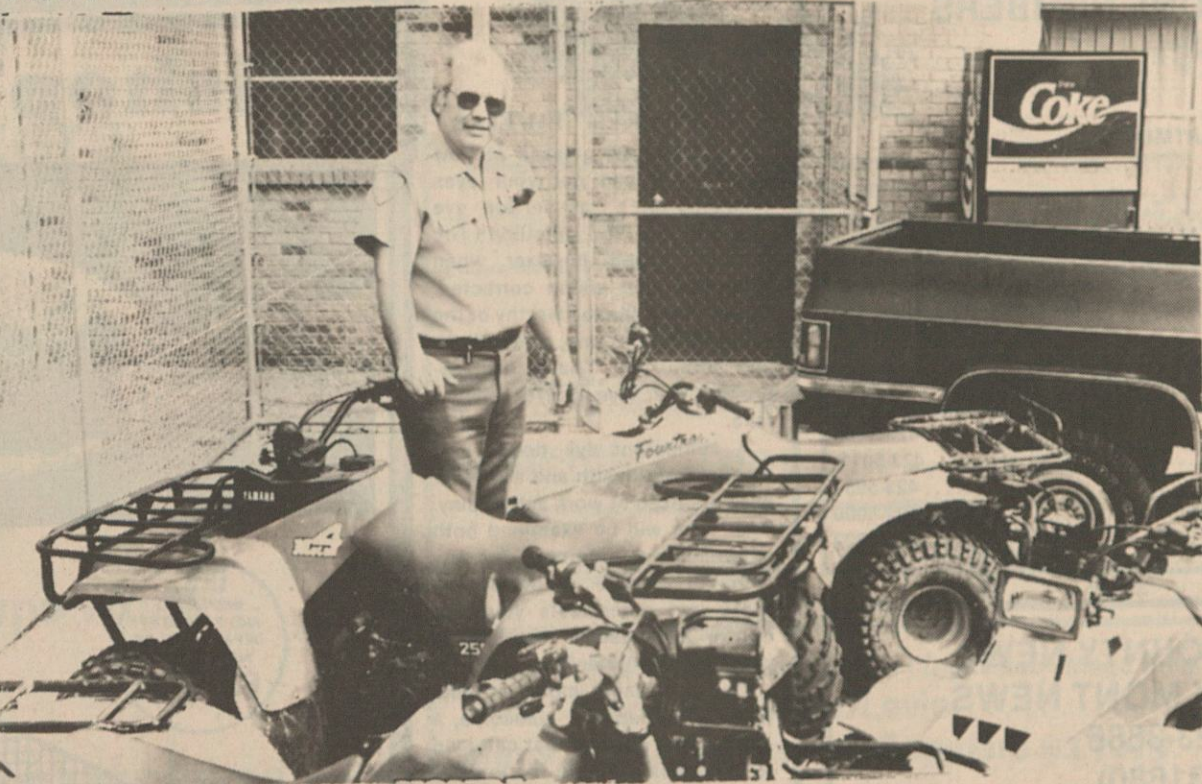
Burnsville PTL To Meet

Stolen Vehicles Recovered

A Prentiss County man has been charged with receiving stolen property after the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department recovered four all-terrain vehicles and a partially stripped 1989 Chevrolet Silverado pickup on Monday, March 25.

Jaret Ray Taylor, 19, has been charged with seven counts of receiving stolen property following a three month probe by county officials, according to Chief Deputy Mike Higginbottom. Two of the ATV's were reported stolen from the Stanley Dexter residence and one from the W. T. Carson residence recently. The other vehicle is believed to belong to a Burnsville resident but officials could not be positive because the serial number on the vehicle had been removed Higginbottom stated.

The 1989 Chevrolet pickup was reportedly stolen from the B. L. Mercer residence on the night of February 11. Some merchandise stolen from Alcorn County was also recovered Deputy Higginbottom said. More charges are likely as more information is gathered and the investigation continues.

Sen. Cochran Praises 155th Armored Brigade

U.S. Senator Thad Cochran (R-Miss.) praised members of the 155th Armored Brigade for their "hard work" as they began desert warfare training at Fort Irwin, California.

Senator Cochran visited with Mississippi's 155th at the National Training Center on Saturday. The unit began a two-week combat training program Monday, March 11.

"I wanted to come out and tell them that they've really done a great job and they've been an important part of our ability to achieve victory in Kuwait and Iraq," Senator Cochran said.

Mississippi's 155th was mobilized in December because of the Persian Gulf crisis and sent to Camp Shelby, Mississippi for initial training. The brigade moved to Fort Hood in late December for advanced training.

Army officials briefed Senator Cochran on the 14-day training program. Brigadier General Wesley Clark, commanding general of the National Training Center, told the Mississippi Senator that the training

program simulates actual combat.

The Mississippi brigade will fight mock battles in the Mojave Desert, pitted against Fort Irwin's opposition forces - U.S. Army soldiers who wear special uniforms and employ Soviet and Iraqi-style tactics, Senator Cochran said.

Army officials have indicated that the 3,900 members of the Mississippi National Guard Armored Brigade training in California will return to Camp Shelby following training, for de-activation this spring.

Cochran said that while the 155th was not deployed to the Persian Gulf region, their training prepared them for any mission. Colonel Fletcher C. Coker, commander of 155th brigade, toured the field operations with Senator Cochran.

"Our troops have performed well and they're at a high state of readiness and prepared to carry out any mission that they're assigned. We're proud that they're reflecting credit on Mississippi," he said.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

SELECTING AND USING ACCESSORIES

We often make the mistake of using too many small accessories in one room. Many small objects add clutter and require too much dusting. Empty spaces add to the dignity and restfulness of a room.

Do your accessories consist of a collection of odds and ends that do not add beauty and character to your home? If the accessory serves no function and does not contribute to the desired appearance, the room will look better without it.

Begin deciding which accessories to use by first removing everything from the room except the furniture. Group the furniture for convenient use. Decide which accessories you need for use and beauty at each furniture grouping. These are some considerations:

Do you need a lamp and an ashtray near a chair? Do you need books and magazines near chairs for reading? Do you need a lamp near chairs for seeing? Does the wall space over the sofa need a wall hanging for interest and balance? Would a growing plant add life and interest to the room? Does the mantel need accessories to help make the fireplace the center of interest?

Choose and place useful ac-

cessories first. Add others cautiously. Plan to use appropriate well-designed accessories that serve their purpose.

Regardless of changes in style, good design remains the same. How can someone tell if an accessory has good design? The following guidelines should help you recognize good design. An object has good lines if:

Lines are simple and related to the overall shape of the object.

Variations of one or a few lines repeat.

Lines add to the usefulness or attractiveness of the object.

Lines carry the eye easily from one point to another and around the object.

The shape is good if:

Shapes within the object are in good proportion to each other.

Shapes in different parts are related by repetition or variation.

Classic design ideas and shapes come from geometric forms such as the circle, square, oval, rectangle and variations of nature's designs. Exact copies of designs from nature become tiring.

Texture includes the surface appearance as well as how an object feels to the touch. Notice if the creator of the object has used the basic materials naturally. For instance, pewter and copper may be polished and hammered; reed may be woven; and wood may be carved and polished.

Color is one of the eye-catching features of an accessory. Often the best color choices is the material's natural color.

Color needs to suit the mood of the accessory. Vivid clear colors are best suited to contemporary designs. Subdued colors are generally best suited to soft shapes and lines.

The individual designing an accessory often add decoration to the surface of an accessory to enrich texture. If skillfully applied, the decoration should appear to be a part

of the object. Sometimes this ornamentation appears to be nothing more than surplus -- in this case it is poor design.

Look for simple objects without added decoration. Beware of showy, elaborate, impractical accessories.

BAKED BEAN CASSEROLE

- 1 1/2 lb. ground beef
- 1 c. brown sugar
- 1 tsp. mustard
- 2 c. ketchup
- 1 tsp. onion salt (onion, if desired)
- 4 slices bacon
- 2 cans port and beans

Brown ground beef in a large skillet; drain. Put beef in a large bowl and add brown sugar, mustard, ketchup, onion salt and beans; mix well. Pour in casserole dish. Top with slices of bacon. Cover and bake at 350° or 1 hour.

County Agent's News

CONSERVATION TILLAGE

Producers in Tishomingo County who plan to use some type of conservation tillage system need to include a burndown herbicide in their farming preparations.

Burndown materials can be applied within two to four weeks of the planting date. Such timing allows for additional treatment at planting, if necessary.

Weeds that aren't killed before planting will cause problems the entire season. A poorly executed burndown can cause a theoretically sound conservation tillage effort to fail.

Base the choice of a burndown herbicide on species and size of weed. While failure can and will occur at times, good management can and will reduce weed problems.

SOYBEAN PLANTING TIME

As the 1991 growing season approaches, not much in Tishomingo County has changed since last year. Statewide, soybean acreage may be down 5 percent or a little more -- farmers expect to plant just under 1.9

million acres of beans. In Tishomingo County, we expect that the soybean acreage will be about the same as last year or slightly larger.

Given these conditions and past history, Tishomingo County growers should carefully consider input cost. They don't need to radically change the operation of the bean enterprise. Staying with the basics is a good way to keep production costs in check; unnecessary expense is an unwanted burden in 1991.

As we approach soybean planting season in Tishomingo County, it's helpful to review a few recommendations. This advice is based on years of research by agronomists at Mississippi State University.

The best planting dates are May 1 to June 10 in north Mississippi and May 10 to June 20 in the southern half of the state. These dates insure the best opportunity for high yields in most circumstances. Many of our producers have had good yields with late June planting -- there is always an exception to the rule -- but May and early June are still optimum times.

Many times growers will comment that they can't afford to lime. But given the pH readings of some of the soil samples from across the state, many growers cannot afford NOT to lime their soils.

A liming study conducted several years ago on two soil types makes this point. The soils had an initial pH of 5.1. Lime was applied at a rate of 1 ton per acre. The response was an increase of 6 to 7 bushels per year over five years.

With the price of beans averaging \$5 per bushel, this translates into an extra \$30 to \$35 per acre.

Considering lime and spreading cost to average \$21 per acre, this is \$9

to \$14 above expense the first year. And it doesn't take much figuring to determine that the lime helped pay for itself.

HEALTH GAMBLE

Don't gamble with your health. Every year, producers and home gardeners in Tishomingo County run the risk of illness from misuse of toxic products, particularly agricultural chemicals. Most of these cases could be prevented with a little extra effort.

The cardinal rule when using any chemical is to READ the label. Note specific warnings, protective equipment and first aid measures the label recommends.

Forget the old saying, "If a little is good, a little more is better," when applying pesticides. Use the amount specified on the label. Other tips include:

- *Set up equipment for proper dosage.
- *Keep all toxic products out of reach from children.
- *Don't store chemicals in food and drink containers.
- *Safely dispose of containers and leftover chemicals.

Vitamins, Minerals & Your Health

Refrigerating Vitamin/Mineral Supplements

Will keeping vitamin/mineral supplements in the refrigerator help keep them fresh longer?

Generally speaking, heat is an enemy of foods, medicines, vitamins, and many other materials. Minerals are stable at even very high temperatures -- but the tablets or capsules in which they are contained may become hardened or changed so that they do not fully release their contents.

One might conclude that, because some foods and medicines are stored in the refrigerator, keeping supplements in the refrigerator would preserve freshness. At least one problem exists with refrigerating supplements. Every time a cold container is removed from the refrigerator and opened in the warm, humid kitchen environment, moisture collects on the capsules or tablets inside. This moisture causes tablets and capsules to stick together and can destroy vitamin activity. The same is true of most prescription and nonprescription medicines. Most should be stored in a "cool dry place."

A better alternative is to purchase supplements in small quantities that last no longer than a few months. Such a small supply should not require refrigeration. Avoid 500 or 1,000 dosage unit containers that may be available from health food stores or mail order.

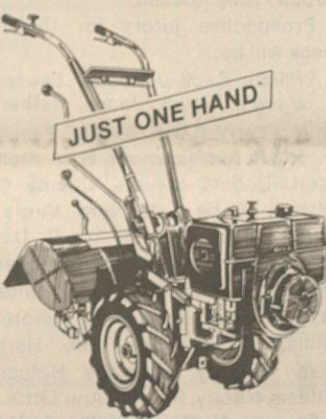

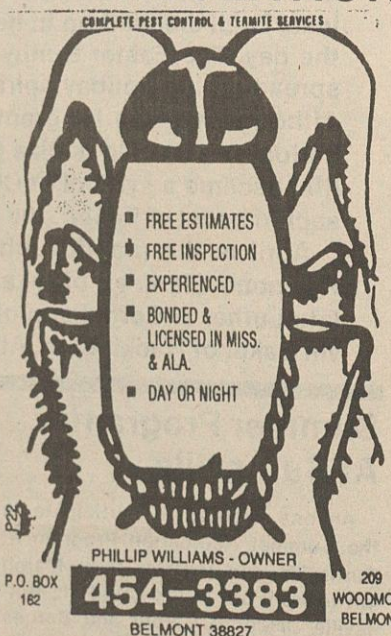

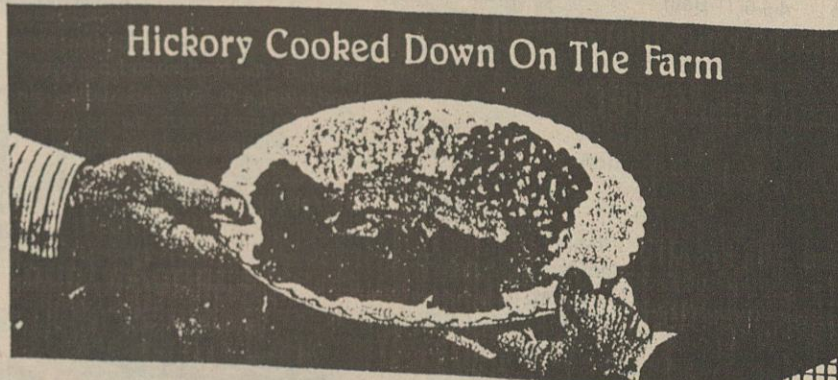

Our visitors were Miss Carrie Embrey, Miss Darlene Embrey and Miss Denise Lynch.

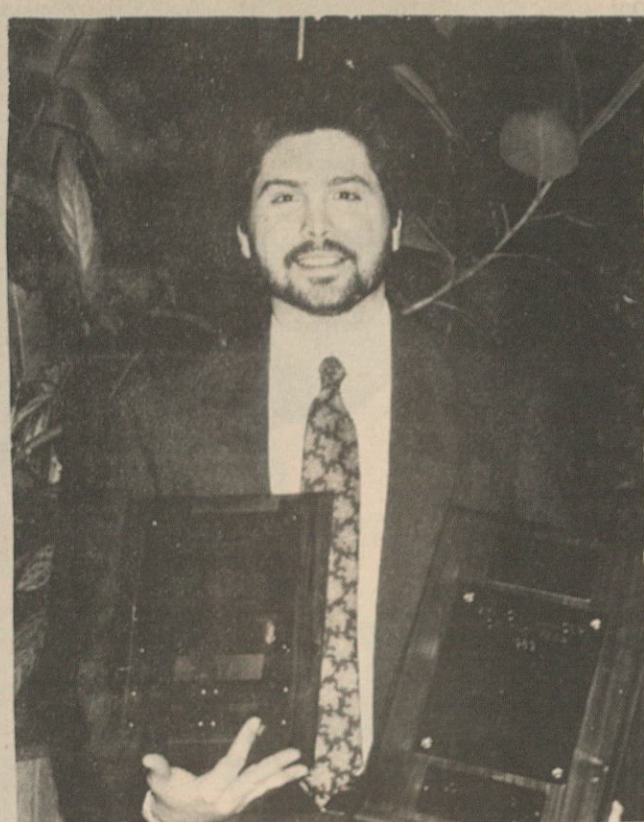

4-H News

Most people think protein can come only from animal foods like meat, cheese, fish or eggs. That's not true. Dry beans, dry peas, lentils, peanuts and other nuts are members of this group, too.

As you've guessed by now, the protein group is the final food group to be highlighted for National Nutrition Month. Even though this group is presented last, it is just as important as the other three groups.

The word "protein" comes from a Greek word meaning "of first rank," and it does rank first in your body. Nearly all the solid parts of your body - from your brains to your bones to your biceps are made of some protein. Those cells are constantly being replaced as they wear out. As your cells need repair or replacing, your body uses protein to "custom-design" the new cells.

Your body needs protein while you're growing. Protein can help you develop healthy muscles, too. It also takes exercise to make muscles strong. If you ate extra protein and didn't exercise, your muscles would just turn to flab. So remember, - protein and exercise make strong muscles.

You should eat two daily servings of 2 to 3 ounces each from this group.

This week's recipe is for Chili Con Carne. People don't always agree about chili. Some people say it can't have beans. Others say it must have beans. Some people say kidney beans are the only beans that should

go in chili. Others say pinto beans should be in chili. There are even chili contests!

CHILI CON CARNE (con carne means with meat)

YOU NEED

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/4 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon ground pepper
- 1 can (15 ounces) chili, pinto or kidney beans
- 1 can (1 lb. 12 oz.) tomatoes with juice
- 1 teaspoon (or more) chili powder
- Equipment
- Skillet with a lid
- Measuring spoons
- Wooden spoon
- Knife
- Cutting board
- Measuring cups

1. Sprinkle the salt in the frying pan so the meat won't spatter.
2. Then put the ground beef, the onion, the green pepper and the pepper in the pan.
3. Cook over moderate heat, stirring and breaking the meat into little pieces. Cook until the meat is light brown and the onion and green pepper are tender. (A wooden spoon doesn't get hot.)
4. Spoon extra fat off meat before you add the other ingredients. Add beans, tomatoes and chili powder.
5. Bring to a slow bubble. Then stir. Reduce the heat, cover with a lid and simmer for 20 - 30 minutes or more. Makes 6 servings.

On March 7, Espy sent a letter to Shaikh Sa'ud Nasir AlSabah, the ambassador of Kuwait, asking that Kuwait consider Mississippians when awarding jobs and contracts for reconstruction.

Espy released the following information for jobs and contracts:

*INDIVIDUALS looking for employment in Kuwait should contact their local state employment office. If an individual is not aware of the closest employment office to his community, he should call the state office in Jackson at 354-8711. The U.S. Department of Labor is coordinating a nationwide interstate job bank and will use the information provided by the local offices.

*BUSINESSES seeking contracts have several organizations to contact to get information about contracts. One contact is the U.S. Department of Commerce Gulf Reconstruction Center. The general information phone numbers are 202-377-5767 or 202-377-5737. Other numbers for specific types of services include: capital goods and international construction, 202-377-5023; services, 202-377-5261; aerospace, 202-377-8231; basic industries, 202-377-0614; and science and electronics, 202-377-3548.

The address for the Gulf Reconstruction Center is: U.S. Department of Commerce, Room 2039, Washington, D.C., 20230.

How To Have An Easter Egg Hunt Safely

Hunting brightly colored eggs has been a custom associated with Easter for many years but the tradition goes back long before Christian times, states Nellie R. Horton, Tishomingo County Extension Home Economist. Eggs were once considered a natural wonder and proof of the renewal of life. Because of this belief, eggs were colored, blessed, exchanged and eaten as part of the rites of spring.

As Christianity began to spread, eggs became symbolic of Christ's resurrection. For centuries eggs were among the foods forbidden during Lent so it became a tradition and treat to have eggs again at Easter.

People in central European countries continued the tradition of elaborately decorating Easter eggs by creating intricate designs on the eggs. In Germany, eggs that were used in Easter foods were not cracked but blown out. The empty shells were then decorated and hung with ribbons on small trees.

Symbolic of good luck, the eggshell tree is one Easter Tradition brought to America by German settlers. Another tradition brought by the Pennsylvania Dutch was the fable that the Easter bunny delivers colored eggs for good children.

Easter is an especially happy time for children because of the enjoyment of hiding and searching for brightly colored eggs. Don't let this happy time be spoiled by an unnecessary illness caused by food spoilage bacteria.

Eggs are perishable and must be handled with care. Buy eggs only from a refrigerated display case. If the trip home will take more than 30 minutes or if the temperature outside is very hot, place the eggs in a cooler for safe transportation home.

Check the expiration date printed on the carton. Don't buy eggs after the expiration date. Inspect the eggs in the carton before buying them, and buy eggs with clean, uncracked

shells. Refrigerate the eggs as soon as possible. When using, remove only the number of eggs needed from the carton.

Hard-cooked eggs that will be hidden for an Easter egg hunt must be prepared with care to prevent cracking the shells. They should be hidden in places that are protected from dirt, pets, and other sources of bacteria. The total time for hiding and hunting the eggs must not be more than two hours. The found eggs must be re-refrigerated until they are eaten.

Hard-cooked eggs will eventually spoil if not refrigerated and should not be eaten if they are exposed to room temperatures for more than two hours. Hard-cooked eggs, in the shell or peeled, should be eaten within one week after cooking.

If in doubt about the length of time the egg has been at room temperature, whether the egg was cracked before, during or after the hunt or the overall safety of the Easter egg, discard the egg.

Oversight And Centralization

Last week's article looked at local church autonomy as found in the New Testament. Such practices as one church giving oversight of a work over to another church and the pooling of funds was discussed. If two churches can engage in these activities, why cannot all churches do so? When such sharing and pooling occurs the churches involved have a centralized work.

One of the major problems with the scriptures do not provide centralized oversight as all works do. And the scriptures do not provide centralized oversight. They provide oversight only on the local level.

The best we can do with centralized oversight is to say that all Christians and all churches are governed by the doctrine of Christ, that He is the head of every Christian and every congregation. (1 John 9:11; Acts 2:42; Eph. 5:25) Certainly we are to be faithful to His teachings on all things, including church organization. (1 Cor. 3:17) To allow men to exercise control over the affairs of a plurality of congregations is going beyond what the scriptures allow.

Yet, traditional Christianity has fallen victim to federalizing programs repeatedly through the centuries. The first few centuries after Christ saw the development of the Roman Catholic Church with its elaborate hierarchy. Protestant denominations started with plans to reform and some even to restore the church to scriptural standards. But they, too, have fostered and supported synods, conventions, and various ecclesiastical bodies which assume control of churches. God has not endorsed any of them.

There is a first step to be taken in this process of centralization. When national and world-wide organizations are established and supported by local churches, the process has begun.

Next week's article will discuss whether or not the job of evangelizing the world can be accomplished without centralization.
