Celebration Friday At New School Complex

Something more than the traditional groundbreaking ceremony will take place Friday morning, November 9, as Iuka and Tishomingo County students, faculty, administrators and parents join invited guests in celebrating construction of

the county's new educational complex.

Using the theme "Lend A Hand For Tishomingo County," Gov. Ray Mabus will participate in the commemorative handprint ceremony in which he and a group of students will

make permanent impressions of their handprints in squares of plaster.

The handprints will symbolize community ownership and unity and will be installed in a decorative band in the brick and stone walls of the new learning center.

To begin at 10:30 a.m., the ceremony is hosted by the Tishomingo County School Board, Iuka School District board, and Major Economic Impact Authority. Approximately 3,100 city and county students, accompanied by about 270 teachers and staff members will arrive by busload to attend the historic event. The ceremony will also mark the start of renovations at Belmont High School.

The "Ole Miss Spirit," a song and dance group from the University of Mississippi, will provide entertainment and perform the national anthem. A welcome will be extended by Mack L. Wadkins, director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation. J. Mac Holladay, director of the Department of Economic and Community Development, will introduce Gov. Mabus. Ole Miss Chancellor Gerald Turner will also participate in the program.

Five students were randomly selected to represent each school in the county in the handprint Ceremony. The students are: Brad Booker, ninth-grader from Iuka School District; LaShanda Sparks, third-grader from Belmont; Deanna Hill, fourth-grader from Tishomingo; Regina McCoy, tenth-grader from Burnsville; and Paula Lynch, tenth-grader, representing the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Center.

This will kick off the "Lend a Hand" program in which Tishomingo County residents and families are encouraged to cast their handprints for preservation in the walls of the school. Each person participating will donate \$20, a portion of which will go toward the libraries at the new school and Belmont High School. The handprints will be identified in a master legend located in the media center of the complex.

In the event of rain, the ceremony will be moved to the Iuka High School gymnasium.

At 1 p.m. also on Friday, Mabus will attend groundbreaking ceremonies for a new math and science complex at Northeast Mississippi Community College at Booneville. Like the Tishomingo project, the math and science building also received funding through the state Impact Authority.

Veterans Day Program

There will be a Veterans Day Program at Tishomingo High School on Friday November 9, at 2:00 p.m. in the new gym. All veterans are invited to attend.

New School Board Elected

Tishomingo County voters elected a new school board in Tuesday's general election to represent the new consolidated, countywide school district.

In the voting, unofficial results showed that several incumbent members of the old Tishomingo County Board of Trustees lost bids for reelection to the new board.

In District 1, Earl Walker won over Richard Smith by a vote of 669 to 189. Walker currently is a member of the Iuka School Board.

In District 2, Larry Bonds, current member of the county school board, was defeated by a slim margin for a position on the new board by Gary White. White had 363 votes to Bonds' 354.

In District 3, county board member Virgil Rhodes also lost a bid for a seat on the new board. Bob Wimbish took 320 votes over John Gwatney in second place with 173. Rhodes had 138 votes.

Harold Oswalt, who serves as president of the current county board, was defeated in District 4 by David Wayne Dawson by vote of 358 to 223.

Harold Sparks will be the only incumbent to serve on the new board, since he was unopposed for his reelection to the District 5 seat.

The new school board trustees, elected by supervisors districts, will take office July 1, 1991. Two positions on the old county school board were also elected, to serve until June. Unopposed were Harold Sparks for the old District 5 position and David Dawson for the old District 3 position.

Tishomingo County voters overwhelmingly passed the enhanced 911

emergency response system for the county.

The issue passed with 2,577 voting for and 573 voting against. The referendum included authority to levy a surcharge of up to 5 percent of the tariff rate on all county telephone subscribers.

In the District 1 Circuit judges race, incumbent circuit judges Thomas J. Gardner III and Frank A. Russell regained their positions. Barry Ford, Pontotoc municipal judge, was elected as the third judge in District 1.

In Tishomingo County, Russell was the top vote-getter with 1,598. Gardner took 1,161 votes, Ford had 1,241, and Republican William Lawson had 805.

In the District 1 Chancery Judge race, Timothy E. Ervin, James L. Roberts Jr., and John C. Ross Jr., all uncontested, were elected.

Jamie Whitten, incumbent U.S. 1st Congressional District Representative, easily defeated his Republican challenger Bill Bowlin. Tishomingo County voters cast 2,634 for Whitten and 610 for Bowlin.

Thad Cochran, uncontested in his bid for reelection to the U.S. Senate, received 2,488 votes in Tishomingo County.

Voting results on the seven state constitutional amendments were: Amendments 2 and 4 passed; Amendments 1,3,5,6, and 7 did not pass in Tishomingo County.

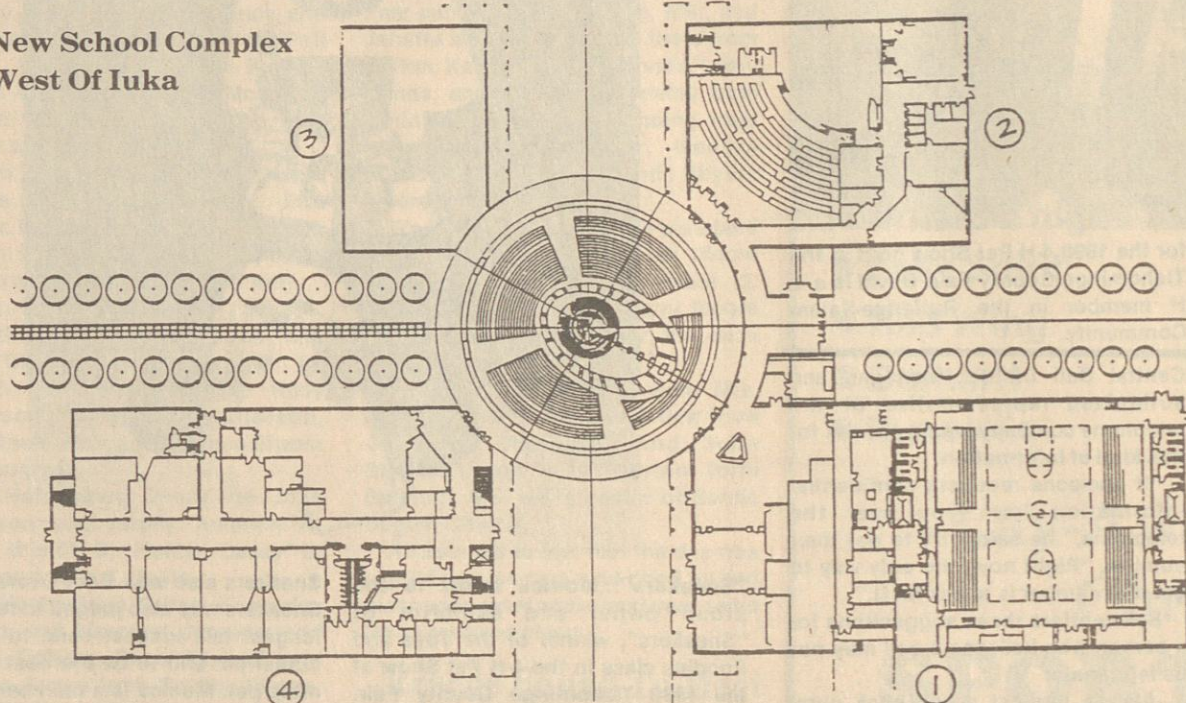

New School Complex West Of Iuka



SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL DESIGN FEATURES:

1. GYMNASIUM/CAFETERIA BUILDING (COMMUNITY FITNESS CENTER AND RESTAURANT):

- The gymnasium will double as a Community Fitness Center after hours and on weekends. Negotiations are now underway to create a local YMCA franchise to operate the facility as a private enterprise.
- The cafeteria is designed to serve not only the student population but also meetings of community clubs and organizations and for special dining before and after sporting or theatre events. The atmosphere is non-institutional and will include a large fireplace constructed of "Tishomingo" sandstone. The dining room will have the overall ambience of a hunting lodge with natural wood and stone finishes. Special decoration will include hunting and fishing trophies donated by area residents who will be recognized on brass plaques describing the animal species and its donor. The collection will also be used as a natural history exhibit of local fauna. It is hoped that locals will make the facility a favorite dining spot after hours and on weekends.

2. AUDITORIUM (COMMUNITY THEATRE):

The auditorium will house 250 seats and back-up spaces for music and drama. It will also house music, drama and distance learning classrooms. The distance learning technology will be enhanced to provide full screen projection in the auditorium to accommodate programming for large groups and community meetings, (i.e. direct satellite communication with Congressional representatives in Washington, D.C.).

The theatre will also be open on Friday and Saturday nights to provide video movies as entertainment for students and the community. (There is not a sufficient market to sustain a full-time for-profit movie house in the community.)

3. UNIVERSITY CENTER:

The University Center will accommodate college-level curriculum in advanced engineering, business administration, and liberal arts. Included in the University Center will be a small observatory which will be open to the public for special evening programs of star gazing and introductory astronomy.

4. CLASSROOMS/MEDIA CENTER/ADMINISTRATION:

The classrooms are designed along a double loaded corridor with individual mechanical control. Walls between classrooms are all fully movable to allow for joining spaces or creating large sections for open planning. The computer lab has a separate public entrance to allow for after hours use of technology by students who don't have home computers and by the community at large. The Media Center is also designed to accommodate separate outside access for the community. The administrative area is designed to accommodate full staff utilization as well as a separate headquarters for community volunteers.

County-Wide Water & Sewer District Proposed

Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors this week announced joint efforts with local and state public health and environmental health officials to address sewage disposal problems associated with business and residential development.

"The first and most important thing we must do is get the word out as to what the law requires," said Board President D. W. McKee. "People have been building houses forever and then working out the water and sewage problems. Now we're required to do the water and sewage considerations first. That's a change, and people just aren't used to it."

Supervisor Ricky Cummings added, "And we want people to know they can build in Tishomingo County."

Board members agreed with public health officials that development must be planned to assure orderly growth that will also protect the public health and ensure the environmental quality.

David Morgan, supervising environmentalist, Northeast Public Health District II, said the "Supervisors took the first step toward orderly development of subdivisions

last summer when they passed an order requiring subdivision plats and adopting subdivision regulations."

He suggested the next best step would be creation of a long-discussed, county-wide water and sewer district.

"With the county-wide water and sewer district," Morgan said, "Tishomingo County can get grants to fund extensions for existing water systems, upgrade water systems, and create a central sewage disposal system. The district would also greatly increase the ability of developers in the area to build new subdivisions, especially to accommodate the expected influx of people associated with the NASA plant."

State Representative Mack Loyd Wadkins said, "The governmental agencies in Tishomingo County are working diligently to address water and sewer needs with very limited resources. We all need to commend this Board for the steps they've taken to form such a district."

Mississippi law mandates that any dwelling have its wastewater disposal system installed and approved before residential water service can be connected. In fact, the law requires a preliminary lot ap-

proval for sewage disposal before the sale or purchase of the property.

State regulations cover any homebuilder, mobile home owner, subdivision or apartment complex developer, or commercial establishment without access to a municipal or other water and sewer system. The state regulations require that those individuals or businesses get preliminary approval for sewage disposal before construction and final approval after installation of the wastewater disposal system.

In general, the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) regulates wastewater disposal systems for single family residences. MSDH regulations cover underground absorption and surface discharge to state waters of anything less than 400 gallons a day-usually, the amount a single family residence would produce.

The state Department of Environmental Quality covers public sewer systems and any discharge of over 400 gallons a day.

"Anyone who fails to follow the two-step process breaks the law," Morgan said. "We want to help people avoid the all too costly expense of building a home or business and

then learning they do not have access to and cannot install an appropriate sewage disposal system."

Environmentalists in every county health department are available to help builders or property owners determine -- based on site and soil conditions -- the most appropriate disposal system. Options include a septic tank, underground absorption, aerobic treatment plant with discharge into suitable state waters, or even discharge of treated waste water onto the property itself through a sprinkler system, for example. The county environmentalist can also provide information about licensed installers.

Applicants must provide a plot plan of the property, giving property size, a legal description, and proposed house site. With this and an on-site evaluation and upon receipt of the \$35 permit fee, the county environmentalist can provide written approval of the completed system.

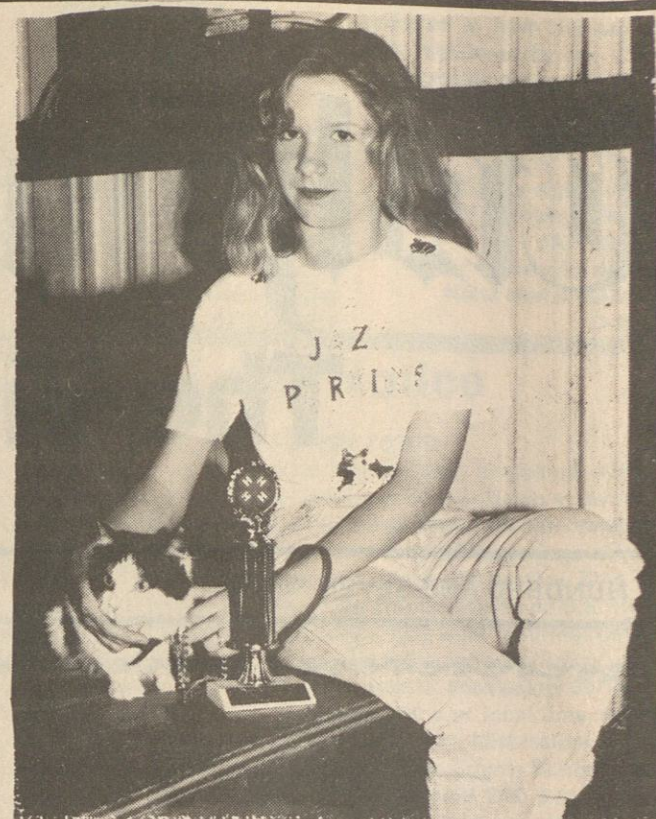

Telephone Company Urges Caution

There have been several recent reports of unauthorized callers posing as telephone company representatives and requesting confidential information.

In one instance, a person was told that long distance charges were being verified and a request was made for their calling card number, including the personal identification number (PIN). With that knowledge, long distance calls could be charged to the owner of the calling card without the owner's knowledge.

According to Tom Bailey, South

Central Bell District Manager, and authorized representative of the telephone company would not ask for this kind of information.

"If someone requests confidential information from you over the telephone," he said, "try to get their number. 'Right now, the only way to get that number is to ask for it.'"

Bailey offers these suggestions for a person who believes a call may not be legitimate:

- Always request a call back number.
- Do not disclose any information.
- Keep a list of details of the incident.
- Contact your local telephone company business office.

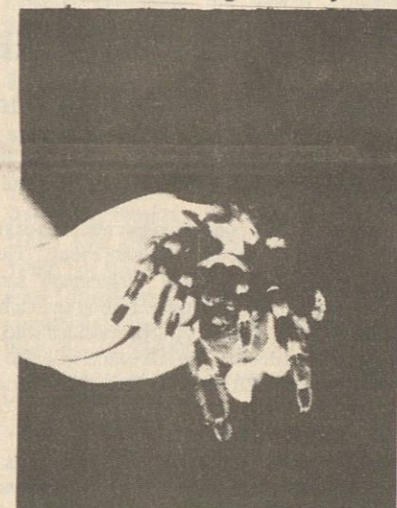

CONTRAINDICATIONS FOR CONTACTS

Contact lenses are great. For most people they are the ideal answer to correcting refractive errors. However, they are not for everyone. Some people are squeamish about wearing contact lenses. Others are careless about taking care of them. Others cannot wear them because of their jobs. Anyone exposed to chemical fumes, vapors, intense heat, molten metals, or high dust levels should not wear contact lenses, at least not while they're working.

Hay fever sufferers may have to stop wearing contact lenses during hay fever season, or go on a reduced schedule. On the other hand, some lens wearers point out that they feel less irritation because contacts are a deterrent to rubbing the eyes to relieve the itching. Any active infection of the eye and the surrounding tissues is a contraindication to wearing contact lenses. If you suffer from chronic or recurring eye infections, contact lenses are not for you. The same is true for people who have unusually "dry eyes."

Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

Vitamin D May Help Prevent Colon Cancer

I have read that vitamin E may help prevent cancer because of its antioxidant properties. Do other vitamins help prevent cancer?

According to a recent report in the medical journal *The Lancet*, "vitamin D metabolites, possibly working in conjunction with calcium, reduce colon cancer risk." In 1974, researchers at the John Hopkins University collected over 25,000 blood samples from volunteers living in Washington County, Maryland. Blood was analyzed for the presence of vitamin D. Volunteers also were asked about their intake of various foods, including those containing calcium. Since 1974, the health status of the volunteers was monitored.

Researchers found that the group of persons having the lowest vitamin D levels had the most colon cancer, and the group having the highest vitamin D levels had the lowest risk for colon cancer. Most vitamin D in humans is produced by the action of sunlight on the skin.

Other studies have shown that calcium consumption also may help protect against colon cancer. In a Chicago study, men who consumed more than 1,200 mg per day of calcium had 1/3 the risk for colon cancer as compared to men who consumed less than 300 mg of calcium daily. It is interesting to note that vitamin D is necessary for calcium absorption.

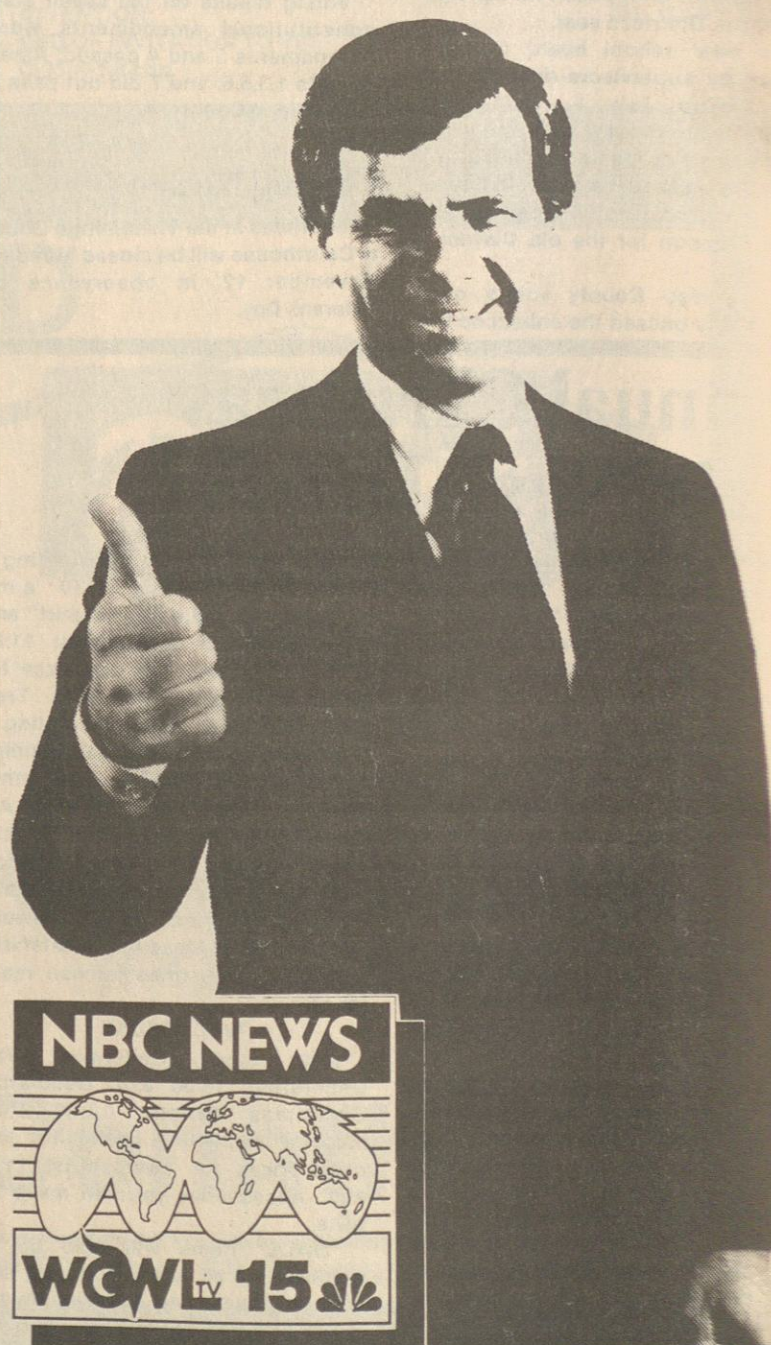

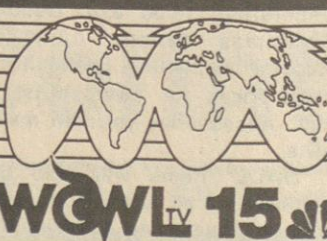

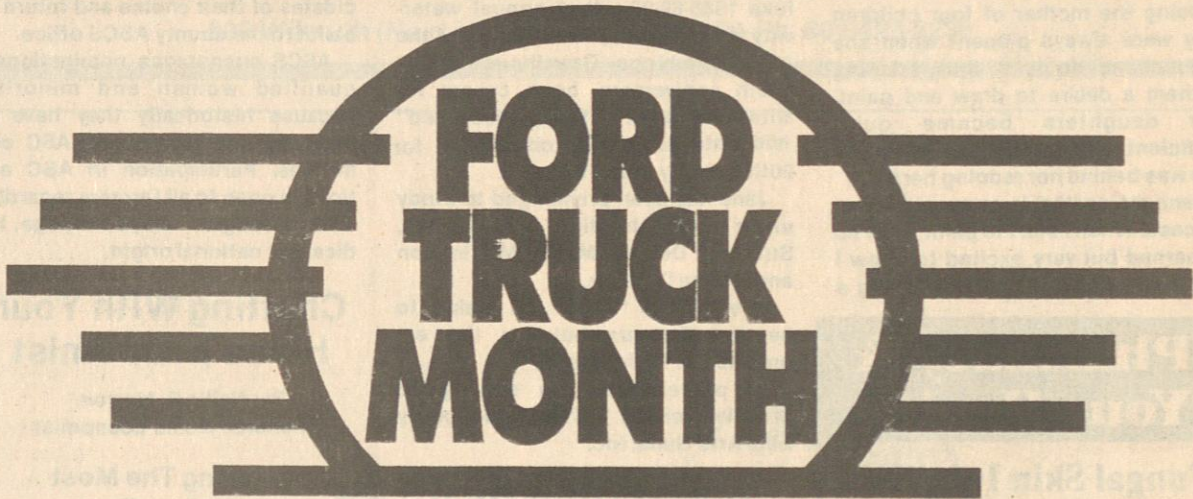

each item off as it is completed.

Get yourself organized. You'll need a system to keep track of important details.

Do first things first. Arrange your day so that you get the important things done first. Spend your most productive time doing the important activities. Leave routine matters for the time of day when you are less productive.

Make and stick to decisions. Acquire a habit of decisiveness. A test of a well-managed life is the ability to get things done. The following four actions will help you be more decisive:

1. Don't spend much time on unimportant decisions.
2. Examine choices thoroughly, and select an alternative.
3. Drop all other alternatives.
4. Act upon your decision.

Remember, that even to "decide or not to decide" is a decision.

Take action. Act promptly after deciding what to do. The sooner you act, the easier it will be to carry out. Don't put things off. If you procrastinate, you will spend valuable time justifying why you are not doing the job, instead of spending the time doing the job. If you have a tendency of putting things off:

1. Make a list of jobs to be done.
2. Analyze each job to be done.
3. Set a time for each job to be completed.
4. Stick to the schedule.

Keep up your self confidence. Accomplish something everyday. Set realistic goals for the day, and keep going until they are achieved. Never waste the precious hours of your day. You can never get that time back.

Concentrate on one thing at a time. Put all your energy into the task at hand. Tune out interruptions when possible. Expect interruptions, but learn to get back to the job you were doing.

Learn to say "No". Think through requests and invitations carefully. Determine if each request or invitation is the best use of your time. Don't get involved in "no-win" situations. Don't be afraid to say "no" firmly.

Watch out for the time thieves. Recognize time thieves and avoid

mentally retarded persons and their families; and 3) to provide an example that will influence people to give of their time, talents and money to do good for others. Having been in operation since December 1978, the Center is presently serving 145 full-time residents and 16 day clients. ASCS FARM NEWS

FARMERS MAY PLACE CORN IN LOAN PROGRAM

After the fall harvest, farmers will decide how much corn to sell and how much to hold for later sale in hopes of higher market prices. Current predictions for somewhat lower prices could cause many producers to opt for the commodity loan program administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Producers who have suitable storage on their farms or the use of an approved warehouse are eligible to obtain a price support loan on their 1990 corn crop. The loan rate for Tishomingo County's corn crop is \$1.66 per bushel.

U.S. corn prices dropped from \$2.77 a bushel in June to \$2.55 in early August, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The season-average price is forecast to range between \$2.35 and \$2.75 per bushel, a bit lower than last month's forecast.

The ASCS commodity loan program provides farmers with operating cash and allows them to hold their crops off the market and benefit from price increase that often come after harvest. Although the program does not guarantee participating farmers a profit, it does guarantee a minimum price.

Farmers can store the grain for as short a time as they wish or for as long as nine months.

Fungal Skin Infections

A group of skin infections collectively referred to as the *dermatophytes* are caused by fungi. The most common fungal skin infection in humans is athlete's foot. Typically, fungal skin infections produce symptoms that are similar to contact dermatitis—itching, scaling, redness, and loss of the outer skin layer.

Fungal infections thrive in the presence of excessive moisture, such as from hot and humid weather, exercise, or the wearing of tight-fitting shoes. Poor nutrition and poor body hygiene also may contribute to this infection.

Nonprescription antifungal agents such as *tolnaftate*, *miconazole*, and *clotrimazole* are applied topically to the skin. These medicines kill or inhibit the growth of fungi in the outer skin layer. Most areas of the body require two to three weeks of treatment. Areas of thick skin, such as palms of the hands and soles of the feet, may require a month to six weeks of therapy.

Griseofulvin is a prescription medicine that is taken orally and is used for skin, nail, and systemic fungal infections. *Ketoconazole* cream is approved for the more severe fungal infections of the skin. According to the journal, *Hospital Medicine*, ketoconazole has been effective against fungal infections not responding to topical antifungals or griseofulvin.

She stated that small children should be taught to drop to the floor, shout and roll in case of fire in the home.

The great tragedy is that preven-

table injury is the number one killer of kids, more children die from injuries each year in the United States than from all childhood diseases combined. Dr. Glynn discussed how to handle and how to prevent home emergencies. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed Dr. Glynn program and visit.

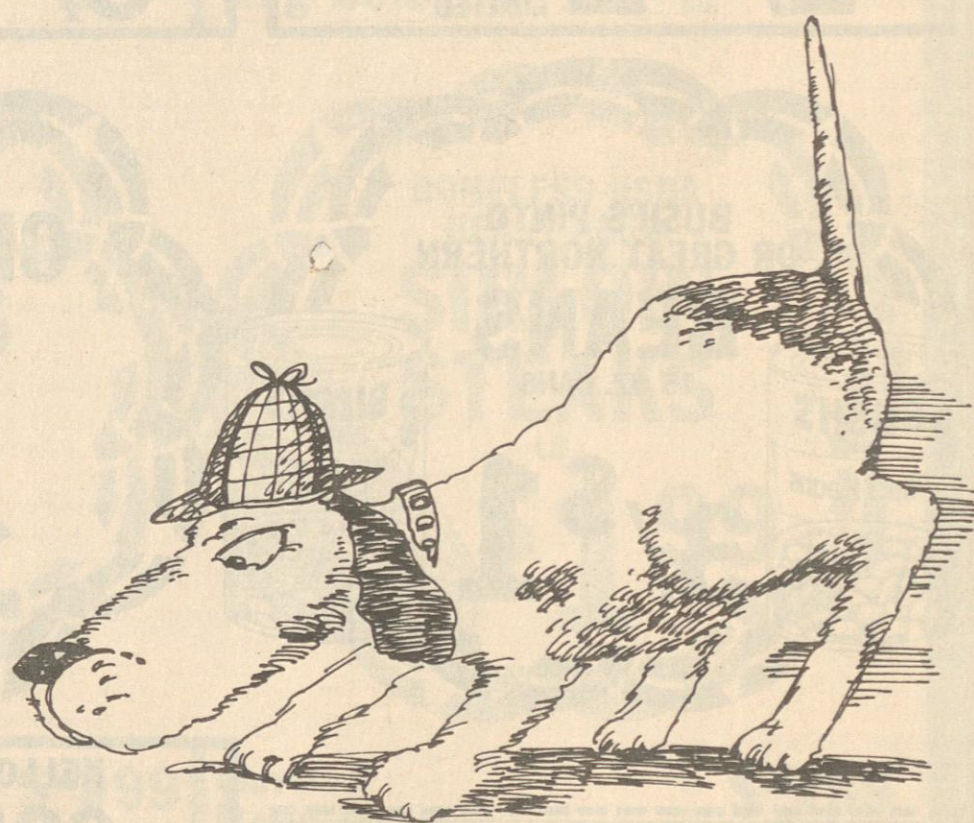

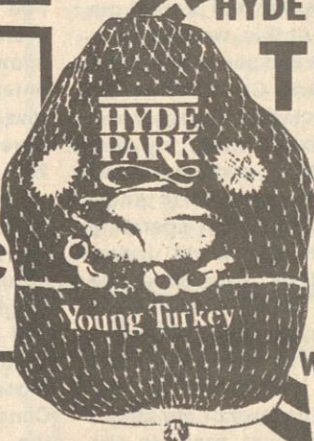

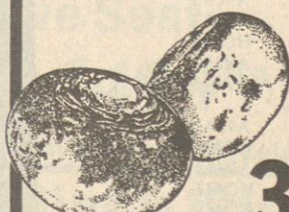

Veterans Day 1990

Veterans Day is a very special American holiday, a time for Americans to pause and remember all those men and women who have served in the United States Forces, according to Larry D. Woodard, director of the Jackson VA Regional Office. He said, "While the VA embodies the spirit of Veterans Day year-round, it is on this special day that all Americans can gather to voice our thankfulness and appreciation." Woodard urged everyone to pay tribute to the more than 228,000 living Mississippi veterans who have served their country in uniform, and to the 28,000 who died during wartime service.

The observance of Veterans Day goes back to 1921 when an American soldier--his name known but to God-- was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. The burial site of this unknown World War I soldier became the personification of dignity and reverence for American veterans.

Many memorial gestures took place on November 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I hostilities at 11 A.M., November 11, 1918--the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. That day became known as "Armistice Day."

If the idealistic hope had been realized, that World War I was "the war to end all wars," November 11 might still be called Armistice Day -- but shortly after the holiday was proclaimed, World War II broke out in Europe and shattered that dream. More than 16 million Americans served during World War II and more

than 400,000 died in service during that period. The families and friends longed for a way to honor their memory -- to honor veterans of all wars.

Legislation was introduced and in 1954 President Eisenhower signed the bill proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day, and he called for Americans everywhere to rededicate themselves to the cause of peace.

Additional significance was added to Veterans Day in 1958 when two more unidentified war dead -- one from World War II and the other from the Korean Conflict -- were brought to Arlington National Cemetery from overseas and buried beside the World War I soldier.

On Memorial Day 1984, an unidentified American War dead from the Vietnam War was interred alongside the other unidentified dead at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

original document, the Bill of Rights, and the additional amendments. It protects our fundamental rights and allows for changes when needed. As I enter the adult world and work force, I must uphold these precious laws that have protected us so dearly for over 200 years.

Our Constitution assures and protects criminals with the right to a fair trial with an attorney. The Constitution gives all citizens freedom of religion, speech, petition, assembly and press. It also protects us from anything threatening to take away those rights. We must protect our Constitution, likewise, by preventing the degradation of this great document.

I and every other American can uphold our Constitution by exercising the privilege that was granted to me in 1920 through the Nineteenth Amendment. I not only have the right to vote, but I will consider it my duty to vote once I reach eighteen years of age. No citizen in this country should fail to vote. Approximately eighty-one million people did not vote in the 1984 presidential elections. (1) Many people do not go to the polls on election day because they are convinced that it makes little difference whether or not they vote. At times it may seem that every vote does not count. One of our greatest statesman of all times, Thomas Jefferson, was elected by a majority of one electoral vote. Every vote counts.

As a citizen I can help preserve my

Constitution and make it real to me by participating in various patriotic activities. Organizations such as the Daughters of the American Revolution are good ways to keep us ever mindful of our American heritage. Participating in patriotic holidays, parades, and celebrations is also a way to focus on our heritage.

Our first procession, or parade, was held on July 4, 1788 to celebrate the ratification of the Constitution. At that time people were rejoicing that the United States had established a new form of government. Today, as an American citizen, I am still celebrating because that same Constitution exists today and has become a model of democracy for the world. For two hundred years our government has derived its strength and endurance from the Constitution, which has lasted longer than any other written Constitution in history.

Tree Picker-Upper

The daily meal of nutrients absorbed by most trees is five times the amount of water an average person draws from his faucet each day.

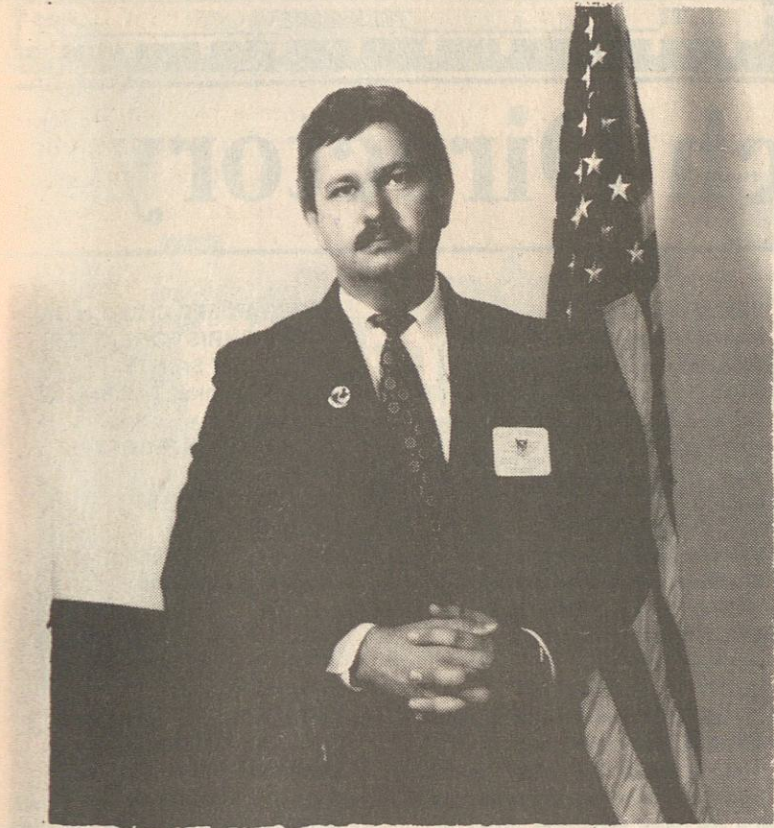

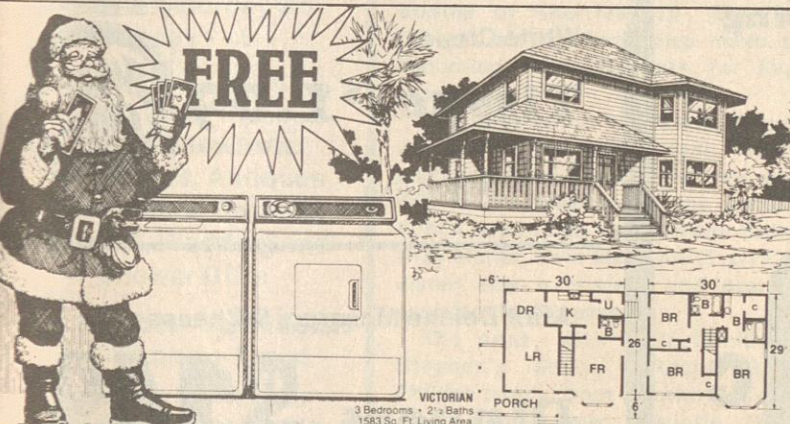

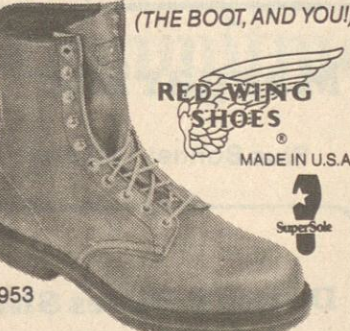

At The Old Courthouse

When I began working at the old courthouse museum, I decided that the first step was to take an inventory. As I documented the collection, I was amazed to catalog over one thousand items. These items represent the historic past of our community and displaying them in our museum will help us preserve the past.

An example of the importance of the preservation work comes in the form of a scrap book kept by Mrs. Lyla McDonald of Iuka. The McDonald home was destroyed in the early 1960's to make room for the present Iuka High School Gym. In cleaning out the house, many papers and articles were thrown into a trash heap to be burned. Mr. James Doan McRae Jr. of Memphis (formerly of Iuka) was visiting his sister, Mrs. Issac Jackson before the McDonald home was to be torn down.

Mrs. Jackson took her brother through the empty McDonald house. Just outside the back door, Mr. McRae found a scrapbook and some old documents on the trash pile to be burned. After briefly fumbling through the pages, he realized the historic significance of the scrapbook and tucked it under his coat. He took it home to Memphis and kept it until August of this year when he donated the scrapbook and articles to the Tishomingo County Courthouse Museum for safekeeping. This treasure chest contains historic information dating back to the settlement of Eastport. Other documents from the Merrill McDonald family date back to 1787. It's rare to find documents as old as the country itself. These are just a few of the items being preserved at the old courthouse. We will be closed this weekend but we will be opened from 8:00 a.m. to 5: p.m. weekdays. Come and see us soon.

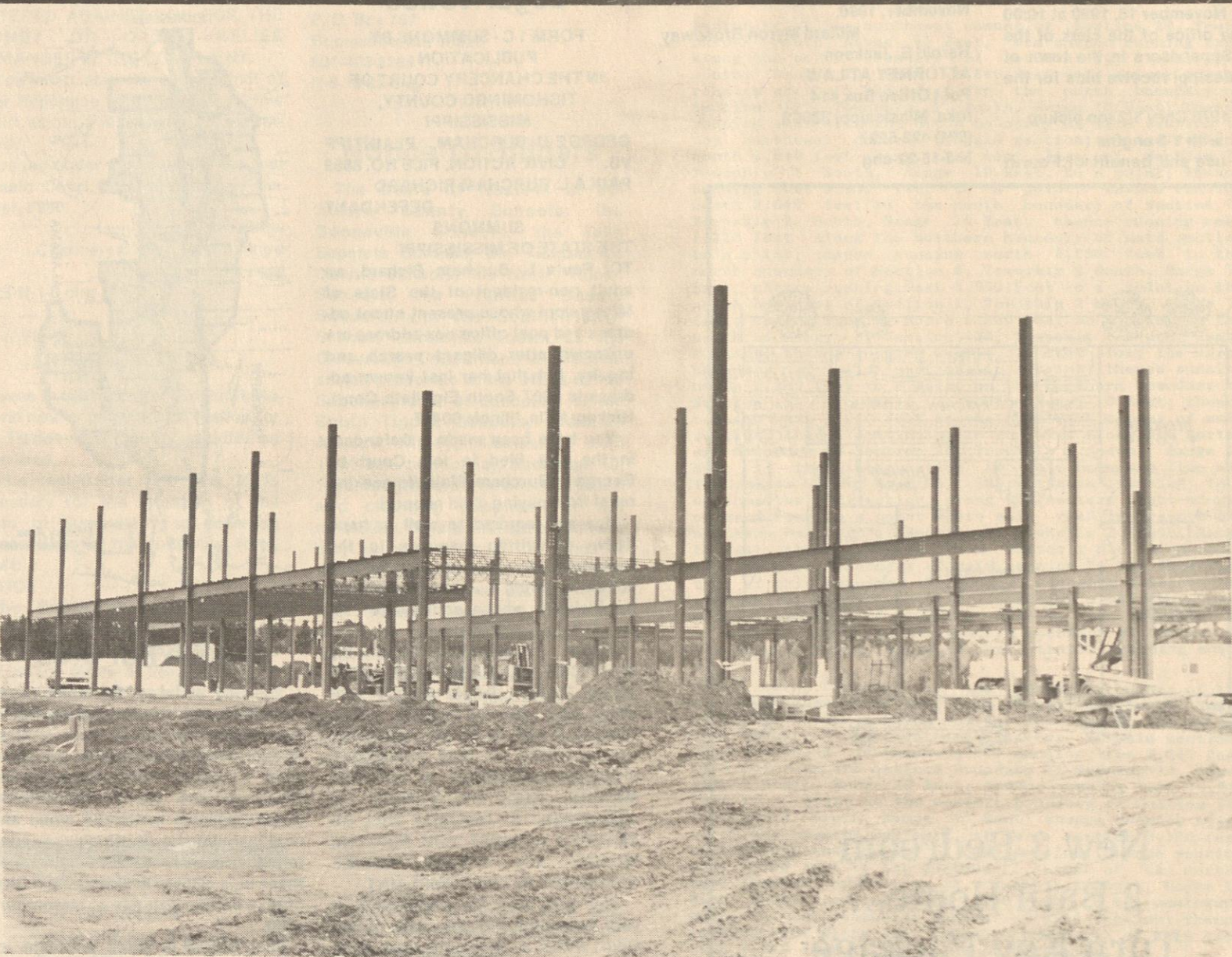

Lands acquired in the State of Alabama will be managed by the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. Lands acquired in the State of Mississippi will be managed by the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks. Both states will manage the lands for fish, wildlife, and other related public recreational use. The Mobile District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is initiating planning actions to acquire approximately 43,000 acres of remaining lands in the area of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, Alabama and Mississippi.

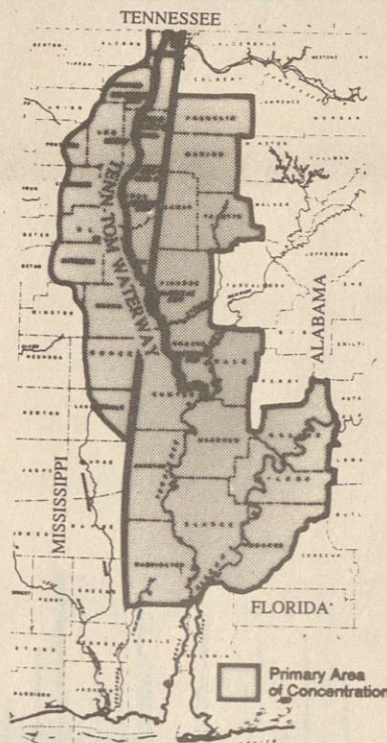

Goat Island Project Receives One Bid

One bid has been submitted to the Tennessee Valley Authority on a proposed marina project at Goat Island.

The project, announced last summer, involves construction, development and operation of a commercial marina on TVA property.

The property is located at the site of the old Goat Island Marina, a 3.8 acre tract with about 1,200 feet of shoreline suitable for marina development.

TVA officials have said that rising costs of fuel and a slump in the economy may have led to the scarcity of bidders on the project. TVA offered a 19-year lease with an initial payment of \$11,000 plus a one-time fee of \$3,500 for administrative cost.

The project would include at least 50 floating boat storage spaces, a floating fuel dock, floating break-water, retail sales area, potable water, public restrooms, five rental boats, and a marine sewage pumpout facility.

TVA promoted the project because of a heavy demand for boat slips on Pickwick Lake and Tennessee River area, TVA officials said.
