Home Needed For Neglected Children

There is an urgent need in our area for a home for abused and neglected children. Each month fifteen to twenty reports of child abuse and/or neglect are received and investigated by the county's social workers. Of the reported cases, twelve to sixteen are found to actually involve the abuse of a child.

Normally a child who is caught in an abusive situation is placed in a "foster home" in hope that the problem can be corrected, and the child returned to his or her family. "Foster homes" are very important and beneficial in providing a temporary place of refuge for such children. However, children who have been severely physically and sexually abused and/or neglected become emotionally disturbed. It is these emotionally disturbed children who do not fit into the "foster care programs", because they release their pain through violence toward other children and through the destruction of the foster parent's property. At the present time, there are eleven children in this county who fall into this category. Until a "therapeutic" children's home is built, many of these children will have to be sent out of the area (some as far as Pennsylvania) to get the care they need. The cost of such treatment in further trauma to the child and in out-of-state fees is exorbitant.

Sociological research has determined that children who endure such abuse without receiving treatment often become child abusers, rapists, murderers, and even serial killers. Approximately seventy-five percent of the people currently housed in our nation's prison system for violent crimes were abused as children. At this present time, there are not enough cells to hold all the convicted criminals. Each year the homicide rate continues to rise. Can we continue to ignore this great need?

The state of Mississippi, as a result of budgeting problems, will probably begin to cut back on the amount of money it spends on social services. Therefore, a local "children's home" could only become a reality through a community-wide effort. What would be needed to start such a home? - the donation of a suitable building; volunteers, to help prepare the building (remodeling, wiring, painting, plumbing, etc.); \$35,000 to \$40,000, which does not include the salaries of the house parents or staff psychologists; and, people to volunteer time to help at the home. It is a great undertaking for an area, but other counties have been able to

do it. There are other possibilities for funding that may become available after the home has been established. Several corporations have developed trusts to help with community projects such as this one. The state of Mississippi will pay \$225 per child per month, if the home meets its requirements. Local churches could also support the home as a local mission project.

Christians grow through the service of helping and loving those who cannot help themselves. Jesus, according to Matthew 25:31-46, said that people would be held accountable for how they respond to the needs of the powerless. Even those who do not claim to be Christians can surely feel for a child who is in need of help that he or she can give.

There will be an organizational meeting to determine the best way to proceed in the establishment of such a home. It will be held at Iuka First United Methodist Church in the Family Life Center at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, February 26. County Firm Secures Contract For Field Jackets

A Golden, MS., firm has been awarded a contract of \$18.5 million to manufacture cold weather field jackets for U.S. troops in Desert Storm.

U.S. Senators Thad Cochran and Trent Lott (R-Miss.) said the Pentagon informed them the contract for \$18,540,500 has been awarded to the Golden Manufacturing Co. of Golden, MS.

The Defense Logistics Agency said the Tishomingo County plant would manufacture 411,345 cold weather field coats for U.S. troops involved in the Persian Gulf War.

Belmont Airport Awarded Grant

The Belmont Airport is the recipient of a grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Aviation Administration, 1st District U.S. Rep. Jamie Whitten announced Tuesday.

Belmont will receive a \$83,250 grant for installation of runway lighting at the airport.

The grant was one of five announced for Mississippi airports.

Man Dies In Fire Iuka Woman Charged With Murder

Suspicious evidence gathered at the scene of a house fire in Iuka last week has led authorities to the arrest of a woman on a murder charge.

Ellen C. Wells, 27 of Iuka, was arrested Tuesday by members of the Iuka Police Department and charged with murder in connection with the death of Leroy Nunley during a blaze at his residence on Feb. 7.

The body of Nunley, 59, was discovered on the living room floor behind the entrance to his home at 303 Wilmuth St.

Another resident, Hershel Dees, escaped the fire through a bedroom window. He was admitted to Iuka Hospital and treated for smoke inhalation.

An autopsy revealed that Nunley died of smoke inhalation, Tishomingo County Coroner/Medical Examiner Dale White said. There was also evidence of a blow to the victim's head, White said.

The fire, reported at 9:15 p.m., was confined to the living room of the home.

An investigation was conducted by Deputy State Fire Marshall Mike Ivy, the coroner, Police Chief Amos Bates, officers of the Iuka Police Department.

Results of the investigation showed that the blaze was deliberately set.

Wells is being held in the

Tishomingo County Jail. No bond has been set for her release.

Graveside services for Nunley were held at 3 p.m. Monday at the Providence Cemetery with the Rev. Steve Hanson officiating. Ludlam's Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

He was a carpenter and a veteran of the Korean Conflict.

Survivors include four sons, Milton R. Nunley of Tishomingo, John A. Nunley of San Diego, Calif., Charles L. Nunley of Germany, and Albert Dale Nunley of Tishomingo; one daughter, Wendy S. Hill of Tishomingo; one brother, R.C. Nunley of Iuka; one sister, Pearl Drexel of Iuka; 10 grandchildren.

Buffer Zone Boundary To Be Set By March

Residents who live within the proposed buffer zone around the NASA advanced solid rocket motor plant should be notified by March 1, the state economic development director told northeast Mississippi lawmakers last week.

The department also said that only about 20 families will have to move out of the region.

State Rep. Mack Loyd Wadkins of Iuka said this week that he had met with Department of Economic and Community Development Director J. Mac Holladay to discuss the proposed buffer zone.

"The people living in the area near the plant site have a right to know what is going on," Wadkins said.

"They want to know whether they are in or out. And the longer they have to wait, the more expensive it will be for them to find other property," he said.

Holladay said that his office had completed the legal work and surveying on the property surrounding the plant site at Yellow Creek.

Space industry officials have recommended the buffer zone around the plant both for security and for possible future expansions.

Last year the Legislature authorized the purchase of up to \$5 million in bonds to purchase the one-mile parcel of land.

Wadkins said he had not been directly involved in the negotiations over the boundaries and that he had heard some things "through the grapevine."

It is possible that the lines of the buffer zone may have been shifted northward to have a lesser impact on residential property, Wadkins said.

Ground was broken last summer for the facility, which will develop a new generation of solid rocket fuel motors for the nation's space shuttle program.

Construction of the plant is expected to take three years.

fastgrowing bones. Children can eat other foods that provide calcium, but it is difficult to meet total calcium needs without drinking a least two glasses of milk each day.

Serve milk as a beverage or on cereal. Choose skim or lowfat milk for children more than age 2. Since chocolate milk contains caffeine and is usually high in sugar, guide children to use plain milk most often, and reserve chocolate milk or cocoa for occasional use.

Cup for cup, yogurt contains as much calcium as milk and is a good choice to vary the menu. Fruit-flavored yogurt is high in sugar. You can make your low low-sugar version by mixing plain (lowfat) yogurt with fruit of your choice.

Breakfast is a good time to serve vitamin C foods, such as oranges, tangerines, grapefruit or their juices. Other good choices are seasonal fruits, such as strawberries, blueberries, kiwifruit, watermelon and cantaloupe.

Try cutting fresh fruit into small pieces the night before. Children enjoy using toothpicks to spear fruit for eating.

Save time by thawing frozen juices in the refrigerator the night before. An older child can mix the juice then.

Plan to have a variety of breads and cereals on hand. Most keep well for several months if stored properly.

Save the ready-to-eat cereals for those really rushed mornings. Since many of the dry cereals marketed to children are high in sugar, either avoid them or mix them with more nutritious (and less sugary) ones. Let older children help select the better cereals, by comparing labels for sugar content per serving.

Making quick breads, such as muffins, from scratch is easy when you mix the dry ingredients together the night before. Leftover muffins freeze well, and single portions can be removed from the container as needed.

Look for quick bread recipes that are relatively low in fat and sugar and high in nutritious ingredients, such as whole wheat, bran or bran cereal, oatmeal, blueberries, cranberries, raisins, carrots, pumpkin, sweet potatoes and nuts. Limit commercial bakery products, such as doughnuts and sweet rolls, which are usually high in fat and/or sugar.

Hot cereals such as oatmeal, cream of wheat, and cream of rice can be ready in an instant if you mix the cereal and liquid the night before right in the saucepan and refrigerate. The next morning, cook the cereal over low heat while you are getting dressed.

Make hot cereal even more nutritious by mixing it with milk instead of water. Try adding chopped apple, pear, banana, raisins, and either allspice, cinnamon, or nutmeg to oatmeal. Try adding shredded cheese to cream of wheat or cream of rice, just before serving.

If all else fails, hand your crew plastic bags of graham crackers and peanut butter or sliced cheese to go with that juice as they dash out the door.

COMPANY BROCCOLI BAKE

2 (1 lb.) bunches fresh broccoli
2 tablespoons chopped onion
2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
1 (10 3/4 ounces) can cream of mushroom soup, undiluted

1 cup (4 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup buttered cracker crumbs
1 hard-cooked egg, sliced

Trim off large leaves of broccoli, and remove tough end of lower stalks. Wash thoroughly, and separate into spears.

Cook broccoli, covered, in a small amount of boiling water for 10 minutes or until tender. Drain well, and arrange in a lightly greased 3-quart baking dish. Sprinkle with onion and 2 sliced eggs.

Combine soup, cheese, and mayonnaise in a small saucepan; cook over

low heat, stirring until cheese melts. Pour sauce over broccoli, and sprinkle with cracker crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until bubbly. Garnish with remaining egg slices.

WHEAT TARGET PRICE SET AT \$4.00 A BUSHEL

Farmers who reduce their wheat acreage by 15 percent and comply with other provisions of the 1991 wheat program will be eligible for federal target price protection at \$4.00 a bushel, price support loans at \$2.04 a bushel and advance deficiency payments at 40 percent of the estimated payment rate for the crop. The estimated deficiency payments will be \$1.40 per bushel for the winter wheat option and \$1.47 for other wheat.

Wheat program participants will also have certain planting options. Farmers may plant other crops on up to 25 percent of their wheat acreage base. This acreage is called "flex" acreage, with 15 percent of the base designated as "normal flex acreage" and 10 percent as "optional flex acreage". In general, any crop may be planted on flex acres other than fruits or vegetables. A list of specific crops that cannot be planted on flex acres will be available later.

The maximum payment acreage will be determined by multiplying the wheat acreage base by 85 percent, less the acreage which is required to be devoted to the acreage conservation reserve. Producers who planted 1991-crop winter wheat in 1990 have the option of waiving the payment acreage reduction provision on the farm if they agree to have

regular deficiency payments determined by using a 12-month national average price rather than a 5-month average price.

No paid land division program is in effect for wheat.

Wheat producers may devote all or a portion of their maximum payment acreage to conservation uses and become eligible for deficiency payments under the 0/92 program provision. Such Acreage devoted to conservation uses will be known as PAY/92 acreage, but may also be planted to sunflowers, rapeseed, canola, safflower, flaxseed and mustard seed. Wheat growers who choose to plant any of these minor oilseeds on this acreage must agree to forgo either deficiency payments on the acreage or marketing loan eligibility for the crops which are planted on PAY/92 acreage elsewhere on the farm.

For 1991, the total amount of deficiency payments that a person is entitled to receive under one or more annual commodity programs will be limited to \$50,000. Findley payments, loan deficiency payments, and marketing loan gains from one or more programs will be limited to \$75,000 per person. These and other specified payments are included in an overall payment limitation of \$250,000 per person.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

BUT I DON'T HAVE TIME FOR BREAKFAST

Does this ever happen at your

house? On Monday, you have good intentions of getting the kids off to school with a nutritious breakfast. But by Thursday, anybody who gets more than juice as they head out the door is lucky.

Adults aside, research shows that children who miss breakfast do not make up the missed nutrients in meals during the day. By taking a few simple steps, youngsters can start the mornings well nourished.

First of all, be flexible about what constitutes a good breakfast. Children don't always want traditional breakfast foods, especially first thing in the morning. They might prefer leftovers from last night's supper, pizza and milk, a bowl of soup, a sandwich, or fruit, cheese and crackers. For easy meal planning, establish a breakfast pattern with your children. Let them select different foods that fit the pattern each day. A simple but nourishing breakfast pattern includes milk, fruit or fruit juice, bread and/or cereal, and maybe meat or a meat alternate, such as peanut butter, eggs or nuts.

Milk, the major food source of calcium, is necessary for

Middle Ear Infections In Children

Infections of the middle ear (called *otitis media*) affect approximately seven out of ten children at least once before their third birthday. By age eight, almost all children have had at least one infection in the middle ear. Children often become irritable and may complain of fullness and pain in the ear. There may be some hearing loss. Some children experience fever as high as 104 degrees with earache. Many of these symptoms result from the presence of bacteria that build up within fluids in the ear. Infection causes tissue swelling which prevents fluid drainage from the ear into the throat by way of the eustachian tube.

The primary treatment of middle ear infections in children involves the use of antibiotics to kill bacteria. Antibiotics commonly prescribed for ear infection include penicillin derivatives and the *cephalosporins*, a category of powerful and often well-tolerated antibiotics. *Steroids* (prescription only) may be needed on a short term basis when there is fluid discharge from the ears.

Nonprescription medicines often are useful in dealing with the symptoms of the infection. Fever and pain reducers such as *acetaminophen* help reduce general discomfort associated with the infection. Decongestants and antihistamines help relieve associated congestion.

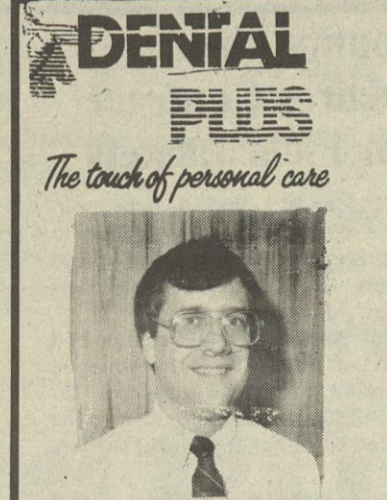
Symptoms Of Cataract

If you have the beginnings of a cataract condition, there are certain signs to look for. There may be slight blurring or clouding of vision, for example, often beginning in just one eye. Sometimes you may find bright light glaring or you may experience multiple images. The clouding of the lens of the eye causes the glare by scattering light rays as they enter the eye. In the same way, dust on a windshield causes glare when it scatters bright sunlight or light from an oncoming car. Tinted glasses or sunglasses can help reduce the glare.

A cataract condition can begin at any age, but it usually afflicts older people. Slowly and progressively the lens of the eye becomes more cloudy until surgery is recommended to correct it. However, it may be many years before the condition is serious enough to warrant surgery.

The problem with cataract symptoms is that they may be caused by some other eye problem. Only an examination by your eye specialist can determine what's causing them. If you're experiencing any of these symptoms, you should have your eyes examined.

INFORMATION FOR NEW DENTURE WEARERS

When your new dentures are in place, your first impression may be that you have quite a mouthful. You may feel that your face looks "full" and the teeth may actually seem longer than they should. Also, your lips may feel out of place and your tongue may feel crowded. You also may notice increased saliva. Your mouth muscles are good at adapting and they will adjust to the new surroundings. What you must do, though, is learn the trick of controlling your dentures, and you can learn rather easily, if you try.

You simply must wear your dentures constantly. You will learn to master them, and the more you want to learn, the faster the process.

For some patients, it is difficult to speak clearly and distinctly at first. As soon as your tongue, lips, and cheeks become accustomed, speech returns to normal. Practice talking in front of a mirror or simply reading aloud to yourself for a few minutes each day until you feel comfortable.

You should be able to eat most of your normal diet within a few weeks. Start with soft, easily managed food. Take small bites and chew gently and thoroughly.

Some discomfort is to be expected until your gums grow accustomed to their new task. If a sore spot develops, contact your dentist. He can relieve it promptly. Any denture will gradually loosen and this may cause sore spots to develop. The denture can be refitted.

Clean your dentures every day to keep them natural looking and odor-free. Your dentist will recommend the best method for cleaning them based on his experience and the materials used in making your denture.

Even though you no longer have teeth, you still have gums. Your gums will begin to recede and while this is normal, it will become necessary for the dentist to relined your denture.

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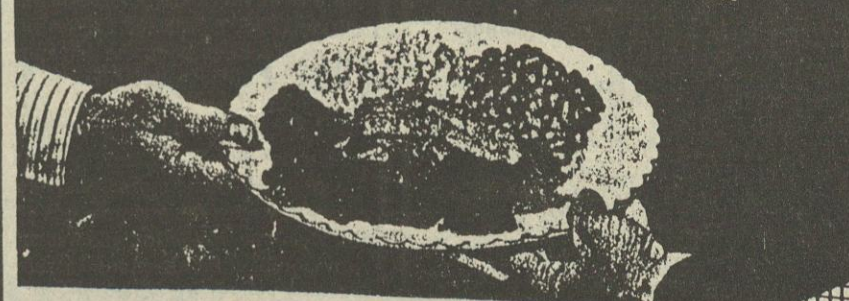

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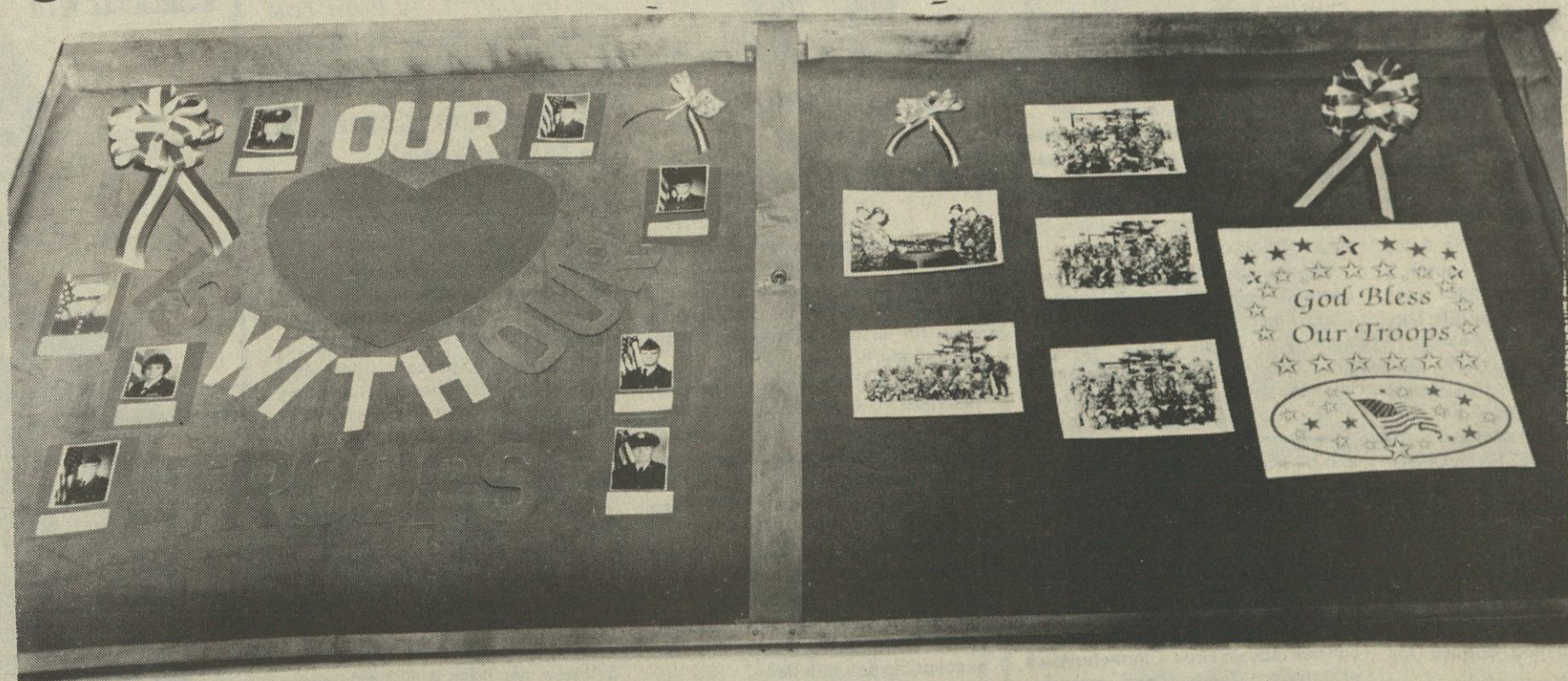

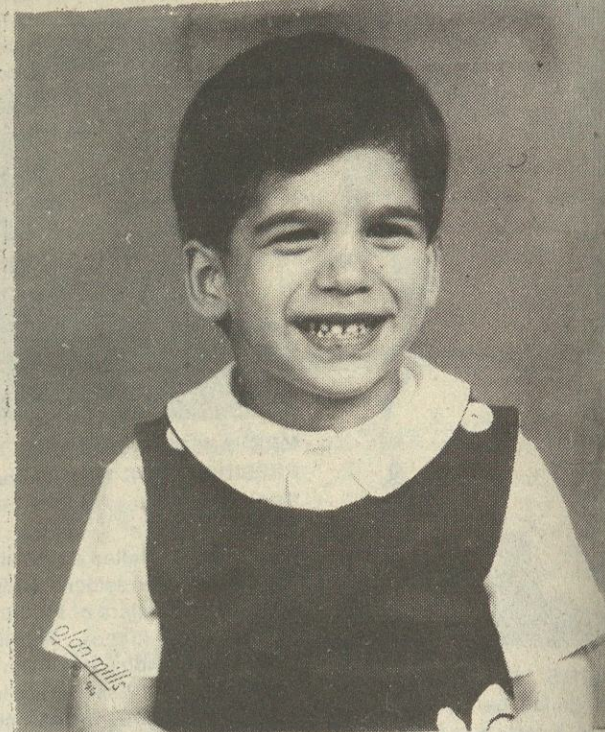

FEEDER PIG SALE

During January, Feeder Pig Sales were held in Booneville, Laurel & Waynesboro. A total of 1981 pigs were sold averaging \$80.64 per hundred weight and \$45.07 per head.

This compares to December 1990 sales in which a total of 2314 pigs were sold averaging \$79.35 per hundred weight and \$42.70 per head.

HEALTHY SOUTHERN PEAS

Southern peas are one of the most common vegetables in Tishomingo County gardens. They taste delightful and are nutritionally valuable because they provide energy, vitamins and high quality protein.

Traditionally harvested in the "green pod" stage, southern peas can be frozen to eat year-round. The plant is easily grown and requires only small amounts of nitrogen fertilizer.

Anyone in Tishomingo County who has grown southern peas knows there are disease problems. The most common disease to scout for in cowpea mosaic virus. Characteristics of infection include leaf mottling, plant stunting and yield loss.

The virus is spread from plant to

plant by aphids. Still, an intensive, full-season spray program is not generally required to protect peas from the disease. There are always exceptions, however.

Growers can select varieties resistant to the mosaic virus, thus minimizing cost of disease control. Numerous commercial varieties of peas have been screened for resistance in trial tests conducted by the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station in conjunction with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

The Tishomingo County Extension office has a list a resistant and susceptible pea varieties.

PRUNE AWAY PESTS

Look for insect and disease problems while pruning fruit trees and vines this spring.

If scale insects or mite eggs are present, apply a dormant oil. The oil reduces the population of these insects and makes control during the growing season less difficult. Dormant oil sprays are effective because insects do not develop resistance to these materials.

Prune any shoots that have fireblight. A copper or bordeaux mixture spray can be applied at the delayed dormant stage if many infected areas are found. Use special care when applying streptomycin sprays to control this disease.

Trees that had severe brown rot may have cankers on limbs where fruit was attached. Normal pruning won't eliminate these cankers. Remove mummified fruit and monitor trees for new infection.

Value Of Farm And Export Has Increased In Mississippi

With cash income to farmers on the increase and agriculture exports larger than in the past few years, things look brighter in the agriculture community. Actually agriculture exports have increased to the extent that more producers are engaging in this marketing process than ever before. Commissioner Jim Buck Ross announced today that the estimated value of farm production for the year 1990 was over 3.5 billion dollars. This is an increase of 126 million over the year 1989. He also stated that 1990 took its place in Mississippi agriculture history, a sharp contrast to a decade ago when the 1980 farm production in Mississippi was 2.7 billion dollars.

Commissioner Ross state that he believes we cannot overemphasize the importance of farm exports. Increased exports have a strong stimulus to agricultural commodity prices, farm land prices, the supply industry, farm machinery manufactures and agricultural export firms.

In a recent report compiled by the United States Department Agriculture, the state of Mississippi exported 691.9 million dollars in agricultural products for year 1989. This figure does not include one of the major export crops and that is lumber and timber. Also not included in this figure is another growing industry in Mississippi and that is aquaculture products. This ranks Mississippi 22nd in the nation and 6th in a 15 southern state area, with our state leading all of our neighbors.

Ross also stated that one of the most important factors in returning profitability to agriculture is to increase our exports. Farming and agriculture do not mean the same

thing. Growing crops and raising livestock are a part of agriculture. Agriculture also includes the manufacture of farm supplies and the processing and distribution of farm commodities. Both farming and agriculture are critical to the well being of domestic and foreign exports.

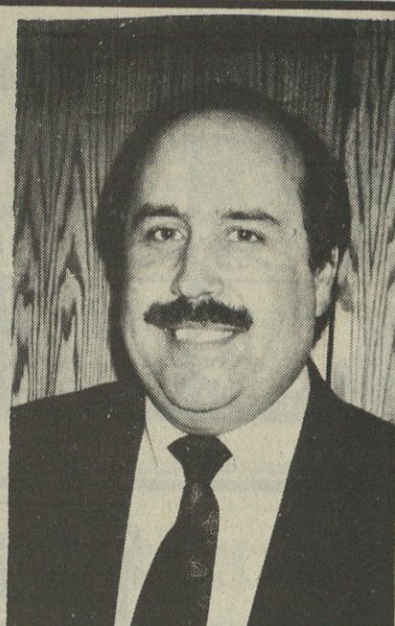

PLAN NOW FOR SUMMER JOBS

Teens hoping to land that perfect summer job shouldn't wait until spring holidays to begin their search. Rather, now is the best time to evaluate job opportunities and begin making contacts.

For most determined teens, some type of summer employment can be found, but it will probably take more than one or two phone calls to land the ideal job.

Teens hoping to find work in camps and resorts should begin making

contacts now. Most of these type employers interview in early spring and secure help well before the tourist season begins.

Some common places for summer employment include city park and recreation commissions, fast food restaurants, department stores, landscaping and lawncare businesses and summer child care programs. These type jobs are usually advertised in local newspapers.

Telephone contacts should be made early, perhaps even before the jobs are advertised. You should ask if and when applications for summer work will be taken, and when you should begin the application process.

Many federal and state agencies provide summer employment for economically disadvantaged youth. If you fall into this category, contact the local state employment office or community service organization in charge of coordinating summer youth employment - Linda Bolton in the Community Action Agency Office at 423-7013. Application deadlines for these jobs also are usually in early spring.

Other steps to preparing for summer employment could include becoming more employable by taking first aid or a lifesaving course, required before employment at many parks, or learning specified job skills such as typing or bookkeeping through school courses.

Begin now to update resumes and job applications.

NEMCC Announces GED Test Schedule

If the lack of a high school diploma is the only thing standing between you and college, Northeast Mississippi Community College has good news for you.

The General Educational Development (GED) Test will be given at Northeast on February 21 and 22, April 29 and 30, May 23 and 24, and June 20 and 21.

Anyone desiring to write the GED must make application in the NEMCC Office of Continuing Education. Applicants must be a resident of the state of Mississippi for at least 30 days, 17 years old or older and if under 20 years old, the applicant must have been out of school for at least six months or his/her graduating class must have already graduated.

A \$15 fee and a current driver's license or birth certificate for identification are required. When the application is completed, a test date will be assigned. Walk-ins will not be admitted to the test.



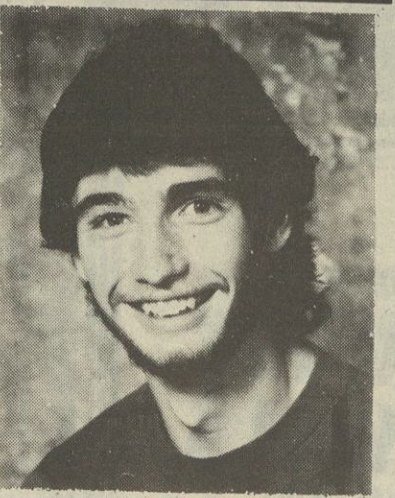

Ask Ochsner

Q. It has been awhile since I've had an eye exam. I don't feel that I need new glasses. Should I bother with a checkup?

A. A routine eye examination should be viewed as a health evaluation. "Our vision is viewed as the most important of our five senses. It is to our advantage to insure that it stays in working order," says Dr. Lynn Cauley, optometrist at the Ochsner Clinic of Baton Rouge.

The recommended frequency of

eye exams depends on a person's age, family history of eye disease and symptoms. As a general rule for these who do not have a significant history of symptoms, Dr. Cauley advises having the first exam between ages three and four, and a second exam at age six. You should have an exam every five to six years until the age of 40; every three years until age 55; and every year after 55.

Many serious eye problems are symptomless in their initial stages. Examples are glaucoma, retinal tears, holes, diabetic retinopathy. "None of these problems in their earliest and common form cause symptoms, such as blurry vision, pain, feeling or pressure, or the absence of vision," adds Dr. Cauley. "Only an eye exam will determine if you have these problems."

Vision problems which do present symptoms are cataracts, macular degeneration, spots and floaters, and amblyopia (lazy eye).

Cataracts are probably the most misunderstood of all eye diseases, notes the optometrist. "Most people think of them as tumors or growths that obscure the eye. Cataracts are defined as any clouding or discoloration of the eye's natural lens which is located directed behind the pupil."

Most cataracts start by the time a person is nearing early forties. It is not a question of if you will develop cataracts, by when. Concerns about family histories of cataracts are usually not critical, since all families whose members live a normal lifespan have a medical history of cataracts.

"Cataracts should be removed not because they are discovered by the physician, but when the patient can no longer comfortably function visually," explains Dr. Cauley.

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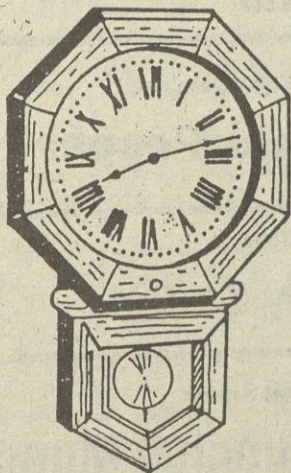

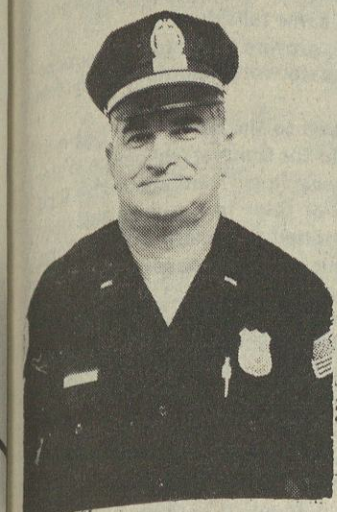

Funeral Services Held For Iuka Businessman



Purvis Cappleman, son of Bob and Edna Cappleman, was born on May 13, 1926, in Dumas, MS. Purvis attended school at Jumpertown and graduated from high school in Wheeler, MS.

After completing school, he worked at a variety of jobs including manager of a drug store in Knoxville, TN and a mechanic with the Frisco Railroad in Memphis, TN. Purvis met Ruth Owen in Memphis in 1945, and they were married the same year. In the latter part of 1945, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and went through basic training at Fort Smith, Ark. In 1946, Purvis was stationed in Italy, where he completed his tour of duty in 1947.

Upon his discharge from the U.S. Army, Purvis and Ruth (Big Darling and Little Darling) returned to Baldwyn, MS, and shortly afterwards moved to Memphis. Purvis held down several jobs in Memphis, including owning a trucking company.

In 1956, Purvis sold the trucking company and joined the Memphis Police Department. He began his career riding with Lt. Dick (W.W.) Davis as his training officer.

He was assigned to several different divisions of the department including some of the following: 1) emergency squad; 2) riot squad; 3) homicide; 4) park patrol; 5) warrant squad.

He ended his career working at the emergency room at John Gaston Hospital doing the administrative work due to his impending disability. At the time of his retirement he had reached the rank of lieutenant.

The following are some thoughts which his former brother on the police force, Eugene Steele, wanted to share regarding his companionship with Purvis:

He first met Purvis in 1956. Steele related how one of the first conversations he had with Purvis was about religious convictions and how they applied to his work on the police force. He was most impressed with his compassion for human beings.

Purvis' leisure times were spent fishing, hunting, and water skiing with his church members, and they found their vacation paradise in Tishomingo County at a new park called J.P. Coleman State Park.

Purvis Cappleman first came to Tishomingo County the first year that J.P. Coleman State Park was opened in 1960.

He and his family started coming to the park for 2 weeks every summer thereafter. There were approximately 10 close friends and families together with his pastor, Rev. William Foote, and his family from Beverly Hills Baptist Church in Memphis present during these weeks. They stayed in tents at the campground. This resulted in many special moments around the campfires. When the park first opened, you could only rent a cabin or camp for 2 weeks at a time, so Purvis started looking for a place where he could stay longer and come more often. He learned of the policeman, Bill Williams and his wife, who owned a cabin just outside Coleman Park and started staying with them.

It was then that he started looking for some land to buy so he could have his own place to stay.

He bought his first property from Julian Busby and Roy Dexter. It was at this time that he began to dream about building a subdivision.

The first people to purchase any property from Mr. Cappleman were Gus and Sue Poole from Memphis. They were next-door neighbors for 15 years. The property they purchased was intended for their future retirement. Gus and Sue stated, "We intended to be next door neighbors for life. Our son, Mark, was virtually a son of Purvis and Ruth. He was at their house as much as he was at his own home."

Purvis loved few things more in life other than his relationships with God and his family than to walk the many acres of property which he had purchased. He was always planning the future development of these properties which now encompass Coleman Park Estates.

One of Purvis' main pastimes and hobbies was collecting antiques and was a long-time member of the Memphis Bottle Club and enjoyed spending many hours researching the history of all types of bottles and he contributed to several magazine articles concerning bottles related to Iuka Mineral Springs.

Out of their passion for collecting, Purvis and Ruth's home was quickly overflowing with a variety of collec-

tions ranging from marbles to frogs. It was at this point that Purvis decided he needed an outlet for his excess collectibles. He located a store, just north of Iuka which had been previously occupied by Ed Hudson's garage.

In 1975, Purvis purchased the store and Cappleman's Antiques was open for business. Purvis would buy items in Memphis and take them to the store on his days off from the police department.

By this time Ruth and Purvis were planning their retirement in Iuka and had moved into their cabin near Pickwick Lake while keeping their home in Memphis. Ruth was mainly living in Iuka and managed the store while Purvis returned to Memphis to finish up his career with the Memphis Police Department.

In 1979 Purvis and Ruth's son-in-law and daughter, Lee and Kathy Everitt, moved to Iuka and joined them in running the antique store.

Late in 1979, the Capplemans purchased the old home of Will Brown in Iuka, and began to restore this 1878 home for themselves, as well as their daughter and son-in-law who were coming to join them in their antique store business. Purvis retired from the police department on Feb. 2, 1981, ending a 25-year career in law enforcement.

Mr. Cappleman's strong religious convictions and church affiliations enriched him with some very close friendships throughout his lifetime. Several friends have provided sentiments about him.

Frank Shoffner, one of his longest and dearest friends, said, "I knew Purvis for over 44 years. I first met him while he was attending Kennedy Baptist Church, now known as Audobon Baptist Church in Memphis. He was a charter member of Kennedy, which means he was one of the original 17 families who formed the church."

"He had a hand in doing many good deeds which few men knew about, because he was not doing things for his own personal praise, but for the Lord. The last trip he made overseas to Brazil, the Lord took him and brought him back due to the poor health he was in at that time. Purvis and Ruth were both the best friends Noela and I have had in Iuka."

Close friend and fellow Gideon, George Goldsmith, Memorial Bible Chairman, stated, "Purvis was a firm believer in the world wide Gideon organization. He was treasurer and qualified speaker for the Tishomingo County Camp. He was an inspiration to all members of this camp."

The Gideon organization is a non-denominational organization responsible for placing Bibles in hotels, motels, hospitals, doctors' offices, nursing homes, and prisons.

Mr. Cappleman was very involved in worldwide missions. He was active in the Partnership in Evangelism. The following is a list of mission trips he participated in:

- 1) 1985 - Argentina - represented two churches and there were over 1,500 professions of faith;
- 2) 1987 - Brazil - represented two churches and there were over 3,200 professions of faith;
- 3) 1988 - Argentina - represented two churches with over 2,000 professions of faith;
- 4) 1989 - Brazil - represented the Foreign Mission Board, Richmond, VA, with over 1,050 professions of faith;
- 5) 1990 - Brazil - represented the Foreign Mission Board, Richmond, VA, with over 1,600 professions of faith.

The Rev. E.P. Baldwin travelled with Mr. Cappleman on all of the mission trips mentioned above except for the last one in 1990. It was during the 1990 mission trip that he took his 16-year-old niece, Leslie Goode, with him due to his poor health. He always felt this was the best educational experience she would ever have.

Rev. Baldwin said, "Purvis took over my 1956 30-33 year old men's Sunday School class at Beverly Hills Baptist Church in Memphis. I left at this time to enter the seminary in order to answer the call of the Lord to go into the ministry field to be a preacher. He was the greatest lay person for evangelizing people that I ever have met."

"He will not only be deeply missed by his family, but also by all of his many, many friends he had made during his distinguished lifetime."

Services were at 3 p.m. Friday at the Iuka Baptist Church with the Rev. E.P. Baldwin, the Rev. William Foote, the Rev. James Owen, and Dr. Julian West officiating. Burial was in the Oak Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Cappleman is survived by his wife, Ruth of Iuka; his daughter Sara and her husband Bill Holcombe of Memphis; his daughter Deborah and her husband Thomas Hyland of Marlton, NJ; his daughter Kathy and her husband Lee Everitt of Iuka; three grandchildren, Gina Bedingfield of grandchildren, Dallas, TX, Leslie Goode of Memphis, and Michael Hyland of Marlton, NJ; and Michael Hyland of Marlton, NJ; his father, Bob Cappleman of Baldwyn, MS; his sister, Elizabeth Ford and her son Tony Ford of Tupelo; and many aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews throughout the country.
