Election Calls For Merger Of Schools

Consolidation of high schools was given the okay in Tuesday's special election in Tishomingo County.

Sixty-two percent of Tishomingo County school district voters said yes to the proposal to consolidate the

county school district with the luka city school district.

Unofficial election returns showed

the vote 2,633 for consolidation and 1,645 against consolidation. About 49 percent of the registered

county school district voters participated in the special election which was called following a petition

drive led by county citizens opposed to the merger.

The vote also enables Tishomingo County to receive a \$7 million state grant offer for educational improvements in the county.

Only county school district voters were allowed to vote in the referendum. City school district residents have voiced no opposition to the proposed merger.

The \$7 million is part of a \$20 million impact authority package to be used for educational, medical, transportation, and recreational improvements in Northeast Mississippi. Consolidation of the school districts was a key requirement for receiving the funds. In December, both city and county school boards adopted almost identical resolutions of intent agreeing to abolish the existing districts, reorganize, and to merge into a single, countywide school district effective July 1, 1991.

The boards of trustees of both districts will exist and continue to govern until July 1, 1991. The newly formed district will encompass the entire geographical area of Tishomingo County. Plans call for a new high school to be built in the northern part of the county and for the existing Belmont school to be renovated.

The name of the new district will be determined by the boards of trustees of the existing city and county school districts.

Also, the superintendent of the new district will be appointed by the

newly elected board of trustees.

According to Nick Phillips, chairman of the board of trustees for the luka city school system, the merger proposal must now be submitted to and approved by the Mississippi State Board of Education and the U.S. Federal Department of Justice.

The county and city school boards have an enormous amount of organizing and planning to do before next summer, Phillips said.

Although the order stated that the merger be effective July 1, 1991, it doesn't necessarily require that the new school building be completed by that deadline, Phillips explained.

Under the merger, the county's four high schools will be consolidation into two. Each high school will offer courses in advanced math, science, foreign language, and other subjects.

The new high school, called a regional, multi-purpose educational complex, will offer a universities center, adult literacy program, and child care facilities for students.

The University of Mississippi will be the leading institution in the complex.

"This vote was a strong, positive signal that Tishomingo County is prepared for the future," said Bill Burnette, project manager for the Major Economic Impact Authority, "The people of Tishomingo County have made it clear that they are concerned about education and the progress ahead," he said.

Burnette said that Tishomingo County had definitely met the requirements for receiving the impact money. The planning phase would begin soon, he said, to work out the details of the merger.

Alabama Man Killed In One Vehicle Wreck In Iuka

An Alabama man was killed in a one-car accident on Pike Street in luka early Sunday morning.

Jeffrey Davis, 27, of Route 3, Old lighway, Cherokee, AL, was dead at the scene of the accident, luka Police Chief James "Amos" Bates said.

Davis was driving a 1976 Pontiac Grand Prix westbound on Pike Road when he braked near a curve, skidded 100 yards, left the road and hit a tree, .

Bates said. The car was traveling at a high rate of speed, the chief said.

Davis died from blunt trauma to the head and chest due to the accident, according to Tishomingo County Medical Examiner Dale White.

luka Police Officers, Dan James and Robert Till investigated the accident, which was reported at 3:30 a.m. Sunday. There were no passengers in the car.

State Auditor's Office Continues Investigation Of Board's Action

The state auditor's office is continuing its investigation into the process by which the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors awarded a contract last month for an office facility in luka.

"I have asked my investigative division to gather additional information necessary to give us a better grasp of the events," state hore: Pete Johnson said Tuesday.

Johnson ordered the audit atter receiving a number of complaints concerning the Board's action.

Supervisors voted Feb. 26 to award \$2.5 million contract to Vanderheyden Construction Co. of Whiteville, TN, S & J Steelbuilders, Inc. entered a bid of \$2 million.

The project involves construction of a temporary office building to house Lockheed Aerojet employees during construction of the NASA plant at Yellow Creek.

S & J has filed an appeal of the board's decision in Tishomingo County Circuit Court. The appeal will be heard April 9 before Judge Frank Russell.

The auditor said that his office is making progress on the investigation and plans to have the information ready by the April 9 hearing.

Johnson said that he wants the public to know that the investigation is ongoing and "we are going to get to the bottom of it."

The auditor also said that there had been a misconception that his office was going to make the results of the report public.

"We just don't release a report such as this during an investigation," he said

The Mississippi Basic Skills Assessment Program (BSAP) and Functional Literacy Examination will be administered in Tishomingo County School on April 3-5, 1990. The BSAP will be given to students in grades 3, 5, 8 and the FLE will be given to students in the 11th grade.

The Basic Skills Assessment Program and the Functional Literacy Examination replaced the Mississippi Educational Assessment Program in 1983 as a result of the passage of the Mississippi Education Reform Act of 1982. The BSAP and FLE test student performances in relation to minimum performance standards for basic skills in reading, writing, and mathematics, in grades 3, 5, 8 and 11.

The Vocational Center would like to express its appreciation to these three who donated their time to speak



The Mississippi Egg Marketing Board has sponsored the Egg Preparation Demonstration contest since its initiation in 1980. The board provides \$160 to help pay the expenses of the first place winner's trip to Louisville, Ky. to compete in the National Egg Preparation Demonstration Contest.

The board also provides each of the top five contestants in the State Contest with an omelette skillet.

Only 12 4-H member are allowed to compete in this contest each year. Applications are taken on a first come, first serve basis.

Unfortunately, having too many contestants in the Stae Egg Preparation Demonstration Contest has not been a problem. The problem has been too little participation.

Plan your day. Make a list of the activities you must do during the day, and carry this list with you. Check

4. Act upon your decision.

Remember, that even to "decide or not to decide" is a decision.



TESTING SIDE VISION

If you're concerned about how good your side (peripheral) vision may be, try this simple experiment at home. Looking straight ahead of you, fix your line of sight on one particular object in the room. Then, still looking straight ahead, make a note of all the other surrounding objects in the room that are also visible. If your eyes give you a "full" picture, your side vision may be normal. However, this kind of test is not reliable and may give you a false sense of security. Only through tests made by your eye doctor can you be sure.

Any defective side vision can be hazardous and may also be a sign of advanced stages of glaucoma, an eye disease that can cause blindness if not treated in time. In glaucoma, fluid pressure builds up in the eye, causing serious damage to the delicate structures within the eye. You should have your eye pressure checked at least once a year, especially if you are over forty, are nearsighted, or if there is a history of glaucoma in your family.

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Caring for Dry Skin

Dry skin is a condition experienced by many people. Prevention of dry skin may be accomplished by increasing environmental moisture such as through the use of a cool mist vaporizer and by minimizing skin exposure to very hot water, harsh soaps, and detergents. Dry skin care involves the use of occlusive preparations and skin moisturizers.

Occlusives: Soaking the skin in water for a few minutes, followed by the application of an occlusive preparation such as lanolin, petroleum jelly or products containing animal or vegetable oils, often helps dry skin become softer and smoother. The occlusive fills in the tiny breaks in the skin and helps prevent the evaporation of water from the skin.

Moisturizers: Product ingredients such as glycerin and propylene glycol attract moisture. These ingredients either are absorbed directly into the skin or stay on the surface of the skin where they pull water from the atmosphere. Moisturizers may also lubricate the surface of the skin.

Skin care products are available as gels, lotions, creams, and ointments. Ointments are thought to have better occlusive properties, but lotions and creams are more popular because they usually do not produce greasy spots on the skin.



And you must voice your opinion whether for it or against it. You have that right.



County Agents Notes

SNAKEID

Learn to recognize poisonous snakes and don't fear the others. Many snakes are beneficial. They kill rats and destroy insects. Some eat other snakes.

Most people who live in rural areas will, sooner or later, encounter a snake. One wants to be bitten by one, however. Snake bites can be avoided, and ones from poisonous snakes should be avoided. People who can identify poisonous snakes from nonpoisonous ones can protect themselves from a dangerous bite.

Most non-poisonous snakes have long, oval heads. They also have a double row of scales on the tail, round pupils and a smooth, undented face. They also lay eggs from which the young hatch.

Most poisonous snakes have a flat, triangular head, a single row of scales on the tail, vertical pupils and dents (or pits) on the face. They also have a heavy body, slim neck and bear live young.

There are exceptions to these descriptions, of course. The coral snake, a relative of the cobra, is a poisonous snake with a smooth face and round pupils.

Rattlesnakes and moccasins show the true body conformation of poisonous snakes. Rattlesnakes have

ASCS Farm News

FARM PROGRAM SIGNUP UNDER-

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting applications for the 1990 feed grain, wheat, cotton and rice programs. The sign-up period opened January 16.

All farmers with an established crop acreage base are eligible to participate in the voluntary programs. Program benefits include price support loans and target price protection.

At signup, farmers may request advance deficiency payments in cash for wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and rice. The payments will be limited to the farmer's intended program acreage.

The 1990 acreage reduction requirements are 5 percent for wheat, oats and extra long staple (ELS) cotton, 10 percent for corn, sorghum and barley, 12.5 percent for upland cotton and 22.5 percent for rice. Farmers who meet these requirements and comply with other program provisions may obtain price support

plications for the 1990 feed grain, wheat, cotton and rice acreage reduction programs on January 16. Farmers who participate in the programs will be eligible to receive price support loans and deficiency payments, if applicable.

We encourage producers to study the programs and consider the benefits in relation to their farm operations.

the characteristic rattle or button on the tail. Some common species in Mississippi include pigmy, diamondback and timber rattlesnakes.

The copperhead, or highland moccasin, has bands of brown on a tan body. The cottonmouth, or water moccasin, has a dark body and a stark white mouth.

STRAWBERRY CHOICES

If you plant strawberries, grow varieties adapted to our area of the state. Most of the plants have been bred and selected for improved quality, disease resistance and high yields under certain conditions.

The two varieties suited for north Mississippi are Cardinal and Sunrise. Tangi is the No. 1 variety recommended for south Mississippi.

There are also two systems of growing strawberries in Mississippi. Growers in south Mississippi use the hill system while growers in the northern area of the state use the matted row system.

Keep the berry plot free of weeds and grass. If strawberry plants become too thick during the first summer, thin them early in the fall. TIMBER BRIDGES

loans at a national average rate of \$1.57 per bushel for corn, \$1.95 for wheat, \$1.49 for sorghum, \$1.28 for barley, \$.81 for oats, \$1.33 for rye, 50.27 cents per pound for upland cotton, 81.77 cents per pound for ELS cotton, and \$6.50 per hundredweight for rice.

Established target prices are \$4.00 per bushel for wheat, \$2.75 for corn, \$2.61 for sorghum, \$2.36 for barley, \$1.45 for oats, 72.9 cents per pound for upland cotton, 98.1 cents per pound for ELS cotton and \$10.71 per hundredweight for rice.

Limited cross compliance requirements are in effect for all 1990 program crops except oats and ELS cotton. Limited cross compliance means that if a producer participates in the program for one crop on a farm, the producer will be prohibited from planting in excess of the crop acreage base for each other crop on the farm.

Further clarification and additional 1990 program provisions may be obtained from the Tishomingo County ASCS office.

FARMERS ASKED TO REPORT OPERATION CHANGES

Producers are urged not to delay reporting changes in their farm operations for the 1990 program year to our office.

To assure that farmers get full program benefits, farm records must be current. Farmers are, therefore, asked to contact the county ASCS office if there has been a change in the land owned or operated, if a farm will have a new owner effective for 1990, or if a change is made in the operation of an existing farm unit.

Requests to combine farms or divide a farm should be made as early as possible, because reconstitutions

Allied Enterprises is a statewide system of multifaceted rehabilitation clities for the mentally and/or physically handicapped and is owned and BSOLU rated by the Mississippi Department of Human Services' Office of ocational Rehabilitation. --9:00A

Vocational Rehabilitation was begun in an organized fashion around 1920 sippi assist returning World War I veterans with disabilities by providing serces they needed to re-enter the labor market with their service-related cational limitations. In 1922, the program was expanded to include the lian population of the country as the program had been quite successful working with the veterans. The program primarily served persons with vsical impairments in the beginning, but has been expanded throughout vill offer a tre EN SALE M evears to accommodate persons with disabilities such as hearing and ual deficiencies, mental retardation, specific learning disabilities, menand emotional illnesses, seizure disorders, brain damage and virtually w impairment of physical origin that would limit a person from a ccational standpoint. The services provided by Vocational Rehabilitation day include counseling and guidance, physical restoration, vocational aining and job placement. The agency works with Mississippi citizens of orking age who are eligible for services. The agency's eligibility criteria is mee-fold. In order to be eligible for services, a person must have a mental ndor physical disability. This disability must present a handicap to the mployment of the person, and there must be a reasonable expectation that reperson can obtain and maintain employment after services have been endered.

In the late 1950s, Mississippi Vocational Rehabilitation realized a need r a specialized service that was not available from any other source. agnostic Evaluations were routinely secured by rehabilitation counselors mphysicians, psychologists and psychiatrists, but these reports proved nited in determining all of the factors that impacted a person from ocational standpoint. Other problems experienced by counselors were tal some clients could not seem to get a job after services were rendered rhad problems maintaining employment after they went to work. This led othe establishment of the agency's facility system.

The first Allied Enterprises facility was set up as a pilot project in prokhaven in 1959. The project was successful and by 1980, the agency adopened facilities in 23 locations throughout the state. Since 1980, some tolities have been merged and combined, others have been terminated as rolleasible in some locations and new facilities have been started in new

but of the present 17 Allied Enterprises facilities provides three primary seriess: Vocational Evaluation, Personal Vocational Adjustment Training add Placement. Basically, Vocational Evaluation is a process of determing person's functional vocational limitations, assets and capabilities and lientifying services that will be needed for a person to reach an achierable vocational objective. This is accomplished through a system of lesting, work samples and observing and monitoring a person's performacceinan actual work setting.

Personal Vocational Adjustment Training is provided when a person has

Living Program was initiated to provide services necessary for persons with severe disabilities to function more independently when competitive employment is not feasible. The agency's Supported Employment Program was developed in the late eighties to provide on the job work adjustment assistance by a job trainer or coach for clients who would be unable to maintain employment without such assistance. Mobile Evaluation units were purchased and activated in 1989, to provide Vocational Evaluation services to persons in rural areas who had no access to an Allied Enterprises facility. The Public Offender Program began in 1988, to serve Correctional Department parolees with disabilities. The agency's Rehabilitation Engineering program was developed to provide expertise and assistance in barrier removal and accessibility for persons with mobility impairments.

Allied Enterprises of Corinth was established in March of 1968, to serve Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo counties. During the 1970s, the facility struggled to maintain an adequate amount of subcontract work and never really served many clients outside of Alcorn County due to the lack of a transportation system.

The 1980s were a period of expansion for the Corinth facility. In 1980, the facility had 1 primary customer and had from 5 to 10 work stations available to serve clients. By the end of 1989, the facility had 4 primary customers and an adequate number of work stations to serve 50 clients per day. By 1984, the facility had outgrown its 14,000 square foot building on Sawyer Road and moved into a 22,000 square foot building in southwest Corinth.

The 1980s saw the development of a transportation system that enabled the provision of services to persons in Prentiss, Tishomingo, Tippah, Benton and Marshall counties, who had not been able to enter the facility in the past due to transportation problems.

During the 1980s, the facility underwent four resurveys by the Commission on the Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (a national accreditation body) and achieved maximum accreditation for 3 years on each of these occasions.

In the summer of 1986, the Job Club program was established at the facility. This program has led to a tremendous increase in the percentage of clients being placed into employment by the facility and has made possible the placement of many persons with severe disabilities into the competitive labor market that could not have been place before.

Program Evaluation activities in the mid 1980s revealed that a high per centage of the facility's clientele did not have high school diplomas or GED certificates. As a consequence of this, an Adult Basic Education Program was coordinated with Northeast Mississippi Junior College and GED preparation classes were established to meet twice weekly at the facility. Several clients have been successful at getting their GED certificates as a result of this service. About this same time, it was determined that the facility was not reaching many special education students in the area, and if they did receive facility services, it was after the students had left the school system and experienced failure in trying to obtain and/or maintain employment. A series of meetings were coordinated with representatives of the area's special education programs and the agency's general counselors. The result of these meetings was the establishment of a Cooperative Special Education Program, whereby, some special education students in their final year of school are transported to the facility to spend approximately half of each school day receiving vocational evaluation

and/or vocational adjustment training. This program has made it possible to place many of these students into competitive employment shortly after the completion of their secondary education program.

During the first quarter of 1989, the agency determined that the facility system was not receiving a sufficient amount of input and support from the communities in which the individual facilities were located and it was felt that more local input into the facility's operations might improve the facility's responsiveness to community needs and increase and effectiveness and efficiency of the program. A decision was made to form facility advisory councils at each location and a search was begun for persons in the facility's service delivery area that could provide input and guidance for the program. This search resulted in the identification and recruitment of 21 representatives of northeast Mississippi's business, industrial and governmental population that were willing to serve in this capacity. Due to conflicts related to the state's governmental reorganization plan, the facility's accreditation resurvey and an expansion of the program's subcontract base during the second half of 1989, the Advisory Council did not get past the appointment phase of the council plan. The initial meeting of this council was held on Tuesday, February 20, 1990. The Facility Advisory Council should prove to be an important assest to the facility's management in meeting the needs of the service delivery area.

As the facility begins the last decade of this century, it is important to reflect on the program's past, to determine where it is now and to plan the future direction of the program's services and operations. Several goals for the 1990s are apparent from this process.

One important goal for the nineties will be an attempt to secure a larger, preferably, publicly owned physical plant for the facility. The program has already outgrown its present location and it is hoped that an alliance can be developed that includes area governmental units, community leaders and the facility's parent agency and that this alliance can lead to he accomplishment of this goal.

Computerization of many of the facility's functions will become increasingly important in this decade as the program continues to increase the number of persons served, expands the subcontract base and strives to meet the needs of the area's disabled population through new programs and the increased efficiency and effectiveness and existing programs.


Enhanced community involvement and input will be of major importance in the coming decade, as well as the facility's coordination and cooperation with other human service agencies. All of these will be necessary to meet the needs of the area's disabled population and employers.

During the 1990s, Allied Enterprises will continue its efforts to fulfill the role for which it was envisioned to be, an alliance of Employers, Government and the disabled population of Mississippi.

Transportation to Allied Enterprises is provided for persons in Tishomingo County on a daily basis by a van that picks them up in the morning and drops them off in the afternoon at pickup points throughout the county. 




