harold Sparks. Kary Dailey cast the one opposing vote.

Before a crowded courtroom, County Superintendent of Education Larry Greene explained a proposal which he submitted to the Department of Economic and Community Development but which was not chosen for funding. This package called for upgrading and building of additional facilities at each school in the county, without consolidation.

Greene challenged the need for a new high school by pointing out state education department figures which project the schools will increase by 60-100 students from the NASA rocket plant.

The order to merge states that the superintendent of education of the newly formed district will be appointed by the newly elected board of supervisors. This point has opposition by some citizens who favor the election of a superintendent.

Greene pointed out at the meeting that in the referendum voted on in November, 1988, 84 percent of county electors voted to keep an elected superintendent of education.

Other citizens addressed the crowd, which was about evenly divided for and against the merger.

The name of the new school district will be determined by the boards of trustees of the existing Tishomingo County School district and Iuka School district, the order states.

The new board of trustees will consist of five members.

One member will be elected from each supervisor district and must be a resident and qualified elector of the district, the order reads.

Both orders, which are almost identical, must be published in the Tishomingo County News for three consecutive weeks, beginning with today's paper. (See page 13). Copies will be posted at three public places in the school district: Tishomingo County Courthouse, Iuka City Hall, and Iuka High School.

The order will become final thirty days after its first publication, unless a petition is filed protesting within that time. If no petition is filed, the order will become final at the end of the thirty days. However, if twenty percent of the voters of either school district file a petition protesting the merger, then an election will be held in the district which protests. The order will become final only if the majority of voters in each school district vote in favor of the order, if an election is necessary.

Before it becomes final, the order must also be submitted to and approved by the state lay board of education and the U.S. Attorney General.

Iuka's New Telephone System Completed

Installation of Iuka's new telephone switching system has been completed on schedule and will be placed in operation during the early morning hours Friday, December 15, according to Tom Bailey, South Central Bell's district manager.

Bailey said the digital equipment, a Remote Network Switch built by Stromberg-Carlson, will make several new services available to Iuka customers.

Beginning Friday, Iuka customers will be able to subscribe to South Central Bell's new Area Calling Plan.

"This exciting new type of local service will enable customers to call within an expanded area at lower, distance-measured local rates without dialing a '1' before the number," Bailey said. "The expanded area for Iuka will include Burnsville, Tishomingo, Belmont, Corinth and Rienzi."

"The Area Calling Plan gives customers greater control over their phone bills, while offering substantially lower rates on calls to area exchanges that are currently long distance," Bailey said. "For example, under this plan, a 5-minute daytime call to Corinth will cost only \$.22. The same call at long distance rates would cost \$.98. Customers who would like more information on the Area Calling Plan may call a service representative at 1-557-6500."

Another service made possible by the new switching system is RINGMASTER service.

"RINGMASTER service allows customers to have up to two additional telephone numbers associated with their home or business telephone line," Bailey said. "Calls made to those numbers have a distinctive ring. This gives you many of the advantages of having more than one telephone line, without the expense."

"In addition," Bailey said, "South Central Bell coin telephones will be converted to dial-tone first."

"With dial-tone first, callers will hear a dial tone when they lift the receiver to place a call. They will be able to dial emergency calls from a coin telephone to 911 or '0' operator without depositing coins. Calls to directory assistance in Mississippi (1+411, 1+555-1212) and to 1+800, credit card and 0+ calls billed to a third number or billed collect will not require coins. Cards providing step-by-step instructions for using dial tone first service will be placed on all South Central Bell coin telephones."

"We're excited by the possibilities of this new switch," Bailey said. "I'm certain we will see some amazing advances in new features added to this system in the years ahead."

"And I personally am delighted that the new switch will bring these advantages and conveniences of the Information Age to our Iuka customers," Bailey concluded.

CHICKEN DIVAN
2 whole chicken breasts, boned
1 cup water
1/8 t. dried rosemary leaves

2 (10 oz.) pkgs. frozen chopped broccoli
2 (10 3/4 oz.) cans of chicken soup, undiluted
1/4 cup dry white wine
1/2 cup (2 oz.) shredded processed Swiss cheese
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
Paprika

Cut chicken into 1/4-inch cubes. Combine chicken, water, rosemary, salt, and pepper in a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Cover with clear plastic wrap; microwave at medium high for 5 to 7 minutes or until done. Drain chicken, reserving 1/4 cup broth; set aside.

Pierce broccoli packages with a fork; place packages in a flat baking dish. Microwave at high for 7 to 9 minutes or until done, rearranging packages once. Drain broccoli.

Combine soup, wine, Swiss cheese, and reserved broth, mixing well. Place chicken in a 12/82-inch baking dish; pour half of soup mixture over chicken. Top with broccoli. Pour remaining soup mixture over broccoli. Cover with waxed paper; microwave at medium for 9 to 11 minutes or until thoroughly heated. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and paprika. Cover and microwave for 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 minutes. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

PEER PRESSURE
Many words we use today have two meanings. The word "cool" could refer to the weather or to an extremely

likable person. "Cool" people behave in a way we find pleasing or stylish. The word "peer" also has two meanings. One is when peer refers to a person or thing of the same rank, age or quality. Another meaning is to look closely at in order to see more clearly. Our classmates are our peers because they are in the same grade and are generally the same age. "Peer Pressure" is the influence our peers exert on us. This influence can be both positive and negative. When we ask our parents to buy us things "because everyone has them" is peer pressure.

Sometimes our friends and others may pressure us to use drugs. This pressure can be very strong or it may be friendly and very mild. There are two types of peer pressure. Positive peer pressure motivates us to improve as individuals. Negative peer pressure usually encourages us to go along with the crowd. We may be pressured into doing something we know is wrong or against the rules.

Negative peer pressure is usually expressed in one of four ways. The first way is called "Some Like It Hot." This is usually the strongest form of peer pressure and may involve some type of verbal threats and maybe even physical threats. Hot peer pressure is rarely used to pressure people to use drugs. An example of hot peer pressure is "Let me copy your homework or I'll kill you." People using this type of peer pressure are not our friends.

The second form of negative peer pressure is called "Some Like to Please". This peer pressure is usually in a friendly manner. An offer is made without threats or strong pressure to conform. An example of this type of peer pressure is "You want a pinch of chew before you go home?"

The third type of negative peer pressure is "Unfriendly". This type of pressure rejects the other person for not being part of the "in" group. Non-users are excluded and made to feel unwanted. An example of this type pressure is "You'll never get another invitation to party again."

The fourth and final type of negative peer pressure is "tease". With this type you are teased and made to feel different if you don't participate. An example is "Are you chicken?"

Our friends are important to us. We would like to please them and do what they ask. Sometimes it makes us feel good when our friends include us in their plans. We also don't want to be seen as being different from the rest of the group. Throughout all

Pharmacy & Your Health

Cold Medicine Recommendations

In the September issue of American Druggist, chain store and independent community pharmacists' recommendations for over-the-counter cold products are listed. Product recommendations were made for liquid cold products, long-acting cold preparations, cold tablets, multi-symptom products, and products for sinus conditions. Pharmacists indicated that they received more consumer requests for cold tablet recommendations than for other forms of cold medicines.

Liquid Cold Products: Chain store pharmacists recommended Dimetapp Elixir most often. Independents recommended Nyquil.

Long-Acting Cold Products: Drixoral was recommended most often by both groups of pharmacists.

Multi-Symptom Products: Independent and chain store pharmacists preferred Comtrex over similar products.

Cold Tablets: Actifed was recommended most often by chain pharmacists, while independents recommended Drixoral.

MICROWAVE COOKING TIPS FOR CONVERTING RECIPES

You can save lots of time in the long run by adapting your long-time favorite recipes to microwave cooking, but it takes a bit of experimenting. Here are some tips:

*The temperature of the food before it's cooked and the food's shape, composition, and volume all factor into the cooking time. Check manufacturer's cook book for recommendations on dish sizes, control settings, and cooking times of similar recipes.

*Combine the ingredients for most recipes as usual.

*Skip any browning steps. However, when a conventional recipe calls for cooking onions or vegetables in butter first, do include this step.

*Cubed meat and chopped vegetables will cook more evenly if cut uniformly.

*Reduce the cooking liquid in soups, stews, and main dishes by one-fourth, since little evaporates in cooking.

*Puncture foods with sealed skins, such as potatoes, before baking.

*Cook in oven-proof glass, or ceramic dishes without metal trim; or use cookware designed for microwave ovens. If you're not sure about a utensil, place the empty utensil in the microwave for 10 to 20 seconds. If it feels warm, don't use it in the microwave.

*For soups, stews, and main dishes with liquid, you'll need a container with about two cups extra volume.

*Since cakes and quick breads rise higher in a microwave oven, fill pans just half full of batter.

When baking large cakes, brownies, or moist bars, place a shot glass or juice glass in the center of the baking dish to prevent a soggy middle and ensure uniform baking throughout.



Diet and Cavities

Many people think that only sugar plays a part in causing cavities. However, starches, or complex carbohydrates, also contribute to cavity formation. Sugars and starches interact with bacteria in the film of plaque that constantly forms on the teeth, and this produces acids which erode tooth enamel.

We can't avoid all sugars and starches and still eat a nutritious diet. For example, fresh fruits naturally contain sugar. Starch foods include bread and crackers as well as cookies. You can reduce the risk of cavities by being selective:

- Avoid foods that stick to the teeth. If you eat them, brush and floss immediately afterward.
- Avoid hard candies and other foods that remain in the mouth for a long time. The same goes for sugar-sweetened drinks.
- Read food-product labels to determine sugar content in any form -- sucrose, corn syrup, fructose, glucose, dextrose or honey.

It's essential to brush and floss faithfully and to regularly have the teeth cleaned professionally to remove any plaque that remains despite home care.



INSIGHT IN EYESIGHT

DEPTH PERCEPTION

Because the eyes are set about two and one-half inches apart, each retina receives a slightly different image. You can readily see this if you place your finger eight inches in front of your nose, close one eye at a time and watch your finger change it's apparent position. Deep within the brain there are special cells which match the offset images from the two eyes to yield the sense of depth.

To maintain this system, very precise and intricate alignment of the eyes is necessary. There are six muscles

which control the focus of each eye. Horizontally, the alignment must be within a few degrees vertically, even less. The very narrow range of the vertical alignment explains why people with one eye sighting slightly higher than the other experience difficulties, and you may even see double. You can appreciate the importance of testing this faculty during an examination.



Letter To The Editor

SCHOOL PROPOSAL TO UPGRADE QUESTIONED
To The Tishomingo County School Board:
Controversy continues concerning the consolidation of
Iuka School District and Tishomingo County School
District.

Last week's article made it obvious to the voters and the
concerned parents which stand the School Board has
taken on this most important subject.

We were given many reasons NOT to support con-
solidation; such as expense involved in equipping and
maintaining the magnet school, transportation problems,
location, tax increase and appointment of a county Superin-
tendent of Education.

We may indeed have "good schools" in Tishomingo
County with facilities that have been adequate in the past,
but times change and parents do not want their children to
be locked into minimum wage jobs. We need improvements
and most parents of school children are willing to help if
given the chance. My main concern lies in the Burnsville
area and articles may state that our students consistently
score above state average and above average ACT scores to
enter college. To question some of our local parents that
have children who have graduated salutatorians and
valedictorians, have high enough scores to enter a junior
college, but scores that are too low to enter Ole Miss or
Mississippi State. Our teachers may also be dedicated, but
that seems hard to believe in Burnsville since 11 of 18 high
school teachers are new this school year.

Also, Burnsville must be the exception in the county, when
mentioning the "highest accreditation rating" that can be
achieved in the state, as anyone that is remotely involved
knows this is incorrect.

The people of these communities understand that the job
of coming up with the \$3,000,000 is quite the commitment,
but there are many grants and funds available to be utilized
if needed. Consolidation is inevitable, whether it be now or
two years from now; the only difference being that if we
consolidate now, we have \$7,000,000 available to apply
toward the process. If we do not consolidate now and lose
the impact funds, there will be no money available in the
future. This is our children and grandchildren's future. Let's
don't accept this new proposal with no comments. WE
NEED CONSOLIDATION. Some citizens show concern that
our Board will not accept this money that is laid in their lap,
as with the satellite learning program that we had a chance
to get, but some people felt that our school didn't need.

If the Tishomingo County School Board keeps its
priorities in line, and work for the students rather than their
own jobs; we won't see this opposition. We'll get the con-
solidation, the impact money, better education and a
brighter future for our children.

I think taxpayers would accept a tax increase for this
chance. Especially since we're most always hit with in-
creases that we haven't even had a chance to choose or op-
pose. What better reason to pay more taxes?

Maybe we need state appointed officials in the Board
capacity, as we certainly haven't had satisfying results with
our elected officials. This is the time for concerned parents,
students, teachers and voters to make their position known.
Don't close the door on this opportunity to pull our school
out of the rut that seems to prevail in Burnsville. We can get
new schools if we can get our Board to work for us. Without
voters, they wouldn't be in their present position, but now it
seems they're working against what they were elected to do!
Mississippi has the highest poverty rate in the country.
One reason is the low quality of education we're giving our
kids.

Remember the words of a famous President: "Don't
worry about the mules going blind, just load the wagon!"

Tishomingo should accept new schools

Editorial Re-printed From The Northeast Miss. Daily Journal

Tishomingo County and Iuka public school districts' trustees overwhelmingly approved a merger plan Monday night. The plan's final approval will qualify the new, merged district for \$7 million in state Economic Impact Authority funds to help build a nationally competitive school system. The strongest possible public schools will improve the education of the county's students while also helping attract new residents who will work at NASA's \$1.3 billion rocket motor plant at Yellow Creek in the northern part of the county.

But there's a potential stumbling block, and it must be removed. Some Tishomingo County School District voters oppose the merger and want a referendum on the issue. If the forces opposing merger succeed in calling a referendum and prevail at the polls, the merger will be blocked — and Tishomingo County will lose the \$7 million forever.

If the merger is implemented, the \$7 million will be matched with \$3 million in local funds for extensive renovations and additions at Belmont High School and a new high school in the northern end of the county.

Both high schools will offer broadly based courses, as requested by NASA officials. Both schools will be competitive with the best school systems in Mississippi and other states. The new high school in the northern part of the county will be unique in Mississippi because it will be operated as a university center. Its science laboratories will be built to university specifications and standards. It will admit students countywide for advanced course work. State and county operating funds for the two schools will be equal on a per pupil basis. University funds will support the advanced curriculum at the new high school in the northern part of the county.

Set the facts straight about merger

It's important to set the record straight about the pending merger:

• If Tishomingo countians refuse the state's gift of \$7 million it will go to some other county. People who claim that the state will hold the money until Tishomingo County comes up with another plan are mistaken. Alcorn County and Itawamba County would like nothing better than to get Tishomingo County's slice of the economic impact pie. There's a good chance they'll get it if Tishomingo falters. If the money were to go to neighboring counties for education, Tishomingo County would be put at a virtually insurmountable education disadvantage.

• The new school district, which is planned to go into effect in 1991, will be countywide. It will be governed by an elected school board. One trustee will represent each of the county's five districts, and voters will control who sits on the new school board with their votes. The two existing school boards will be dissolved simultaneously. The Iuka school board will not control the current county school district at any point in the merger process.

• The superintendent of the new district will be appointed because that is required for the county to qualify for economic impact funds. The appointed superintendent will answer directly to the elected school board. The elected school board will be held accountable by voters. People all over Tishomingo County will have a direct, central role in how their schools are run.

• The Economic Impact Authority was tailor-made for Tishomingo County's unprecedented opportunities in connection with the NASA plant. It and the surrounding counties are the only ones currently qualified for the economic impact authority funds. Good public schools attract new growth and prosperity. Good schools bring in people who build homes, open and own businesses, raise families and expand the county's economy and tax base. A lack of good public schools discourages growth and takes money out of Tishomingo countians' pockets.

Decide to strive for excellence

Every school in Tishomingo County currently meets the minimum standards set by the state Department of Education. But parents should ask two questions for their children's sake:


• Is the minimum all we want?
• Do we want to just "get by," or do we want to excel in company with the best schools in the nation?


The road to mediocrity lies in refusing the impact funds and being satisfied with just getting by.

The road to excellence is through a merged district enriched with \$10 million in state and local funds, advanced programs and superior facilities countywide.

Tishomingo County has a chance to lead Northeast Mississippi if it accepts the state's \$7 million and the innovations that will come with it.

Tishomingo countians should accept the merger, take the state's money and build a prosperous future through their public schools.

Social Security Changes Effective January, 1990

A 4.7 percent cost-of-living adjustment will increase the amount of Social Security and Supplement Security Income (SSI) payments in January.

The annual benefit change raises the amount of the maximum age 65 Social Security retirement benefit to \$975.00 a month and the full Federal SSI payment to \$386 for an individual and \$579 for a couple.

The tax rate for Social Security will be 7.65 percent in 1990 for employers and employees and 15.3 percent for self-employed persons. The wage base - the amount of earnings subject to the tax will increase from \$48,000 in

1989 to \$50,400 in 1990. Benefit increases are made annually based on the change in the consumer price index from the third quarter of one year to the third quarter of the following year.

Other changes announced by the Social Security Administration include new limits for the retirement earnings test - the amount of earnings a beneficiary can earn and still receive full Social Security benefits. The limits for 1990 increase from \$8,880 to \$9,360 for people age 65 to 69, and from \$6,480 to \$6,840 for people who are under 65. After a person's 70th birthday, no limit is placed on earnings.

The amount of earnings needed to earn one work credit for Social Security coverage will be \$520. A maximum of four work credits can be earned per year.

On November 21, Congress voted to repeal the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act as of January 1, 1990. Here are some of the questions most Medicare beneficiaries have regarding this:

Q. What is the new Medicare Medical Insurance Premium?

A. For 1990, The Basic Medicare Medical Insurance Premium is \$28.60.

Q. Why did the notice from Social Security say the premium for 1990 is \$33.90, if it's really only \$28.60?

A. When Congress changed the Medicare Program, and repealed the Catastrophic Health Insurance, the premium was lowered. But the change in the premium came too late for use to adjust the premium deduction in your January 3rd check or to reprint the notice we sent you. It will take us several months to correct your benefit amount to reflect the lower premium, but we will automatically refund any money we owe you.

Q. What do I have to do to get my refund?

A. You don't have to do anything. We will take care of it automatically, and we will send you a note in your check, or a separate notice if you have direct deposit.

Q. When will the premiums be corrected?

A. Our best estimate is that the August 3rd check will be correct.

Q. How long will it take to get my refund?

A. We will automatically refund any money we owe you some time after we make the premium correction in August. You will receive a separate refund check.

Q. I get billed for Medicare, and my bill is wrong. What should I do?

A. You should pay the amount shown on the bill to ensure that your Medicare coverage will continue. You will automatically be credited for any extra money you pay.

beyond recognition. Minor friction follows, then the fight. Chances are the toothpaste drama was only symptomatic of deeper feelings which had been within both for some time. Only the spark was needed to ignite them.

There are a number of communication approaches, but I find the following very helpful. First, one spouse shares their true feelings with the other. Honesty and openness are important. That may take 15 or 20 minutes, or however long is needed. The other spouse then gives feedback, telling what they really heard being said. This gives the first spouse opportunity to correct any misunderstanding feelings.

Roles are then switched, following the same procedure. This process may

take 30 to 45 minutes longer. At the conclusion both may still be angry, but at least they will know the source of their anger, the problem. Instead of being out of control, they will be in control, acting rather than reacting. They will be communicated by listening with concentration rather than just "hearing each other out".





ASCS Farm News

WORLD AND U.S. AGRICULTURAL OUTLOOK Overview

The world agricultural outlook is highlighted by rebounding commodity output, rising consumption and falling crop stocks. World crop production is recovering from last year's reduced level; but for most crops, production will not match continued high levels of use. In 1990, world animal product output will expand, led by much larger U.S. poultry production. World commodity consumption will reach a record level in response to large output, continued economic expansion and population growth. Commodity prices will be supported by strong demand and a working down

of crop stocks, although feed grain and oilseed prices will ease from last season's drought-stricken levels.

This outlook suggests U.S. farmers can look forward to another year of favorable income. Increased marketing receipts are anticipated because of larger commodity output and higher prices for some commodities. At the same time, production expenses will stabilize with lower feed costs. Even with smaller direct Government payments, producers will make cash farm income of \$52 to \$57 billion in 1990. This would be 2 to 4 percent higher than our latest estimate for 1989. Net farm income of \$44 to \$49 billion would be 2 to 5 percent below 1989's record, reflecting a smaller expected increase in the value of commodity inventories in 1990.

U.S. Farm Income and Food Prices

Larger commodity marketings and dampened production expenses should mean a year of increased income to farmers. Consumers will find large commodity supplies and slower inflation, suggesting only moderately higher food prices.

U.S. Crop Production in 1990

There are two developments that point to larger crop production next year: An easing of requirements for Government program participation; and higher prospective yields.

U.S. Exports to Grow in the 1990's

Economic growth and an easing of trade barriers in the 1990's would stimulate world consumption and agricultural trade, particularly for developing countries. U.S.

agricultural exports would stand to gain in view of more than ample crop production capacity to meet market needs at home and abroad.

In summary, global grain trade is likely to increase in the 1990's in response to economic growth and trade reform. The United States should be in a good competitive position to take advantage of the growth in global trade.

FORESTRY INCENTIVE PROGRAM SIGNUP (FIP)

There will be a FIP signup held December 11th - December 22, 1989. The purpose of this practice is to establish a stand of trees for soil protection, forestry purposes, and to preserve and improve the environment. The program is designed for cutover timberland and marginal cropland and other open acres. Policies for this prac-

tice are as follows: Cost-sharing is authorized for the establishment of trees that will provide both forest products and improved protection from wind and water erosion, clearing land occupied largely by scrubby bushes of no economic value, only where essential to permit planting desirable tree species, planting must be protected from destructive fire and grazing.

The practice will be required to be maintained for a minimum of 10 years following the calendar year of installation or establishment.

Ask Ochsner

Q. What are the general effects of drinking alcohol? With the holiday season ap-

proaching, it would be an interesting subject to address from a medical standpoint.

A. Dr. Thomas Feagin, head of the section of community internal medicine at Ochsner Clinic, says that the general effects of drinking alcohol depend on body weight and whether the drinker has or has not eaten while drinking. Drinking alcohol can act as a general anesthetic and reduce inhibitions, but, by just consuming it in small amounts, it will impair your decision-making capabilities.

Based on consumption of a single drink (12 ounces of beer, 4 ounces of dry wine and 1 ounce of hard liquor), and given a person of average size and weight, here is the general effect of drinking:

- 1-2 drinks - a sense of comfort and relaxation.
- 3 - reduced inhibitions and exaggerated behavior.

4 drinks - clumsiness and slurring of speech, and nearing point of legal intoxication.

5 drinks - obvious intoxication; drinker will usually fall asleep.

7-8 drinks - if consumed quickly enough to raise blood alcohol level to 0.3, death can result from respiratory function failure.

The effects of alcohol on the brain and nervous system include behavioral aggressiveness, mental deterioration, poor judgment and an increased risk for accidents. It is known to contribute to violent behavior, and is responsible for auto, pedestrian and fire fatalities, suicide attempts and child abuse.

If you happen to make it home after a binge of drinking, hangovers are inevitably faced by most par-


ty-goers. Dr. Feagin says that heavy smoking poses to heavy drinkers of tobacco while drinking also tributes to the hangover experienced by the person who drinks too much. Probably the most hangover remedy, Dr. Feagin says, is taking aspirin and drinking glasses of water. Going to bed would reduce the hangover. And, of course, if you don't drive!





and of no effect.

8. This order shall not become final unless and until this
order is submitted to and approved by the Mississippi State
Board of Education and the U.S. Attorney General. In the
event this order shall be disapproved by the Mississippi
State Board of Education and/or the U.S. Attorney General,
the same shall be void and of no effect. In the event of the
filing of any petitions with the Tishomingo County School
District Board of Trustees under the provisions of law
governing this procedure, the Board of Trustees shall verify
same and make a determination of whether the petitions are
signed by the requisite number of qualified electors. The
findings of the Tishomingo County School District Board of
Trustees upon this question shall be final and conclusive
for the purpose of the submission of the matter to the
Mississippi State Board of Education and the approval or
disapproval of the action by the Mississippi State Board of
Education.

9. Any person aggrieved by this order adopted under any
of the foregoing provisions may appeal therefrom within
ten (10) days from the date of the adjournment of the
meeting of the Tishomingo County School District Board of
Trustees at which such order shall be finally entered upon
its minutes.

Does the time of day I take
my calcium supplement have
any effect on how it works in
my body?

Some experts believe that
calcium supplements are
better absorbed on an empty
stomach, when phytates and
oxalates (chemicals in food)
are not available to inter-
fere with calcium absorp-
tion. Others believe that
calcium absorption is
highest when taken with
meals because the lactose
and glucose (two sugars)
present in many foods will
increase calcium absorp-
tion.

A recent study suggests
that one can attain

reason for increased absorp-
tion is unknown. In a
previous study published in
1985, it was found that older
persons who could not
produce hydrochloric acid in
their stomachs had better
calcium absorption at
mealtimes.

The Facts Concerning Our Schools

In this article we will confront the most important issue facing Tishomingo County today - OUR CHILDREN'S FUTURE! Both today and in coming weeks, we will deal with the FACTS concerning the proposed school district merger. It is our belief that if your people know the FACTS that they will support the proposed school improvements put forth by the school boards and the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD).

The most asked questions concerning proposed school improvements in Tishomingo County.

1. Why are our (county) schools being given away to luka?

ANSWER: Our county schools are not being given away. Both the luka Separate and the Tishomingo County Schools will dissolve and be merged into one county-wide system at the same point in time July 1, 1991. AT NO TIME WILL EITHER SCHOOL BOARD HAVE JURISDICTION OR CONTROL OVER THE OPERATIONS OF THE OTHER SCHOOL DISTRICT. THE NEW BOARD THAT WILL TAKE OVER AT THAT TIME WILL BE ELECTED FROM THE EXISTING SUPERVISOR DISTRICTS.

2. Why are we (county) being forced to adopt a system which requires an appointed Superintendent of Education in light of the fact that the voters of the county overwhelmingly rejected this option two years ago?

ANSWER: The people should know that:

1. This is a non-negotiable requirement by the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development the county must comply with in order for the county to receive the \$7 million impact money. This gift was not being offered two years ago when the voters rejected the change.

2. If the change is made we will have as the administrative head of our schools the best educator we can find from either Tishomingo County or the entire United States. He or she does not necessarily have to be a good politician, only a good educator who knows excellence in education when he or she sees it.

3. Finally, and perhaps most important, a school district is a large and complex organization; it must have only one boss who is directly accountable to the people for the quality of education in that district. If both the superintendent and board are elected, neither one is accountable to the other for the job that they do. The board can always blame the superintendent or the superintendent can blame the board for the district's problems. If the board appoints the superintendent, the voters will be able to know without a doubt who is in charge and who is accountable to them. They will only have to go to their board member to talk to the one in charge.

3. I live in Tishomingo and I am facing having to send my child to school at Belmont. How can I expect my child will get as good an education at a renovated facility in Belmont as he or she would get at the new facility in the north end of the county?

ANSWER: On the governor's announcement on December 5th, he stated that the school at Belmont would offer a curriculum which would be competitive with the school on the north end of the county. This means that both will be able to offer from 45 to 70 courses (carnegie units). This will be about twice to three times the credits presently offered by the county schools.


Also, according to Mr. Bill Burnette with the Impact Authority of the Dept. of Economic and Community Development, the school at Belmont will receive up to \$1 Million in Impact funds for additions and renovations to accommodate the added students and classes. This will be matched with up to \$300,000 in local money to bring the total up to \$1,300,000 that can be spent on the Belmont High School.

County Agents Notes

COTTON PLANNING

The cotton harvest may be over in Tishomingo County, but producers still have work to do. There are several jobs done in winter that are important to cotton production in the spring. Among these tasks Tishomingo County cotton producers perform are soil sampling, subsoiling, liming, land forming and drainage improvement.

Winter is also a good time to analyze the 1989 crop and evaluate current production methods before the 1990 crop is planted. Producers who make decisions about cultural practices should fully consider weather conditions.

Poor performance for a single season shouldn't be the only factor in determining whether to change a method or technique. A new practice should not be adopted on a large percentage of cotton acreage before it becomes a proven performer over a period of time.

Producers should stick with proven practices.

limiting new ideas to a small number of acres until they are properly evaluated.

To remain competitive, producers must be exposed to the latest technology. They wisely spend time attending winter meetings and reading publications.

Much research that is being conducted has potential for increasing cotton quality and yield. Producers should read carefully and listen carefully, however. They should ask questions and attempt an understanding of how that knowledge can be applied to individual farming situations.

The Beltwide Cotton Conference may offer cotton producers new insights into research and new technology. The conference will be Jan. 8-12 in Las Vegas, Nevada. Call the Tishomingo County Extension Office at 423-3616 for more information.

PASTURE WEEDS

Several weed problems in winter pastures will need attention fairly soon. Wild turnip, wild mustard, buttercup (yellowtop) and dock are a few of the broadleaf weeds that are common in pastures this time of year.

These weeds can be controlled with an application of 2,4-D or a combination of 2,4-D and dicamba.

Ditch banks, fence rows and other similar areas with undesirable brush should be treated with herbicides this winter. Basal sprays of 2,4-D, 2,4-DP, dicamba or Garlon in diesel fuel will give good control. These treatments are useful when foliar applications are risky near sensitive crops such as cotton and soybeans.

POINSETTIA CARE
Christmas poinsettias are

beautiful and will last many weeks if properly cared for. The length of time these plants will last depends on the maturity of the plant at purchase, the variety and the treatment at home.

When buying poinsettias, check the age of the flower. The colorful "flowers" actually are vividly colored leaves called "bracts." The actual poinsettia flower is the tiny, yellow bead-like structure in the center of the bracts.

Mature flowers are slightly swollen and their cups show nectar. Avoid buying poinsettias that have already dropped their flowers and bracts.

Plant breeders have introduced new varieties of poinsettias. These new varieties offer more bracts per stem and wider color ranges. Most of them are bred to last much longer than the older varieties.

Poinsettias often remain in good condition for two to three months if care is provided. Place the plants in sunny exposures in the home. Don't allow the bracts to touch cold windowpanes as freezing temperatures cause damage.

Increase humidity around poinsettias when possible.
