Superintendent Sought To Head New School

The search for a superintendent of education to head the new Tishomingo countywide school district is underway, with advertisements being prepared to recruit the new administrator.

School officials hope to have the new superintendent in office by the end of January, said Robert Grisham, city school board member.

City and county school board members, in a joint meeting, passed a resolution Monday night establishing that the existing city, county, and the new countywide board of trustees will all take part in the interview and search process. The superintendent will not be elected without a majority vote of each of the three boards voting as separate entities, Grisham explained. Terms of the new administrator's employment, salary, and compensation will also be decided by the three boards in the same manner, the resolution stated.

Advertisements for the position will be placed in national education publications as well as statewide publications, Grisham said.

Some of the qualifications to be considered for the new superintendent include holding or eligibility to hold a Mississippi AAA administrative certificate, at least 5 years administrative experience, some district-level experience, graduate credits, minimum of 3 years in classroom teaching experience, and 2 years serving as principal.

A letter has been submitted by school officials to the state Attorney

General's office requesting responses to several questions on the hiring of the superintendent, Grisham said.

Members of the new consolidated school board have been meeting with the existing city and county boards to become oriented with the project before they take office on July 1, Grisham said. Three of the five new trustees are completely new board members, while two are currently existing board members.

An information letter has been prepared by both boards for all administrators, faculty, and personnel of the two districts to explain the hiring process for the new district and the timeframe for the consolidation to take effect.

All current teachers will be asked to reapply for their positions in the new school district, Grisham said. None will be terminated, he added.

School officials hope to have prin-

cipals employed by mid-February, and all faculty in place by April 1, Grisham said.

Cutbacks in the budget for the new magnet high school under construction have also been a topic of discussion in weekly school board meetings.

The cost overrun for the school has been scaled back to about \$1.5 million, Grisham said. Some of the items altered to trim the budget were changes in the electrical system, floor surfaces, parking lot lighting, and reduction of various accessories and equipment, he said.

Suggestions are being sought by both school boards for a name of the new magnet high school, the school colors, and the school mascot. Proposals should be submitted to the Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority (MEIA), P.O. Box 272, Iuka, Ms. 38852, by December 30.

SWEET POTATOES WITH APPLES

4 delicious apples, peeled, halved, cored and very thinly sliced lengthwise

4 teaspoons lemon juice
1/2 cup apple juice or cider

2 pounds sweet potatoes or yams, peeled, halved and very thinly sliced
4 teaspoons butter or margarine, melted

Toss the apple slices with the lemon juice. In a 1 1/2 quart baking dish or casserole, arrange layers of the potatoes and apples. Save the most attractive potato slices for the top layer, arranging them in a pin-wheel design.

Pour the apple juice or cider and melted butter or margarine over all. Cover the casserole and bake it in a preheated 350 degree oven for one hour. Uncover it, and bake it for another 15 minutes. About 200 calories per serving (1/2 cup). (Some sweet potato casseroles have as many as 600 calories per serving.)

BUCKLE UP FOR CHRISTMAS TRAVEL

Just some thoughts about child safety seats and using seat belts as we approach this busy season with so many of us traveling to visit family and friends.

As a 4-H agent, I don't often get the opportunity to work with infants and toddlers, but I'm concerned about their safety and welfare. I want all Tishomingo County children to grow up to be healthy 4-H members.

Each year, hundreds of babies and toddlers are killed and thousands are seriously injured in accidents while riding in motor vehicles. All states

GETTING THE RED OUT

Many people are concerned about red or "bloodshot" eyes, particularly since we are exposed to a great deal of advertising that implies that red eyes are a common and significant problem. The fact is that we all have small blood vessels in the membrane that covers the white of our eyes. In some people they are more pronounced than in others, making their eyes look redder. Your eyes can also become redder than is normal for you as a result of smoking, late hours, air pollutants, drinking, or long, strenuous use. In such cases, eliminating the cause will eliminate the problem.

There are no over-the-counter medicines that you need ever buy for red eyes. Such drops contain very weak decongestants, which constrict your eye blood vessels slightly for a few minutes -- an nothing more. Either you do not need any medication at all for your eyes or you have a medical eye problem, in which case you need your doctor's advice and a prescription from him.

safety seats is improper anchorage of the seat to the car. Users should follow manufacturers' instructions to the letter.

Not all models fit in all cars. So when buying, test the seat in your car with your child to be sure you've got the right one. If you have two cars, the seat that fits fine in one might not be suitable in the other. You could only use the one car for transporting your children or have suitable seats in both--but don't try to make seats do in both cars if they don't fit both.

Don't thread the car's safety belt through the lowest section of the seat frame. Routing it higher up will keep the seat from tipping forward in a crash. Take up slack in the car's safety belt.

Keep harnesses fastened snugly. Readjust straps each time you place a child in the seat, seeing that the webbing lies flat and isn't twisted.

Use only manual lap belts to secure seats. Automatic safety belts are not designed for use with child restraints.

Another thought to keep in mind is that children learn by example. Be sure you buckle up yourself after you've buckled your children in.

Mississippi Department Of Wildlife, Fisheries & Parks

State deer hunters will be going to the woods for one day in search of either-sex deer on Saturday, December 22 in all 82 counties and on the following wildlife management areas: Bucatunna, Chickasawhay, Lost River, Little Biloxi, Old River, Pearl River, Red Creek and Wolf River.

All U.S. Forest Service and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers lands in the following counties are excluded: Benton, Calhoun, De Soto, Grenada, Lafayette, Marshall, Panola, Tate, Tippah, Tunica, and Yalobusha.

Shooting hours for deer are one half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset. Hunters must have a valid hunting license signed and on their person before going to the woods.

State law requires that all deer hunters must wear in plain view 500 square inches of unbroken, hunter orange material.

Farmers Home Administration

FmHA--MONEY AVAILABLE FOR FINANCING HOUSING!!!

Billy D. McClure, County Supervisor for Tishomingo County with the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), states that funds are now available to finance housing loans for low income families.

FmHA makes loans to finance the purchase of existing dwellings, purchase of a lot and costs of construction of a dwelling on it, and/or cost of construction of a dwelling on a presently owned building site.

To be eligible for an FmHA loan, McClure said applicants must be without decent, safe, and sanitary housing. They must be unable to obtain the needed credit from other lenders on reasonable rates and terms. However, he added that applicants must have adequate income to meet the normal living expenses, pay real estate taxes and insurance, and be able to repay the mortgage.

Example: A couple with two children making \$18,000.00 income per year, qualified for a \$38,000.00 loan, using average costs for insurance and taxes with repayment terms over 33 years at 9 % interest, would pay approximately \$249.00 per month.

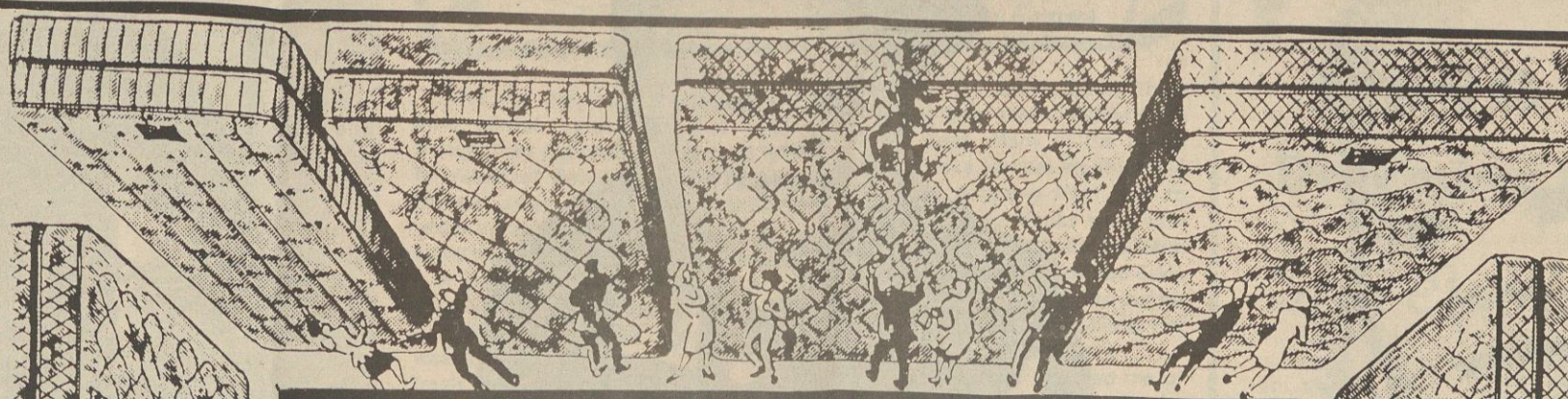

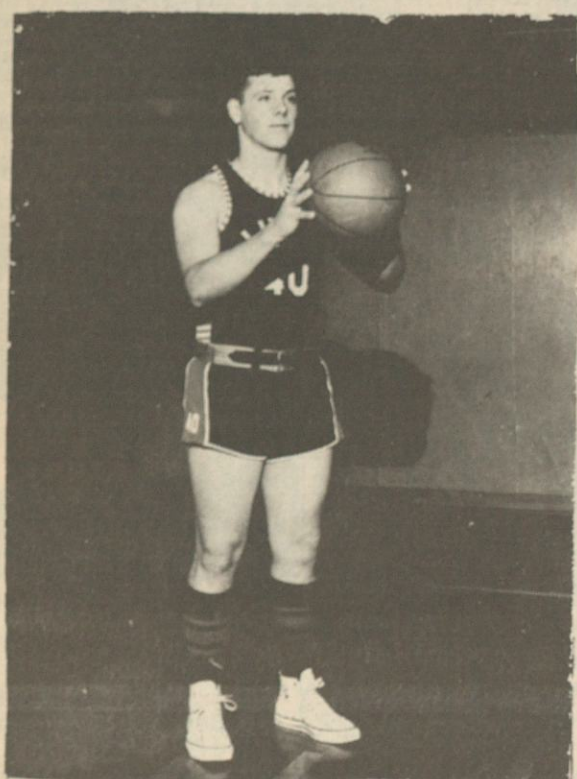

CATTLE ON LICE REPORT

Cattle can become infested with
biting, sucking lice in winter because
these insects thrive in those conditions.
They easily grasp the thick,
long coats cattle develop to keep
warm.

Lice are prevalent on poorly fed
and poorly housed animals. Keep
livestock in top physical condition,
and make sure barns are clean, well-
ventilated and roomy.

Insecticide sprays are more effective
than dusts to control lice. Spray
animals until they are soaked, and
repeat application in two to three
weeks, if necessary.

Clean and spray barns with the
same insecticide, but be careful not
to contaminate feed and water. And
don't house untreated animals with
treated ones. That will only encourage
infestation of the whole herd.

HOGGING THE BARN

Good management practices to
control lice and mange are also
necessary for hog producers in
Tishomingo County.

Many insecticides are available to
control hog lice and mange.
Producers can choose from sprays,
dusts, pour-on liquids and bedding
treatments.

Sprays are most effective when
applied with a power sprayer large
enough to wet the hog. Use them on
warm, sunny days so the animals will
dry rapidly.

Dusts are cost-effective if only a
few hogs need to be treated. Pour-
ons and bedding treatments are
alternatives when sprays are not
practical.

Slaughter restrictions may vary according
to product, application,
animal age and animal health. Read
labels before doing anything else.

Safety In Holiday Baking

Many Mississippians have started
their holiday baking, stockpiling fruit
cakes and other goodies for the hordes
of family and friends who appear
this time of year.

But many of the most delectable
dishes contain one of the state's most
plentiful -- and potentially dangerous --
food items: eggs.

Stressing that the damages can be
averted by proper handling and
cooking, the Mississippi State Department
of Health recommends that
cooks take special precautions this
year when preparing egg dishes or
dishes including eggs in the recipe,
especially uncooked eggs.

"The U.S. Food and Drug Administration
has placed eggs on the potentially hazardous
foods list," said State Epidemiologist Dr. Ed
Thompson. "They've done this because
Salmonella has been found in eggs,
primarily in those produced in the
northeast section of the United States."

Salmonella is the bacteria which
causes the disease salmonellosis.
Symptoms include headaches, abdominal
pain, diarrhea, nausea, and vomiting.
In severe cases, salmonellosis may
cause dehydration. These effects occur
within six to 72 hours after exposure,
generally 12 to 36 hours, and can last
from 24 hours to several days.

Other foods people eat daily -- such
as beef, pork, and milk -- are also considered
potentially hazardous by the FDA. This
warning doesn't mean the food can't be
consumed, but consumers and restaurateurs
should pay strict attention to proper
cooking and serving guidelines.

MSDH is updating state food
sanitation codes to correspond with
new FDA guidelines. The Sanitation
Division is notifying restaurants and
other food service establishments
statewide, and plans to request
regulation changes from the State
Board of Health.

"We haven't seen any outbreaks of
egg-related salmonella in Mississippi
yet," said Doctor Thompson. "But that
doesn't mean we're not at risk."
The Centers for Disease Control (CDC)
has advised FDA that the

problem is not longer regional but
national in scope. Though Mississippi
eggs have yet to be associated
with the disease, not all eggs consumed
in the state are produced here,
since brokers fill their orders from
eggs produced throughout the country.

Consumers should observe the
following cooking and handling
guidelines to insure safe the healthy
eating: * Avoid serving raw eggs
and food containing raw eggs. This
includes Caesar salad, uncooked
hollandaise or bearnaise sauce, non-
commercial mayonnaise or egg nog,
and ice cream mix. Use only
"cooked" recipes of these dishes.

* Cook eggs and foods containing
eggs thoroughly. Whole eggs meet
necessary time temperature
requirements for safety when they
are cooked until the white is set and
the yolk is beginning to thicken. Cook
scrambled eggs until firm.

Cornell University, the American
Egg Board, and Egg Nutrition Center
recommend the following cooking
times:

SCRAMBLED - 1 minute at a
cooking surface temperature of 250
degrees F.

POACHED - 5 minutes in boiling
water

SUNNYSIDE - 7 minutes at a cooking
surface temperature of 250 degrees
F, or cook covered 4 minutes at 250
degrees F.

FRIED, OVER EASY - 3 minutes at a
cooking surface temperature of 250
degrees F on one side, then turn the
egg and fry for another 2 minutes on
the other side

SOFT-COOKED - 7 minutes in
boiling water

* Realize that serving lightly
cooked foods containing eggs -- such
as meringues and French toast -- may
be particularly risky for people with
weakened immune systems and other
high-risk groups.

* Use grade AA or A eggs with
clean, uncracked shells. Buy only the
amount needed for a prompt turnover
time in your refrigerator and practice
"first in first out" egg rotation. Use
the expiration date on each carton to
insure that the oldest eggs are used
first.

* Leave eggs in their original
container. Refrigerate as soon as they
are delivered, and keep refrigerated no
higher than 40 but not below 30
degrees F. Do not wash eggs before
storing or using them.

* Use shell eggs within two to
three weeks of purchase. Use leftover
Never leave them out of refrigeration
for more than two hours. Use hard-
cooked eggs within a week of
cooking.

* Serve cooked eggs and egg-rich
food immediately after cooking, or
refrigerate at once for serving later.
When refrigerating, take precautions
to insure the item will cool quickly
(i.e. shallow dish, several small dishes)

Pharmacy & Your Health

Sore Throat: A Common Complaint

One of the most common complaints
heard by pharmacists and
physicians is sore throat. According
to a recent report, 8 out of 10
people get at least one sore throat
each year. Causes of sore throat
include smoke, pollen, pollution,
and dust. Frequently sore throats
are associated with colds or other
upper respiratory problems that
clear up in a few days without
treatment.

Less often sore throat is caused
by beta hemolytic streptococci
("strep throat"). Strep throat
infections, if left untreated, can lead
to rheumatic fever and heart damage
in children. For this reason, it
is good for children with sore
throats lasting for more than 4 to 5
days to be seen by a physician.
Treatment with antibiotic medicines
can clear strep throat infection.

Minor sore throat pain often
can be relieved with nonprescription
medicines. Topical sprays may
help give immediate relief. Throat
drops and hard candy often soothe
a dry, scratchy throat by improving
saliva production. Cough drops
and liquid medicines may suppress
the urge to cough. A nose drop or
spray may help reduce nasal congestion
and secretions that flow
into the throat, one of the causes of
sore throat. A nondrug approach to
sore throat pain is to gargle with
warm salt water every thirty to
forty minutes.

POWERLESS TO HELP

With cold weather approaching, it's
possible we might experience an ice
storm in Tishomingo County. Most of
you know what trouble an ice storm
brings, particularly if the electricity
goes off and stays off.

Cooking and eating habits have to
change during a power failure. There
is no heat or refrigeration, and water
is limited. Health risks from contaminated
or spoiled food increase.

If the power goes off, there are
several ways to cook food. Thread
food on skewers and use the
fireplace as a grill. Or, wrap food in
foil and cook it in the hot coals.

Food can also be placed in cast
iron or heavy aluminum cookware and
cooked in the fireplace.

Outdoor grills are good to use
during emergencies, but put them in

areas where air can circulate. Fuel-
burning camp stoves and charcoal
burners are other cooking alternatives.
Fumes from outdoor grills, stoves
and burners are dangerous if inhaled,
so be careful when using them.

Winter is the time of year when
beef producers in Tishomingo County
should think about buying bulls for
1991. Selection and purchase of a bull
are important because the bull's offspring
are the genetic future of the herd.

A better bull is the most practical
approach to improving quality and
performance in beef herds, so get out
the thinking cap and start asking
questions: "What type bull do I
want?"

*Where and when should I buy?
*How much should I pay?

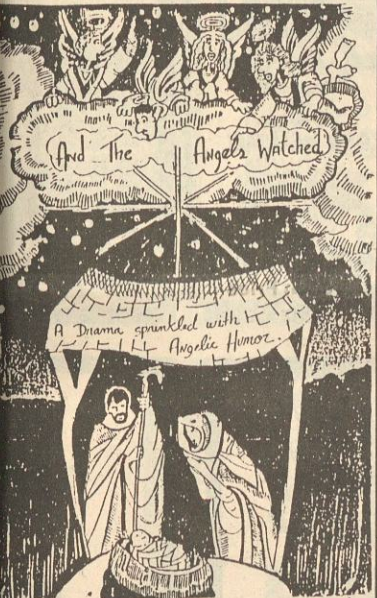

Stories From Our Nation's Past

On a Poor Farm Near Iuka

by Charles C. Cresap

I was born and raised in northeast Mississippi on a poor farm near Iuka. Iuka was a small one-bank, two-cotton-gin town.

I was 12 years old in 1929 when cotton, our only cash crop, dropped from forty-five cents per pound in 1928 to five cents per pound, so we learned to live without money. We had cows, hogs, chickens and more vegetables than we could eat. My mother and three or four aunts who lived within 10 miles could set a Sunday smorgasbord that would beat Western Sizzlin by a city block. The food was high in fat and cholesterol but the government didn't tell us, that it was not good for us and apparently it didn't hurt, as I burned it up walking 30 miles per day six days a week behind a pair of mules in the cotton and corn fields. And that good rich food seemed to agree with me as by the time I was 15 years old I was over 6' tall even with enough turned down to fill a size 13 shoe.

The Iuka Guaranty Bank opened in 1912 with \$15,000.00 in capital. It has never been closed except for overnight and I saw recently where its capital now exceeds \$100,000,000.00. Still same ownership, two and three generations later. It had a net increase in assets in 1932 even though most all banks in the surrounding area went broke. In 1933 when Mr. Roosevelt ordered all banks closed, the Iuka Bank closed at the regular closing time on March 4 and even though it did not open on March 5, Mr. Gaines, the banker, was sitting out front in a borrowed seven-passenger Buick full of money, doing banking as usual. He advised depositors that they could draw out their money if they wanted to and some did but most of them brought it back later.

I finished Iuka High School in the spring of 1938 with a class of 15 and one of the original founders of the bank told me that he would lend me \$350.00 if I wanted to go to college. I took him up on the offer and haven't lived there since. I entered Mississippi State College in the fall of '38 and although I worked more than I went to school, I graduated in the spring of 1942 with a B.S. degree and joined the United States Marine Corps. By that time my college loan was up to \$450.00 and I had agreed to pay it back at the rate of \$25.00 per month. And I never missed a month making my payment. That's when a Private First Class made \$54.00 per month less \$7.20 for National Service Life Insurance. So I think it's a disgrace that so many today refuse to repay their loans and it's a much worse disgrace that our government chooses to let them get away with it and just pass it on to the taxpayers, most of whom have already paid off their loans.

One of the good lessons that we learned from the depression was that although we were living in poverty, we didn't know it since the government wasn't always telling us where the poverty line was. And since we were living better than the average in our area, we thought we were doing good and that's what counts.

The meeting was called to order by Nancy Daugherty, president, who led the members in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

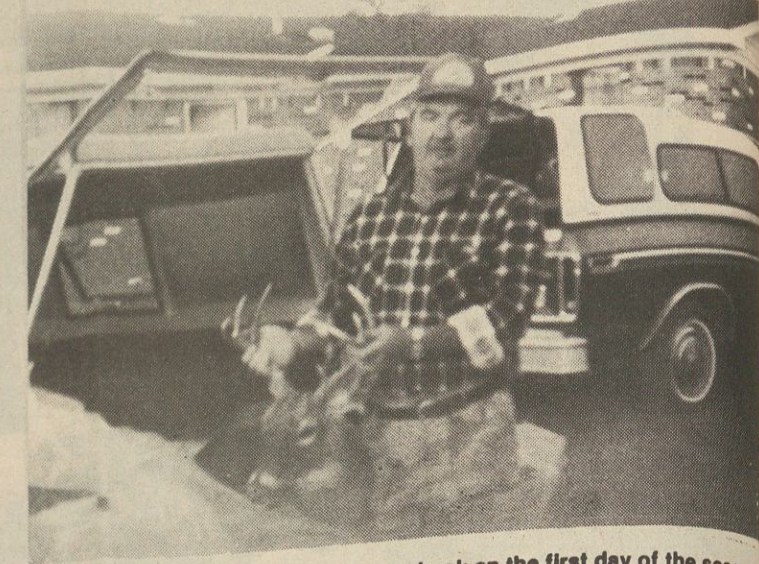

Iuka School District Receives Accreditation

The Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District has been accepted as an accredited member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

The accreditation will be followed by a study in five years, and the district will have to update the accreditation in 10 years, Stone said.

won the recognition, including Tupelo, Corinth, Amory, New Albany, Oxford, and Aberdeen.

1990 WHEAT, BARLEY, OATS PRODUCERS TO RECEIVE PAYMENTS

Approximately \$1.743 billion in deficiency and 0/92 payments will be made to eligible producers of the 1990 wheat, barley and oats crops, according to Keith Bjerke, executive vice president of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation.

Barley producers will receive about \$35 million and oats producers about \$8 million.

Bjerke said the payments will be in cash through Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices.

Deficiency payments are made under the 1990 wheat, barley and oats programs when the national weighted average market prices received by producers during the first five months of the marketing year (June through October) are below established "target" price levels.

Deficiency payment rates are based upon the difference between

the target price for the commodity and the higher of the five-month average market price or the basic loan rate.

Eligible producers will receive a payment as shown in the following table: Calculation of 5-Month Deficiency Payment Rates

Advance payment rates were reduced by 2.33 cents for wheat and 2 cents for barley. Oats producers did not receive an advance but their payment rate will be reduced by 1.22 cents. These reductions were required by the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989. All deficiency payments will be reduced by 1.4 percent as required by the Balanced Budget Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (Gramm-Rudman Hollings).

Producers who enrolled in the wheat, barley and oats 0/92 programs were guaranteed a minimum payment rate of \$0.90 per bushel for wheat and \$0.26 for barley. Oats producers did not receive a guaranteed rate less any advance in 0/92 payments they have already received.

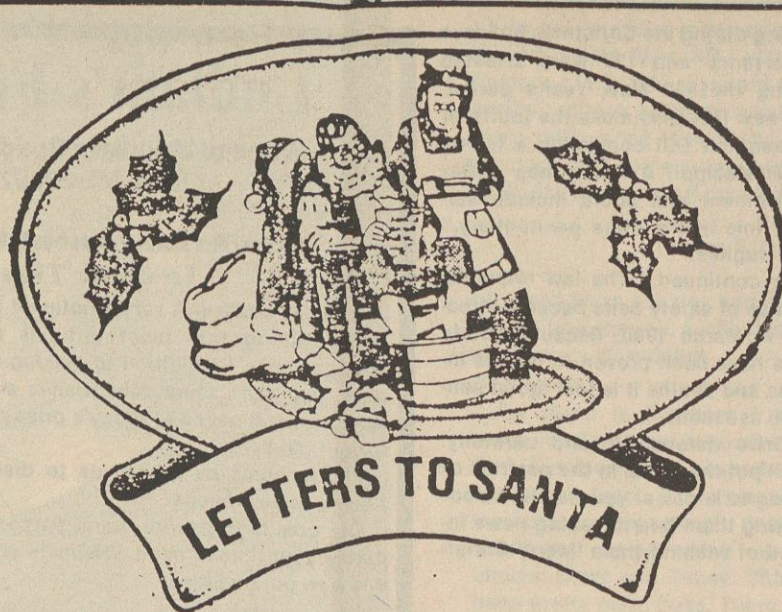

Public Safety News

Flashing blue lights in your rear-view mirror during the Christmas holidays won't be Santa's sled bringing you a sack full of goodies. Flashing blue lights on a Mississippi highway mean that the Mississippi Highway Patrol is on duty to protect the motorists in Mississippi during the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

For 78 hours there will be an increase in patrol manpower to apprehend speed law violators, drunk drivers, reckless drivers and drug traffickers. The patrol will be looking for drivers with expired licenses, expired inspection stickers and expired tags, according to Lt. Col. Billie T. Hughes, chief of the Mississippi Highway Patrol's Uniformed Division. Special funds from the federal government are making it possible for the patrol to add 360 extra manhours to work both the Christmas and New Year holidays.

"Eight persons died on Mississippi roads in the 78-hour Christmas holiday period last year and three were killed during the 78-hour New Year holiday period of 1990," Hughes said. "We hope to start the decade of the '90s with everyone working together for safer driving during the holiday period."

The Christmas holiday period begins 6 p.m. Friday, December 21 and ends Tuesday, December 25 at midnight. Stepped up forces for New Year's will begin at 6 p.m. Friday, December 28 and end at midnight Tuesday, January 1.

"Plan the holidays in advance. If you're going to be drinking be sure to designate a non-drinking person as a driver. Last year 72 people were arrested on the highways for drunken

driving during the Christmas holidays observance and 126 were arrested during the 1990 New Year's period. The new DUI laws make the fourth or subsequent DUI conviction a felony in Mississippi. A felony has stiffer punishment and could include serving time in the state penitentiary," said Hughes.

He continued, "The law requiring the use of safety belts became effective in March 1990. Because safety belts have been proven to reduce injuries and deaths it is just 'good sense' to use them.

"Drive defensively and carefully. Don't put the patrol in the position of having to knock at your family's door to bring them heartbreaking news instead of wishing them 'Merry Christmas'."

Rumored Corps Land Buy
By: Dan Cimaro

There is a project currently being undertaken that should be of interest to sportsmen and some landowners. The past, inquiries have been received at the Bay Springs, Columbus, and Tom Beville Resource Offices located on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. In general the callers indicated that they heard that the Corps of Engineers was in the market for real estate. Well this time the rumors are true if the proposed sale property meets certain criteria.

Maybe a little background information would help:
During the construction of the 234-mile Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, the Corps of Engineers, with authorization from Congress, is going to replace that lost habitat. This process is termed "Mitigation", or, easing the severity of something; in this case easing the severity of the lost habitat. Public Law 99-662 of November 17, 1986 authorizes the purchase from willing sellers of 20,000 acres to replace that lost habitat. Of this 20,000 acres shall be acquired in the Mobile-Tensaw Delta in Alabama and 25,000 acres in Mississippi's Pascagoula, Pearl, and Mississippi River Deltas. The remaining 43,000 acres may be acquired in Mississippi and Alabama preferably along the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. Emphasis will be placed on flood plain forests and bottomland hardwood sites.

Factors that will be used to evaluate lands include:
1. Do the lands contain bottomland hardwoods?
2. Are they forested flood plains?
3. Are they easily accessible?
4. What is the tract's distance from current state or federal wildlife management areas?
5. What is the area's wildlife habitat suitability?

Once the property has been purchased, the lands will be managed by

the appropriate state wildlife department with all development and management costs to be reimbursed by the Corps of Engineers.

The Government WILL NOT condemn any property for this mitigation effort. The only lands bought will be from willing sellers. If you have land that you wish to sell, mail the Corps a copy of your deed and, if possible, plat maps. Each tract will be evaluated by a team from the Corps, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the state wildlife department of the affected state. The evaluation team will inspect the property for its suitability. If the team approves the tract, appraisers shall be sent to assess the fair market value. If the price is not acceptable to the owner, the owner is under no obligation to sell. The Corps will pay for the closing costs but will not pay for any liens on the property. Approximately 10,000 acres have so far been purchased in the Mobile-Tensaw Delta from willing sellers.

SCB Introduces New Billing Service For Customer Convenience

South Central Bell is introducing a new billing service that allows customers to place collect or third-number-billed calls through an automated system.

The system, available after December 6, can be used to place collect calls and calls billed to a third number, as long as the calls are local, or in the same South Central Bell calling zone.

Using a Touch-Tone phone, customers dial '0' plus the number they're calling. After a tone, if a calling card number is not input, the customer is instructed to enter the digits '1-1' to place a collect call, the billing number for calls billed to a third number, or '0' to talk to an operator.

A South Central Bell operator is always available for assistance or to place a different type of call. Person-to-person calls still require operator assistance.

Sooner Or Later, The New Madrid Will Quake

So it didn't happen. A major earthquake did not strike along the New Madrid fault on December 2nd or 3rd.

But a major tremor is expected to hit the area within the next 20 years -- and emergency precautions for such an event must not be forgotten, a professor at the University of Southern Mississippi contends.

Dr. David Patrick, an engineering geologist and chairman of the Geology Department at USM (601 266-4530), agrees with other scientists that, sooner or later, the New Madrid fault zone will experience seismic activity that may cause major damage at points along and on either side of a roughly defined line from Cairo, Ill., to Marked Tree, Ark.

"At this time, it's important to realize that the New Madrid is an active zone," Patrick said. "It's going to happen, and the plans that have been made should not be thrown out the window on December 5."

"The last real big ones (New Madrid area earthquakes) happened from December 1811 to February 1812," he said. "Three or more were major earthquakes and there were hundreds of other small quakes during that time."

"It is estimated -- over a given period of time -- that there is a 50-50 chance over the next 15 to 20 years of a 7.0 (Richter Scale) earthquake in the New Madrid zone," Patrick added, noting the difficulties in making accurate predictions of the specific size, location and time of such geologic events.

The New Madrid zone seems to experience activity every 100 years, or so, and Patrick said that a "return period" of that seismic involvement appears to be due.

Patrick said that although New Mexico climatologist Iben Browning's prediction of the December 2-3 New Madrid quake was based on global tidal stresses, many scientists do not believe that the combined gravitational pull of the sun and moon is strong enough to influence the earth's solid rock structures.

The USM geologist said that relatively little is known about the New Madrid fault zone because it is deep underground, area quakes are not common and there is a lack of information on quakes in the area. By contrast, some California faults are visible on the surface and they have been the subject of scientific research for a number of years, he said.

Patrick said the southern half of Mississippi would not be devastated by a strong New Madrid quake, but north Mississippi could expect moderate to severe damage. Major damage occurs at the center of a quake and diminishes as energy is released out through the earth's geologic formations, he said.

Ask Ochsner

Q. Every year when we bring in our Christmas tree, my child starts to cough, wheeze and complain of tightness in the chest. Could the tree be causing her asthmatic symptoms and should we buy an artificial tree instead of a live tree?

A. "What often happens with Christmas trees purchased from commercial tree lots is that the trees have been cut in advance, then packed and transported and left outdoors for a long period of time in

humidity, encouraging the growth of mold spores. These mold spores are what usually provokes the allergic reactions many people have to the Christmas trees," said Carolyn B. Daul, M. D., allergist and immunologist with Ochsner Clinic. "The trees then, in effect, become a hot house for mold spores, particularly in the Gulf South climate."

"When the tree is brought into the house, spores are still active from an allergen standpoint and this is aggravated by the water used to preserve the longevity of the tree," Daul said.

"As lights and decorations are placed on the tree, the mold spores are stirred up, invariably creating allergic responses to these in the vicinity who suffer from allergies to these substances. All it takes is a slight provocation to make an allergic person react to these mold spores," Daul said.

The allergy and asthma specialist said that even though mold spores are still present in trees growing in cut-and-choose lots, the level of spores is usually not as great, since the trees are not cut and transported over a long period of time. But she cautions that the spores can still provoke allergy attacks.

"If there is really a problem with mold spores, the best thing is to get an artificial tree," Daul said. "This also holds true for pine boughs and garlands used for home decorating. In fact, the pine smell itself can provoke symptoms since an irritant reaction can occur as a result from the odor."

"Any pungent odor can be an irritant reaction and such odors are prevalent at holiday time."

"Scented candles, potpourri and similar substances can create irritant and asthmatic reactions in persons who suffer from allergies. It is akin to indoor air pollution and provokes unpleasant reactions in these patients. Quite often, they are the same persons who have irritant reactions to certain perfumes," Daul said.

Decorations of dried flowers are not as offensive to allergy sufferers, according to Daul, because they rarely emit an aroma. Live plants associated with the holidays, such as poinsettias, are also generally safe since they produce relatively small amounts of pollen, but if they are watered too often, mold spores can grow in the soil, sometimes creating problems for allergy sufferers.

"If a child or other family member has a pattern of becoming sick, particularly with allergic and/or asthmatic symptoms, around the

holidays, pay particular attention to whether these symptoms occur when the tree is brought into the house. If so, purchase an artificial one and start a new, healthier family tradition," Daul said.

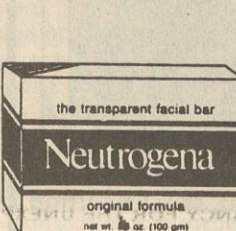

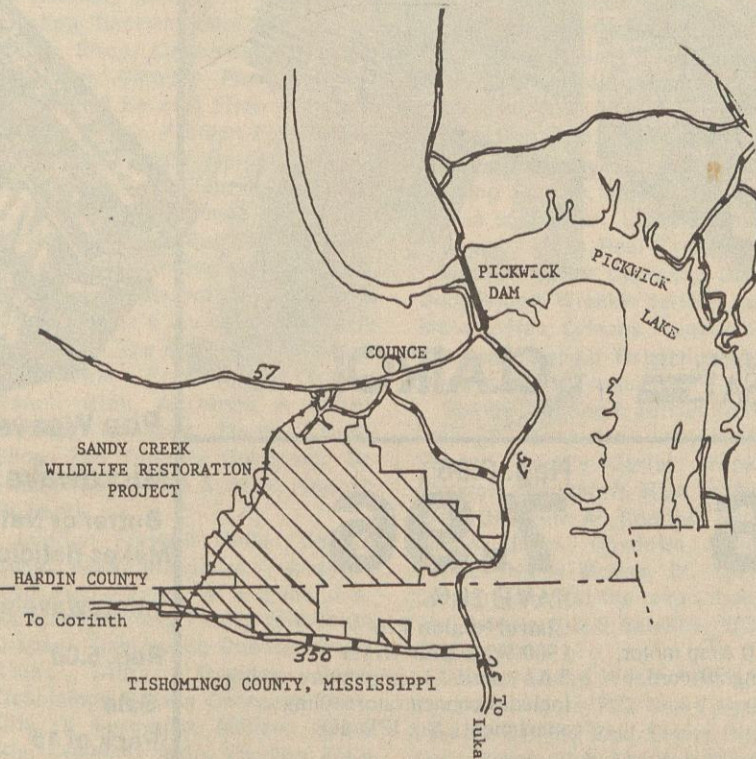

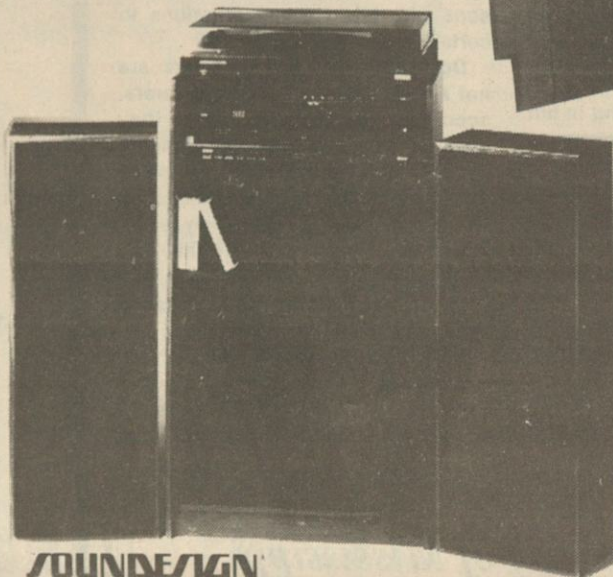
