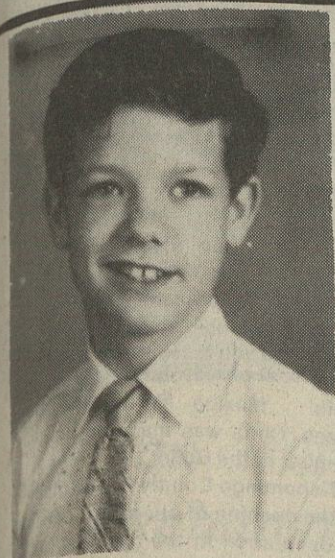

Steven DeWayne "Wayne" Ward, 16, of Cordova, TN., Houston High School sophomore, died Saturday, March 2, in Germantown, TN. in an automobile accident. Services were at 2:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 5, at Memorial Park Funeral Home with burial in the Memorial Park Cemetery, Memphis, TN.

He was a Christian, an active member of Second Baptist Church, where he took an active part in all youth activities. He played on the Church basketball team. He was an honor-roll student since Kindergarten, a member of the Junior National Honor Society. He received many awards, honors, top of his French class and the recipient of the Presidential Physical Fitness Award. His Pastor, Dr. Lovitt, and "youth friends" from many Churches and Schools, took part in the services.

He leaves his mother, Cheryl Ragghianti, of Cordova, TN., his father, Steve Ward, of Iuka, MS., a half-brother, Pete Young, of Cordova, TN., his grand-parents, Leon and Anne Ward, of Memphis, TN. and Norma Stacks of Germantown, TN., his great-grandparents, Jopp W. Castleberry, of Iuka, MS. and Eva Davis, of Memphis, TN.

He also leaves many Aunts, Uncles, and cousins. Wayne had many friends in Iuka. He loved to visit his Dad, his youth friends at Iuka Baptist Church, Iuka. He loved the friendly people in his Dad's and "Grand-Daddy, (Pa-Cass) Church and town.

He loved the beautiful lakes, rivers and streams, in Tishomingo, Co. A favorite memory that Wayne had shared with his young friends and they told us at his funeral, was of a canoe trip, he and his Dad, took down Bear Creek, last summer. Wayne spent his Christmas vacation with his Dad and celebrated his 16th. birthday, which was Jan. 4th., in Iuka.

We, the family, would like to say, to our precious youth and young people.....When you turn 16 and get your drivers license, please drive safely, obey all laws and be careful. Cars aren't big toys. They can kill and cripple for life.....even with seat belts buckled and air bags, as our Wayne and his classmate was. Both were killed. We are hurting, we are grieving. Go to Church, accept the Lord as your Savior, live for him, and be prepared to meet Jesus, should you be called to Heaven, from a speeding car.

Redistricting Process Underway In County

The steps in the process of redistricting Tishomingo County are now underway. The Board of Supervisors met late last week with engineers and completed their plans for the boundry line which would redistrict the county to substantially equalize the population to meet the requirements of the U.S. Constitution.

Redistricting was brought about because Federal Courts are holding to the doctrine of "one man - one vote." The ideal which the courts seek is exact apportionment so that members of the board would represent equal numbers of people.

Results of the 1990 census indicated four of the five supervisor districts in the county were outside the preferred 5 percent deviation that assures the one-man, one-vote principle.

According to the 1990 census, District 1, with a population of 4,054, and District 2, with 3,869 residents are above the high side and District 3 with 3,150 and District 4 with 3,138 fall below the low side. According to one Supervisor of the county, in the redistricting plan proposed to the Justice Department, the 4th District will gain much of the 3rd District's property. The 3rd District will pick up some out of the 1st District and all of the 2nd District's property located in the City of Iuka which includes the Hospital, Shoe Plant, and the Industrial Park in Iuka. According to a spokesman of the Chancery Clerk's office, the redistricting is a long process which must be done before the election deadlines. Candidates have until July 19 to qualify for office. Moving district lines can affect qualifications for particular offices.

The completed redistricting plan is expected to be mailed to the U.S. Department of Justice this week. The Justice Department has 60 days to act on it, but also can request additional information and can extend the time by another 60 days.

County Declared A Major Disaster Area

Tishomingo is among 18 Mississippi counties declared a major disaster area as a result of storms and flooding, President Bush announced last week.

Residents and business owners are now eligible to apply for federal assistance to cover damage caused by heavy rains and flooding that began on February 17, it was declared on March 5.

The heavy rains caused a great deal of road and bridge damage throughout the county, officials determined.

Federal and state officials have implemented disaster recovery operations by opening two Disaster Application Centers and setting up toll-free phone services for disaster victims.

The principal state and federal

financial aid programs that victims may apply for are temporary housing and minor repairs, individual and family grants, and low interest disaster loans.

"These services are for everyone in the declared disaster areas, especially in outlying communities which may not have as many people affected by the disaster," said federal coordinating officer Mike Polny of Atlanta. "We encourage these people to call. The information hotline will answer any questions they may have about the assistance programs and how to apply."

The application period for disaster aid is 60 days from the date of the presidential declaration. That means victims of the current Mississippi disaster must apply by May 3, 1991, Polny explained.

The disaster area covers the 18 counties of Adams, Bolivar, Calhoun, Clay, Coahoma, Grenada, Itawamba, Leflore, Lowndes, Monroe, Panola, Quitman, Simpson, Sunflower, Tallahatchie, Tishomingo, Washington, and Yalobusha.

Applicants should be prepared to offer the following documents and information when requesting assistance: proof of identity, proof of residence, insurance information, good directions to the damaged residence, and their best description of damage and losses.

Disaster application centers are operating Saturday through Monday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. at Washington County Convention Center, South Raceway Road, Greenville, MS, or S.D. Lee High School Gym, 1815 Military Road, Columbus, MS.

The toll-free hotlines operate from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. For disaster information, persons should call 1-800-626-7748. The disaster application hotline is 1-800-462-9029.

False Solicitors

Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs said this week that he had been informed of individuals soliciting funds in the name of the Mississippi Sheriff's Association. The callers have been reported to use insulting and abusive language. Dobbs said that the calls have been reported in other areas of the state, and not yet in this area. Neither the Mississippi Sheriff's Association nor the local sheriff's department is associated with these solicitors in any way, Dobbs said. Dr. Ernest Jobe will head up the program again this year and will oversee training in leadership, problem solving, research techniques and creative thinking. Resource people and speakers will continue the training and broaden the base of subjects covered. Projects for the new year will be selected by the teams of participants at the opening retreat and work on these projects will continue for the length of the program.

School System To Receive Channel 1 T.V. Program

Aubrey Ray, Principal of Iuka High School, has received confirmation that the Iuka/Tishomingo County Schools will receive the Channel 1 Television program for the school year of 1991-92.

The Classroom Channel is part of the Whittle Educational Network and provides the schools with noncommercial video programs to enhance classroom activities and instruction. The program is designed primarily as an enrichment tool to be used by teachers as a supplement to existing curricula or as a cornerstone for new studies. The programs are sent by satellite and recorded and shown during a designated time of the day that does not interrupt the regular academic program of the school. The program is designed to compliment the learning interest of grades 6-12.

The network focuses upon current events in the areas of Language,

Science, Mathematics, Social Studies, Health and Behavioral Attitudes of teens.

The program is funded through Whittle Communication Network with no cost to the school district. The school district agrees to show the programs daily during the school year at an un-interrupted time of the other instructional program. Each site that the program is placed on must contain 150 students minimum in grades 6-12.

Equipment on each site is as follows:

1. One monitor (TV) per each 23 students enrolled.
2. Two VCR's for recording and playing the programs back to the student body.
3. Satellite receiver.
4. Whittle Communication is responsible for installation of equipment on each site.

155th To Return To Mississippi

Mississippi's 155th Armored Brigade, which includes Company C, 1/198th Armor of Iuka, will be back at Camp Shelby by the first of April, announced Col. Leland Remond, commander of the base.

The brigade will return to Camp Shelby to demobilize after being called to active duty in support of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

The National Guard unit will return from Fort Irwin, California during the period of March 27 thru April 1. It is not known how long they will remain at Shelby for deprocessing.

LIFE INSURANCE-- HOW MUCH IS ENOUGH?

Determining an adequate amount of life insurance coverage requires a careful assessment of one's personal financial situation. A simple and practical way to make this assessment is by using a method known as Needs Analysis.

The Needs Analysis approach incorporates an evaluation of what many insurance experts define as a family's most important financial obligations and goals. These include insurance coverage for mortgage debt, college expenses and future family income.

Your insurance proceeds should be sufficient to pay off the remaining mortgage on your home. Obviously, if you purchased your home recently and are carrying a large mortgage, you may need a sizeable amount. As your mortgage decreases, your life insurance need for this purpose diminishes. If you own a second

home, the mortgage on that also needs consideration.

Many people want life insurance proceeds to be large enough to cover their children's college expenses and possibly graduate school. Estimate the amount needed by matching the ages of your children and the anticipated return from investing the life insurance proceeds during pre-college years against projected college costs adjusted for inflation.

Revise this calculation periodically as your children get closer to college age. As it is impossible to project inflation and earnings with precision for many years into the future, it may be a good idea to be as conservative as possible when estimating long-term investment gains.

One advantage of using cash value insurance for college expenses is, if the policyowner continues to live, the cash values can still be used to pay tuition expenses.

The amount of income you need to provide for your surviving spouse and dependents will vary greatly according to your other assets, retirement plan benefits, Social Security benefits, age, health and your spouse's earning power.

Most surviving spouses find employment, but their income is based on education, training and experience. Your spouse's may be insufficient to cover the monthly expenses of the family's current lifestyle. Providing a supplemental income fund will help your family maintain its standard of living.

Early Detection

If you have regular eye examinations, especially as you get older, you have a much better chance of being treated successfully when eye problems occur. This is particularly important in the case of older people who are more prone to eye disease. Glaucoma and cataract are probably better known than some other eye diseases associated with aging, but many other diseases can be just as serious.

Degeneration of the macula or retina, for example, may result from poor circulation and cause a loss of clear vision. Also, the pupils may become smaller and less adaptable to changes in light. When this happens, you will need better illumination when reading or performing close by tasks. You may also need to move closer to the light source to see comfortably. The need for more illumination may also make driving at night a problem, especially on poorly lighted roads.

No matter what your age, your health should be protected and especially your ability to see clearly and comfortably. That's why regular examinations by your eye specialist are important.

Timberline

This year's tree planting season is quickly coming to an end as tree planters hustle to reforest those few remaining acres. If you're a landowner who's admiring your new forest, be advised that another forestry-related season is not yet over - the season for wildfires.

Wildfire season in the South usually lasts from November through March. The wildfire activity generally starts off slow, but builds to a frenzy during March. It's ironic that as tree planting ends, the threat of wildfire reaches its highest level.

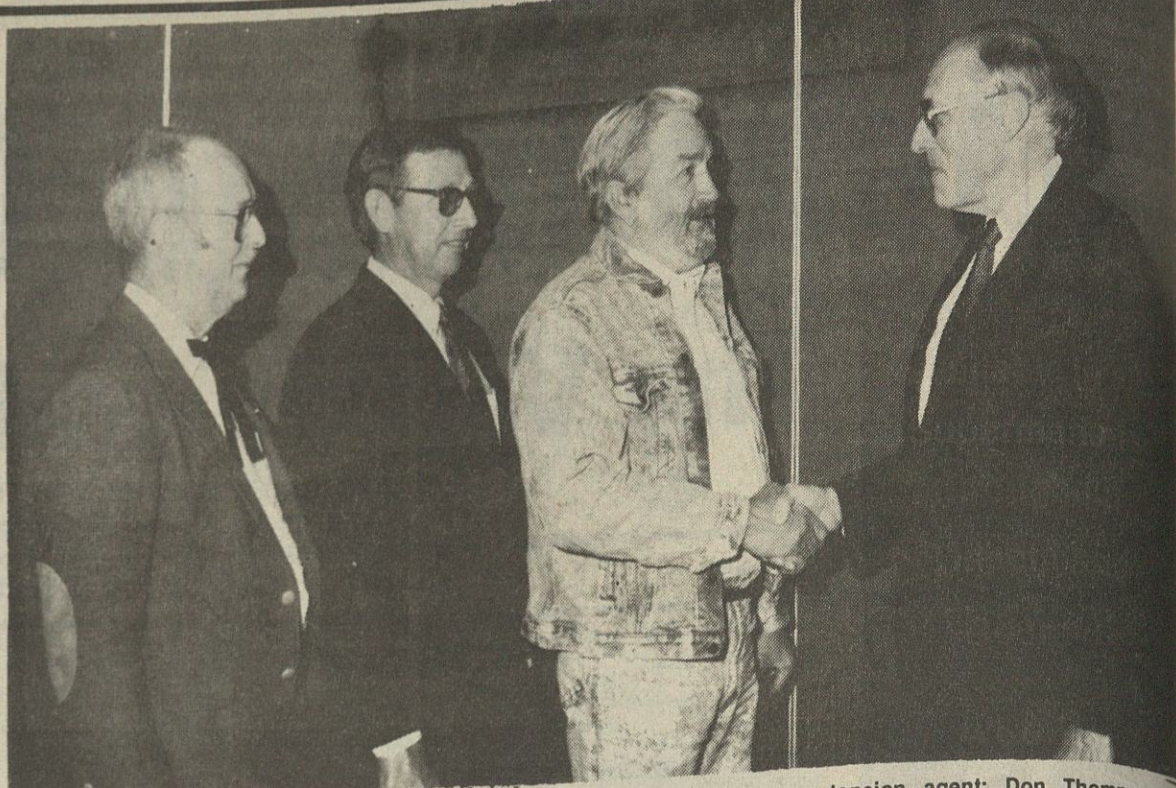
The protection of these newly planted acres, along with the thousands of existing acres of forestland in Tishomingo County, is of prime importance to the Mississippi Forestry Commission. Realizing the importance of timber to the local and state economy, and the personal value of this forest resource to its owners, Commission employees are dedicated to the quick response and suppression of all wildfires.

As a landowner, you can also play a vital role in the protection of your forest. By constructing and maintaining roads and firebreaks around and through your forestland, you can provide an effective barrier against wildfire. A firebreak is a continuous lane, seven to ten feet wide, in which the mineral soil has been exposed due to the removal of vegetation and duff.

Firebreaks can slow and sometimes stop the spread of wildfire by cutting off the fire's fuel supply. Firebreaks can serve as a control line used to backfire from, as well as access into the fire threatened area. In addition to fire protection, firebreaks can be seeded with favorable wildlife foods to improve wildlife habitat. Fescue and winter oats are two that come to mind.

If you've just finished planting a new forest, or if you have existing young plantations, a firebreak protecting high wildfire-risk areas is a solid investment. Once in place, and regularly maintained, firebreaks offer protection to a vulnerable stand of young trees.

Sustained-Release Vitamins/Minerals

I take a convenient, long-acting allergy medicine. Would it be best to take long-acting vitamin supplements?

Taking medicines several times a day is inconvenient. And it is easy to forget to take doses. Therefore, many manufacturers of drug products have developed long-acting (sustained-release) dosage forms. Each tablet or capsule can be considered to be two or three tablets or capsules in one. Medicine typically is released over an 8 to 12 hour period.

Unlike many medicines, nutrients tend to stay in the body for long periods of time. It makes little sense, therefore, to produce sustained release dosage forms of agents which - by their very nature - are long-acting.

Although sustained release dosage forms of some supplements may be available, they appeal primarily to the uninformed who believe that their nutrient levels may become dangerously low at any time. After all, many persons who have very good diets do not need to take supplements. And most of the remainder of the population gets along quite nicely on a well-formulated product that contains an adequate quantity, quality, and variety of ingredients. BREAD & CEREAL GROUP

Our second food group to highlight for National Nutrition Month is the Bread and Cereal Group.

Did you ever hear people say "bread" when they meant "money"? Long ago in Egypt, bread was so valuable that it was used as money. Bread is valuable today because it gives us B vitamins and iron. The bread and cereal group is an affordable way to eat healthy food.

All foods made from rice, corn meal, or whole grain or enriched flours are in this food group. In addition to bread, muffins, noodles and spaghetti, this group also includes rice, tortillas, cereals, and pizza dough.

Children need to eat four servings from the bread and cereal group every day.

Many of us eat a sandwich nearly everyday. Did you ever wonder who first invented sandwiches? Some people think it was an Englishman who was the Earl of Sandwich. He was a big gambler who hated to leave the card table even to eat. One day, he put a piece of meat between two pieces of bread. That way he could eat and play cards at the same time.

This week's recipe, Tasty Tuna Treat, makes a good lunch or a light supper. Add a bowl of soup, a glass of milk and a piece of fruit for a really nutritious meal. This recipe also calls for chopped vegetables, so be careful with that sharp knife.

TASTY TUNA TREAT

- 1 slice whole wheat bread
- 2 tablespoons canned tuna or other cooked fish
- 1 tablespoon mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons chopped tomato
- 2 tablespoons chopped lettuce
- 2 tablespoons grated cheddar or other cheese
1. Preheat oven to 400°
2. Mix the tuna with mayonnaise and spread it on the bread.
3. Top with lettuce, tomato, and cheese.
4. Place on a cookie sheet and bake at 400° for 4 to 6 minutes or until the cheese melts. Or you can run it under the broiler for a minute or two until the cheese melts.

'High Blood Pressure: Five Things To Do

High blood pressure cannot be cured. Control of blood pressure takes a commitment to several things that can make living with the condition easier. If you have high blood pressure, here are five things you can do:

1. Keep track of your pressure. Home blood pressure monitoring equipment makes possible the obtaining of frequent measures.
2. Reduce salt intake. Cook with less salt and use less table salt. When shopping, purchase foods with low-sodium content as compared to brands with more sodium. And avoid "salty" foods such as potato chips and pretzels. If you are overweight, reducing calorie consumption will facilitate weight loss and may reduce blood pressure.
3. Stay fit. One of the best exercises for all age groups is walking. Walking 20 to 30 minutes three or four times a week will help burn excess calories and give you a feeling of extra energy.
4. Stop smoking. Cigarette smoke contains substances that tend to increase the blood pressure.
5. Take prescribed blood pressure-lowering medicines. The "best" medicines are those that control pressure with a minimum of side effects.

ASCS Farm News

DEADLINE ANNOUNCED FOR
1990 CROP LOANS

Price support loans on 1990 wheat, oats, and barley will be available until March 31. Loan on corn, sorghum, cotton and soybeans are available until May 31.

County loan rates per bushel are: \$1.66 per bu.; Grain Sorghum, \$2.83 per cwt.; Soybeans, \$4.55 per bu.; Wheat, \$1.93 per bu.; Oats, .83 per bu.; and Upland Cotton, \$.5115 per lb.

Regular loans have a nine-month maturity date with variable monthly interest rates. Maturing 1990-crop wheat is eligible for the farmer-owned reserve.

To be eligible for price support loans and other farm program benefits, producers are required to participate in acreage reduction programs. Sign-up for the 1991 programs began March 4.

Many producers use the com-

modity loan program to obtain interim operating capital or hold their grain for future delivery. As of March 11, 1991, local producers had obtained federal price support loans on 6 bales of cotton.

The ASCS official said applications for price support loans on 1990 small grains should be filed before March 31, and before May 31, for corn, sorghum, cotton and soybeans.

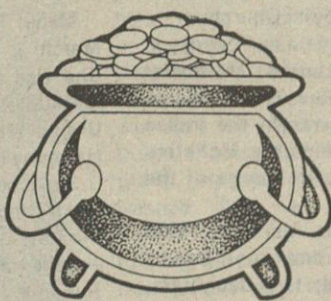

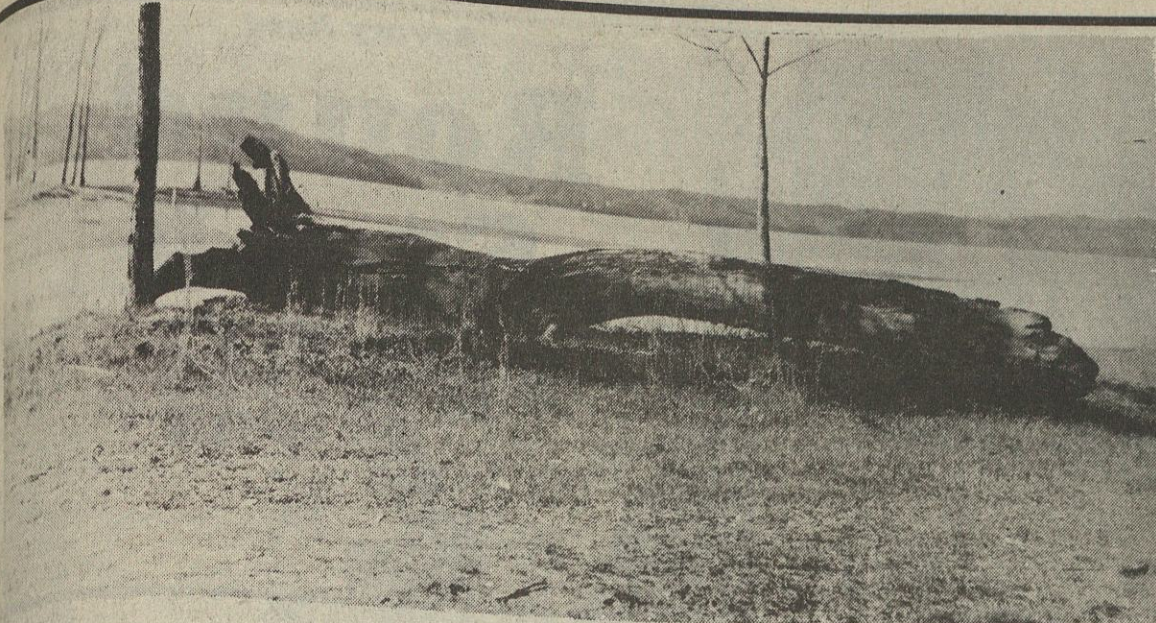

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE IUKA SPECIAL MUNICIPAL SEPARATE SCHOOL DISTRICT DECLARING THAT A NEED FOR ADDITIONS TO A SCHOOL FACILITY EXISTS IN THE DISTRICT FOR WHICH NO FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District (the "Board" of the "District"), as follows:

1. The District has entered into an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with the Tishomingo County School District (the "Agreement") which, among other things, allows the District to jointly acquire or improve school facilities (The Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District and the Tishomingo County School District are referred to herein collectively as the "Districts").

2. A need exists for additions to one school building being financed and operated under the authority of the Agreement.

3. The district cannot provide the necessary funds to pay the cost or its proportionate share of the cost of the additions to the school building required to meet the present needs of the District.

4. In cooperation with the Tishomingo County School District, the District desires to sell, grant or otherwise convey to a corporation, individual or partnership, with or without consideration, or to permit such corporation, individual or partnership to use, maintain or operate as part of public school facilities, pursuant to Section 4 of the Emergency School Leasing Authority Act of 1986, as amended, its interest in one (1) school building, or a portion thereof, together with other real or personal property which may be necessary, useful or convenient for the purposes of the District. Any such sale, grant or conveyance shall be for a period of time not to exceed twenty (20) years, and title to any real property transferred by the District shall revert to the District at the expiration of such term.

5. In cooperation with the Tishomingo County School District under the authority of the Agreement, the District desires to "lease", as that term is defined by §37-7-301(v)(i), Miss. Code of 1972 (as amended by the Emergency School Leasing Authority Act of 1986), one (1) "school building", or a portion thereof, as that term is defined by §37-7-301(v)(i), Miss. Code of 1972 (as amended by the Emergency School Leasing Authority Act of 1986), which may include the school building sold, granted, or otherwise conveyed by the District pursuant to paragraph 3 above. The principal amount of said lease shall not exceed Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000).

6. The District proposes to take final action upon the question of the sale, grant or other conveyance of its interest in such school building, or a portion thereof, and on the question of leasing such school building, at a meeting of the Board of the District to be held at 5:30 P.M. on Wednesday, April 17, 1991 at the Board's meeting place located at the Iuka High School, 507 W. Quitman, in the City of Iuka, Mississippi, which date is not less than thirty days after the date of first publication of this resolution, unless prior to such meeting at 5:30 P.M. on April 17, 1991, a petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) or fifteen hundred (1,500), whichever is less, of the qualified electors of the District shall be filed with the District requesting that an election be called on such questions. If such a petition is timely filed, the District shall, not later than its next regular meeting, adopt a resolution calling an election to be held within the District upon the questions of authorizing the Board to sell, grant or otherwise convey such building, and to lease such building. Such election shall be called and held, and the result determined, pursuant to and as provided by Section 4 of the Emergency School Leasing Authority Act of 1986 and §37-7-301 (v)(i), Miss. Code of 1972 (as amended by the Emergency School Leasing Authority Act of 1986).

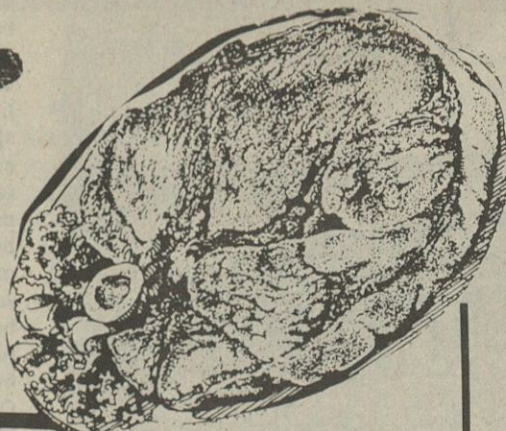

At The Old Courthouse

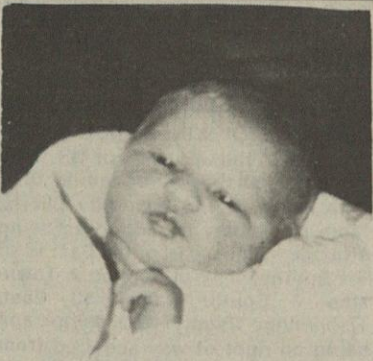
"Oh I found it!" my mother exclaimed. In her hands she held a small pink quilt. It was faded and ragged in places. "This is my baby quilt that I have been looking for," she said. Almost in tears she held up the quilt to look at it. "I have had this quilt as long as I can remember," she said. "My mother made it when she was expecting me. Oh, I'm so glad I found it!"

Around our house there are several quilts on beds, chairs or in chests or closets. Both of my grandmothers made quilts. My mother's mother especially enjoyed making them and we

have many of them. Other quilts in the cedar chest go back three or more generations. My grandfather has several quilts that go back to his grand parents.

I have taken the quilts for granted because we always had them around the house. Not until recently did I take time to admire the detailed patterns, the stitching, and realize the time and care that was taken with each quilt. Then I started to read about them.

Quilts and blankets have been around for thousands of years. A quilt can consist of any material, wool, silk, cotton or related material. The

most popular fabric in our area is cotton. The quilt is made in three layers. The base or bottom is sewn to a batting that is usually a thick cotton or synthetic material that acts as stuffing. The quilt top is then attached. The quilt top is made several different ways.

Patterns are derived from a floral geometric, or checkerboard shape that are drawn on a quilt top and later sewn or pieced together in sections to make the top. Some of the patterns are the Wedding Ring, Flower Garden or Dresden Plate Designs. I have seen quilts that depict the United States with a patch representing each individual state. I have also seen star patterns, representations of farm scenes, animals and people. I have even seen an Elvis quilt.

In the medieval days, knights wore quilted jackets and hoods under their armor. It kept them warm as well as protected their skin from the metal armor. The Dutch and English brought quilts to the American Colonies to brace for the cold hard winters. A lot of culture was sewn into these quilts. Pictures and patterns were transformed into practical folk art. For example, love birds were frequently sewn onto quilts for newly wed couples for those about to be married. One pattern is even called the "Wedding Ring." The Indians also wove blankets for their weddings and in some cases used the blanket in the actual wedding ceremony. Memory quilts are quite unique and each one tells a story. Pieces of dresses, clothes for special occasions or other things of sentimental value can be sewn onto a quilt top to create a theme. This gives the maker of the quilt quite a creative and imaginative way to express themselves.

Quilting "Bees" or parties were common in the 18th and 19th century rural America. The bees were a chance for ladies to get together and talk, share gossip and sing songs or hymns. The bees would last all day and at supper the men and children would join the party. Music and dancing usually followed.

I can remember both of my grandmothers saving most every scrap of material from their other sewing and

using the scraps for a quilt top.

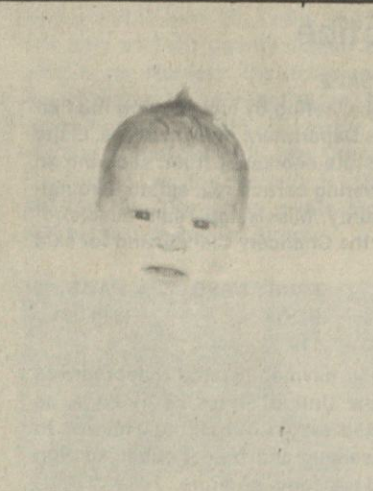
Mrs. Jane Dean not only has several antique quilts made by her ancestors, but also has an old wooden quilt loom. She believes the loom to be over 100 years old, but it is in beautiful condition. These looms were quite common in years past, but the old peg looms are rare in this day and age. Mrs. Dean will be sharing her quilting heirlooms in our March display at the Old Courthouse.

Mrs. Lela Clark, a retired first grade teacher from Iuka, has several class quilts. These date back to the 1950's and 60's. Mrs. Clark would send a piece of material home and the parents would sew or embroider the children's names on what is known as a friendship quilt. Many of her first grade students still live in the area and are invited to view some of the quilts on display in March at the Old Courthouse as we feature Mrs. Clark's quilts with our display.

Ms. Nellie Horton, Tishomingo County Home Economist states that quilting almost became a lost form of art. In the 1950's and 60's, quilting was almost lost as an art form. Groups and individuals did not regain popular interest until it was revived during our country's Bicentennial, where our heritage was focused upon. Ms. Horton also said the quilts that were made from scraps are usually fashioned today from pre-cut cloth pieces. She also stated that on Tuesday, March 26 a Quilt Fair, sponsored by the Tishomingo County Extension Homemakers Council, will be held at Golden City Hall.

Many people locally still make quilts or have those made by their ancestors and others still keep the art of quilt making alive. Quilting Bees are still active in Tishomingo County. The Harmony Methodist Women's Bee make quilts as fundraiser for their programs. This is not only a money making project, buy according to Mrs. Veda Kay, a bee member "It makes for a good fellowship and a lot of fun. By the way, the term "Bee" came from the way quilters worked on them, like busy bees. The Harmony Bee will be displaying some of their handiwork in our exhibit this month. We would like to thank them for displaying their wonderful work.
