Berryman Sentenced To Life - Plead Guilty

Brian Scott Berryman was sentenced to life in prison by Circuit Court Judge Frank Russell after pleading guilty Monday to capital murder, armed robbery, and burglary of an occupied dwelling at night while armed.

Berryman was the first of three suspects to be tried in Tishomingo County circuit court in connection with the murder of William Milton Solomon.

Solomon, 90, was beaten, robbed, and shot to death in his Tishomingo County home in the Rutledge-Salem Community in January 1989.

Berryman, 26, and two additional suspects, Darryl Bannister of Iuka and David Armendariz of Burnsville, were taken into custody and charged with capital murder. The other suspects are awaiting trial in connection with the incident.

While jury selection was going on Monday, Berryman decided to change his plea to guilty.

Berryman was sentenced to life in prison for the capital murder charge, being eligible for parole after serving 10 years of the sentence.

He was given 25 years on the charge of burglary of an occupied

dwelling at night while armed with a deadly weapon. He will be eligible for parole after 6 1/4 years of that term.

On the armed robbery charge, Berryman received a 42-year sentence from the judge.

The terms were given to run consecutively. Berryman would have to serve a total of at least 26 3/4 years before becoming eligible for parole, the court ruled.

Before beginning any of the prison terms, Berryman must first complete an eight-year term he is currently serving from Lee County.

Shooting Ruled Accident

An Iuka teenager was killed Friday night in what authorities have tentatively ruled an accidental shooting.

James Kenneth "Kenny" Gray, 17, of Route 2, Iuka was pronounced dead at Magnolia Hospital, according to Tishomingo County Medical Examiner/Investigator Dale White. Gray died from a single gunshot wound to the head. The incident occurred northeast of Burnsville near the Alcorn - Tishomingo County line and was reported at approximately 8 p.m., White said.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs said the details of the incident were being withheld pending further investigation by the sheriff's department.

Services for Gray were held at 1 p.m. Monday at Grace Bible Church with Danny Lovelace and Gary Dawson officiating. Burial was in the Shady Grove Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James A. Gray of Iuka; two sisters, Linda Lovelace of Iuka and Lisa Lovelace of Tishomingo; four brothers, Joey Gray of Iuka, Eugene Gray of Burnsville, Curtis Lovelace and John Lovelace both of Iuka; one grandparent, James A. Duffy of Iuka.

Mitchell Named To Head New Shuttle Rocket Motor Project

Royce E. Mitchell, manager of the Space Shuttle Redesign Solid Rocket Motor Project at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, AL, has been appointed manager of NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) Project Office, also at the Marshall Center.

The Advanced Solid Rocket Motor is designed to replace the motor currently used in the Shuttle's twin boosters. It is one of NASA's top-priority programs, and is needed to enhance the safety and reliability of the Shuttle over the many years in the future during which it will remain a principal U.S. launch vehicle.

Mitchell replaces Lowell K. Zoller, who has been named assistant to the director of the Institutional and Program Support Directorate at Marshall. Zoller has led the ASRM activities since its inception. His responsibilities included manager of the Phase B engineering definition study contracts, chairman of the source evaluation board (SEB) for contractor selection and most recently as project manager of the ASRM program. Zoller leaves the ASRM program as it enters into the

development phase. Zoller's other key positions at Marshall include manager of the Systems Management Office and deputy manager, External Tank Project Office, both in the Shuttle Projects Office; manager, Special Projects Office; advisor to the European Space Agency in support of the Spacelab Program; and several key supervisory positions in the Program Development and Science and Engineering Directorates.

In his new position, Zoller's first assignment will be to lead a task team to study the present Center program/project planning and acquisition systems and to recommend changes to improve any facet of the process.

The changes, which are effective immediately, were announced by Marshall Center Director Jack Lee. In making the announcement, Lee noted that the appointments are being made to coincide with a transition point in the ASRM program. The Marshall Center is currently making final preparation to award a multi-year contract to Lockheed Missile Systems Division for the design,

development, test, and evaluation of the new rocket motor. In addition, construction of new facilities for ASRM production is now beginning, following groundbreaking which was held on Tuesday, April 10, at the Yellow Creek site in northeastern Mississippi.

Mitchell's experience in the redesign and certification of the solid rocket motor following the Challenger accident makes him highly qualified to lead the ASRM thru development and production. Prior to his assignment as manager of the Space Shuttle Redesign Solid Rocket Motor Project, he served as Chief of the Solid Rocket Motor Office in the Solid Rocket Booster Projects Office.

Mitchell's other key assignments have included serving as manager of the Systems Engineering Office, Hubble Space Telescope Project Office, and in the Chief Engineers Office, Central Systems Engineering Office as well as in the Astrionics Laboratory of the Science and Engineering Directorate.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

AGING AMERICANS

Willard Scott on the "Today Show" daily reports the birthday of viewers who are 100 years or older. If he were to wish a happy birthday to every U.C. citizen more than 100 years of age, it might take up the whole show. Each day, 71 people 100 years or more celebrate a birthday. This adds up to a total of 26,000.

Most centenarians are female. Most live in institutional settings and almost 90 percent of all centenarians have annual incomes less than \$5,000. Some experts predict there will be one million centenarians by the year 2080.

When we look at another group of elderly, 85 to 99 years old, we get a different picture. These Americans are more often cared for by family members than are centenarians, and they are not as poor.

However, both groups reflect the increased longevity of our populations. Most older Americans will require some form of care in their later years.

Most of this care is being provided by daughters and daughters-in-law with careers and children or grandchildren of their own. The numbers of the "sandwich generation" (older children caring for their children and grandchildren as well as their aging parents) are increasing rapidly.

According to the American Council of Life Insurance, meeting the demands of two generations simultaneously is bound to cause stress. Caregivers are torn between two worlds: wanting to help their aging parents maintain their health and independence in their home and wanting to be with their children as they grow up.

Resentment may be felt by all parties: from the older parents who are frightened by their dependency; from the caregivers' children who want more time with their parents and from caregivers who are ignoring personal needs to meet those of parents and children.

The pressures of keeping a job add even more stress to an already difficult situation. The National Long-

term Care Survey conducted in 1982 by the Department of Health and Human Services revealed that 39.1 percent of the family caregivers, 30 percent had to rearrange their work schedules and 19 percent took time off without pay to care for an aging parent.

Psychologists recommend the first best step in handling these dual stresses is to talk about them.

If you are the older child responsible for both parent and children tell them that you love them and share with them your feelings of frustration, fear and hope. This will help break down communication barriers that fuel family tensions.

YOU MIGHT ALSO TRY THESE STEPS:

Schedule separate time for your parents and your children so each knows which time is theirs. For out-of-town parents, you might spend one week out of every month with them, depending on the seriousness of their illness.

Schedule a telephone hour at work, perhaps during lunch, when your parents, children and physicians may call you.

Arrange with your employer to make up time away from the office. Talk frankly with your supervisor, employee assistance counselor and co-workers about your caregiver responsibilities so they understand the basis of possible schedule conflicts or your reluctance to take on additional job responsibilities. Try to arrange a more flexible schedule if your family demands feel excessive.

Meet with other caregivers and self-help groups to share your feelings and receive support.

Accept your own human limitations and enlist the aid of another family member, neighbor or community services when you need to take a break.

HOT CHICKEN SALAD CASSEROLE

2 cups chicken, cooked, deboned, chopped
1 cup celery, chopped fine
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
3 hard boiled eggs, chopped
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
1 (10 1/4 oz.) can cream of chicken soup (undiluted)
1/2 cup crushed potato chips (divided usage)
1 (2 oz.) jar of pimento
Combine chicken, celery, salt, pepper, and eggs. Moisten with mayonnaise. Add soup. Pour half of the mixture into greased 2-quart baking dish. Add a thin layer of crushed potato chips. Add remaining mixture. top with crushed chips and pimento. Bake at 350 degrees. YIELD: 6-8 servings.

Medicines With Multiple Uses

Although we may think that medicines have just one specific use, many medicines have multiple uses. Aspirin, for example, is one of our most versatile medicines. Some health experts refer to it as the "miracle drug." Common aspirin is useful as a pain reliever, fever reducer, and inflammation fighter. Aspirin may also help prevent the occurrence of heart attacks because of its ability to prevent the formation of small clots in the bloodstream.

In low doses magnesium hydroxide (Milk of magnesia) is useful as an antacid. In higher doses, magnesium hydroxide draws water into the bowel and serves as a gentle laxative.

Antihistamines such as diphenhydramine and chlorpheniramine can be used for relief of a variety of health problems. The histamine-blocking action of these medicines makes them valuable in preventing or relieving allergic reactions to pollens, dust, insect bites, poisonous plants, and bee stings. The drying-effect of antihistamines provides relief of runny nose and congestion associated with the common cold. Also, the drowsiness associated with most antihistamines makes them ideal ingredients in nonprescription sleep aid tablets and capsules.

The lab is designed to provide state-of-the-art delivery of the most effective adult education training available. The use of computers assist adults who wish to upgrade their basic skills or improve in special areas needed in their present jobs.

The targeted participants include all residents in Northeast Mississippi. These adults are instructed to one or more of several areas: basic skills in reading and math and employability skills. Low income or unemployed participants may qualify for financial assistance.

The lab has 12 computer stations each available for individual instruction that allows the participant to pace his or her own learning.

Lab is available for operation from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. four (4) days a week Monday through Thursday. Additional computer training is available for those who have little or no experience with computers or keyboards. Current enrollment is 61 with successful completers. The lab is enrolling in this training on Tuesday, May 1. Tentative plans to return to Tishomingo County sometime next year.



OCCASIONAL EYEGLASS WEAR

Though it's usually not a good idea to retreat to your eyeglasses once you've been fitted for and have adjusted to contact lenses, there are times when you may want to -- and when it makes sense. You may want to slip on your glasses first thing in the morning, before you've gotten yourself together; or late at night, after your contacts have been removed. Certainly you would be happy to have a pair of eyeglasses handy (with current prescription) should you lose a contact lens.

With soft contacts, other than the normal distortions from eyeglasses, it is very easy to interchange contacts and spectacles without any visual disturbances. Hard contacts pose a problem. After removing hard lenses, most people have difficulty seeing with glasses. This may last an hour or so. Also, your vision with glasses will vary depending on the time of day you wear them, and how long the contacts were in your eyes.




Moxley - Roberts Plan April 21st Wedding

Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

The Most Frequently Taken Vitamin

Are some vitamins more popular than others? If so, what is the vitamin that is most often taken?

According to the the National Health Interview Survey, as reported in the journal *Nutrition Reviews*, the most frequently taken single vitamin is vitamin C. Vitamin C was consumed by almost 9 out of 10 vitamin supplement users and was taken more often than any other nutrient by both men and women. This survey, which was conducted in 1986, considered the behaviors of 13,000 persons.

This survey determined that one-third of all adults in the United States took vitamin and/or mineral supplements. In all age groups, women were more likely to be supplement users as compared to men. Adults who were not overweight and whose health was good used supplements more frequently than did less healthy individuals.

Children were more likely to be supplement users than adults with 4 out of 10 using some type of supplement. It is interesting to note, however, that supplement use in children was twice as high in families earning \$40,000 or more per year as compared to families earning \$7,000 or less per year (50% versus 23%). The most common supplements used by children were multivitamins.

Services Held For Hawaiian Senator

United States Senator Spark Matsunaga of Hawaii, a long time advocate for peace and champion of Japanese-Americans seeking compensation for their internment during World War II, died Sunday, April 15, in Toronto, Canada. He was 73 years old and the father of Mrs. Scott (Diane) Segars of Iuka.

Senator Matsunaga was born on the island of Kauai, Hawaii, and attended public school there. He graduated from the University of Hawaii with a Bachelor of Education degree and was a public school teacher prior to volunteering for military service during World War II. He had his basic training at Camp Shelby in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, and then served overseas in Africa and Italy and was twice wounded in battle. He received the bronze star with a V for valor and other Army decorations. After leaving the military service he graduated from Harvard Law School. Senator Matsunaga was elected to the United States House of Representatives for seven consecutive terms from 1962-1976 and was elected to the United States Senate in 1976, and was then re-elected.

Matsunaga, who announced in January that he was suffering from prostate cancer that had spread to the bone, died at Toronto General Hospital while undergoing treatment.

The senator is survived by his wife, Helen, five children, and 3 grandchildren.

Hawaiian Governor John Waihee asked that the body lie in state Wednesday in the state Capital with burial Thursday or Friday at Punchbowl National Cemetery in Honolulu.

The family asks that memorials be sent to the Pacific Peace Foundation.

Death Penalty A Deterrent

The prison population is increasing

faster than we can build new prisons. Cities, Counties and States are on crash programs to raise taxes or to pass bond issues to fund more jails and prisons to relieve overcrowding. I often wonder if the judge or judges who decided "what's overcrowded" ever spent a time on a submarine or troop transport ship. The streets in most towns and neighborhoods are also overcrowded with criminals out on early release, parole, probation or bond awaiting trial. The State recently reported 20,000 inmates plus another 2,200 awaiting pickup in jails. This is double the number of 15 years ago expected to double again by year

2000.

The FBI recently reported violent crime up five percent over the same six months one year ago. It also reported that the prison population grew by 46,000 during the same six-month period to a total of about 150,000 plus more than one million doing time outside State and Federal prison walls. Those behind prison bars cost the taxpayers \$25,000 annually; those in jails cost \$18,000, and those serving time outside (parole, probation, etc.) cost \$3,500. Those figures are conservative and increasing rapidly year after year.

There is a simple solution to this problem of rising violent crime and prison overcrowding. The solution is to execute those 2,000 inmates on death rows, whose convictions and sentences have been reviewed and confirmed several times. I am confident that if this is done there would be a big drop in the violent crime rate and within a few years and a drop in prison population. The backlog in our court system that has become unmanageable would clear up after the initial long line of jail inmates awaiting death penalty trials go to court to plead guilty for life sentences. Then our courts could handle capital cases, and those sentenced to death could be executed. This is necessary for execution to deter crime. The current system in which two or three court-appointed attorneys represent the accused and after a long, drawn-out trial they simply keep taking the case back through the system until they find an anti-death penalty judge who will throw

out the death penalty. This system obviously does not deter crime. It has rendered the Judicial System completely ineffective.

If use of the death penalty serves as a deterrent to violent crimes such as rape, robbery and murder, we would save millions of dollars in Georgia and billions nationwide that we are spending annually on crime. And far more importantly, we would save thousands of lives.

The 2,000 on death rows on whom we are spending \$5 to \$10 million to get them off the death penalty are not the type of people that we need in our society. Whereas, the 3,000 or 5,000 people that they brutally raped, robbed and murdered were for the most good honest law-abiding citizens.

Although the anti-death penalty people in this country are far outnumbered by those like I who believe in the death penalty, they are slowly winning the race. In 1987, there were 300 criminals sentenced to die by execution; 25 were executed that year; 79 sentences were vacated. If

the majority continue to sit by quietly and pay taxes to "beat or void" the death penalty and build more prisons to comfortably house the rapidly growing prison population, then it won't be many years until, on the average, one member of every household in America will be robbed, brutally raped and then murdered so there won't be an eyewitness left to testify in court.

However, if you want to see the death penalty used as a deterrent to crime, you had better start telling someone about it. Your President indicated during his campaign that he favors the death penalty, and he has mentioned the subject recently. But it's going to take a lot more than "honorable mention" to turn the system around. In fact, there is a move on Capital Hill by Senators Joe Biden and Ted Kennedy to eliminate the death penalty by adding on more and more conditions under which it can't be used, Senate Bill 32.

Your Governor, your Congressman and some judges are up for election

or re-election this year. Let them know how you feel about this subject!

Those same experts who tell us that the prison population is going to double during the next 10 years tell us that the death penalty does not deter crime and tell us that crime can be reduced by better educating our people so that they can secure gainful employment. The cost of keeping one inmate in prison for one year (\$25,000 - \$30,000) will pay tuition, room and board and leave a little spending money for four students at the University of Georgia for one year.

So let's crank up the electric chair, eliminate the obstacles that tie the hands of law enforcement and turn a lot of criminals loose to commit more crimes.

And in a few years we can offer a free college education to every high school graduate and open up more Vo-Tech Schools in the empty prison buildings.

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


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

4-H Communicates

WATER, WATER, IS IT
REALLY EVERYWHERE?

Many of us take our water supply for granted. We just assume that when we turn on the faucet that water will come out. While it's true that water seems to be plentiful in our part of Mississippi, remember that the quality of water is as important as the quantity.

Water has played a major role in Mississippi's history. The Indian tribes found in our state settled along the streams so they could use the water for cooking, drinking and washing. The settlers also located along streams for the same reasons. Transportation was another important use of water in our state as it was being settled and it still is today.

Water is even more important in our lives today and it is everyone's job to conserve our water, both quantity and quality. Even though three-fourths of the earth's surface is covered by water, most of that is salt-water which can be used by a few specially adapted animals. The rest of us rely on sources of fresh water for our daily use. There are two sources of fresh water, ground water and surface water. Ground water is water that soaks into the earth. It is stored in layers of rock, soil, gravel and sand below the surface. Surface water is the water found in lakes, streams, rivers, and ponds.

Since water is such a precious resource, it is important for us not to waste it or pollute it. The average American uses between 60 and 100 gallons of water each day. Agriculture and factories use much more than the average person does. Some of the ways we can all save on water is to take short quick showers, keep the water turned off while you brush your teeth, and take shallow baths. There are also devices to use in the toilet so that less water is used when you flush. Watering your lawn less and using plant and grass varieties that take less water can also help us to save water.

Water pollution is also a big issue of our times. While we want clean, safe water for our household use, the uses of water determine the level of quality needed. Water that is used to irrigate cotton may need treatment before it can be used in manufacturing. Minerals and other substances found in water can be affected by vegetation, temperature, logging, construction and air pollution, just to name a few. Because so many factors affect the water quality, the quality changes over a period of time. To ensure the quality of water each person should take responsibility for the safe disposal of their waste, whether it be chemicals, plastics, papers or metals.

4-H members in Tishomingo County will be learning more in coming weeks about how the water supply affects them and how they impact on the water supply through a grant received from the John Deer Corporation.




Sen. Lott Scheduled To Speak At Fundraiser

Chief Deputy Higginbottom Is Arson Investigator

Tishomingo County now has an expert in arson investigation on its law enforcement team.

Chief Deputy Mike Higginbottom of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department was named last month an official Certified Arson Investigator by the Mississippi Department of Insurance.

Higginbottom earned the title by completing the requirements for a training course in arson investigation sponsored by the Mississippi Fire Investigators Association and state Commissioner of Insurance George Dale.

The certification makes Higginbottom qualified to serve as an expert witness in legal cases involving arson or a fire scene. In addition, he is trained in all aspects of fire investigation.

The course, held at the Mississippi State Fire Academy in Jackson, lasted over a period of two years. Students were required to attend six two-day meetings and to pass regular tests and a comprehensive examination.

Participants put in about 160 hours of training to earn the certificate, Higginbottom said. They were required to study projects such as the controlled burning of vehicles and other staged fire scenes as part of the training and were instructed in analyzing a fire's point of origin, its cause, and other critical elements, he explained.

A law enforcement representative from each Mississippi county was enrolled in the program with about half completing the course and receiving their certificates at the graduation ceremony held on March 16 in Jackson, Higginbottom said.

"I am proud of Mike for completing this program and for the work he does on our force," said Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs. "Law enforcement officers should take advantage of every available training program," he said.





ASCS Farm News

ACP SIGNUP CHANGED:

Sign-up periods for the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) have been replaced with a continuous sign-up. The program provides technical and financial assistance to help farmers solve critical soil, water and pollution problems on their land. Producers who desire cost-share assistance to correct severe conservation problems may sign up for the ACP at any time. The Tishomingo County ASC Committee may set up to approval dates to consider requests for cost-sharing.

Funding for Tishomingo County's 1989 ACP totals \$4291.00. The funds will be used to control erosion, conserve water, improve water quality and install other conservation measures.

ASCS approved 31 ACP applications in 1989 to treat critical soil and water conservation problems on 727 acres of Tishomingo County farmland.

The program is designed to encourage producers to voluntarily perform soil and water conservation measures to correct environmental

problems on their farms. ASCS identifies critical conservation problems in the county, determines priorities for cost-sharing to obtain the maximum solutions to the problems, and selects practices for the county program. ACP practices available in the county include:

stake and measure any type of acreage, or portions thereof, before crop planting time.

ASCS began accepting applications for the 1990 farm programs on January 16th. The acreage reduction requirements are 5 percent for wheat, oats and extra long staple cotton, 10 percent for corn, sorghum and barley, 12.5 percent for upland cotton and 15 percent for rice. To be eligible for price support loans, target prices and other farm program benefits, producers must comply with these and other farm program provisions.

Farmers may request pre-measurement for acreage conservation reserve land and planted acres of program crops. When the land is pre-measured, producers are required to plant within the stakes that are placed and to report their crop acres to ASCS after planting. Other ASCS producer service include measuring total cropland, fields or subdivisions to be planted and land areas for other purposes. Fees vary, based on the type of service rendered.
