





Spring Registration Set At NEMCC

New Phone Service For Belmont & B'ville

A new kind of South Central Bell telephone service will bring a larger local calling area to Belmont and Burnsville customers beginning December 15.

"The Area Calling Plan (ACP) is an optional service that gives subscribers more control over their local telephone bills and provides local calling to locations now considered long distance." Tom Bailey, district manager, said.

As a part of the recent Public Service Commission (PSC) order requiring South Central to reduce rates in Mississippi by \$22.8 million, the Area Calling Plan was changed from a 22-mile to a 30-mile plan. For Belmont customers, that means calls to Fulton, Fairview, Mantachie, Tremont, Baldwyn, Booneville, Guntown, Rienze, Saltillo and Tupelo will now be local calls and can be reached by dialing only seven digits. The expanded area for Burnsville will include Corinth, Rienze, Booneville

and Baldwyn. "The Area Calling Plan is an exciting benefit of the advance technology we placed in Belmont and Burnsville in November," Bailey said. "It's a flexible, practical way to price local service, and it recognizes the ties that Belmont and Burnsville citizens have with nearby locations that are now long distance." Area Calling Plan residence customers will pay a basic line charge that is \$5.15 less than the current flat-rate charge in Belmont and Burnsville, plus low, additional charges for each local call. "The plan give you more control over your bill, because, if you call less, you pay less," Bailey said. "And, charges for calls to the nearest locations will be capped at a maximum monthly amount of \$15.00, regardless of how many calls you make to these locations."

For Area Calling Plan Subscribers, calls to nearby locations will be priced at lower, local rates. For

example, the current charge for a 5minute daytime call from Belmont to Tupelo is \$1.53 at regular long distance rates. Under the Area Calling Plan, the same call will cost only .37 cents. Also, a 5-minute daytime call from **Burnsville to Corinth would cost .98** cents at current rates, but will cost only .22 cents at Area Calling Plan rates.

ACP requires an individual line, but Bailey suggested that party-line customers also consider the benefit of the Area Calling Plan for them.

"A two-party customer in Belmont or Burnsville, who pays \$11.36 each month for local service can subscribe to ACP for \$10.00 per month plus usage," Bailey said. "By moving to

ACP, customers will have the benefit of a private line -- and be able to make local calls to areas that used to be long distance."

For multi-line business customers who choose ACP, the charge for hunting service will be reduced by 20%. Hunting service allows incoming calls to find an open line automatically.

Belmont and Burnsville customers will receive complete information about ACP in the mail during Decem-

"The Area Calling Plan is a great example of how advanced technology can make telephone service more flexible and useful, while keeping it affordable," Bailey said. "With the reduction in monthly access charge for ACP, the increased number of locations that are local calls, and the reduction in zone charges, I believe the new ACP will offer something for everyone in Belmont and Burnsville."

To sign up for ACP, residence customers may call 1 + 557-6500. Business customers may call 1 + 557-6000. There is no charge for these

Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

How Common is B-12 Deficiency?

My doctor gives me a B-12 shot every month. Three of my friends also receive B-12 from different doctors. Do most elderly persons need B-12?

According to the medical journal American Family Physician, it is estimated that 3 to 10 percent of persons over age 65 have low blood levels of vitamin B-12. The actual B-12 deficiency in the elderly and in the general population is unknown. Some physicians believe that many elderly persons benefit from B-12 and give many patients this vitamin. Others suggest use of the vitamin only when laboratory tests indicate low levels.

Deficiencies most often are caused by lack of a material in the gastrointestinal (GI) tract which is responsible for B-12 absorption or by a decreased ability to absorb materials from the GI tract. The vitamin typically is given by injection. Because the vitamin stays in the body for a long time, monthly injections usually are satisfactory. (It takes five years to deplete all B-12 from the body.)

Symptoms of B-12 deficiency include but are not limited to fatigue, listlessness, anorexia, lightheadedness, and difficult breathing. Weight loss, inflammation of the tongue, and even congestive heart failure may be present. Psychiatric problems, such as hallucinations and depression, can occur.

MS. House OF Representatives

Education, economic development and drug abuse will be among the key topics again in the 1991 legislative session but the dark financial clouds hanging over the state may be the overriding concern of most lawmakers.

The 90-day session begins at noon Tuesday, January 8, with final adjournment set for April 7. It will be the fourth and final regular session of the current four-year term.

Mississippi, like many states, is tinued slump in corporate tax collections and compounded by economic uncertainty related to the Persian Gulf crisis. With a projected shortfall of \$105 million in general fund revenues for the current fiscal year, funds are expected to be extremely tight again in the coming year. This means the Legislature will be facing some very hard decisions in an election-year session.

In addition to the budget crunch, members of the House of Representatives and Senate may be looking into such diverse areas as federally mandated changes in Medicaid, legislative reapportionment, agricultural programs, workers' vompensation, possible revisions in the gun permit law, prison crowding, industrial development, solid waste

disposal, assisting small businesses, tourism, landlord-tenant rights, helping local governments, with water and sewage problems, and scores of other issues.

Education was a top legislative priority throughout the 1980's and will be again as Mississippi enters the second year of the new decade. Approximately 63 percent of the total general fund budget is earmarked for education at all levels under the budget recommendation prepared for Fiscal Year 1991-1992 by the Joint Legislative Budget Committee. The proposal includes an all-time high of \$818.4 million for general support of public schools, K-12, through the Minium Foundation Program, an increase of \$9.2 million although still less than the Department of Education's request.

All together, the Legislative Budget Committee has recommended an austere general fund budget totaling \$1.987 billion designed to take care of critical needs to the extent possible within existing revenue sources, and to provide priority funding for programs established as legislative priorities in 1990 and previous years. The recommendation includes budget increases of \$40.9 million and reductions of \$71.2 million, or a net decrease of \$30.3 million compared to the \$2.018 billion budget adopted last spring for the current fiscal year.

Proposed increases consist mainly of "Built-in" increases deemed necessary because of state laws or prior legislative commitment, including a \$17.4 million boost of state funding for Medicaid. Among the proposed decreases are \$15 million for general support of the state's universities, \$5 million for community colleges, and \$3.4 million for mental health programs.

The budget proposals also call for experiencing serious money a net cutback of 784 fulltime problems caused largely by a con. positions, most of which are now un-

require legislative action for approval. A separate budget recommendation totaling \$2.135 billion in general funds has been prepared by the Governor's office, including \$149 million in "new" revenues that would take legislative action to become reality. The package contains many of the same items that failed to win final approval during the regular and/or special legislative sessions earlier this year. For example, the biggest single item is an estimated \$65 million from legalizing and taxing video poker machines. A similar proposal died in the Senate, 11-37, in the regular 1990 session.

The House Appropriations Committee got an early start in December toward dealing with the thorny budget problems, bolding a series of presession hearings with officials from the Institutions of Higher Learning, Medicaid Office, Department of Education, and other agencies. The Appropriations Committee also met with the Ways and Means Committee for a joint budget presentation, and the Ways and Means Committee received a detailed briefing on the Governor's revenue package.

Nobody wishes to cut higher education or any other major programs. At the same time, nobody wants to impose higher taxes on the people. The Legislature has successfully avoided a general tax increases since 1985, excluding a minimum hike in fuel taxes in 1987 to help finance the four-lane highway program. However, the general consensus is that extensive budget cuts apparently will be necessary in FY 1992 unless additional revenue is found, and that money will not be available for new programs such as the multi-million dollar education reform package approved last spring by lawmakers but never implemented.

Hundreds of bills already have been prefiled in the House and Senate, and the number will continue to grow after the session begins.

Another effort is expected to pass the wide-ranging drug abuse bill which narrowly failed in 1990 because of House-Senate differences on certain features. Key provisions include tougher penalties for drug offenders, drug testing of public and private employees under certain conditions, expanded drug rehabilitation and education programs, and mandatory suspension of driving privileges for drug violations.

education, Like economic development has been a major priority of the Legislature with special emphasis on expanding present business enterprises as well as stepped-up programs to attract new business. The Department of Economic and Community Development is expected to present a number of additional proposals next year for further expansion.

One of the hotly debated issues in 1990 involved hazardous waste management. The focus may be on nonhazardous solid waste such as ordinary household garbage in the coming session, with local officials across the state facing strict new

Marketing means many things to many people. Producers in the fruit and vegetable industry define marketing as "anything that occurs between variety selection and consumer purchase."

Many people in Tishomingo County grow fruits and vegetables, and they have numerous options within the

framework of this definition. One of those is direct marketing to consumers.

sumers.

Direct marketing can take place on the farm, by the roadside or at the

local farmers' market.

As does everything else, direct marketing has its advantages and disadvantages.

When growers sell direct to consumers, they eliminate grading, packing and storing to produce. Direct marketing also reduces container costs and increases producer control over setting the price. All sales in the direct marketing transaction are cash.

But, direct marketing requires growers to carry liability insurance, which does increase cost of production. Growers must also work longer hours and deal with all kinds of people. They are responsible for bringing customers to the produce instead of bringing the produce to customers.

Plan Your Vacations Now In State Parks

Reservations for vacation cabins at Mississippi State Parks for 1991 will be accepted beginning at 8 a.m. on January 2.

Reservations may be made by contacting the individual park office during regular business hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Cabin reservations are not required but are strongly recommended.

Dr. John King, director of the Division of Parks and Recreation, has listed the rules that apply to cabin reservations:

1. One person may not make reservations for more that five cabins for one date, unless special approval is given by the district manager to accommodate family reunions or similar events.

2. Reservations may be made for only one set of dates at a time.

3. First priority will be given to inperson requests, followed by telephone requests, and letters postmarked after January 1.

Minimum stay for the heavy use season · Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend · is three nights. There is a two-night minimum during other times of the year. Maximum stay during the heavy-use season is 14 days.





Elderly Mississippians may think they are too old to exercise, but the Department of Human Services' Council on Aging advises that, in most cases, it is never too late.

"Exercise is crucial to an older person because physical activity counters many problems of old age," said Council on Aging Director Billie Marshall. But, she cautioned, "older people should be careful when choosing an exercise and should not pick an activity that would add stress to the body, basketball or football, for example, but golf and croquet

Hiccups Treatment: Different Approaches

Almost everyone has experienced hiccups - a sudden contraction of the diaphragm and the muscles responsible for inhaling and exhaling air. If continued for a long period of time, hiccups can be hazardous. Hiccups can become quiet fatiguing and often will prevent sleep. Although there are

various causes of hiccups, one of

the most common is swallowing

hot foods. A number of self-treatments have been suggested for hiccup relief. These include holding one's breath, standing on one's head for a certain length of time, drinking water from the "wrong side" of a cup, slowly taking 9 sips of water, and breathing into a paper bag.

Although there were several studies conducted in the nineteen seventies, little has been written during recent years regarding the evaluation of different hiccup treatments. One study concluded that persons who swallowed a teaspoonful of white granulated sugar often obtained hiccup relief. Varying degrees of success have been achieved with carbon dioxide, quinidine and chlorpromazine. A recent issue of The New England Journal of Medicine reported on hiccups in a boy who had experienced the problem for several years. Immediate relief was achieved with the antidepressant medicine amitriptyline.

ASCS REMINDS FOREIGN INVESTORS OF REPORTING RULE

Phillip Horn, County Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, reminds foreign investors who have bought or sold agricultural land in Tishomingo County to report the transaction within 90 days.

The Agricultural Foregin Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) requires all foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land to report their holdings, acquisitions, dispositions, leases of 10 years or more, and land-use changes to ASCS. "This law is still in effect, and those who fail to report or who are late in reporting face Possible fines," Horn said.

Foreign investors have reported owning about 12.0 million acres of

land in the United States as of December 31, 1989. In Mississippi, foreign-owned agricultural land totaled 442,365 acres for 1989. For reporting purposes, Horn

defined agricultural land as any tract of more than 10 acres now in farming, ranching, forestry, or timber produc-"This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land later converted to agricultural use." Foreigners who own or have an interest in 10 acres or less do not need to report unless annual proceeds from the sale of agricultural products grown on these es exceed \$1,000

Individuals or companies that specialize in land holdings, land transfers, or management services should contact the local ASCS Office for details on reporting in behalf in foreign clients.




