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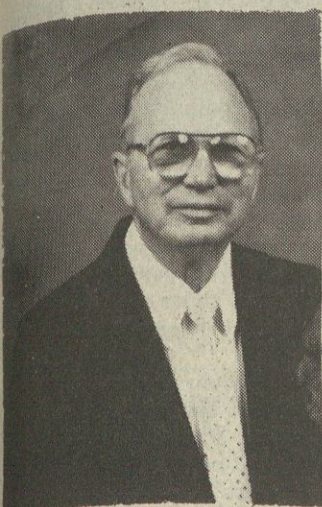

Funeral Services Held For Dr. Harry Cosby, Jr.



Dr. Harry Cosby, Jr., 67, died Sunday, February 17, 1991, at his son's residence in Columbus following a long illness.

Dr. Cosby had lived in Iuka since 1949. He had been a familiar face to many area residents as he practiced medicine until his retirement in June of 1976. His contributions to the city of Iuka and the Tri-State area were numerous.

Dr. Cosby was born and reared in Memphis, TN where he attended Central High School and West Tenn. State Teachers College. Upon graduation he was accepted into the University of Tenn. College of Medicine. Following graduation from Medical School he served two years in the U.S.A.F. stationed in Germany and France.

After returning from service he moved to Amory, MS, where he practiced for two years.

After the Cosby's moved to Iuka in 1949, Dr. Cosby set up his practice and opened the first hospital in Tishomingo County in May of 1950, named the Cosby Hospital Clinic.

Aided by the University of Tennessee, the Northeast Mississippi Regional Medical Program was established. Dr. Cosby was director of this program where multiphasic testing was performed in Tishomingo, Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah and Benton Counties. This program allowed the opportunity for people to receive complete physical examinations, at no cost, through the use of a mobile medical unit. Dr. Cosby's greatest desire was to provide good health care to the people of Tishomingo County and the surrounding areas.

Dr. Cosby was also instrumental in securing federal funds for the Pickwick Medical Center, Pickwick Dam, TN, where he served as Director

during the tenure of this program.

Upon retirement from private practice, Dr. Cosby continued to stay active by teaching nursing classes at Northeast Mississippi Community College and serving as physician for Tenn. Valley Authority.

He was an active member of the Iuka Baptist Church where he served as a deacon and supported many church activities. He was a member of the Iuka Rotary Club and promoted many community organizations.

Services were at 2 p.m. Monday at the Iuka Baptist Church with Dr. Julian West and Dr. Charles Dampier officiating. Burial was in the Oak Grove Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include his wife, Babe Cosby of Iuka; two sons, Walter Cosby, M.D. of Columbus and Harry Thomas Cosby, D.D.S. of Philadelphia, Pa.; two sisters, Juanita Smith of Memphis and Norma Carlson of Las Vegas, Nev.; three grandchildren.

Iuka Officers Apprehend 3 Suspects

Iuka police officers used bloodhounds to help capture two suspects wanted by authorities in Arkansas after they fled into a wooded area near an Iuka apartment complex on Sunday.

The two suspects, along with an Iuka woman, were arrested and charged with shoplifting from several local businesses.

Arrested were Bruce Edward Newboles, 25, and Shawna A. Newboles, 19, both of Paragould, Ark., and Misty Tipton, 23, of Pickwick Circle, Iuka, said Police Chief Amos Bates.

When officers entered an apartment at 601 Pickwick Circle, the Arkansas suspects fled on foot into nearby woods. The Iuka Rescue Squad assisted in the search using bloodhounds to track the man and woman. The search, hampered by rain, ended a short time later when both suspects were apprehended behind the Iuka Motel, Bates said.

The two Newboles, along with Tipton, were charged with shoplifting from Wal-Mart, Piggly Wiggly, and Nelsons stores in Iuka. The three may face similar charges in Corinth.

Bruce Newboles was transported to Arkansas where he faces several burglary charges. Both Shawna Newboles and Tipton are being held in the Tishomingo County Jail. Bond has been set at \$7,500 for each.

Police officers involved in the search and arrests were Rick Cornelison, Bobby Flynt, Johnny Nunley, and Randy Stringer.

Attention Fishermen

The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks has recently announced two fishing limitations.

There is a new statewide creel limit of 25 crappie per day, for both black crappie and white crappie.

The department also announced a 14-inch minimum length limit on small mouth bass on Pickwick Reservoir, Bay Springs Reservoir, and Divide Section of the Tenn-Tom Waterway. This limit is effective from February 17, 1991, until amended. All smallmouth bass under 14 inches total length must be immediately released and may not be in possession on these waters.

Search Continues On Tenn-Tom For Missing Teenager

Swollen Creek Scene Of Tragedy

A boat outing on the flood-swollen Little Yellow Creek ended in tragedy Tuesday as three teenagers in a small boat were swept into a turbulent spillway of the Tenn-Tom Waterway.

One teenager, A. J. Dillon, 18, a senior at Burnsville High School, managed to swim to safety. At press time Wednesday, the body of one companion, Darryl Shea, 16, a junior at Burnsville, had been pulled from the waterway and one boy, Brett Prewitt, 18, a senior at Burnsville, remains missing.

According to young Dillon, he and his friends went to the Little Yellow Creek area, just off Turnpike Road, around 3:00 Tuesday afternoon just to play. He said around 3:15 they accidentally entered the current of the spillway and jumped out of the boat. He and his friends went through the spillway. A. J. managed to swim to shore and made attempts to help his friends who had also survived the spillway. Realizing he could not rescue them, A. J. managed to make it to the Prewitt home and called for help. A search for the two young men began around 4:30 Tuesday afternoon. The body of Darryl Shea was found around 8:30 Wednesday morning just a short distance from the accident scene.

The Tishomingo County Rescue Squad, County Volunteer Fire Departments, local and county law officials, the Mississippi Fish and Game Commission, the Alcorn County Civil Defence, Burnsville Mayor, Bobby Johnson, and the Burnsville Fire Department and many friends are helping in the continued search.

Darryl Shea is the son of Ann and Danny Shea; Brett Prewitt is the son of Wanda and James Prewitt and A. J. Dillon is the son of Dottie and Steve Thompson.

Heavy Flooding Causes Damages To County Roads And Homes

Area creeks and ditches swelled and overflowed as heavy rains drenched Tishomingo County Sunday and Monday. An estimated 7 1/2 inches of rain was recorded in the area during a 36-hour period.

Damage to many county roads and bridges has occurred from flash flooding caused by the rains, said

First District Supervisor Frank Williams, Jr.

Williams said he had observed culverts and gravel washed out, and a lot of pavement damage to roads in the area. A number of county roads have been blocked off because of the rising water, he said. Signs are posted in these areas, he added.

Some area residents reported water leakage in their homes due to the continual, non-stop down pour.

Both Iuka and Tishomingo County schools cancelled classes Tuesday due to the road situation.

More rain was predicted to soak the area late Tuesday, with showers remaining possibly throughout the week.

DANGER SIGNALS OF TOO MUCH DEBT

Fortunately, potential debt problems can be spotted before they reach the serious stage. By knowing what danger signals to look for, you can take steps to prevent a problem

before it occurs.

Look over the checklist below. If any of these danger signals look familiar, you may be headed for financial trouble.

- You think of credit as cash, not debt.
- Your debts are greater than your assets.
- You owe more than seven creditors.
- You are an impulsive or compulsive shopper.
- You and your spouse are dishonest with each other about your

use of credit.

• You don't know how much your monthly living expenses are or the amount of your total debt.

• Your expected increase in income is already committed to paying off debts.

• You depend on extra income, such as earnings by a second person or overtime by the breadwinner, to help you make ends meet.

• You have less than 2 months' take-home pay in cash or savings where you can get to it quickly.

• You have to pay back several installment payments that will take over 12 months to pay off.

• You have more than 20 percent of your take-home pay committed to credit payments other than your home mortgage.

• You get behind in utility or rent payments.

• You have to consolidate several loans into one or reduce monthly payments by extending current loans in order to pay your debts.

• You cannot afford to pay for regular living expenses or credit payments; therefore you,

*Take out a loan.

*Withdraw savings.

*Skip payments.

*Pay only the minimum amount due on your charge accounts.

If you checked at least four of the above statements, examine your budget and look for ways to tighten your belt. If you checked five or more, you are probably headed for financial trouble. If you checked seven or more, then you are in financial danger.

Spots Before Your Eyes

If you've been seeing spots before your eyes, this may be due to a minor disturbance in circulation. Spots are commonly translucent and without any well-defined shape. They seem to float in the air before the eyes and move when your eyes move, usually a little away from center. Sometimes they disappear for a time and then reappear without causing any serious impairment of vision.

You are probably more aware of them whenever your circulation is disturbed in some way. This can be caused by stress, anxiety, fatigue, illness, or heavy smoking. Spots can also be caused by minor changes within the vitreous or white matter of the eye. The vitreous is a jelly-like liquid that tends to become thinner and more fluid as a person gets older. This may cause it to shrink somewhat and draw forward, separating from the retina. However, this is not considered harmful. Whatever the cause, however, if you're experiencing spots before your eyes you may want to have them examined to see if any other problems are indicated.

CHEMICALS ON CROPS

More than 360 county agents participating in a national survey said the American public perceives agricultural pest control as essential.

The poll also indicated that most Americans think a ban on agrichemical use would have negative consequences.

Despite public support for pest control, most of the agents said the use of agrichemicals is in jeopardy. The solution, they said, is to improve understanding of why chemicals are used on crops and what safeguards are provided to the public.

Many agents in our state agree with this point, and so do I. Let's work toward a better understanding of these products and how they are used. Read product labels. Ask questions of your Tishomingo County Extension Office personnel. We're here to help.

USING TICK REPELLENTS

People in Tishomingo County are more conscientious about protecting themselves from ticks because of publicity stirred by Lyme disease. The use of tick repellents containing N-diethyl-metaltolamide can be hazardous to health if not used properly.

Although many products with this ingredient are recommended for application on skin, health officials now say these products should be applied on clothing only. The ingredient, which is found in such products as

Bedwetting: Causes and Cures

According to a recent study, 14 percent of children between the ages of 5 and 13 wet the bed. Nighttime bedwetting can result from many different causes. Heredity seems to be a big factor. It has been reported that in 44 percent of families with a child that wets the bed, one of the child's parents also was a bedwetter. The incidence is higher if both parents were bedwetters.

Organic causes of bedwetting include structural defects in the urinary tract at birth, a small bladder, urinary tract infections, diabetes, epilepsy, and neurological problems. Researchers recently found that the absence of the hormone *vasopressin* may be a factor in childhood bedwetting. Organic causes may require surgery or other procedures.

Nonorganic causes may be approached with behavioral techniques. The child may be instructed to take charge of such things as making a trip to the bathroom before bedtime, washing soiled bedclothes, and charting the progress of the number of dry nights experienced. Moisture alarm systems are sometimes useful. Prescription medicines used to treat bedwetting include *vasopressin*, certain *antidepressants*, and occasionally, *amphetamines*.

ALTERNATIVE CROPS

Many vegetable growers in Tishomingo County seek new alternative crops for their farms. In this definition, the word "alternative" refers to crops not customarily grown in Mississippi.

There are a good number of alternative crops that have not been tried in Mississippi or in Tishomingo County. Some of these new crops include vegetable varieties from Asia, Africa and the tropics. Gourmet and baby vegetables are two more options.

Dr. Richard Snyder, a horticulturist at the Truck Crops Branch Experiment Station in Crystal Springs, is a good resource person on specialty vegetables. PRUNING TIPS

Apple and pear trees bear fruit on short structures called "spurs." These spurs do not grow much each year, so home gardeners should not worry if they see little growth.

Heavy pruning done yearly on apple and pear trees does more harm than good. It stimulates new growth that is susceptible to fireblight. Prune mature apple and pear trees only to remove dead or diseased limbs.

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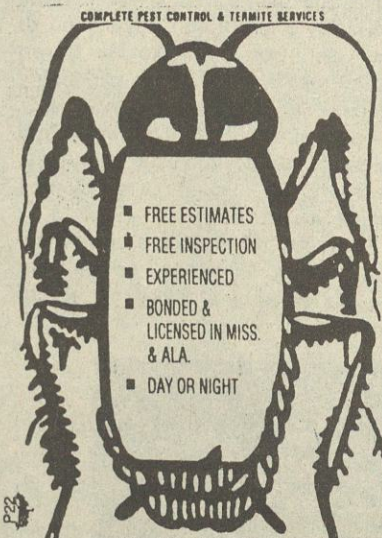
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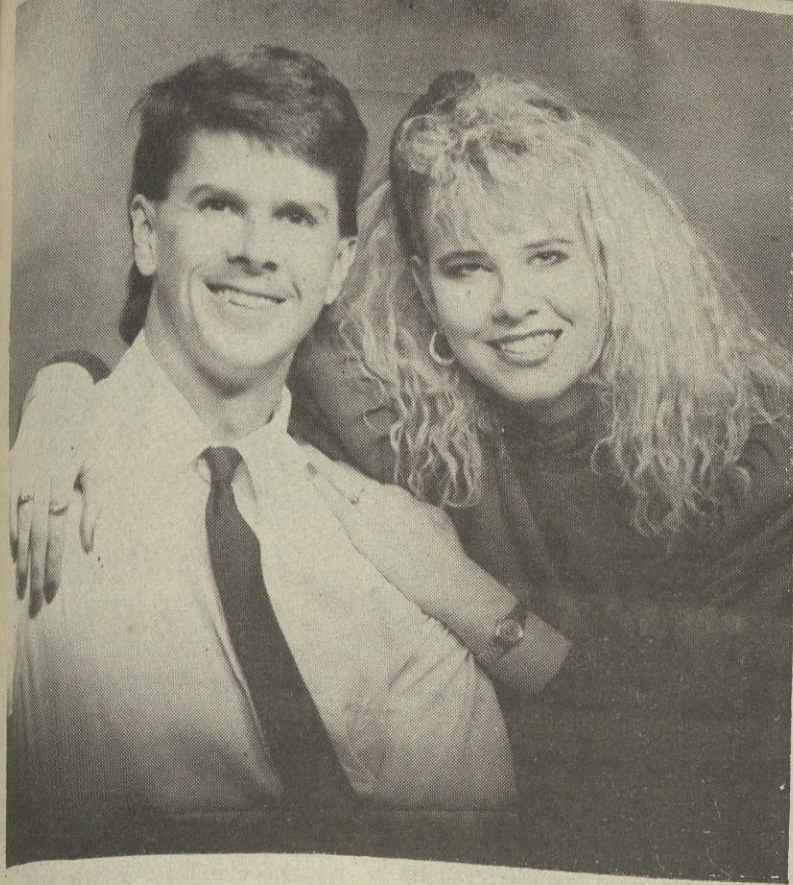

At The Old Courthouse

Recently I visited in Jackson, Mississippi before attending the Mississippi Museum Conference. I was amazed at the number of museums in Jackson. They range from the Brooks Robertson Museum to the Mississippi Agricultural Museum.

The museum I was most fascinated with was the Mississippi State Historical Museum in the Old State Capitol Building. I was greeted at the front desk by a receptionist who directed me to the curator's office where I found the Exhibits Curator, Cavett Taff. Mr. Taff has been advising The Old Tishomingo County Courthouse Museum on displaying artifacts and exhibits.

I was pleased to finally meet him. Mr. Taff wanted me to look through the displays on my own and confer with him later in the day.

I was glad that I was able to walk through at my own pace. As a history buff, it was all very exciting and educational. The tour started with the Prehistoric Indian Collection. This room held displays ranging from ancient tools, arrowheads and pottery to an ancient wooden canoe that had been found buried under a construction site.

Another room was devoted to Jefferson Davis, a Mississippi Statesman and only President of the Southern Confederacy. The room contained artifacts from Davis' life from his extensive military career, political career and life after the Civil War. Davis' personal guns and swords were displayed in several cases along with pictures, letters and documents. A small replica of his final home, Beauvoir, in Biloxi was displayed in the room.

Several rooms were devoted to a

historical collection of artifacts and illustrations displayed with a wide variety of techniques. The exhibits display themes that are coordinated and progress in an order from display to display, room to room. The exhibits tell the entire story of Mississippi from Indians to Civil Rights.

I toured the governor's office, house chamber, and the senate which were all restored during the restoration of the entire Old Capitol in 1957.

Cavett Taff took me on a behind-the-scenes look at the museum. He pointed out several artifacts and pictures which were directly related to Tishomingo County. An exhibit on the history of the Old Capitol Building holds a book that was taken from the state library in the Old capitol when Sherman's Army pillaged the town in 1862. The book was found at a camp site in Tishomingo County by T. Coman of Iuka in 1863. The book was returned to the State Archives in 1926 with the inscriptions of where the book had been. The book alone was impressive, but Taff combined artifacts and illustrations to tell a story.

Another interesting display has a working weaving loom. The capitol runs working displays of making cloth on the loom during the year. The loom has carved into the front beam an inscription "Loom made in Tishomingo County Mississippi."

The vast storage areas were breathtaking! Cavett took me into rooms where shelves were filled with tagged artifacts. Clothes hung bagged on huge racks, costumes from eras going back 400 years. One small room held nothing but tagged swords, another paintings and portraits, guns, and musical instruments. It was a history buff's heaven! Taff showed me the instruments for measuring heat and humidity. Too much heat

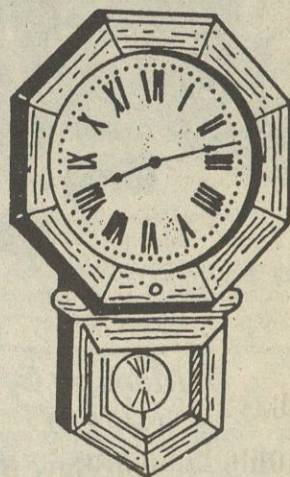
with high humidity in a room will ruin artifacts by causing mold. Cold with low humidity can cause paper to become brittle and crack. It does the same with clothes. Rust and rot, can also be a problem. Preserving and restoring objects is a complicated task. You have to be so careful with artifacts. Gloves are always worn when handling objects to protect them from body acids that could cause deterioration of an object. This deterioration could be immediate or take 100 years. "we don't like to take chances even through the article might be deteriorated in 100 years because we want the article to be here 100 or even 500 years from now". Says Taff, "We are only the

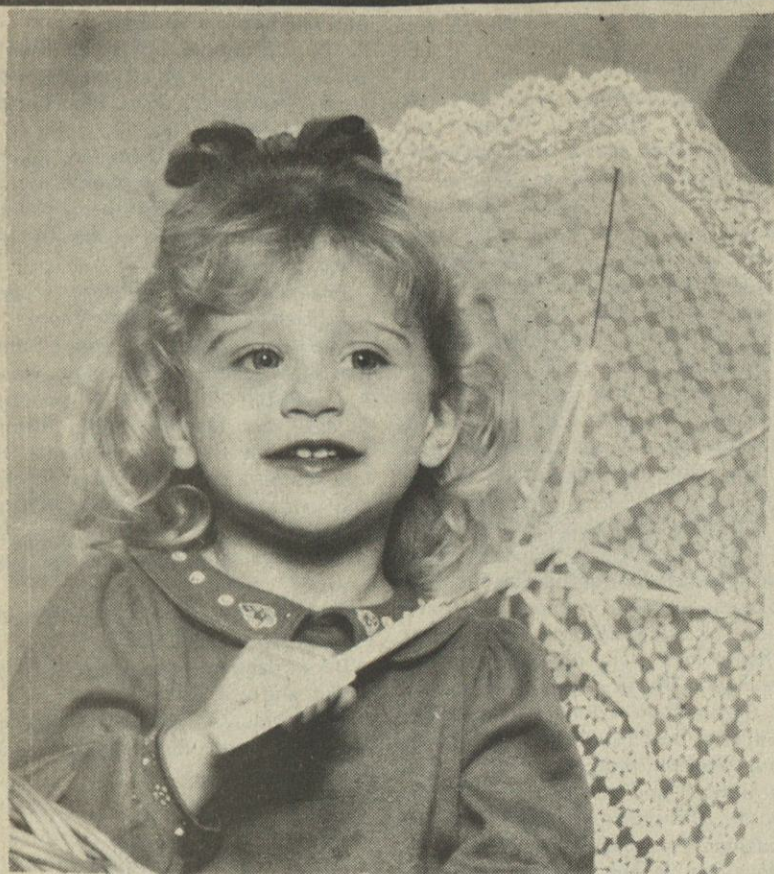

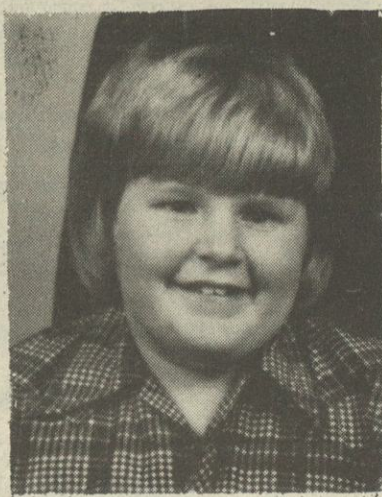

The House gave unanimous approval to a bill aimed at cracking down on abuse of the state's bingo law by clearly spelling out the non-profit organizations allowed to conduct bingo games, requiring quarterly financial reports, and making sure that proceeds are used as intended for charitable purposes.

A main thrust of the bill is to halt commercial bingo operations carried on in the name of charity when most of the proceeds, in fact, go into the pockets of the operators.

As approved by the House, the bill restricts bingo games to nationally chartered veterans' organizations and other nonprofit charitable groups, including churches, which are exempt under Section 501(c) of federal tax laws.

Another measure gaining swift House passage provides for the regulation by the Consumer Protection Division in the Attorney General's Office of certain charitable fund-soliciting organizations and professional fund raisers. Most states already have similar laws.

A number of exemptions are allowed under the measure including certain religious organizations, educational institutions, groups that raise less than \$4,000 a year, and fraternal, social, and patriotic groups that solicit contributions solely among their own members.

A measure to tighten the state's gun permit law won decisive approval but was later recalled and temporarily retained on the House calendar so some amendments might be offered. The bill makes several changes in the 1990 law allowing citizens who are 21 or over to carry a concealed weapon for self-protection if they get a per-

mit.

The bill still contains restrictions on who can obtain a permit, and lists several places where guns will be prohibited such as schools, churches, courthouses, colleges, athletic events, airport terminals, and other locations. In addition, people in charge of the facilities would be authorized to restrict guns from a shopping center or private business, but public notice would have to be posted.

A permit would not be required for anyone over 21 to have a concealed weapon in their own home, business, or motor vehicle. It also would be legal to carry a concealed weapon without a permit if going hunting or target shooting.

Gun permits would be issued for four years instead of three years as the law now provides, and the Public Safety Department would have 120 rather than 30 days to conduct background checks on applicants. The initial fee would remain at \$100 but an amendment was adopted to lower the renewal fee to \$50.

Also, the Public Safety Department would keep a record of permit holders and make the information available to law enforcement agencies on request, but the list would not be open for public inspection.

The House voted to make several technical changes in public employment retirement laws and broaden the retirement board's authority to invest its idle funds. Among other things, the legislation seeks to clarify the definition of disability in existing laws, and would let Mississippi troops in the Middle East claim credit for public retirement purposes of up to four years of active military service. A similar credit is now allowed for military duty but only through the end of the Vietnam War in 1975. This bill allows such credit regardless of when the military service is performed.

Several insurance bills were approved including proposals to prohibit firms from cancelling proper-

ty and casualty policies because of a damage claim resulting from an act of God; prohibit raising auto liability premiums because of an accident in which the insured was not at fault; require written notice of reasons for cancellation of policies; require a company which sells homeowner or standard fire insurance to pay \$100 to volunteer fire departments responding to fire calls in rural areas; and regulate insurance premium finance companies.

The wide range of other bills winning House passage include a natural gas marketing act to help protect the rights of owners of natural gas wells and wells producing casinghead gas; a measure allowing municipalities to make contributions to soil conservation districts; a bill to provide for plugging abandoned oil or gas wells considered a threat to public health and safety; and legislation to reenact laws creating a number of boards or commissions due to expire unless extended including the Oil and Gas Board, State Insurance Commission and Rating Bureau, Motor Vehicle Commission, Agricultural Aviation Board, and Advisory Committee to the Board of Architecture.

The House also voted to increase various fees by the insurance industry to help support the State Insurance Department; allow certain fees collected by the department of Public Safety to be placed in a special fund earmarked for the agency; require the Public Safety Department to keep confidential a driver's first tow moving traffic violations, with certain exemptions; allow the department of Corrections to collect a monthly probation fee of \$20 from all offenders under its supervision, in-

cluding those from other states. The bill requires the State Education Department to be notified any time a school teacher is convicted of a felony offense; permit the Commission on Agriculture to impose penalties for violations of the gasoline and petroleum products inspection laws; authorize purchases up to \$50,000 without advertising for bids on public purchasing laws (the present limit is \$2,500); permit a first offender who is under 23 and convicted of a non-violent felony to request that conviction be stricken from public records; empower the Division of Plant Industry to deal with Africanized "killer" honey bees; require the Governor to stay within revenue projections in making budget recommendations to the Legislature. Any proposals by Governor involving new source revenues would have to be submitted separately.

Another House-passed bill would amend the state's "lemon" law to provide added protection to consumers in disputes involving defective motor vehicles. The measure provides that federally mandated arbitration proceedings in disputes would be held in Mississippi, and the owner of the vehicle would have a right to be present.

And a bill was approved to designate the spicebush swallowtail as the official state butterfly of Mississippi.

Mississippi House

The House of Representatives, working to meet a crucial deadline, handled a towering stack of bills over the past week dealing with such diverse issues as compulsory auto insurance, bingo, tightening the state's gun permit law, and changes in public employment retirement laws.

There was a sharp increase in floor action as the drive got underway to meet a Valentine Day's cutoff for initial floor action on general bills and constitutional amendments. The deadline does not apply to revenue bills, appropriations, or general legislation passed earlier by the op-

posite chamber.

Motorists would be required to have at least minimum liability insurance on cars and trucks under one of the major bills approved by the House. A similar proposal was passed by the House in 1990 but died in the Senate. It would require vehicle owners to show proof of coverage before getting a tag and carry a certificate from their insurance agent in their vehicle. Violators would face stiff penalties.

Minimum coverage would be raised to \$25,000 for bodily injury or death to one person; \$50,000 for injury or death to two or more people; and \$10,000 for property damage. Current requirements under the state's old financial responsibility law are

from placing the land in the CRP when compared to dollars of cost.

Producers will be permitted to enter the same acreage simultaneously into the annual commodity programs and the CRP, and to withdraw from the commodity programs, without penalty, if their CRP bid is accepted.

USDA needs 30 days to evaluate and accept a bid but acceptance is not binding on either the producer of USDA until the contract is signed.

Fifty percent cost-share assistance will continue to be available to establish needed permanent vegetative cover, including trees, on the accepted acres. Annual rental payments for 10 years also will be paid to CRP participants, based upon their bid, except in some limited cases, such as hardwood tree planting, where a longer period may apply.

Further details will be made available to producers in the near future through their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices.

USDA ANNOUNCES ARP/CRP SIGNUPS AND CRP PROGRAM PROVISIONS FOR 1991

Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter announced the 1991 Acreage Reduction Program signup will be March 4 through April 26, and the 10th Conservation Reserve Program signup will be March 4 through March 15.

Under new CRP program provisions, bids on eligible land will be accepted based on environmental benefits obtained per dollar of cost to USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation.

Producers cautioned that they should not rely on bid amounts which have been accepted in previous years when making their bids. In past signups, there was a high expectation that a producer could rely on no change occurring with respect to the bid amounts which would be accepted. Producers who wish to enroll in the CRP should be aware there is increased competition.

Land eligibility requirements will be expanded from past signups to include not only highly erodible land, but also other cropland acres that reduce the impairment of water quality or improve wellhead protection. Wellheads are sources of water for municipalities. Bids will be accepted for protection of these wellheads as well as areas designated by states as '319 areas', which have been determined to be a source of water quality problems.

To increase water quality benefits under CRP, producers offering areas such as filterstrips, sod waterways, shelterbelts and contour grass strips will receive additional consideration during the bid evaluation process.

Bids for enrolling wetlands will not be accepted during this signup. The Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade act of 1990 establishes a Wetland Reserve Program and we will announce details of this program in the near future.

CRP bids will be accepted only for contracts beginning in 1991 and bid acceptance determinations will be made after a nationwide review and evaluation. Selection will be made after a nationwide review and evaluation. Selection will be based on the environmental benefits received

Ask Ochsner

Q. What is Meniere's disease?

A. Meniere's disease is a disorder of the inner ear that leads to attacks of vertigo, a sensation that your surroundings are whirling around you, along with other ear symptoms. It is named for the French physician who described the disease in 1861.

The exact cause of the disease remains unknown, says Dr. Timothy Molony, neuro-otologist at the Ochsner Clinic. "Meniere's disease may be caused by a host of problems," adds Molony. "Among these are inner ear trauma such as a head injury, circulatory problems, viral infections to the ear, autoimmune diseases and possibly allergies."

Associated symptoms include a gradual distortion of sound, loss of hearing, and ringing in the affected ear. Episodes may occur several times a week or only once every two to three years. Regular sufferers may have remissions lasting months to years.

Attacks of dizziness may occur suddenly or without warning. These are often associated with nausea and

vomiting, as well as sweating. A sensation of pressure or fullness in the ear is often present.

The root of the problem appears to be abnormal fluid pressure within the inner ear. It is not known what leads the fluid to accumulate. The excess pressure from the fluid buildup causes dizziness, which may or may not be associated with head or ear pressure.

The disease affects both sexes equally and the first symptoms may occur at any age, however, it most often strikes between the ages of 30 and 50. Initially, the problem involves only one ear, but 20 to 40 percent of affected persons eventually develop symptoms in both ears.

There is no cure for Meniere's disease. Treatment attempts to correct the inner ear problem if found. Medication can help alleviate the dizziness, nausea and anxiety that accompany an acute attack. In severe cases of the disease, surgery is an option and is performed to relieve the vertigo. Surgery is usually ineffective in curing the hearing loss, ear pressure or ringing in the affected ear. Other illnesses can masquerade as Meniere's. These include inflammation of the inner ear, circulatory problems or benign tumors of the auditory nerve. Diagnostic testing will determine if the problem is Meniere's disease.

The Church Is Regulated

Some think of the church as being pretty much what we want it to be. Some have even suggested that the reason there are so many churches is so that folks can have a choice of where and how to serve God - as there are choices of ice cream. But the New Testament portrays the church as being regulated.

The doctrine taught and received among churches in the Bible was governed. Controversy raged over issues such as the circumcising of Gentile converts (Acts 15); the incarnation (II John 7); the resurrection (II Tim. 2:17-18) and others. It does make a difference what one believes. Some teachings are acceptable, some are not.

Organization of the church was regulated. The reason this must be so is that local church leaders, elders, were to meet qualifications. They were to be temperate, able to teach, not self-willed, the husband of one wife with faithful children, et. (I Tim. 3; Tit. 1) Those who did not meet these qualifications could not be overseers of the local church as elders. No arrangement was made for any other. If there were no regulations, why list these qualifications?

Membership in the congregations was regulated. Not everyone was accepted. (Rom. 14:1; Tit. 3:10) Some were ousted. (I Cor. 5) Fellowship was not open to just anyone, but to the faithful. That being the case, certainly one can look at God's word and distinguish between "faithful" and "unfaithful."

Other things, like the work and practice of the church, were to be monitored by brethren according to the word. But these examples serve to show that the Biblical church was controlled by God.

To the Corinthian church the apostle Paul wrote, "If anyone defiles the temple of God, God will destroy him. For the temple of God is holy, which temple you are." (I Cor. 3:17)

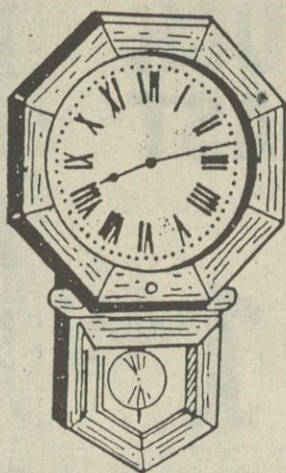

Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

Most People Don't Need Extra Carnitine

Why do manufacturers of vitamins and minerals not put vitamin B-T in their supplements?

About 40 years ago it was shown that *carnitine* - a substance that resembles an amino acid - was a necessary vitamin for the mealworm. Carnitine was designated vitamin B-T. Although carnitine is sometimes termed a "vitamin" in relation to human nutrition, the substance is *not* a vitamin in humans. In the body, carnitine is necessary for metabolism of certain fatty acids. Individuals who have low carnitine levels may develop abnormalities in blood levels of lipids (fatty acids).

Carnitine is manufactured by the healthy human body and also is found in meat and dairy products. During periods of stress, critically ill individuals and newborns may develop low carnitine levels. The major source of carnitine for the infant is milk. According to Peggy Borum, Ph.D., at the University of Florida, most infant formulas are supplemented with carnitine so that the final concentration is similar to that of human milk.

Dr. Borum writes that, although carnitine is commercially available as a "nutrient supplement," these products vary greatly in purity and are not regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

Northeast Football Signees Named

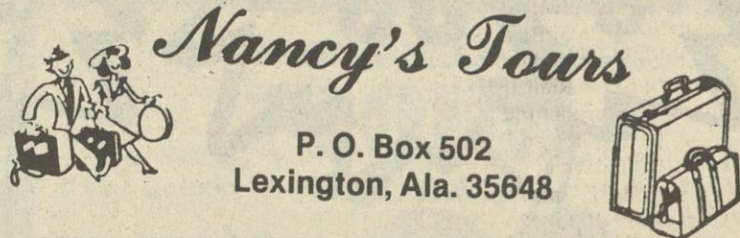
