Hayden Ables Seeks Re-election As Chancery Court Clerk

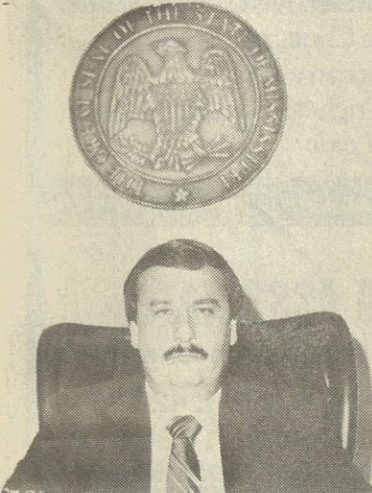

County Schools Open Monday

Open House Set For Sunday

Classes begin Monday, August 26 in all schools within the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District. Monday will be a full day of classes for students.

At Tishomingo County High School, cafeteria services will be limited to sandwiches and salads for a few days. All other school cafeterias within the district will serve regular lunches. Price of lunches will be \$1 for students and \$1.75 for adults.

The date for determining eligibility for participation in all activities governed by the Mississippi High School Activities Association (sports, band, cheerleading, etc.) will be September 3. Students will be eligible to participate in activities representing the school in which they are enrolled on September 3.

An open house is planned at Tishomingo County High School on Sunday, August 25, from 3 to 5 p.m. The public is invited to tour the classroom building and cafeteria area on the campus located on Hwy. 72 West of Iuka. An open house will also be held at the Belmont schools on Sunday, September 8.

Two Arrested Following Shooting At Dennis Home

Two suspects were arrested in connection with a shooting that injured four at a party near Dennis Saturday night.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs said that two victims were seriously injured and two grazed by gunshots fired into a house located north of Mississippi 4 west of Dennis.

Those arrested were identified as Ricky Dean McCoy, 32, of Tishomingo, and Virginia Zola Purdom, 27. Both were charged with shooting into a dwelling in connection with the incident. McCoy was also charged with four counts of aggravated assault. McCoy and Purdom made initial appearances before Justice Court Judge James R. Blakney, and bond was set at \$5,000 each.

Dobbs said that when he arrived on the scene shortly after the incident he found that numerous shots had been fired into the house. The shooting probably stemmed from a fight between one of the suspects and one of the victims, he said.

Aubrey T. Ridings, 24, of

Tishomingo, and Mackie L. Whitehead, 38, of Iuka received serious injuries from the gunfire and were taken to North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo. Both were listed in good condition Monday.

Roy E. Savage, 32, and Keith Whitfield, 38, both of Golden, were grazed by gunfire and did not require medical attention, Dobbs said.

The shots were fired into the window, wall, and door of the residence, which belonged to Daniel Fowler.

Fowler was hosting a party attended by 20 to 25 people, Dobbs said. Fourteen people, including Fowler, were arrested and charged with possession of beer or liquor, he said. They were held overnight at the Tishomingo County Jail and released on bond Sunday. Fowler remained in jail Monday on a probation violation charge.

Dobbs said he was assisted in the arrests by Belmont police officer Mike Kemp, Golden Police Chief Charles Harris, Tishomingo police officers Don Hall and Bob Kemp, and State Trooper Ricky Marlar.

School Complex Receives Grant

The Tishomingo County Education Complex at Iuka was selected as one of six projects to receive a grant from the Major Economic Impact Authority in the second round of funding.

Gov. Ray Mabus announced the new projects at news conferences in Ripley and Fulton last Friday amounting to a total of \$5.4 million in funding assistance from the Authority. The new projects resulted from an additional \$5 million appropriated to the Authority by the 1991 Legislature and \$400,000 in unused funds from the first round of projects announced in 1989.

Education remained the top priority once again in the new Authority projects. Five of the six projects involve educational facilities and programs while one project is a regional solid waste disposal system.

"The future of both the existing workforce and the children of Mississippi is dependent upon the availability of quality educational and training programs and facilities," Mabus said. "These projects provide additional top notch educational opportunities to the people of Northeast Mississippi and the families who transfer to the area because of the NASA plant."

The University Center at the Tishomingo Education Complex at Iuka will receive an additional \$150,000 in impact monies. The funds will assist in completion of the University Center's second floor, which is designed as a NASA Resource Center. NASA will equip and staff the Resource Center to provide teacher training and to develop and coordinate curricula in the Tri-State area. In addition, NASA is to provide \$1.5 million in computer equipment that will be given to the local community after three years. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$2.25 million.

The Authority received 23 proposals from the 11-county area eligible for new project funding. The projects called for a total investment of more than \$67 million, of which \$26.1 million was requested from the Authority.

In the first round of funding, Tishomingo County received \$7 million for construction of a new magnet high school and for improvements at Belmont High School. The grant was to be matched by \$3 million in local funds. An additional \$1.2 million was allocated for the magnet school in November of last year.

Itawamba County received the largest grant announced Friday, as \$1.5 million was announced for construction of a magnet high school near Fulton. The grant is to be matched locally by \$3.2 million.

Alcorn County received \$1 million for educational purposes. A learning center for applied science and technology to be located at the existing vocational/technical center is planned with \$500,000. The other \$500,000 will be used for facility improvements at Alcorn Central High School.

In a joint effort between Itawamba Community College and Northeast Mississippi Community College, \$1.25 million in impact funds will help establish two advanced technology training centers. The Community Development Foundation of Tupelo/Lee County and CREATE, Inc. are also providing funding support for the project.

ICC will operate the Center for Advanced Machine Tool Technology at its Tupelo campus while NEMCC will run the Center for Advanced Industrial Electronic Technology at Booneville. The centers will provide the advanced technology skills

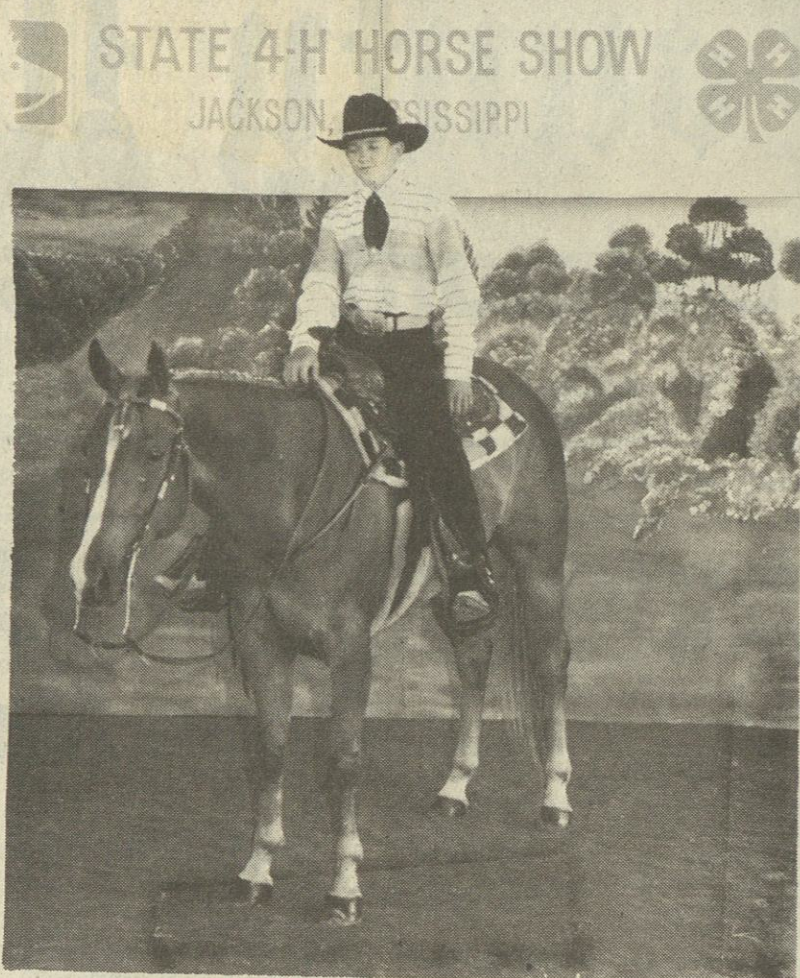

Home Economics Tips

YOUR RIGHTS AT THE CREDIT BUREAU

A credit bureau is a reporting agency that maintains credit records on people in the community who have ever used or applied for credit. This information is reported to subscribing creditors when consumers apply for credit.

Credit bureaus do not make the decision on whether a creditor should extend credit to a consumer. Nor do they make judgments as to whether a

consumer is a good or bad credit risk. They only compile information and make it available to creditors. The creditor makes the final decision based on his or her standards and the credit history contained in the file.

Anyone who has been denied credit because of information from a credit bureau must be given the name and address of that credit bureau by the user of the report. Upon request of the consumer and with proper identification, the credit bureau must tell what information it has and how it was gathered.

The credit bureau must disclose any companies that have received

records in the last six months and any prospective employers who were sent information in the last two years. Additionally, any adverse information (except notice of bankruptcy) must be removed after seven years. Bankruptcies cannot be reported after 10 years.

If a consumer believes any information in his or her file is incorrect or incomplete, the credit bureau must reinvestigate the challenged information within a reasonable period of time.

If the original information was wrong, or if it cannot be verified, the bureau must send corrections to any firm that received the file in the past six months. The corrections must be permanently entered into the file and the inaccurate information removed.

If, however, the investigation proves unsatisfactory and the bureau will not change the report, consumers have an additional right. A 100-word statement may be written giving the individual's side of the story. This statement must be permanently attached to the record. If the person desires, the credit bureau must send this statement to everyone who has recently received the file.

OLD FASHIONED MACARONI & CHEESE

1 (8 oz.) package macaroni shells
1/2 pound mild Cheddar cheese
sliced
2 cups milk
1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup margarine

Cook macaroni a little less than package directions, until not quite tender. Make a paste of flour, salt, pepper and a small amount of the milk. Add egg and mix well. Add the remainder of the milk and mix. Alternate macaroni and cheese slices in buttered 2-quart casserole, beginning with the macaroni and ending with cheese. Pour milk and egg mixture over all and dot with the margarine. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes, until thickened and cheese is melted.

SELECTING A FABRIC FOR HOME SEWING

Fabric selection is an important activity in the construction of a garment or an outfit. It can also determine the success or failure of a clothing project. 4-H members enrolled in the 4-H clothing construction project learn to evaluate and coordinate patterns and fabrics carefully.

The selection of fabric for a 4-H clothing project will depend largely on pattern design, the intended use of the garment, personal likes/dislikes and sewing knowledge and expertise.

It is important to read and follow carefully the suggested list of fabrics on the pattern envelope. These fabrics are an abbreviated list intended to give the sewer an idea of the type of fabric most suited to the pattern design. Other fabrics that behave in much the same way are equally as good as those listed.

Regardless of the type of fabric purchased, practicing good consumer habits is a must. Before buying, examine the fabric quality. Learning to recognize the quality fabric is often difficult, even for the most advanced sewer. Some of the criteria to look for are:

The weave should be firm. Thread should not shift easily when scratched with fingernail.

The weave should be uniform. No unusual thick or thin spots when held up to the light.

Crosswise or filling yard should be at right angle to the selvages.

Color or printed design should look even and fresh throughout.

Geometric prints (printed plaids, stripes, etc.) should be at right angles to the selvages. Irregular printing cannot be corrected and will result in an inferior garment no matter how well it is constructed.

No powdery dust should appear when fabric is rubbed between fingers. Powdering fabric is a technique sometimes used to conceal poor quality fabric.

Next examine the end of the fabric bolt for some helpful information. According to the care labeling rule, piece goods must have appropriate care instructions printed on the end of the fabric bolt.

4-H members enrolled in the clothing construction project learn the practice these guidelines for selecting fabric and other valuable

sewing techniques.

HOW CONTACTS STAYS ON THE EYE

If you've been wearing glasses and are considering changing to contact lenses, you may wonder what in the world allows the lens to rest and remain on the eye without falling off.

One way to understand the process is to take a clean, flat piece of glass, moisten it, and then place it against a clean window pane. You'll find that it only clings to the pane but can be moved easily as long as the surface is wet. The contact lens works in the same way. Instead of being flat, however, it is rounded to fit comfortably over your cornea, the clear membrane that covers the lense of the eye. The surface is always naturally wet because it is moistened every time you blink your eyes.

The curve in the contact lens has to be very carefully made not only to fit comfortably but also to give you clear vision. That's why your eye specialist will take very exact measurements of your cornea in fitting contact lenses to your eyes. The same care will be taken in making the lens so your vision problem is also properly corrected.

"Attention Hunters & Trappers"

If you plan to hunt or trap on Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway project lands or waters, you will need a 1991/92 U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (COE) Hunting/Trapping Permit. There is no charge for the permit, but you must apply before December 31, 1991. THAT MEANS SPRING TURKEY HUNTERS SHOULD GET THEIR PERMITS EARLY. All persons in possession of a permit agree to read and abide by the terms outlined on the permit.

Hunting and trapping are permitted on all Tennessee-Tombigbee project lands and waters not otherwise posted as closed. The following is a partial list of the exceptions and restrictions which apply to all persons hunting or trapping on Corps' land ("For the rest of the story" simply read the back of your hunting/trapping permit.):

1. All hunters, regardless of age, are required to have a valid COE hunting permit in their possession.

2. No hunting or trapping is allowed:

a. within 1000' of any lock, dam, building, dredge, construction site, or public use area.

b. on that part of Columbus Lake lying east of the main channel and south of Highway 50.

3. Waterfowl hunting is not allowed on project lands and water from Aberdeen Lock and Dam to Mile

Marker 360.8 and Pool A.

4. Only portable tree stands are allowed and must be removed daily.

5. Dogs are allowed for hunting of small game in areas designated exclusively for "Small Game Hunting Only".

Retrievers are allowed for waterfowl hunting.

6. No high powered rifles are allowed on Corps property.

7. Legal firearms for small game are standard 22 caliber rimfire rifles (no 22 magnums) and shotguns with shot size No. 4 or smaller.

8. All waterfowl hunters must use steel shot. There are no steel shot size restrictions.

9. Legal weapons for deer hunting are primitive weapons and shotguns with slugs only.

10. State antlerless seasons do not apply to COE lands. Antlerless deer may be harvested only during archery and primitive weapon seasons.

11. ATV operation is not allowed on COE property.

12. All Federal, state, and local laws governing hunting and trapping also apply.

Applications for 1991/92 Hunting/Trapping Permits are available at the Corps Resource Offices: Bay Springs Resource Office U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Route 1, Box 320, Dennis, Mississippi 38838-9723 (601)454-3481.

Applications are also available at many sporting goods stores, bait shops, and marinas along the Waterway. Call one of the above numbers for the location nearest you.

Deer Season Will Open On Schedule

Deer season will open this fall as scheduled, according to the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

Earlier reports of confirmed cases of anthrax in deer in the Delta have caused some hunters to call the department asking about the upcoming deer season.

"We have had no confirmed cases of anthrax reported to us in the last three weeks from the Delta," Chief of Game Bill Thomason said.

"We expect this disease to have run its course before the opening of the deer season this fall, and hunters should have no concern about deer they harvest having anthrax."

Thomason said that all cases of confirmed anthrax have been on private Delta lands in Sunflower, Tallahatchie, and northern Leflore counties.

"Local landowners and hunting clubs, in consultation with the local district biologist, will have to decide if they will hunt deer this year on their lands," Thomason said.

Browns Ferry Unit 2 Reaches Continuous, Full Power Operation

TVA's Browns Ferry Unit 2 reached continuous full-power operation Tuesday afternoon after 75 days of tests, concluding one of the nuclear industry's most extensive recovery efforts.

TVA began restarting the reactor on May 23 and achieved startup on May 24. The 1100-megawatt unit, which can power the homes of 200,000 customers, rejoined the TVA system on June 27 and operated at increasing power levels until August 2, when it was shut down as part of the testing program. It rejoined the TVA system on August 6 and began a gradual increase in full power.

"The success of the power ascension test program shows that Browns Ferry can operate safely and efficiently," said O.J. "Ike" Zeringue, Vice President, Browns Ferry Operations. "Browns Ferry is taking the time to make sure the people, the programs, and the equipment meet the highest expectations. Our next challenge is

to continue to improve the operation and maintenance of this facility to do our part in helping TVA become the best electric utility in North Alabama."

No Good News For Many

"The gospel" as it is used in the New Testament means "glad tidings of good things." Jesus said that the gospel of His resurrection and eternal life should be preached to all people. But the gospel is not good news to those who will not receive the benefits.

Noah preached to the people of his day with the good news that God would save the faithful in an ark. He also preached a message of doom to a wicked world. (II Pet. 2:5; I Pet. 3:18-20) Unfortunately, folks did not believe that God would destroy the world with a flood, else they would have appreciated the good news of the ark. There was no good news for these sinners who had turned their backs on God.

Jonah did not have a good message for the inhabitants of Nineveh. When he finally got to the city with God's message, "...He cried out and said, 'Ye forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!' Upon hearing this, the king issued a decree that all should fast and mourn, & the mighty and the lowly repented. The thing that brought change was not good news, it was bad news!"

Preaching Jesus Christ is not all good news. Along with the message of God's love and grace comes the warning that He will return! In flaming fire taking vengeance on those who do not know God, and on those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ." (II Thess. 1:8) Attempts at watering down such warnings merely diminish the effects of the good news of the gospel. If people do not realize that they are lost, they will not appreciate being saved.

arrived until after lunch. It is hoped that this year there will be a record number attending the reunion.

This year will see some family members rejoicing in births of new descendants and some of the family members grieving for those lost in death. All members sharing a part of their lives with others who are of a common lineage and heritage. The day will include lots of good food and the Millard Nagle Silver Dollar Pitching Tournament which will begin soon after lunch. All extended family members and friends are encouraged to join in the visiting and fun for the rest of the Sunday afternoon.

Drive With Heed This Labor Day

While many Mississippians relax during the Labor Day weekend, the Mississippi Highway Patrol will be working double duty in an effort to keep from having a repeat of last year's 19 deaths resulting from motor vehicle crashes. Not since the Fourth of July holiday in 1978 have 19 people been killed in motor vehicle crashes in Mississippi during a holiday period.

Two federal grants will pay for troopers to work up to 936 extra manhours through the 78-hour Labor Day holiday. "Troopers will be looking for speeding motorists, drivers under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DUI), expired inspection stickers, expired drivers' licenses, and motor vehicles with improper or expired license plates," according to Lt. Col. Billie T. Hughes, chief of the Highway Patrol's uniformed division.

Troopers will conduct two informal surveys to determine the current safety belt usage rate among drivers of automobiles. The surveys will be held at 10 prime locations across the state during the week prior to and the week during the Labor Day holiday. Also, for the first time, troopers will issue "warning" tickets to drivers who are not buckled up.

Commissioner of Public Safety Louisa O. Dixon has made safety one of the patrol's top priorities and has identified increased safety belt usage as a primary means of achieving

safety on Mississippi roadways. She has adopted the national goal of 70 percent safety belt usage among drivers in Mississippi by the end of 1992.

A special federal DUI enforcement grant to the Highway Patrol will pay for some extra duty by troopers during the holiday period. Last year Highway Patrol officers made 135 DUI arrests during the Labor Day holiday. "With the use of camcorders in patrol vehicles, troopers have better documentation of erratic driving behavior," said Hughes. In 1989 there were 262 DUI arrests made and 293 in 1988.

Another grant providing for extra manhours during the Labor Day period to apprehend speeding motorists will pay troopers to work on what would ordinarily be their days off duty. The number of speeding citations issued during Labor Day weekend declined from 3,956 written in 1988, to 2,264 in 1989 and 2,119 in 1990.

"We believe that a decline in the number of citations issued indicates that more people are obeying the speed laws and know that they are subject to being cited. We hope the increased enforcement will lessen the number of motor vehicle crashes and fatalities. The 1990 Labor Day holiday ended with 13 motor vehicle crashes and 19 fatalities. Nine deaths resulted from seven crashes on county roads which includes one pedestrian; three on city streets; and seven, including a pedestrian, on state and federal highways. Including the pedestrians, 14 of the people were killed in 11 one-car crashes and five were killed in two two-car crashes," stated Hughes.

He emphasized, "Driving within the speed limit and keeping alert can help prevent motor vehicle crashes. Using safety belts can prevent serious injuries and deaths. In Mississippi, only rural portions of interstates 10, 20, 55 and 59 have a 65 mph posted speed limit. Other posted speeds are 55 mph or less."

Hughes said, "Careless drivers need to be aware that the speed of a vehicle involved in a crash usually determines the severity of the injuries received. The patrol will be using aircraft from its Air Operations Unit, the camcorders, the motorcycle brigade, and non-traditional patrol vehicles in addition to the regular enforcement cars. New Mustangs and some confiscated vehicles used by the Highway Patrol will be on the roads, making it difficult for law violators to recognize them easily."

The Labor Day holiday begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 30 and ends at midnight Monday, September 2.

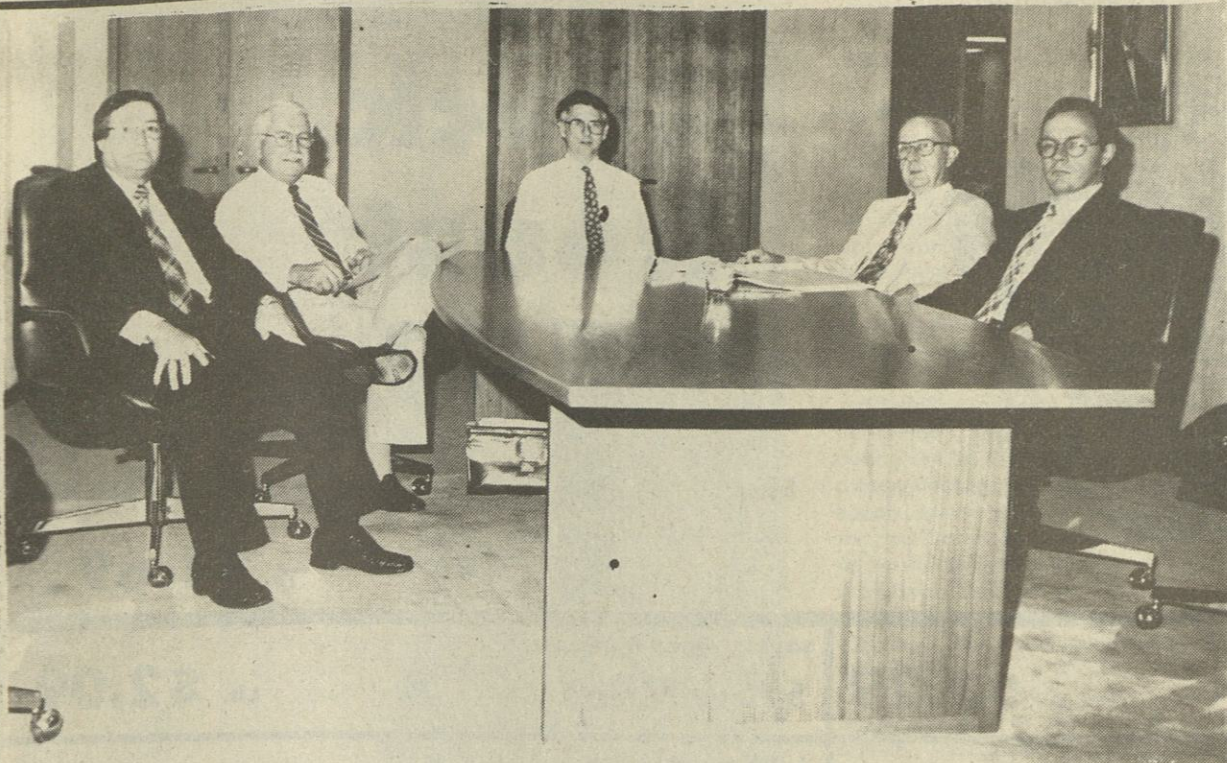

ASCS Farm News

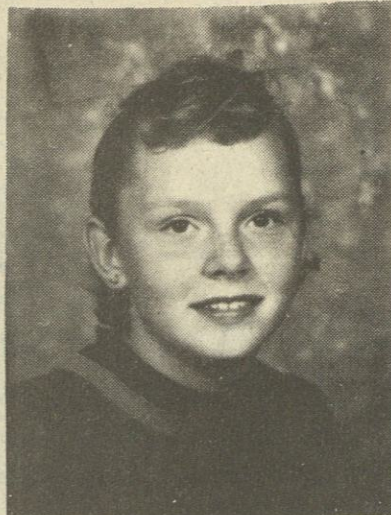
Some farmers in Tishomingo County have not filed a crop report this year, Phillip Horn, County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. The deadline for farmers to report their 1991 planted acres was August 1, 1991.

"Late-filed crop and land use acreage reports will be accepted as long as the producer pays the cost of verifying the acreage report," said Horn, "and there is physical evidence of the crop or land's use."

ASCS uses crop reports to determine program compliance and to document crop acreage bases. Before receiving price support loans, deficiency payments and other farm program benefits, farmers must report crops and acreages planted, the uses to be made of these crops, and cropland acres devoted to conservation uses. "This report is mandatory for program participants because without it, farmers are not eligible for benefits on their 1991 program crops." The ASCS official said the acreage report governs the level at which farmers are eligible for program payments and other benefits.

Farmers who do not submit a crop report will be credited with 0 plantings for their future crop acreage base.

Preliminary certification results indicate that 233 farm operators in Tishomingo County have reported their acreages and are eligible for 1991 farm program benefits.

night at 6:30.

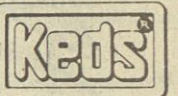
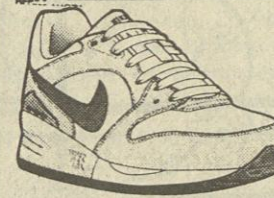

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE GAS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF IMPROVING, REPAIRING AND EXTENDING THE GAS SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "Municipality"), acting for and on behalf of the Municipality, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates and declares as follows:

1. It is necessary and advisable and in the best interest of the Municipality and its inhabitants to issue gas system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) to raise money for the purpose of improving, repairing and extending the gas system of the City of Iuka, Mississippi for which purpose there are no other available funds on hand.

2. The Governing Body has employed Cook-Coggin Engineers, Inc., a competent engineering firm, to study the System, determine the nature and extent of the improvements, repairs and extensions necessary thereto, and make an estimate of the cost thereof.

3. Said engineers have determined the nature and extent of the necessary improvements, repairs and extensions to the System and have made an estimate of the cost thereof, which estimate is the aggregate amount of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000).

4. Said improvements, repairs and extensions are necessary, are economically feasible and would be in the public interest and of benefit to the Municipality, and the findings of said engineers are hereby adopted, including the estimate of the costs of said improvements, repairs and extensions.

5. Under the provisions of Sections 21-27-11 through 21-27-69, Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"), the Municipality is authorized to make such improvements, repairs and extensions and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by and through the issuance of bonds, the principal and interest of and on which shall be payable from the revenues of the System.

6. A sum not exceeding One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) must be provided and raised by the issuance of special obligation bonds in said amount, payable both as to principal and interest from the revenues of the System, as authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Governing Body does hereby declare its intention to issue gas system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) to raise money for the purpose of improving, repairing and extending the gas system of the City of Iuka, Mississippi.

SECTION 2. Said bonds in the amount, for the purpose and secured as aforesaid will be authorized to be issued at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at the City Hall on September 3, 1991, at 7:00 o'clock P.M., which date so fixed will be more than ten (10) days after the third date of publication of this resolution, as directed by Section 3 hereof. If a petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of the Municipality be filed objecting to and protesting the issuance of such revenue bond issue on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then an election on the question of the issuance of such bonds shall be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, and may be sold under the regular procedure for selling such bonds.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the Municipality, and being a qualified newspaper under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, the last such publication to be more than ten (10) days prior to the date specified in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 4. The Clerk of the Municipality shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of publication of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 2 hereof.

Alderman Buddy James seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:

"Artist Of The Month"
Nelda McRae

The Tishomingo County Fine Arts Guild, Incorporated has chosen Nelda McRae as its August, 1991 "Artist of the Month." Nelda joined the Art Guild in November, 1990 at the annual Tri-State Art Fair held at the Tishomingo County Fairgrounds.

Nelda was born in Prentiss County, Mississippi. As a child, her exposure to art was limited to coloring books and crayons. She not only colored the pictures, but also traced the pictures from her books and colored them. Other children made caricature drawings of people, but she found that difficult at the time and decided to stick to crayon work.

Nelda received her secondary school education from Holcut High School, from which she graduated in 1953. She later attended Northeast Mississippi Junior College beginning in 1962 after marrying and starting a family. Her dormant interest in art was sparked when, as a college requirement, she needed a credit in art. She chose a drawing class in order to satisfy that requirement. Her instructors were Mr. and Mrs. Patrick, who she remembers fondly as a great encouragement to her in her newly activated desire to draw. In her

drawing class, she felt that the other students were superior to her in their abilities, so the natural thing to do under those circumstances was to follow the Patrick's instructions to the letter. When she followed their directions closely, she found that she was able to draw what she wanted to. She also learned what she knows about drawing by the trial-and-error method.

After completing her drawing class at Northeast, Nelda decided that she could also learn to paint. Lila Ham of luka was where she turned for her initial painting classes. Due to her other studies and rigorous personal schedule, she decided that short art workshops would be more practical than weekly lessons. Her painting studies continued with an oil, watercolor, and pastel class with Norma Dennison of Jackson State Community College. Jewel Helton of Corinth taught her the Bill Alexander method of oil painting. Sherrie Barrett of Corinth contributed more oil techniques to Nelda's background. George Shook of Memphis added his skills to her watercolor abilities.

In May of 1991, Nelda began a watercolor class under the direction of Oneta Cole of Booneville, which she continues to enjoy at present. She also benefited from a watercolor

and acrylic workshop in July, 1991 with Norma Dennison of Jackson State Community College.

Nelda was proud to receive a 1st place blue ribbon for her painting "The Old Home Place" at the Tombigbee Waterway Festival Art Exhibit in July of this year in the "Oils" Division. She exhibits a special fondness for landscape paintings, especially trees. She also enjoys old buildings in her artwork. She is also proud of her husband, Alvis, and their children Kirby, Marcia, and Lisa.

Is Chronic Fatigue Syndrome a Disease?

Within the last few years, a condition referred to as "chronic fatigue syndrome" has been described in the medical literature. According to recent articles, there is debate as to whether or not this is a disease. The debate revolves around its cause, how to diagnose it, and how it should be treated. On one side are experts who claim that the condition may not exist at all. An equal number of experts seem to point to a health problem with sudden onset in previously otherwise healthy individuals. According to these experts, people of all ages, occupations, and income are affected, with women experiencing the condition more often than men or children.

It is speculated that some type of virus causes the victim to become very tired. Bed rest may not help. The fatigue may be so severe as to cause the person's normal activity level to be less than half of what it was for the previous six months. There may be mild fever, sore throat, muscle weakness, joint pain, and sleep disturbances. One of the most common symptoms of chronic fatigue syndrome is mental depression. Treatment of chronic fatigue syndrome varies with symptoms. Prescription antidepressant medicines have helped a number of individuals. Other treatments may become apparent as we learn more about this interesting, yet poorly described condition.

County Agent's Notes

FALL GARDENING

Fall gardening is the way to have fresh vegetables right into winter. Many fall gardens are carried over from summer gardens. Tomato plants, okra, pepper and eggplant, if cared for during the summer, continue to produce until cold slows them down and frost kills them. To keep these vegetables producing, control insects and diseases, keep the plants watered and fertilized, and don't let the garden grow up in grass and weeds. A good fall garden, however, is not just keeping the summer garden alive. It means planting new vegetables to produce in fall and early winter.

Plan the fall garden at the same time you plan the spring and summer garden. Include your seed needs for fall when ordering seed for the spring and summer garden. It helps to have the seed on hand so it can be planted at the appropriate time.

Many cool-weather vegetables normally planted in spring grow and produce better in the fall, since they mature as the weather cools. When wet weather causes a delay in planting early spring vegetables past a time when they can be expected to mature before hot weather destroys them, a fall garden provides a second opportunity. Chinese cabbage (very sensitive to heat) and rutabaga (requires a long period of cool weather) are two cool-weather

vegetables recommended for planting only in the fall.

Warm-season vegetables planted in mid-summer for fall harvest require additional time to mature as the weather cools in September and October. Choose planting dates in mid-summer that permit these vegetables to mature before frost.

YOUNG PLANTS

The hot, dry weather in July, August, and September is hard on germinating seeds and young seedlings. Germination and seedling survival is improved if one of these methods is used:

*Water a day or two before planting so seeds are planted in moist soil. Watering after planting can cause the soil surface to pack and crust.

*Plant seed in moist soil and cover with moistened, non-crusting materials; a mix of peat moss and vermiculite, or composed sawdust and sand. Keep surface moist during

germination and seedling establishment.

Plant three to five seeds of the small-seeded vegetables such as broccoli and cabbage at the recommended final plant spacing in the garden row. Once the seedlings are established, thin the seedlings to one plant at each location.
