# Funeral Services For p. L. "Jess" Oaks



P. L. "Jess" Oaks 80, died Wednesday, January 9, 1991, at the luka Hospital. Services were held at Springhill United Methodist Church with the Rev. Dale Hathorn and the Rev. W.T. Dexter officiating. Burial was in Springhill Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of

Mr. Oaks was an active member of Springhill United Methodist Church. A World War II veteran, he served in combat in Europe with the 87th Infantry Division. He was a charter member of the luka VFW Post and was in charge of a number of military funerals for World War II and Korean War dead who were returned to the county for burial.

Mr. Oaks was also retired from the Mississippi National Guard and was a 32nd degree Mason.

In 1947 while farming the family farm in the Midway Community, Mr. Oaks began writing charter

Mississippi Farm Bureau life policies in Tishomingo and Itawamba counties. He began working full-time with Farm Bureau in 1954, after operating a store at Midway for several years. From that year to his retirement, he helped to build Tishomingo County Farm Bureau to one of the largest memberships in the state. He retired as an agent with the Mississippi Farm **Bureau Insurance Companies in 1975** after serving in this capacity for 21 years. He was an active member of the Tishomingo County Farm Bureau, having served as president for a number of years prior to his serving

as an agent. Mr. Oaks was active in politics all of his adult life. He served as secretary of the Tishomingo County **Democratic Executive Committee** and was a member of the staff of Governors Ross Barnett, John Bell Williams, and Cliff Finch.

He is survived by his wife, Zenobia Grantham Oaks; one son, Jimmy Oaks of Huntsville, AL.; a sister, Lorena Oaks of luka; one brother, James Fletcher Oaks of Tuscumbia. Al; one grandson, and a number of nieces and nephews.

# **Public Meeting Shows** Support For NASA Rocket Plant Project

vironmental air permit that will allow construction to begin on the advanced solid rocket motor plant received overwhelming support from area citizens last week.

All 22 individuals who spoke at a public hearing on Thursday, January 10, recommended that the state issue NASA a permit to construct air emissions equipment.

The hearing, held by the state Department of Environmental Quality, was called to receive public comment on a preliminary draft per-

The hearing was to address only the air emissions permit, one of three environmental permits required to begin construction of the facility, said Dwight Wylie, chief of the department's air division. Wastewater and other environmental permits are also required. An application for the open burning of waste propellant submitted by NASA will be reviewed separately, Wylie said.

No protests from citizens were voiced at the meeting.

The air emissions application has been under review for six months. The permit will contain numerous regulatory constraints under which NASA will have to operate, Wylie

Royce Mitchell, NASA project manager, said that the plant would operate "without undue degradation of the environment."

"I want to assure everyone here that your favorite fishing hole will be safe," he added. All emissions will be retained within the facility, and there will be no safety concern for the general public, ne said.

Many of those speaking in favor of the permit expressed love for the outdoors and concern for preservation of the nature surrounding the production plant.

luka Mayor David Nichols said that the area was richly blessed with clean water and clean air.

"If we destroy nature, it will destroy us," Nichols added. In supporting the permit, Nichols said that the region was doubly blessed,

because now industry can live in harmony with the environment and man can live with nature.

Representatives of chambers of commerce from luka, Corinth, and the Shoals area in Alabama expressed their support of the issuance of the construction permit.

Other citizens from Tishomingo and Alcorn counties spoke of their interest in the project and their confidence in NASA and the contractors in providing environmental safeguards for the area during construction and operation of the plant.

A housewife and grandmother, Margaret Williams, whose family has enjoyed Pickwick Lake for 30 years, stated "if they (NASA) are smart enough to build a rocket, then they know they must protect the environment and know how to protect it."

Two individuals from Adamsville, Tenn., who have land investments in the area near the Yellow Creek site, said that they welcomed NASA to the

Several citizens from Alcorn County, whose ancestors had owned land near the plant site, said that they were confident of the procedures and measures that NASA would be operating under.

Emissions of air pollutants associated with the manufacturing operation include particulate matter, carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxides, sulfur oxide, volatile organic compounds, hydrocarbons, and hydrogen chloride. The plant will be a minor emissions plant, Mitchell of NASA told the group.

Accidents can be expected in this type of operation, but NASA has developed contingency plans in case of an emergency, Mitchell explained. NASA is very pleased with the backing and support of area agen-

cies, Mitchell added. John Thomas, project manager for Lockheed, stood up to acknowledge the public support of NASA,

Lockheed, and Aerojet. "After hearing your confidence in us, we are dedicated to fulfilling your expectations of making the environment safe and clean," Thomas said.

#### Congressman Jamie Whitten Makes **Statement Concerning Persian Gulf**

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Congressman Jamie Whitten made the following statement today, concerning Saturday's vote on the Persian Gulf situation: "Our troops had been sent there by our government. There is a difference

of opinion as to whether that was wise. I believe all agree we should do everything we can to support the troops.

"It is my belief we should not limit what they find it necessary to do, and I voted for the request of the President as offering our best hope for peace. "I believe it would be more effective, if we have to strike, to limit it to

"I have served for many years and continue to serve on the Appropriations Committee, where we have had testimony by Defense Secretary Cheney and Secretary of State Baker, and I have met with the President on the overall situation in the Persian Gulf.

"I join with all of you in a prayer for guidance toward peace."

# '41 vote different, congressman

The only current member of Congress who was here in 1941 says Saturday's vote authorizing the use of force against Iraq is "far different" from the vote he and others cast declaring war on Germany and Japan.

"At that time, there was only one side to it - the Japanese had hit Pearl Harbor while their ambassador was downtown talking about peace," said Rep. Jamie Whitten, Mississippi Democrat, who was first elected to Congress in November 1941, a month before Japan attacked.

Today, he said, "each person thinks the facts are different" about whether sanctions can force Iraq out

"There is room for folks to differ." said Mr. Whitten, who nevertheless

sided with President Bush and authorized him "to use U.S. armed forces" if he determines sanctions against Iraq have failed.

"He's asked for help to keep from going to war," Mr. Whitten said. 'That's what he says; that's what I

Mr. Whitten, 80, was appointed to the House Appropriations defense subcommittee during World War II and has risen to chairman of the full appropriations panel that controls all federal pursestrings. He spoke of the conflicts and confrontations in between.

"Looking backwards, we made mistakes in Korea and Vietnam. We don't need a can't-win war," said Mr. Whitten, quickly adding that questions of war and peace "are not an exact science.



Finally, the Appropriations Committee voted to develop a supplemental list of "critical needs" that would involve new revenues to be funded. The critical needs list will be presented to the Ways and Means Committee, charged with the responsibility of handling tax bills and other revenue measures.

Members of the committee were divided on the new procedures. Some legislators said the changes would help make sure that state spending is held within anticipated revenues and give the entire House a larger voice in the appropriations process. Others expressed concern that the changes may be premature, expecially if there's a chance a revenue package may be forthcoming in either House or Senate.

In other legislative developments, the House approved a bill to rename the Mississippi Agriculture and Forestry Museum in honor of longtime Agriculture Commissioner Jim Buck Ross, whose efforts led to the establishment and development of the museum.

The Education Committee met with State Superintendent Richard Thompson and other education leaders. The Public Utilities Committee received a briefing from Bill Wilkerson, director of the Public Utilities Staff, on efforts to improve utility rate-making procedures.



To blend favorite furnishings, and beloved collections into an eclectic design scheme, find a strong design thread: color, pattern or the mood of each piece. To create an appealing eclectic masterpiece, be selective and apply basic criteria to each

\*Is the piece appropriate to the overall formal or informal atmosphere you are striving to create?

For example, an old handmade quilt from the attic can have as much inherent beauty and integrity as a handknotted rug from the Orient. Both are tasteful and of good design, yet the mood of the two are vastly different. The quilt is informal and country in nature. The oriental rug blends with the most formal furnishings. The difference in mood is a useful dstick to measure the compatibility of various pieces.

In a room filled with unlike elements, use color to bring unity to the room. Repetition is an ally in coloring an eclectic design scheme. BAKED BEAN CASSEROLE

#### **News From The House**

The state's financial plight commanded most of the attention of Mississippi lawmakers as the 1991 legislative session got underway amid mounting concern over budgetary matters.

The full extent of the budget crunch and its potential impact was outlined by fiscal experts in a series of meetings with legislators soon after the opening gavels were rapped on Tuesday, January 8. The 90-day session is due to end April 7.

This is the final regular session of the current four-year term. There are indications it may be among the

toughest sessions in years. Dr. Edward L. Ranck, director of the Unitversity Research Center's division of Policy Research and Planning, confirmed the state is facing a projected shortfall of \$105 million in general fund revenues for the current fiscal year. The longtime financial specialist said the economy is "very weak" at this time and warned that the state is "walking into one of the most difficult budgetary periods I have ever seen."

Holding Books Too Close

If you think your child holds books too close to his eyes when he reads, you may want to have his eyes checked to find out if he has a vision problem. When children first begin to

read, they usually look at books with large print and lots of space between the lines. Once in school, however, and as they advance into upper grades, the type is not as large. Getting used to the difference in type size may be the only problem at first. To compensate for the difference, they may hold books closer to their eyes for awhile, but if the habit continues beyond a reasonable time, it may be wise to have their eyes checked by your eye specialist. Even if your child passed the

eye test at school, you should not take it for granted that he doesn't have a vision problem. Eye tests given at school are usually simple tests of what a child can see at 20 feet. Passing this test with a "20/20" rating, however, does not mean that he has perfect vision. It means only that he can see at 20 feet what the normal child can see

Happy Birthday

When you were young you were a twiggy, Now that you are older you are a good piggy!



It's nice to come into a warm cozy house on a cold rainy day. Cozy and warm with only the flick of the switch or turn of a knob. It wasn't so easy to get warm two hundred years ago.

The Indians depended on a fire which they lit by sparks made in wood kindling. This was done by striking pieces of flint and metal together to make a spark or by working a stick between their hands, holding the stick upright with the end against a rock. The friction caused heat and eventually the spark that started the kindling.

Large rocks were placed in a circle around the fire. The rocks were heated and used for cooking. Clay pots and pans were used on the heated rocks and hot coals to cook on. These fires were outdoor or in a pit in the center of a thatched house. A hole in the ceiling provided ven-

Settlers who came to this area in the early 1800's build cabins with fireplaces made of stone or brick hearths with plaster, wood or brick mantles. The chimneys were sometimes made of logs covered with clay plaster. This led many times to house fires. Rocks or brick was

preferred in constructing chimneys. In the early years wood was used as fuel for the fire. Coal was expensive, but became more affordable and practical with the use of the iron stove. One version, the pot bellied stove, was invented by Ben Franklin and was a very popular stove. These stoves were different sizes and served various purposes. Chimneys gave way to stove pipes. Natural gas became popular for heating in the 1870's Wood stoves gave way to gas stoves. Boilers were used in large building heated by gas or coal.

The old courthouse used coal burning fireplaces in the downstairs areas and pot bellied stoves in the upstairs courtroom. Planning was done to prevent another fire like the one that destroyed the original cour-

Coal was thought to be expensive in those days. A month's supply of 100 lbs. coast \$8.00 according to the 1889 Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors Minutes. Coal was used in the old courthouse for many years. Today the old courthouse is heated

by two central heating units that were added in its 1986 renovation. We still have the fireplaces, covered now by steel plates. We have three pot bellied stoves in the courthouse. One came from Oldham Baptist Church and another came from a railroad station in Tennessee. The stove from Tennessee is converted to a vertical position now. Originally, it was in an old caboose to provide heat for an entire passenger train. The fires now burn only in the memories of these relics from the past.

Who can forget warming themselves against grandma's stove or gas heater. Though the heat of today may warm us faster, cheaper or just more modern, grandma's heater still warms the heart.

Rekindle these warm feelings of the past by visiting the Old Courthouse Museum and seeing our fireplaces, wood stoves and other exhibits. Y'all come to see us soon.


#### House Members Call For Passage Of New 4-Lane Highway Program

A widely based coalition of House of Representatives members has revealed plans to seek approval of a new multi-million dollar four-lane highway program in the 1991 legislative session.

"This will be a new program and will have no impact on the four-lane program approved in the 1987 legislative session. In fact, our program is designed to augment the 1987 program," sponsors of the proposal said in a joint statement.

Representative Bill Wheeler of Belmont said he and several other House members have been working on the legislation over the past several weeks. "We believe we have put together a good, solid bill that will provide for construction of another 650 miles of four lane highways in areas of the state that need fourlaning but were not included in the 1987 highway program," he said.

Other legislators involved in the effort include Representatives Shelton E. "Buck" Bounds of Philadelphia. Glenn Burdine of Mathiston, David Green of Gloster, Jerome Huskey of Greenwood Springs, Bennett Malone

of Carthage, and Jimmy Tyrone of Monticello. In addition, Wheeler said a number of other lawmakers have participated in informal meetings to discuss the legislation and indicated

their support for the proposal. The legislation would authorize the sale of up to \$900 million in general obligation bonds with a maturity date of not to exceed 25 years from the date of issuance. The proceeds would be placed in a special fund to be used to pay for the four laning.

Sponsors said a companion bill would be introduced to finance the bonds. Wheeler said details will be released later.

The measure provides for three phases of construction. The goal is to have all contracts let by 1998 and all of the work completed by the year

"We think this is the way to go. Highways represent a capital investment in our future. People coming into the state in future years will benefit from the highways and ought to help pay for them," said Wheeler, who represents House District 19 in Itawamba and Tishomingo Counties.

Sponsors said it will cost less to build the highways now than to wait until later in view of increasing construction cost. They said the program also would boost Mississippi's economy and help combat unemployment around the state.

The following highways would be four-laned under the proposal:

A segment along or near Highway 25 beginning at the Itawamba-Tishomingo county line and extending northerly to the Tennessee line.

A segment along or near Highway 42 from U.S. 49 at Hattiesburg and extending easterly to the Perry-Greene county line.

A new Flowood-to-Jackson bridge. A segment along or near Highway 4 at or near Ripley and extending easterly to Booneville

A segment along or near Highway 6 beginning at U.S. 61 at Clarksdale and extending easterly to Batesville. A segment along or near Highway

19 beginning at I-59 at Meridian and extending northwesterly Mississippi 16 at Philadelphia. A segment along or near Highways

24 and 48 beginning at Liberty and extending easterly to I-55 at McComb.

A segment along or near Highway 25 beginning east of Aberdeen near the intersection of Highways 45 and 8 and extending northerly to the Itawamba-Tishomingo county line.

A segment along or near Highway 27 beginning at I-55 and extending northwesterly to I-20 at Vicksburg.

A segment along or near Highway 30 beginning at U.S. 45 at Booneville and extending easterly to Highway 25

A segment along or near Highway 4 beginning at Highway 3 at Savage and extending easterly to U.S. 78 at Holly

A segment along or near Highwa 24 beginning at U.S. 61 near Wo ville and extending easterly to H

A segment along or near Highwa 25 beginning at U. S. 45A and exter ding northeasterly to Aberdeen.

A segment along or near Highway 27 beginning at the Louisiana Line south of Tylertown and extending northerly to I-55.

A segment along or near Highway 42 beginning at the Perry-Greens county line and extending easterly 10 State Line.

A segment along or near Highway 48 beginning at or near Centreville and extending easterly to Liberty.

A segment along or near U.S. 495 beginning at U.S. 82 west of Green wood and extending northerly to U.S. 49 at Tutwiler; then along or near U.S 49 beginning at Tutwiler and ex tneding northwesterly to U.S. 61 8

A segment along or near U.S. 6 beginning at Redwood and extending northerly to U.S. 82 at Leland.

In addition, the legislation calls of the State Highway Department conduct a study into the feasibility constructing or improving segment of U.S. 49 from Jackson the Gulf Coast as a controlled limited access highway.



**HUNTER ETHICS** 

As the hunter learns the basics of handling firearms safely, he or she must also develop certain responsibilities to the sport.

An understanding of wildlife management game laws and sporting codes is as important to the hunter as handling a firearm safely. New, as well as experienced hunters, should develop a code which will make them good hunters. This code can be called a "hunter's ethics".

The hunter must follow this code of ethics whether he or she is hunting with friends or hunting alone.

Here are six rules compiled by the National Rifle Association which should be part of a hunter's code of ethics. They compliment the "Ten Commandments of Firearm Safety" and should be followed just as

1. I will support conservation efforts which can assure good hunting for future generations of America.

2. I will obey all game laws and regulations and will insist that my companions do likewise.

3. I will obey the rules of safe gun handling and will courteously but firmly insist that others who hunt with me do the same.

4. I will consider myself an invited guest of the landowner, seeking his permission and so conducting myself that I may be welcome in the future. 5. I will do my best to acquire those

marksmanship and hunting skills which assure clean, sportmanlike 6. I will pass along to younger hun-

ters the attitudes and skills essential to a true outdoor sportsman. Accidents with firearms do no just

happen. They are caused by ignorance and disregard of safety rules. Before you go hunting make sure you know the Ten Commandments of Firearm Safety.

1. Treat every gun as if it were loaded.

2. Be able to control the direction of the barrel even if you stumble. Think ahead! 3. Be sure the barrel and action are

clear of obstructions. 4. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know identifying features of the game you hunt.

5. Unload guns when not in use. 6. Never point a gun at anything The Vidette & Belmont










By Greg Allen Three battalions of the 155th Armored Brigade from the Mississippi National Guard convoyed west shortly after the holidays to begin maneuvers here.

Their fourth unit, the 3rd Battalion. 141st Infantry from Texas, has been here since the brigade was activated for active duty Dec. 7.



**GUNS AND KIDS** 

Many families own handguns and long guns, both for sport and personal safety, about 70 million of us. Unfortunately, guns play an important role in many injuries and fatalities resulting from acts of violence, suicide, and accidents.

Children and teenagers are at particular risk of suffering from accidental gunshot injury. One in ten children who lost their lives in 1987 died of a firearm related death. Half of these deaths occurred in the victim's homes. Boys are 80% of the victims and 92% of the shooters. Unintentional firearm death rates are highest in rural areas and among lower income families.

major gun-related organizations agree that gun ownership carries with it special responsibilities, especially when children are around. Common safety recommendations include:

"childproof" a revolver by sucuring a padlock around the top strap of the weapon or by using a trigger lock.

Store handguns unloaded and uncocked in a securely locked con-

Do not store your handgun among your valuables, such as jewelry or silver or in a bedside table or under your mattress or pillow.

Don't rely on a firearm's safety device. Treat every gun as if it were loaded and ready to fire.

While these recommendations may sound like common sense, one study found that half of surveyed families who kept guns at home kept them loaded at all times, and half of these guns were not kept locked away from

Of all the injury risks facing children, firearm injuries and deaths are among the most preventable.

#### **Does Fluoride Cause** Cancer?

A magazine article says that rats that were fed water containing fluoride developed cancer. Does this mean that fluoridated water may be hazardous?

The Wellness Letter from the University of California, Berkeley examines the "evidence" from a study that recently was discussed in various magazines. Over a twoyear period rats were fed water containing 45 or 79 parts per million (ppm) fluoride. (Fluoridated water in municipal water supplies typically contains 1 to 2 ppm fluoride.) One of 50 rats in the 45 ppm group and 3 of 80 in the 79 ppm group developed a form of bone cancer called osteosarcoma.

· The director of the program in which the research was performed indicated that the cancer "could be the result of chance alone."

A panel of scientists assembled by the American Public Health Association reviewed the data and concluded that the findings were inconclusive.

· The incidence of bone cancer in the U.S. has not risen since fluoridation was implemented in 1945.

Over half of children age 5 to 17 have no dental cavities, primarily as a result of fluoridated water. No fluoride-related medical calamities have materialized due to water "supplementation" with this important mineral.

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
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

#### **County Agent News**

A B-I-G DIFFERENCE

We hear so much in the news about saving our national forests and national parks. These terms are used interchangeably by well-meaning people, but a national forest and a national park aren't the same thing. There's a big difference.

Let me explain. By law, the national forests in the United States are working forests set up by Congress in the late 1800's to provide the nation with a continual source of wood products. The national forests also provide wildlife habitat, fishing, camping and other recreation.

By contrast, our national parks (Yellowstone, for example) have been intentionally set aside for noncommercial use and are not managed for timber or resource production. These parks are intended to approximate natural conditions.

In fact, when there's a fire in a national park, the areas where the trees were burned are not replanted. The forest grows back naturally -- no matter how long it takes to regenerate.

This protection is even more extreme in the 90 million acres formally designated by Congress as wilderness area. There, even roads are not allowed, so that the forestland remains much like it was before Columbus arrived.

Remember -- there is a difference between our national forests and our national parks. Help clear up the confusion by knowing the facts.

WHO'S LEFT

Ninety-nine percent of food grown in the United States and 96 percent of imported food from 88 countries either were free of pesticide residues or contained residues within acceptable tolerance limits, according to 1989 test results by the Food and Drug Administration.

This result indicates that our food is safe and our producers are doing a good job of keeping our food supply safe. Farmers, however, aren't the only handlers of pesticides and other chemicals.

Pesticides can be found in the hands of the homeowner. Flea powder for the family pet is one example. It's best to follow the example of many of our farmers in Tishomingo County by properly storing pesticides.

Keep pesticides in an area that cannot be accessed by children, animals or unfamiliar adults. Store them locked and away from feed, seed, clothing and personal products. Make sure the storage area is welllighted, well-ventilated and is not exposed to extreme temperature changes.

Put highly toxic products in a specially marked area. Post warning

Keep products in their original containers with labels in plain sight. Check for leaks or dampness, and record an up-to-date inventory in a notebook or small pad.

If in doubt about the product, read the label and follow directions for
