Tri-State Celebration Tuesday In Honor Of NASA Groundbreaking

luka will be a hubbub of activity next Tuesday as the city hosts the NASA Tri-State Celebration.

Visitors from the neighboring states of Alabama and Tennessee will join Mississippians in a day-long celebration of the location of NASA's advanced solid rocket motor facility at Yellow Creek.

The day has also been set aside to honor U.S. Congressman Jamie Whitten for his efforts in bringing the plant to Northeast Mississippi.

The rocket plant is projected to have a major impact on the economies of Mississippi and its two neighboring states. NASA's arrival has been a long-awaited event for Tri-State leaders and a culmination of several years of negotiating and planning. For this reason, Gov. Ray Mabus declared April 10 a day to observe those involved in the project and to officially break ground on the facility.

Dignitaries scheduled to be present include Gov. Mabus, Alabama Governor Guy Hunt, Mississippi U.S. Senators Thad Cochran and Trent Lott, Congressman Whitten, and many other state and local officials from the three states.

Officials will participate in groundbreaking ceremonies early in the

day, which are to be attended by invitation only.

Meanwhile, activities in luka will get underway at 10 a.m. Mineral Springs Park will feature an arts and crafts fair, live entertainment, and refreshments. The list of entertainers includes New Prospect Baptist Church Puppet

Ministry, Jane Dean, Michelle Johnson, Nita and Anna Beth Goss, Courtney Compton, and Archie Lee and Hollis Long.

Official commemorative T-shirts of the event will be sold at various locations.

The Tishomingo County Wagon Train Association will provide wagon rides, beginning behind the Old Tishomingo Courthouse, from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m.

An Industrial Fair will be set up at, the National Guard Armory and the luka High School cafeteria for public viewing. Exhibits will be brought in by NASA, Lockheed, Aerojet, and RUST International. A number of colleges and universities will also be represented. These include: University of North Alabama, Mississippi University for Women, Itawamba Junior College, Mississippi State University, the University of Mississippi, Blue Mountain College, the University of Alabama at Huntsville, Shoals Community College, Bethel College, State area Vocational Technical School in Crump, TN, Memphis State University, Jackson State from Jackson, TN, Athens State from Athens, Alabama, Birmingham Southern, Northwest Mississippi Community College, Samford University, Auburn University, and Northeast Mississippi Community College.

After lunch the focus will shift to the luka High School football stadium. "Campus Country" from Northeast Mississippi Community College will perform at 1 p.m.

A public celebration gets underway at 2 p.m. at the stadium with an invocation and national anthem performed by opera singer Dennis Bailey.

Eighteen high school bands will also provide entertainment for the public. Schools represented will be: luka High School, Belmont High School, Burnsville High School, Tishomingo High School, Alcorn Central High School, Corinth High School, Kossuth High School,

Biggersville High School, and Mooreville High School, all from Mississippi. From Alabama: Colbert County High School, NW Alabama Community College, Phil Campbell High School, Vina High School, and Russellville High School. From Tennessee: Adamsville High School, Middleton High School, Hardin County High School, and Bolivar Central High School.

Gov. Mabus will host the ceremony, which will recognize local and state officials, congressional delegations, and representatives from NASA. Congressman Jamie Whitten will be recognized and will address the crowd. The speakings will end with a patriotic salute and a balloon release.

Parking will be provided at the following locations: Piggly Wiggly and Wal-Mart, on Hwy. 25 South, Jay Bird Park in downtown luka, and the National Guard Armory on Old Hwy. 72. A continuous shuttle service will transport visitors to and from the high school from the parking area.

State Auditor Files Brief

A bried filed by State Auditor Pete Johnson said that the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors did not have the authority to accept the higher of two bids submitted for the Lockheed & Aerojet office building. S & J Steelbuilders, Inc. of Booneville has filed an appeal of the board's action in Tishomingo County Circuit Court. S & J's bid of \$2 million

was rejected by the board on February 26 in favor of a \$2.5 million bid submitted by Vanderheyden Construction Co. of Whiteville, Tenn.

Circuit Judge Frank Russell, who is scheduled to hear the appeal April 9, ordered Johnson to file the "friend of the court" brief following the state audit of the board's bid process.

In the brief, Johnson said that the Board's minutes without question did not supply the information required by law to support it's action.

Johnson also said that he was "of the opinion that the prudent and proper Board action was for it to have rejected both bids and re-advertised for new bids."

The supervisors voted 3-2 to award the contract to Vanderheyden, saying that S & J's bid did not meet bid specifications.

A member of the Committee on appropriations since 1943, Mr. Whitten was elected Chairman by his colleagues in 1979 and each succeeding Congress.



This legislation turned the public and domestic industries toward employment instead of continuing merely to increase unemployment compensation.


Congressman Whitten was born in Cascilla, Tallahatchie County, Mississippi. He attended Cascilla and Charleston public schools, and the University of Mississippi Law School.

He was a member of the debate team and active in University Theatre productions. In 1932, he had the highest grade average of those admitted from the University to the Mississippi State Bar.

He is married to the former Rebecca Thompson of Saltillo and has two children: Jamie L. Whitten, Jr., of Washington, D.C. and Mrs. Beverly Merritt of Arlington, Texas.

Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

Foods: Enriched or **Fortified?**

What is the difference between the terms "enriched" and "fortified" that I find on various food

Many foods - especially grains - lose nutrients during processing. When these foods are enriched, those nutrients that were lost during processing are replaced. For example, enriched bread and other refined grain products are supplemented with thiamin, riboflavin, niacin and iron so that the food products contain approximately the same amount of these nutrients as before processing.

When foods are fortified, nutrients are added that originally were not present. For example, vitammins A and D are added to margarine, and iodine is added to table salt. Food fortification has helped prevent such health problems as rickets (vitamin D deficiency) and goiter (iodine deficiency).

Heat, light, and moisture cause vitamins to deteriorate. For this reason and others, the amounts of nutrients shown on food labels are approximate. To guard against nutritional deficiencies, some persons take a supplement each day. A tightly sealed container of a vitamin/mineral supplement may have less tendency to deteriorate than, for example, an unsealed cereal that is stored in a hot, humid area for long periods of time.

County Agent's Notes

SUDDEN COLD SNAP

It happened just as it has for decades in Tishomingo County - a warming trend in early March suddenly suppressed by a wave of cold, Arctic air. The cold snap caused temperatures to drop

The new plant growth coaxed by pruning and warm weather is dead. Homeowners in Tishomingo County must once again use pruning shears to remove dead tissue and promote a second wave of growth.

These are several things homeowners can do to protect landscape shrubs and plants from sudden cold snaps.

Mulch can be placed around plants to keep soil temperature constant. Sudden changes in soil temperature can warm plant roots and stimulate the plant to grow. Young, tender shoots would then be exposed to freezing temperatures like those we recently had in the county.

Plants can be covered with plastic bags at night. The plastic allows plants to retain heat and prevents colder temperatures from penetrating plant tissues. The bags should be removed during the day. Warmth from the sun will cause a buildup of heat that can burn plants.

Plants can also benefit from the addition of fertilizer. A specialty fertilizer will protect plant roots from being burned because it gradually releases nutrients that would damage tissue is excessively applied.

known as strawberry weevils, can seriously hurt your crop yields.

The weevils lay their eggs in the bloom buds on the berry plant, and then cut off the buds.

These insects emerge in early April. Control them with a spray application of sevin. If timed correctly, only one application is needed. TERMITES

Homeowners in Tishomingo County should check for swarming termites during the next few weeks. It's a good idea to be prepared for these pests because they cause much destruction around the home:

Don't confuse termites with swarming ants. Ants have a narrow waistline and elbow-shaped antennae. Termites have a thick waist and straight antennae.

Subterranean termites usually have their colonies in the soil. They feed on materials containing cellulose,. and many of these materials are contained in building foundations. Foundation materials can be protected by a chemical barrier placed in the soil between the building and the termite colony. Consult a professional pest control operator on use of this technique.

tilizing trees and shrubs. **TIMBER PILING**

Some of you may have heard the term "timber piling" being used by people within the forest industry. Just what is timber piling, and why is it important?

Timber piles are long, heavy, round pieces of wood driven deep into the ground to anchor structures built on soft or wet sites. Docks, landings, beachfront buildings and pressure points on bridges are examples of sites where timber piling is used.

Wood foundations provide good support for buildings. The coliseum in Oakland, Calif., has a timber piling foundation, yet it was not damaged by the devastating earthquake in the San Francisco-Oakland bay area last

Most of the buildings in the French Quarter in New Orleans rest on timber piling. Many urban areas in New York, New Jersey, Connecticut and Massachusetts use timber piling in major building constructions. Most of the piling used by the urban areas of the East Coast is made from treated southern pine.

Words From **Bill Wheeler**

Representative Bill Wheeler of Belmont has been named to a Select House Committee on Drug Abuse to work on the wide-ranging legislative package prepared by a joint interim study committee.

The appointment was announced by House Speaker Tim Ford. Wheeler represents House District 19 in Itawamba and Tishomingo Counties.







These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605(b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for cal ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact. A-5-12-19-26-chg **Drinking & Driving** Don't Mix In Mississippi

Mississippi is tough on people who drink and drive, with stiff penalties for persons convicted of driving under the influence (DUI) of alcohol that include up to five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine for repeat offenders.

"Drunk drivers no longer get just a ticket," said Billy Terrell, director of the Division of Public Safety Planning's Office of Highway Safety. "They are handcuffed, arrested and put in jail. This should be a clear message that drinking and driving will not be tolerated in this state." The law is as follows:

*The first conviction carries a fine of \$250 - \$1,000, up to 24 hours in jail and a one-year license suspension, reduced to 90 days if the offender completes the 10-hour Mississippi Alcohol Safety Education Program.

*For a second conviction within five years, the fine is \$600-\$1,000, with a mandatory sentence of 48 hours to one year in jail or 10 days to one year of community work. The second conviction also results in a two-year license suspension, reduced to one year if the offender completes a treatment program certified by the Mississippi Department of Mental Health.

*A third conviction within five years results in a fine of \$800-\$1,000, a mandatory jail sentence of 30 days to one year and a license suspension of five years (three years if a treatment program is completed).

*Punishment for a fourth conviction within five years is a fine of \$2,000-\$5,000, 90 days to five years in the state penitentiary and a five-year license suspension (three years if a treatment program is completed).

Also, there are stiff penalties for related offenses. Anyone convicted of driving while his or her license is suspended due to a DUI conviction is fined \$200-\$500, receives a sentence of 48 hours to six months in jail and six months is added to the original license suspension.

Ear Drops for Some **Types of Earaches**

Earache is one of the most painful conditions experienced by small children. The most common cause for earaches is infection. And middle ear infections (otitis media) are very common in children. The treatment of this infection usually requires the care of a physician and the use of prescription antibotic medicines given by mouth and/or injection.

Infections in the external part of the ear (otitis externa) are sometimes referred to as "swimmer's ear." The ear canal may itch and become inflammed. In many cases a yellow fluid drains from the external canal at night and is visible on one's pillow the next morning.

Ear drops may be effective in relieving the itching and pain associated with external ear infections. Aluminum acetate solution, for example, may help decrease swelling within the ear and eliminate crusting of the ear canal.

Some authorities recommend these ear drop precautions: wash both hands before using ear drops. Hold the top of the ear up and back so as to help straighten the ear canal. Do not insert the medicine dropper into the ear or touch the dropper to the skin or other surfaces. If the drops cause burning or itching for more than a few minutes after use, contact your physician.


Tishomingo State Park Easter Egg Hunt





NASA Releases ASRM Environmental Fact Sheet

Officials at NASA's John C. Stennis Space Center (SSC) maintain that tests firings of the planned Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) will not harm the environment or cause health problems in surrounding communities. An information fact sheet addressing issues raised by some area residents has been developed by NASA in response to these concerns.

The fact sheet points out that NASA is convinced, based on the best scientific and technical advice and evidence available, that this test program can be conducted at SSC without any significant detrimental effects on the local environment.

The complete text of the fact sheet follows:

THE ADVANCED SOLID ROCKET MOTOR PROGRAM AT STENNIS SPACE CENTER

PURPOSE:

The Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) program is essential to the continued launch of the Space Shuttle into the year 2000 and beyond. Use of the redesigned motors in the shuttle program in the mid-1990s will greatly improve flight safety, reliability, and performance. LOCATION:

Stennis Space Center in Hancock County, MS, has been selected as the new site for testing of the rocket motors. The test facility and associated easement area cover over 139,000 acres which provide adequate protection from the noise and effects of testing on the outlying communities. The ASRM program further cements Stennis' role as the nation's premiere test facility for large propulsion systems development testing and establishes SSC as the test center for all testing and flight certification of the Shuttle's propulsion system. DURATION:

Proposed testing of the motors is scheduled for late 1992. Eight motor tests are scheduled for the first two years, followed by two tests per year thereafter. Each test will last about two minutes.

RESPONSIBILITY:

The tools and technology are available to properly manage the program for compliance with all regulations. Human health and the environment will be protected and maintained. NASA is committed to protecting the people of this area, the natural beauty and ecology of the area, and the environment in which we live and work. NASA is morally and legally responsible for actions related to the testing. EXPERIENCE:

NASA has a considerable data

from offshore onto land.

In all these years, NASA has seen no negative environmental impact of the critical Florida ecological system or wildlife habitat, a habitat which includes the manatee, bald eagle, and approximately fifty other threatened and endangered species.

Likewise, NASA has accomplished twenty-two firings of the Space Shuttle solid rocket motors at a site in Utah. The test site is just four miles from farm lands where crops are grown and cattle are grazed. NASA has extensively monitored many tests with ground instrumentations and aircraft measurements. The combustion by-products ride the thermal plume up to a 20,000 foot altitude, then become aerosol and dissipate over a very large area, thereby minimizing any threat to human health and the environment. This experience, coupled with advanced field-certified computer modeling efforts, provides NASA with the confidence to test at Stennis Space Cen-

TEST AREA:

The test area will be located 6.5 miles from the nearest community. TEST CONDITIONS:

Before construction of the test stand can occur, air and wetlands permits must be issued to NASA. Once permitted, the single most important environmental criteria for testing will be weather conditons. NASA will use up-to-the minute weather information before, during, and after the test to ensure that proper atmospheric conditions are present. Both off-site and on-site weather information will be used. Testing will not occur if rain is predicted within a minimum of two hours of the firing. Wind conditions and atmospheric stability must also meet guidelines to be established by the Mississippi Bureau of Pollution Control and the U.S. Environmental Protection AgenTEST EFFECTS:

The testing of a single motor will produce a variety of by-products common to the environment including aluminum oxide, carbon dioxide, and water vapor. Hydrogen chloride will also be produced. Tests will be performed only under proper weather conditions so that adequate mixing with the surrounding air can occur.

Aluminum Oxide:

The testing of the motor will produce aluminum oxide, not aluminum.

Health Effects: The Environmental Protection Agency is currently reviewing whether aluminum oxide should be removed from the toxie chemical list due to a lack of substantiated toxicity concerns. Although aluminum oxide is considered a nuisance dust, ground level concentrations outside of the immediate test area are projected to be well within safe exposure levels. There have been allegations that aluminum, not aluminum oxide, has been linked to Alzheimer's Disease. The Environmental Protection Agency, Food and Drug Administration, and numerous medical studies have found no conclusive evidence that aluminum, a common element in our food chain, causes Alzheimer's Disease.

Soils: Experience at other test firing locations indicates minimal deposition of aluminum oxide. Although existing soils in the Gulf Coast area are acidic in nature, they typically contain organic matter which neutralizes the effects of aluminum oxide. A detailed soil sampling network will be established to assure that no adverse soil affects occur.

Hydrogen Chloride:

Gaseous hydrogen chloride will be produced from the test firing. In order from this gas from the test to deposit acid rain that is harmful, the exhaust cloud must come into contact with rain within minutes of the test firing. A two-hour weather prediction capability is all that is required to ensure that rain does not follow a test. Two hours is well within the technology base according to leading weather experts and the experience of several federal agencies.

Health Effects: Proper weather conditions will ensure that adequate mixing occurs in the upper atmosphere to reduce concentratrations of hydrogen chloride to levels well below safe exposure limits.

Soils and Vegetation: Soils in the area are generally acidic in nature. Field experience and computer analyses indicate that concentrations of hydrogen chloride will not measurable change the acidity of existing soils. Furthermore, no vegetation loss or long-term damage will occur.

Surface Water: In the immediate area of the test stand where concentrations will be greatest, runoff control and collection systems will be constructed to contain localized fallout which will be subsequently neutralized to harmless levels. Computer analyses and experience indicate that the vast majority of air-

borne hydrogen chloride will be released into the upper atmosphere when reduced concentration will pose no harmful effects to outlying surface water and associated aquatic life.

Acoustics:

The Stennis Space Center was constructed with an adequate buffer zone to ensure proper acoustical protection relating to test firing. The ASRM test stand location was chosen to minimize noise to the surrounding communities. Testing will only be done under proper weather conditions to minimize sound effects related to testing. A noise monitoring program will also be established to verify actual levels of noise resulting from test firing. ced during the earlier Saturn stage testing done at SSC in the Apollo program. Public announcements will be made prior to all tests. Wetlands:

A portion of the SSC area where the ASRM test stand will be built is defined as a wetlands and, therefore, requires a wetlands permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. As required by law, this area will be replaced by creating wetlands in another area of SSC. In order for construction to start at the test size Corps of Engineers must age NASA's replacement wetlands and issue a permit. NASA antice no adverse effect on wetlands side this test site.


base experience in the testing and launching of solid rocket motors. Likewise, NASA also has access to the experience of the Department of Defense. Further, NASA is absolutely committed to protect and preserve the environment including air, water, soils, wildlife, and the fishing in our surrounding area. It goes without saying that NASA must and will comply with all the laws and regulations of the state and federal regulatory agencies.

Since 1964, NASA has launched 142 vehicles using solid propellants. Included in the number were 31 Space Shuttle flights since 1981 from Kennedy Space Center in Florida. A one-per-month launch rate prior to Challenger was achieved and is planned again in the coming months. During each launch, one million pounds of solid propellant, the equivalent to one test planned for Mississippi, is burned in the first 20,000 feet while only 9,000 feet downrange. In other words, each launch roughly equates to one ground test depending on wind direction and speed. Wind direction is not constraint to launch and is usually





It provides an all new capability for fully automated, real time inspection and marks a major breakthrough for the solid rocket industry by allowing propellant to be continuously mixed, qualifed and cast directly into a motor. The result is improved accuracy, product quality and reliability at a tremendous time and cost savings over conventional quality assurance methods.

The Lockheed/Aerojet Team believes that use of the system would greatly enhance quality inspection and control in the propellant manufacturing process for NASA's Space Shuttle ASRM.

The critical first step in achieving this milestone was the development and demonstration of FTIR/FA as a reliable analytical inspection tool for solid propellant. With one sampler there are no moving parts and an FTIR analysis is made every three minutes as propellant passes over independent crystals in the line. The other sampler makes us of a robotic manipulator to collect propellant samples for FTIR scanning. Direct cast is possible with either sampler since propellant properties are constantly monitored, tested and controlled in a steadystate 'real time' environment, as opposed to end-of-the-mix testing in batch mix operations.

Both samplers were demonstrated during a full scale development program that concluded in October. Inert and live propellant tests, simulating conditions of a UK-400 continuous mix unit like that being proposed for the ASRM were 100 percent successful. Today, this new technology offering maximum process control and optimum propellant quality stands ready for implementation.

Yellow Creek Site Information

The Yellow Creek site is located on the Yellow Creek Embayment of Pickwick Reservior, 9 miles north of luka, Mississippi, and 35 miles west of the Quad-Cities area

The Yellow Creek reservation includes a total of 1.396.1 acres of fee simple land consisting of reclassified reservoir tracts including Goat Island and private ownership and State and county road tracts and railroad rights of way that were acquired for the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant. The main property includes 1138 acres.

Site activities on the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant began on February 13, 1978 (construction permit issued on November 29, 1978, and was cancelled on August 29, 1984, after an investment of \$1.2 billion. 



This automated testing capability eliminates the potential for human error when analyzing propellant samples, and presents an exact 'finger print' of propellant compositions.

FTIR/FA can determine complete propellant ballistic, physical and mechanical property data within three to four minutes, substantially reducing the labor-intensive and time consuming efforts associated with obtaining the same information through conventional laboratory methods which require about three weeks.

These significant benefits were demonstrated at Aerojet this past summer with the successful implementation of FTIR/FA in standard vertical batch mixing operations.

More than 25,000 contracts have been completed in the past 83 years, for the pulp and paper, metals, chemical, automotive, fcod and beverage, electronics, power, refuseto-energy, manufacturing, aerospace, plastics and polymers industries. RUST has also been a leader in projects for federal and local government agencies in energy, water and wastewater services. Rust family ownership continued until 1967, when RUST became a division of Litton Industries. In 1972, the company was acquired by Wheelabrator-Frye Inc., a large firm speializing in air pollution control systems.

Major milestones in the company's history are outlined as follows:

1936 - The Allegheny Industrial Electrical Company (AIE) was formed as a wholly-owned subsidiary of RUST. AIE provides electrical construction services for industrial projects, principally for RUST companies, but also for other engineers and constructors.

1941-1956 - During World War II and the ten-year postwar era, RUST built several large defense facilities, including AEC plants at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, where the peak period had over 13,500 employees on the project; a \$23 million TNT plant at Paducah, Kentucky, which received a government award for excellence; and a vanadium plant in the mountains of South America.

1969 - RUST acquired the North American licensing rights to the Von Roll technology, which was being used in refuse-to-energy plants in over 50 major cities in Europe and Asia.

1972 · The acquisition of RUST by Wheelabrator Frye highlighted RUST's increased work in pollution control, cogeneration and refuse-toenergy plants.

1973 - A regional office was opened in Portland, Oregon, and staffed to serve clients in the Northwest.

1981 - Acquisition of Pullman, Inc., by RUST's parent company, Wheelabrator-Frye, resulted in consolidation of RUST's Northeast Regional Operations with the Swindell operations in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The new company became Swindell Rust. The consolidation combined RUST's extensive experience in the pulp and paper, chemical process, power generation, and environmental fields with Swindell's 75 years experience in all phases of metals, civil work, and ceramics.

1981 - The Rust Engineering Company became a major operating division of Kellogg Rust Inc. of Houston, Texas. Kellogg Rust was owned by Wheelabrator-Frye.

1982 • RUST International Corporation was formed as a consolidation of all operating divisions formerly associated with The Rust Engineering Company. Under the new organization, The RUST Engineering Company became a wholly-owned subsidiary of RUST, providing construction and construction management services only.

1983 - Kellogg Rust became one of The Signal Companies following the merger of Wheelabrator-Frye and The Signal Companies, Inc.

1985 · The Signal Companies and Allied Corporation merged into Allied-Signal, Inc.

1986 - Kellogg Rust was dissolved. The construction activities and organization were divided between the engineering companies. The Henley Group, Inc. was formed in a spin-off of Allied Signal to its shareholders. The new public company was one of the most successfuly equity offerings of the year. Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. was set up as a wholly owned subsidiary of Henley to develop facilities for and provide services to the refuse-toenergy, environmental and general

industrial markets.

1987 - Six million shares, or approximately 17.4% of Wheelabrator Technologies Inc. common stock was offered for public trading.

1988 - RUST acquired Envirotech Operating Services (EOS) which became the focus for RUST's capabilities in municipal water and wastewater treatment.





The team of Lockheed and Aerojet have met these challenges with the development of an advanced propellant manufacturing technology-a new generation continuous mix process. It lies at the heart of the proposal to NASA for the Space Shuttle Advanced Solid Rocket Motor, ASRM.

This fully automated process allows for propellant to be produced and cast in one smooth, efficient and on-going operation, rather than producing it in multiple batches, the method currently used for all solid propellant production.

The continuous mixer, a model UK-400, offers a 20,000 pound per hour production capacity. A horizontal interrupted screw serves as the only 'blade' used by the unit. Oxidizers, pre-mixed fuels and curing agents are precisely metered by computer, automatically fed and continuously blended as they travel the length of the mixer emerging as cast ready propellant to a surge tank. Through an automated pumping system, propellant can then be cast directly into the motor.

On-line analysis is a key element of continuous mix. A sophisticated Fourier Transform Infrared/Factor Analysis (FTIR/FA) system provides real time inspection and closed-llop process control to assure optimum propellant quality at any stage of the production process.

The advantages of continuous mix over conventional batch mix are distinct, and the improvements dramatic: They have been proven by Aerojet, the only contractor in the industry to have produced with both processes-over 17 million pounds of propellant using continuous mix, and over 160 million pounds using batch mix. Experience has shown that when it comes to the production of large solid motors, like the ASRM, con-

demonstrated production of an ASRM propellant simulant in a commercial UK-400 unit like the one proposed for the ASRM Yellow Creek, Mississippi facility.

The process greatly enhances safety. By spreading a small quantity over a larger surface, the amount of propellant exposed to mechanical action with continuous mix is drastically reduced. Less than 1,000 pounds is exposed to the mix screw for only three minutes at a time, compred to as much as 28,000 pounds churned for three to four hours by batch mix blades. Automated procedures throughout the closed process eliminate human contact with exposed propellant.

Propellant quality is improved because it is controlled in a continuous steady state process that allows constant monitoring as opposed to the batch-to-batch variations that result from vertical mixing. Motor reliability and reproducibility is improved through in-process quality testing and through the use of knowledge-based process controls.

cast Transportation and operations for the two processes are markedly different. It takes 45 batches from an 1,800 gallon batch mixer to cast every ASRM followed by 45 cleanups. Fuels and oxidizer for each batch are transported in separate vehicles from preparation areas to the mix area. In continuous mix however, transportation is accomplished by pipelines, each engaged in a smooth continuous flow of materials to the mixer.

Batch mix and cast requires that up to 45 bowls be transported from the mix area to the cast building connected to the motor segment, cast, disconnected, moved aside, and replaced by the next bowl in line. In all, up to 90 connect/disconnect functions are performed on each motor segment. Continuous mix in comparison requires no connections of the propellant line to the motor segment while propellant is present.

Lower cost is a major advantage of continuous mix. The process can achieve a production rate of up to







Trudeau, as Lockheed's ASRM Vice President and Program Manager, heads the prime contractor effort, charged with overall project responsibility, as well as systems engineering and integration. Levinsky, Aerojet's ASRM Vice President and Program Manager has responsibility for the design, development and production of the advanced motor, including the direction and implementation of a new production facility.

Together, the two bring over 50 years of successful program management in the field of aerospace and defense to their key positions.

HOWARD TRUDEAU

Trudeau began his career with Lockheed in 1967 as Project Leader, Advanced Payload Systems, in the Missile Systems Division. In 1971, he was promoted to Manager, Reentry Systems Engineering, where he led the development of the Trident I (C4) Reentry System.

From 1975 to 1980, he was the Assistant Program Manager Technical, for Lockheed's Advanced Fleet Ballistic Missile Programs organization, involved in concept definition studies of the Trident II. He later returned to the Engineering organization as Manger, Reentry Systems Division and subsequently, was named Assistant Chief Engineer. In 1984, Trudeau was appointed Chief Engineer-Engineering and Technology, at Lockheed's Missile Systems Division, responsible for the design and development of the Trident II (D5) Missile and for engineering support to the Polaris, Poseidon, Trident I Program and several advanced systems.

CHUCK LEVINSKY

Levinsky has held his current position as Aerojet's ASRM Vice President and Program Manager since the beginning of the earlier ASRM Phase B study program in 1987. Prior to that he served as the Vice President for Aerojet's Space **Booster Program office.**

In 1974, Levinsky was named Director of MX Advanced Development, a

multi-million dollar technology program which served as the foundation of the Peacekeeper Program. Upon award of the Peacekeeper Stage II contract to Aerojet in 1979, Levinsky was named Director of Engineering, charged with the major task of Stage II design and development. With the start of Stage I production, he moved on to become Director of Manufacturing, where he managed production operations for all Aerojet strategic solid rocket motor programs, specifically the processing and assembly of USAF Peacekeeper Stage II motors.

He came to Aerojet in 1958 as a Senior Engineer in Research where his work was instrumental in the design and development of the Moveable Pintle nozzle.

Shortly, thereafter, his pioneering effort on the controllable solid rocket motor for the Advanced Interceptor Program was recognized as a dramatic accomplishment in congressional testimony by the Advanced Ballistic Missile Agency.

He was later named Manager of Component Design for Aerojet's Advanced Technology Division, and in 1970 became the Director of that division. From 1971 to 1973, he served as the Director of Tactical Propulsion Systems, where he headed development and production efforts for such programs as Harpoon, Improved HAWK, Sparrow, Shrike and Phoenix.



Merrill, an luka, Mississippi native, was a pioneer flier who piloted and the first commercial flight across the Atlantic in the 1930's.

Merrill became Eastern Airlines' leading pilot and logged 8 million air miles in 44,111 flying hours, more than any pilot before him or since. "He represented the passing of an era that we will never see again in airline industry," said Eastern spokesman Jim Ashlock. "His accomplishments in his day were more dramatic than those of the astronauts." "What people remember him for is that he didn't smoke, he didn't drink and he didn't cuss. The simple fact is that he was just an awfully nice guy."

Merrill collected numerous honors, including the Harmon Trophy, bestowed for flying Atlantic flight in

The late Henry Tindall "Dick" 1937. The flight carried no passengers; instead, Merrill carried across the Atlantic the first photographs of the coronation of King George VI. In 1966, Merrill helped pilot a corporate jet around the world with entertainer Arthur Godfrey, setting 21 world speed records. He was also awarded the International Federation of Aeronautics School Gold Medal for having more flying time than any other pilot.

Born in 1894 in the Merrill-Nelson House in luka, Merrill took Navy flight training during World War I, and then began flying mail in 1928 for Pitcairn Air Lines, the predecessor of Eastern. Merrill and his wife, former actress

Toby Wing, maintained a Miami Beach home until shortly before his death October 31, 1982, as well as a home in Lake Elsinore, Calif., where he died.

Team Communications Network Links Massive Proposal Effort

As the engineers, chemists and program managers geared up for the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) Proposal effort, systems integrators from Lockheed and Aerojet's Information Systems (IS) group worked together to launch an intensive effort of their own: to create a unique computer network that would link the two teams for the ASRM Proposal, and provide a resource for future Aerojet projects.





Key design changes in the Space Shuttle's solid rocket motors, made following the Challenger accident in 1986, have long since been completed and certified flightworthy by extensive testing. The redesigned rockets have successfully boosted the Shuttle into orbit eight times since September 1988.

So why is NASA conducting ground firings of Shuttle solid rocket motors of the pre-Challenger design? Because, static firings in the Technical Evaluation Motor series are yielding a variety of benefits for the agency's solid rocket motor program, managed by the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, AL.

The primary reason for conducting the firings is to reclaim millions of dollars worth of solid rocket motor casings and associated hardware for future reuse. The casings are specially forged, 12-foot-in-diameter cylindrical metal segments in which propellant is poured and cast, creating the four massive elements from which each 126-foot-long motor is assembled.

Casings are refurbished and reused as many as 20 times. In normal operations, the expended motors are recovered from the ocean following the Shuttle's ascent, then disassembled and inspected, after which the casings and other components are recycled.

At the time of the Challenger accident, 11 solid rocket motors had been produced but not used. With minor rework, the reusable components of these motors are interchangeable with those on the currentdesign motor. But, since there is no practical, safe way to scrape or wash the highly flammable propellant out of the segments, the motors have to be fired to reclaim the hardware.

"The Shuttle program has accelerated to a launch rate near that which was under way at the time of the Challenger accident," said Royce Mitchell, manager of the Redesigned Solid Rocket Motor project at the Marshall Center. "The use of these reclaimed motor segments is vital to supporting our flight manifest and

represents several million dollars in cost savings to the Shuttle program," Mitchell said.

Three of the Technical Evaluation Motor firings -- those scheduled for the fall of 1990 through the spring of 1991 -- will serve another purpose equally vital to maintaining the Shuttle's future flight schedule. NASA is currently in the process of qualifying a new supplier for a type of rayon yard used in nozzle components of the solid rocket motor. The quality and characteristics of the rayon can be only partially assessed with laboratory tests. To fully certify that the material meets specifications for flight, it must be used to fabricate actual nozzle components, which then must be subjected to full-duration firings. The technical motor evaluation motors provide a low-cost opportunity to do this, since the pre-Challenger motors contain the same 1.1 million pounds of propellant as in the current design, producing the same environments and demands on the nozzle as a current flight motor.

"For instance, the effects of aging and storage are important to understand. The last of these motors will be several years old when fired, so the date will be very valuable for technical assessment," Mitchell explained.

The test series is being conducted by Thiokol Corp., NASA's prime contractor for the solid rocket motor program, at the company's northern Utah test facility. The firings began in November 1988, with four motors fired thus far. Tests are scheduled to continue through late 1991.

The United States In The Space Race

The idea of exploration of outer space has long fascinated mankind. During the years after World War I there were some early efforts to develop rockets that might penetrate into space. This work during the 1920's and 1930's achieved some success, and many predictions were made of scientific advances to be made in the years to come. But to most Americans space travel was only a fanciful idea in a science fiction book. Nevertheless, some scientists continued work on rocketpropulsion problems, with the idea of some day penetrating space.

Rocketry was advanced during World War II, chiefly in the field of weapons. The Germans were most successful in developing long-range rockets, which they used to bomb England from Europe. After the war several nations continued to experiment with rockets to be used for both weapon-launching and the exploration of space.

Rocket research in the United States took a back seat to atomic research in the period after World War II. Even so, the United States made sufficient progress to begin



NASA believes that it will provide safe, reliable service as an interim design, but that it is not the long-term solution. The post-Challenger redesign process was limited by requirements that the Shuttle be returned to flight as quickly as possible, consitent with safety, and that the redesign make maximum use of the existing inventory of motor hardware. Therefore, the redesigned motor is still based essentially on 1970s technology. The ASRM will take advantage of the most modern systems for automation, process control, and plant safety. In short, it will be built upon a far more mature technology base.

Advantages in Safety, Performance Several design features of the ASRM will improve the reliability and safety of the Space Shuttle:

• Field joints are designed to close rather than open when the motor is pressurized at ignition, eliminating the most likely cause of joint leakage.

• The number of factory joints is reduced through use of weldable case materials, eliminating four criticality 1 failure points.

• The ballistic design will make it unnecessary to throttle the Shuttle main engines during the period of ascent where maximum dynamic pressure is encountered. This will eliminate or reduce approximately 150-160 criticality 1 or 1R failure modes involving the main engines and auxiliary power units.

• The nozzle redesign reduces the number of parts and the number of joints, eliminating about 16 criticality 1 and 1R failure modes.

 Asbestos-bearing materials will be eliminated from the motor.

The submarine-launched Fleet Ballistic Missile was created for the U.S. Navy to serve as a known and credible deterrent to nuclear aggression. It took Lockheed less than five years to produce the first FBM -- Polaris A-1 -- from a concept in early 1956 to deployment in November 1960. In late March 1990, the sixth in the Lockheed-built family of FBMs went to on deterrent patrol aboard USS Tennessee (SSBN 734).

A major strength is Lockheed's ability to serve as systems engineer and systems integrator, and two NASA programs are prime evidence of this. Both will be "launched" this month (April 1990) - one, launched literally on April 12, is the Hubble Space Telescope which will allow humans to see backward in time 14 billion years to the edge of our galaxy. The other, launched figuratively, will be right here in Tishomingo County -- at the groundbreaking for NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant.

Lockheed also is a member of three of the four work-package teams that



zero gravity for unique research fand development projects that will benefit humans on earth. The station also will serve as a springboard for exploration to other planets. Lockheed was involved in experimental Strategic Defense Initiative projects since 1978 - six years before President Ronald Reagan articulated the concept. On June 10, 1984, a Lockheed-built, nonnuclear Army interceptor called HOE (for Homing Overlay Experiment) was

launched from Kwajalein Atoll in mid-Pacific and, 100 miles above earth, sought out and sped into the path of a missile warhead launched from California 4,200 nautical miles away. The collision demolished both warhead and interceptor without a nuclear explosion.

Today, LMSC is building a followon experimental interceptor to HOE called ERIS, for Exoatmospheric Reentry-vehicle Interceptor Sunsystem. Another SDI program is the Boost Surveillance and Tracking System (BSTS) which, high in space, would detect missile launches and would alert defenses. There are several other SDI programs being researched under Lockheed's aegis. LMSC has several classified programs, also.

The company has about 22,800 employees at its main plant in Sunnyvale and another 5,000 nationwide at various bases and sites.

Early Space Flights

The first United States satellite, weighing eighteen pounds, was sent into orbit in January, 1958. It was a good start even though it did not match the Russian achievement in launching the one-thousand-pound Sutnik II. During the next five years both nations made great advances in the field of rocket propulsion and space travel. During these years the Russians

succeeded in photographing the side of the moon that we on earth never see. Both Russia and the United States sent satellites past the moon into orbit around the sun. American scientists developed special satellite systems for weather research and communication, including direct television broadcasts between Europe and the United States. In April, 1961, the Russians scored

another dramatic "first" by launching a manned spacecraft. Yuri Gagarin rode a spaceship into orbit around the earth once, and returned safely. In August, 1961, another Russian, Gherman Titov, orbited the earth seventeen times before returning





pass through the atmosphere. The fact that stars seem to twinkle illustrates the turbulence created by colliding masses of hot and cold air. Looking at stars from the Earth is a lot like looking at birds flying overhead from the bottom of a swimming pool.

From its vantage point above the distorting atmosphere, the Hubble Space Telescope will be able to produce a range and quality of images impossible for its groundbased counterparts.

Deployment And Verification

The Hubble Space Telescope will be carried into space in the cargo bay of the Space Shuttle Discovery. When the assigned 370-mile orbit is reached, Shuttle astronauts will supply full electrical power from the orbiter to the Hubble telescope. Most of its systems will undergo a short checkout to make sure they are operating properly.

The day after launch, the telescope's own internal power will be switched on, and the power supplied from the orbiter will be turned off. Then, the crew will use the Shuttle's remote manipulator arm to lift

On the launch pad, Colubia sat astride a huge external fuel tank containing 730 metric tons of liquid hydrogen and oxygen. On each side of the fuel tank were two booster rockets. At life-off, Columbia's three internal, liquid-fuel engines ignited first. Two seconds later the booster rockets kicked in, and the shuttle system lifted off.

About two minutes following the launch, at an altitude of about 6,100 meters, or 20,000 feet, both boosters were detached and parachuted into the Atlantic Ocean for reuse on other orbiters. Eight minutes after launch, the drained fuel tank was released to disintegrate in the atmosphere or plunge into the Indian Ocean. Colum

By combining the use of an ultrasonic scanner with computerized data processing, color TV monitors and artificial intelligence, it's now possible to "train" a computer to recognize not only the presence of an anomaly, but also identify its type-case-to-insulation unbonds, insulation-to-propellant unbonds, voids and cracks-and, in the near future, to show propellant density and the quality of the bond it-

Using Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) case materials, researchers at Aerojet have "trained" the computer on pattern recognition of 'built-in'' flaws. The research program is a promising technique to not only detect the location and size of defects, but also to predict the type of defect present in the material. Ultrasonics is several steps ahead of X-ray when it comes to fast,

economical, and high quality property tests. Artificial intelligence assisted acoustic ultrasonic emission signal analysis gives the speed of real-time inspection, without the excessive cost of X-ray film. But the greatest savings come with the ability to single out a bad bond before the

propellant is cast. Two test orientations are used to check each other. The Pitch-Catch method (both transducers outside the case) measures ultrasonic energy return. An unbond between the case and insulation would return more energy than a good bond. The Through Transmission method (one tranducer on the outside and one on the inside) measures signal attenuation. Slight attenuation would indicate flawless material. More attenuation would indicate an unbond, for example, an insulation-topropellant unbond. With either "time-of-flight" method. а measurement may be used to determine how far into the material a flaw

is located.

Development under NASA's ASRM contract would encompass two areas: Ultrasonic Inspection for the motors and Acoustic Emission for the cases

The ASRM ultrasonic scanner proposed by the being Lockheed/Aerojet Team will be robotically controlled, registering 38 thousand data points at three test

points during manufacturing. The first point will be inspection of individual case sections prior to case to ensure no unbonds are present in the case-to-insulation bond. Next, the individual cast sections will be tested to ensure good insulation-topropellant bond. Then the entire assembly will be inspected again just prior to vertical assembly.


