Consolidation Question To Be Answered In Tuesday's Election

On Tuesday, March 27, polls will be open in the Tishomingo County School District for residents to vote in the special election on school consolidation.

Voters will mark for or against school district consolidation on the ballot and will decide whether the county district and the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District

will dissolve and merge into a single school district.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. The following county precincts will be operating: Burnsville, West Burnsville, North Burnsville, Coles Mill, Midway, Tishomingo, West Tishomingo, Paden, East Belmont, North Belmont, Belmont, Dennis, Golden, and Cotton Springs.

The Circuit Clerk's office in the Tishomingo County Courthouse will be open this Saturday, March 24, from

8 a.m. until 12 noon for those who need to vote in the election by absentee ballot.

The election will also decide whether Tishomingo County becomes eligible to receive \$7 million from the Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority.

Tuesday's vote will reflect whether county residents approve the forming of a single, countywide school district. Both city and county school boards approved and passed orders

to merge in October 1989.

Consolidation is a key requirement for receiving the funds, state economic officials have said. If the county votes against consolidation, the department will not award the money.

If Tishomingo County refuses the \$7 million, where the money will be utilized has not been determined, said Bill Burnette, project manager of the Authority in Northeast Mississippi.

"The \$7 million was earmarked for educational improvements in Tishomingo County, and no other decision concerning the funds has been made," Burnette said.

The legislature's guidelines for use of the impact funds also included the stipulation that there be local support for the proposed projects, Burnette said. Residents in the Iuka city school district have not voiced opposition to the merger. Proposals for school consolidation, which have

also been announced for funding by the Authority in Alcorn and Itawamba counties, usually bring an emotional response from people, Burnette said, because those decisions always affect children.

"This whole consolidation plan in Tishomingo County is for the children. In about five years, when the NASA plant is operating along with the spin-off industries, there will be numerous opportunities for children to live at home and to find local jobs. Improving the educational system will give students a chance to receive the type of education that will help qualify them for these jobs," he said.

Burnette, who serves as the Authority's liaison and coordinator of the projects to receive funding, is certain that Tuesday's vote will speak clearly for the county.

"This vote will send a signal to NASA, Lockheed, and Aerojet, and also to the potential industries looking at this area," he said. "It will say to them whether Tishomingo County is equipped to provide an educated workforce to serve them."

Regardless of the election results, Burnette says he is optimistic about the growth predicted for the county.

"We are seeing history in the making here. This area is moving faster than anywhere else in the entire state. Tishomingo County has the opportunity to set an example for the rest of the state," he said.

Iuka Man Arrested In Jewelry Robbery

An Iuka man was arrested last Monday in connection with the January robbery of a local jewelry store.

The individual, whose name is being withheld pending further investigation, was charged with breaking and entering and is being held in the Tishomingo County Jail, according to Iuka Police Chief Amos

Bates.

Mid-Town Jewelers was robbed on January 27. From \$10,000 to \$12,000 in jewelry was reported stolen, Bates said. The burglar knocked out an air conditioning window unit and entered the building through the opening.

Officers have recovered only a portion of the stolen valuables but are continuing the search, Bates said.

Lockheed Chooses Jackson Company For Yellow Creek Security Services

The Capital Security Company of Jackson, Mississippi, will provide security services at the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) production facility at Yellow Creek just north of here.

The one-year contract, with a one-year renewal option, was announced by Howard Trudeau, ASRM project manager and president for Lockheed Missiles and Space Company of Sunnyvale, California.

Lockheed is the prime contractor and systems integrator for the ASRM, a project managed by NASA-Marshall Space Flight Center.

ASRMs will replace the twin solid

boosters that currently help lift each space shuttle from the launch pad.

"We had eight bids for security services," Trudeau said, "most of them from the Alabama-Tennessee-Mississippi region around Yellow Creek."

"After careful evaluation, we're delighted to select the Capital Security Company."

Security officers will begin their duties April 1 at the 1,100-acre Yellow Creek site, where groundbreaking ceremonies will take place on April 10.

Besides performing guard activities, the officers will have some firefighting and emergency treatment capabilities.

New 4-Lane Bypass Approved For Iuka

The Federal Highway Administration has approved the design for a new four-lane bypass around Iuka.

The proposed Tishomingo County project provides right of way for the construction of a four-lane highway from U.S. 72 south of Iuka to a point on present MS 25, according to a March 9 legal notice of design approval.

Two lanes and a median will be added to the west side of present MS 25 from US 72 to Old US 72. The four-lane divided highway on new location will run from Old US 72 to a point on

present MS 25 approximately one and one-fourth miles north of Iuka.

From this point, two lanes and a median will be added to the east side of present MS 25 northward for approximately one mile.

A two-lane road will connect the proposed new MS 25 to the present MS 25 approximately one mile north of Iuka near the intersection of J.P. Coleman Park Road. The four-lane will cover about 4.6 miles.

The highway department proposes to begin construction on the bypass during state Fiscal Year 1991, which begins July 1, 1990, said State High-

way Department First District Engineer Paul Swindle.

"Right now we are beginning to purchase the right of way property. The acquisition process involves title searches, appraisals, and negotiations with landowners," Swindle said.

Department of Economic and Community Development officials announced in December that the bypass will be paid for by Economic Development Highway Act funds. This act was expanded during the 1989 legislative session.

Construction Work On Schedule Despite Controversy Over Bids

Despite controversy over the awarding of a contract to construct the building, work is going full steam ahead on the temporary office facility going up at Iuka Industrial Park.

Already the crew has completed the concrete slab, erected 60 percent of the structural steel and roof and started interior work, heating and cooling systems, and electrical work, project manager Herman Vanderheyden of Vanderheyden Construction Co. said Tuesday.

"The controversy has had no effect on construction whatsoever," he said.

The project calls for an 80,000-square-foot building to be leased to Lockheed Aerojet for temporary office space.

Construction has already utilized approximately 185 workers, including subcontractors, suppliers, and laborers.

A vast majority are Mississippians, Vanderheyden said.

"About 160 of these are from Mississippi, while only about 10 are from Alabama and maybe 16 from Tennessee. This is a Mississippi project - a local project."

Many of the subcontractors involved in the work have originated from Iuka and nearby Corinth, Fulton, and Belmont.

By project completion, Vanderheyden estimates that close to 300 Mississippi workers will have been associated with the construction effort.

Controversy arose when the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors awarded Vanderheyden the contract on February 26. Vanderheyden bid \$2.5 million. A second bid by S&J Steelbuilders Inc. of Booneville for \$2 million was rejected because supervisors said it was not responsive to the board's advertisement.

In board meeting minutes supervisors said that S&J's bid could not be considered because it included an open-ended \$2,200 per day penalty for delaying S&J from starting to work past March 1 due to no fault of the contractor. The bid also excluded parking and security lights, floor coverings and installation, fire alarms, and intrusion alarms.

S&J's bid also stated that it did not include any state, county, city sales taxes or building permits and/or use taxes. Any such tax bill will be added to and become a part of the total price of the contract, it read. A tax of 3 1/2 percent of the total could add approximately \$70,000 to the cost.

The state auditor's office has conducted an investigation of the super-

visor's decision. Results of the probe were to be released late Wednesday and were not available at press time.

Supervisors defended their position at a news conference in Iuka last Friday.

The Board's attorney, Mike Malski, said that if the minutes of the board of supervisors fairly indicated the process by which the board went through to come to a decision, they would be supported. It is also the board's position to do the fairest thing under the circumstances, he added. Malski also said that verbal negotiations do not count. S&J had verbally proposed to furnish the specifications not included in the original bid to make the bid acceptable.

Judge Frank Russell will hear S&J's appeal of the board's decision on April 9 in Tishomingo County Circuit Court.

The building will be turned over to Lockheed Aerojet on May 1, with final completion scheduled for June 1, Vanderheyden has said.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

FOOD SHOPPING FOR ONE OR TWO
If you fix food for only one or two people, you may have found that keeping food costs down is really hard. With planning and shopping know-how, you can serve nutritious, economical meals.

Menu planning is the first step to good eating on a budget. Before you shop, check your newspaper for special sales. Also do a refrigerator, pantry and freezer audit for items to use up. Plan your meals around these

foods.

Clip and use coupons only for items you need. Before using a coupon, ask yourself "Would I buy this item if I did not have a coupon?" Coupons can be great money-savers, but only if you needed the item in the first place.

Make a grocery list before you shop. Group items such as fresh produce, canned foods, frozen foods, breads and cereals, spices, meat, dairy and nonfood items. It will help you streamline your trip through the store so you don't have to go back several aisles for an item.

Don't grocery shop when you are hungry. You are more likely to buy unnecessary items. Impulse shopping can really add to the grocery bill.

Try to shop when the store is not crowded. Take advantage of unit pricing if your store offers it. The unit price is the price per pound, ounce, quart or other unit. Most supermarkets have unit price labels on the display shelves above or below canned and packaged foods.

Generally, the larger package costs the least per serving. Consider buying the larger package only if you can use it up, store it for later use, or split it with a friend.

Read the label. Look for the ingredient list. Ingredients are listed in order from largest to smallest amounts. A can that listed "beef, water, tomatoes..." would be a better buy than one that listed "water, beef, tomatoes..." because it would contain more beef.

If a claim is made on the package, such as "high in vitamin C," or "fortified with vitamins and minerals," you will find a nutrition label on the package. It can also help you compare the nutritional content of a product. Note the serving size on the nutrition label comparing the same amount between packages.

Look for "no-brand" or general foods. They usually have the same nutrients as brand name food, but they usually cost less. You can spot them by their plain packages with black lettering.

FOOD MARKET CHANGES LAST YEAR

Consumers were offered new taste and flavor sensations by food companies who introduced 1,700 new food-enhancing condiments in 1989. Sauces and flavorings, pickles with Cajun, Jamaican, Thai and Creole offerings. Last year was a record year for new products, with almost 9,200 new foods entering the market. More than 1,300 new snacks and

candies, 1,348 new dairy items, almost 1,200 new bakery items (many with oat bran) and entrees offering low-fat, low-salt, low-cholesterol convenience appeared.

HOT CHICKEN SALAD CASSEROLE
2 cups chicken, cooked, deboned, chopped

1 cup celery, chopped fine

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

3 hard boiled eggs, chopped

2 tablespoons mayonnaise

1 (10 3/4 ounce) can cream of chicken soup (undiluted)

1/2 cup crushed potato chips (divided usage)

1 (2 ounce) jar of pimento

Combine chicken, celery, salt, pepper, and eggs. Moisten with mayonnaise. Add soup. Pour half of the mixture into greased 2-quart baking dish. Add a thin layer of crushed potato chips. Add remaining mixture. Top with crushed chips and pimento. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

FEEDER PIG SALES

During February, feeder pig sales were conducted in Amory, Bruce, Laurel and Waynesboro. A total of 2,177 pigs were sold averaging \$97.01 per hundredweight and \$54.89 per head.

This compares to January 1990 feeder pig sales in which a total of 1729 pigs were sold averaging \$76.92 per cwt and \$43.26 per head.

EYES INJURED BY CHEMICALS

The first thing you should do if a chemical gets into your eye, whether on the job or at home, is to find a source of water as quickly as possible. Every second the chemical remains in your eye increases the damage, and the damage may be permanent unless you act in time. Run to your nearest source of water and gently but liberally let it flow into your eye so you can wash out the chemical or at least dilute it.

If you're at home when the accident happens, the kitchen sink will probably work better than the one in the bathroom. The faucet is usually higher, in fact high enough for you to put your face under the faucet. Let a gentle stream of cool water run directly into the injured eye. Use your thumb and forefinger to keep it open.

When the eye is thoroughly washed out, close it and pat it dry with a towel. THEN telephone your eye doctor and tell him what has happened. He will take it from there.

Serious Gardening

It's time for serious vegetable gardening in Tishomingo County. Most gardeners have already planted onions, Irish potatoes, English peas, cabbage and broccoli. Some sweet corn has also been planted in a few gardens.

Gardeners have several varieties of sweet corn to choose from: white, yellow and bi-color. Some varieties are sweeter than others. Merit, a yellow, normal sugar variety, is popular among gardeners in Tishomingo County.

Many tomato, pepper and eggplant transplants will be set out in March and April. These warm-season transplants require warm soil. Cool soil and temperatures below 60 degrees slow growth in these plants, but black, plastic mulch can be used to warm soil.

Set tomato plants where they won't be subject to drowning. Remember the late spring rains of 1989 in our county? They drowned many tomato plants set in low beds and heavy, poorly drained soils.

Mineral Helps Relieve Depression

My mother takes lithium for depression. Isn't lithium just a mineral?

Lithium is a mineral, but is not just a mineral. It has special value in manic-depressive psychosis. Persons who have this condition are termed manic-depressive. About one out of 10 persons is affected. Abraham Lincoln is thought to have had this condition in which there are alternating phases of depression and mania. In the depression phase, the victim is irritable, anxious, and lacking in self-confidence and self-esteem. In contrast, the manic phase is a state of elation, where one believes that nothing is impossible and that he or she is in the "best mental state."

Since 1970, lithium has been the treatment of choice for manic depression. Lithium is often chosen over drugs such as antidepressants because it controls the combination of mania and depression.

Although lithium is a mineral, it is a prescription "drug" and has side effects similar to drugs. Diarrhea, vomiting, drowsiness, and muscular weakness are among the most prominent. In a recent study it was shown that individuals taking lithium experienced decreased blood levels of vitamin D. For this reason, it has been suggested that persons taking lithium may require a vitamin D supplement.

REPAIRING WINTER DAMAGED ORNAMENTALS

4-H members in the Horticulture project are preparing to welcome Spring with some time spent out in the yard. Here are some tips about repairing winter damage on shrubs and trees that 4-H'ers can help with.

Sudden temperature changes, particularly a drop in temperature, can be harmful to ornamental shrubs and trees. This is especially true if a sudden drop in temperature is preceded by several days of warm, sunny days.

When we have several days or weeks of warm weather, plants respond by "breaking dormancy." Buds begin to swell, flowers open and new leaves begin to unfold. If these warm days are followed by a sudden drop in temperature, the newly exposed tissue will be freeze damaged. Also, bark splitting may occur causing more extensive damage to the plant.

Often such symptoms are not

noticed until the plant is stressed, such as during periods of drought which normally do not occur until mid-summer when thoughts of such a

freeze have long been forgotten.

Usually cold damage to plants is expressed as leaf "scorch" of the leaf tips. Scorch may also occur under circumstances. To determine whether or not the stems are damaged, scratch the bark with your fingernail to see if the cambium is green. If the cambium is green, the tissue is still alive. After danger of severe winter longer exists, prune back the tissue, removing all dead stems from the plant.

There is nothing that can be done to remove the scorched evergreen plants. They will drop off and be replaced by foliage as spring progresses.

To lessen the effects of winter on ornamentals and shrubs, mulch with a material that will retain water and air exchange between the atmosphere and soil. Materials such as pine straw, pine bark mulch will keep the moisture in the soil from fluctuating.

Remember, the soil will freeze more uniform temperature. Mulched, otherwise temperatures may warm up and encourage plant growth too early.

Using the right type of equipment is just as important as knowing when to prune. Proper pruning shears to "clean" cut and not bruise the stem being cut.

Local Students Involved In National Project

March 23, 1990 marks the beginning of the second decade of celebrations of National Energy Education Day. Mississippi will join states across the nation in observing this celebration.

Students from Tishomingo County have been involved in efforts to make their communications more energy conscious. These students realize that the energy conserved today can be used in their future.

Their project, which has illustrated this year's theme: Educating for a Decade of Energy Decisions, have included designing bumper stickers, T-shirts, bookmarks and coloring sheets.

The goal of the National Energy Education Development (NEED) project is to encourage and support ongoing energy education programs in all of the nation's schools through direct involvement of students at the grass roots level.

Mississippi schools have been active in the NEED project since 1983. Schools and groups have received national recognition for their energy projects. Thousands of Mississippi students have reached hundreds of thousands of Mississippians with valuable energy information during

the seven years of involvement.

Each year, the State NEED Committee, sponsors energy contests. These contests include energy picture, bookmarks, comic strip, T-shirt design, bumper sticker, skit and literacy contests.

State awards are presented to the NEED projects judged to be the best in Mississippi. The awards recognize outstanding efforts in energy achievement by small groups and entire student bodies.

Certificates, plaques, and monetary prizes are awarded by the state sponsors. These sponsors are as follows: Blossman-Gas, Inc., the Electric Power Association of Mississippi, the Lampton-Love Companies, Mississippi Power and Light Company, and Mississippi Valley Gas Co.

The NEED project in Mississippi is coordinated by the Mississippi Energy Extension Center, a department of the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. Local activities are coordinated by the County 4-H Extension Agents.

This cooperative effort at the local and state level has produced an energy network in Mississippi, consisting of public schools, private schools, parochial schools, and 4-H Clubs. The Tishomingo Electric Power Association sponsors awards for the local contest.

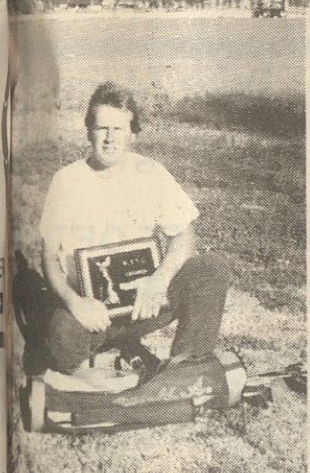

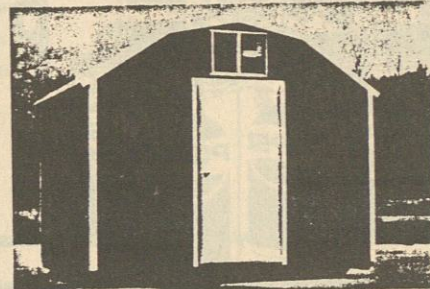

Here Are The Facts!

I. Students are getting a good education.

1. Tishomingo County Schools have some of the top test scores of any school district in the State of Mississippi.

2. Students in our county schools are well above the state average on ACT scores as a requirement for entrance to college.

3. Graduates of county schools continue to do well in college as evidence by the number of college graduates who are doctors, lawyers, professional people and highly skilled workers. (66% of teachers in Tishomingo County are graduates of county schools.)

II. Our schools are meeting accreditation requirements.

1. All teachers are now endowed in areas in which they are teaching.

2. Each school is presently offering a minimum of 28 carnegie units with the Vo-Tech school offering 20 carnegie units of study.

3. During the 1989-90 school year, Tishomingo County Schools have been evaluated by the State Department in special education, Chapter I, Vocational Education, and an on-site accreditation evaluation. The District has been fully accredited by the State Department of Education with standards achieved.

III. During the past 18 months, the following has been accomplished:

1. The schools are free of asbestos.

2. 2½ acres of property adjoining Belmont School has been purchased.

3. Facilities have been renovated at each center at a total cost of \$98,000.

4. Six late model school buses have been purchased.

5. State of the arts science labs have been built and equipped at each school at a total cost of \$400,000.

6. Curriculum have been upgraded, students, teachers, and district policies have been written, and a program of instructional management begun.

7. The district is on a sound financial basis with surplus carry-over from year to year.

IV. Proposal For Improvement

1. Take the \$3 million that the county must come up with and:

A. Construct a computer lab and learning center K-6.

B. Reasonably expand present curriculum and facilities.

C. Upgrade programs and facilities at the Vo-Tech Center.

V. Advantages of this Proposal

1. It was developed by administrators and teachers who know the needs of students and have their best interests at heart.

2. It will allow us to keep present schools in their present locations.

3. This proposal contains something for elementary students and the vocational school which the other proposal does not.

4. It will insure that the County Superintendent of Education would continue to be elected by the people.

5. This proposal will allow taxes to be kept at their present rate, whereas as a general rule consolidation requires greater expenditures creating a need for additional taxes.

Your careful consideration of these facts prior to your vote on the issue of school consolidation would be greatly appreciated!

"Light Bearers In A Dark World"

"Light Bearers in a Dark World" was the public address given at an assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses held recently in Memphis, TN. The Iuka Congregation was numbered among the 1,187 in attendance. The speaker was Don W. Emshoff, who serves congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses in Arkansas and parts of Tennessee and Mississippi.

After citing several major threats to the earth and mankind today, Mr. Emshoff said, "Many prominent authorities forecast dark days ahead. Yet the Bible foretold that there would be needed spiritual light for this troubled 20th Century. At Isaiah chapter sixty God says to the woman used as a symbol for God's faithful heavenly organization, 'Arise, O woman, shed forth light, for your light has come and upon you the very glory of Jehovah has shone forth. For, lo, darkness itself will cover the earth, and thick gloom the national groups; but upon you Jehovah will shine forth, and upon you his own glory will be seen.'"

As an example of darkness in the religious world Mr. Emshoff noted the doctrine of the immortality of the human soul. "Jehovah God told Adam that if he disobeyed he would 'positively die,' not fly or fry! The punishment for disobedient sinners is eternal death. The Bible-based hope for the rest of mankind is a resurrection from the unconsciousness of death." When the speaker asked the audience if they were glad that they had come out of religious darkness, they responded with loud applause.

He emphasized that Godly conduct and the proclamation of God's

Kingdom must mark every true Christian, including the eight new Witnesses baptized at the assembly.

protecting the AAH groups' pick-up effort and provide any needed assistance to them.

"Persons convicted of violating the litter laws could be fined up to \$50 by the courts," Lt. Col. Billie T. Hughes, assistant Highway Patrol chief, said.

MHP along with local law enforcement agencies are responsible for enforcing state litter laws.

In 1989 state troopers issued almost 200 citations to litter law violators.

"These Adopt-A-Highway groups are putting forth a commendable ef-

fort," Hughes said. "We'll be on the roads working hard to protect roadsides' cleanliness and safeguard travelers."

According to Highway Department Director John R. Tabb as of March approximately 2,575 miles of roads have been adopted statewide by public and non-profit groups as well as private organizations.

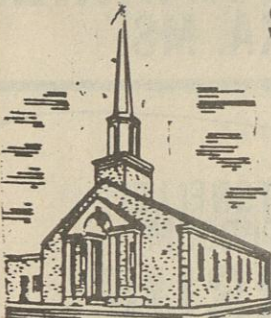

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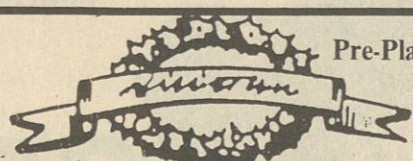

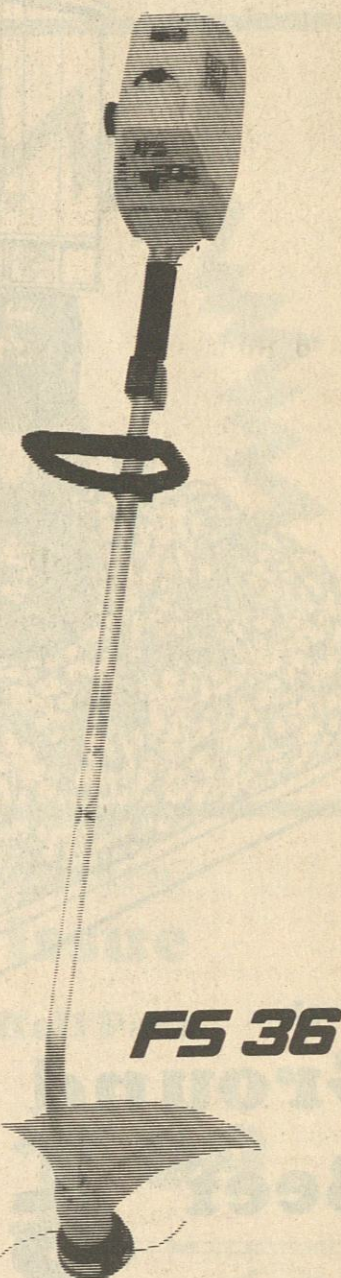

Our People Should Come Together

Change doesn't necessarily guarantee progress or improvement but progress and improvement necessarily require change. To leave our local schools as they are is another way of saying we want neither progress nor improvement.

All would agree that change for change-sake is of little value. On the other hand, when there is reason for change we should have the wisdom and common sense to accept it. Back 30 to 40 years ago change was relatively slow, whereas, today it is entirely different. During this decade, according to the experts, we probably will experience the most rapid technological revolution that has ever been encountered. As a matter of fact, it is now underway and we must prepare for it without delay.

In view of the unquestioned need for improvement, it's hard to believe that the majority of our citizens would turn down \$7,000,000.00 and deprive our children of an improved education and our people of better jobs. We submit that anyone who is willing to deny Tishomingo of a potentially bright future, just to keep a school in a particular location for a short time, is short-sighted with no regard for the county as a whole.

For all practical purposes, it has been mandated that all counties in Mississippi will be consolidated in order to improve education. The State Superintendent of Education has reported that the majority of all Mississippi Superintendents of Education are now appointed. With the exception of some metropolitan schools the trend in our nation is consolidation, larger schools, smaller classes and more teachers. The proposal offered to us may not be perfect, but it's far ahead of the present alternative. What is objectionable to some of our people now may be even more objectionable in the near future, when we'll be forced to comply with the state's educational requirements. Prentiss County turned down a bond issue for consolidation and at the present time their taxes are 4 times that of Tishomingo County. We don't believe our people want that, once they've looked hard at the real facts.

If there ever was a time for unity in Tishomingo County, it is now. Do you want a segment of the people to dictate what is best for our children?

The future of Tishomingo County is extremely bright, if we're willing to take advantage of the opportunity before us. If we're going to win this thing for our children and grandchildren, we must bond together. This issue is the most important subject to come before us in several decades. Let's prove to the state and all adjacent counties that we're intelligent enough to make the right decision. Talk to your friends and neighbors and promote the advantages of consolidation on a rational basis. Finally, get out and vote for our future. We may never have another chance.

Dear Editor,

We would like to take this opportunity to encourage everyone to cast their vote on Tuesday, March 27, 1990, on the issue of consolidation of the Tishomingo County School District and to remind everyone of a few of the primary issues involved.

We are opposed to the consolidation for many reasons, but the main reason is that if consolidation is voted in, our Superintendent of Education will be appointed. We want to continue to exercise our right to vote for our Superintendent of Education. The right to vote is one of the most precious freedoms we have in this country, and even though we sometimes take it for granted, think of where we would be without it.

An elected Superintendent is responsible to the people, while an appointed Superintendent is responsible to the board. The best reason to have an elected Superintendent of Education is exemplified by our present situation. Late last summer, ourselves and other citizens of Tishomingo County wanted information regarding the proposed consolidation. At that time, the proposal was a well kept secret being discussed in board meetings that were closed to the public, and requests for information and copies of the proposal were denied. Thanks to the efforts of Larry Green, everyone in the county now knows the provisions and requirements of the proposal.

The only elective political office in Tishomingo County that is required by statute to be filled by a person that is a professional educator is the office of the Superintendent of Education. After reviewing and analyzing the consolidation proposal, Larry Green has spoken out against the proposal. He has informed and tried to demonstrate to everyone in the county that the consolidation plan is unnecessary, is not feasible, and is not suited to the educational needs of Tishomingo County. Larry has been telling us that the cost of consolidation would be so excessive that we would receive more benefit from our money by upgrading existing schools. Our board does not have any teachers or trained educators on it. An appointed Superintendent would risk being fired by the board if he told the people the board had made a mistake. We need a

Superintendent that is a professional educator elected by the people instead of a "yes man" appointed by the board.

If you have been wondering how an appointed Superintendent is recommended and selected, consider this quote from Article 8 Section 204 of the Mississippi Constitution which provides that a county superintendent of public education, "shall be appointed by the board of education by and with the advice and consent of the senate". In other words, people in Jackson tell us who it will be.

We currently have a good, strong, fiscally sound school system that is providing a quality education to our children. Students graduating from Tishomingo County Schools consistently make above average ACT scores that are strongly competitive with the scores from schools all over the state. A high percentage of our graduates go on to become teachers, engineers, doctors, pharmacists, accountants, management, and other professionals in addition to being successful in other careers and industries. We submit that any graduate of a Tishomingo County School is trainable as an employee in high tech industry.

Although we have a good school system, there is room for improvement as our goal should be to have the best school system in the nation for our children. If the consolidation proposal goes through, the \$3 million we have to pay, and the \$7 million from the DECD will only be used to construct a high school at the north end of the county, not one dime will be to improving the education our children receive. It is our opinion that it would be better for our children and less expensive to the county if we let the DECD keep its \$7 million, and spend our \$3 million on improving and expanding classes in our existing schools, where the entire \$3 million would go directly to benefit the education of our children. All three of our county schools have the facilities to handle a significant increase in the number of students. From the county district's standpoint, there is no need for the construction of a new school. However, the facilities of the luka Separate School District are almost at capacity. They will have to be expanded, or new facilities constructed if even a few more students enroll. It is no wonder that people in luka are spending so much money to push this consolidation through.

Why should we even consider this proposal which will have the new school at the north end of the county offering twice as many courses as the school at the south end of the county while everyone in the county is levied the same on taxes? That is discriminating against ourselves.

In conclusion, we would like to emphasize that the School Board has declined to obtain a contract with the DECD to insure we get any money, and that, regardless of what the board order says, it has not been determined whether members of the new board will be elected or appointed, and that only three things are certain if a majority votes in favor of consolidation, they are:

- 1) The Tishomingo County School District will be abolished.
- 2) The luka Separate Municipal School District will include the entire county, and
- 3) The Superintendent of Education will be appointed.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the many citizens of our county who worked hard and put in long hours to gather names on petitions to guarantee our right to vote on this issue. Let's establish our county as a leader in the new era we are entering and not as a pawn of the power-brokers in Jackson. Vote against consolidation.

It has been widely reported and misleading in your newspaper by pro-consolidation forces that Tishomingo County Schools would receive \$7 million of free money for the county and district schools to consolidate. It was also reported in your newspaper that this money is a gift.

Here are the real facts: On February 15, 1990, the State Board Commission sold \$17 million in general obligation bonds to fund Impact Authority Grants for Northeast Mississippi.

Dear Editor:

Fifty odd years ago my father attempted to get a petition signed by enough citizens to combine several small rural schools into one consolidated school with a bus system to transport children to and from school. He failed to get enough signatures to accomplish this. The following are a few of the excuses he got when he asked for those signatures:

1. These schools were good enough for me, they are good enough for children now.
2. It might make my taxes go up.
3. Why do we need different schools and subjects? All we need are the 3 R's: Readin', Ritin' and Rithmetic.

Well they passed those little schools on down to us. The teachers we had did the best they could with what education they had and in the limited time they had (4 to 5 months a year) and often one teacher for the entire school teaching all grades (1st through 8th). The children were made to study hard and for most part learned enough to figure the weight of the cotton they picked, the corn they hauled, and the beard feet of the lumber they cut at the sawmill.

Then the war came along and most of us went into the service and served our country well as records will show, however most of us served in the lower ranks as enlisted personnel. In many instances we served under commissioned officers who were far inferior to us in common sense and judgement but who had an education which we did not. They qualified for commissions we did not. Others of us who did not go into the military worked in factories making war material or in other equally important work. Like the ones in the military they often worked under supervisors who were inferior to them in common sense and judgement but who had an education to qualify them for the supervisor's positions.

Since the war we have had some upgrading of schools but they are far from being adequate to educate our children to compete in a scientific-high-tech-world. Some have been fortunate enough and financially able to go on to schools and colleges in other locations and prepare themselves for better positions and opportunities but for the most part our children have had to settle for low paying factory jobs, pulpwood work, service station attendants and other low pay jobs or have had to move to larger cities and work as laborers there. There is nothing dishonorable about working in those jobs and they are all necessary to our way of life however they hold very little promise for our children and their children.

I see want ads in the papers every day where employers in the vicinity of Tishomingo County are seeking plant engineers, quality control supervisors, plant managers, production control supervisors and other high pay jobs for technicians and supervisors. Why do we not have qualified personnel to accept those positions and why will we not have qualified personnel to fill the high-tech jobs with NASA? Because we did not upgrade our schools years ago to prepare our children for those jobs today and because if we do not upgrade our schools now we will not have our children qualified to fill the scientific-high-tech-jobs that come this way in the future and they will come.

The NASA plant is only the beginning for this area. luka and Tishomingo County is going to cease to exist as we have known it. Some of you who are my age or older can remember when Huntsville, Ala. was just a lot of small gray houses around Redstone Arsenal. But look at it now.

Is it so hard to visualize this area covered with railroad yards, waterway ports, truck terminals, major airports, manufacturing plants, large hospitals, law firms, police departments with crime labs, city and interstate transportation systems, etc.? The potential is endless and even a little frightening. But that is the way it will be and jobs will be created by the thousands and qualified people from large cities will pour into this area by the thousands looking for those jobs. Are we going to sit here on our laurels and give those jobs to them while we do the dredge work for them or are we going to get up and do something to get our children and grandchildren qualified to take those good jobs themselves?

Some of us would like to keep our quiet little towns like they are or set them back fifty years to what they were then. But those days like some of us are about a thing of the past. The future belongs to our young people and to survive in it they must be prepared for it. So for once let us put our own selfish interests aside and give them a chance at a decent future.

I am one of the 5,000 or so who will not be able to vote in the school consolidation decision even though it will affect me and my children and grandchildren as much as it does anyone else. However I can and do encourage everyone who can vote to get out and vote for the consolidation and the future of our kids and our community. Some of you apparently were misled by some self-serving people who were afraid they were going to lose their job and talked you into signing the petition to bring this to a vote. But because you signed the petition does not mean you can't change your mind and vote for consolidation in the election.

Individuals with jobs affected by consolidation have a better chance than anyone to get those jobs back or better jobs if they are qualified. If they are not qualified they should never have had those jobs to begin with and we should make sure they don't have them in the future.

From the beginning the county schools and contains have been treated as though our opinion did not matter. Few knew of the proposal for consolidation until the deadline had passed; therefore, nothing could be done.

As a defense, we, the opposing countians, drew-up a petition that would call for an election on this matter. There were exactly 183 pages of the petition surrendered to the office of Larry Green, Superintendent of Education. Of those 183 pages, 3465 names were obtained and 2143 certified. After this number was reached, the certification stopped. This means that 40% of the school district legally signed the petition requesting a county-wide election to be held.

As you may have heard in the news, Mack Lloyd Watkins proposed a bill to the Mississippi Legislature that requested luka be allowed to vote on this issue. It was denied!

We, as seniors, are concerned about our children's future. At THS, we offer higher level science and math courses-Physics, Chemistry, Geometry and Advanced Mathematics. Students who are graduates of THS are doing extremely well in senior colleges, majoring in such areas as engineering. Create A Smokefree Environment

A ban on smoking by employees of the local medical center will be extended March 1 to create a smokefree environment.

of the 178-bed hospital were prohibited from smoking in the facility.

point out the dangers of smoking but also to take steps to protect and enhance the health of our patients, visitors, and employees.

"Smoking is a number one cause of preventable death in our country today," he continues. "Allowing this health menace to continue in our

hospital would be incompatible with our mission of good health. Our expanded smoking ban emphasizes the importance of clean air for all."

"Smoking is detrimental to the recovery of all patients, both smokers and nonsmokers," said Dr. Carl C. Welch, chief of the Magnolia Hospital

Medical Staff. "We ask that visitors respect their needs so that our patients can recover as quickly and comfortably as possible."

The lone exception to the smoking ban will allow patients to smoke unless prohibited by their physicians. Hospital officials are confident the

ban on smoking will not only improve air quality but result in a cleaner, safer environment for patients, visitors and employees.

To assist area residents who wish to stop smoking, the hospital offers smoking cessation classes through the Magnolia Cardiac Rehabilitation and Fitness Center.
