State Insurance Commissioner George Dale Visits Fire Stations

The state insurance commissioner was in Tishomingo County this week to visit and evaluate the county's fire departments.

Commissioner George Dale, who

previously visited the county in Feb. 1989, said that Tishomingo County has made many improvements in its fire protection.

The state legislature passed House Bill 693 in 1988 which appropriated

state monies to be directed to volunteer fire departments.

Dale said that Tishomingo County was the first county he had returned to visit to observe progress in the departments using the funds.

Tishomingo County has increased the number of its fire departments from nine to 12 since last year, Dale said. Three additional fire stations are currently being organized. The county also has nine fire emergency vehicles in operation now.

Tishomingo County overall is rated Class 10 unprotected by the Mississippi state rating bureau, Dale explained. The North Crossroads department is the only county fire department that has been rated. The department received a Class 9 rating. Three other departments in the county are on the verge of being rated as Class 9 departments, which would cause a reduction in homeowners insurance premiums.

The city of Iuka is rated a Class 8. The Eastport/Mill Creek Volunteer Fire Dept. has qualified as a Class 10 certified department, Dale said. Homeowners within a 5-mile radius of the department will receive a 3 to 5 percent reduction in their insurance premiums with the rating.

A department must meet certain equipment and manpower standards to be eligible for certification, said Mark Nowell, state rating bureau field representative. Eastport is the fourth county fire department to be certified, he said, joining Midway, First District, and Valley Grove Fire Departments, which were recertified.

The rating bureau evaluates fire departments every four years to ensure that standards for fire protection are maintained.

Commissioner Dale added that he noticed a lot of community effort during his tour of the county. A group working on the roof of a fire department in the Carters Branch community particularly impressed him, Dale said.

"The county has a very active fire department coordinator in Jerry Bonds," Dale commented.

A state fire rating is determined using the following criteria: 39 percent for the department itself, including equipment and training of staff; 39 percent for adequate water supply to the department; 13 percent for fire prevention training and coding system for the area; and 9 percent for the communication system.

Tishomingo County has a prime opportunity to upgrade its emergency communication system through the installation of the E911 telephone service, Dale said.

"The E911 system can lower response times for emergency calls," he said.

Voters will decide whether to adopt 911 in the Nov. 6 election.

A reception was held for the commissioner at the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse Monday afternoon. Dale also attended the Iuka Lions Club meeting Monday night.



The Iuka Lion's Club met Monday, October 15, at Bet's Family Rest. Special guest speaker was Insurance Commissioner George Dale. This was Mr. Dale's second visit to the county, his purpose being to inspect our rural volunteer fire departments and see what has been done since his last inspection in February,

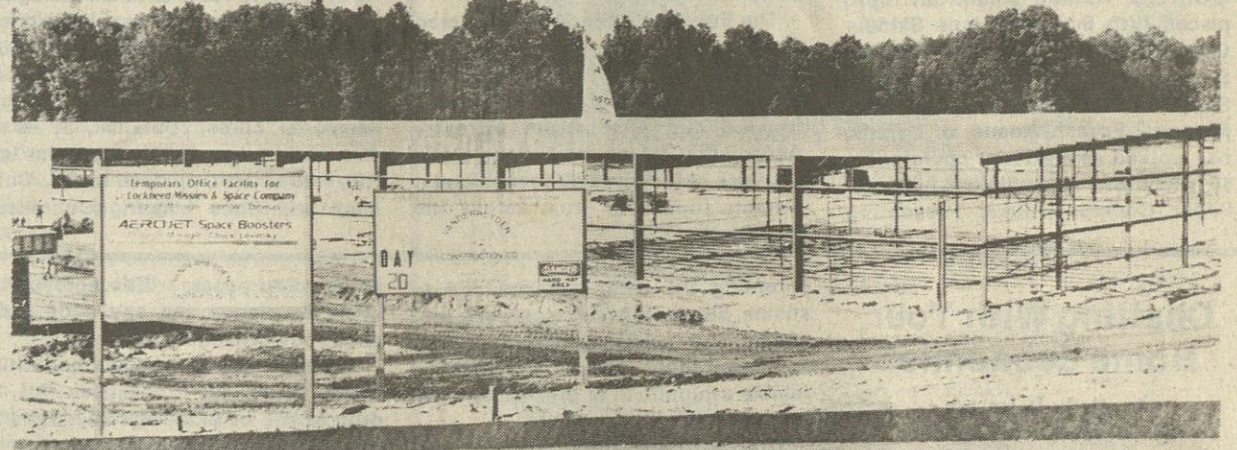
Burnsville Homecoming Court Presented

80,000 Sq. Ft. Building To House Cafeteria and Offices

Second Office Building Under Construction

Employees working in the Lockheed Aerojet offices in Iuka before long won't have to travel far to eat lunch.

A second office building under construction for Lockheed will feature a built-in cafeteria.

While designed to accommodate Lockheed and Aerojet's growing workforces, the cafeteria will also be open to the public, said Gene Owens, job site superintendent for Vanderheyden Construction Co.

The 80,000-sq.-ft. building is in its fourth week of construction next to the present facility Lockheed occupies in the Iuka Industrial Park.

Vanderheyden is constructing the new building on land purchased from the city of Iuka.

About 67,000 square feet of the building will be leased to Lockheed, Owens said. The remainder of the building will be leased as office space to businesses associated with Lockheed.

The cafeteria will cover about 5,000 square feet on the northern end of the building. Vanderheyden has not yet determined who will provide food services in the cafeteria, Owens said.

The east side of the building will be its front, and it will face the present Lockheed office. Parking lots will be paved on the building's northeast, east, and west sides, Owens said.

First American National Bank will locate an Automatic Teller Machine (ATM) near the building to provide banking services for employees

working at either building. The ATM building has already been built on the east parking lot of the new building and will offer drive-up service.

Completion date for the building is set for December 1, Owens said. Construction is proceeding at a pace faster than architect's plans are being finalized, he said.

The present office building, also built by Vanderheyden, is leased to Lockheed by the Tishomingo County Development Authority, the building's owner.

Vanderheyden decided to construct the second facility when Lockheed officials determined that additional office space would be needed for employees relocating to Iuka to work on the NASA advanced solid rocket motor project.

Ceremony Planned At New Magnet School

A ceremony marking the beginning of construction on the Iuka/North Tishomingo County Educational Center is planned for Friday, November 9, at 10 a.m. at the site of the school on U.S. 72 west of Iuka. The event will also celebrate the expansion and renovation at Belmont High School.

Teachers and students from both

city and county school districts will attend the ceremony along with school administrators and officials. Governor Ray Mabus is also scheduled to attend.

The Tishomingo County Educational Center will be a state-of-the-art facility which includes a magnet high school, university center, child care

facility, and literacy training lab for adults and children. The center's design also allows the facility to be available for night and weekend use for community events. Johnson/Bailey Architects of Tupelo designed the educational complex. The Center and Belmont High School renovation are being funded with \$3 million in local funds and \$7 million in Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority funds.

Parents and local residents are invited to attend the event.

Bonds To Finance Park and College Improvements

Improvements at J.P. Coleman State Park in Tishomingo County, Northeast Mississippi Community College and Itawamba Community College will be financed through the sale of \$69,485,000 in capital improvement bonds.

Mississippi Bond Commission members Gov. Ray Mabus, Attorney General Mike Moore and State Treasurer Marshall Bennett approved the sale this month, providing the funding that will allow work to begin on construction, renovation and repair projects throughout the state.

"I am very pleased that we will be able to make these improvements," Mabus said. "The improvements at J.P. Coleman State Park will make it a more enjoyable place for Mississippians and visitors from out of state. Improvements at the community colleges will enhance educational opportunities in northeast Mississippi."

"The Capital Improvements Program is a real step forward for our state," the governor added. "It will improve the quality of life for all Mississippians."

The program includes \$675,000 for marina slips and additional parking at J.P. Coleman and \$911,011 to upgrade facilities at the community colleges.

Other improvements resulting from the bond sale will include construction and renovations at institutions of higher learning, Department of Mental Health facilities and correctional institutions; housing renovations at youth training centers; and equipment for the Mississippi Authority for Educational Television.

The capital improvements bill was approved by the Mississippi Legislature and signed by Mabus this year. The bonds will be repaid over a 20 year period, with the final payment due April 1, 2010.

Community Blood Drive In Burnsville

Burnsville residents have the opportunity to celebrate life by donating at the community blood drive from 9:30 to 1:30 Saturday, October 20, at the Burnsville Masonic Lodge.

Every unit of donated blood is sent to the United Blood Services laboratory in Tupelo for testing and processing. Laboratory technicians separate the whole blood into components (including red blood cells, plasma, platelets and cryoprecipitate), so that one donation helps several patients.

Red blood cells are used for surgery patients. Plasma is needed to treat trauma and burn patients. Platelets are required for cancer and leukemia patients undergoing chemotherapy. Cryoprecipitate is a special blood clotting factor used by those with hemophilia.

While components are transfused for the specific medical needs, a patient with a serious injury may require several different components.

The Burnsville blood drive has a goal of 50 donations. Anyone who wishes to donate may drop by the blood drive or call 1-800-365-7640 for an appointment.

The Burnsville Masonic Temple is sponsoring the Oct. 20 blood drive. Blood donated here is used to meet the needs of patients in Tishomingo Hospital and 21 other hospitals throughout the area.

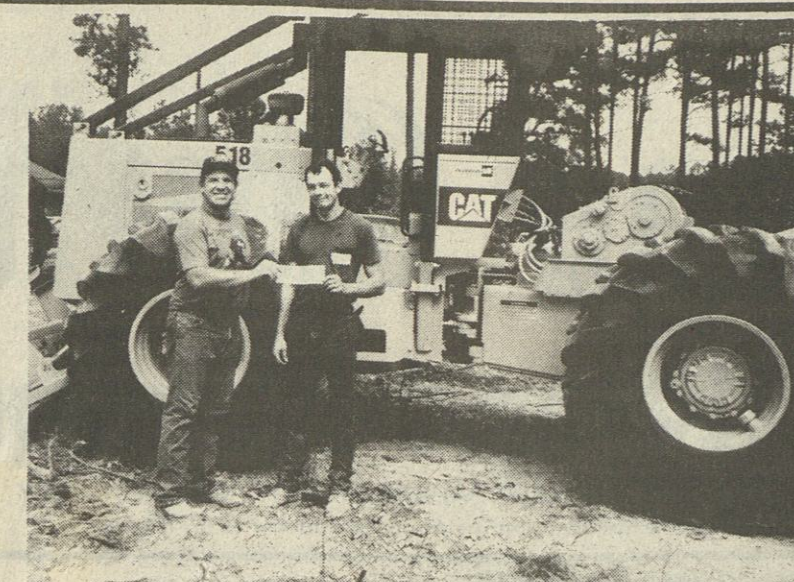
Speaking as a concerned parent, I

When the "salad makes the meal" it is a main dish salad. They are easy to prepare, attractive and economical when you carefully choose ingredients. You'll want to be sure the main dish salad is substantial and satisfying. Use a large enough plate so it will not be crowded. Ready-to-use canned meats, fruits, and vegetables are time and energy savers.

Ask Ochsner

Q. I was diagnosed with diverticulitis. My physician advised me to eat high fiber cereals and fresh fruits. Why are these foods recommended?

A. Diverticula are the small, sac-like swellings that sometimes develop in the walls of the colon. Many older people develop diverticula without

ever knowing it. This symptom-free almost symptom-free diverticular disease is called diverticulosis. One or more of the diverticula becomes inflamed it causes diverticulitis, explains Dr. Chesley H. Jr. at the Ochsner Clinic, section gastroenterology. Diverticulitis can cause severe pain in the lower quadrant of the abdomen, adds Hines. Fever also occurs. Only a minority of the persons with diverticulosis ever develop the symptoms of diverticulitis. However, untreated diverticulitis may lead to serious complications, including perforation. There appears to be a connection between a diet high in fiber and diverticular disease. Notes Hines, diverticular disease, it has been clearly shown that patients on a fiber diet had fewer complications from their disease. In countries where people assume a high fiber diet, diverticulosis is extremely rare. Therefore, modifying your diet it may be possible to prevent the formation of diverticula. It is suggested that eat whole grain breads, oatmeal, bran cereals, plenty of fibrous fruits and vegetables.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

How do you react when your child brings home the report card? You may be able to predict your reactions on the basis of past performances. Remember that a report card evaluates a student's work; not a student's worth or the quality of

parenting the child received. It's a shame, but some parents only see the grades and miss the child. They act as though these report cards were infallible evaluations of their children's total being and future lives. This attitude puts tremendous pressure on many fine young girls and boys and their parents. These young people have qualities few teachers ever see, let alone grade. The child is a whole being with many more aspects than just intellect. Every young person has strengths. Who ever heard of having a report card that scores kindness and friendliness?

Some of the scholastic C and D students might get straight A's when it comes to basic human moral and ethical values. No one scores a child on compassion or good manners, yet both are important throughout life. Parents need to recall that the child's self-concept is more important than grades on the report card. Regardless of how well or how poorly a son or daughter does on that scholastic report, the young person must know love and acceptance. Parental love should never be conditioned on getting good grades.

FUN AT HOME Human relationships are more important than material surroundings. Children take their patterns of thinking, feeling and acting from those they live with in the family. Fun in the home helps to shape their thinking and ideals. It helps to build habits and develop leadership for the later years. In short, family fun helps to form and enrich the life of each member of the group. Playing with children is important. Children learn first from their parents and those close to them. By sharing in a child's playtime, even if that time is limited, parents also can learn about their offspring.

In make-believe or other play activities, children will sometimes reveal troubling or frightening thoughts. They may express feelings of guilt, fear or sadness. Parents, who involve themselves with their children in play situations, show their approval, acceptance and support of the child's interests. Here are some make-believe games that are low cost yet fun: 1. Turn the playpen or a card table upside down with strings wound around the legs make a good cage for a "wild animal."

2. If you have a small wagon, your child may fill it with books, newspapers and letters to be the delivery person. A mail carrier needs a bag to carry the mail in. 3. Playing "office" always makes a child feel important. You'll need

some scrap paper, a little notebook, some envelopes and any odds and ends you have in your desk.

An empty spool makes a wonderful pencil holder for a desk set. Put a drop or two of blue vegetable dye in water to make a bottle of ink.

4. Save all your tin cans (opened smoothly) with the labels on to play store.

5. A box of bandages and a piece of rope for the stethoscope will suggest playing doctor and hospital.

6. Line up chairs for a train. All the available dolls and stuffed animals can be the passengers. Travel to some exciting places to "see the sights."

7. Sit in a box or carton and row the boat with two large mixing spoons.

Crunchy Sweet Potato Casserole

2 cups cooked and mashed sweet potatoes
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1 1/4 cups sugar
2 eggs, beaten
6 tablespoons margarine or butter, melted
Combine all ingredients in mixing bowl and mix well. Spoon into 2-quart casserole dish and bake uncovered in oven at 400 degrees for 20 minutes. While this is baking, prepare topping.
Topping:
3/4 cup crushed cornflakes
6 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
In small mixing bowl combine all ingredients. Stir well. Makes about 1 cup. Sprinkle casserole with topping and bake for 10 minutes longer.
YIELD: 6-8 servings.

Ask These Questions About Your Medicines

According to the National Council on Patient Information and Education, there were only 656 prescription medicines on the market in 1961. Today we have four times as many medicines. And in the course of a year, the average American will take six or seven prescription medicines.

- If I am pregnant, can I safely take this medicine?

Holiday Salads Can Fit Into Your Holiday Plans

During the holiday season, salads can come to the rescue in many ways. There's the accompaniment salad, the appetizer salad, the main dish salad, and the dessert or party salad.

Salads for the holidays can be as varied as your imagination and can serve most any purpose you'll need during this busy season.

People have been eating salad ingredients for centuries. However, today there are almost limitless ways to combine all the mineral and vitamin-rich foods we normally eat in salad form. From a nutritional and budget standpoint and because salads are such colorful and attractive foods by themselves, they are becoming more important in the daily menu picture.

Basically, good salad techniques include selecting the best ingredients and tastefully combining them. For the right beginning, use only crisp greens for the base of the salad or for a plain tossed salad.

As soon as you bring the greens home, wash them thoroughly, drain and store in a plastic bag or other container in the refrigerator. Buy whichever greens are in season and when possible, keep a variety on hand. Iceberg, Boston and leaf lettuce, endive, escarole, romaine, tender spinach and cabbage leaves and watercress are excellent salad greens.

Almost any vegetable, fruit, or meat will make a good salad. For the heart of the salad, combine or arrange salads just before serving for a crisp appearance. Always chill canned fruits and drain thoroughly. Arrange it on a salad plate in a neat, uncluttered manner; keeping it as simple as possible. Watch for color, texture, and flavor variety when you combine ingredients.

Choose a dressing to complement the salad. Many types of prepared dressings are available for vegetable, fruit, or meat salads. Or, you may have your own favorite recipe you'd like to use.

For easy and convenient salad making, keep your canned foods shelf well stocked. Canned foods are easy to store in a cool, dark, dry place. Watch for ones you normally use and when they're on special, stock up so you'll have plenty for quick-notice meals.

We mentioned three basic kinds of salads so think about which ones you're likely to be using and how they can fit into your holiday plans.

Accompaniment salads should be light, rather than substantial. Serve them middle-sized portions either as

4-H At The County Fair
October has been a very busy month for 4-H members in Tishomingo County. The Tishomingo County Fair has played a big part in their activities.

Five 4-H Clubs designed and showed club exhibit booths. The North Crossroads 4-H Club won the Grand Champion award with their booth entitled "4-H - Is Not Received, It is Achieved." Reserve Grand Champion went to the Little Dough Bakers 4-H Club using the theme "Southern Born, Southern Bread." Third place went to the Mingo 4-H Club with a display of results of their water quality study

done on a section of Bear Creek. Rainbow 4-H Club received a blue ribbon for their recycling campaign booth and Helping Hands 4-H Club also received a blue ribbon for their 4-H promotional booth. These booths were designed and installed by 4-H members.

4-H members were also given the opportunity to display their handiwork during the Tishomingo County Fair. Sixty-two 4-H members and other youth exhibited 1,064 items ranging from fresh vegetables to wood craft to baked goods and canned foods. Of all these items, 560 were judged to be blue ribbon quality. This was better than 50% of the items exhibited. The 4-H members and other youth worked very hard to produce high quality exhibits.

ASCS Farm News

FARMERS HAVE CAUGHT UP

As a group, farm operator households have entered the U.S. mainstream; they no longer have low incomes relative to nonfarm households. Back in 1930's, when farm commodity programs were initiated, average farm family income was about half that all U.S. families. By the late 1950's, the share was still about 60 percent.

But today, farm operator household income, on average, is on par with nonfarm family incomes. This challenges the popular view that farm commodity programs now assist a relatively disadvantaged group.

Some farm families continue to have serious income problems. But the drop in farm numbers and rise in average income mean that these problems are not as pervasive as they once were.

Farm poverty rates today are low by historical standards and the farm poor are a small part of the U.S. poverty population. This contrasts sharply with 1959-60, the first years for which poverty data were calculated, when over half of the U.S. farm population was poor and one in

five poor people lived on a farm.

Off-farm income growth has been critical to this improvement. Farmers' household income from off-farm jobs, nonfarm investments and nonfarm transfers has exceeded net farm business income (net cash farm income less depreciation) since 1973.

One recent study shown that about half of all farm households depends primarily on off-farm income for family living. Nine out of ten of these households operate farm with annual sales of less than \$40,000. These smaller farms typically generate low or negative net farm incomes.

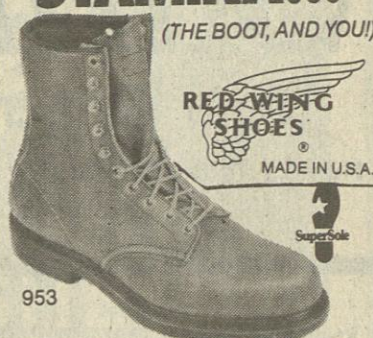
For 45 percent of all U.S. Farm operators, farming is a second job. Many are machinists, manufacturing production workers, or lawyers first and farmers second. Growth of non-farm job opportunities in rural areas has contributed to improved farm household incomes, perhaps more so than commodity programs. This is important because only about one in three farms participate in commodity programs.

Flu Shots Available

Readily available flu shots could spare thousands of Mississippians the misery of influenza. So public health officials push vaccine every year to try to save them from the viral disease and its complications, the fifth leading cause of death in Mississippi 65 years of age or older.

The Mississippi State Department of Health offers flu shots before the flu season, which usually begins around early December and lasts through April. The shots, available at county health departments, carry a \$5 administration fee.

While not 100 percent effective, the vaccine remains the most effective means of preventing influenza. The vaccines, made from purified, killed egg-grown viruses, cannot cause influenza.

"We encourage everyone to get a flu shot around this time of the year," said State Epidemiologist Dr. Ed Thompson. "It's especially important for the elderly because they are more susceptible to complications from influenza."

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends a new shot each fall since influenza immunization declines within a year. And since immunity from the vaccine starts to decline after several months, the shot

should be given as close to the actual flu season as possible.

The Mississippi State Department of Health recommends flu shots for:

- *Anyone who wants to avoid the flu.
- *Certain groups at increased risk for serious complication if they get the flu, such as:
 - Adults or children with chronic diseases of the cardiovascular or pulmonary system, including children with asthma.
 - Persons 65 years of age or older.
 - Nursing home patients, with approval from their attending physician.
 - Adults and children who have required medical followup or hospitalization during the previous year because of chronic metabolic disease.
 - Children six months to 18 years who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, and may be at risk of developing Reye syndrome after influenza.
- *Health care workers, especially those working with patients who fall into one of the above groups.
- *Persons whose absence from work could result in disruption of essential services, including school teachers, certain military personnel, police officers, and firefighters.

People with allergies to eggs or persons with illnesses accompanied by fever should not receive the influenza vaccine.

For more information about influenza or the vaccine, readers should contact their physician or local health department.

NOTE: Some county health departments are planning to schedule special days for influenza immunizations. Please check with the individual counties for the planned schedule in your area.

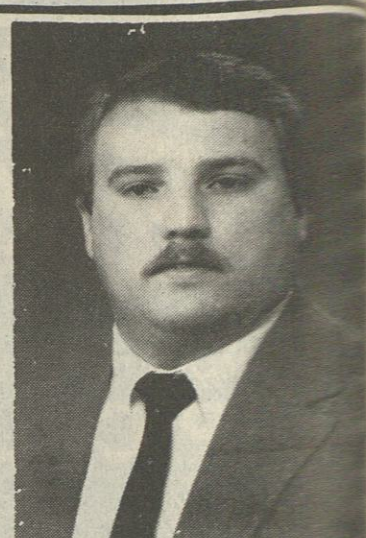
During Chester's eight-week training cycle, she studied general military subjects designed to prepare her for further academic and on-the-job training in one of the Navy's 85 basic fields.

Rickets and Lack of Milk in the Diet

Is there any real harm that can occur in older babies who do not receive milk?

The harmful effects of not getting milk or another form of protein, calcium, and vitamin D in the diet was demonstrated in a study recently reported in the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*.

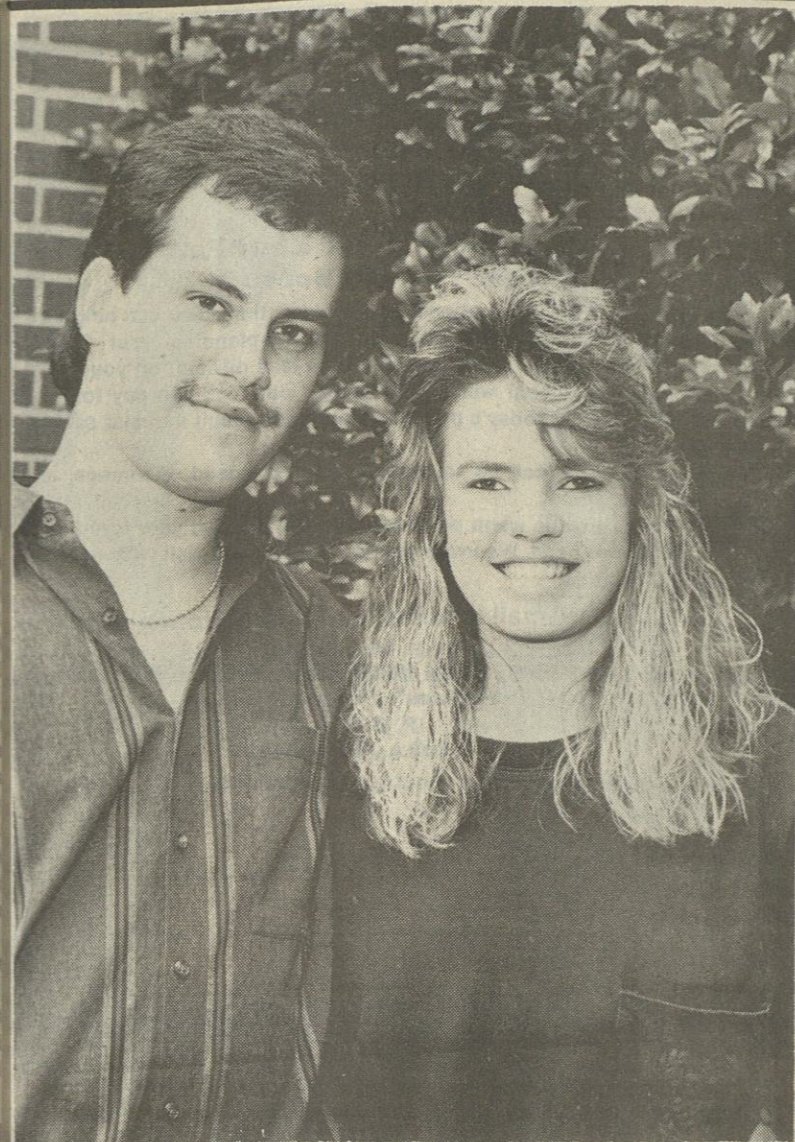
Babies were identified in the Netherlands who were fed a diet that primarily consisted of unpolished rice, vegetables with a high fiber content, and seeds from certain types of plants. Small amounts of seaweed, nuts, and fruits also were given to some of the infants. Items not eaten included milk, meat, poultry, eggs, and other foods of animal origin (with the possible exception of fish). Some individuals believe that this diet, which is termed "macrobiotic," provides a variety of health benefits.

The infants who were studied did not receive vitamin D supplements. Physical exams revealed that over half of these infants on the milk-free diet had symptoms of rickets - a health problem characterized by bone that does not contain enough calcium. Lack of vitamin D in the diet is the usual cause. The authors of the study concluded that, "avoidance of milk products in combination with a high fiber intake may damage bone development in young children."

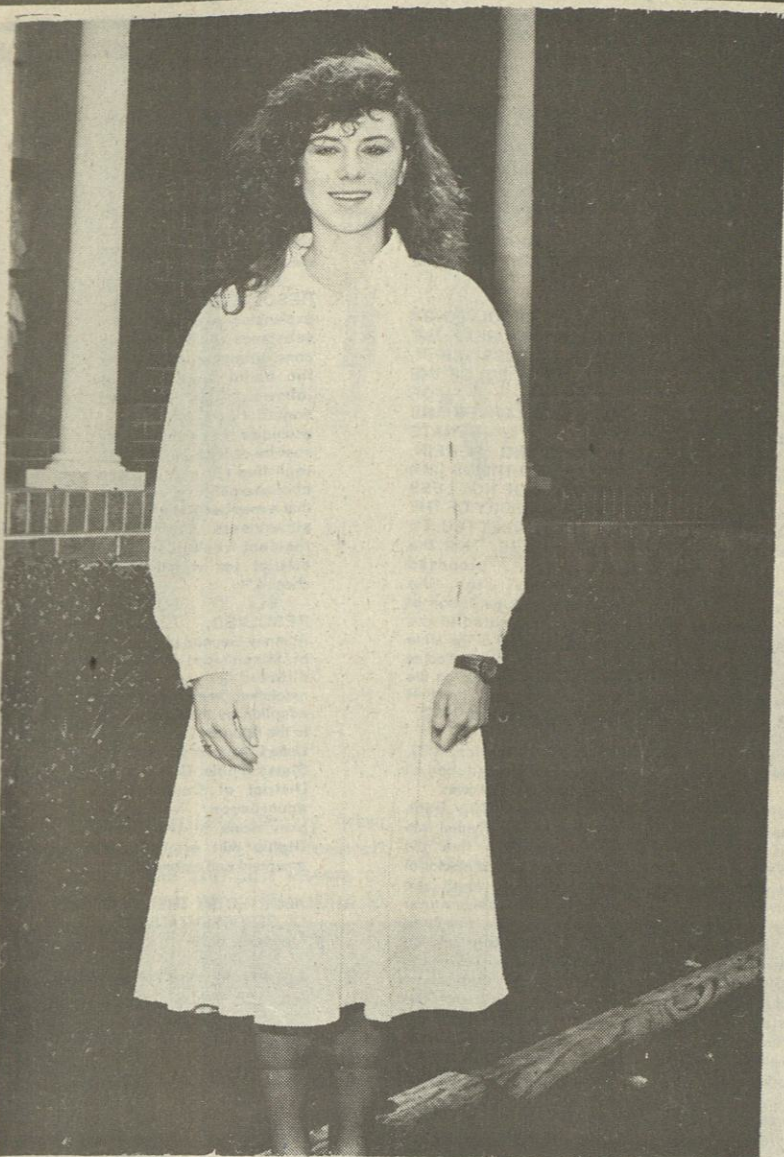

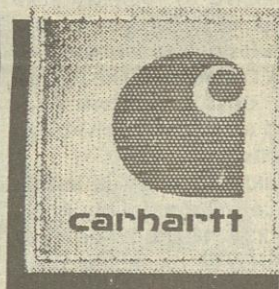

County Agents Notes

HELPFUL SERVICE

Mississippi State University operates three fish disease diagnostic laboratories to serve fish farmers on Tishomingo County and other areas of the state. Services are provided at no cost to the farmers, and that can really help them keep expenses under control.

The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service has labs in Stoneville and Belzoni; the MSU College of Veterinary Medicine has a lab at the Wise Center on campus. BEEF MANAGEMENT

One of the keys to a successful beef cattle operation in Tishomingo County, regardless of size and type, is an adequate set of cattle handling facilities. Without a way to corral and restrain cattle, many routine jobs and practices that affect herd health will not be done.

Constructing new facilities can sometimes be costly to the producer. Many costs could be reduced through the use of existing barns and sheds as holding or sorting pens.

When returns from most management practices are compared to annual facility cost per cow-calf unit, handling facilities are not expensive.

Tishomingo County has a portable squeeze chute, head gate and scale that is available to any cattleman who needs a facility of this type for vaccination, dehorning, castration or any other type of work on cattle

where they need to be caught & held. The chute is easily pulled by a pick-up equipped with a standard trailer hitch.

If you have need of this chute, contact the County Agents Office or call 423-7016.

MORE LIME FOR FORAGES

Now may be the time for Tishomingo County cattle producers who may be running short on hay to play for cool-season forages. Low soil pH may be one of their biggest problems in growing these forages.

Many producers who have soil samples analyzed find that the soil pH is below 5. These soils need 1 ton of lime per acre to improve growth.

The Tishomingo County Extension Office has three bulletins available on cool-season grazing crops. Information Sheet 1168 "Forage Types, Varieties, Planting Dates and Rates," Publication 1022 "Winter Annuals for Grazing" and Information Sheet 830 "Tall Fescue in Mississippi."

BEE KEEPING SHORT COURSE

Plans are being made for a multi-county Bee Keeping Short Course which will be held at Northeast Mississippi Community College in Booneville in November. The course will be conducted by representative of Mississippi State University and the Mississippi Department of Agriculture & Commerce. The course will consist of 3 or 4 two hour sessions and will be at no charge to the participants.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 225, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO AUTHORIZE THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATION OF A NONPROFIT CORPORATION TO MANAGE AND OPERATE A STATE PRISON INDUSTRIES PROGRAM WHICH MAY MAKE USE OF STATE PRISONERS IN ITS OPERATION, AND TO REMOVE THE PROVISION AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE SEPARATION OF CONVICTS ACCORDING TO RACE; AND TO REPEAL SECTION 223, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, WHICH PROHIBITS PENITENTIARY CONVICTS FROM BEING LEASED OR HIRED TO ANY PERSON, CORPORATION, OR BOARD.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, WHICH TWO-THIRDS CONSISTS OF NOT LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, That the following proposed amendments to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1990:

I. Amend Section 225, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows:

"Section 225. The Legislature may place the convicts on a state farm or farms and have them worked thereon or elsewhere. It may also provide for the creation of a nonprofit corporation for the purpose of managing and operating a state prison industries program which may make use of state prisoners in its operation. It may establish a reformatory school or schools, and provide for keeping of juvenile offenders from association with hardened criminals. It may provide for the commutation of the sentence of convicts for good behavior, and for the constant separation of the sexes, and for religious worship for the convicts."

II. Repeal Section 223, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows:

"Section 223. No Penitentiary convict shall ever be leased or hired to any person or persons, or corporation, private or public or quasi public, or board, after December the thirty-first, A.D. 1894, save as authorized in the next section, nor shall any previous lease or hiring of convicts extend beyond that date; and the Legislature shall abandon the system of such leasing or hiring as much sooner than the date mentioned as may be consistent with the economic safety of the state."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, for the purpose of submitting these and other proposed amendments to the Constitution to the qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection, with the amendments in this resolution being voted on as one (1) amendment, since the proposed amendments pertain to one (1) subject, such election to be conducted and held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1990, in the manner provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment amends Section 225 of the Constitution and repeals Section 223 of the Constitution to authorize the Legislature to provide for the creation of a nonprofit corporation to manage and operate a state prison industries program which may make use of state prisoners in its operation. The proposed amendment also removes the provision which authorizes the Legislature to provide for the separation of convicts according to race."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, WHICH TWO-THIRDS CONSISTS OF NOT LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, That the following amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1990:

Repeal Section 272, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows: "Section 272. The Legislature shall provide by law for pensions to confederate soldiers and sailors who enlisted and honorably served in the late Civil War and who are now resident in this state. Pensions shall also be allowed to the widows of such soldiers or sailors now dead on conditions to be prescribed by law. Pensions shall be allowed to the wives of such soldiers and sailors now living upon the death of the husbands on conditions to be prescribed by law, but pensions granted to such widows shall cease upon their subsequent marriages."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, and an election is hereby called and fixed to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1990, for the purpose of submitting this and other amendments of the Constitution to qualified electors of this state for approval or rejection, said election to be conducted and held as provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional

Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows:

Section 137. It shall be the duty of the State Treasurer, within ten (10) days after the first day of January and July of each year, to publish a statement under oath, in some newspaper published at the seat of government, showing the condition of the treasury on said days, the balance on hand and in what funds, together with a certificate of the Governor that he has verified the count of the funds in the treasury, and found the balance stated by the Treasurer, actually in the vaults of the treasury, or as the truth may be. And it shall be the duty of the Governor, at such other times as he may deem proper, to go to the treasury, without giving notice to the Treasurer, and verify the cash balance as shown by the books, and to publish the fact that he has done so, and whether the amount called for by the books be actually in the treasury, and stating whether the Treasurer had any "line whatever that the verification would be made."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, for the purpose of submitting this and other proposed amendments to the Constitution to qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection, such election to be conducted and held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1990, in the manner provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment repeals Section 137 of the Constitution which requires the State Treasurer and Governor to publish and verify the balance of the treasury."

Repeal Section 3, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows: "Section 3. The limits and boundaries of the State of Mississippi are as follows, to-wit: Beginning on the Mississippi River (meaning thereby the center of said river or thread of the stream) where the southern boundary line of the State of Tennessee strikes the same, as run by B.A. Ludlow, D.W. Connelly, and W. Petrie, commissioners appointed for that purpose on the part of the State of Tennessee; thence east along the said boundary line of the State of Tennessee to a point on the west bank of the Tennessee River, six (6) four-pole chains south of and above the mouth of Yellow Creek; thence up the said river to the mouth of Bear Creek; by a direct line to what was formerly the northwest corner of the County of Washington, Alabama; thence on a direct line to a point ten (10) miles east of the Pascagoula River on the Gulf of Mexico; thence westwardly, including all the islands within six (6) leagues of the shore, to the most eastern junction of the Pearl River with Lake Borgne; thence up said Pearl River to

DIVIDED INTO NOT MORE THAN FIVE DISTRICTS, AND TO ABOLISH THE REQUIREMENT THAT A MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS SHALL BE A RESIDENT FREEHOLDER IN THE DISTRICT FOR WHICH HE IS CHOSEN.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN, WHICH TWO-THIRDS (2/3) CONSISTS OF NOT LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, That the following proposed amendments to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1990:

Amend Section 170, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows:

"Section 170. Each county shall be divided into not more than five (5) districts, a qualified elector of each district shall be selected, in the manner prescribed by law, and those so chosen shall constitute the board of supervisors of the county, a majority of whom may transact business. The board of supervisors shall have full jurisdiction over roads, ferries, and bridges, to be exercised in accordance with such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe, and perform such other duties as may be required by law; provided, however, that the Legislature may have the power to designate certain highways as "state highways," and place such highways under the control and supervision of the State Highway Commission, and maintenance. The clerk of the chancery court shall be the clerk of the board of supervisors."

II. Repeal Section 176, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows:

"Section 176. No person shall be a member of the board of supervisors who is not a resident freeholder in the district for which he is chosen. The value of real estate necessary to be owned to qualify persons in the several counties to be members of said board shall be fixed by law."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of an election in the manner and for the time provided by Section 273 of the Constitution, for the purpose of submitting these and other proposed amendments to the Constitution to the qualified electors of this state for ratification or rejection, with the amendments in this resolution being voted on as one (1) amendment since the

proposed amendments pertain to one (1) subject, such election to be conducted and held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1990, in the manner provided by law for statewide general elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanatory statement of the substance of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment provides that each county shall be divided into not more than five (5) districts, and that a member of the board of supervisors shall be a resident freeholder in the district for which he is chosen."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Attorney General of the State of Mississippi is hereby directed to submit this resolution, immediately upon adoption by the Legislature, to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Attorney General of the State of Mississippi is hereby directed to submit this resolution, immediately upon adoption by the Legislature, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.
