Iuka Police Officers Raid Local Business

Iuka Chief of Police Amos Bates provided the following press release regarding the weekend arrest of an Iuka business owner on charges of drug violations, state and federal pornography charges, contributing to the delinquency of a child, and several misdemeanor violations.

On the 17th day of February at approximately 10 p.m., Chief Bates, and two officers, Randy Stringer, Danny Nunley, Bobby Flynt, conducted a search of the apartment of Danny V. Owens located in Riverside Apartments. Several photos, weapons, and an undisclosed amount of controlled substances were seized from this residence, listed as 1000 North Pearl St., Apt. #17B.

Following this, a search was conducted at KIS One Hour Photo on Hwy. 25 North in Iuka. Evidence seized there included photos, weapons, and records.

Danny V. Owens was arrested early Sunday morning by the above officers

along with county deputies, Joel Holliman, Bob McCarley, and Mississippi Highway Patrolman Jerry Boyd.

Owens is being held at the Tishomingo County Jail under a \$56,250 bond set by City Judge Mike Cooke and faces charges of contributing to the delinquency of a child, state and federal firearms violations, state and federal pornography charges, along with misdemeanor violations.

Building Proposed To Attract Engineers

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors is proposing to construct an 80,000-square-foot building in Iuka for attracting Lockheed Aerojet to locate temporary offices in Iuka.

Lockheed Aerojet is the prime contractor team on the NASA advanced solid rocket motor project at Yellow Creek. Bids were taken last Friday for the construction of a metal building 200 feet in size. The facility will be located on about 10 acres in the Iuka Industrial Park, said D.W. McKee, president of the board of supervisors.

Lockheed Aerojet has made no commitment to locate their temporary offices in Iuka. NASA Project Director Lowell Zoller said earlier this month that the search for temporary

office space has covered Corinth, Iuka, and the site itself at Yellow Creek. The site might not be favorable however due to congestion and interference related to the ongoing construction, Zoller said.

The Iuka office building will be paid for by Tennessee Valley Authority in-lieu funds, McKee said.

The building will contain a room for a computer complex, numerous offices, and several conference rooms. A 500-car lighted parking area will also be included.

S & J Construction Co. of Corinth was the low bidder with a base bid of just under \$2 million. Vanderheyden Construction Company of Whiteville, TN provided the only other legal bid of \$2.5 million.

Under the bid specifications, the

contractor chosen would have until June 1 to complete all work, McKee said.

The board of supervisors will decide whether to proceed with the project when Lockheed Aerojet announces its decision on location, McKee said. Supervisors hope to hear some news this week, he said.

Dr. Kelly Segars, who has been actively involved in negotiations with Lockheed officials, said Wednesday that after recent meetings with Lockheed engineers and contractors in California, the outlook was encouraging for the facility to be located in Iuka.

"We expect a decision today or tomorrow," he said Wednesday. At press time, no definite decision had been announced.

Merger Election Set For March 27

The Tishomingo County School Board has set March 27 as the date for the election to determine whether the Tishomingo county schools will merge with the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District.

In a meeting Tuesday night board members unanimously approved a motion to announce the date.

The election is necessary because residents in opposition to the merger turned in petitions to the county school board.

The special election will also decide if Tishomingo County accepts a \$7 million grant offer from the state Major Economic Impact Authority for educational improvements.

State officials have said that the two school districts must merge into a single, countywide school district to be eligible for the funds.

Petitions containing 3,465 names were delivered on January 13 to the office of county school superintendent Larry Green.

The petitions had to contain names of 1,748 electors, or 20 percent of the electors to call the issue to a vote. County registrar Gerald Parsons certified 2,143 signatures, more than enough to call the election.

County school board member Harold Sparks said that the election had been approved by the state Attorney General's office. It was necessary for the ballot to also receive approval, he said.

The ballot will offer two responses, and voters will mark either for or

against consolidation, Sparks said. A simple majority vote will be necessary to decide the outcome.

Only residents of the county school district who are registered voters are eligible to vote in the election.

A bill introduced in the state legislature last month that would allow residents of the Iuka school

district to vote on the issue was defeated by a House subcommittee. Iuka school district residents have not voiced opposition to the proposed merger.

The impact authority funds have been offered to help prepare for growth anticipated with the arrival of the NASA advanced solid rocket motor plant near Iuka.

California Trip Proves A Success

Tishomingo County delegates who travelled to California last week to recruit Lockheed Aerojet employees returned home feeling optimistic about the reactions they observed.

About 25 local residents served as ambassadors for the area to the employees preparing to transfer to work at the advanced solid rocket motor plant.

Mississippi's reception was held Monday night at the Sheraton Sunrise Hotel in Sacramento.

The event was attended by close to 500 space industry employees, according to Dan Brown, group director of public affairs for the Aerojet Sacramento Group.

"Mississippi was very well-represented and gave an impressive program," Brown said.

Gov. Ray Mabus and DECD Director J. Mac Holladay made the state's presentation entitled "Mississippi: The State of Change" and "Discover Northeast Mississippi: Expect the Unexpected." A video featuring Northeast Mississippi was shown to the crowd.

The Tishomingo County group, along with neighboring counties and representatives from state colleges and other organizations, manned tables, and exhibits, greeting the visitors and handing out brochures and informational literature.

"We talked to a lot of people and answered a lot of questions," said state Rep. Mack Wadkins of Iuka. Some individuals he met expressed an interest in visiting our county, Wadkins said.

NASA Official Discusses Buffer Zone

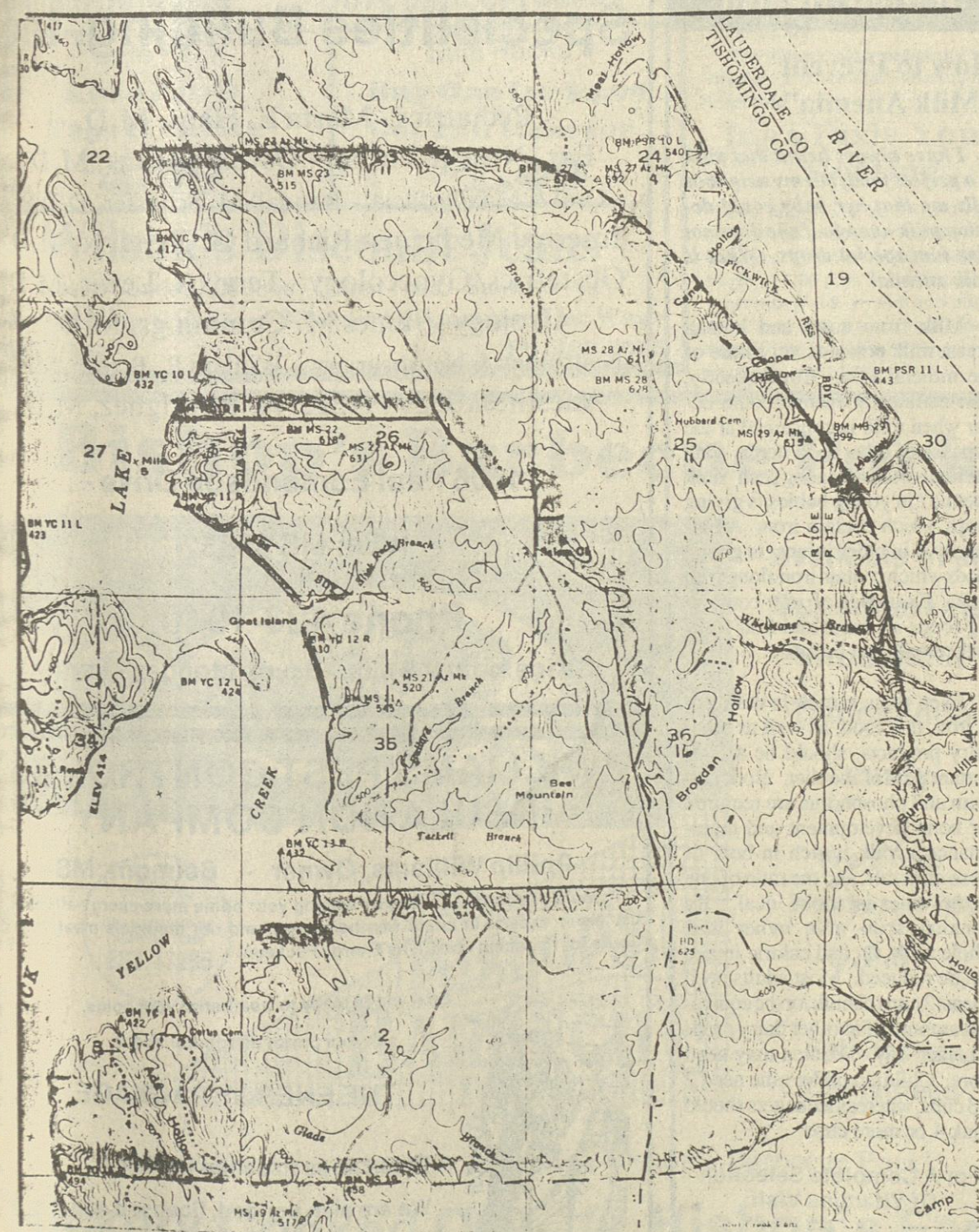
In negotiations with local and state officials, both NASA and the contractor team of Lockheed Aerojet have requested that a buffer zone be established surrounding the 1,140-acre plant site at Yellow Creek. The zone would provide safety and security and also insure space for future expansion of the solid rocket motor operation, officials said.

In January a bill was introduced in the Mississippi legislature to authorize the state to purchase land to create a one-mile buffer zone encircling the region. At this date no action has been taken on the bill by state lawmakers.

In the following letter written to Tishomingo County residents, Lowell Zoller of NASA attempts to answer some of the pertinent questions about and to explain NASA's reasons for requesting the proposed buffer zone.

TO OUR TISHOMINGO NEIGHBORS

We at NASA are very much aware of the community concerns, frustration, and potential sacrifices associated with the proposed buffer zone at the new NASA rocket motor plant. For that reason, we have openly discussed the buffer

zone at every opportunity to which we have been invited, and I shall attempt, herein, to describe our reasons.

The plant construction is expected to start in April of this year and continue through 1992. During that time, the community may expect the usual construction worker influx, noise, dirt, and traffic congestion. Activation and operation of facilities will begin in mid 1991, and we shall start propellant processing development on site shortly thereafter. During plant operations, there will be typical industrial noise, traffic, and air emissions.

Hazards
The propellant processing includes the mixing of inert fuel with ammonium perchlorate oxidizer, and the pouring of the mixed propellant into large cylindrical motor segments. The propellant processing and motor assembly will entail certain hazards and produce waste material for disposal. Many solid rocket motor facilities have had accidents, and we must consider the possibility of a similar occurrence at Yellow Creek. Therefore, each facility on site has been designed, to the maximum extent possible, to prevent accidents and to contain accidents that might occur.

While there is minimal risk in the mixing of the fuel ingredients, the grinding of the oxidizer to a very small particle size is a hazardous operation, identical to that experienced in many industries where fine dust can lead to explosions (as in grain elevators). To minimize the hazard, the grinding is done in enclosed areas operated by remote control. Once the oxidizer is mixed with the fuel, accidental ignition of the rocket propellant could cause vigorous burning, which might result in a limited explosion, and release of chemical combustion products in the air; however, it should be understood that the propellant is not unstable and explosive like gun powder or dynamite. Buildings have been located so that an accident in one area would not cause harm to people in other buildings or to people outside of the site boundary, although the noise, air emissions, and, perhaps, some vibration could be evident.

For the type of propellant we shall be producing, the following chemical products result from burning of one pound of propellant:

	6 ounces	Aluminum oxide is an inert material of no particular concern.
White powdery ash		

	4 ounces	Hydrogen chloride is largest component (2 ounces), nitrogen oxides, chlorine, and carbon monoxide
Potential acid forming gases		

These combustion products would result if there were an accidental ignition of propellant and will result from the unavoidable burning of waste propellant and firing of very small (5 pound) material acceptance motors. Under worst case conditions, the following air emissions might occur:

	Waste Disposal*	Segment Accident**
Aluminum Oxide Ash	100,000 lbs/yr.	170,000 lbs.

*Maximum production rate without clean air steam boiler (open pit burning)

Although the quantities appear large, the amount of material in the atmosphere would disperse rapidly, and, while well within all EPA and State regulations, locally, there could be some evidence of the burning. By comparison, a typical coal fired power plant would produce as much acidic gases in 5 hours as the rocket motor plant would produce in a whole year. Our contractor is working on a prototype steam boiler, approved by EPA for testing, to remove all obnoxious chemicals from the burning of waste before release into the air; such a boiler is planned (and budgeted) for installation at Yellow Creek. Until that technology is completed, we shall have to use open pit burning of waste propellant. Nevertheless, any emissions from the plant will be a concern for people in the vicinity.

Encroachment
Should EPA regulations become more stringent, the development of other businesses or activities within the immediate vicinity of the plant could cause a cumulative environmental effect that might shut down the plant. This might happen even though the rocket plant was operating within EPA regulations, since many small businesses are not required to comply with EPA or State requirements until a threshold value has been reached. The Shuttle program is expected to continue for another 30 years, and the Administration has made a commitment that the U.S. will return to the moon and undertake a mission to Mars; thus, we expect to be permanent residents. The future requirements for the rocket plant cannot even be fully defined; thus, the day may come when expansion of the site might be desired, but prevented by buildup of the surrounding area. Speculative development in the area is already a reality.

For these reasons, 15 months ago (October 29, 1988) I announced at a public meeting at the Iuka High School our desire for a buffer zone, and provided the map showing that proposed zone (accompanying photo). Our contractors, based upon experiences at their plants, have also been active in requesting consideration for the buffer zone among local and state officials.

We understand the frustration of some residents over not knowing if, when, or how that buffer zone might come into being. Should a buffer zone become a reality, it will be done by the State of Mississippi, not NASA. As you know, a bill is before the current legislative session that would give the State both authority and funding to acquire the property. We have no way of knowing if that legislation will pass. Furthermore, we do not know how the property might be acquired by the State, how fair market value might be determined, or when property might be acquired if it does become law. While we might be more hopeful of the bill's enactment than some of you, we can only wait with you as the governmental wheels turn. Should the buffer zone become a reality, we have not precluded continued use of the Hubbard Salem Baptist Church, and would try to adjust our plant operations and access procedures, to the extent possible, to accommodate the church activities.

I have talked to some, but not all, of those who might be affected by a buffer zone. We, at NASA, want to be good neighbors and strong partners in your progress in the tri-state region. Our interest in the buffer zone is not entirely parochial, for I believe that it can contribute materially to the long-term socio-economic future of your region. We shall always attempt to answer your questions, and try to keep you informed to the best of our knowledge. I thank you for your support, and look forward to a long and profitable community relationship.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

THE HOWS TO SPICES
Adding spices to foods can add variety and excitement to what seems like routine and boring meals. But knowing the "Hows" of spices is important for true success with spice cookery.

HOW TO STORE: Heat and moisture hasten flavor loss and cause caking of the spice in the container. Store seasonings away from areas where heat and moisture are generated, such as over the sink or range. Direct sunlight will fade products such as herbs and the red seasonings.

Sprinkling seasonings into a boiling pot of food allows the steam to become trapped in the container and will hasten caking. While this is a convenient way to add flavor, be aware it will shorten the life of the seasoning.

HOW LONG TO KEEP SEASONINGS: Assuming they have been properly stored, herbs and group spices have a shelf life of up to two years. Whole spices retain their flavor five years or longer.

Members of the red pepper family, such as paprika and chili powder, last one year or up to two years, if refrigerated. Dehydrated vegetables have a shorter shelf life and should be checked at six months.

Extracts have a shelf life of about four years. All extracts should be kept tightly closed to prevent the evaporation of the alcohol which is an ingredient in the formula.

HOW TO TELL FRESHNESS: There are three checks to use for seasonings that have been stored for some time -- look, smell, taste.

Use a visual check for fading on such seasonings as paprika, dill weed and chives. Open the container and smell and taste the contents. If a fresh, alive odor or taste is not apparent, it is safe to assume the product should be replaced. There is no health hazard in using old seasonings. They have simply lost their flavor impact and will not deliver the taste they should.

HOW TO USE SEASONINGS: There is no right or wrong way to use seasonings. It is an individual preference. Suggested uses for each spice are on the container. Add ground seasonings about 15 minutes before the end of the cooking period. Whole spices are best added at the beginning of cooking to allow flavors to release and blend.

Start with a small amount (1/8 - 1/4 teaspoon), taste, then add more if necessary. It is difficult to correct over seasoning.

HOW TO SUBSTITUTE DIFFERENT SEASONINGS: No two spices have the same flavor so if substitutions are made, the end result will be different. On each bottle there are suggested foods that go well with the seasoning. If the seasoning called for in the recipe is not available, check the others on the shelf for another one that goes well with the food

being prepared.

IRISH POTATO CASSEROLE
6 medium potatoes
2 cups shredded American cheese
3 tablespoons green onions, chopped
1 (8-ounce) carton sour cream
1/4 cup margarine
1 tablespoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper

Boil potatoes in jackets until done, but not soft. Remove from water and cool. Remove jackets and grate. (Potatoes may be cooked day before). In small saucepan melt 1/4 cup margarine and 2 cups cheese; when almost melted add chopped green onions. Remove from heat, add 1 carton sour cream, salt and pepper. Pour over grated potatoes and toss as a salad. Put into greased 13x9x2 inch casserole dish and dot with margarine. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 30 minutes. YIELD: 12 servings.

ART OF FITTING CONTACTS

You may be surprised to learn that fitting contact lenses is more than just a precise exercise; it's also an art. Contact lenses do not fit your cornea like a second skin or the way a lid fits tightly on a jar. That would prove as uncomfortable as an overly snug garment or a tight pair of shoes; it would also prove unhealthy for the cornea.

On the other hand, a lens must fit snugly enough so that it doesn't slip around too much. Such slippage would result in blurred vision, possible irritation, and a lens that may pop out.

Rather, the lens must float on just the right amount of tears, which must be allowed to flow freely under the edge of the lens. The tears are necessary both to provide a cushion between lens and cornea, but also to clean the cornea and provide it with vital oxygen and nutrients. It's the kind of balanced fit which demands not only skill, but artistry.

UNA-In-England Course Being Taken

Persons wanting to study Shakespeare in England, view European art collections, visit Scottish hospitals or watch BBC productions may call on the University of North Alabama to fulfill those dreams this summer with its UNA-in-England program.

Bill Matthews, director of continuing education, said UNA is offering seven courses for credit or non-credit for the three-week sessions in England.

The registration deadline is March 21. The UNA-in-England program will be July 27 to August 13, with a four-day side trip to Paris.

The courses to be offered are "English Literature", "European Art", "British Theatre", "Survey of the Music Industry", "History of the Bible in English", "Radio and Television" and "Health Care: International Aspects".

"The people we met seemed to be really looking forward to moving here," Gann said. While the reception was planned for 5 to 7:30 p.m., a number of employees stayed until after 8 p.m. talking about Mississippi, she said.

Californians were also impressed by the handmade bookmarks they received sent by Iuka Elementary School students, said Martha Segars of Iuka. Segars was impressed by the "down-home attitude" of the people.

"They will be able to relate to Northeast Mississippi and will be an asset to the community," she said.

Paul Morris, president of the Iuka Chamber of Commerce, felt that the group made a positive impression in recruiting efforts.

"I think they were appreciative of our state and our being there in force like we were," he said.

Morris added that he was expecting some visitors to arrive this week for a tour of the area.

Media Library Workshop At Iuka Baptist

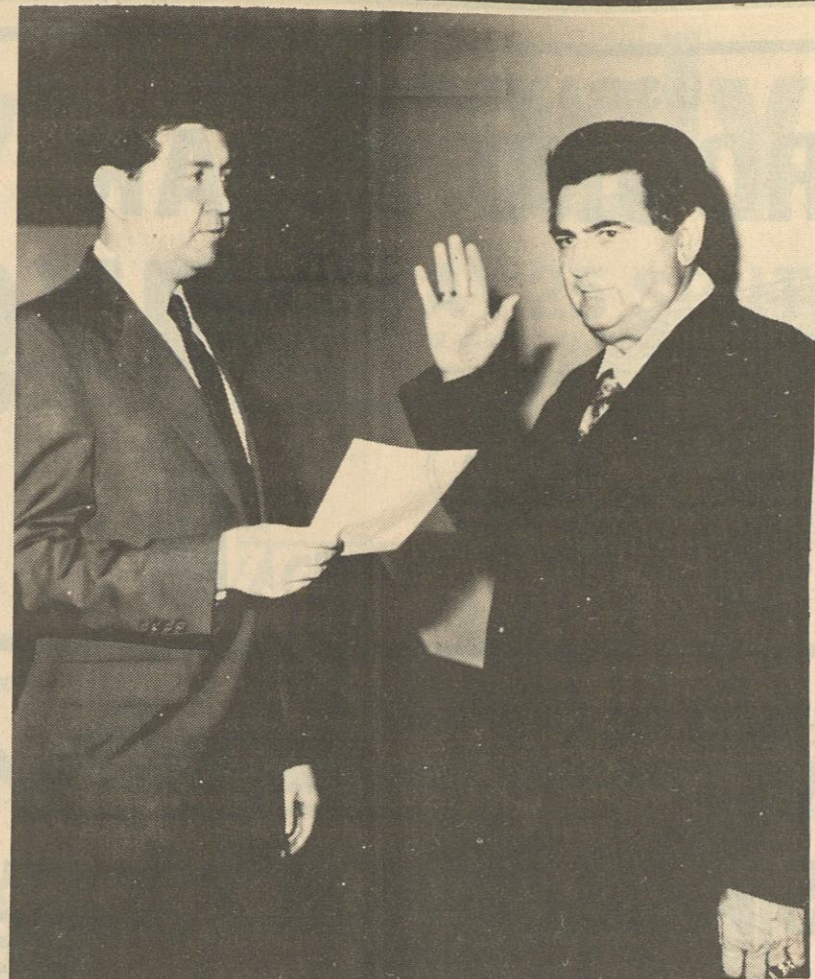

County Agents Notes

INSEMINATION SHORTCOURSE

Many cattle producers in Tishomingo County have said they would like to have more cows, but find the cows priced too high to buy. One way to solve this problem is for producers to get more production from the herd they have.

Through the use of artificial insemination, producers can increase weaning weights of calves and get more pounds of beef. The quickest way to improve genetics in a herd is by artificial insemination with proven bulls.

Cattle producers can attend an artificial insemination shortcourse March 13 through 16 in Hernando at the DeSoto County Extension Office. Participants can preregister by contacting Jimmy McLain, Panola County Agent, in Sardis at 601-487-2085 or in Batesville at 601-563-6261.

COCKROACHES

Cockroaches can be a serious problem in Tishomingo County homes.

There are five species living in our area: German, American, oriental, brown-banded and smokey brown. They vary in appearance and habits. These pests can be carried into homes in grocery bags, boxes, eggs cartons, beverage cases and fresh produce.

Cockroaches can also migrate from one building to another by running along water pipes and electrical wires.

Surface sprays of dursban, diazinon or baygon can be used for control. Bait containing bydromethylon can also be used. Follow label directions.

HONEYBEE CARE

Beekeepers in Tishomingo County should maintain their bee hives by reducing the hive entrance to a space no taller than three-eighths inches and no wider than 2 inches. An entrance of this size will keep our cold air and mice.

The entrance should face south unless weather conditions determine otherwise.

PRUNING CUTS

Remove dead branches from fruit and nut trees to insure tree health. If a branch has been dead for some time, a callus ring will have formed at the base. Make pruning cuts on the outside of the callus ring to avoid creating a new wound.

Detaching a limb on the outside of the callus does not make a new wound. Callus will continue to develop across the cut surface of the dead branch.

Pruning paints are not necessary. They are merely cosmetic. They can hide a wound, but they do not keep our disease or hasten healing.

Young Men Turning 26 In 1990

Young men who will turn 26 in 1990 will be reaching an important milestone, according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1990, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1982 will be turning 26 and will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstituted. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service State Director Edgar F. Rapp, Jr. Warned that with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain benefits, such as federal student aid, job training, and most federal employment in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon.

Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment and permission to practice law.

Rapp points out that men age 18 through 25 who have not yet registered can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison or both.
