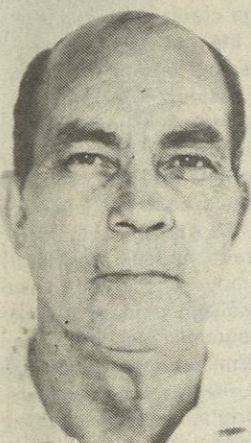

\$401 Million Appropriated For NASA's ASRM Project

Yellow Creek Not Threatened By Long-Term Space Plan

A new long-term space plan that calls for no additional space shuttles does not threaten the future of the advanced solid rocket motor project in Iuka, a local space official says.

The "National Space Launch Strategy," announced last week by Vice-President Dan Quayle, has raised questions concerning the ASRM project being developed by NASA, said Rosemary Younts, public affairs officer for the ASRM division of Aerojet, one of the project's contractors.

The space strategy, developed by the National Space Council, chaired by the vice-president, was outlined in a report by Quayle at Vandenberg Air Force base in California. However, the information contained in the report has been public for a year, Younts said.

Quayle said, in part: "As far as manned spaceflight is concerned, the shuttle will be crucial for some time to come. The space launch policy proposes to extend the lifespan of the shuttle fleet; to maintain the capacity to produce spare parts; and to operate the system conservatively. But the policy does not envision acquiring new orbiters. Therefore, in all probability, we have purchased the last space shuttle."

Although the plan states that no additional space shuttles will be acquired, it is inaccurate to assume there will be no need for the advanced solid rocket motor, Younts explained. NASA itself has said that the current fleet of four shuttles meets the needs of the space program. Each shuttle has a life expectancy of 100 flights, which should extend well into the 21st century, she said.

A key element of the new strategy is the development of an unmanned space launch system to greatly improve national launch capability with reductions in operating costs and improvements in system reliability, responsiveness, and mission performance, Younts said.

The ASRM could realistically play an important role as the booster for this new space launch system, she said.

The ASRM plant is designed to produce the twin solid rockets used in each space shuttle launch.

Other elements of the strategy include: to ensure that existing space launch capabilities, including support facilities, are sufficient to meet U.S. government manned and unmanned space launch needs; to sustain a vigorous space launch technology program to provide cost effective improvements to current launch systems, and to support development of advanced launch capabilities, complementary to the new launch system; and to actively consider commercial space launch needs and factor them into decisions on improvements in launch facilities and launch vehicles.

The report has coincided with recent announcements concerning federal spending on the ASRM project.

The Transportation Appropriations Act passed last week by the House contained a \$401 million appropriation for the Yellow Creek project, a news release from U.S. Rep. Jamie Whitten said.

A spokesman from Whitten's office said Monday that a Senate committee had cut \$100 million from the appropriation, but the bill would be returned to a House conference committee for further review, probably in September. The spokesman said that he expected the appropriation to be restored to its original amount in the conference.

Home Economics Tips

QUALITY PLAY TIME

One of the most wonderful gifts a parent can give a child is time for play.

As busy parents we sometimes think the time with our children needs to be teaching them or in some way guiding their behavior. If you enter into the world of play, keep several things in mind.

Playing means being in your child's world and sharing the wonder and relaxed curiosity of learning in a playful mode. Every child's task as they grow and develop is to reinvent the world or develop their own active and personal understanding of it.

One of the ways they work to understand is through play. In play with materials of all kinds (the more natural and simple the better), every child asks the following questions:

- *What is this object?
- *What does this object do?
- *What can I do with this object?

When playing with your child, point out things about the toy or object that the child might observe, test, feel, label and try, all in an exploratory manner.

One of the important skills you can use with your child is to listen and watch and ask the child leading questions so that you can understand more about what he or she is learning and thinking.

Rather than give them information or give them instructions, say things like, "What do you think that does?" or "How does it work?" or "What do you imagine it can be?" or "Try it again, that was really exciting!"

No matter what your child's age, helping her understand the world around her by observing, pondering, and experimenting with you as a relaxed and active partner is a wonderful gift of quality time.

THE SANDWICH GENERATION

Other than the "with children stage," the most difficult stage for dual wage earner families is the middle-aged adult child with aging parents, sometimes called "the sandwich generation" or the "women in the middle".

These are the caregivers of aging parents who also have high demands for care from their own nuclear families. About 25 percent of caregiving adult children report the presence of children under age 18 in their household.

Researchers think "women in the middle" will be a phenomenon common to only one or two generations. In the future, aged parents will stay healthier longer, thus postponing the need for care from their adult children until after the grandchildren are grown. In the future the major problem will be that many old adult children will need to provide care to very old parents.

Competing family obligations are only part of the problem for the middle-aged adult. Work is also a problem and some are handling it by dropping out of the labor force. In a study done in 1987, 5 percent of sons left their jobs to become caregivers.

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whereas 12 percent of daughters quit work.

Those women who continue to work and provide parental care, alter their lives in other ways to cope: 20 percent cut back on hours, 29 percent rearrange their schedules, and 19 percent take time off without pay to fulfill caregiver obligations.

Another topic for research consideration is how divorce, widowhood and remarriage impact adult children's ability to provide parental care. The research in this area, although limited, suggests that children with disrupted marriages give significantly less help to parents and feel more restricted about helping, primarily due to their job demands.

In the future, there may be fewer adult women who are able to provide care to their parents because they must work to support themselves and their children. As a society we need to be searching for quality alternative care.

meat. Simmer uncovered 10 minutes. In a 13x9x2-inch baking dish, spread 1 1/2 cups sauce. Arrange layers of uncooked noodles, sauce and cheese (some of each). Repeat. County Agent Notes

BEEF TIPS

It's time for cattle producers in Tishomingo County to think about fall and winter planning for your cow herd. Is there enough hay to last through winter?

If producers plan to graze cows this winter, they still may need to plan on feeding your herds for 30 to 60 days if winter pastures become wet and boggy before spring.

Winter feeding is an expense in any beef herd. Producers should try to work the cows before fall, checking them for pregnancy to make sure they are carrying a calf. They should not consider keeping and feeding a cow all winter if she is not bred.

A cow that is not bred is worth more money at the stockyards than on pastureland.

The calving records for last year should indicate how far apart the birth dates of the first calf and last calf born to each cow? A short calving season is essential to a profitable cow/calf program. Identify and eliminate late calving cows and freeloaders.

CARE FOR CURRENT GARDENS

After sweet corn has been harvested, don't delay in dealing with the left-over green stalks. Turn them back into the garden soil, shredding them if possible, to allow them to break down rapidly. If shredding isn't possible, cut the stalks and lay them in garden walkways as a mulch.

Continue applications of a recommended fungicide to tomato plants for control of early blight and other leaf diseases. Apply every seven to 10 days.

Hot weather this month can cause ripening tomatoes to crack at the stem. Cracks across the blossom end are waterbursts. To reduce both problems, pick the ripening fruit

before planned watering and predicted rain.

Pole beans and peas that continue to grow vigorously without producing pods may have been overfertilized. Hot, dry weather causes these vegetables to shed blooms. The results are no beans or peas. If the temperature drops and rain is forthcoming, the plants will begin to set a crop.

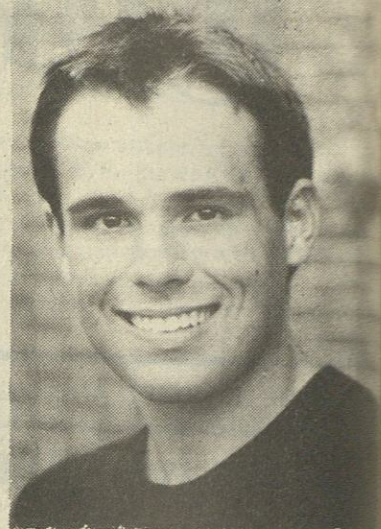

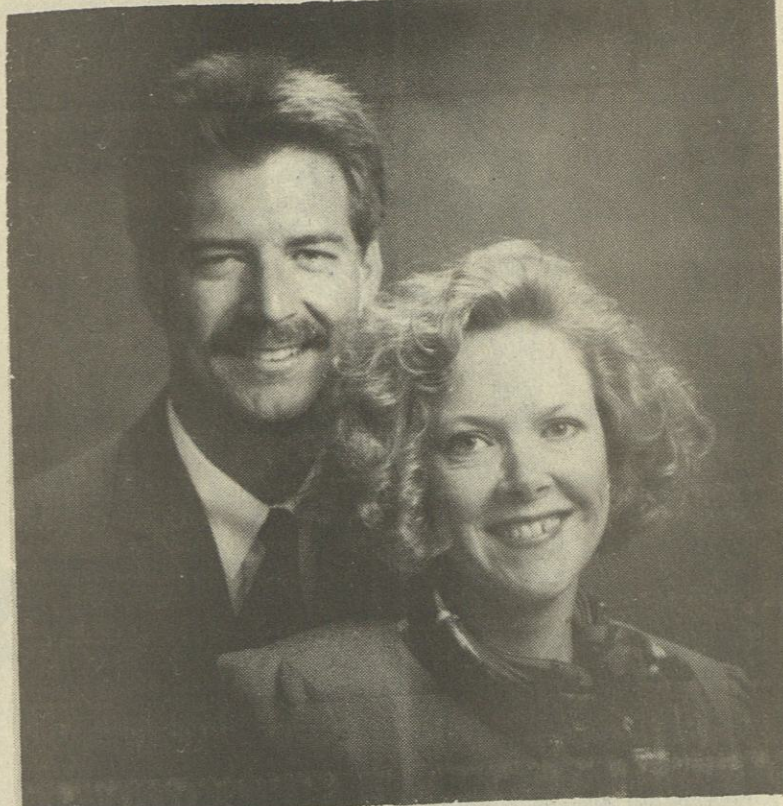

The war was yet two months old in the summer of 1861 when a Sunday sermon at the Congregational Church in Galesburg, IL changed the life of Mary Anne Ball Bickerdyke. A letter was read, by the parson that men were dying, not of wounds, but diseases in the federal camps at Cairo, IL. Medical volunteers were called for. A list of credentials followed for the type person needed.

Afterward, a woman rose to nominate Mary Anne Bickerdyke due to her knowledge of herbal medicine. Bickerdyke, a self proclaimed "Botanical Physician," was experienced in treating the sick. She was a trusted christian widow. The mother of two sat quietly in the church as the congregation pondered the nomination. Demming it a command from God, she yielded her hands and heart to the aid of the sick and wounded soldiers.

The 42-year-old Bickerdyke, a devout Methodist, prayed for guidance. In June of 1861, she found herself in the filthy Cairo camp. Opposition to a woman's presence soon faded as she used her wits to command respect and take control of the situation. Immediately, the quality of health care improved.

Mother Vickerdyke was attached to General Grant's Army of the Ohio in the winter of 1861. In the spring, she set up hospitals for the wounded after the battles of Forts Henry and Donaldson. The bloody aftermath of Shiloh called for unprecedented action for that time by placing tent hospitals right on the battlefield. The seriously wounded were treated there if they could not reach the steamboats at the bluff of Pittsburg Landing over a mile away.

She oversaw the operation of these facilities as well as those in Savannah, Tennessee, some eight miles east. She was short on staff and supplies but made do with what she had. After engagements near Corinth, the hospital was moved to the town of Farmington in North Mississippi, a short distance away on July 9, 1862.

The horrid conditions of the Farmington Camp were much worse than Cairo on her first day. The scene is

phis/Charleston Railroad that ran through North Mississippi.

Early in September, Price moved into a small railroad town to secure the tracks. Grant countered by entering the luka area by a northern route. Price and Grant were literally separated by the railroad both sought in their quest for control over Corinth. General Rosecrants, a commander under Grant, clashed with General Price south of the railroad on September 19, 1862. The bloody clash left hundreds of casualties in its aftermath.

Mother Bickerdyke was on hand throughout the engagement, and afterward, and spent ten days attending the wounded of both sides at "luka Springs." She oversaw hospitals established in every available home, church, and building in the town. A hospital was set up in a local hotel (luka Springs Hotel.) The hotel was a hostelry for wealthy southerners in search of health from the medicinal spring waters.

The hotel had a fine supply of linen. Patients enjoyed the comforts of mattresses and feather pillows compared to the straw mats in the usual medical camps. The patients were picked up from the battlefield at luka and transported to the camp near Corinth by rail. Mattresses and pillows were stacked in boxcars to make the ride more comfortable. "It was the best haul Mrs. Bickerdyke ever made," according to author, Nina Brown Baker.

Mary Anne Bickerdyke followed the Union Army through the long hard years of war treating men of both sides with the same care and

humanitarian effort. She was admired and respected for her efforts from soldiers and civilians alike. President Lincoln praised the saintly widow for her efforts. General William T. Sherman put it best when asked how he felt about Mother Bickerdyke. With humble heart and simple words, Sherman said, "She has more power than I...she ranks me."

War breeds heroes of common men who show uncommon valor. During the Civil War we find this true of many heroic men and women. Grave 557 at Shiloh National Military Cemetery holds the body of J. Eastwood of Wisconsin. It wasn't until the bodies were relocated in 1866 to the National Cemetery from common graves that the gender of Eastwood was found to be a woman. Over 400 cases of

women who disguised themselves as men, fought with courage, and died for their beliefs are quietly recorded on both sides of this conflict. To these, no distinct recognition was ever given for their sacrifice.

In times of war, a hero is not necessarily one who fights causing death. A hero can also save lives. One heroine of the Civil War was dedicated to this proposition that all life was precious. She was known affectionately as "Mother Bickerdyke" and her story is detailed in the book "Cyclone in Calico" by Nina Brown

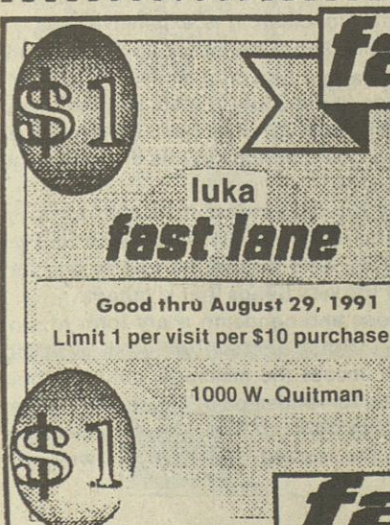

Lockheed Sponsors Van In NASA's LASER Program

Lockheed Missiles & Space Company is helping sponsor the first NASA mobile resource van that will reach teachers nationwide with free instructional materials on science, engineering and research.

As envisioned by NASA, several such vans would be funded by industry under Project LASER, which stands for "Learning About Science, Engineering and Research."

Teachers visiting LASER vans can get ideas, curricula, lesson plans, slides and videotapes for use mainly in grades 3 to 12.

John Thomas, the Lockheed manager for NASA's Advanced Solid Rocket Motor project (ASRM) presented Lockheed's initial \$50,000 sponsorship check on July 19, to Jack Lee, director of NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center.

Like other companies, Lockheed will provide a total of \$125,000 in increments for a three-year sponsorship.

Thomas said: "We're enthusiastic about this sponsorship and are fortunate to have the opportunity to be involved with the very first unit. LASER is a superb resource for studies in mathematics, science and engineering; it'll make those studies fun and challenging."

"In our own tri-state region around luka, NASA's ASRM project has already given impetus to major improvements in the quality and scope of education, and the LASER van will enhance this progress. It has been in the area already."

The LASER van that Lockheed is supporting will spend part of its time in the Mississippi-Tennessee-Alabama area surrounding the ASRM plant.

The first LASER van was in-

troduced last year in the South, Midwest, West and Washington, D.C., to great acclaim and usage by teachers. President Bush, Vice President Quayle and Education Secretary Lauro Cavazos visited the van.

The 22-ton LASER prototype consist of a tractor with a 48-foot long trailer. It can accommodate 12 teachers at workstations where computers can display educational materials, and where videotapes can be copied.

The LASER project was the idea of J.D. Horne, director of the executive staff at NASA-Marshall.

Horne said NASA hopes to achieve three goals with LASER mobile centers: to enrich science and mathematics education without adding to teaching burdens; to provide practical, "hands-on" activities that entice children to understand science and mathematics; and, especially in grades 3 through 8, to reinforce students' desires to learn algebra, geometry, calculus, biology, chemistry and physics.

"We want to show students that science and engineering course are not 'too tough,' or are for geniuses only," Horne explained. "To reach the students, we must first reach their teachers. That is the ultimate goal of the mobile teacher resource centers."

"Unless America provides itself with a large enough pool of scientists and engineers, our world leadership role in science and technology will be seriously threatened."

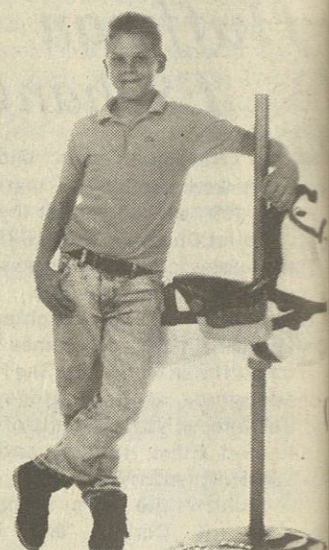

dog inoculated (vaccinated) against rabies as provided herein, with the approved dosage of an approved anti-rabies virus (vaccine), and it shall be unlawful for any person within the State of Mississippi to own or have in his or her possession within the State of Mississippi any dog, six months of age or over, which has not been inoculated (vaccinated) against rabies with the approved dosage of an approved anti-rabies virus (vaccine). It shall be the duty of every person in this state so owning or having in his or her possession a dog to have said dog inoculated (vaccinated) immediately after said dog has reached the age of six months, and it shall be said person's further duty to have said dog so inoculated (vaccinated) annually thereafter, on or before June 30 of each year, after the initial inoculation (vaccination) hereinafter provided for. For a failure to comply with this section said person shall be subject to the penalties provided in section 41-53-13.

All inoculations (vaccinations) done in accordance with this chapter must be done by either a licensed veterinarian, a licensed physician, a licensed pharmacist, a licensed dentist, a county agent, a Smith Hughes teacher, or other competent person granted a permit to administer virus (vaccine) by the state board of health on the recommendation of the county health officer. However, only licensed veterinarians and licensed physicians shall be permitted to charge a fee for inoculations (vaccinations) done under the provisions of this chapter.



Challenge Awaits Participants

In the next few weeks, 30 young business and professional people from across the state will be selected for the 1991-92 Leadership Mississippi program sponsored for the 18th year by the Mississippi Economic Council.

Pharmacy & Your Health

Seborrhea: Affects 12 Million Americans

Seborrhea is a skin condition that is commonly confused with dandruff. The term *seborrhea* refers to chronic skin eruptions, most of which occur on the scalp, face, and other hairy parts of the body. Seborrhea is associated with dull, greasy scales. The skin tends to itch and burn.

When seborrhea occurs in newborns and young infants, the condition often is referred to as "cradle cap." Seborrhea tends to intensify during periods of stress. Women are affected more often than men, and the condition is seen most frequently among middle-aged and older adults.

Although seborrhea and dandruff are not the same condition, they are treated in much the same way. Many medicated over-the-counter shampoos can be used to treat either condition. A recent article in *U.S. Pharmacist* suggests these guidelines for medicated shampoos: (1) If the condition gets worse or does not improve, try products with different ingredients. (2) Do not use medicated shampoos on children under the age of two except on the advice of a physician. (3) Do not use products containing *selenium* if you have open sores on your scalp. (4) If the scalp is especially dirty, wash it first with a regular shampoo to remove excess dirt and scales.

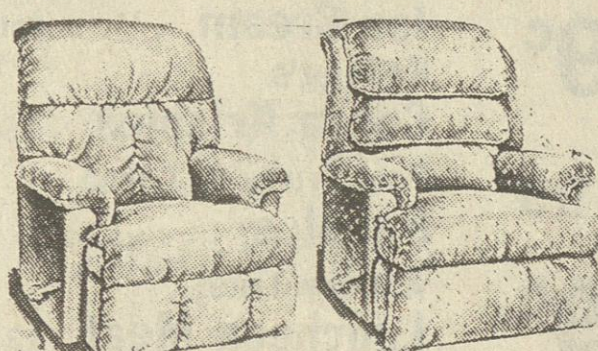

WOOL PROMOTION REFERENDUM SET FOR AUGUST 19-30

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has scheduled a referendum August 19-30 for wool producers to decide whether to continue a market production and improvement program.

Deith Bjerke, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the proposed program, similar to one approved in 1986, would continue to authorize deductions from producer price support payments.

If the referendum is approved by a majority of either the producers voting or the producers who own a majority of the sheep represented in the referendum, deductions from wool price support payments would be established at a rate not to exceed seven cents per pound of wool marketed and not to exceed 35 cents per hundredweight of unshorn lambs for calendar year 1991.

For calendar years 1992 through 1995, the deductions may increase up to an additional one cent per pound of wool marketed and up to an additional five cents per hundred weight of unshorn lambs, per year.

The amounts deducted will be used by the American Sheep Industry Association to finance advertising

and sales promotion programs for wool in domestic and foreign markets, and for information programs for producers on production management and market development and improvement.

ASCS county offices will distribute ballots in early August. Completed ballots must be returned in person to the county office or postmarked by the August 30 deadline.

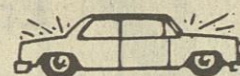
To be eligible to vote, a person must have owned sheep or lambs six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days in 1990. A cooperative may vote on behalf of its members but, if it does so, its members are then ineligible to vote in their own capacity.

In the 1986 referendum, producers owning 67.8 percent of the sheep approved the program.

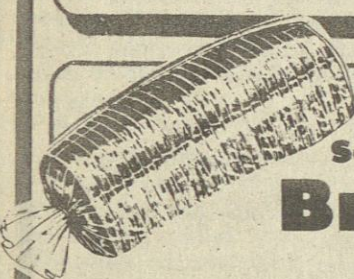

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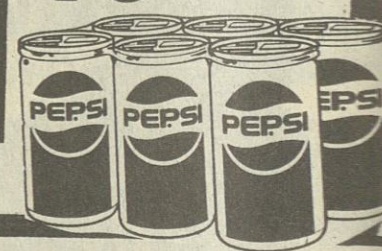

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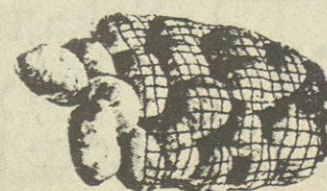

Mississippi Successfully Clears Census Hurdle

"Good news for Mississippi - we've kept our fifth Congressional seat," said Secretary of State Dick Mulpus, reacting to the U.S. Commerce Department's decision not to change the 1990 Census totals.

Mulpus' office, along with local counties and cities, has been monitoring Census activity nearly a year since preliminary totals showed Mississippi's population at a much lower level than had been expected.

"Every state in the nation had the chance to go out and find more people. Some of them apparently were willing to wait and let a bureaucratic 'adjustment' increase their numbers. We were not," Mulpus noted. "We found more than 50,000 people who had been missed and that's what saved our congressional seat."

Mulpus credited local and statewide efforts last fall with raising Mississippi's preliminary Census count to retain its five seats in Congress.

"Our efforts have paid off - we can all breathe a sigh of relief," Mulpus said about the news.

July 15, Commerce Secretary Robert Mosbacher announced that he had decided not to make adjustments in the final Census totals release last December. Those totals showed that Mississippi gained some 50,000 residents in recount efforts after preliminary numbers showed the state was in danger of losing a fifth congressional seat and millions of dollars in federal funds.

"We have stayed in touch with our Washington delegations, as well as Commerce officials, throughout this process," Mulpus noted. "Now, we can begin to focus on understanding what our Census numbers tell us about our state and how they will affect our future."

Attention Area Farmers Call Before You Dig

South Central Bell is asking for advance notice from area farmers as they prepare their land for this season's crops by burning off fields or by doing their spring plowing. Property owners are asked to cooperate to prevent damage to

telephone company facilities during this time, according to T.H. Bailey, district manager.

Bailey said telephone junction boxes, or pedestals on private property or road right-of-way are usually damaged more often than any other outside equipment.

"Excessive heat generated by grass or brush fires melts the telephone cables causing service outages which are expensive and quite inconvenient to the telephone customers in the affected area," Bailey said.

Property owners planning agricultural activities where buried telephone facilities are in the general vicinity should call the One Call Center, 1-800-227-6477, toll free statewide. South Central Bell will send a representative to locate and mark any telephone equipment.

NEMCC Dental Hygiene Program Granted Accreditation

Northeast Mississippi Community College's dental hygiene program, one of only three in the state, has received notification that it has been granted approval accreditation.

The program in dental hygiene is accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation of the American Dental Association, a specialized accrediting body recognized by the Council on Postsecondary Ac-

creditation and by the United States Department of Education.

The accreditation was given based on a site visit of the school's facilities in November, 1989.

Approval, the best of four classifications given by the ADA, is granted to an educational program to indicate that it has achieved or exceeded the basic requirements for accreditation. It further specifies that the program has no serious deficiencies or weaknesses.

Northeast's two-year dental hygiene program, currently under the direction of Dr. Lee Roberts of Baldwin, has graduated 117 students since its inception in January 1978.

The curriculum consists of two academic years and one summer of classroom and clinical instruction. Students may elect to take a three-year program. Northeast can accommodate a total of 28 students each year, 14 freshmen and 14 sophomores, in the two-year program.

Graduates of the program are awarded the Association of Applied Science degree and are eligible to write state and national board examinations for licensure as registered dental hygienists.

The next site evaluation of the program is scheduled for 1997.

Dr. Terry Rhodes of Corinth serves as clinical director of the program and Lynne Hudson of Pocatontas, Tenn., is the academic director. Roberts is the program administrator.

In the 10th grade, those enrolled in the leadership project become teen leaders. They organize their own groups, and hold offices on the district and state level.

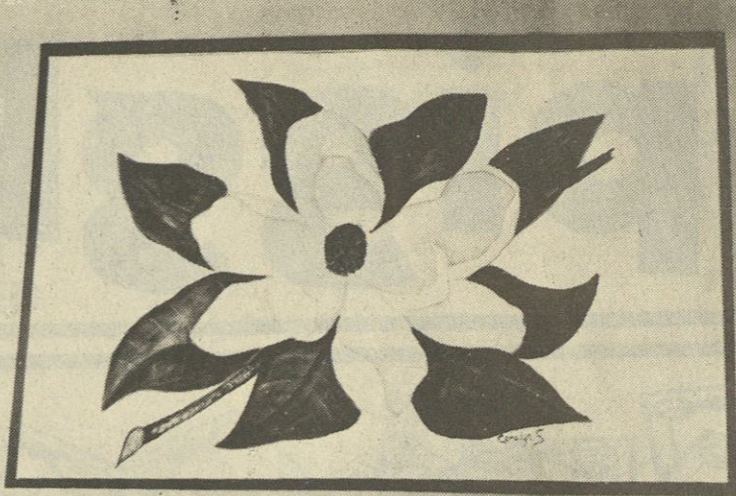
The leadership project can help 4-H members develop skills they will need in their school, other clubs and the community. They're better able to make decisions about their future.

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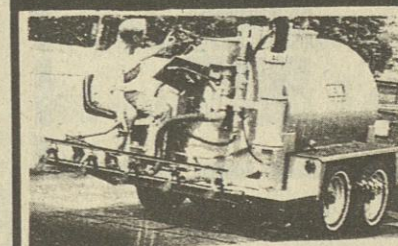
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Tishomingo County wants to control its hospital

LUKA — Folks in this outpost of far Northeast Mississippi who have been handed a major role in the nation's space program into the next century are torn by a controversy over retaining county control of a proposed state-of-the-art hospital.

At stake is some \$2.3 million in state economic impact funds which would be infused into building the modern acute care hospital that is vitally needed to serve the nearby \$1.6 billion NASA Advance Solid Rocket Motor plant as well as Tishomingo County.

Unless J. Mac Holladay, director of the State Department of Economic and Community Development, changes his mind in the next week or so, to get the money the town apparently will have to accept the administration and ownership of the hospital by North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo.

Some locals contend that Holladay, who is virtual czar over spreading \$25 million in economic impact grants to local entities within a 65 miles perimeter of the huge NASA facility, is playing high-level politics with the hospital funds to force the deal with the big Tupelo hospital down their throats with implied threats that further grants could be jeopardized.

There is substantial local opposition, solid among local doctors, to the Tupelo-based hospital operating the new Luka Hospital, because of asserted bad experiences with NMMC's running of the existing Luka hospital

under contract for the past five years. And almost universally folks feel strongly that ownership of the hospital remain with the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

A proposal for NMMC to build and operate the new hospital and receive the impact money was signed off by the Tishomingo board more than a year ago and technically accepted by Holladay. Only afterwards, contend locals, did NMMC insist that it must also own the Luka medical facility.

One outspoken local physician, Dr. Kelly Segars, charges that Holladay should open the bidding for construction and administration of the new hospital to other vendors besides the Tupelo-based hospital. "If politics is not involved, why wouldn't they listen to

other proposals?" Segars said, adding that as many as five other hospitals providers have expressed interest in the Luka facility.

Segars speculated that the political attraction of funneling the contract to the Tupelo-based NMMC "could be the fact that it has 2,400 employees and that represents a lot of votes" in comparison to Tishomingo County's small population.

Holladay said the intimation of politics at the state level being involved in the impact grant process "is unbelievable to me." He said there had been "no interference" from Gov. Ray Mabus or anyone in the Legislature in his handling the rocket plant impact area projects.

The DECD director said he could not "logically" accept any additional proposals for the Luka hospital facility unless he found it impossible to conclude an agreement on the NMMC proposal among the three parties involved the Tishomingo Board of Supervisors, NMMC and his own agency.

Ownership of the new hospital, he said, was a sticking point. "But we believe we've negotiated it out." Holladay intimated he was sympathetic to the Tupelo hospital's insistence on owning the new facility because NMMC has committed \$3.2 million of its own funds toward building the hospital.

If it came down to a choice of selecting a hospital vendor from Mississippi or "Nashville or Memphis (Cumberland Health Services Inc. of Nashville had attempted to submit a proposal, and Baptist Medical Services of Memphis is interested)," said Holladay, "I'll take Mississippi."

Dr. Kenneth Draper, chief of Staff of the existing Luka Hospital, said it was the consensus of the medical staff the NMMC "doesn't intend to maintain the services of a general hospital here." What Cumberland proposed (55 beds vs. 40 by NMMC, plus an intensive care unit) he said, was "more acceptable to our needs" and would assure local ownership.

He suggested that of the DECD gave the impact grant to the county, revenue bonds could be issued for matching funds, "the hospital could be built and we could get the best deal for managing it."

The Tupelo-based hospital had built a satellite hospital in Baldwin in 1969, but 10 years later pulled out, causing bad feelings said Dr. Glenn Bennett, who has his own clinic in Baldwin. "Their attitude is they are the big guy on the block and they want you to knock under," Bennett said.

Timberline

(Second in a series based on the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station report Forestry and Mississippi's Forest Resources: Their Economic Impact.)

In the last column, we saw that our timber industry is booming: the value of the 1989 harvest broke existing records, the harvest volume continues to increase, and a record number of workers are employed by the industry. Many people view the steady stream of log trucks, shake their heads in amazement, and ask, "Where are all those trees coming from?" In this column we'll look at that question.

Fortunately, we have plenty of timberland. Since 1957, commercial timberland acreage has remained relatively stable at 55 to 57 percent (17 million acres) of our total land area. Land use is constantly changing: as forested land is converted to other uses, abandoned farm land is replanted to trees. So far, the figures have at least balanced. In fact, forested acreage might be increasing slightly.

Our forest land is well distributed across the state, except for the Delta. However, in recent years some delta land has been replanted in trees under the Conservation Reserve Program.

Our timberland was exploited early in this century by timber companies

that clearcut the virgin forest and moved on. Recovery of the forest began with depression-era conservation programs and gained momentum with the advent of government-sponsored assistance programs that began in the 1950's and continue today.

The growing stock levels for both pine and hardwood increased dramatically, indicating underutilization of our forest resources. Many industries moved into the state to utilize the abundant supply of timber. Most of them used pine.

The volume of pine continued to increase until 1987, when it stood at twice 1957 levels. Since 1977 yearly pine removals have equaled pine growth, so we've seen no further increase in pine volume.

Hardwood growing stock has been increasing steadily since 1967. It's volume has almost doubled, and it's still increasing.

A couple of things need to be noted about the above trends: when researchers gathered the data, they didn't measure any trees smaller than five inches in diameter at breast height. Due to intense pine planting under the Conservation Reserve and other cost-share programs, there are hundreds of thousands of acres of pine trees that were too small to be counted as "growing stock", and the negative or break-even growth-removal situation for pine might have looked less pessimistic for the 1978-1988 period had they been included. However, timber mortality has more than doubled in the last decade, primarily as a result of southern pine beetle epidemics. And that's a potentially more serious drag on the forest economy than a negative growth-draw situation due to heavy harvesting.

In the next column, we'll address the question: "Can we continue cutting trees at the current rate without running out?"

Ask Ochsner

Q. I drink a lot of coffee at work and by lunch time, I'm usually pretty keyed up. Could I be consuming too much caffeine?

A. Chances are you're drinking more coffee and consuming more caffeine than you should. But you're not alone.

According to Dr. Andrew H. Mebane, Ochsner Clinic psychiatrist, "about 72 million Americans consume more than their fair share of caffeine each day. Perhaps as many as half of these Americans are highly

addicted to caffeine."

Although the effect of caffeine varies in different individuals, one or two cups of coffee alone will boost your energy level.

"Those who are addicted to the stimulant effect of caffeine may experience withdrawal symptoms including fatigue, irritability and headaches, when trying to eliminate or cut down," says Mebane.

Sources of caffeine can be found everywhere -- not just in the coffee you drink at the workplace. Caffeine is also in tea, soft drinks, and medications such as pain relievers and cold preparations.

Dr. Mebane recommends keeping your daily intake of caffeine below 250 milligrams which is equivalent to

one mug, two cups of coffee, three cups of tea or four cans of most soft drinks. He also recommends checking over-the-counter drug labels carefully for caffeine content.

To reduce the amount of caffeine you consume, Mebane suggests substituting fruit juices or water. As in any change in your diet, you should make the changes gradually which may eliminate or lessen any symptoms of withdrawal such as irritability, fatigue or headaches. If you do experience withdrawal symptoms try making the change to a caffeine-free or low level caffeine diet more gradual.

Any symptoms should be gone in a couple of weeks.

Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District is accepting applications for business development loans through the district revolving loan fund. This fund is capitalized by the Economic Development Administration, the Appalachian Regional Commission, the Farmers Home Administration, local governments and the state of Mississippi. The program is intended to help meet financing gaps, create jobs, encourage private investment and develop the regional economy.

Private, for-profit businesses operating in, or proposing to operate in, Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tiptah or Tishomingo County, Mississippi are eligible to apply. Loan activities may include fixed assets or working capital. Refinancing of existing debt, speculative activities, relocation of businesses from other areas, and businesses owned by persons with relationships with NEMPDD directors or RLF staff are not eligible.

Individual loans are limited to \$200,000, but borrowers may qualify for a package of loans from more than one source. Terms are ten years at fixed interest, usually 7%. 125% collateral is required, of which 75% must be real property and no more than 50% equipment. Borrowers must provide part of the cost of any loan project. Personal guarantees, insurance on collateral, civil rights compliance, environmental review and other federal collateral, to apply. Minority and women owned businesses receive priority for closing, and are required to provide less private investment.

Anyone interested in the loan program is encouraged to contact the NEMPDD office at 728-6248. The district staff will provide application materials, explain the program guidelines, and assist applicants in completing the necessary paperwork.

PUBLIC NOTICE NO. 3174

The Mississippi Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, at a meeting in Jackson, Mississippi on June 24, 1991, under authority of Section 25-43-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, made known its intent to adopt and thirty (30) days thereafter did adopt the following basic regulations for wildlife management areas. This was done under authority of Sections 49-1-29 and 49-5-13, Mississippi Code of 1972.

Be it ordered that Public Notice Number 2500 is hereby repealed and the following basic rules and regulations relative to wildlife management areas are adopted:

Safety Precautions: All rules of gun safety shall be observed. Target shooting is prohibited. No hunting or shooting within 200 yards of any building. No alcoholic beverages allowed. Persons intoxicated or careless with firearms shall be expelled from hunts immediately.

Firearms: No firearms shall be permitted during the closed season on game birds and animals.

Forfeiture of Hunting Privileges: If while on a wildlife management area any person violates any rule or regulation adopted by the Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, or any game and fish statute, that person may be required by the area manager to forfeit, for the remainder of the license year, or by the Commission to forfeit, for a period of one calendar year, all hunting and/or fishing privileges on that wildlife management area. The person shall also be subject to prosecution and fines as provided by law.

Dogs: Dogs are not allowed on wildlife management areas during closed seasons except by special permit.

Harassment of wildlife, including spotlighting, is prohibited.

All vehicles within, entering or leaving a wildlife management area are subject to checks at roadblocks or checkpoints for compliance with game and fish and/or wildlife management area laws and regulations.

Roads: No hunting or loaded weapons allowed within 100 feet of the right of way of any public road. Public roads are any roads maintained with federal, state or local funds. No motorized vehicles allowed on any roads blocked or posted as closed, or on any wildlife food plots.

All persons under the age of sixteen (16) must be accompanied by a licensed adult at all times who will be responsible for the minor's actions.

Tree Stands and Blinds: It shall be illegal to construct or to hunt from any permanent stands or blinds. Destroying, defacing, cutting, driving nails into or otherwise damaging any standing live tree, natural feature or plant is prohibited.

During deer seasons without dogs, the use of organized drivers and standers in which drivers make noises by shouting, whistling or any noise making devices is prohibited.

This adopted public notice will become effective August 23, 1991. Witness my hand and seal this 24th day of July 1991.

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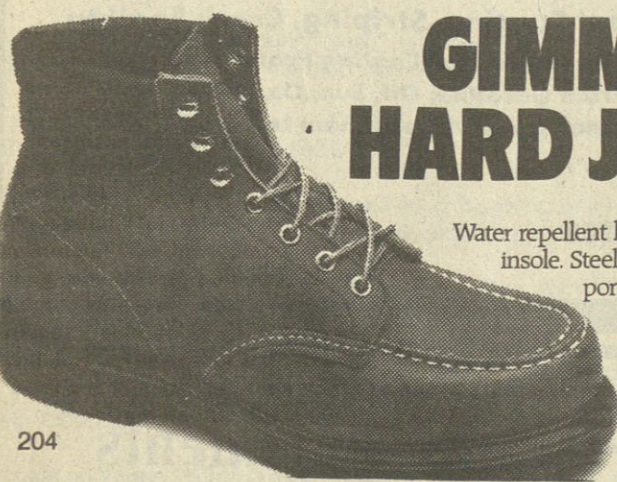
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
