Kelley Rutledge of Iuka is one of the 773 high school students from across the U.S. who will perform in the Lord Mayor of Westminster's New Year's Day Parade in London. The participants, all-star members of Universal Cheerleaders Association (UCA) and Universal Dance Association (UDA), will tour the European city during their eight-day trip.

"This trip and performance will give these young people a chance to show their talents to an international audience," said Kris Shepherd, UCA vice president. "They really enjoy performing together and the camaraderie of the group is infectious. Both our kids and the folks in London consider this event a real treat."

UCA, founded by former University of Oklahoma head cheerleader Jeff Webb in 1974, conducts training camps for more than 75,000 high school and college cheerleaders, dance teams and mascots in 44 states each summer.

UCA also produces national high school and college cheerleading competitions which are broadcast annually over the Entertainment and Sports Program-

ming Network (ESPN). Varsity Spirit Fashions, a UCA subsidiary, manufactures and markets uniforms and spirit supplies.

While in London, the group will visit the new Elvis Presley Museum where members of the Memphis contingent will present gifts from the Graceland estate, Memphis Mayor Richard C. Hackett and Shelby County Mayor Williams N. Morris Jr.

Kelley departed from Atlanta December 26 and will arrive back in Atlanta late January 2nd.

Kelley attended UCA camp at the University of Mississippi along with the other Iuka cheerleaders.

Kelley is a junior at Iuka High School. This is her third year to serve as a varsity cheerleader. She also is a Lady Chieftain basketball player and a member of the varsity tennis team. She is serving as an officer of the Beta Club and Fellowship of Christian Athletes. She is also on the annual staff. She was a finalist in the Beta Beauty Review. Kelley is an honor roll student. She is active in her local church, Iuka United Methodist.

Attention Federal Retirees

The State of Mississippi has illegally collected state income tax from the annuity payments of federally retired persons according to the Mississippi Federation. National Association of Retired Federal Employees, and continues to do so, even though the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that a state shall not discriminate between state retirees and federal retirees in collecting income taxes imposed on their annuities. The state retirees are totally exempt from payment of any state income tax against their state annuity, while federal retirees must pay state income tax on any amount of their annuity above \$5,000.

Members of the Mississippi Federation, National Association of Retired Federal Employees, will institute a lawsuit against the state to collect a refund of these taxes for the statute of limitation years. If a person has paid income tax to the state for these years that person should immediately file

amended state income tax returns for the years 1986, 1987 and 1988, claiming refunds, and citing Davis vs. Michigan as a precedent for the claim.

Funeral Services For James L. "Shim" Dean

James Lyle "Shim" Dean, age 81, died Tuesday, December 26, 1989 at the Iuka Hospital. Mr. Dean served the people of Iuka some 20 years as a member of the Board of Aldermen. He was devoted to his home town and worked hard for the development and progress of Iuka during his four terms as a city law maker. He retired from political life in 1985.

"Shim" Dean was a businessman in Iuka in the late 1930's and early 1940's, owning a pressing and cleaning business and also a Bowling Alley. During this time, he first entered the political life in Iuka, serving as a member of the Board of Aldermen for three terms. In the 1940's he took a job with Mead Paper Company, buying pulp in the Iuka yard for several years

before moving to Kingsport, Tenn. where he worked 30 years with Mead. Following his retirement and return to Iuka, Mr. Dean was again elected to serve as Alderman for two terms.

Funeral services for James L. Dean were held Wednesday, December 27, at 3:00 at the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. W.T. Dexter and Rev. Frank Burton officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery. He was a member of the Iuka United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Ruth Russell Dean of Iuka; and one daughter, Glenda Dean of Iuka.

Pallbearers were: John Biggs, Bob Brown, Frank Burns, Leroy Dean, Chuck Kay and Curtis Seago.

Unemployment Up In Tishomingo County

Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, reported that unemployment in Tishomingo County at mid-November, edged up to reach 19.6 percent of the civilian labor force, compared to 16.8 percent last month and 18.9 percent for November, 1988. The civilian labor force for the county also increased from last month but experienced a loss of 220 from one year ago. There were 6,160 Tishomingo County residents employed at mid-month, 140 below the October figure and 230 below that of November, one year ago.

Manufacturing em-

ployment in the county at 2,400, experienced both monthly and yearly losses. Non-manufacturing employment, estimated to be 2,920, also experienced monthly and yearly losses.

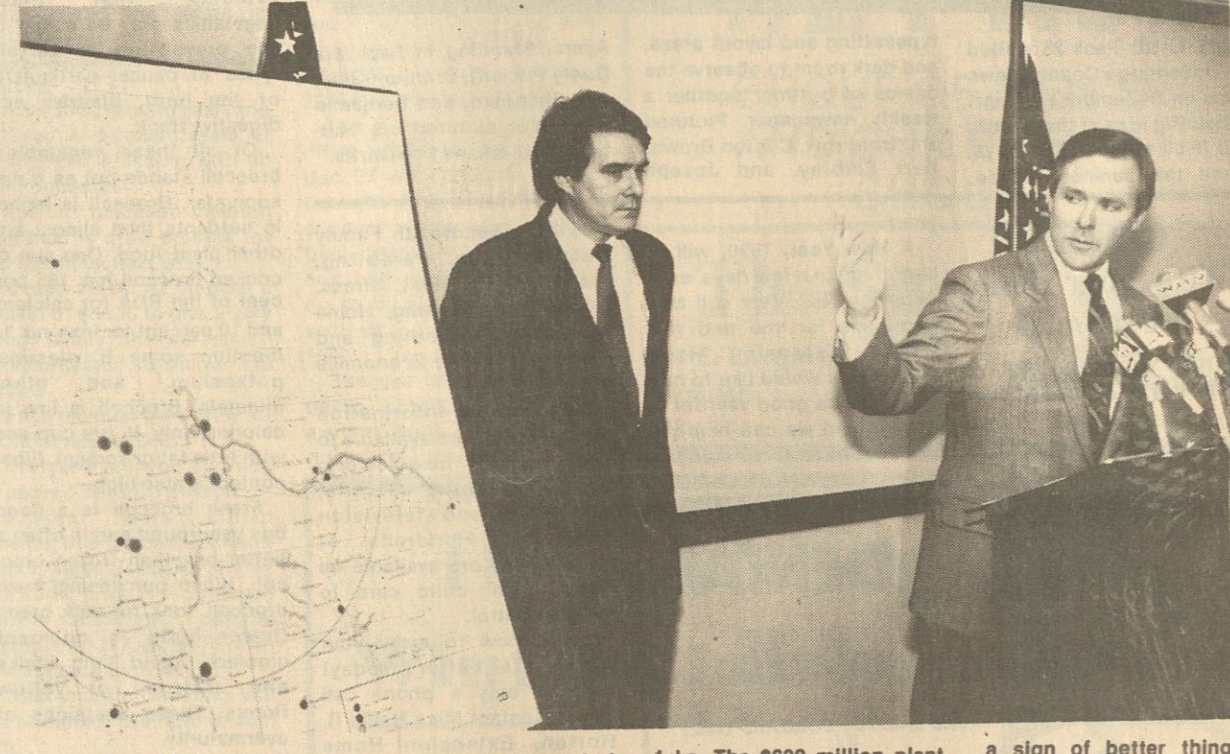

BROCCOLI-A SMART SELECTION

Recently, we have heard lots of talk about eating vegetables as a cancer preventative. The Surgeon General specifically recommends such vegetables as broccoli, cauliflower, box choy, brussel sprouts, cabbage, kohlrabi, mustard, and turnip greens, collard, kale and rutabagas. There is

evidence that these vegetables may be linked to the prevention of certain types of cancer—particularly of the lung, bladder and digestive tract.

Of all these vegetables, broccoli stands out as a real superstar. Broccoli is higher in nutrients than almost any other plant food. One cup of cooked broccoli has 165 percent of the RDA for calcium, and 10 percent for iron, not to mention some B vitamins, potassium, and other minerals. Broccoli is low in calories—only 45 per cup and with little fat or sodium. Fiber content is also high.

Fresh broccoli is a good buy year round and is often a better buy than frozen broccoli. When purchasing fresh broccoli, look for dark green flower buds in compact clusters. Avoid limp stalks and enlarged or yellow florets. These are signs of overmaturity.

Broccoli has increased in popularity in the last years. In fact, we now eat more than five times the broccoli as we did in 1972. It is also very versatile in that it can be served raw, or lightly steamed in salads, as a companion to rice or other grains, chopped or pureed in soups, baked in casseroles, in sauces over pasta, minced into omelettes, stuffed into baked potatoes with low fat cottage cheese and chives and more.

When preparing broccoli, don't overlook the stems and leaves. They are as nutrient rich as the florets. Discard only the tough woody ends and use the rest of the plant. However, the stems will take longer to cook, so sliced them thin and cook them somewhat before adding the florets to the pot. If you prefer cooking the stems intact, cut gashes in the ends of the stems to speed their cooking.

In order to retain the maximum nutrients, flavor, color and texture, brief cooking is the key. Try cooking broccoli by steaming, stir frying, or microwaving just until tender but still crunchy.

Broccoli needs very little added to it for flavor or garnish. A little butter or margarine and/or lemon juice enhances broccoli's natural goodness without overpowering it like heavy cheese or cream sauces. Use your imagination and experiment with seasonings such as her-

bs and spices, lemon juice or vinegars and soy sauces for extra zip.

GREEN BEAN BAKE

1 can (10 3/4 ounces) condensed cream of mushroom soup
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon soy sauce
Dash pepper
2 packages (9 ounces each) frozen green beans, cooked and drained
1 can (3 1/2 ounces) French fried onions

Home Environment: Through the 4-H home environment project, 4-H members learn the home involves not only the furnishings and structure, but also the experiences and personalities of the people who live in the home.

Every household is different. Each individual needs privacy as well as a place to interact with others. Knowing how to arrange space and select furnishings enriches different types of lifestyles.

4-H members enrolled in the home environment project know there's more to a well-designed home than just selecting the right wallpaper to go with the right tablecloth. They learn to understand design principles and their own relationships to space.

Activities in the home environment project teach principles and materials necessary to make the home more attractive, convenient and comfortable within the family resources. Members can learn the values of old as well as new furnishings and accessories.

Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

Mineral Oil and Fat-Soluble Vitamins

Is there a nutritional benefit that can occur from use of mineral oil?

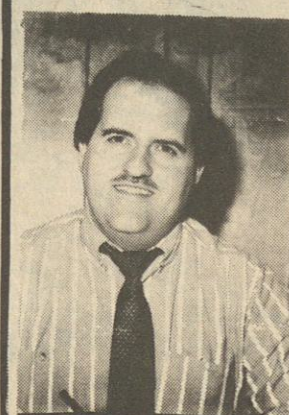
Unlike vegetable and animal fats (oils), mineral oil normally is not absorbed from the stomach and intestines and provides no nutritional benefits - no calories, no vitamins, no minerals. Mineral oil is used to prevent constipation and is available in at least one popular nonprescription product in combination with milk of magnesia. Short-term use of mineral oil for this purpose may be appropriate, but long-term use could result in vitamin deficiencies. Mineral oil may interfere with absorption of fat-soluble vitamins such as A, D, E, and K.

Research studies have provided conflicting results. In at least one study, giving mineral oil twice daily for more than two months was associated with reduced blood levels of some vitamins. In another study in which children had been given mineral oil for as long as six years, there was no demonstrated reduction in vitamin blood levels. It is possible that long-term use of mineral oil could result in vitamin deficiencies or the need to take supplements. Persons with chronic constipation should consider a psyllium-type laxative made from plantago seed husks.

When used on a platform, the United States flag should be displayed above the speaker. When from a staff in a public auditorium, the United States flag should hold the superior prominence of the position of the clergyman's or right as he faces the audience. 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OPTOMETRIST

BE CAREFUL WITH MAKEUP

Makeup and contact lenses do not mix. However, with a few simple precautions, you will find it no real problem to use both.

Try to put makeup on after inserting contacts, and remove the makeup after you've taken them out. If you find that you displace lenses frequently, a lighter touch should help, as should certain changes in the form of makeup you use. For example, switching from a hard pencil eyeliner to a softer one, or to liquid.

Confine eyeliner to the

outer part of your eyes and lower lashes. Let it wander to the rims. Be sure to wash your hands thoroughly before touching the eyes; cosmetic creams are difficult to remove. It's also best to use water-based, hypoallergenic cosmetics, particularly around the eyes. Mascara can be a real problem, especially the waterproof or building types. Mascara should also be discarded after a few months as it can be subject to bacterial contamination.

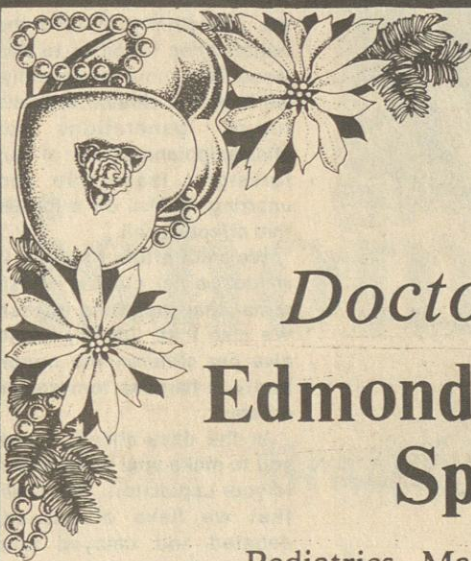

Home Testing For
Pregnancy

Testing for several health conditions can now be conducted in the privacy of one's home or office. Screening test kits are available to help detect the presence of vision problems, dental plaque, and colon cancer. Home test kits and devices are available for monitoring high blood pressure and diabetes. Pregnancy testing kits are also available for home use. Pregnancy tests detect the presence of HCG (human chorionic gonadotropin), a hormone produced during pregnancy.

In a recent article in Pharmacy Times, Dr. Janet McCombs indicates that the newer pregnancy test kits are more sensitive in detecting HCG than were "first-generation" test kits. Tests should be conducted early in the morning, while the urine is concentrated and contains the greatest amount of HCG. Urine may be collected in the morning and refrigerated for 8 to 12 hours for testing purposes.

A negative test result following a missed menstrual period warrants further testing. According to Dr. McCombs, false negative results occur far more frequently than do false positive results. Positive test results indicate the presence of HCG and possible pregnancy.



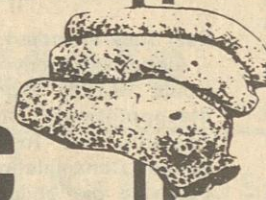

ORDER TO MERGE

THE IUKA SPECIAL MUNICIPAL SEPARATE SCHOOL DISTRICT WITH THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT INTO A SINGLE, COUNTY-WIDE SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District by resolution adopted on October 9, 1989, has declared its intention to merge the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District with the Tishomingo County School District into a single, countywide school district with a high school being located in both the North and South portions of the County and to cooperate with the Tishomingo County School District toward the goal; and

WHEREAS, a similar resolution was adopted by the Tishomingo County School District Board of Trustees on the 9th day of October, 1989, declaring its intentions to abolish itself and merge with the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District into a single, countywide school district with a high school being located in both the North and South portions of the County and to cooperate with the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District toward that goal; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District shall exist and continue to govern the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District until July 1, 1991, and the Board of Trustees of the Tishomingo County School District shall exist and continue to govern the Tishomingo County School District until July 1, 1991; and

WHEREAS, construction will begin on the NASA Solid Rocket Motor Plant to be located in the Yellow Creek area in Northern Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and the initial funding of that project has been approved by the United States Congress; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that Tishomingo County will experience a substantial growth in population in the near future which will place heavy demands on the existing schools in Tishomingo County; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Economic and Community Development has proposed to offer Tishomingo County up to 7.7 million dollars in funding for the construction of a regional educational complex and the upgrading and renovation of a second high school, said monies to be matched with 30% local monies; and

WHEREAS, a merger of the county's school systems and educational resources would substantially strengthen the school systems in the county and the educational opportunities offered to the children of Tishomingo County by such a system; and

WHEREAS, a merger of the school systems in the County would better enable the Trustees of the schools in Tishomingo County to utilize most effectively any minimum foundation program funds, and/or economic impact funds which become available in the future.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District as follows:

1. The Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District will merge with, reorganize, change and alter the boundaries of its district upon the Tishomingo County School District abolishing itself and agreeing to be incorporated in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, effective July 1, 1991. The Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District shall exist and continue to govern the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District until July 1, 1991, and the Board of Trustees of the Tishomingo County School District shall exist and continue to govern the Tishomingo County School District until July 1, 1991.

2. The newly formed single, countywide school district shall encompass the entire geographical area of Tishomingo County and shall have two high schools therein, one being located in the Northern portion of the County and one being located in the Southern portion of the County.

3. The name of the new single, countywide school district shall be determined by the Boards of Trustees of the existing Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District and the Tishomingo County School District.

4. The Board of Trustees of the new, single, countywide school district shall be composed of five members. One member of the Board shall be elected from each supervisor district and shall be a resident and qualified elector of the district from which he or she is elected. The election shall be held at the first regular general election following the approval of this proposed merger by the Mississippi State Board of Education. The trustees shall take office on the first Monday of July following their election. At such election the members of the newly formed Board of Trustees from supervisors districts 1 and 5 shall be elected for a term of six years, the members from districts 3 and 4 shall be elected for a term of four years, and the member from District 2 shall be elected for a term of two years. Thereafter, members shall be elected at regular general elections as vacancies occur for terms of six years each and shall take office on the first Monday of January after their election.

5. The superintendent of education of the newly formed single, countywide school district shall be appointed by the newly elected board of trustees for a period of time to be determined by the newly elected board of trustees and in compliance with applicable laws of the State of Mississippi.

6. This order shall be published in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published and having a general circulation in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District once each week for three consecutive weeks and a copy of this order shall be posted for the time required by law at three public places in the school district, said postings being as follows: Tishomingo County Courthouse, Iuka City Hall, Iuka High School.

7. This order shall become final thirty days after the first publication of the notice, as listed hereinafter, unless a petition is filed protesting the same within such time. In the

event no such petition is filed, the order shall become final at said time. However, in the event twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District file a petition with the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District Board of Trustees, within thirty (30) days after the date of the first publication of this notice, protesting against the merger, reorganization, change and alterations of the boundaries of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District, then an election shall be called and held on order of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District Board of Trustees, by the Tishomingo County Election Commission, after publication of legal notice of such election. The election shall be held within thirty (30) days after the first publication of the notice of such election. At such election the question shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District as to whether or not the district shall be merged, reorganized, changed or altered as provided in this order. If a majority of those voting in said election in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District shall vote in favor of the order of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District Board of Trustees, then such order shall become final. If a majority of those voting in said election in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District shall vote against the order, then such order shall be void and of no effect.

8. This order shall not become final unless and until this order is submitted to and approved by the Mississippi State Board of Education and the United States Attorney General. In the event this order shall be disapproved by the Mississippi State Board of Education and/or the United States Attorney General, the same shall be void and of no effect. In the event of the filing of any petitions with the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District Board of Trustees under the provisions of law governing this procedure, the Board of Trustees shall verify same and make a determination of whether the petitions are signed by the requisite number of qualified electors. The findings of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District Board of Trustees upon this question shall be final and conclusive for the purpose of the submission of the matter to the Mississippi State Board of Education and the approval or disapproval of the action by the Mississippi State Board of Education.

9. Any person aggrieved by this order adopted under any of the foregoing provisions may appeal therefrom within ten (10) days from the date of the adjournment of the meeting of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District Board of Trustees at which such order shall be finally entered upon its minutes.

In the event this order shall be disapproved by the Mississippi State Board of Education and/or the United States Attorney General, the same shall be void and of no effect. In the event of the filing of any petitions with the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District Board of Trustees under the provisions of law governing this procedure, the Board of Trustees shall verify same and make a determination of whether the petitions are signed by the requisite number of qualified electors. Iuka Hospital Opens
Nursing Facility

Because of a bill passed by the Mississippi legislature in July 1989, six hospitals in the state were allowed to convert a portion of their unused beds to extended care beds. Among the six was NMMC's affiliate, Iuka Hospital. According to Iuka Administrator Bill Rutledge, the bill allowed only those hospitals that had originally constructed nursing home facilities to convert their beds. Iuka had built its south wing in 1967 as an extended care facility. However, the need for acute care beds became greater, and the 36 beds were subsequently redesignated. Changing government regulations and health care needs, however, soon eliminated the need for the acute care beds. The south wing was closed about five years ago.

On September 11, the hospital admitted its first patient to the newly designated facility. There are currently 33 patients. Three rooms are still being renovated, but soon the full 36 beds will be in use.

Pat Cooper, RN, Nursing Facility Supervisor, says the additional beds are needed in Tishomingo County. "We've wanted to convert the beds for a long time," she said; "now we have finally been able to do it." Pat says that a lot of preparation went into opening the unit. Government regulations on the operation of nursing homes had to be studied by Pat and her 24-person staff. A multitude of forms were designed and printed and the rooms were renovated.

Rutledge says that the hospital and nursing facility share support services such as dietary and housekeeping. Rutledge, who has been licensed as a nursing home administrator since 1977, is also the facility's administrator. Additional staff required to operate the nursing facility included six LP-Ns, 13 nursing aides, and two dietary and housekeeping personnel.

Pat says there is a world of difference between working in a hospital and working in a nursing facility. "We provide both intermediate and skilled care for our patients," she said. "Each patient has a long-term care plan tailored to his/her specific needs."

Pat tries to visit each patient daily. On those rare occasions when she doesn't visit, her patients will usually

seek her out.

Although the quail's wings have been clipped, one bird did manage to fly the coop! "Our patients love the pets," Pat said. "Those who are able to come out to the garden do so regularly to check on them." Pat says plans call for adding patio furniture to the garden next summer.

The facility also has a full array of recreational and educational activities. Activity Director Becky Estes says such programs as aerobic dancing, music, hair-dressing, crafts, exercise, and sing-alongs are available. A number of the residents especially enjoy the Richard Simmons "Sweating with the Oldies" video.

When the unit opened, 109 names were on the waiting list. "We're glad to provide this needed service to our county," Rutledge remarked.

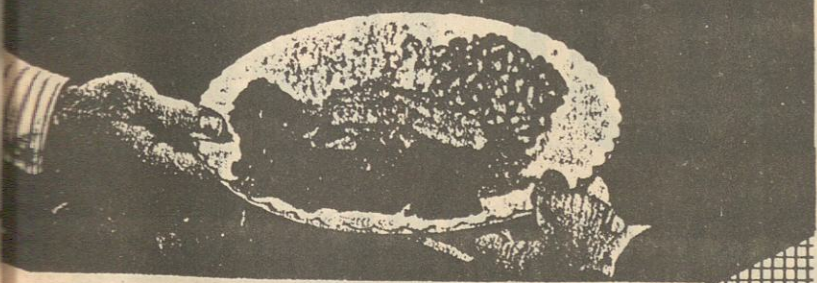

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Green's Proposal Flawed

In his article, dated December 21, 1989, entitled "The Truth About School Consolidation" there are several questions. First, the minor points of controversy are:

1. Green says the two county school system will not dissolve.

Response: Both boards of education will dissolve as of July 1991 and at that time merge into one. It's not really important what it will be called, it's only important that it be done.

2. Green says the Mississippi Impact Authority will enter into a contract with the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

Response: He knows this is not true. Call the Mississippi Department of Economic & Community Development Office in Jackson, if in doubt.

3. Green says our local school officials have had no voice or input into the proposal.

Response: This is not true. Mr. Green's office presented a proposal, along with over 60 others, that was not accepted by the State. If that's what he means that his proposal (input) was not accepted, then he is right.

4. Green says you will lose the right to vote for a Superintendent of Education.

Response: For an elected official who has practically no authority, e.g., he has no vote, can not fire or hire and cannot spend a dime without approval of the board of education, it is a small price to pay to get \$7,000,000.00 free and a chance for improved education plus the economic impact so badly needed by our county. We'll continue to elect our board members who will hire the best person available for the job.

5. Green again mentions that 84% of the people voted to keep his office on an elective basis.

Response: At the time of this vote, November 1988, there was no good reason to do otherwise. Now there is a much better reason.

6. Green says the Magnet School site has not been selected.

Response: We are publicly told it will be located in close proximity to the NASA facility. Who cares if it's a few feet one direction or the other.

7. Green asks how the 30% County matching money will be funded.

Response: Officials in our county say this can be done without a bond issue and hopefully without a tax increase. Even if there is a tax increase, it would be relatively small compared to what it would be if the county has to foot the total bill without State assistance.

8. Green says money for the South Tishomingo High School has not been addressed in writing.

Response: This is ridiculous. The Governor has formally told us that we will get approximately \$1,000,000.00 (could be slightly more) plus approximately \$300,000.00 from the County's matching funds for the High School at Belmont. At this stage, it's impossible to give an exact dollar and cents figure. Just because Mr. Green reneged on his contract with the county doesn't mean the State will do the same. We had nothing in writing from you, Mr. Green.

Reasonable answers to all the questions are available to everyone who wants to listen. If Mr. Green would quit distorting the truth, maybe more people would be willing to stop and listen.

9. Green's Local Plan - The major point.

Response: This undoubtedly is the more short-sighted pro-position as compared to the one accepted by the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development. Granted, Mr. Green has his own reasons for his position. He has to accept his share of the responsibility for much of the confusion and hostility generated amongst the people.

But wait a minute. Why would we want to continue feeding a dead horse? Green's proposal, for all practical purposes, is dead.

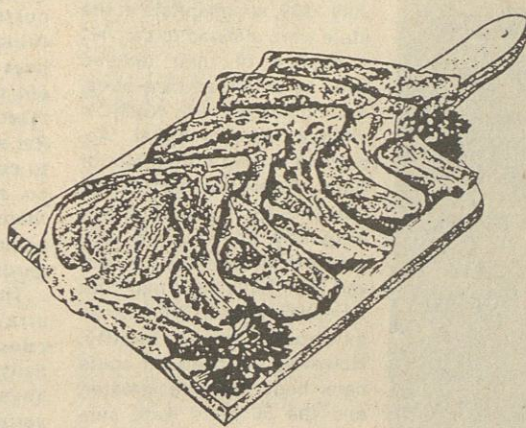

Chatting With Your Home Economist

UNIFYING COLOR THROUGHOUT THE HOME

When considering the colors for a particular room, you must consider the color scheme for the entire house.

Color helps unify a house. Adjoining rooms should have some relationship of color and pattern. Carry one or more colors from room to room but not necessarily in the same amounts, values or intensities. The dominant

color in one color scheme can be used as a secondary color in an adjoining room. A unified color scheme throughout the house con-

tributes to harmony and allows furnishings and accessories to be moved from room to room.

Some ways to develop a sense or feeling for color combinations include:

*Begin a scrapbook or file of color combinations you find appealing.

*Collect swatches of fabrics, wall coverings and paint chips with which to experiment.

*Visit furniture stores, interior design establishments, art galleries and fabric retailers to study color. Notice proportions, values and intensities of color combinations.

When looking at samples for possible use in the home, borrow the largest sample available. Study samples at different times of the day and night to see how colors change according to the

amount and type of lighting available in the room.

Remember to use the largest samples available because increasing an area of color influences its value and intensity. Also color combinations at small scale may only hint at the fullscale effect.

Individuals feeling uneasy about developing a color scheme for their home can take the easy route by choosing a ready-made one.

They can be found in a patterned wall covering, a china pattern, a fabric print or a patterned rug. Study the color composition, observing amounts and intensities. At-

temp to repeat the colors in the same proportions in the color scheme you're developing. Continue using the same color combination as you put colors and patterns together for each room in

the house.

You may interchange the dominant colors throughout the house if you feel a unified color scheme may become monotonous. For example, if the color scheme you've chosen is green and peach, use green as the dominant color in some areas and peach as the dominant color in other areas.

Another modification is to vary the intensities of the colors or to use more of a neutral (white, gray, cream) in some areas. When changing the intensity of a color, be cautious not to get too far away from the true color you're using. If the color modification is too intense, it may appear as though you've introduced a new color into a color scheme creating confusion.

Color in the home should reflect the color preferences

of the individuals who live there. Take current trends into account, but don't let trends determine your color scheme. Regardless of the colors in fashion, your individual preference should be the main consideration.

SCALLOPED POTATOES PARMESAN

2 cans (11 ounces each)
condensed Cheddar
cheese soup

1/2 cup milk

1/4 cup grated Parmesan
cheese

8 cups thinly sliced
potatoes

1 cup thinly sliced onion

1 tablespoon butter or
margarine

Paprika

In bowl, blend soup, milk, Parmesan. In buttered 3-quart shallow baking dish (13x9x2"), arrange alternate layers of potatoes, onion, and

sauce. Dot top with butter; sprinkle with paprika. Cover; bake at 400° F. for 45 minutes. Uncover; bake 15 minutes more or until potatoes are tender. Makes about 7 1/2 cups.

DON'T SNUB THE SPUD: Eat the whole thing. If you eagerly devour the tender insides of a baked potato - but not the skin - you're leaving a lot behind. Vitamins are concentrated near the skin, and the skin itself provides valuable roughage to aid digestion.

Mandatory Withholding For Farmers

Beginning January 1, 1990 some farmers will find themselves faced with mandatory income tax withholding for their workers. This provision

was a part of the recently passed budget reconciliation bill.

Under the old law wages paid for agricultural labor were exempt from income tax withholding requirements. In the new provision, if an agricultural worker's cash wages are subject to FICA withholding, the worker's cash wages are also subject to income tax withholding.

In general, agricultural workers are subject to FICA withholding if they earn at least \$150 in annual cash remuneration or are covered because of the employer FICA withholding test. The employer FICA withholding test subjects employee wages to FICA withholding if the employer pays more than \$2,500 during the year to all employees.

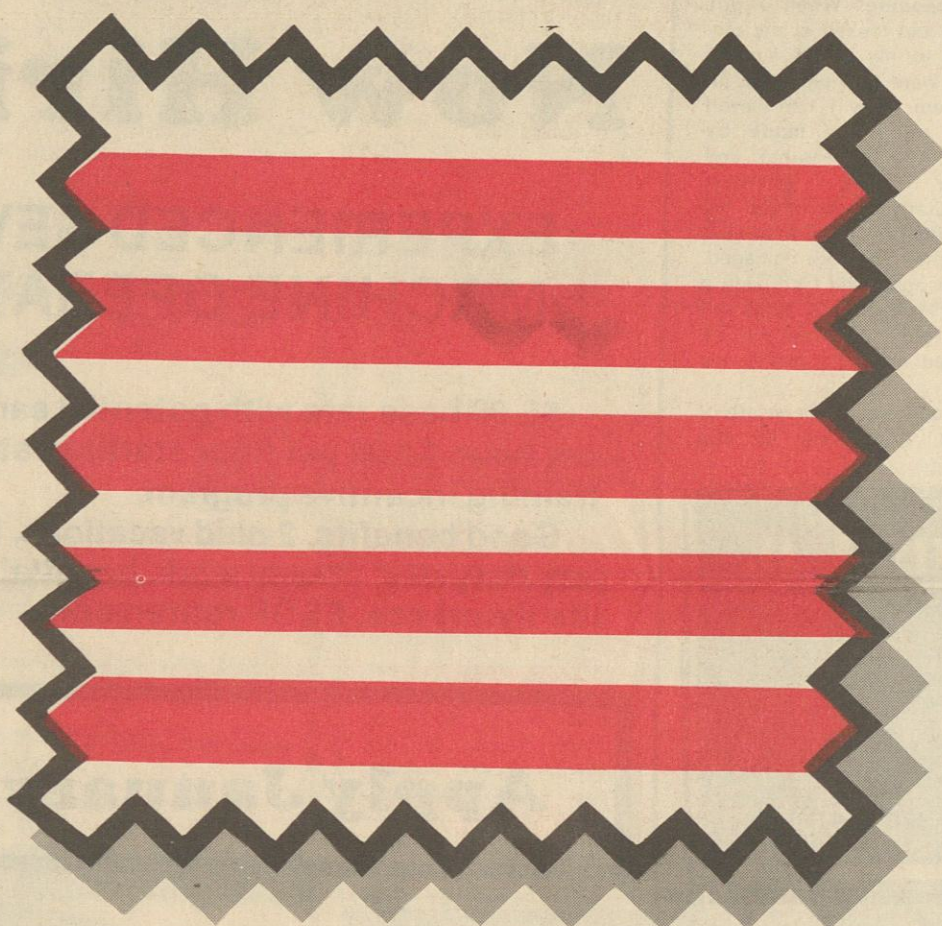

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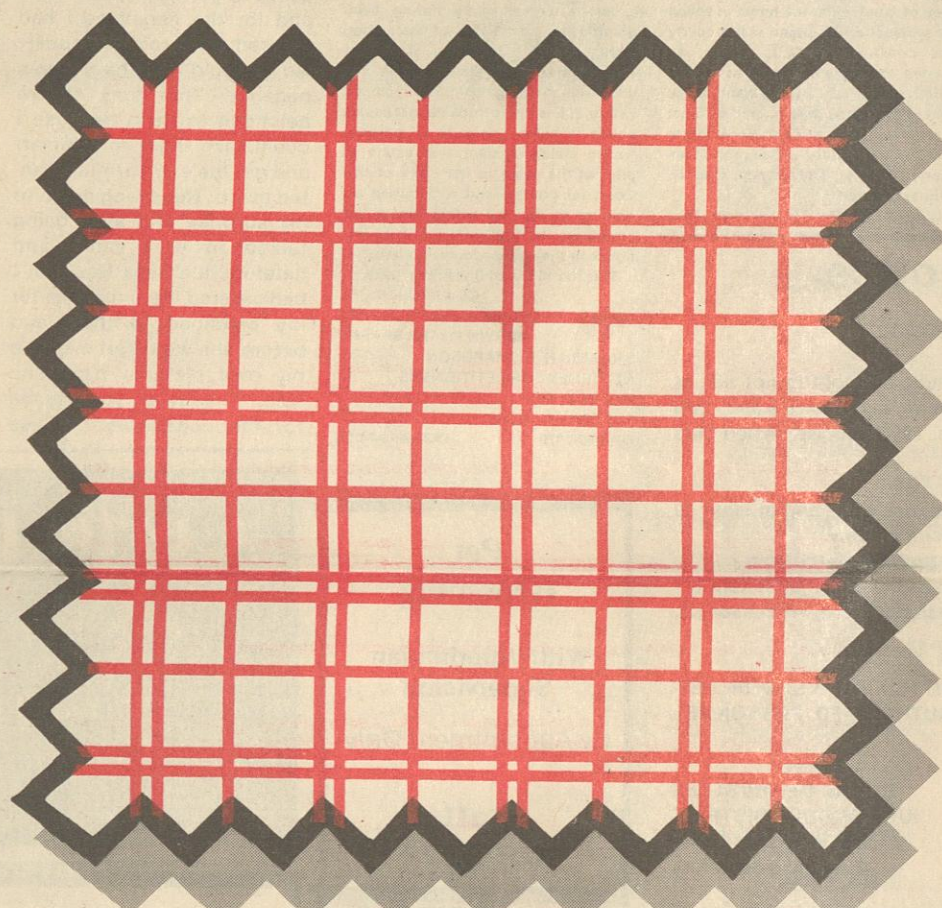
