### Open Letter From The Tishomingo Cty. School Boards

By action of two school boards operating under an interlocal agreement, the children of Tishomingo County will now have educational facilities second to none in the State of Mississippi and comparable with any secondary school facilities available in the southeastern United States. Efforts have been made to secure administrators, teachers, coaches, and staff as exceptional as our facilities.

The Tishomingo County School Board and the Iuka Special Separate Municipal School Board have met almost weekly, deliberated, and made decisions to implement the consolidation of the two districts into a new district with a newly-elected board to take office July 1, 1991. Members of the board-elect have attended many of the meetings and participated in job interviews to help make the transition as smooth as possible.

The school boards wish to thank Governor Ray Mabus and the Department of Economic and Community Development for their commitment to the people of Tishomingo County. Their acknowledgment that improved schools are the primary key to economic development indicates that our new school district can be a model for the State of Mississippi. What we have the opportunity to accomplish here will be the envy of the

region.

A special thanks goes to the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors: Frank Williams, Jr., First District; Ricky Cummings, Second District; D.W. McKee, Third District; M.R. Whithead, Fourth District; and Leon Cook, Fifth District. Without their support the financial requirements of meeting the state's proposed 70/30 fund match would have been almost impossible to attain. Support from the governing administrative body of the county was instrumental in acquiring additional funds to complete the total project.

Plans are now being made for use of the new facilities at Belmont and Tishomingo County High School in August, 1991. So much has been accomplished since the initial construction contract was let in September, 1990. We express our appreciation to the citizens of Tishomingo County who have encouraged our efforts and volunteered their assistance when requested. We now encourage each of you to stay involved in the process of providing the best for our children and the future of Tishomingo County. Visit the new facilities when the opportunity is presented. We think you'll be pleased.

### Hernando Man Drowns In Waterway Near Paden

Rescue workers pulled the body of a Hernando man from the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Sunday night after several hours of diving and dragging the waters.

According to Tishomingo County Coroner/Medical Examiner Dale White, the body of Michael H. Waller, 35, of Hernando, has been sent to Jackson for an autopsy to determine the cause of his death.

White said that Waller was out boating Sunday when an incident was reported about 5:30 p.m. The body was recovered at approximately 8:45 p.m. just north of the railroad bridge at Paden.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, rescue squads from Tishomingo and Prentiss counties, and fire departments from Midway, Tishomingo, Paden, and Eastport-Millcreek participated in the search.

According to Benny Parrish, a diver on the scene, others in Waller's boat marked the spot where the victim went into the water. The body was found only 40 - 50 yards from the area.

### REDUCING YOUR RISK OF CANCER THROUGH DIET

April is Cancer Control Month, sponsored by the American Cancer Society. Research suggests a relationship between what we eat and the risk that we will develop some types of cancer. While there are many other factors involved, diet is one of the factors that is controllable.

The American Cancer Society (ACS) suggests seven dietary guidelines to reduce the risk of cancer. These guidelines are consistent with and similar to the U.S. Department of Agriculture/U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Dietary Guidelines, which are the basis for nutrition education within the Cooperative extension Service.

First, the ACS recommends avoiding obesity. According to the ACS, an individual who is 40 percent or more overweight may have an increased risk of colon, breast and uterine cancers.

If you are not physically active, regular exercise may help you lose weight and keep it off. If you eat too much, decreasing your calorie intake may help. Long-term success usually depends upon new and better lifelong habits of both exercise and eating.

Second, cut down on total fat intake. According to the ACS, a high-fat diet may increase your risk of developing cancer of the breast, colon or prostate.

A high-fat diet is linked to an increased risk for heart disease. For a low-fat diet, eat vegetables, fruits and grain products; choose lean meats, fish, skinless poultry and low-fat dairy products most of the time; and use fats and oils sparingly.

Third, eat more high-fiber foods. The ACS reports a high-fiber diet may protect against colon cancer. The exact mechanism is not known but could be related to dilution of intestinal contents and speeding up their passage through the colon.

To increase the fiber in your diet, eat more vegetables, including dry beans and peas; fruits; and breads, cereals, pasta and rice, especially whole-grain products. These foods are generally low in fats, so by choosing these foods often, you are

also likely to decrease fats in your diet.

The fourth guideline is to include foods rich in vitamins A and C in your daily diet. Vitamin A and related factors found in dark green and deep yellow fruits and vegetables may reduce the risk of lung, esophagus and larynx cancer. The ACS also reports that vitamin C prevents nitrates from combining with proteins which can form cancer-promoting chemicals which increase risk of stomach, esophagus and larynx cancer.

To increase the vitamin A in your diet, have dark-green vegetables, such as spinach, turnip greens, and broccoli, as well as deep-yellow fruits and vegetables, such as sweet potatoes, carrots and canteloupe often. Choose vitamin C-containing foods, such as oranges, grapefruit, melons or berries daily.

Fifth, include cruciferous (cabbage-family) vegetables in your diet. According to the ACS, cruciferous vegetables produce powerful enzymes in the liver which may break down cancer-promoting chemicals. They may reduce the risk of esophagus, stomach, colorectal, lung and bladder cancer.

Besides cabbage, some other cruciferous vegetables are broccoli, Brussels sprouts and cauliflower.

Sixth, cut down on salt-cured, smoked and nitrite-cured foods. According to the ACS, these type foods may increase the risk of stomach and esophagus cancer.

Evidence to support this recommendation is not yet clear. Yet some health authorities recommend that individuals continue to limit intake of these foods to the current low level of consumption.

Nitrates are used as curing agents in bacon and other cured meat products. They prevent spoilage and maintain food color. Yet nitrates combine with protein to form cancer-causing chemicals (carcinogens). Because of safety concerns, the amount of nitrates now used in cured foods has been greatly reduced.

Vitamin C compounds also can be

added to these foods, in order to help prevent the nitrates and proteins from forming the carcinogen. Check the ingredient labels for the protective phrases: "ascorbic acid," "sodium ascorbate," and "sodium erythorbate."

Conventionally smoked meats and smoked fish contain tars similar to the cancer-promoting tars found in tobacco smoke. The food industry is now using "liquid smoke" in many foods. This is thought to be less hazardous. Always check the ingredient label, if you are unsure of what's in a particular food.

Seventh, keep alcohol consumption moderate, if you do drink. According to the ACS, heavy drinkers are more likely to develop cancer of the mouth, larynx, throat, esophagus or stomach. One theory is that overdrinking may alter the way we process food, which in turn encourages cancerous cell growth. Another theory is that alcohol may interfere with the body's ability to defend itself against disease.

Moderate drinking for women is no more than one drink per day; for men, it is no more than two drinks per day. Count as a drink: 12 ounces of regular beer, 5 ounces of wine, or 1.5 ounces of distilled spirits (80 proof).

Some people should not drink any amount of alcohol beverages. These include women who are pregnant or trying to conceive, individuals who plan to drive or engage in other activities that require attention or skill, individuals using medicines, even over-the-counter kinds, individuals who cannot keep their drinking moderate, and children and adolescents.

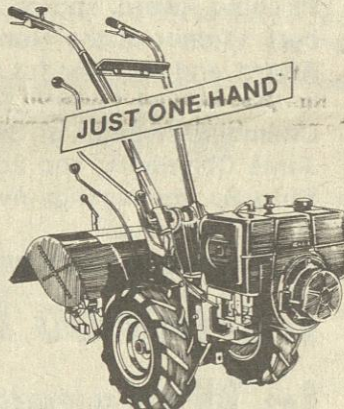
### SKILLET DINNER

- 3/4 c. uncooked macaroni
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/4 c. chopped onion
- 2 (8 oz.) cans tomato sauce
- 1 (15.25 oz.) can whole kernel corn, drained
- 2 tsp. chili powder
- 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt
- 1/2 c. diced Cheddar Cheese

Cook macaroni according to package directions, omitting salt; drain. Cook ground beef and onion in a large skillet, stirring to crumble meat. Drain. Add macaroni, tomato sauce and next 3 ingredients; stir. Cook over medium heat 5 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in cheese; serve immediately. Yields 6 servings.

If the lack of a high school diploma is the only thing standing between you and college, Northeast Mississippi Community College has good news for you.

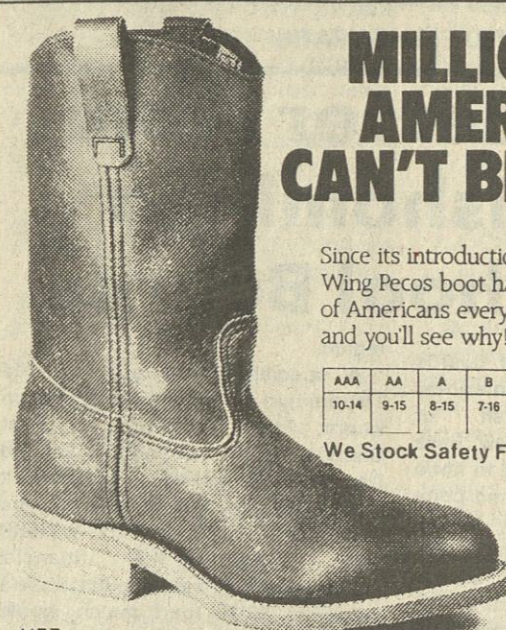
The General Educational Development (GED) Test will be given at Northeast on July 2 and 3, August 6 and 7, August 15 and 16, and September 16 and 17.

Anyone desiring to write the GED must make application in the NEMCC Office of Continuing Education. Applicants must be a resident of the

### Protection From Power Tools

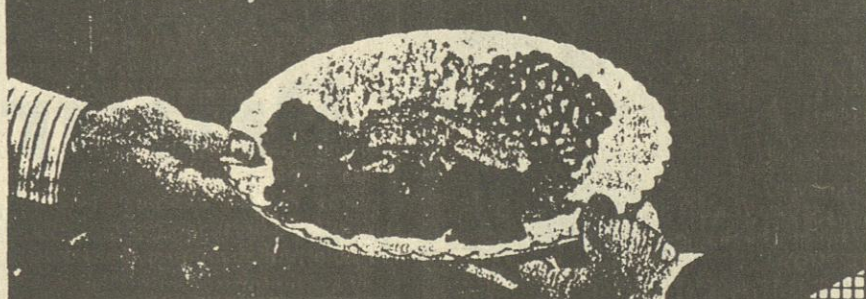

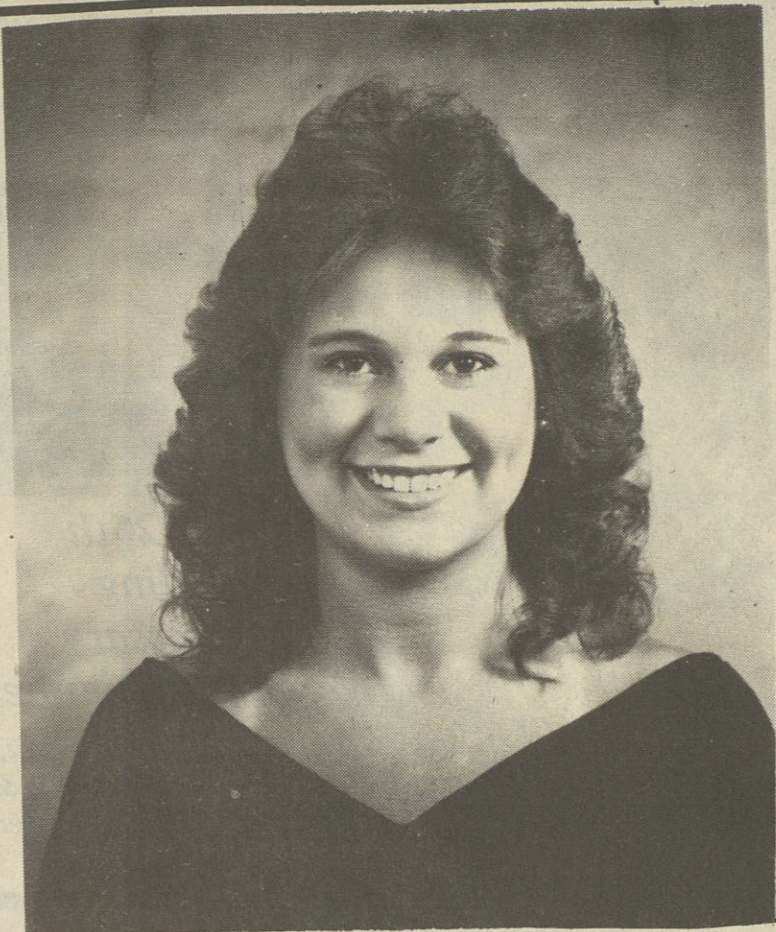

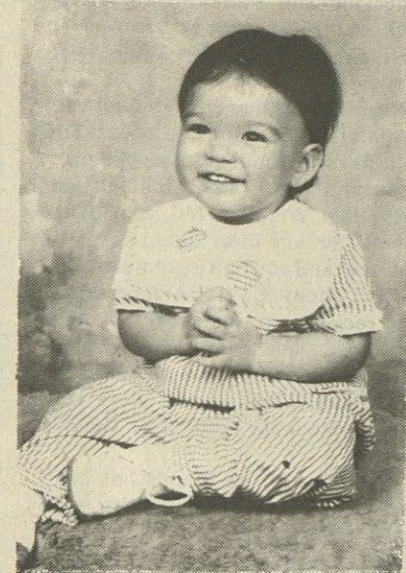

### Several New State Laws Take Effect In July

Uniform drug-testing guidelines to help combat drug abuse in the work place; additional health services to needy children under the Medicaid program; the rights of residential landlords and tenants will be spelled out more clearly; and organizations will have to comply with strict, new requirements to conduct bingo games.

These are among a large batch of new state laws which take effect in July following approval by the Mississippi Legislature earlier this year. Implementation of the laws was pushed back in many instances to coincide with the start of the state's fiscal year on July 1 and give various agencies time to prepare for the changes.

Numerous 1991 laws already have taken effect. A few other measures become effective later this year or next year.

Overall, the Legislature approved more than 600 bills in the session which ended April 30 involving such vital issues as education, economic development, health care, agriculture, and public employees' retirement benefits. Approximately 300 measures take effect in July, including more than 150 general bills and scores of appropriations to fund state agencies and institutions over the next 12 months.

The new drug-testing law is based on a model act developed by the Drug Testing Advisory Subcommittee of the American Bar Association and aimed largely at helping employers deal more effectively with drug abuse in the workplace. While it does not require drug testing in the private sector, the law sets forth uniform procedures to be followed in testing of private and public employees. Among other things, it specifies that applicants for non-government jobs may be required to submit to testing as a condition of employment.

Another drug-related law which already has gone into effect calls for a six-month suspension of a driver's license for anyone convicted of violating state drug laws.

Several education bills become law in July including a wide-ranging measure which allows school districts to utilize local business and professional people for teaching classes on a limited basis, sets up a mentorship program to help beginning teachers, provides new criteria for renewal of teacher certificates, and requires local school board members selected after July 1 to have at least a high school diploma or equivalent.

The Department of Education will be empowered to take new correctional action when a school district loses accreditation under another law taking effect in July. The act permits appointment of any interim conservator when deemed necessary to oversee the troubled district's operations until the problems are resolved.

School discipline also is addressed in a new law. Discipline plans adopted by local districts will be required to include certain provisions making it clear that parents are financially responsible for destructive acts by children against school property or individuals. These and related provisions apply to acts committed after July 1, 1992.

Other laws taking effect July 1 will revise public purchasing laws, including a new 20 percent set-aside provision regarding purchases from minority-owned businesses; reorganize the Department of Agriculture and Commerce into four major offices and create a joint legislative committee to formulate a long-term plan for agriculture and agribusiness services; expand the multi-million dollar Medicaid program to bring it in line with new federal requirements; establish a new landlord-tenants rights act; require that health insurance policies offer reimbursement for treatment of mental illness and temporomandibular joint (TMJ) disorders; and provide for consolidated administration of loan and scholarship programs for medical and dental students and various others.

The state's new bingo law is designed to clearly define the nonprofit organizations allowed to conduct bingo and make certain that proceeds are used as intended for charitable purposes. Violators could face a maximum fine of \$2,500 and/or a year in jail. The Legislature also approved a law providing for regulation of certain charitable groups which solicit contributions in excess of \$4,000 a year.

The Commission on Environmental Quality will be mandated to develop rules for collection, storage and disposal of old tires under another law going into effect in July. The law also deals with disposal of lead-acid batteries, and sets up a "Right Way To Throw Away" program for homes, farms, schools, and small businesses. The legislation is part of a package of waste management bills approved in 1991, including several measures already implemented.

Some of the other laws taking effect July 1 will:

- Increase the bonds which may be issued under the Major Economic Impact Authority Act from \$30 million to \$35 million and make other revisions in economic development laws; amend public employee retirement laws to enable workers with 25 years' service to retire with full benefits, regardless of their age; require AIDS and HIV testing of state prisoners convicted of sex crimes on or after July 1; tighten the state's gun permit law with new restrictions on where concealed weapons are prohibited such as schools, churches, athletic events, and courthouses;

- Set up a new Department of Rehabilitation Services for the blind and handicapped; allow school districts to establish "alternative" schools starting this fall for students having disciplinary problems; create a Natural Gas Marketing Act to protect the rights of owners of natural gas wells and wells producing casinghead gas; provide for licensing and regulation of athletic trainers; allow contributions by municipalities to soil conservation districts; update the state's Home Corporation laws; increase penalties for headlighting deer; revise minimum fees for lifetime sportsman licenses;

- Require an insurance company to pay a minimum of \$100 to volunteer fire departments for each initial response to save buildings in Class 9 or 10 areas; revise procedures for weighing farm-raised catfish; require notification of motorists before driver's licenses are suspended or revoked; revise laws involving disposition of unclaimed property; require the Commission on Environmental Quality to consider additional factors when imposing civil penalties, including harm to the environment and hazards to public health; strengthen record-keeping requirements of pawnbrokers; and close a loophole in DUI laws by requiring a uniform DUI citation including information about the accused's right to an attorney and increased penalties for future violations.

## ASCS Farm News

FARMERS ASKED TO REPORT WEATHER-DAMAGED CROPS

To obtain 1991 acreage credit for the crop and for future crop acreage bases, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, reminds farm program participants to notify ASCS before destroying weather-damaged crops.

Evidence of the failed acreage must be present when the field inspection is made. Excessive rainfall has prevented most farmers from planting cotton and corn and caused some planted crops to fail.

Farm program participants are currently filing acreage reports with ASCS to qualify for benefits on their 1991 program crops. The reports are necessary to determine program compliance and to document crop acreages for 1991 deficiency payments, and for future programs. These reports should be filed by July 15th to be in compliance with this year's programs. As of June 17, 21 farms were certified.

To assist producers with acreage reports, ASCS offers measurement service. Producers can request measurement of planted crops, acreage conservation reserve land, fields or subdivisions, total cropland and land areas for other purposes.

Farmers in compliance with the 1991 acreage reduction programs are eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other farm program benefits.

ASCS SCHEDULES MOHAIR REFERENDUM  
The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will conduct a referendum June 17 - 28 for mohair producers to vote for or against the continuation of a market promotion agreement between the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America.

The proposed program authorizes USDA to withhold up to 4-1/2 cents per pound on 1991 to 1995 mohair marketings for promotion and improvement purposes. Deductions would be used by the Mohair Council to finance advertising sales and promotion programs for mohair and goats in domestic and foreign markets. The funds would also be

used to conduct information programs for producers on production management and marketing improvement.

To be eligible to participate in the referendum, a person must have owned goats six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days in 1990. A cooperative may vote for its members, but if it does, the individual members will not be eligible to vote.

Copies of the proposed program and ballots are being distributed to mohair producers in Tishomingo County beginning June 17. Ballots may be returned by mail or in person to the county ASCS office on or before June 28th.

A similar program was approved nationally in 1986.

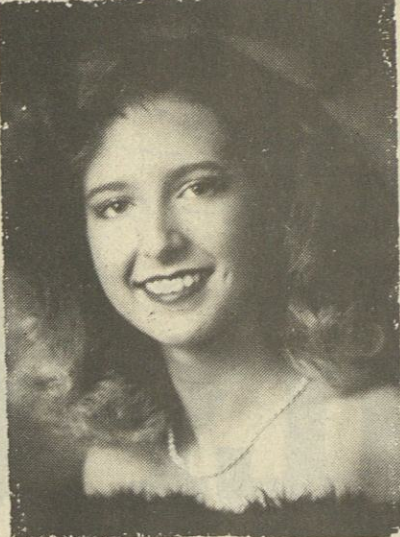
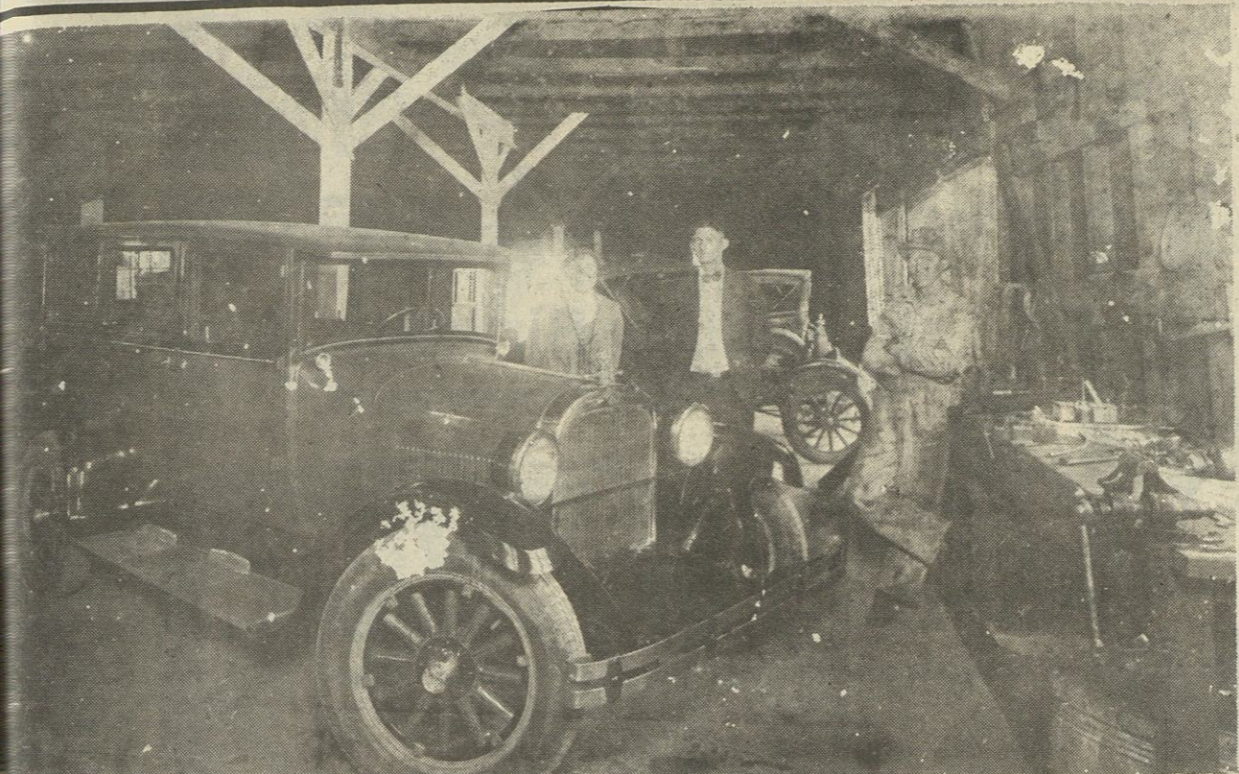

"I am amazed at how well she still drives around," says DeeAnna Bean about her 83-year-old grandmother, Mrs. Pet Dexter Lewis. Mrs. Lewis began driving at age 18 when her mother, Mrs. Ida Biggs Dexter, bought a Model T Ford Automobile. Mrs. Dexter couldn't driver herself nor did she care to learn. She referred to let young Pet "chauffeur" her wherever she needed to go. Now it is over sixty five years later, she is "still rolling," says DeeAnna, "slowly, but still rolling!"

The Dexters were one of the first families to own a car in Tishomingo County. The first person credited with the honor of having the first car in the area was Mr. Carlton Leslie Woodley. Mr. Woodley, known to his friends as "Slim", was also the first auto mechanic in Iuka. For several years he drove for Drs. Whitehurst and Montgomery.

In 1919, Mr. Woodley set up an

agency in Iuka for the Briscoe Automobile Company. He had a Dodge Agency for a time in Corinth but returned to Iuka to sell Fords. He later obtained the Chevrolet Agency which he operated until his retirement. His daughter, Mrs. Margaret June Riley says, "Dad loved fooling with cars." These facts were fondly remembered by Mr. Ben McRae III about "Slim" in a memorial article from the Iuka Rotary Club News dated Feb. 13, 1968. McRae concludes the article by saying, "Slim" Woodley will be missed by all."

When President Roosevelt ordered the banks closed for a holiday in 1933, it was a car. that helped save Iuka Guaranty. Mr. L.T. Gaines knew that the presidential order stated that banks must "Close Their Doors" but said nothing about doing business outside of them. Like Harry Bailly in "It's a wonderful life", Mr. Gaines, did

not loose control. He, Mr. Richard McRee, and the other bank employees loaded a strong box with money.

Mr. W.S. Brown Sr., a neighboring businessman, loaned the bank his seven passenger Buick (probably a 27 or 28 model). It was a big, long car with suicide doors that opened out in both directions. The Buick was parked in front of Brown's Department Store across from the bank at the corner of Front and Fulton Street. Armed deputies guarded the money 24 hours a day until the crisis had ended. Iuka Guaranty Bank is still thought to be the only bank in the country that did business during this emergency, all from the back seat of that old Buick. (If anyone has a picture of that old car, please make me a copy).

According to records and photographs, there were quite a number of automobiles in the late 1920's in Tishomingo County. The roads were still dirt and the car ran fair...till it rained. Mules and wagons were quiet a common sight as recently as the mid-1950's on rural county roads.

Mr. James E. Thomas wrote in Mr. A.W. Mangums Book "Down Memory Lane" About the twenty-millionth Ford being sold in Iuka, Mississippi. Thomas Stated:

"Jordan Motor Company was host to Ford Motor Company officials when the Twenty Millionth Ford was brought to Iuka in the fall of 1931. The town officials and business men were there to welcome the entourage. Iuka School was dismissed and people from miles around gathered downtown to be part of this historic event.

We have original pictures of this event and Mr. Woodley with the first car in the area. Come by and see what we have at the Old Courthouse soon.

Finally, we would like to encourage the public to buckle up and don't drink and drive. Be careful, the roads are as dangerous as ever, even more so today. Law enforcement thanks you and we, Thank You!

Oh, by the way, "Mamaw" Lewis, keep those wheels a rollin as long as you feel like it!

scholars assume the roles of United States representative by debating, lobbying, and voting on proposed and gun legislation.

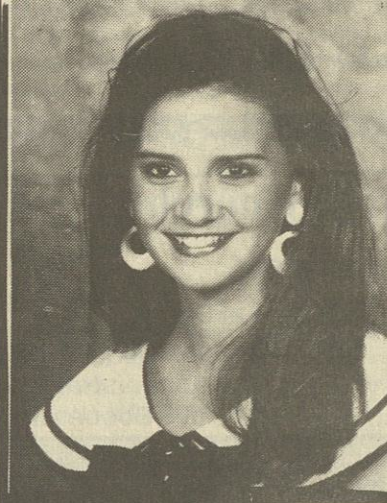

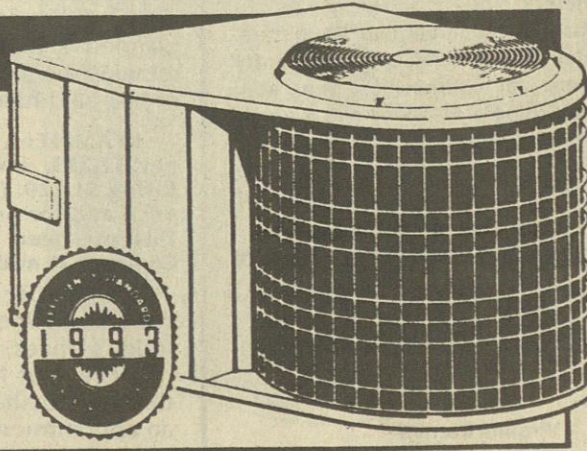

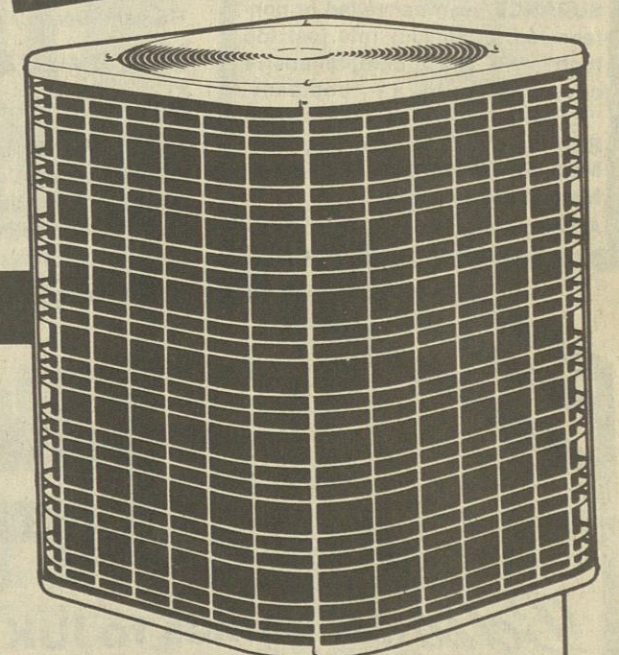

## Hospital Strengthens "No Smoking" Policy

Beginning July 4, Iuka Hospital and Nursing Facility will implement a revised smoking policy that will lead to a smoke-free environment.

IHN's new policy states that use of tobacco in any form will not be permitted in the hospital or on the grounds of the facility. Employees will not be permitted to use tobacco while officially on the job.

Hospital Administrator Bill Rutledge, said, "The new smoking policy follows the standards set by the hospital's accrediting organization. It also demonstrates IHN's dedication to the promotion of health and wellness and our recognition of the proven detrimental effect of tobacco use."

The EPA has ranked passive smoke as a Class A carcinogen, and it joins the ranks of asbestos, benzene and radon for its ability to cause cancer in humans.

"As the public becomes more aware of the dangers of non-smokers breathing second-hand smoke, I predict that we will see an increase in the number of businesses that will

implement restrictions or bans on smoking in the work place," he said.

The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations now requires accredited hospitals to provide for "the dissemination and enforcement of a hospital policy that prohibits the use of smoking materials throughout the hospital buildings."

Iuka Hospital isn't the only company that has taken measures against smoking. The Smoking Policy Institute, a non-profit organization based in Seattle, reports that 60 percent of all companies have some smoking restrictions and 24 percent ban smoking from the work place.

Patients will not be permitted to smoke or use tobacco in any form unless they have received written permission from their attending physicians, Rutledge said.

Iuka Hospital and Nursing Facility is an affiliate of North Mississippi Medical Center. NMMC will also implement a revised smoking policy that will lead to a smoke-free environment.

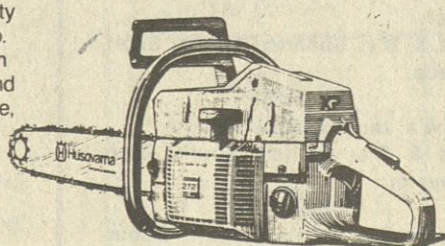

program is designed to meet a critical need of rural communities by providing trained leadership to address economic and social needs."

PRO-MISS is an intensive 15-month educational program that includes seminars, workshops, demonstrations, study tours, independent study and a final project to address an existing problem in the community.

Only 35 participants statewide will be selected for the first PRO-MISS class. Five of these will be from Tishomingo County.

"The five chosen from this area will form a team to work together as they go through the program," Tucker said. "A unique aspect of this program is that the area will be provided with a core group of trained leaders to address the problems and opportunities of the community."

The program is open to county residents 21 or older. Nominations and applications are available from the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and will be accepted through June.

Written applications will be reviewed and semi-finalists will be selected for personal interviews. Based on the written applications and the interviews, five participants from

the area will be chosen.

The class will meet as a group for the first time Sept. 24 through 26 at MSU. The final session is set for November 1992.

"If you are looking for leadership opportunities and challenges, PRO-MISS can offer you a program that will sharpen your skills and enhance your leadership talents and abilities," Tucker said.
