Gaylon G. Lovelace Announces For Tax Assessor/Collector



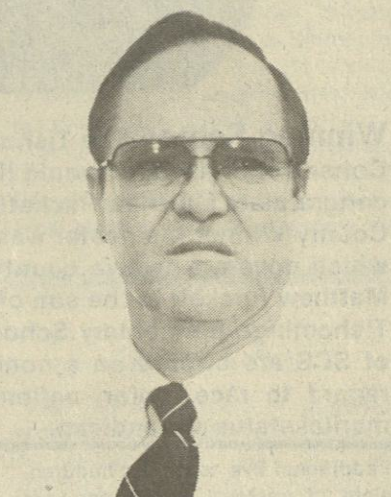

School Opening Delayed 1 Week

Students in the Tishomingo County School District will be getting another week of summer vacation.

The school board of the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District voted Monday to delay the beginning of classes in the 1991-92 school year until Monday, August 26, one week later than previously scheduled.

Several holdups led the board to make the decision, said Earl Walker, school board president.

Gas and sewer work at the new magnet high school near Iuka was not yet completed this week, Walker said. School officials are also waiting for a shipment of classroom furniture to arrive, and it was not certain the furniture would arrive in time for classes to begin on August 19.

Another factor was paying at Belmont High School that needs to be done before students arrive, he said.

Although the classroom building at the new complex is basically complete and ready for students, the extra week will allow more progress on construction of the cafeteria/gymnasium building, Walker said.

"We could have gone ahead and opened on the 19th, but after considering all the factors involved, we thought it best to postpone it a week," Walker said.

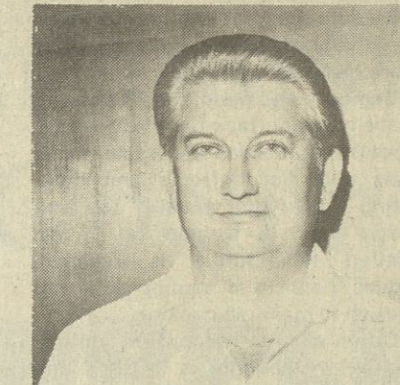
The board voted 3-1 to enact the delay, with Walker voting against it. Trustee Harold Sparks was absent.

The setback will alter the school district's yearly schedule causing school to let out a week later next spring, Walker said, unless several holidays within the year are omitted.

Water lines to the new facility are already completed, and work is continuing on the sewer lines. Gas will be needed in the cafeteria before hot meals can be prepared, he said.

The public is invited to an Open House at the Tishomingo County High School at Iuka on Sunday, August 25, from 3 to 5 p.m. An Open House is also planned at Belmont High School on Sunday, September 8, from 3 to 5 p.m.

Home Economics Tips

KITCHEN ENERGY TIPS

How you operate your kitchen can either save big bucks in your energy bill or provide that extra savings for other expenses or pleasure.

Limit the use of your dishwasher to once a day, preferably after the evening meal.

If your dishwasher has a filter screen, clean it often.

If your refrigerator-freezer is the type that needs to be defrosted, do it whenever the frost is about 1/4 inch thick; a thick frost makes the motor work harder.

Try to break the family's habit of frequently opening refrigerator door and leaving it open for long periods of time.

Check your instruction manual to know the optimum temperature for your refrigerator and freezer; if you are keeping the food too cold, you are wasting energy.

Check the refrigerator-door gasket to make sure cold air is not escaping. Keep the condenser of refrigerator free of dust and dirt.

Let hot foods cool to room temperature before refrigerating. Turn off oven and range surface units or burners when not in use.

Be sure the pilot light of gas range is properly adjusted; it could be using more fuel than necessary.

Use pots and pans that fit the size of the range surface units or burners; a pot that is too small wastes heat. Use pans with flat bottoms and tight-fitting lids. Place pan on the unit before heat is turned on. When desired temperature is reached, reduce heat to a setting just hot enough to maintain cooking.

On an electric range, turn unit off just before cooking is finished and use the retained heat to finish the job.

Position oven racks before turning on oven, not after.

Do not preheat oven longer than about ten minutes. Only leavened foods and pastry products require a preheated oven.

SALMON FRITTERS

1 (7 3/4 ounce) can salmon
Milk
1 cup biscuit mix
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/4 cup finely chopped celery
2 tablespoons finely chopped green peppers
2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
1 tablespoon minced parsley
1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt

Drain and flake salmon, reserving liquid. Add milk to salmon liquid to make 1/2 cup. Add to biscuit mix, along with egg and lemon juice. Blend in salmon, vegetables and seasoned salt. Drop batter by spoonfuls into deep fat, heated to 375 degrees. Fry until golden brown on both sides, about 3 minutes. Drain on paper towels.

YIELD: 4 servings.

ASCS Farm News

ASCS TO CONDUCT WOOL, LAMB REFERENDUM

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will conduct a referendum August 19-30 for wool and lamb producers to vote on continuation of an agreement between the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the American Sheep Industry Association (ASI) for a wool market promotion and improvement program.

The agreement authorizes deductions from producers' price support payments to finance the ASI's activities. These funds are used by the industry for advertising and sales promotion programs for wool in domestic and foreign markets, and for information programs on production management and market development and improvement.

If producers approve continuation of the agreement, up to 7 cents per pound on shorn wool marketings, and 35 cents per hundredweight on unshorn lambs would be deducted for 1991. For calendar years 1992 through 1995, the deductions may increase up to an additional one cent per pound of wool marketed and up to

an additional five cents per hundred weight of unshorn lambs, per year from the prior year.

To participate in the referendum, producers must have owned sheep six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1990. Members of cooperatives which cast votes would not be eligible to vote separately in the referendum.

ASCS will begin distributing ballots to Tishomingo County wool producers in the near future. Ballots may be returned by mail or in person to the county ASCS office.

U.S. sheep producers have approved the market promotion and improvement program in each referendum held since 1954.

MOHAIR PROMOTION PROGRAM APPROVED
Preliminary results of a recent

mohair referendum show that 86.8 percent of the mohair producers in the nation favor a mohair promotion program.

Approval of the program means that advertising and other market development activities promoting the sale of mohair will be continued under a new agreement between the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America.

The agreement authorizes deduction of up to 4-1/2 cents a pound from payments on mohair marketed from 1991 through 1995.

One Tishomingo County producer participated in the referendum.

Nationally, 2,918 producers voted in the referendum. Of this total, 2,533 were in favor of the mohair promotion program and 385 were against it. The 2,533 producers own 89.8 percent of the goats owned by producers voting in the referendum.

The Mohair Council of America had been funded through deductions

from price support payments since mid-1983. Deductions from 1989 price support payments were about \$736,000.

INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

AN IMPERFECTLY SHAPED CORNEA

If you have an imperfectly shaped cornea that is interfering with your vision, you may find wearing corrective glasses doesn't do enough to solve the problem. Maybe you should consider wearing contact lenses.

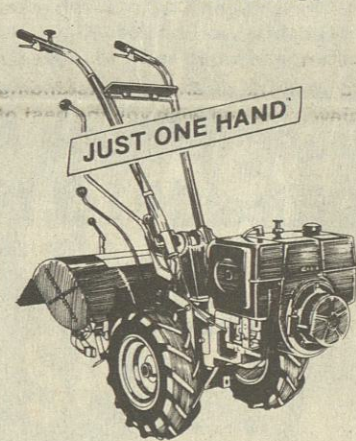
When the cornea is normal it forms a perfect curve in helping the eye to focus clearly and sharply on an object. But sometimes the cornea is imperfectly curved. In a condition known as keratoconus, for example, instead of having a round surface the cornea is cone-shaped and irregular. Before the advent of contact lenses, someone who suffered from keratoconus and other irregularities of the cornea would find his vision becoming gradually and increasingly distorted, even with glasses.

Now with contact lenses this condition can be corrected so that good vision is possible. The contact lens completely covers the cornea, allowing the image passing into the eye to remain sharp and clear. A change from glasses to contact lenses will take time to adjust to the differences. However, the slight inconvenience is worth it.

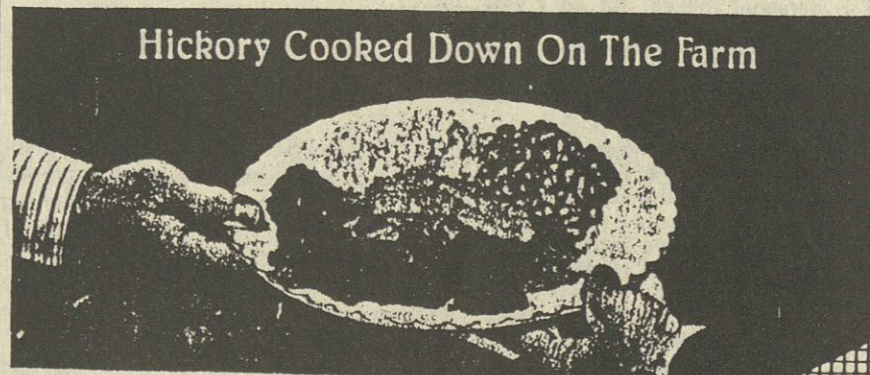

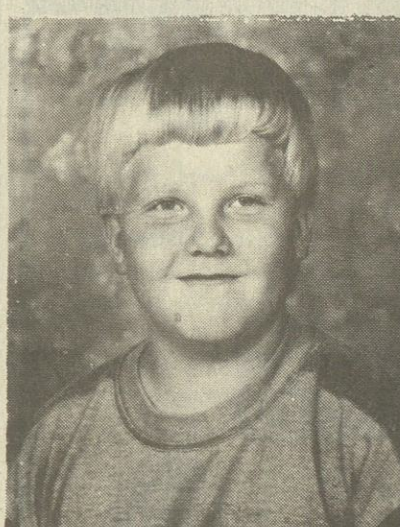

needed and use the minimum amount that will do the job.

Inquire of the salesperson or the manufacturer about leachability of the chemical. It the chemical is a leacher, be especially cautious where groundwater aquifer contamination is likely to occur.

Avoid winter use around high water tables.

Dispose of unwanted quantities and empty containers as directed on the container. Do not flush into toilets or septic tanks.

When rinsing a pesticide sprayer or empty container, do not dump large volumes of washing or rinsing water on a small area.

Be especially careful with chemicals when working near (within 100 feet) of a domestic water supply. This applies to springs and wells. Wells should be cased using unperforated casing for the upper portion; they should be grouted and capped to prevent inflow in case of high surface water or an accidental spill.

MEXICAN CORNBREAD

1 pound ground beef
2 cups self-rising corn meal
1 (10 oz.) can cream style corn
2 eggs
1 cup milk

1 large onion chopped
4 jalapeno peppers chopped
1/2 pound shredded Cheddar Cheese

Saute beef until red is gone. Mix meal, corn, egg, and milk. Grease heavy iron skillet and sprinkle with meal. Put half of mix in skillet; add beef, onion, pepper, and cheese. Pour remaining mix over top. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Home Economics Tips

PROTECTING THE HOME WATER SUPPLY

New information is released almost daily about the health hazards associated with pesticides, cleaning compounds, fertilizers and other chemicals used around the home. Many of these compounds are hazardous and must be treated with knowledge, forethought, respect and a great deal of care to protect the well-being of family, friends and neighbors.

Certain procedures are useful for minimizing the hazards associated with using and handling dangerous chemicals:

Read the label carefully and completely. Extensive detailed label information is required by law to give the information you need for making sound judgements. Follow the instructions carefully.

Buy and use chemicals only as needed. Excesses are hazardous and difficult to store. Disposing of them can contaminate land and water.

Use cautiously, carefully and prudently. Treat hazardous materials with due respect. Do not treat in anticipation of a problem. If there is a problem, apply chemical where

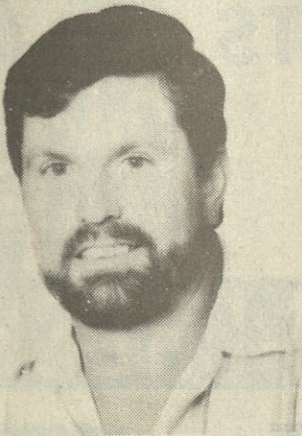

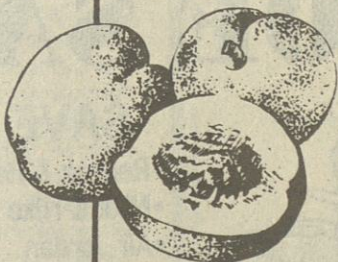

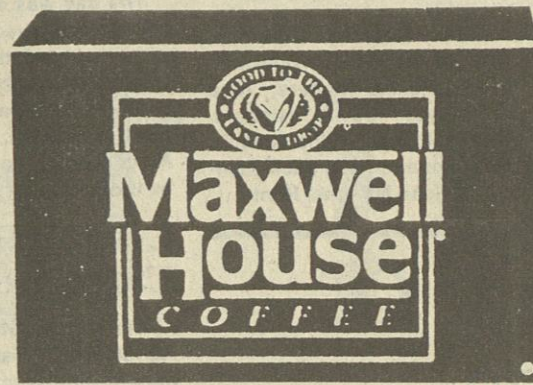

They are Adams, Attala, Amite, Benton, Claiborne, Copiah, Covington, DeSoto, Forrest, Franklin, Greene, Hinds, Jackson, Jasper, Jefferson, Jefferson Davis, Jones, Kemper, Lafayette, Lamar, Lawrence, Lincoln, Leake, Marion, Montgomery, Neshoba, Newton, Noxubee, Perry, Pike, Rankin, Scott, Simpson, Smith, Stone, Tunica, Walthall, Wayne, Wilkinson and Winston counties.

Eighteen other counties are eligible because they are contiguous to one or more of the primary counties. They are Calhoun, Carroll, George, Grenada, Harrison, Holmes, Lowndes, Madison, Marshall, Panola, Pearl River, Pontotoc, Tate, Union, Warren, Webster, Yazoo and Yazoo counties.

Farmers in all 58 counties have eight months to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses. To be eligible, they must have suffered a 30-percent loss of normal production, be able to repay the loan and any other loans, be unable to get credit elsewhere, have adequate security and have multi-peril crop insurance, if available.

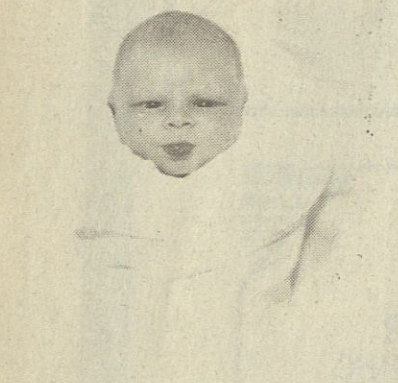

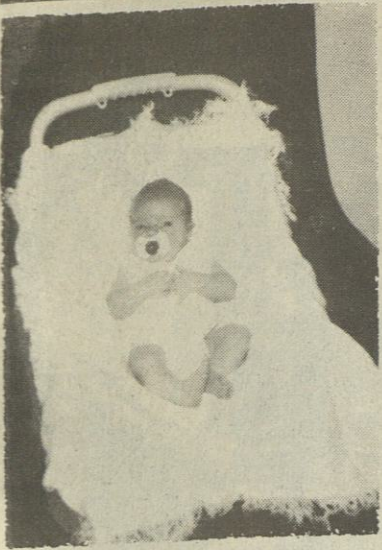

Confidentiality Letter

The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is participating in an ongoing statewide effort to identify, locate, and evaluate children through the age of twenty-one who have a physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional disability. Early identification of children in need of special educational experiences is most important to each child. Furthermore, this information gathered from contacts with parents and other agencies will be used to help determine present and future program needs as progress is made toward the goal of providing a free appropriate public education to all children with a disability.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by this agency and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the family Rights and Privacy Act and EHA-B. As a parent, you are guaranteed the right to inspect any such information about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without informed consent. If you have questions regarding the collection, maintenance and use of data about your child, please contact Betty Barnes, Child Find Director for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District by calling 438-7471 or writing to her at the following address: The Education Center, P. O. Box 98, Tishomingo, MS 38873.

The Child Find Director implements child identification, location, and evaluation of children birth through twenty-one who have disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find Director works with the local Headstart, Welfare, Health and Mental Health agencies, as well as local education agencies, physicians and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Director

tor to insure that the Referral-to-Placement procedures are followed. The director works with Local Survey Committees at each school to implement this procedure. The following activities briefly describe the procedures.

Prior to evaluation, a copy of the Parent Information Pamphlet and Procedural Safeguards are given to parents. District personnel explain the Parent Information Pamphlet to parents and insure that they understand the Procedural Safeguards.

After parental consent for testing is obtained, a nondiscriminatory evaluation is conducted. Students are evaluated in all areas related to the suspected disability by qualified personnel.

Parents are notified when a student is ruled eligible for a special

education program. An Individual Educational Plan is developed for the student before the student is placed. Parents must sign permission for placement. Parents, teacher and students participate in this process. All students receiving special education services are reassessed at least once a year and reevaluated at least once every three years.

We now have twenty-four special education classes in our district which serve students who have physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional disabilities. It is the goal of the Tishomingo County School District to provide free appropriate education to all children with disabilities through age twenty-one by the year 2000.

Charmain Thompson of Byram will conduct the session on advocacy. Thompson, public affairs director for the Mississippi Library Commission, will discuss ways in which volunteers and Friends of the Library can support city and county funding for the library, its programs and services.

The August 20 program in Hattiesburg will be hosted by the Friends of the Library of Hattiesburg, Peta and Forrest County. It will take place at The Library, 723 Main Street in Hattiesburg from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Jane Hinton of Hattiesburg is

president of the hosting Friends of the Library, and Hattiesburg resident Betty McKenzie is the southern region representative on the state board of Friends of Mississippi Libraries.

NEMCC Awarded \$100,000 Grant

Northeast Mississippi Community College has been awarded a grant of \$104,908 by the U.S. Department of Education to fund the institution's Special Services Program, President Joe M. Childers announced.

The grant award will fund the twelve-month project period for student support services raising the total funding to date to \$960,394. Funding is 100 percent by the federal government.

Authorized under the amended Higher Education Act of 1965, Special Services is the only TRIO project that deals exclusively with postsecondary students, according to Sarah Rhodes, Northeast's project director.

"Special Services is designed to aid the student who is academically, economically and/or culturally disadvantaged," she explained. "The purpose is to assist the college in carrying out projects designed to provide remedial and other special services for students with academic potential who are enrolled or accepted for enrollment and who by reason of deprived educational, cultural, or economic background, physical handicaps or limited English-speaking ability, are in need of such services to assist them in their postsecondary education."

Although special services programs are offered at many junior and community colleges, no two programs are the same.

"Program objectives are developed according to the needs of the students at their particular institutions," Rhodes said.

According to project regulations, awarded funds can be utilized to provide counseling, tutoring or other educational services, career guidance, placement or other student personnel services.

Northeast uses the funds primarily to provide tutoring services to those students who qualify for the program.

"Special Services at Northeast employs peer (student) tutors to lend assistance in the majority of academic disciplines," Rhodes added. "Results through the years have been very favorable for students and faculty alike. GPA's (grade point average) have increased as a whole for students who received services and Northeast has seen the retention rate rise while at the same time the drop-out rate has decreased."

hard to detect.

Most lakeshore permits are granted, however, an application must be filed prior to any work beginning. Beat the rush and make an appointment for an on-site meeting with a Corps Ranger. An application must be submitted along with a drawing depicting in full detail all dimensions relative to the proposed activity. A location map is also helpful. Any changes from the approved permit must be requested prior to a construction change. A common change is the addition of electrical service. Water and electricity is a deadly combination, so all wiring must comply with the National Electrical Code and Corps requirements.

You have one year to complete the work after you are issued a permit. The Corps policy is to issue permits only to landowners. If you rent or lease land, you must have the actual owner of the land apply for you. Permits are not transferable. In cases of death or sale of property, the existing permit becomes null and void, and the new owner must apply for a new permit.

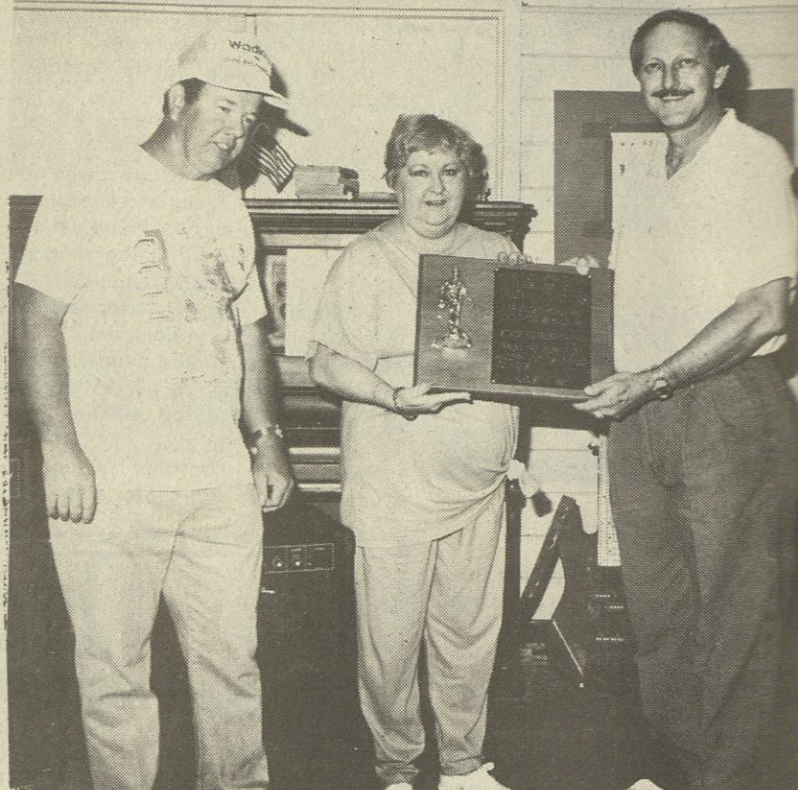

RESPONSE:

It sounds as though you do need professional help. Running away may be a symptom of a more serious problem such as psychosis, drug addiction, or poor parent-child relationships. In your case, the latter may be a strong possibility. The relationship may have reached a point where your child feels exasperated and runs away to save himself perhaps from rejection which could take on many

forms.

Not knowing more about your situation, I cannot provide specific suggestions. But I do want to reinforce your apparent decision to obtain professional help. Consider also the services of a school social worker or guidance counselor.

Tenn-Tom Today

If you have ever taken a boat trip on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway you surely have seen the shoreline development that is taking place. Private facilities include boat ramps, floating docks, fixed or stationary piers, dredging, bank grading, retaining walls, and placement of riprap (rock) for erosion control. One thing that all these activities have in common is that a permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is required prior to beginning work.

In some areas the Corps regulates construction type activities only as they relate to the water. These activities could take place above, on, or below the surface of the lake. In most areas, the Corps controls the ac-

tivities on lands higher in elevation than the lake. These controls are called flowage easements and range from 2 to 6 feet above the normal elevation of the lake.

Let's say the easement in your area is two feet. To visually estimate the easement area, extend a vertical line two feet from the lake surface when it is at normal pool. Then imagine a line running parallel to the lake surface from the two foot vertical line. Where ever that line strikes the land, that is the boundary of the easement. Actual distance from the shoreline to the easement line will vary depending on the topography. Random trees along the easement line were painted with white paint about four feet above ground. The land between the shoreline and marked trees is the easement land. Due to weathering, high water and the passage of time, much of the easement boundary is

SPECIAL SUBJECTS IN NUTRITION AND FITNESS

Cathy was "on a diet." So for lunch, she had some tuna salad with mayonnaise, no bread, a wedge of whole milk cheese and a granola bar. What Cathy didn't know was that more than half the calories in her lunch came from fat!

The tuna was packed in oil-and 56 percent of its calories came from fat. Ninety-nine percent of calories in the mayonnaise came from fat. The cheese got 75 percent of its calories from fat. And 50 percent of the calories in the granola bar, which included peanuts and chocolate, came from fat.

Cathy didn't need to plan a totally different lunch. She could have chosen tuna packed in water. She could have used low-fat salad dressing or tried a mixture of mustard and yogurt instead of the mayonnaise. There are several lower-fat cheeses she could have selected.

A piece of fruit would have been a better choice for dessert. And, of course, there was no reason to skip the bread because it's relatively low in calories and provides important nutrients.

Today, the National Institutes of Health recommends that people

reduce their daily intake of fat to about 30 percent of the total calories. It's not hard to eliminate the fat you can see -- cutting fat off meat and not slathering butter on your toast. It's a lot harder to cut out the fat you can't see, but it can be effective. For example, if you drink three glasses of whole milk a day and switch to skim milk, you could spare 17 pounds' worth of calories in a year's time.

Learning to identify the "hidden" fat in foods is just one of the many educational activities of the 4-H Food and Nutrition project. If you are interested in learning more about foods and nutrition or joining the Tishomingo County 4-H program, contact the county Extension office.

FROSTED FRUIT

- 1 small lemon
- 2 cups buttermilk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups assorted fresh fruit (such as halved strawberries, sliced nectarines, and blackberries)
- Lettuce leaves (optional)
- Fresh fruit for garnish

Ahead 5 hours before serving or day ahead:

1. Into large bowl, grate peel from lemon (reserve remaining lemon for use another day). Stir in buttermilk, sugar, and salt until well blended. Gently stir in half of the fruit. Spoon mixture into 11" by 7" or 9" by 9" baking pan; top with remaining fruit (some fruit will float on mixture for

pretty color). Cover; freeze until firm, at least 4 hours.

2. To serve, unmold fruit salad; place on lettuce-lined platter. Let salad stand at room temperature to soften, about 30 minutes or until fork can be inserted easily. Garnish with more fruit if you like. Or, soften salad in pan; cut into 9 pieces and arrange them on individual lettuce-lined salad plates. Makes 9 accompaniment servings.

Each serving: About 80 calories, 1g fat, 2 mg cholesterol, 85 mg sodium.

Registration At NASA/Yellow Creek

The location of the August 14 registration for fall semester classes at The University of Mississippi's NASA/Yellow Creek Center has been changed to the Iuka Middle School, formerly Iuka High School, instead of the new Tishomingo County High School, as originally planned.

Registration for Ole Miss courses will be in the auditorium of the school, located at 507 West Quitman St., is from 4-7 p.m.

The change became necessary because construction of the Tishomingo County Education Complex is still underway. Classes initially will also be held at the Iuka Middle School until the complex construction has been completed.

Ole Miss officials also announced that advisers from the Schools of Engineering and Business Administration would be on hand to confer with registrants. The NASA/Yellow Creek Center will offer fall classes in engineering, education and liberal arts.

Know Your County Road Number

County road markers are vital to the citizens of Tishomingo County. Road numbers are used by emergency service personnel to locate residents who call for fire department or emergency medical assistance.

Citizens are urged to become familiar with their county road numbers so that in the event of an emergency, the number can be communicated to emergency services. Response time will be greatly improved.

Road numbers will also be crucial to the success of the Enhanced-911 system in Tishomingo County.

Voters approved the E-911 system for the county in the general election last fall.

E-911 is a centralized computer answering service for emergency telephone calls. When a caller dials 911, he will reach a dispatcher, and the caller's address will appear on a computer screen before the dispatcher.

For the system to be installed, all roads in the county must be numbered and documented, and each address in the county assigned a number.

A local E-911 Commission is working to hire a coordinator to complete the mapping of county roads.

Proper address identification will be necessary with the E-911 system since it is an "address-driven" system.

The Commission urges all county residents to know their county road numbers. Children should also learn which road they live on to be informed in case of an emergency.

Local Student Attends Conference

Jerry Thompson of Belmont recently attended the fourth of this summer's five orientation conferences at The University of Mississippi.

The sessions for high school graduates and transfer students include testing sessions to determine career interests, orientational and instructional meetings, test interpretation, individual counseling and preparation of a class schedule for fall semester, academic advising and pre-registration.

County Agent's Column

STINGING REPLY

It's best not to touch something you know nothing about or aren't sure of. People still forget this when they encounter a brightly-colored or unusually-shaped insect. They touch, and then they get stung or bitten.

Many children (and adults too) are tempted to touch the spiny caterpillars they see crawling around. These caterpillars are larvae of the buck moth. They have four rows of pointed spines on their bodies, and the spines are razor-sharp.

That means the spines can easily prick skin. What results is a nasty sting, similar to the one given by a wasp or a bee. The reaction from the caterpillar sting varies from person to person, so it's best to see a doctor if you get one.

People who are allergic to wasp and bee stings should immediately seek medical attention. A severe reaction is a life-and-death situation in the case of an allergy.

Other than stinging, buck moth caterpillars don't pose a serious threat to humans. They can, however, injure some plants. Oak, hickory, and willow leaves are a particular favorite of these pests.

It doesn't take much of a touch to get stung, so don't.

BEEF MANAGEMENT

Most beef producers in Tishomingo County need to be in a good "frame of mind" right now. Herds can only be helped by timely and sound management programs.

Cull old cows from the herd. Don't gamble that they will breed back or produce a calf in 1992.

Also get rid of the "no mouth" cows. Check the teeth on the herd when running them through the chute. If a cow does not have any bottom teeth or if those teeth are short and peg-shaped, she needs to be sold.

Cows should have teats of normal size and a frame in good condition.

If the udders are bad, those cows will not be as productive as they could be.

Life is too short to handle a mean cow that may be worth more money at a sale today than later. If you say, "I ought to sell that cow," then do it.

BAGGING THE CULPRIT

Too often, homeowners in Tishomingo County wait until their ornamentals have been nearly stripped of foliage before they pinpoint bagworms as the culprits.

Bagworms cause considerable damage to ornamentals at this time of year. You can control the bagworms with insecticides such as Sevin, Malathion, or Diazinon.

Spider mites prey on ornamentals too. They suck sap from the shrubs and trees, causing leaves to change

from green to a yellowish gray. Uncontrolled, these pests can kill young ornamentals in a single season. Older plants and shrubs may slowly die over several seasons.

Hose down ornamentals with water to break up spider mite webbing. You can also apply the same insecticides for them that were used to control bagworms.

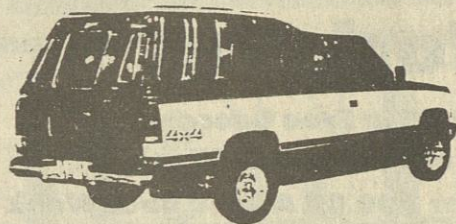

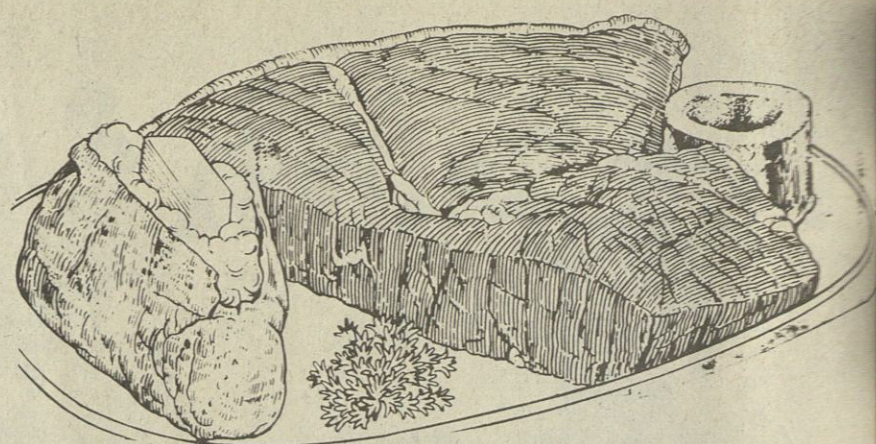

The fact of the matter is that folks love their denominations, never hinted at in scripture, more than they love the church for which Christ died. The opt for division, unscriptural doctrines, and confusion rather than the unity and harmony taught by Christ.

Take The Right Road To Career Choices

Carol will be entering the ninth grade this fall. She is excited about her first year of high school, but she also is confused by college prep requirements and courses to prepare her for a career.

Like most of her friends, Carol isn't definite about her career plans. In fact, Carol says she hasn't exactly given college and career much thought.

"I've tried to keep my grades up, and I've taken the courses the counselor recommends, but that's really all I've done to prepare for a career," she said.

Carol isn't alone. Dr. Ann Jarratt, youth development

specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, said many people, even high school graduates, don't know positively what they want to do with the rest of their lives.

"That doesn't mean it is too soon for Carol and her friends to start thinking about careers," Jarratt said. "They should be considering careers and collecting information and experiences to help them decide about future plans."

Jarratt said Carol is at a good age for setting sights on a lifetime goal, and said her next step is learning as much about herself as she can.

"Carol and others facing her decision should take a close look at their interests, strengths, special talents and people skills, among other things," Jarratt said. "Now is the time to dream a little and ask

themselves what they would do if they were qualified for any job in the world."

Other questions that need answering include what part of the world do they want to live in? What kind of lifestyle do they want? How much leisure time do they want? How important is the amount of money they will make?

"Answering these questions will help take them through a process of career brainstorming and then narrowing down the field," Jarratt said. "They need to find out as much as they can about careers that interest them."

The Occupational Outlook Handbook, available in most public and school libraries, is a good source of information on different careers. It lists salary range, educational background needed, and number of job openings predicted to occur with the next few years.

"Another way to get career information is to ask people about their jobs," Jarratt said. "If you are interested in medicine, quiz the people at your doctor's office."

Jarratt said older students such as high school seniors or graduates could begin career exploration by talking with their counselor.

"Ask the counselor about taking an interest inventory; discuss your ACT profile; look at the subjects you've liked and done well in," she said. "Then compare what you have learned about yourself and about career areas and see if there are any interesting matches between the two."

"If possible, narrow choices to one or two broad areas," Jarratt said. "Then determine if vocational training will qualify you for the kind of job you would like. If college training is your preference, you may elect general courses the first year, to help you zero in on a major course of study."

Dean's List At UNA Announced

The Dean's List for the 1991 summer term at the University of North Alabama has recently been released. To be considered for the Dean's List, a student must be classified as a degree-seeking student in full-time residence and have no grade of failure, incomplete, withdrawal passing or withdrawal failing during the term. Students who are unable to register August 15 may do so in the Office of Continuing Education in Stringer Hall on the main campus, or by mail.

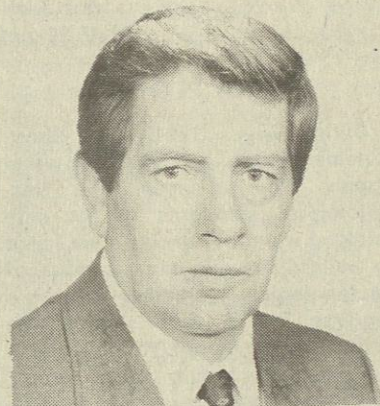

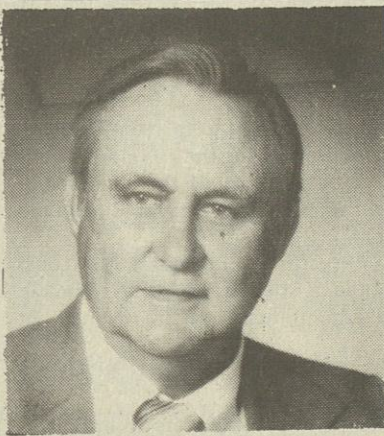
The problems facing all Tishomingo Counties are not confined to the cities or towns, therefore, I will see to it that the county cars will patrol county roads as well as inside corporation limits.

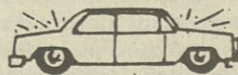

1. It is necessary and advisable and in the best interest of the
Municipality and its inhabitants to issue gas system revenue bonds of the

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY AS

SECTION 1. The Governing Body does hereby declare its intention to
issue gas system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum prin-
cipal amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) to raise
money for the purpose of improving, repairing and extending the gas
system of the City of Iuka, Mississippi.

SECTION 2. Said bonds in the amount, for the purpose and secured as

Mississippi Ranks In Top Five In National Rankings Of New Plants/Expansions

Mississippi is ranked fourth in the 1990 Top Ten States for new industrial facilities and expansions per capita, according to the February issue of Site Selection magazine. In per capita rankings for the year 1988-90, Site Selection ranked Mississippi fifth in number of new plants and expansions.

The Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development 1990 New and Expanded Facilities Report shows that Mississippi had 664 new and expanded facility announcements, which created 16,540 jobs and had a combined estimated capital investment of \$977 million.

Manufacturing-related facilities announced 15,105 new jobs in 621 new and expanded facilities while non-manufacturing facilities announced 1,435 new jobs in 43 new and expanded facilities.

More than \$855.9 million of the total capital investment came from manufacturing related facilities while non-manufacturing-related facility announcements represents approximately \$121.1 million.

During 1988-90, manufacturing-related facilities announced 53,033 new jobs in 1,922 new and expanded facility announcements with \$3.8 billion in capital investments.

New and expanded facility announcements during 1990 include

Borden, Inc., which will manufacture, store and distribute packaged food condiments and related products at its new Jackson facility, announced a \$30 million capital investment with 400 new jobs. Calgon Carbon Corporation, which will supply activated carbon used in environmental applications such as purification of drinking water, announced a capital investment of \$65 million with 60 new jobs at its new Bay St. Louis facility. Tecumseh Products, Plant No. 2, a new air conditioner compressor manufacturing facility in Tupelo, announced a capital investment of \$50 million with 250 new jobs.

Mississippi Steel, an expanding reinforcing steel bars manufacturer in Flowood, announced a \$45 million capital investment with 20 new jobs. Wayne Poultry, an expanding poultry processing facility in Laurel, announced a \$13 million capital investment with 300 new jobs.

Among non-manufacturers, the Information Technology Lab, a new research and development facility in computer-aided engineering in Vicksburg, announced a \$50 million capital investment with 210 new jobs.

Of the lands to be acquired under this law, not less than 20,000 acres are to be acquired in the area of the Mobile-Tensaw River Delta, Alabama, not less than 25,000 acres are to be acquired in the areas of the Pascagoula River, the Pearl River, the Mississippi River Delta, Mississippi, and approximately 43,000 acres are to be acquired along the Waterway in the states of Alabama and Mississippi.

A series of public meetings have been held at various cities in Alabama and Mississippi to inform the public of the history of the Water Resources Development Act of 1986 (Public Law 99-662-Nov. 17, 1986), how the law is to be acquired will be selected through an acquisition process, and how the lands will be managed. Although willing seller response has been adequate over most areas of Alabama and Mississippi, additional offers for large tracts or tracts of land adjacent to existing State or Federal water management areas are required along the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway corridor.

Mitigation Of Wildlife

Expanded Employer Survey Underway

Some Mississippi businesses and industries will be asked to contribute wage and occupational information as part of Mississippi Employment Security Commission's continuing effort to keep employers abreast of workplace changes occurring in the state.

In the next three months questionnaires will go out from MESC's Labor Market Information Department to employers in the transportation, public utilities, local and state government and education industries, according to MESC's Interim Executive Director Liston L. Thomasson. He urges employers to complete and return the survey.

Mississippi is one of 11 states which volunteered to cooperate with the Bureau of Labor Statistics to collect useful wage information as well as numbers of people working in jobs and types of jobs in all industries in the state. By 1993 all Mississippi industries will be surveyed for both wage and occupational facts.

Beginning this year employers will receive a single survey which will collect both occupational employment and wage information in one survey questionnaire. This survey will eventually replace the salary survey MESC has published in the past.
