Iuka's Company C, 1/198th Armor Receives Eisenhower Trophy

Company C, 1/198th Armor of Iuka received the Eisenhower Trophy while training at Fort Hood, Texas, on February 26, 1991. The Eisenhower Trophy is awarded annually to the most outstanding company of the Mississippi National Guard. The trophy was first awarded in 1953. It is based on strength, attendance, tank gunnery, and individual weapons qualification.

Brigadier General Brackeen awarded the trophy to Company Commander E. James Oliver III of Winona, Mississippi.

First Sergeant Roger Helton of Iuka said, "It was all possible because of my people." Without good people, Helton added, it would have been impossible to receive such a prestigious award.

Company C, along with the 155th Armored Brigade, will be moving to the National Training Center located at Fort Irwin, California on March 5. Training should be completed by the end of March. The company will then move to Fort Carson, Col. for more training with the 4th Infantry Division.

Senator Lott Proposes Bill To Award Congressional Gold Medal To Schwarzkopf

General Norman Schwarzkopf, the U.S. commander in the battle for the liberation of Kuwait, would become the latest recipient of the Congressional Gold Medal under a bill introduced last week by U. S. Senator Trent Lott of Mississippi.

"This is a national award for a national hero," Lott said in introducing the legislation. "General Schwarzkopf has led the high noon showdown at the Kuwait corral and come away a victor. Anything less than national recognition would be deficient."

"The country is very fortunate to have a man like General Schwarzkopf to lead our forces in such an effort. This award is a small attempt to express our national pride and appreciation for his efforts."

Lott said previous recipients included: Fleet Admiral Ernest King in World War II; General of the Army George Marshall in World War II; General John J. Pershing, for heroic achievements; Admiral Hyman Rickover, on two occasions; and General Douglas MacArthur for gallant service.

"The efforts of General Schwarzkopf and the coalition forces have decisively crushed the Iraqi aggressor forces. As of Wednesday, U.S. and coalition forces had destroyed 40 out of 42 Iraqi army divisions. Saddam's navy is no longer a threat and his air force resides in Iran," Lott said in a speech on the Senate floor.

"In a matter of weeks, the world's fourth largest army has been eliminated. It has truly been an historic effort with tremendous leadership from General Schwarzkopf. His strategy and planning are very responsible for the success that we have seen."

The bill has not yet been voted on by the Congress.

Spring Course Offered In Yellow Creek Region

The University of Mississippi has announced official registration for two more education courses being offered in the NASA/Yellow Creek region during the 1991 spring semester.

Bob Oesterling, associate director of the Ole Miss Center for Public Service and Continuing Studies, said registration for "Organization of Special Education" (EDSP431 and 631) will be held Wednesday, March 20 from 4 to 5 p.m. at Iuka High School Library. Classes will meet at 4:30 - 9 p.m. at the Iuka High School Library on the following Tuesday: March 26, April 2, 9, 16, 23, 30 and May 7.

Tuition and fees, due and payable at registration, are \$68 per credit hour for undergraduates and \$90 per credit hour for graduates. A \$10 late registration fee will be assessed after March 20.

Students electing to drop and/or add classes, after having been officially enrolled, must complete a drop/add form indicating the change to be made. Refunds will be computed on the time of official notification of withdrawal.

Gulf War Ends

President George Bush Calls For Cease-fire After Defeat Of Iraq

Surprise, joy, and relief describe the way many Americans reacted to the news that the fighting in the Persian Gulf had ended.

And perhaps foremost on the minds of many citizens is when the American troops will be able to return home from Saudi Arabia.

President George Bush announced a cease-fire for Operation Desert Storm, which went into effect at midnight EST on Wednesday, February 27.

The president's action followed the retreat of Iraqi troops from their stations in occupied Kuwait after Allied ground forces staged an offensive attack to drive them out.

Iraqi soldiers surrendered by the thousands in the brief ground battle.

Iraq, in defeat, agreed to all peace terms demanded by the United Nations on Sunday, March 3, laying the foundation for a formal end to the Persian Gulf war. The war began with an Allied air attack on January 17, 1991.

Despite the cease-fire, no definite dates have been confirmed on which American troops will be transported home from the Middle East.

Families and friends of many soldiers from the area who were deployed to the Gulf are anxiously awaiting word of the troops' dismissal from active duty.

The 155th Armored Brigade of the state National Guard, consisting of many local members, was activated in December. The 155th was stationed at Camp Shelby near Hattiesburg for a short time before moving to Fort Hood, Texas. According to a news release, the unit will be moving from Fort Hood to the National Training Center in Fort Irwin, Calif., sometime this week.

U.S. Rep. Sonny Montgomery predicted that the 155th would spend 3½ weeks in California and return to Camp Shelby for a month before being released from active duty.

Montgomery also said there was no talk of sending guard units to Saudi Arabia to replace troops there.

Candlelight vigils and prayer services have been held in many areas to honor the efforts of our servicemen and women and to pay tribute to those who lost their lives in the conflict.

Burnsville Man Dies Following Barn Fire

A Burnsville man collapsed and died while attempting to extinguish a fire on his property last Saturday.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs identified the man as Henry Stacy Grimes, of Route 1, Burnsville.

According to Rick Inlow of the Burnsville Fire Department, the department received a call at 7:40 p.m. Saturday and the unit arrived several minutes later. Grimes was found unconscious not far from a barn which was totally destroyed by fire. Inlow said that firemen began administering CPR until ambulance services arrived. Grimes was transported to the Iuka Hospital where he was later pronounced dead.

Results of an autopsy revealed that Grimes died of an apparent heart attack, said Dale White, Tishomingo County Coroner/Medical Examiner. The victim also sustained first and second degree burns over much of his body, White said.

An arson investigation conducted by the deputy state fire marshal from Tupelo revealed no trace of arson in the incident, Inlow said. The investigator did determine that the fire probably originated in a shed in the back of the barn, but could not determine what started the blaze.

A running water hose was found near Grimes which indicated that he was apparently attempting to put out the blaze when he collapsed, Inlow said.

The incident is under a continuing

investigation.

Services for Grimes were held Tuesday, March 5 at Coleman Funeral Home Chapel with George Coleman Sr. officiating. Burial was in Harmony Hill Cemetery.

Grimes was a carpenter, farmer and landowner. He was a veteran of the Korean War and was a Methodist.

Survivors include his wife, Debbie Armendariz Grimes of Burnsville; five sons, Howard Grimes, Johnny Grimes, Jimmy Ray Grimes, Darren Grimes and Junior Grimes, all of Burnsville; one daughter, Mary Roberson of Collierville, TN.; two stepsons, Daniel Armendariz and David Armendariz, both of Burnsville; his mother, Kitty Dilworth Grimes of Counce, TN.; one brother, Jerry D. Grimes of Counce; four sisters, Louise Beaty of Nashville, TN., Katherine Nordby and Mary Moore, both of Berwyn, Ill. and Martha Hiller of Lagrange, Ill.; and five grandchildren.

County Road Project Awarded To Dement Construction Company

The Mississippi State Highway Commission has awarded a project for work in Tishomingo County, according to Zack Stewart, northern district highway commissioner.

Dement Construction Company of Jackson, Tennessee received the award as the low bidder at a contract cost of \$174,000.00.

Stewart said the contract provides for joint repair on Mississippi Highway 25 over the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

The commissioner said traffic will be handled under "one way" operation.

Stewart explained that temporary traffic signals will be installed at both ends of the bridge.

He urges all who drive through the work zone to use extreme caution and to obey all traffic signs.

The completion date is July 31, 1991.

NEMCC/DECD To Host Conference March 19th

Northeast Mississippi Community College and the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development will host an "Advanced Solid Rocket Procurement Conference" March 19 at 5:30 p.m. on the Northeast Campus.

Located in Iuka, the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor Plant is a \$500 million project for manufacturing solid rocket propellant (SRC) of the NASA shuttle booster. Production of SRP and SRC will be fully automated by utilizing the state-of-the-art facility in the manufacturing process.

According to Duane Bullard, director of industrial services at NEMCC, "The ASRM project, contracted by Lockheed and subcontracted by Aerojet and Rust International, will provide ample contracting opportunities for Mississippi businesses."

"This regional conference is designed to help Mississippi

businesses effectively reach and supply the ASRM project by providing them with the opportunity to meet with other business representatives, and procurement specialists, and representatives of the three major contractors.

Bullard says he hopes this conference will open a direct, face-to-face channel of communication between active Mississippi businesses and the ASRM contractors.

The conference will be held in the Patterson Hall Auditorium from 6:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. Registration is scheduled at 5:30. There is no fee for the conference and attendance is open to any company interested in selling goods and services to NASA and the prime contractors.

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Forestry News

"Strange as it may seem every tree in Tishomingo County was once a tiny seed", stated Sherrill Umfress, Commissioner for Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District. He added, "Even the tallest pine or hardwood trees were once just a speck of material".

"Anyone can plant tree seedlings", he remarked, "but not everyone can plant them successfully". He pointed out that it was necessary to combine the right species with the right site and plant them at the right time in order to achieve the best growth and survival.

"There are three things necessary for the seedling to grow, food, water, and sunlight".

"Water is present in the soil with minerals for the seedling root system to absorb. The leaves collect sunlight and gases which are added to the water and minerals to form food for the plant".

"A tree grows in three ways: up, down, and around", commented County Forester Brendix Glasgo, Mississippi Forestry Commission. He continued, "When a tree adds height, it is growing from the tips of the branches. The tree roots grow by adding more roots and going deeper into the ground". He continued, "The third way a tree grows is by putting on more layers around the trunk itself. Always remember that the trunk or main body of the tree never grows

upward." He added, "If you drive a nail into the trunk of a round tree, it will always remain in the same place. This is because a tree grows only from the outer part."

It was pointed out that the size of our forest has been greatly reduced with only about half of our original forest area still remaining. Much of the land that had been forest because farm land and sites for cities, factories, airports, and roads. However, some of the land became barren waste because of forest fires, and poor timber management practices.

For a long while few people thought of treating our forest with care because it was believed that they would last forever." He continued, "Finally, landowners realized that the forest were being destroyed and began taking care of them by preventing forest fires, insuring future growth through the sustained yield method, and by planting seedlings in the barren areas".

"Let's be glad that we have learned to develop a good program of forest use and care". Remember, forests are one of the gifts of nature which can be renewed. Other things like minerals, oil, sulfur, and salt will not grow back. This is not true with trees. Our forest will continue to give us products of value forever if we take care of them.

NEMCC To Host Annual Science Fair

Northeast Mississippi Community College will host the Region IV Science Fair in Bonner Arnold Coliseum Thursday, March 21. The fair will include entries from 16 north Mississippi counties.

Projects will be divided into five classes. Classes one and two include grades 1-6 and has six categories each. Classes three, four and five include grades 7-12 and have eleven categories each.

Each category will have a 1st through 5th place winner. In class three (grades 7 and 8) the first three place winners will participate in the State Science Fair at Jackson State University on April 12. In classes four and five (grades 7-12) all five place winners will attend the state-wide competition. Class one and two winners will not be eligible to participate at JSU.

Contestants may begin setting up their displays in the gym at 8:00 a.m. on March 21. Judging will take place at 1:00 p.m. followed by an open house for public viewing of the projects from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Winners will be announced at an awards ceremony at 8:00 p.m. Two winners will be chosen to compete at the International Science Fair in Orlando, Florida, May 5-11. Two alternates will be selected, but will only attend the event if one of the winners is unable to make the trip.

Pharmacy & Your Health

What To Do About Morning Sickness

One of the most common complaints experienced during pregnancy is morning sickness. According to recent statistics, about 60 percent of all pregnant women experience early morning nausea and vomiting, usually during the first three months of pregnancy. However, only a few women experience severe vomiting throughout the day.

Most physicians are cautious in prescribing medicines for pregnancy-related nausea and vomiting. A common recommendation is to avoid large meals. Eating small portions of low-fat foods at frequent intervals has been shown to be beneficial in some cases. Some physicians suggest treating morning sickness with soda crackers and caffeine-free soft drinks. Avoiding spicy foods and the smell of foods may help prevent the nausea and vomiting.

If these measures are not successful, nonprescription medicines that are proven safe to take during pregnancy may be helpful. A phosphorated carbohydrate solution such as *Emetrol* may help reduce nausea. According to a recent article in *Pharmacy Times*, the antihistamine *meclizine hydrochloride* is considered by some to be the drug of choice for the management of morning sickness. However, no medicine should be consumed during pregnancy without the advice of a physician.

Mr. & Mrs. E. C. Holtsford To Celebrate Anniversary

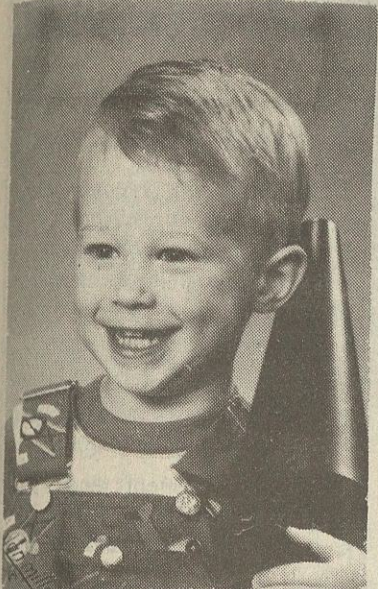

MILK FROM AROUND THE WORLD!
Even though nearly all milk products in America come from cows, you might drink unusual milk in other countries. In Arctic lands reindeer milk is used and in Greece, sheep and goats milk is enjoyed.

Did you know? Cheese was first made by accident. A shepherd was carrying his milk in a pouch made from a sheep's stomach. Rennet from the sheep's stomach and the sun's heat made the milk separate into lumps (curds) and thin liquid (whey). The bumps taste good. They were very much like our cottage cheese today.

This week's recipe uses a product from the milk and cheese group, along with a favorite snack.

- NACHOS**
- 1 cup grated Monterey Jack or cheddar cheese
 - 4 ounces large tortilla chips (enough to cover cookie sheet)
 - 1/4 cup taco sauce (if you wish)
1. Check to see that oven racks are in the middle of the oven. Then preheat the oven to 400°.
 2. Spread the tortilla chips on a cookie sheet.
 3. Cover the chips with the grated cheese.
 4. Bake for 2-3 minutes, or until the cheese melts.
 5. Be sure to use a pot holder to take the cookie sheet out of the oven.
 6. To make it spicy, put a little taco sauce on each nacho as you eat it.

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My physician recommended that I take a nonprescription iron supplement for anemia. Is there anything I need to know about iron?

Iron deficiency is the most common mineral deficiency. There is much that iron users should know about iron supplementation.

- All iron supplements tend to irritate the stomach and may cause nausea, stomach pain, and diarrhea.
- Iron is best absorbed on an empty stomach. But taking iron in this manner can increase the likelihood of stomach upset. Taking iron with food minimizes stomach upset but decreases absorption by as much as 50%. Taking iron with antacids also decreases iron absorption.
- Some authorities believe that taking iron with ascorbic acid (vitamin C) increases absorption. Iron-ascorbic acid combinations are available.
- Some individuals become constipated due to the effects of iron. Taking iron with a stool softener may prevent iron-induced constipation.
- Iron supplements may turn the stool black in color. This effect may be dramatic but is harmless.
- It may take as long as three months to correct an iron deficiency — to rebuild iron stores — even when large doses of iron are taken every day.

KNOW YOUR SNAKES

Learn to recognize poisonous snakes, so you won't fear the others. Many snakes are beneficial because they eat rats and destroy insects. Some eat other snakes.

Most people who live in rural areas will sooner or later encounter a snake. No one wants to be bitten by one, however. Snake bites can be avoided; the others from poisonous snakes should be. People who can identify poisonous snakes from non-poisonous ones protect themselves from a dangerous bite.

Most non-poisonous snakes have long, oval heads. They also have a double row of scales on the tail, round pupils and a smooth, undented face. They lay eggs from which the young hatch.

Most poisonous snakes have a flat, triangular head, a single row of scales on the tail, vertical pupils and dents (or pits) on the face. They also have a heavy body, slim neck and bear live young.

There are exceptions to these descriptions of course. The coral snake, a relative of the cobra, is a poisonous snake with a smooth face and round pupils.

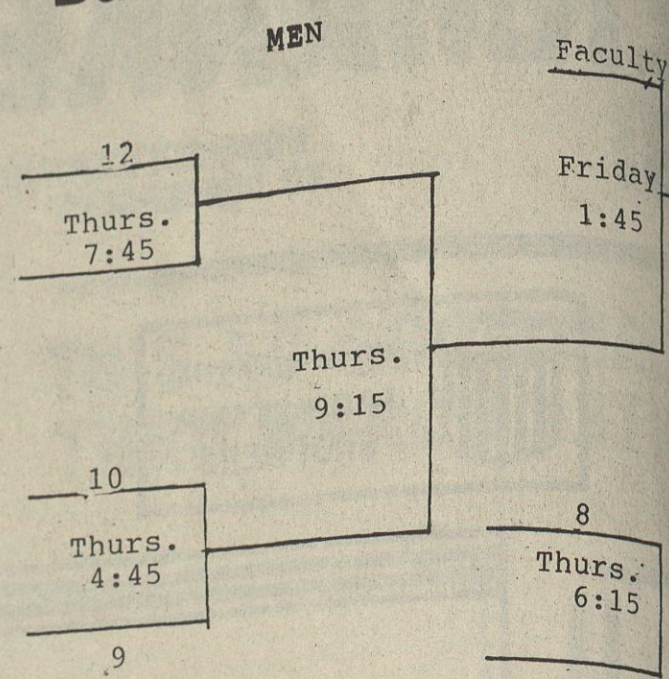
Rattlesnakes and moccasins show the true body conformation of poisonous snakes. Rattlesnakes also have the characteristic rattle or button on the tail. Some common species in Mississippi include pygmy, diamondback and timber rattlesnakes.

The copperhead, or highland moccasin, has bands of brown on a tan body. The cottonmouth, or water moccasin, has a dark body and a stark white mouth.

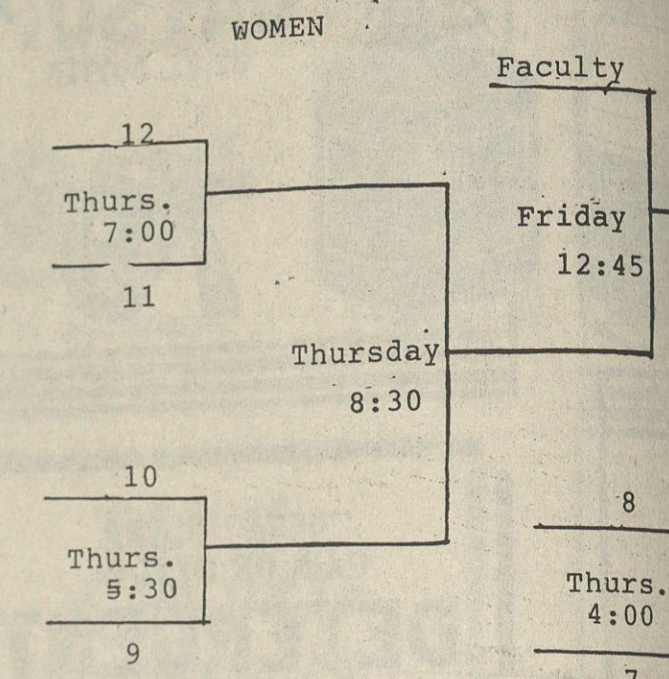

gardeners are ready to plant onions, Irish potatoes, English peas, cabbage, broccoli and sweet corn.

Gardeners have several varieties of sweet corn to choose from: white, yellow and bi-color. Some varieties of are sweeter than others. Merit, a yellow, normal sugar variety, is popular among gardeners in Tishomingo County.

Many tomato, pepper and eggplant transplants will be set out in March and April. These warm-season transplants require warm soil.

Cool soil temperatures below 60 degrees slow growth in these plants, but plastic mulch can be used to warm soil.

Set tomato plants where they won't be subject to drowning. Remember the late spring rain we sometimes have in Tishomingo County? They drown many tomato plants set in low beds and heavy, poorly drained soils.

BUDDING BEAUTY

Fickle weather in March gives gardeners in Tishomingo County a good case of spring fever. If you are "itching" to get out in the yard, here are some tips.

Mild days and balmy weather be temporary, so resist the urge to do so while weather is nice. set out summer flowers before danger of frost has passed.

If flower beds have not been freshened for summer, take the time to do so while weather is nice. soils aren't too wet. Add a 1- to 2-inch layer of organic material such as peat, potting soil, compost or bark to the soil. Work in the light application of an all-purpose fertilizer. Let mellow until time to plant summer flowers.

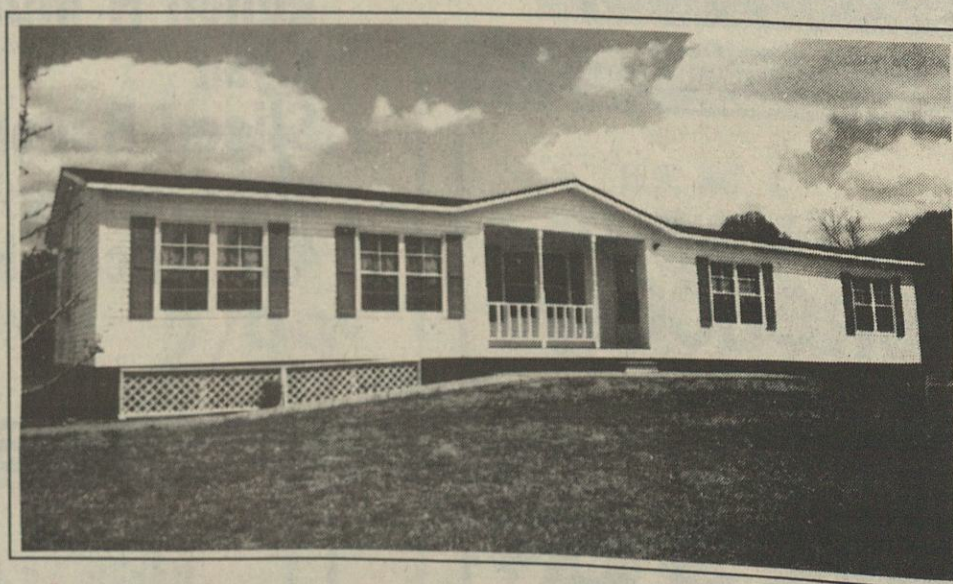
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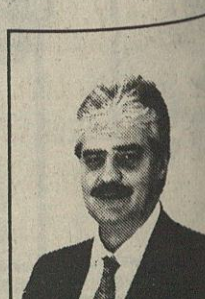
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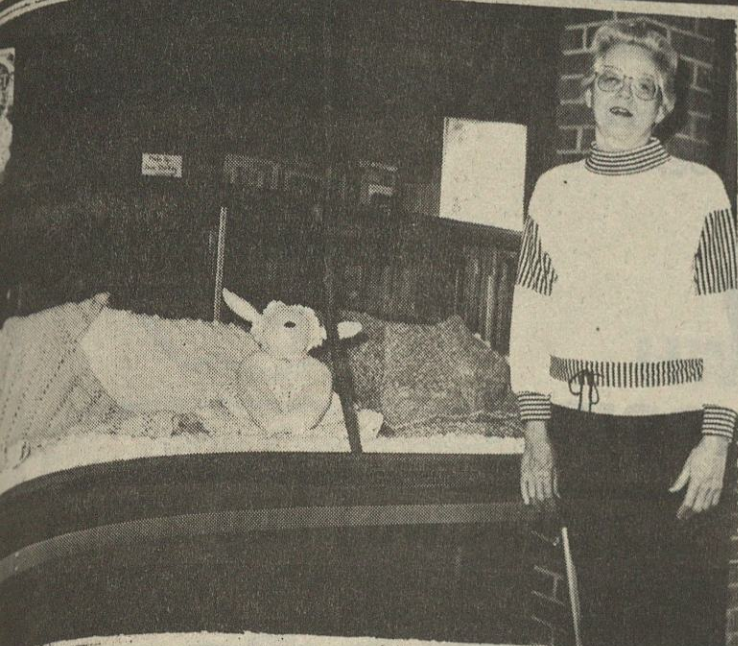

ASCS FARM NEWS

USDA TO IMPLEMENT NEW PROVISIONS OF THE CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM

America's farmers and ranchers will be given numerous incentives to tackle environmental concerns when this year's Conservation Reserve

Program opens up for bids in March.

"The new program has many opportunities for producers as a result of changes in the 1990 Farm Bill," said Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter. "There are some exciting conservation ideas in addition to some expanded criteria for enrollment."

The 1985 Farm Bill authorized the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) primarily to protect highly erodible lands. Nearly 34 million acres were enrolled under the program in past sign-ups.

The 1990 Farm bill extends the old legislation but shifts the primary focus away from erosion reduction toward new multiple environmental objectives.

The program has changed to the point that lands, with greater frequency, will not necessarily have to be eroding to be accepted into the new CRP. Other environmental concerns such as water quality have become as important as erosion.

Eligible land for the new CRP will include areas with identified water-quality problems, designated conservation priority areas, public wellhead areas (municipal water sources) identified by the Environmental Protection Agency and areas where trees are to be planted. Areas designated by states as sources of water quality problems also may be eligible for participation in the CRP.

Producers who want to establish new terraces, shelterbelts, windbreaks, filterstrips, waterways, wildlife habitats or other long-lasting environmental practices may now be able to do so on eligible cropland under the CRP.

USDA will implement new procedures to increase bid competition among CRP applicants to determine acceptable offers from farmers. Bids will be evaluated on the basis of the overall environmental

gain to society.

"The most notable difference to farmers will be the way USDA accepts offers and the expansion of eligible lands. Bids will be screened at the local and national levels to determine the acceptability of the requested rental payment.

At the local level, county ASCS committees will review each offer to make sure the offer does not exceed local cash rental rates, based on the committee's knowledge of those rates for comparable land within the county.

At the national level, offers will receive a final screening. This assessment will use a mathematical formula based on an estimate of the potential productivity and environmental value of the land being offered.

We want a fully competitive bid system in operation. That means offers will be very carefully reviewed, weighing cost against environmental benefits.

There are other implications as well. Since enrollments over the next five years will be smaller than the last five years, USDA can be more selective to insure that enrolled land is crucial to environmental improvement.

For example, environmentally sensitive areas in the Eastern Corn Belt, the South, Appalachia, the upper Mid-

West and the Northeast will have a much better chance of being accepted than in the past.

Producers will not have to worry about the CRP filling up on the first couple of sign-ups under the new proposal. In order to reserve 2 million acres for enrollment in 1994 and 1995 by producers who might be experiencing hardship implementing conservation plans on highly erodible land, USDA will limit sign-ups on an annual basis.

Wetlands will be covered under a separate program which will use easements rather than 10-year contracts. Details for the Wetland Reserve Program will be proposed separately.

USDA plans to enroll an additional 5.5 million acres in these programs by 1995, including approximately 500,000 acres in the tenth sign-up for CRP contracts, March 4-15. In addition, a summer sign-up will be held for 1992 crops for the CRP and for wetland programs.

Under the CRP, annual rental payments of up to \$50,000 per year for approved contracts may be made to eligible farm owners or operators who convert eligible cropland to approved cover, including grass, trees and wildlife cover. USDA will soon publish more details of the proposed program in the Federal Register.

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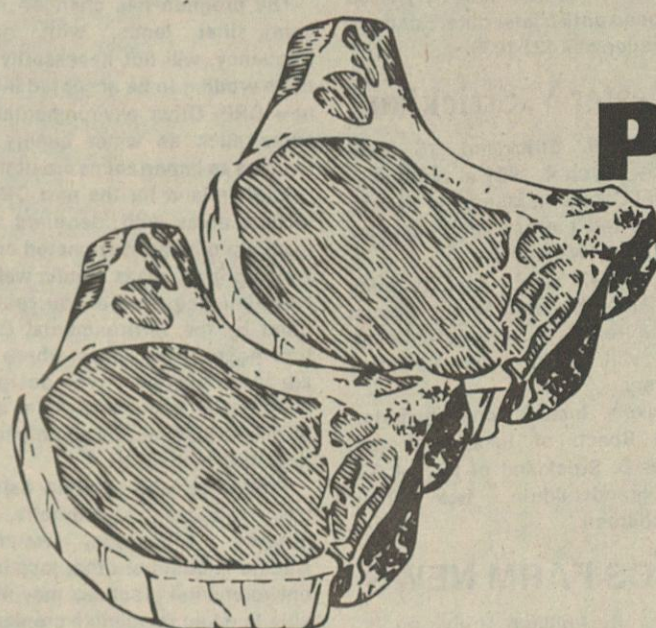


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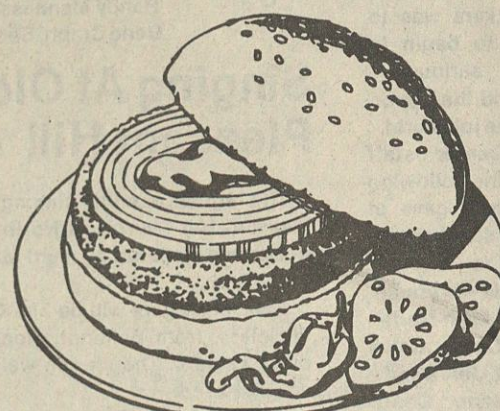
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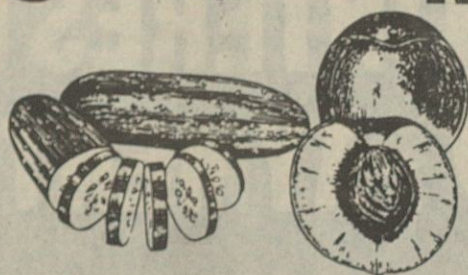
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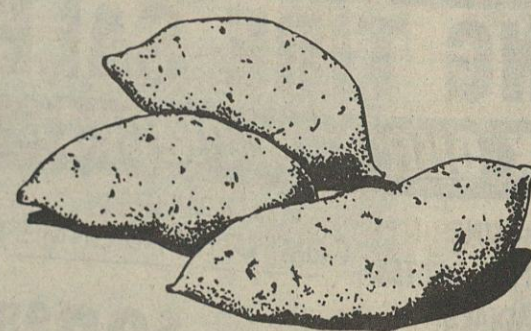
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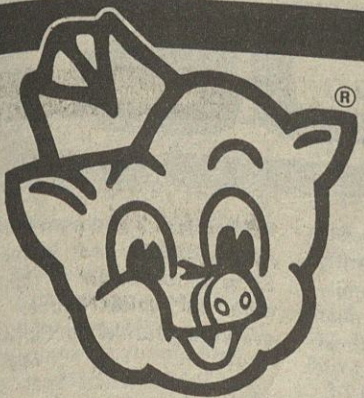
