Some of my job duties are: maintaining all case records ensuring that they are up to date; screening clients for needed services and using my judgement in making referrals to appropriate staff and/or other agencies; scheduling appointments; preparing all monthly reports including Medicaid/Medicare, Federal Probation, and individual billings; and doing all typing, filing, and reviewing of case records for Tishomingo County.

As you can see, I have worked with the public for the past 16 years in various agencies of our county so I am aware of the needs of our county and its people. I feel that my past work experience shows that I am a responsible person and that I am qualified to serve as circuit clerk.

The duties of the circuit clerk are many and varied. Some of the duties are to handle voter registration, conduct elections, provide a docket of cases to be tried at court term, keep a jury list from which jurors are selected, and issue marriage license.

59 Qualify For County Election

As of July 19, the qualifying deadline for the countywide election, a total of 59 candidates had qualified to run for office in Tishomingo County.

In the race for sheriff, incumbent Richard Dobbs will face five opponents: Gary Walls, Rick Cornelison, Marcus E. Ivey, Johnny S. Nunley, and James R. "Red" Taylor.

Incumbent Circuit Court Clerk Gerald Parsons will be running against Donna Henry Dill, Scotty Skinner, and Bobbie White. Jimmy (Buddy) James qualified to run as an independent candidate with his name to appear on the ballot in the Nov. election.

For tax assessor, incumbent Horace Ledgewood will face A.T. Marlar Jr., Boyd Lee Tidwell, Gaylon Lovelace, Tim Bivins, and Lynn Harris.

There are three candidates in the race for chancery clerk: incumbent Hayden Ables, Samuel James, and Larry G. Brown.

Eighteen candidates will be vying for the post of county supervisor. In District 1, incumbent supervisor Frank Williams Jr. has three opponents: Bobby Riley, Perry D. (Dale) Price, and Curtis Eugene (Gene) Milligan.

District 2 has four candidates: incumbent Rickey Cummings, Bobby Johnson, Arlie L. South, and Lonzo (Bud) Wilkins.

In District 3, incumbent supervisor D.W. McKee will face Charles D. Lambert, Danny Ryan, Harold Wayne Enlow, and Lyndon (Lynn) Ward Parsons.

In District 4, incumbent supervisor M.R. Whitehead, Ricky Whitfield, Jasper E. Ables, and Jerry Don Keith will be competing for the post.

District 5 incumbent supervisor Leon Cook is unopposed for re-election to that position.

For justice court judge in the northern district, incumbent Judge J.R. Blakney is running against Larry Dale Lambert and James J. (Jim) Kirk. In the southern district, incumbent Judge Willie Joe Sparks has one opponent, Wayne White.

There are five candidates in the race for constable, northern district: Curtis Blair, Joe Moyers, Travis Busby, Steve Rye, and Gary K. Lovelace.

In the southern district, eight candidates have qualified for the constable post, including Donald Deaton, Harmon Davis, Phillip W. Slayton, Charles Harris, Judy C. Wells, John D. Quillen, John Moore, and Wade Hutcheson.

Several candidates are unopposed for county offices. They include Dale White for coroner/medical examiner, Wayne Lambert for county surveyor, and Nicholas Phillips for county attorney.

The primary election is set for Tuesday, September 17, with the general election to take place on November 5.

Lynn Harris Announces For County Tax Assessor

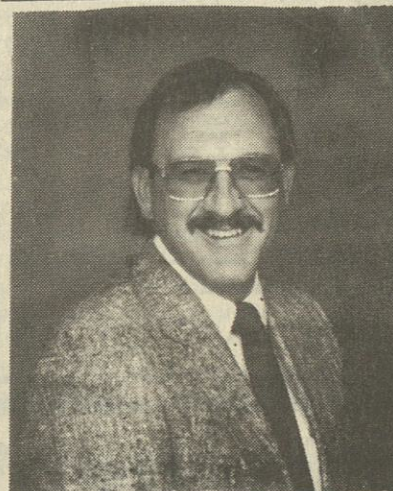

State Worker Killed In 2-Vehicle Crash

A two vehicle accident on Old Hwy. 72 west of Iuka early Wednesday morning claimed the life of a Tishomingo man.

According to officials, Chester Berryman, 48, was killed around 8:30 a.m. west of Barnes Store on the 2-lane road. Mr. Berryman, an employee of the Mississippi Highway Department, was operating a sweeper when a car driven by Sandra Puckett of Iuka hit the rear of the heavy equipment throwing the worker from his seat. Mrs. Puckett and her son, Jason, were taken to the Iuka Hospital and were admitted for observation.

According to Tishomingo County Deputy Mike Higginbottom, both vehicles were traveling west and there were no apparent flagmen or caution signs at the site.

Mr. Berryman is survived by his wife, Ora Mae and one son. Additional details were not available at press time Wednesday morning.

MAINTAINING A BALANCE IN NATURE

Since man is a part of nature, it is essential for him to maintain harmony with natural resources, including wildlife. More ecologists need to examine the cause and effect relationships between man-changed environments and wildlife in order to predict future happenings.

More testing and research is needed in various parts of the country in order to determine how to build and produce the much needed wildlife habitats.

Our primary concern is one of maximizing coexistence among every form of life. The average person can contribute to nature's balance by planting and landscaping their gardens in a way that would be beneficial to themselves as well as to wildlife. We can also build and install bluebird boxes, wood duck boxes, hummingbird feeders, etc. In addition,

some might try planting various types of trees and shrubs for wildlife enhancement.

Whatever the type of land you manage, if it has any wildlife or green plants, proper soil management is of paramount importance. Many of life's nutrients are found in soil. Such things as nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, iron, magnesium, and calcium are important to the life process. For this reason alone we should implement measures to increase soil productivity. Soil productivity depends on such factors as its five major components listed above and the multitude of ways they interact. Minerals make soil fertile, but it also needs adequate amounts of moisture in order to sustain various species of life. Both experimentation and manipulation are key factors in obtaining soil productivity.

A coarser texture of soil will have a lower water-holding capacity. Pure sand holds in little water above the water table. However, silts retain moisture for long periods of time, and clay possesses a strong water retention. In addition, a happy medium might be loams which have a mixture of fine and coarse particles. These have an excellent water-holding capacity as well as fertility.

Water-holding capacity is increased by living organisms and organic matter in the soil. This is why fertilizers are used as soil enhancers. Soil management is an essential component of the management of

natural resources.

Erosion is a major concern since the depletion of forest land is ever increasing. Some people may place large rock along the edge of any embankment to avoid erosion. Others might plant trees, shrubs, grasses, or dig drainage ditches. All of these are beneficial ways to deter erosion and help maintain natural resources.

Another component of maintaining a balance of nature is maintaining desirable and acceptable wildlife populations.

Desirable wildlife populations may be maintained through the use of repellents or attractants, stocking, transplantation, managing predators, hunting regulations, etc. These things can be accomplished by public awareness and compliance. Observing hunting regulations such as not hunting out of season, and only taking the specified bag limits help maintain populations of endangered or protected species. The stocking of lakes and ponds with recommended fish or planting crops that would attract certain wildlife could all be ways that one could contribute to wildlife management.

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FLUORIDATED WATER NOT TIED TO CANCER

Optimal fluoridation of drinking water and use of fluoride-containing dental products do not pose a cancer risk to humans, a report from the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) says. The report also confirms that the addition of fluorides to drinking water, dental products, and dietary supplements are effective sources in preventing tooth decay.

The report did warn that health professionals and the public should avoid excessive and inappropriate fluoride exposure. The report suggests that dietary supplements only be prescribed if drinking water lacks sufficient levels of fluoride. Also, parents should instruct children to minimize the swallowing of fluoride-containing products, particularly toothpaste.

In addition, high doses of fluoride were not found to be beneficial in reducing osteoporosis or related bone fractures, nor were chronic low levels of fluoride associated with birth defects or gastrointestinal, genitourinary, or respiratory system problems.

The HHS urges that states inform dentists, health care professionals, and communities about the fluoridation status of drinking water and suggests that the FDA review dental-product labeling to ensure the public has sufficient knowledge to make decisions about these products.

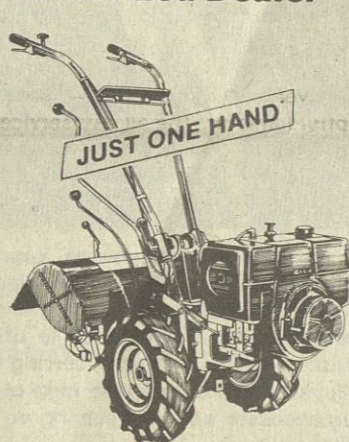

1992 WHEAT ACREAGE REDUCTION SET AT 5 PERCENT

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is requiring a 5-percent acreage reduction for the 1992 Wheat Program, according to Phillip Horn, CED of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. This compares to the 15 percent acreage reduction required for the current wheat crop.

"This level was chosen to maintain competitiveness in world markets while balancing the risks of excessive supplies or possible shortages," Horn said.

Wheat producers who comply with the acreage reduction requirement will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel, the same as this year. Horn said the program will not have a paid land diversion.

The 1991/92 wheat crop is projected at 2.0 billion bushels, down 26 percent from last year's 2.7-billion-bushel harvest. The decline reflects an 8-million-acre reduction in planted area and lower yields. "This year, decisions to plant fewer acres were

based on higher acreage reduction requirements, new flexibility provisions in the 1990 farm legislation, and lower wheat prices," the ASCS official said.

Services Held For Mrs. Laura Carey Jones



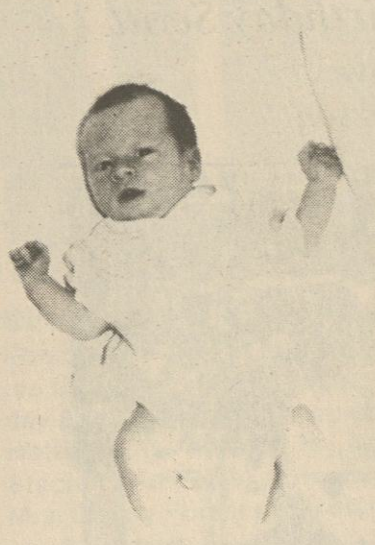
Laura Carey Jones, 90, died Sunday, July 21, 1991, at the luka Nursing Home. She was a member of luka

4-H Communicates

COLOR AND CLOTHES

Color has its own language. We use names of colors to express our feelings. Have you heard the expression: "green with envy," "true blue," "red with anger," "feeling blue"? We are conditioned by color to stop on red, go on green and slow down on yellow. Color is used to inspire action, warn of danger, make us happy, and to promote serenity.

Color is usually the first characteristic noticed about an object. Advertisements and packaging use color to call your attention to a product.

Color is important in dress. When shopping for ready-to-wear or yard goods, color is generally the first attraction. If the color is appealing, you will look at other aspects of the garment or fabric, such as style, texture, hand, etc.

The importance of color in dress may be best exemplified by stage dressing. You have no doubt noticed that when a large number of entertainers (such as dancers) are on stage in similar or identical costumes, the main character (or feature dancer) will have a different color costume to give her greater visibility and emphasis.

Also, costume color is used to set a mood or denote character personality. For example, mourner dressed in black, bride dressed in white, or patriot in red, white and blue.

Do you have a favorite color or colors? Why do you suppose you tend to have certain colors in your wardrobe? Do you "feel" better in some color than others? Why?

Color preferences can reveal a great deal about one's personality and mood at a given time. Color is a very personal thing. Probably no two people will react the same way

toward color.

County Agents Notes

PESTS ON THE HOMEFRONT

Your fall garden could be haven for insects. Look out for chewing insects such as worms, beetles and leaf miners. Sucking insects - aphids, stinkbugs and whiteflies - will make their presence known also.

Home gardens in Tishomingo County can use an approved insecticide to save vegetables. They should check gardens at least once a week. Apply insecticides as needed for control.

A garden isn't the only source of insect problems in the fall, however.

Too often, homeowners in Tishomingo County wait until their ornamentals have been nearly stripped of foliage before they pinpoint bagworms as the culprits. These pest can cause considerable damage to ornamentals in late summer and early fall. Many safe and effective insecticides are available for bagworm control.

Spider mites also prey on some ornamentals. They suck sap from the shrubs and trees, causing leaves to change their color from green to yellow and gray. These pests can kill young ornamentals in a single season; older trees may slowly die over several seasons.

Hose down ornamental plants with water to break up spider mite webbing. A recommended insecticide can help, too.

BUGGING THE PLANTS

Stinkbugs are building up in high numbers in the soybean fields of Tishomingo County. Producers finding at least one stinkbug per foot of row should begin control measures with an approved pesticide.

Squash bugs, leaf-footed bugs and stinkbugs may cause problems in pumpkins and winter squash. They feed on vines, leaves and fruit on the pumpkin and squash plant. Control these insects with applications of a recommended insecticide. Follow label directions.

SOIL CONSERVATION

Grasses, like all green plants, live and grow on food manufactured primarily in their own green leaves. Ranges, pastures, lawns, or other grass crops can flourish and conserve soil only as the individual plants have an opportunity to make food for their own growth.

A grass cover that is weak does not make efficient use of soil moisture and nutrients. As a result it does not provide the maximum amount of livestock feed. And it is not able to protect the soil from erosion by wind or water.

A dense cover of grass protects the soil from the battering, splashing action of rain. The leaves break up the raindrops and allow more water to soak into the soil, thus preventing erosion, conserving moisture for plant growth, and restoring underground water supplies. The higher and denser the grass, the better it shades the soil and keeps it cool. This reduces loss of water by evaporation and enables grass to grow better in hot weather.

Decaying grass roots, leaves, and stems and the manure produced by grazing animals supply organic matter to the soil. This maintains its tilth and fertility, makes it more absorptive, and reduces erosion.

Things That Don't Fit Evolution

The General Theory of Evolution (as opposed to the Special Theory change within limits) proposes that higher forms of life evolved from lower forms and that life arose from non-living matter. But there are several things that just don't fit that proposition.

Charles Darwin, who popularized the General Theory, recognized in his book, *Origin of Species*, that the gaps between life forms were missing from the fossil records. He speculated that those missing links would be found in time. That was in 1859. The gaps are still there today. Evolutionists themselves say the gaps have not grown any narrower. Many statements and pictures found in text books and by popularizers of the General Theory about the fossil record are speculations, not fact.

If life arose from non-life, surely scientists should be able to demonstrate in the laboratory how it happened. As much as we know about living things, and as much as the General Theorist claims to know about how the first life came about, why can he not create "simpler" life forms? The fact is, he cannot, even in a highly controlled, closed system. Living things come only from other living things. And to say that complex life came from chance happenings when it cannot be demonstrated is not scientific, to say the least.

If life forms arose from lower life forms, certainly much time has transpired. The latest estimates of the earth's age are around 4 1/2 billion years. But over 400 species of living things have gone extinct over the last 350 years. That amounts to more than one species per year. If one takes only 1% of that rate of extinction and applies it to 4 1/2 billion years, he still comes up with 45 million species going extinct. A lot of evolution must have taken place to provide all the species that died off. Of course, the evolutionist claims that conditions on earth have changed through the ages. But such claims are often based on speculations about how life could have evolved, not on any empirical evidences.

Creationists are sometimes accused of holding to their religious faith in the face of scientific evidence to the contrary. It is true that the Genesis account does not always fit the current views of the scientific community. But folks should realize that the General Theory of Evolution has some serious problems as well.

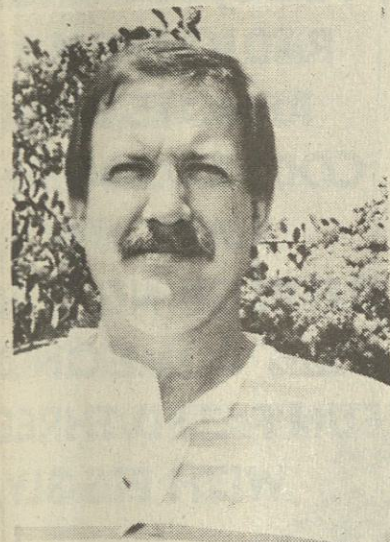

Jerry Bonds Certified As County Fire Coordinator



Jerry Bonds of Iuka was certified July 1, as County Fire Coordinator of Tishomingo County. Jerry was among the first in the state to meet the requirements established by the Mississippi Department of Insurance, according to George Dale, Commissioner of Insurance.

"We are very pleased with the dedicated leadership which our county fire coordinators have demonstrated since the Mississippi Legislature mandated this program in 1988. Coordinators which fully meet the state's requirements are making an outstanding contribution to the growth of Mississippi's fire protection efforts", Dale said.

In order to be eligible for the inaugural certification, coordinators had to participate in over 50 hours of training, complete a variety of planning and reporting requirements, and conduct a series of local meetings with fire officials throughout the county. "Certification of a county fire coordinator means the county exceeds the requirements for receipt of state fire funds. It places the county on a priority list for assistance and support," according to Ray Gildea, State Fire Coordinator. "It is our intention to provide technical assistance where it will do the most good. Counties without a certified coordinator are at a considerable disadvantage," Gildea added.

County fire coordinators distribute and collect information from all fire departments, assist with contracts required for distribution of state funds, and work closely with individual fire departments to promote the availability of needed training and equipment. Since 1988, over 300 new fire departments and fire stations have been built in Mississippi. When the fire coordinator program began in

1988, more than one-third of the state's population lived more than five miles from a fire station. Now less than ten percent of Mississippi's residents live greater than five miles from a responding fire department. According to reports furnished by county fire coordinators there were about 10,000 volunteer firefighters and 2,225 paid firefighters as of June, 1991. A total of 12,000 structural fires occurred in Mississippi in 1990. Fire departments answered more than 60,000 calls including nearly 25,000 medical aid requests.

State fire funding as a whole doubled in the period from 1988 to 1991. State funding for rural fire protection tripled. County funding increased over 700% during the same period.

Fire departments estimated total fire losses for 1990 at around \$250 million dollars. Total fire savings exceeded \$500 million dollars during the same period.

foods or a large amount of one or a few foods to the exclusion of others. Consumers, many of whom are obsessed with dieting and weight loss, have a difficult time determining the soundness of many of the proposed weight loss schemes. What does the consumer do?

It is important for consumers to have guidelines to evaluate the diets. The following guidelines were used by the Consumer Guide in a paperback called "Rating the Diets" and are appropriate for the consumer:

"Has it been tested? Has the author of the diet tried the regimen on hundreds, even thousands, of overweight people and compared the results to a similar number of people on regular weight reducing diets? Has it been published in a reputable medical journal?"

"Who promotes it? Is the person promoting the diet known, well-respected and knowledgeable in nutrition?"

"How long has the diet been around? If less than five years, view it with suspicion."

"Does this diet conflict with recommendations of experts? It should be backed by substantial scientific data."

"Is the diet individualized? Rigid diets that tell the dieter what and when to eat are doomed to fail."

"Is the diet based on principles of another expert or health association? If so, what is the opinion of that expert or association about the diet. They may not have been consulted before the diet was advertised."

"Is there some secret? Is it limited to a few foods or stoves expensive or unusual foods? Does it warn against eating a combination of foods at one time? Does it omit foods of high nutritional value such as dairy products, breads and other grains? Does it depend on vitamin and mineral supplements to balance the

Otitis Externa is "Swimmer's Ear"

An infection of the ear canal brought on by the presence of too much moisture in the external ear is commonly referred to as "swimmer's ear." The technical or medical name for this condition is *otitis externa*, meaning inflammation of the external ear canal.

Very often otitis externa results from water entering the ear during diving or swimming. Water may become trapped in the ear due to the presence of excessive ear wax. The moisture softens and wears away skin lining the outer canal. This makes the canal more susceptible to infection. Other causes of otitis externa include hair dye, hair spray, or excessive cleaning of the ears with cotton swabs. The ear canal may itch and become inflamed. Fluid may drain from the ear at night and often can be seen on pillows the next morning.

Although nonprescription ear cleaners are available, many authorities recommend professional removal of ear wax. Ear drops may be effective in relieving pain and itching. Aluminum acetate drops may help decrease swelling and ear canal crusting. Oral pain relievers may help. Antibiotics or antifungals sometimes are needed.
