## April 2 thru April 7 Is County-Wide Clean-Up

The week of April 2 through April 7 has been designated as clean-up week by the Leadership Tishomingo Beautification Group, team V. Various youth groups from the county, including church youth groups, scouts, 4-H clubs, etc., have been asked to participate in the campaign. Cash prizes will be awarded to the individual turning in the most trash. Trash should consist of bottles, cans, and all kinds of paper picked up along public highways, streets, parks, etc. All trash must be in plastic bags and brought to the following designated weigh-in stations: Iuka - JayBird Park; Tishomingo - Grain and Elevator; Belmont - Court Square; Burnsville - Pour House Restaurant parking lot. Trash will be weighed from 3 - 5 p.m. on Saturday, April 7. A cash prize of \$10 will be awarded to the youth from each area who collects the most trash, and a \$25 cash prize awarded to the winning groups. This is not only an opportunity for individuals or groups to raise money but also to take pride in the community. A list of participating clubs and winners will

be announced. Members of the Leadership Tishomingo team, Johnnie Bonds, Nellie Horton, Bobby Johnson, Gary Walker, and Martha Yarbrough, wish each participant the best of luck.

# Election Calls For Merger Of Schools

Consolidation of high schools was given the okay in Tuesday's special election in Tishomingo County.

Sixty-two percent of Tishomingo County school district voters said yes to the proposal to consolidate the

county school district with the Iuka city school district.

Unofficial election returns showed the vote 2,633 for consolidation and 1,645 against consolidation.

About 49 percent of the registered county school district voters participated in the special election which was called following a petition

drive led by county citizens opposed to the merger.

The vote also enables Tishomingo County to receive a \$7 million state grant offer for educational improvements in the county.

Only county school district voters were allowed to vote in the referendum. City school district residents have voiced no opposition to the proposed merger.

The \$7 million is part of a \$20 million impact authority package to be used for educational, medical, transportation, and recreational improvements in Northeast Mississippi.

Consolidation of the school districts was a key requirement for receiving the funds. In December, both city and county school boards adopted almost identical resolutions of intent agreeing to abolish the existing districts, reorganize, and to merge into a single, countywide school district effective July 1, 1991.

The boards of trustees of both districts will exist and continue to govern until July 1, 1991. The newly formed district will encompass the entire geographical area of Tishomingo County. Plans call for a new high school to be built in the northern part of the county and for the existing Belmont school to be renovated.

The name of the new district will be determined by the boards of trustees of the existing city and county school districts.

Also, the superintendent of the new district will be appointed by the

newly elected board of trustees.

According to Nick Phillips, chairman of the board of trustees for the Iuka city school system, the merger proposal must now be submitted to and approved by the Mississippi State Board of Education and the U.S. Federal Department of Justice.

The county and city school boards have an enormous amount of organizing and planning to do before next summer, Phillips said.

Although the order stated that the merger be effective July 1, 1991, it doesn't necessarily require that the new school building be completed by that deadline, Phillips explained.

Under the merger, the county's four high schools will be consolidated into two. Each high school will offer courses in advanced math, science, foreign language, and other subjects.

The new high school, called a regional, multi-purpose educational complex, will offer a universities center, adult literacy program, and child care facilities for students.

The University of Mississippi will be the leading institution in the complex.

"This vote was a strong, positive signal that Tishomingo County is prepared for the future," said Bill Burnette, project manager for the Major Economic Impact Authority. "The people of Tishomingo County have made it clear that they are concerned about education and the progress ahead," he said.

Burnette said that Tishomingo County had definitely met the requirements for receiving the impact money. The planning phase would begin soon, he said, to work out the details of the merger.

# Plans Underway For NASA Celebration

Final preparations are being made for the Tri-State NASA Celebration scheduled for Tuesday, April 10 in Iuka.

The day has been set aside to celebrate the location of the advanced solid rocket motor plant at Yellow Creek and also to honor U.S. Rep. Jamie Whitten for his work in locating and funding the plant in Tishomingo County.

Special visitors to Iuka will include state and local officials from the Tri-State area, representatives from NASA, Lockheed, Aerojet, and many others.

At Mineral Springs Park, there will

be an arts and crafts fair, entertainment by area high school bands, concession stands, and information booths. An old-time wagon train will be on the streets to transport visitors to different locations.

From 10 - 1:30 p.m. an industrial fair will be held at the National Guard Armory. In addition, exhibits by Lockheed, Aerojet, NASA, and RUST International Corp. will be open for viewing at the Iuka High School cafeteria.

At 1 p.m. "Campus Country" from Northeast Mississippi Community College will perform at the Iuka High School football field.

A public ceremony will begin at 2 p.m. at the football field to recognize Congressman Whitten. Other officials will address the crowd at this time.

Many individuals in Tishomingo County and the Tri-State area are working hard to make April 10 an exciting and successful event. Financial support is needed to help cover expenses. # State Auditor's Office Continues Investigation Of Board's Action

The state auditor's office is continuing its investigation into the process by which the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors awarded a contract last month for an office facility in Iuka.

"I have asked my investigative division to gather additional information necessary to give us a better grasp of the events," state Auditor Pete Johnson said Tuesday.

Johnson ordered the audit after receiving a number of complaints concerning the Board's action.

Supervisors voted Feb. 26 to award a \$2.5 million contract to Vanderheyden Construction Co. of Whiteville, TN. S & J Steelbuilders, Inc. entered a bid of \$2 million.

The project involves construction of a temporary office building to house Lockheed Aerojet employees during construction of the NASA plant at Yellow Creek.

S & J has filed an appeal of the board's decision in Tishomingo County Circuit Court. The appeal will be heard April 9 before Judge Frank Russell.

The auditor said that his office is making progress on the investigation and plans to have the information ready by the April 9 hearing.

Johnson said that he wants the public to know that the investigation

is ongoing and "we are going to get to the bottom of it."

The auditor also said that there had been a misconception that his office was going to make the results of the report public.

"We just don't release a report such as this during an investigation," he said.

Everyone associated with the in-

vestigation has been very helpful and cooperative, Johnson said, which has enabled his department to operate faster.

The 80,000-square-foot building, which is presently under construction at the Iuka Industrial Park, is scheduled to be turned over to Lockheed Aerojet on May 1, with final completion scheduled for June 1, Vanderheyden has said.

## Iuka Minor League Tryouts

Iuka Minor League will hold its Baseball tryouts for 7, 8, & 9 year olds, April 6, 1990, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Dixie Youth field. Everyone that is going to play Dixie Youth baseball (7, 8 & 9 year olds) will be required to be present. Everyone will have to register before they can try out. Also anyone that played last year will have to register this night.

Everyone is required to bring a copy of their Birth Certificate, unless one has already been turned in, and \$13.00 registration fee.

If you will be 7 years old before August 1, 1990 and will not be 10 years old until August 1 or later of this year, you are ask to be present. Teams will be picked this night.

## County Schools To Administer BSAP And FLE Test

The Mississippi Basic Skills Assessment Program (BSAP) and Functional Literacy Examination will be administered in Tishomingo County School on April 3-5, 1990. The BSAP will be given to students in grades 3, 5, 8 and the FLE will be given to students in the 11th grade.

The Basic Skills Assessment Program and the Functional Literacy Examination replaced the Mississippi Educational Assessment Program in 1983 as a result of the passage of the Mississippi Education Reform Act of 1982. The BSAP and FLE test student performances in relation to minimum performance standards for basic skills in reading, writing, and mathematics, in grades 3, 5, 8 and 11.



## Alabama Man Killed In One Vehicle Wreck In Iuka

An Alabama man was killed in a one-car accident on Pike Street in Iuka early Sunday morning.

Jeffrey Davis, 27, of Route 3, Old Highway, Cherokee, AL, was dead at the scene of the accident, Iuka Police Chief James "Amos" Bates said.

Davis was driving a 1976 Pontiac Grand Prix westbound on Pike Road when he braked near a curve, skidded 100 yards, left the road and hit a tree,

Bates said. The car was traveling at a high rate of speed, the chief said.

Davis died from blunt trauma to the head and chest due to the accident, according to Tishomingo County Medical Examiner Dale White.

Iuka Police Officers, Dan James and Robert Till investigated the accident, which was reported at 3:30 a.m. Sunday. There were no passengers in the car.

Periodic Checkups

q. How often should a person visit the dentist for checkups and professional cleaning?

A. Years ago the maxim was "brush your teeth twice a day and see the dentist twice a year." But that maxim is not flexible enough to meet individual needs. There is no assembly-line uniformity in people's teeth, even in the same family, and conditions that develop throughout life vary widely from one person to another.

For example, the rate of plaque buildup is very rapid for some people. They may require professional cleaning four times a year, whereas once or twice a year might suffice for others. Also, some people are more prone to tooth decay than others. Examination by the dentist at appropriate intervals can make it possible to treat small cavities easily long before they threaten the life of a tooth.

By evaluating each patient's teeth and gum conditions, the dentist determines the best schedule for checkups as a means of maintaining good dental health.

Okay 4-H member, here is your opportunity to put all your eggs in one basket -- or maybe we should say skillet. We need contestants for the State 4-H Egg Preparation Contest. This is a fun and educational contest that offers winners a title and a trip.

The Mississippi Egg Marketing Board has sponsored the Egg Preparation Demonstration contest since its initiation in 1980. The board provides \$160 to help pay the expenses of the first place winner's trip to Louisville, Ky. to compete in the National Egg Preparation Demonstration Contest.

The board also provides each of the top five contestants in the State Contest with an omelette skillet.

Only 12 4-H member are allowed to compete in this contest each year. Applications are taken on a first come, first serve basis.

Unfortunately, having too many contestants in the State Egg Preparation Demonstration Contest has not been a problem. The problem has been too little participation.

#### MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR TIME

Time management is a matter of self-discipline. Control your time by controlling yourself. Although we all have the same amount of time, we don't have the same demands on our time.

To make the most of your time -- whatever the demands -- consider the following tips:

Plan your day. Make a list of the activities you must do during the day, and carry this list with you. Check each item off as it is completed.

Get yourself organized. You'll need a system to keep track of important details.

Do first things first. Arrange your day so that you get the important things done first. Spend your most productive time doing the important activities. Leave routine matters for

the time of day when you are less productive.

Make and stick to decisions. Acquire a habit of decisiveness. A test of a well-managed life is the ability to get things done. The following four actions will help you be more decisive:

1. Don't spend much time on unimportant decisions.
2. Examine choices thoroughly, and select an alternative.
3. Drop all other alternatives.
4. Act upon your decision.

Remember, that even to "decide or not to decide" is a decision.

Take action. Act promptly after deciding what to do. The sooner you act, the easier it will be to carry out. Don't put things off. If you procrastinate, you will spend valuable time justifying why you are not doing the job, instead of spending the time doing the job. If you have a tendency of putting things off:

1. Make a list of jobs to be done.
2. Analyze each job to be done.
3. Set a time for each job to be completed.
4. Stick to the schedule.

Keep up your self confidence. Accomplish something every day. Set realistic goals for the day, and keep going until they are achieved. Never waste the precious hours of your day. You can never get that time back.

Concentrate on one thing at a time. Put all your energy into the task at hand. Tune out interruptions when possible. Expect interruptions, but learn to get back to the job you were doing.

Learn to say "no." Think through requests and invitations carefully. Determine if each request or invitation is the best use of your time. Don't get involved in "no-win" situations. Don't be afraid to say "no" firmly.

Watch out for the time thieves. Recognize time thieves and avoid them: daydreaming, excuses,

frustration, irritation, impatience and worry.

Remember -- successful time management is the process of arranging the events of your day so that you accomplish things that are truly important to you.

#### BLACKENED CATFISH

A VERY POPULAR RECIPE!

- 6 catfish fillets
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, unsalted, melted
- 2 tablespoons paprika
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cayenne powder
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cayenne pepper
- 2 teaspoons lemon pepper
- 1 teaspoon ground thyme
- 1 1/2 teaspoons basil

Heat a large cast iron skillet over

high heat until a drop of water sizzles in the pan, about 10 minutes.

In a small bowl, combine paprika, salt, onion powder, garlic powder, cayenne pepper, lemon pepper, thyme, and basil.

Keep fillets refrigerated until ready to use. Dip each fillet in the melted butter so that both sides are coated. Sprinkle seasoning mixture on both sides. Use 1 tablespoon seasoning per fillet, patting it in. Place seasoned fillets in hot skillet; drizzle each with 1/2 tablespoon of the melted butter. There will be a lot of smoke; kitchen should be well ventilated. Cook quickly, about 2 minutes per side. Remove to warm platter. Repeat cooking process with remaining fillets.

### TESTING SIDE VISION

If you're concerned about how good your side (peripheral) vision may be, try this simple experiment at home. Looking straight ahead of you, fix your line of sight on one particular object in the room. Then, still looking straight ahead, make a note of all the other surrounding objects in the room that are also visible. If your eyes give you a "full" picture, your side vision may be normal. However, this kind of test is not reliable and may give you a false sense of security. Only through tests made by your eye doctor can you be sure.

Any defective side vision can be hazardous and may also be a sign of advanced stages of glaucoma, an eye disease that can cause blindness if not treated in time. In glaucoma, fluid pressure builds up in the eye, causing serious damage to the delicate structures within the eye. You should have your eye pressure checked at least once a year, especially if you are over forty, are nearsighted, or if there is a history of glaucoma in your family.

## Pharmacy & Your Health

### Caring for Dry Skin

Dry skin is a condition experienced by many people. Prevention of dry skin may be accomplished by increasing environmental moisture such as through the use of a cool mist vaporizer and by minimizing skin exposure to very hot water, harsh soaps, and detergents. Dry skin care involves the use of occlusive preparations and skin moisturizers.

**Occlusives:** Soaking the skin in water for a few minutes, followed by the application of an occlusive preparation such as lanolin, petroleum jelly or products containing animal or vegetable oils, often helps dry skin become softer and smoother. The occlusive fills in the tiny breaks in the skin and helps prevent the evaporation of water from the skin.

**Moisturizers:** Product ingredients such as glycerin and propylene glycol attract moisture. These ingredients either are absorbed directly into the skin or stay on the surface of the skin where they pull water from the atmosphere. Moisturizers may also lubricate the surface of the skin.

Skin care products are available as gels, lotions, creams, and ointments. Ointments are thought to have better occlusive properties, but lotions and creams are more popular because they usually do not produce greasy spots on the skin.

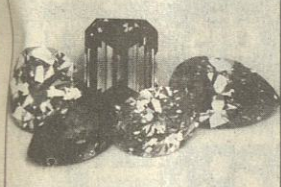

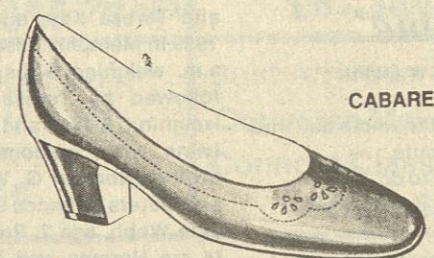

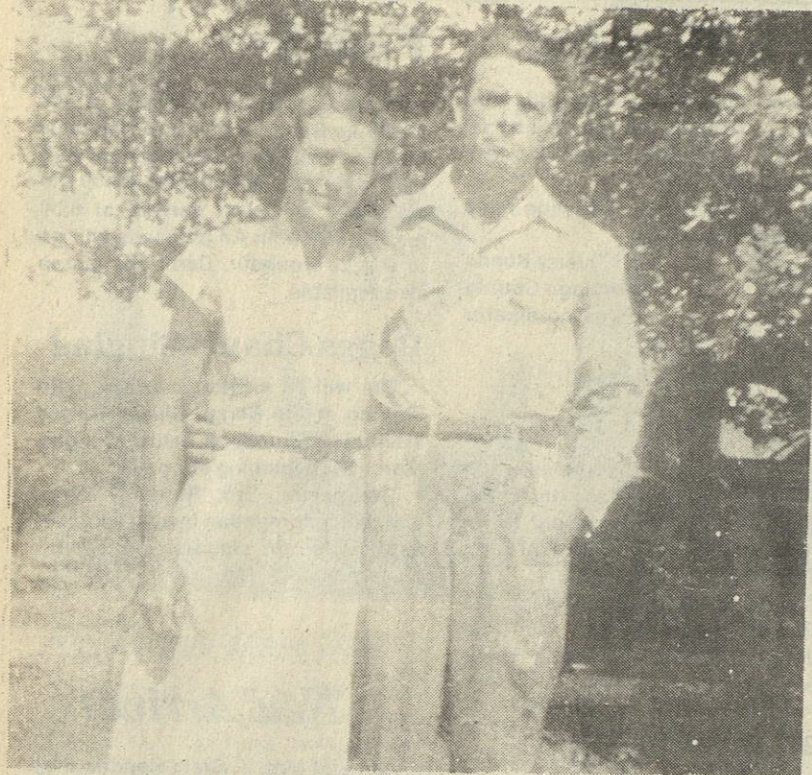

### County Agents Notes

#### SNAKE ID

Learn to recognize poisonous snakes and don't fear the others. Many snakes are beneficial. They kill rats and destroy insects. Some eat other snakes.

Most people who live in rural areas will, sooner or later, encounter a snake. One wants to be bitten by one, however. Snake bites can be avoided, and ones from poisonous snakes should be avoided. People who can identify poisonous snakes from non-poisonous ones can protect themselves from a dangerous bite.

Most non-poisonous snakes have long, oval heads. They also have a double row of scales on the tail, round pupils and a smooth, undented face. They also lay eggs from which the young hatch.

Most poisonous snakes have a flat, triangular head, a single row of scales on the tail, vertical pupils and dents (or pits) on the face. They also have a heavy body, slim neck and bear live young.

There are exceptions to these descriptions, of course. The coral snake, a relative of the cobra, is a poisonous snake with a smooth face and round pupils.

Rattlesnakes and moccasins show the true body conformation of poisonous snakes. Rattlesnakes have the characteristic rattle or button on the tail. Some common species in Mississippi include pigmy, diamondback and timber rattlesnakes.

The copperhead, or highland moccasin, has bands of brown on a tan body. The cottonmouth, or water moccasin, has a dark body and a stark white mouth.

#### STRAWBERRY CHOICES

If you plant strawberries, grow varieties adapted to our area of the state. Most of the plants have been bred and selected for improved quality, disease resistance and high yields under certain conditions.

The two varieties suited for north Mississippi are Cardinal and Sunrise. Tangi is the No. 1 variety recommended for south Mississippi.

There are also two systems of growing strawberries in Mississippi. Growers in south Mississippi use the hill system while growers in the northern area of the state use the matted row system.

Keep the berry plot free of weeds and grass. If strawberry plants become too thick during the first summer, thin them early in the fall.

#### TIMBER BRIDGES

In the past 15 years, engineering research has shown new and innovative uses for wood in structures such as abridges. A national initiative is underway to demonstrate new designs for modern timber bridges and to educate local decision makers about wood as an alternative material

for small bridges.  
Two such demonstrations are being conducted in Oktibbeha and Tallahatchie counties. Persons interested in this technique may want to attend the Mississippi Timber Bridge Conference May 9 through 10 at Mississippi State University.

The conference will focus on design, construction, maintenance and cost of modern timber bridges like the demonstration models in the two counties. A field trip to a new timber bridge is planned for conference participants. Mark your calendars if you're interested.

### ASCS Farm News

#### FARM PROGRAM SIGNUP UNDERWAY

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting applications for the 1990 feed grain, wheat, cotton and rice programs. The sign-up period opened January 16.

All farmers with an established crop acreage base are eligible to participate in the voluntary programs. Program benefits include price support loans and target price protection.

At signup, farmers may request advance deficiency payments in cash for wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and rice. The payments will be limited to the farmer's intended program acreage.

The 1990 acreage reduction requirements are 5 percent for wheat, oats and extra long staple (ELS) cotton, 10 percent for corn, sorghum and barley, 12.5 percent for upland cotton and 22.5 percent for rice. Farmers who meet these requirements and comply with other program provisions may obtain price support loans at a national average rate of \$1.57 per bushel for corn, \$1.95 for wheat, \$1.49 for sorghum, \$1.28 for barley, \$.81 for oats, \$1.33 for rye, 50.27 cents per pound for upland cotton, 81.77 cents per pound for ELS cotton, and \$6.50 per hundredweight for rice.

Established target prices are \$4.00 per bushel for wheat, \$2.75 for corn, \$2.61 for sorghum, \$2.36 for barley, \$1.45 for oats, 72.9 cents per pound for upland cotton, 98.1 cents per pound for ELS cotton and \$10.71 per hundredweight for rice.

Limited cross compliance requirements are in effect for all 1990 program crops except oats and ELS cotton. Limited cross compliance means that if a producer participates in the program for one crop on a farm, the producer will be prohibited from planting in excess of the crop acreage base for each other crop on the farm.

Further clarification and additional 1990 program provisions may be obtained from the Tishomingo County ASCS office.

#### FARMERS ASKED TO REPORT OPERATION CHANGES

Producers are urged not to delay reporting changes in their farm operations for the 1990 program year to our office.

To assure that farmers get full program benefits, farm records must be current. Farmers are, therefore, asked to contact the county ASCS office if there has been a change in the land owned or operated, if a farm will have a new owner effective for 1990, or if a change is made in the operation of an existing farm unit.

Requests to combine farms or divide a farm should be made as early as possible, because reconstitutions

require special processing as well as county committee approval.

ASCS began accepting applications for the 1990 feed grain, wheat, cotton and rice acreage reduction programs on January 16. Farmers who participate in the programs will be eligible to receive price support loans and deficiency payments, if applicable.

We encourage producers to study the programs and consider the benefits in relation to their farm operations.

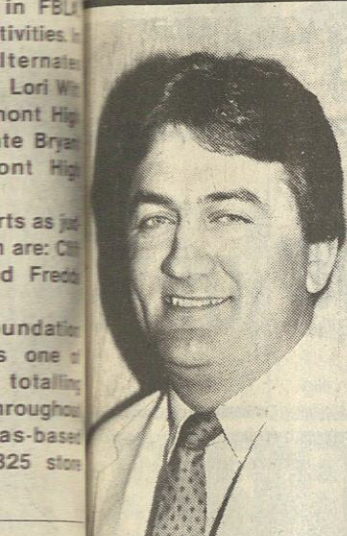

# Bullard Appointed Executive Director Of NEMCC Foundation

As of March 1 faculty and staff at Northeast Mississippi Community College have pledged in excess of \$50,000 to the institution's development foundation. In August '89 the Northeast Board of Trustees who comprise the Foundation board adopted a ten year calendar for raising five million dollars. The first goal of the plan was to challenge the faculty and staff to raise \$250,000. "Any good fund-raising campaign must start at home," Northeast president Joe M. Childers stated. "Our people acted quickly and generously to meet this challenge," Childers added. "Our faculty and staff have certainly demonstrated that we believe in ourselves, this institution, and its future. We now feel that we are ready to go public with our foundation drive -- to businesses, industries, alumni and friends." Northeast's foundation board appointed Duane Bullard of Ripley as part-time executive director of the Foundation effective March 1. Bullard, an Iuka native who has been director of industrial services at Northeast since 1983, coordinates

training programs associated with new, existing, or expanding business or industries in the five-county area and serves as economic development representative for the college.

From 1981 to 1983 Bullard was director of the Yellow Creek Nuclear Training Center in Tishomingo County.

An Iuka native, Bullard attended Northeast, earned a bachelor's degree from Delta State University, and a master's in administration and supervision from the University of North Alabama.

Bullard, his wife Sherri, and their daughter Natalie reside in Ripley.

According to Bullard, Northeast's Development Foundation will provide a complete support program designed to assist donors in making gifts that will be of great benefit to the givers, their families, and to NEMCC.

"We have adopted the theme 'A Quality Investment for Excellence' for our foundation for a number of reasons," Bullard added.

"The state can no longer provide us with monies to go beyond the basics, so we must solicit local and private funds to stay in the forefront, to enhance our existing programs and facilities."

"We can provide good programs with the state dollars, but we can't provide the quality we need without additional monies," Bullard said.

Last year nearly 63,000 people chose Mississippi community colleges to meet their higher education needs and goals. Over 96% were Mississippi residents, homefolks seeking a quality education close to home, at an affordable cost.

Northeast's student population is made up of new high school graduates, young professionals, housewives, second career seekers, senior citizens -- anyone who has an interest in learning something new, getting ahead, starting over or building a new career, Childers stated.

"We have the challenge of meeting the needs of all these people and of maintaining the fine reputation Northeast and her graduates have en-

joyed for over forty years.

"We also want to continue to provide an affordable education to any person who desires it."

According to Childers accessibility is another cornerstone in the community college mission. Northeast is within convenient community distance of the five counties served and offers day and evening classes to encourage northeast Mississippians to further their education.

The institution offers a variety of programs to students and to the community. Two-year academic transfer programs, vocational and technical education, employee upgrade and industrial training, adult literacy programs and community enrichment courses are all available to meet the needs of the area.

"The future of our area certainly looks bright," Childers said.

"Northeast Mississippi Community College will play an important role in this future."

"Northeast has a direct impact on economic development through job preparation, work force upgrade, entrepreneurial support, technology transfer and literacy training."

"Community colleges certainly enhance the quality of life of all Mississippians, and we want Northeast to continue this function in northeast Mississippi."

"We want to continue to expand and to prosper."

Priorities for utilizing gifts to the Foundation have been established by the board, Bullard said. Funds will be used to finance inservice training to improve the quality of the instructional programs, to pay expenses for faculty and staff to attend conferences which will enhance the effectiveness of the institution, to support research projects for faculty members, to finance building renovations when other funds are not available, to provide academic scholarships, and

the list goes on and on.

"A donor may never know the real impact of the gift because it will continue to exert a lasting influence," Bullard added.

Northeast's Foundation, a non-profit corporation, offers a comprehensive program of giving opportunities and is specifically responsible for gift programs involving estate planning, real estate, insurance, endowments, annuities, trusts, pooled income funds or other special gifts that require ongoing management or binding agreements.

Donors of the Foundation may choose to establish a scholarship or other type of permanent endowment. Such donors have the option to name the fund and establish criteria by which the earnings are administered.

All gifts to the Foundation are deductible for federal income tax purposes.

Property owners are asked to cooperate to prevent damage to telephone company facilities during this time, according to T.H. Bailey, district manager.

Bailey said telephone junction boxes, or pedestals, on private property or road right-of-way are usually damaged more often than any other outside equipment.

"Excessive heat generated by grass or brush fires melts that telephone cables causing services outages which are expensive and quite inconvenient to the telephone customers in the affected area," Bailey said.

Property owners planning agricultural activities where buried telephone facilities are in the general vicinity should call the One Call Center, 1-800-227-6477, toll free statewide. South Central Bell will send a representative to locate and mark any telephone equipment.

## Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

### Nutrient Loss During Food Storage

Isn't it true that, if someone eats a good diet, it is not necessary to take vitamin supplements?

Healthy individuals who have no diseases or problems absorbing nutrients from foods have little need for supplements if their diets contain all of the essential vitamins and minerals. For many of us, however, it is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain such a well-balanced diet. One problem is that foods tend to lose their nutritive value during storage. Vitamin levels tend to decrease with increasing lengths of storage.

A study reported in the *Journal of the Canadian Dietetic Association* provides an example of how storage can affect the levels of vitamin C in a commonly eaten food - potatoes. It was found that the vitamin C content of potatoes tested in June ("new potatoes") had a vitamin C content of about 30 mg in a 3 ounce serving. The same size serving of potatoes tested in October had only about 20 mg of the vitamin, and the level fell to about 10 mg the following June.

The researchers also tested french fried potatoes obtained from restaurants. The vitamin C, zinc, potassium, and calcium levels were higher in fries made from fresh potatoes than from frozen, pre-fried potatoes.

These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605(b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.

## Allied Enterprises Can Help You!

Allied Enterprises is a statewide system of multifaceted rehabilitation facilities for the mentally and/or physically handicapped and is owned and operated by the Mississippi Department of Human Services' Office of Vocational Rehabilitation.

Vocational Rehabilitation was begun in an organized fashion around 1920 to assist returning World War I veterans with disabilities by providing services they needed to re-enter the labor market with their service-related occupational limitations. In 1922, the program was expanded to include the civilian population of the country as the program had been quite successful in working with the veterans. The program primarily served persons with physical impairments in the beginning, but has been expanded throughout the years to accommodate persons with disabilities such as hearing and visual deficiencies, mental retardation, specific learning disabilities, mental and emotional illnesses, seizure disorders, brain damage and virtually any impairment of physical origin that would limit a person from a vocational standpoint. The services provided by Vocational Rehabilitation today include counseling and guidance, physical restoration, vocational training and job placement. The agency works with Mississippi citizens of working age who are eligible for services. The agency's eligibility criteria is three-fold. In order to be eligible for services, a person must have a mental and/or physical disability. This disability must present a handicap to the employment of the person, and there must be a reasonable expectation that the person can obtain and maintain employment after services have been rendered.

In the late 1950s, Mississippi Vocational Rehabilitation realized a need for a specialized service that was not available from any other source. Diagnostic Evaluations were routinely secured by rehabilitation counselors from physicians, psychologists and psychiatrists, but these reports proved limited in determining all of the factors that impacted a person from a vocational standpoint. Other problems experienced by counselors were that some clients could not seem to get a job after services were rendered or had problems maintaining employment after they went to work. This led to the establishment of the agency's facility system.

The first Allied Enterprises facility was set up as a pilot project in Brookhaven in 1959. The project was successful and by 1980, the agency had opened facilities in 23 locations throughout the state. Since 1980, some facilities have been merged and combined, others have been terminated as not feasible in some locations and new facilities have been started in new locations.

Each of the present 17 Allied Enterprises facilities provides three primary services: Vocational Evaluation, Personal Vocational Adjustment Training and Job Placement. Basically, Vocational Evaluation is a process of determining a person's functional vocational limitations, assets and capabilities and identifying services that will be needed for a person to reach an achievable vocational objective. This is accomplished through a system of testing, work samples and observing and monitoring a person's performance in an actual work setting.

Personal Vocational Adjustment Training is provided when a person has completed an evaluation which has identified limitations or problems that could interfere with that person's successful adjustment to a work environment. These problems could be in any of the following areas: attendance, tardiness, quality or quantity of their work, physical tolerance, attentiveness to tasks, following instructions, working under supervision or peer relationships to name a few.

Real work is used as a tool to provide the work evaluation and work adjustment phases of the facility's programs. Actual products or sub-components of area industries are subcontracted and brought into the facility for clients to produce. An industrial environment is simulated and clients are paid for their work performed on a piece-rate basis. When a person's performance reaches a level that is considered adequate for entry level employment in the private sector, they are referred for job placement assistance through the facility's Job Club program.

The Job Club is an intensive ten week program of activities designed to evaluate a person's ability to get a job, provide services to enhance that person's job seeking skills and to place them into competitive employment. The program utilizes application-completion training, videotaped, simulated job interviews and job search training to accomplish job placement goals. Sometimes job tryouts or on-the-job training is utilized to place a person. In addition, each participant is certified for the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit program, whereby an employer may deduct a portion of the first year's wages paid a handicapped employee from the employer's federal tax liability. Other services such as Adult Basic Education, transportation assistance or counseling and vocational guidance are provided as auxiliary to a client's primary program on an as needed basis.

The 1980s was a decade of change and expansion for Vocational Rehabilitation as an agency. On July 1, 1983, Vocational Rehabilitation and its sister division, the Disability Determination Section, were taken out of the Mississippi Department of Education and given departmental status as the Department of Rehabilitation Services. The agency maintained this status until July 1, 1989, when the agency and several other programs were combined and the new Department of Human Services was created.

During the 1980s, several new specialized programs were implemented by the agency. The Job Club program was started in 1986 to provide specialized job-seeking training and placement services. The Independent

When she returned the baby had pulled the jacket of the sleeping garment over his head and was dead. An effort to revive him: were futile. The baby was eleven months old.

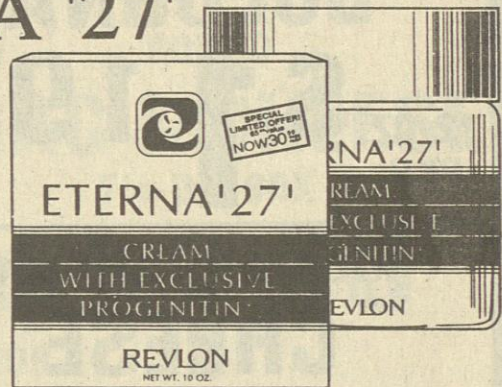
