Eugene Bishop Named Director Of Yellow Creek State Port

Governor Ray Mabus announced the selection of Eugene Bishop as the new director of the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority. Bishop, who was selected from more than 100 applicants, will assume the director's position immediately.

"Mr. Bishop's extensive experience in the Yellow Creek area will be very beneficial in marketing the Port and its industrial park, helping to bring more jobs to northeast Mississippi," said Governor Mabus.

"Mr. Bishop is a trained engineer and was heavily involved in the development of the former TVA Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant," said Carlos Ginn, chairman of the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority. "His experience with this region will be very valuable as he seeks to attract new business to the port and to market the industrial park."

Bishop, 46, previously worked for Atlantic Research Corporation, which provided research services to the Hercules/Atlantic proposal for NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) plant which was awarded in April 1989 to Lockheed/Aerofjet. Prior to that he served in several positions with the Tennessee Valley Authority on developing the former Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant.

"Mr. Bishop's management and marketing skills will be valuable assets to the port with the location of the NASA facility on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway," said J. Mac Holladay, director of the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development.

"The waterway played an important role in NASA's decision to locate in Mississippi and the ASRM plant and related companies will have a major

impact on the Yellow Creek Port and the Waterway."

An agency of the State of Mississippi, Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority, one of two state-owned ports, is administered by the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development. The Authority operates the barge-rail-truck terminal at Yellow Creek and is developing a 190-acre industrial park with barge access adjacent to the port.

Bishop received an associate of arts degree from Itawamba Community College in 1965. He received a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from Mississippi State University in 1967 and has taken courses toward a master's degree in engineering management at the University of Tennessee. Bishop is a Mississippi native, currently residing in Iuka.

Bishop is married to the former Ann Rhodes of Iuka, and they have one daughter, Heather.

Supervisors Propose County Water District

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors is working toward the incorporation of a new county water district to serve areas not currently under the jurisdiction of a water district.

The new district will be countywide and targeted to provide water to those "dry spots" not covered by the 16-18 rural water associations now operating within the county, said Nick Phillips, attorney for the supervisors.

State law does not permit the incorporation of an area already served by a water association or district, Phillips said.

There are over 30 parcels of land included in the proposed boundaries of the new Tishomingo County Water District.

The areas are both large and small, with some overlapping, and others are isolated pockets of the county, Phillips said.

The county's consulting engineering firm, Cook-Coggins of Tupelo, assisted in identifying those

areas to be included in the new district, he said.

A public hearing is scheduled for May 1 at which any parties concerned are invited to express their opinions on the proposed incorporation.

The Board is also in the process of forming a new sewer district to serve property in the northwest corner of the county.

Sewer District Phase I is proposed to serve the NASA advanced solid rocket motor facility, the Coleman Park area, and residential development occurring near Pickwick Lake, Phillips said.

The supervisors have been consulting with the Public Service Commission to comply with requirements and regulations for the district. In addition, an operating agreement was signed with E.O.S. of Birmingham, AL, a subsidiary of RUST International, to provide technical services in implementing the water district, Phillips said.

A hearing for public input on the district is set for May 7 at the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

Kindergarten Registration For Tish. County Schools

Registration for all kindergarten and new first grade students attending Tishomingo County Schools during the 1991-92 school year will be held Friday, April 26, 1991, at each of the elementary schools from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m., or during regular school hours.

According to state law, a student must be five years of age on or before September 1 to enter kindergarten and a student entering first grade must be six years of age on or before September 1.

This year's kindergarten class will not attend school on that date. The present kindergarten class will not pre-register for first grade since they are already enrolled.

A child entering Tishomingo County Schools this fall must have a cer-

tified copy of his/her birth certificate and a Certificate of Immunization, which can be obtained from the Health Department or local physician. Parents do not need these two certificates to pre-register their children; however, the forms must be submitted to the school before the child can begin in the fall. They must also have a Social Security number.

If for any reason a child cannot be registered at the given time, please contact the elementary school in your district.

This applies to Belmont, Burnsville, and Tishomingo Schools.

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The abutment teeth are the teeth to which a fixed bridge is attached. The porcelain veneer crowns are the restorations which fasten the porcelain bridge to the abutment teeth.

The pontic area is the portion of the bridge which actually replaces the missing tooth. The pontic is fastened to the abutment porcelain veneer crowns with metal connectors and provides a strong metal substructure.

To summarize, the porcelain bridge serves the following purposes: replaces missing teeth, helps balance a normal bite, helps prevent unnatural stress on the dental ridge, prevents over-eruption of opposing teeth, prevents drift and tilt of adjacent teeth, helps prevent formation of decay in abnormal areas, helps retard onset of periodontal disease (bone destruction).

Even though the porcelain bridge is considered by dentists to be the finest dentistry available, it must still be considered reparative in nature. It must have meticulous home care.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

"CLEAN—UP TISHOMINGO"

Many Tishomingo Counties have been busy in the past few weeks doing "spring clean-up" of their yard, home and other public places. Tishomingo County is one of the

most beautiful spots in the state with the Dogwood trees in bloom, as well as other blooming plants. Let me encourage you, if you haven't cleaned your yard and other public areas, to do so soon.

Iuka will be celebrating "Heritage Day" April 26, 27 and 28. We want our entire county to look especially beautiful for this occasion.

GIVE YOUR HOUSE A CHECK—UP
Two things are about to save you some money -- maybe big money: this article and your own good sense.

Clip this article and carry it with you around the house. Let it serve as a guide to spring home maintenance

that could save you a bundle by keeping your house in good shape.

Home maintenance can give returns on your home improvement dollar. Start with your windows. Go from one to another and open and close them. Lock and Unlock them. If you find one stuck, make a note of it. That can be tomorrow afternoon's chore.

Examine all the panes. If you find one cracked or broken, you're already losing money: you are paying for heat and air-conditioning that is seeping outside.

Check the weatherstripping on the windows and doors. There is no bigger money-waster than a poorly weatherstripped door. If you have a door that wants to stick when you tug on it, make a note to fix it. It is not going to disappear. The problems will just get worse. Twist those doorknobs too.

When was the last time you really paid your wiring some attention? Do so now. Walk around the house and flip lights on and off. This is a good time to look in on lightbulbs too. Test all electrical outlets. Be sure to check plugs and wires on items hooked into them. Do not forget exhaust fans in the kitchen and bathroom, and your attic fan. Listen for little squeaks. They can become big ones.

While you are working with things electrical, walk to the front door and press the doorbell. No doorbell. Then go ahead and knock the knocker. They can rust, stick or develop squeaks.

Plumbing problems can cost a small fortune if you let them get out of hand. Things to look for leaking faucets or shower heads, leaks or rusted pipes in the basement and clogged or slow moving drains. Flush each toilet, if the valve doesn't shut tightly, it's costing you money. Do not stop there. Test all the water shut-off valves under the sinks and the main line valve.

Now that you have the idea follow this checklist:

Fireplace. Does the damper open easily and close securely?

Walls. Scars? Scuffs? Cracks? Chipped paint or plaster. Pay special attention around windows. Sunshine can bake the paint on windowsills.

Ceilings. Inspect them like the walls.

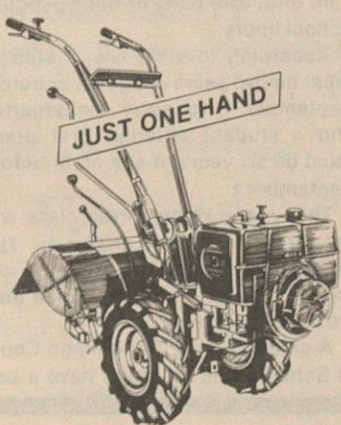
Stairs. Squeaks? Loose steps? Is the handrail firm?

Furnace and air conditioner. Look for leaks. Test motors and change the filter. You are not finished yet.

Climb into the attic. Look for leaks. Check insulation. Now go outdoors.

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INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

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Eye Strain In Children

Have you noticed that your youngster is straining his or her eyes to read. Does your child complain about his eyes being tired. This might be a simple case of eyestrain or there may be a vision problem that needs correcting. Sometimes children develop eyestrain from incessant studying, reading, or television viewing because they are not as physically active as they should be. Playtime and other physical activities are important for the health of his eyes as well as the rest of his body. However, if eyestrain persists even when the child is physically active, you may want to have his eyes examined by your eye doctor to see if there is a vision problem.

Many children who have eye problems are not aware of it, or they may not want to complain about it. If one eye is causing problems, they may begin to depend more on the good eye for their vision. That may solve the problem as far as they're concerned, but it may make the vision problem in the faulty eye more difficult to correct. The sooner they have their eyes examined the better.

1 large fryer, cut up
3 tsp. salt
Black pepper

Cook chicken until tender. Remove from bone, if preferred. Place 1/2 of chicken broth in bottom of baking dish. Have plenty of broth. Roll 1/2 of pastry on floured board; cut in strips and drop small pieces in broth, enough to cover chicken. Add

remainder of chicken and broth. Add margarine evenly to each layer. Add pepper each time. Roll remainder of pastry to cover top. Place in oven, bake at 350° for 1 hour.

3 c. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. shortening
1 egg

Mix flour and shortening well. Beat egg. Add enough water to make 1/2 cup. Add this with salt to flour mixture. Do not overwork.

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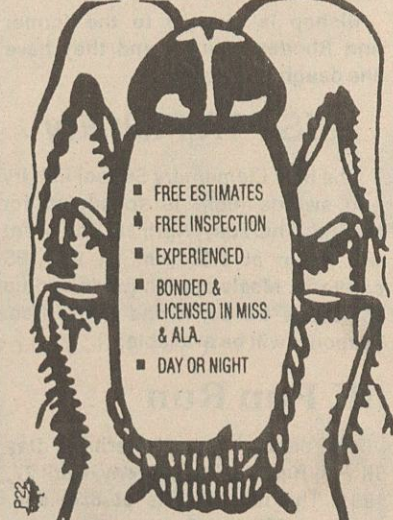
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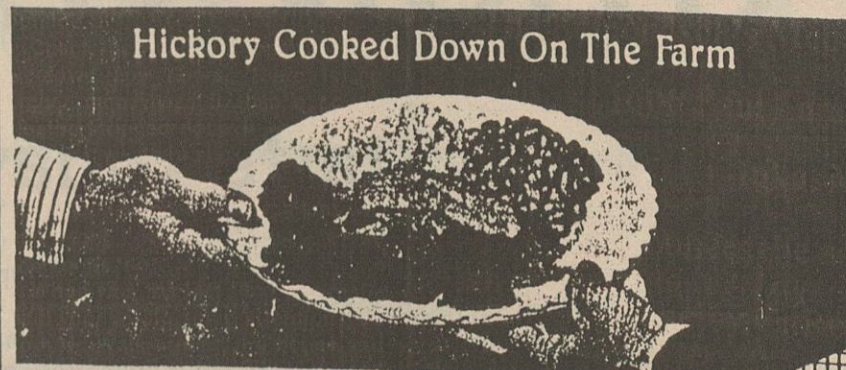
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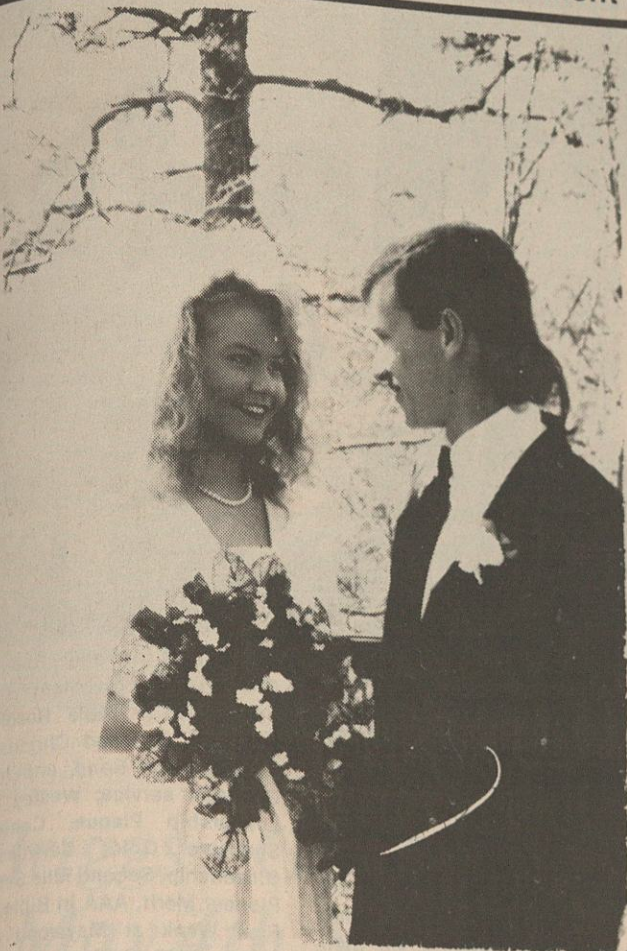
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Pruitt - Hill Nuptials Exchanged March 30th

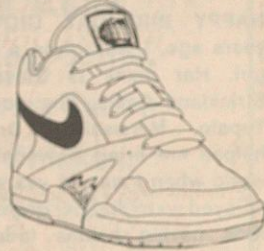

Conserving Our Natural Resources

The wildlife of our country need help. Land is eroding, and trees and grasses are being cut. As citizens of the United States we should help join the fight to preserve our wildlife.

Some ways to preserve our wildlife are to plant trees, hedges, and windbreaks, improve pastureland, manage our marshes, and protect stream-banks from erosion. This is only the beginning.

Farmers and ranchers can make effective decisions regarding wildlife production on their land. Nearly all of the 2,200,000 farmers and ranchers in the soil conservation service practice at least one wildlife protection plan.

One practice the farmers use are stripcropped fields which help attract twice as many birds as normal fields. These fields have more "edge" where food and cover are close together. Stripcropped fields are applied at a rate of about 570,000 acres a year.

Another way to prevent erosion is to protect land from floods. To prevent lands from flooding you need to improve channels and increase drainage ditches.

Many farmers and landowners are constructing ponds. This way fish and wildlife will have the water supply their life demands.

We need to pull together as a nation to preserve our wildlife. If we don't have wildlife the whole cycle of life will be interrupted.

Preserve, protect, and prevent that's my motto.

Remember to preserve a better life for all of us, stop soil erosion and protect the future of our natural wildlife.

Register Now For Babysitter's Workshop

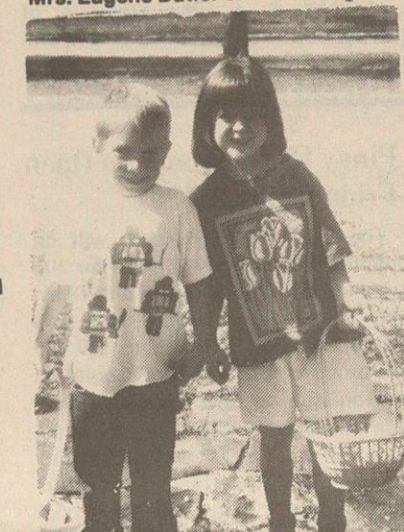

Low Thyroid: More Common in Women

Having low thyroid hormone levels is know as *hypothyroidism*. In this condition, the thyroid gland, which is located in front of the windpipe, produces too little thyroid hormone for the body's needs. Thyroid hormone affects most body cells, and a deficiency results in several problems including fatigue, intolerance to cold, dry skin, puffiness of the hands and face, and constipation. Persons who have hypothyroidism may be overweight and prone to recurrent infections.

According to a recent issue of *Pharmacy Times*, between six and eight million Americans suffer from hypothyroidism. Women are five times more likely to develop hypothyroidism than are men. About 10 percent of women over the age of 40 have the condition.

Thyroid gland function can be determined with blood tests that measure the body's two main thyroid hormones. When hypothyroidism is diagnosed, a hormone supplement may be prescribed. These supplements are prepared synthetically or are derived from animal sources (from beef and pork thyroid glands). While supplements provide control for the condition, hypothyroidism usually continues throughout life. The person with hypothyroidism can expect to live a healthy life if appropriate amounts of thyroid supplements are taken regularly.

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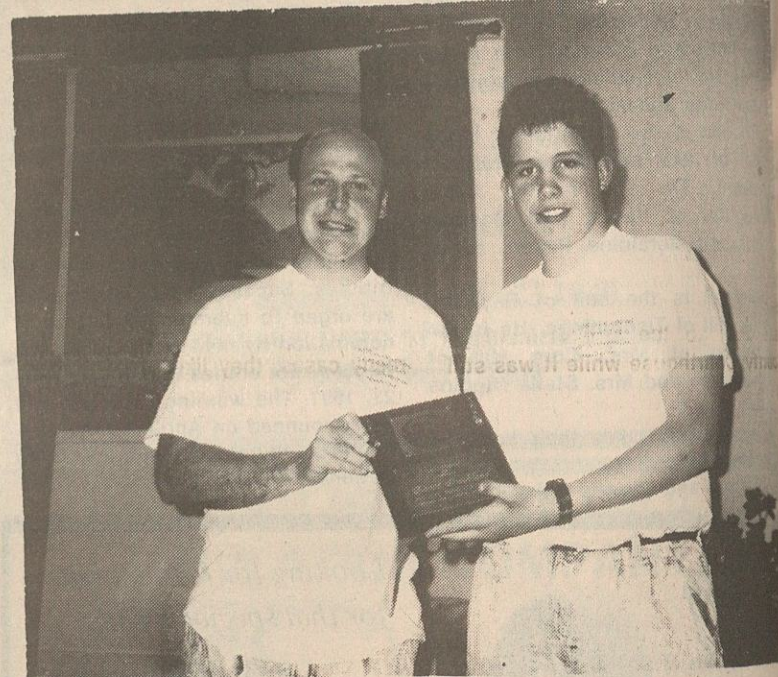


Lads To Leaders/ Leaderettes Compete

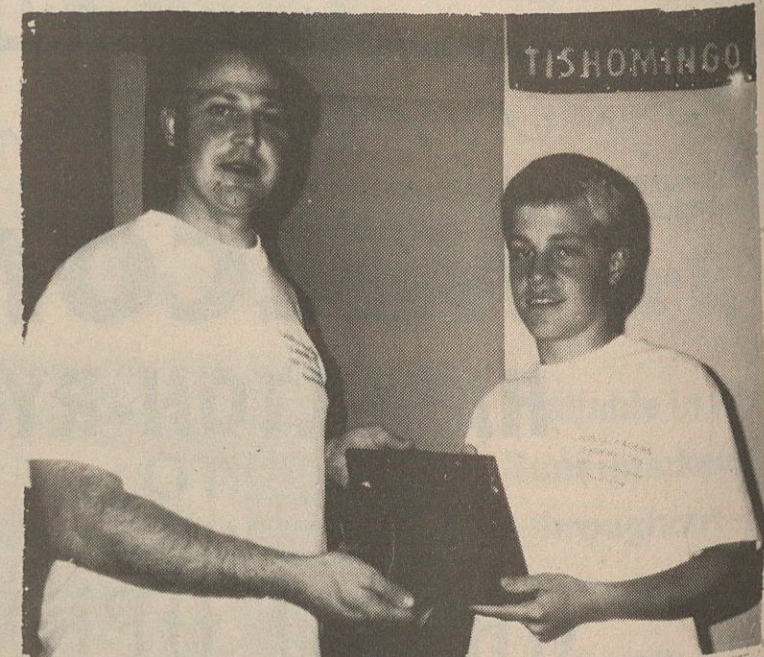

At The Old Courthouse

"They would come to the old courthouse dressed in everything from blue jeans to long white wedding gowns," says Margaret June Riley. "You could watch the young couples come in on the bus and go across the street to get married." Mrs. Riley grew up in the Woodley home right next door to the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse while it was still serving as the marriage capital of South.

From 1889, over 44,000 marriage licenses were issued in the Circuit Clerk's office and are on county records today. Eighty two books hold the records of how 88,000 lives joined together. Many of these weddings took place right in the old courthouse. Many people can still remember how preachers would line the wall in the courthouse foyer waiting to see who would get the next couple coming into the building to be married. Couples would travel from far and near to Iuka for their wedding because at the time there was no blood test or waiting period required. The legal age limit was lower than other states, which led many a Romeo and Juliet to elope.

Miss Mattie Faye Pace served in various county offices from the 1920's until the old courthouse closed in 1971. She sold many marriage licenses during those years including the license of Mr. and Mrs. Red Foley. Mr. Foley was a country music legend in the early days of the Grand Ole Opry. Singer Pat Boone also made it big in both popular and country music and is the husband of Foley's daughter. The Foley's granddaughter, Debbie Boone, also became popular in the 1970's for her hit "You Light Up My Life." Just think, all that started when Miss Pace sold a couple of kids a marriage license.

No one knows for sure who the first couple was to be married in the new Tishomingo County because the

records are gone from 1870-1887. The last official wedding occurred Heritage Day of 1988 when Grant and Jackie Holland were married at the courthouse.

Many people come through the old courthouse each year to reminisce their own wedding that happened from twenty to over fifty years ago. In many cases, they like to have their vows renewed in a special ceremony in the same place that they were first united.

This year we will be offering Heritage Day Weddings to anyone who either wants to renew their wedding vows or have a "Play" wedding for Heritage Day 1991 so that they can proudly say "I was married at the Tishomingo County Courthouse once...or twice."

(Heritage Day is April 27th. Weddings will take place from 9:00 until 4:00 at the Old Courthouse. There will be no charge, but a donation to the museum will be appreciated. O.K. Fellows, time to get on your knees and do some serious courtin'. You only have a week. Happy sparkin' folks!)

Delicious refreshments were served by the hostesses.

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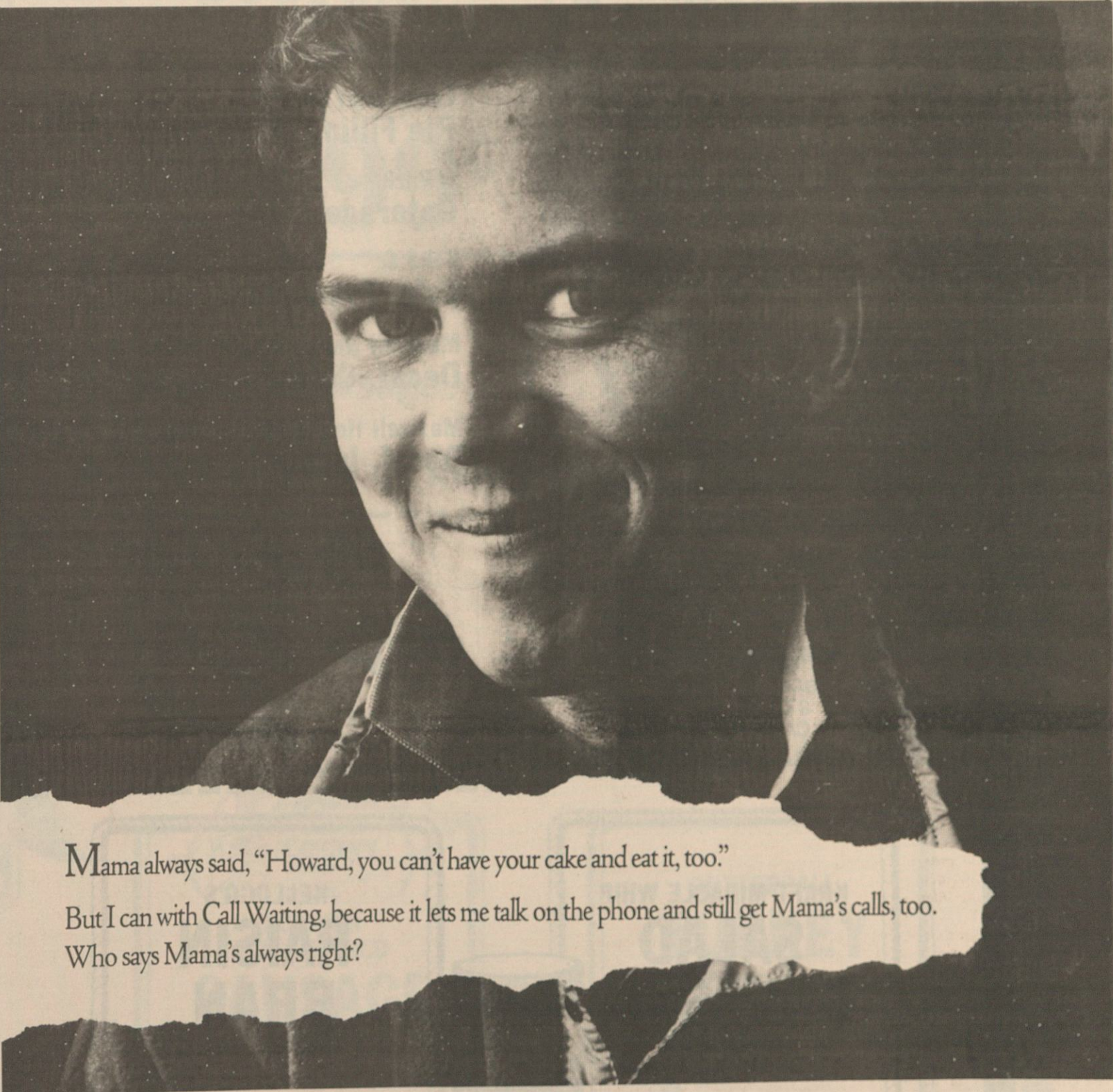

Iuka Pilots Celebrate International Dinner

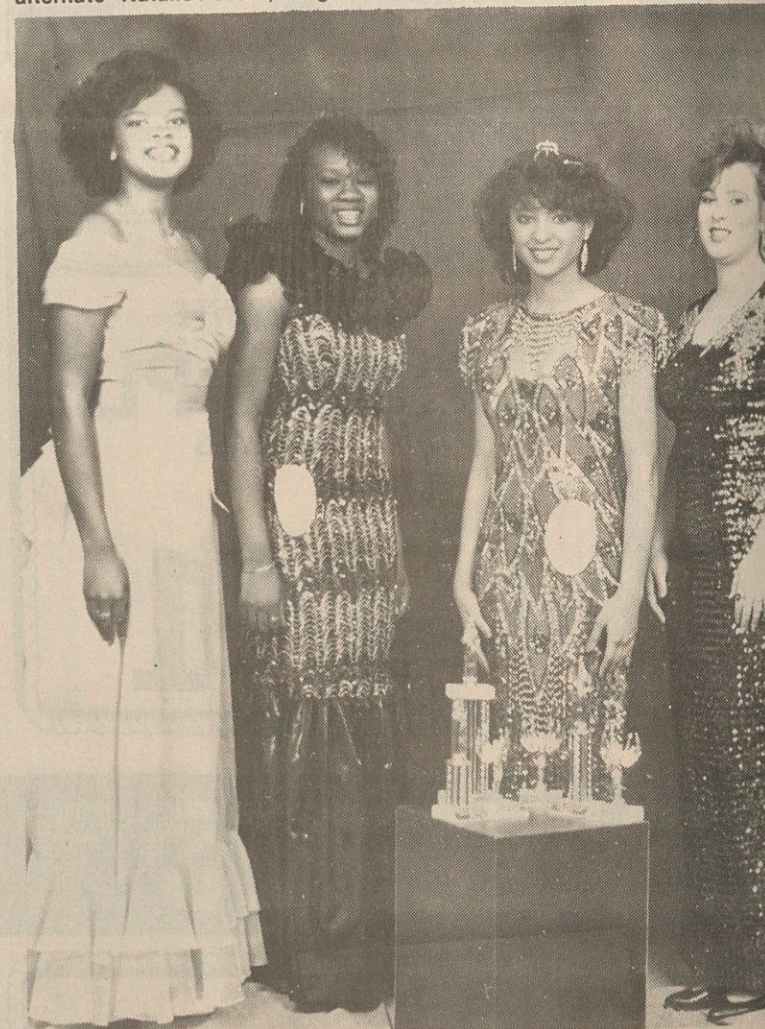

ASCS Farm News

FARM PROGRAM SIGN—UP ENDS APRIL 26, 1991: We began accepting applications for the 1991 farm programs on March 4th, Phillip Horn, CED of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced sign-up and other acreage reduction program provisions for wheat, corn, sorghum, barley, rice and cotton.

The farm programs call for a 7.5 percent reduction in wheat acres; 15 percent in corn, sorghum, and barley acres; 5 percent in upland cotton, extra long staple (ELS) cotton and rice acres; and zero percent in oats acres.

For meeting these acreage reduction requirements, Horn said farmers will be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other benefits on their 1991 program crops.

“Wheat, feed grain, upland cotton and rice program participants may request 40 percent of the estimated deficiency payments at sign-up,” Horn said. Estimated payment rates are \$1.47 per bushel for wheat, \$1.40 for wheat in optional winter wheat provision, \$.58 for corn, \$.56 for sorghum, \$.47 for barley, \$.15 for oats, \$.10 per pound for upland cotton, and \$.37.6 per hundredweight for rice.

Under the 1991 programs, farmers will have planting flexibility on up to 25 percent of the crop acreage base, except ELS cotton. “That 25 percent is called ‘flex’ acreage.” Horn said farmers may plant on these acres, any program crop, any oilseed, industrial, or experimental crop designated by USDA, or any other crop except fruits and vegetables. He said a list of prohibited crops will be available. Horn explained that the first 15 percent of flex acreage will be called

“normal flex acreage,” and the remaining 10 percent will be “optional flex acreage.” The program crops planted on flex acres may be eligible for loans. However, no deficiency payments will be made for program crops planted on normal flex acreage. “Likewise, if a crop other than the program crop is planted on the optional flex acreage, deficiency payments on that acreage will not be earned.”

According to Horn, Producers may certify that they planted no acreage to a program crop, and that fruits and vegetable plantings were not larger than normal, and retain their entire program crop acreage base as if actually planted. “This ‘zero certification’ option is new, and will be available to those producers who don’t participate in the program crop price support program.”

The ASCS official said the amount of regular deficiency payments that a person is entitled to under one or more programs for wheat, feed grains upland cotton, ELS cotton and rice may not exceed \$50,000, the same as for the 1990 crops.

Speaker Shares Information About Middle East With Local Students

During the past several months we were bombarded from television, radio, and newspapers, with names, places, and ideas from the Middle East. If this has been frightening to an adult, think how students must have been feeling.

Gordon Robinson of Dallas spend 10 weeks on a mission in the Persian Gulf area before the war began. When he recently talked to the second grade class at Tishomingo Elementary School, he spoke from experience and provided the students with a better understanding of the geography, culture, and climate of the Middle Eastern countries. Gordon was invited as a resource person to speak to the class while he and his wife Stephanie were visiting with Pearl Robinson, Gordon's grandmother, and Nell McAlister of Tishomingo.

Robinson modeled a Higel (pronounced "high-gall"), the traditional head covering of the Arab people. He also showed the students how the Pakistani head dress differs from that of the Arab people. He described the clothes of the different groups of people in the Middle East.

The students were encouraged to ask questions, respond, and comment while the resource person was in the classroom. They were curious about the Arabian camel. Robinson drew illustrations and answered questions explaining that the one-hump camels live in the Arabian desert while two-hump camels live in colder deserts elsewhere. "The camel is a very helpful animal, but can be a mean and nasty creature when it spits on you or bites you," Robinson said.

Robinson taught the children to say "hello" and "goodbye" in Arabic. Quite often now the morning greeting "Kif-hall-ik" can be heard in the classrooms. You may hear "Salam"

being echoed at the end of the school day.

Jehovah'S Witnesses

Levodopa, or *L-dopa* as it is sometimes called, can be inactivated in the intestine by the B-6 present in some multiple vitamin supplements. Therefore, L-dopa and B-6 should not be taken at the same time. However, inactivation does not occur with all medicines that contain L-dopa. If you have specific questions, ask your pharmacist or physician.

It has been shown that many older people do not obtain sufficient B-6 in their diets. And research studies have demonstrated that this vitamin boosts immunity in the elderly. Because of this immune response "boost," B-6 someday may be found to be beneficial in care of persons with AIDS and certain types of cancer.

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County Agents News

FORAGES AND CORN

After this winter, many Mississippi cattle producers agree that the shortage of good feed has been the problem with getting cattle through the winter. Many of them have been short on hay. Also, cool season grazing crops have had some problems.

HAY AND COOL SEASON FORAGES

Experience and research have shown that home-grown feed on most cattle operations is the most economical way of supplying the feed needs of cattle. I will agree that cattle producers sometimes may be able to purchase hay about as cheap as it can be grown. However, as with this winter, purchasing locally grown hay is not always dependable. Most cattle

producers count on growing their own hay. This allows better control over supply and quality. Then if you are short on supply, you may need to purchase additional hay.

Many Mississippi cattle producers were short on hay this winter due to dry growing conditions from mid-July until winter in 1990. Some of them have had to scrap to get their cattle through the winter.

Following this shortage, many cattle producers are asking for a quick fix for some grazing and hay. If this applies to you and you have cool season grazing, you may need to apply additional fertilizer for additional growth. As temperatures warm in March and April, ryegrass and fescue will make much growth not needed for grazing should be set aside and harvested for hay to insure against a

short hay crop from summer forages. In some locations this was the most and best hay some; producers had going into the winter 1990.

Another suggestion is to get an early start on getting the most from your summer grasses such as bahiagrass and bermudagrass. For these and also your cool season grasses use some 2,4-D or Weed-master (2,4-D plus Banvel) and get the weeds out. Then fertilize to get good early grazing and/or hay. Remember, with bermudagrass, the first cut of hay in the spring should be your best cut. With bermudagrass and bahiagrass you have time throughout the summer to fertilize and harvest for additional hay. CORN - Planting should get into full swing this month. Early planted corn generally outyields later-planted corn. Adequate plant

populations are necessary for top yields. Without irrigation, 16,000 to 18,000 plants per acre are adequate for most fields.

In fields where soils are deep and have a good moisture relationship, 20,000 to 22,000 plants per acre may be needed to optimize yields. If corn is irrigated, 26,000 to 28,000 plants per acre will be necessary. Plant 20 percent more seed per acre than plants needed per acre where soils are cool (50 to 60 degrees F).

Corn variety trials information is available at county Extension offices for growers who need it.

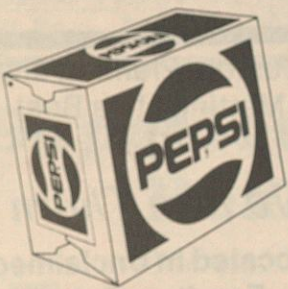

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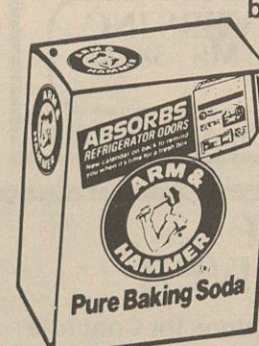


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
