### Steve Rye Announces For Constable North Half

I truly believe that I am qualified to hold the office of constable because of my educational background and experience. Being retired also gives me an edge over my opponents because I can devote my full time to the duties of this office.

The job of constable is not a job that should be taken lightly. When

you have papers that need to be served, you don't want to wait four or five weeks for someone to serve them. I promise you that if I am elected to this office that my first priority will be to get your papers served and served quickly.

If elected, I am for keeping the courthouse open one-half day on Saturday for the working people of this county to conduct their business.

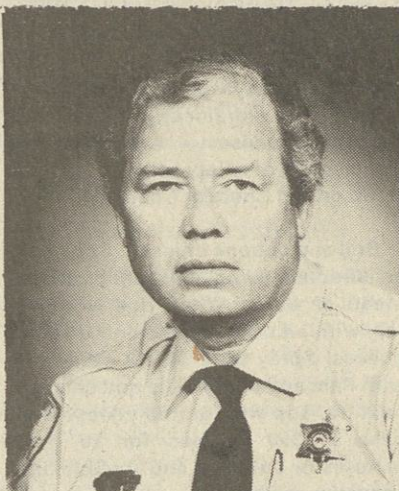
As your Supervisor, I will do everything I can to bring industry to the second district. I will also work to continue improving our educational system and work for improved health care facilities.

## Iuka Man Killed In 2-Car Crash

An elderly Iuka man was killed in a two-vehicle accident that took place over Labor Day Holidays.

James E. Fowler, 68, known as "Pap" was killed Saturday, August 31, 1991 when the small pick-up he was driving was struck by a car driven by Larry Nelson, 54 of Cherokee. Fowler was headed north on Airport Road and Nelson was going East on 72 when the wreck occurred. No seatbelts were being used by either driver as was reported by Mississippi Highway Patrolman Rickie Marlar. Nelson received lacerations to the head and was treated and released from the hospital.

Mr. Fowler was a retired welder and an Army Veteran of World War II.

Services were at 10 a.m. Tuesday at McPeters Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Russell Hamm officiating. Burial was in the Corinth National Cemetery.

Survivors include one daughter, Cynthia Head of California; two sons, Eldridge L. Fowler and James K. Fowler, both of Inglis, FL; one sister, Louise Ray of Dallas, Texas; three brothers, the Rev. J.W. Fowler of Corinth, Bobby Lee Fowler of Mobile, AL, and Billy Dan Fowler of Chicago; five grandchildren.

## Home Economics Tips

HELP YOUR HEART  
NO BUTTS ABOUT IT:  
YOU SHOULDN'T SMOKE

Getting rid of an old flame isn't easy, but cigarette smoking is a habit worth snuffing out. Let's look at the facts:

- About 435,000 Americans die yearly from disorders directly related to smoking - such as heart disease, emphysema and lung cancer.

- Pack-a-day smokers are more than twice as likely to have a heart attack as non-smokers. The earlier you start smoking, the greater your risk of heart attack.

- A woman who smokes and uses birth control pills is up to 39 times more likely to have a heart attack than one who does neither. She's up to 22 times more likely to have a stroke than a woman who neither smokes nor uses birth control pills.

Smoking is a health hazard to you and even to non-smokers who are clouded in sidestream smoke, says

the American Heart Association.

Your body responds instantly to the chemicals in the smoke while you puff. Nicotine can increase your blood pressure, heart rate, and the flow of blood from your heart. It also causes your arteries to narrow and harden. Carbon monoxide reduces the amount of oxygen the blood can carry. This, combined with the effects produced by nicotine, causes a shortage of oxygen in your blood.

Cigarette smoking increases the development of arteriosclerosis, which occurs when fatty deposits, cholesterol and other substances build up in the inner walls of the arteries. This narrows and hardens the blood vessels. Cigarette smoking also causes the platelets in your blood to stick together and clot sooner. Clogged arteries are a major cause of heart attack and stroke. If you already have high blood cholesterol and high blood pressure, smoking will increase your risk of heart attack even more.

But there's good news. No matter how long or how much you've smoked, your risk of heart disease rapidly drops when you quit. Ten

years after ending a pack-a-day habit, your risk of death from heart disease is almost the same as for people who never smoked.

Not only that, you'll miss fewer work days because of smoking related health problems. You'll save time and money spent on the habit. And you'll reduce the risk of heart and lung diseases for others in your family.

In short, some damage from long-term heavy smoking can't be reversed. But the health benefits are both instant and cumulative when you stop.

So put out the flames before smoking puts you out. Contact your doctor or nearest American Heart Association office. They've got information to help you strike up a plan to quit.

## CHICKEN-WILD RICE SUPREME

1 package Uncle Ben's wild rice mix  
1 chicken, boiled and deboned  
1 can sliced water chestnuts  
1 can French style green beans (drained)  
1 cup mayonnaise  
1 can cream of celery soup  
1 cup grated Cheddar Cheese

Boil and debone chicken. Cook rice as directed using chicken broth instead of water. When rice is done, mix with all other ingredients except cheese. Spray 9x13 or 9x9 casserole with Pam and pour in rice and chicken mixture. Top with grated cheese and bake at 350 degrees for 20 - 30 minutes or until hot and bubbly and cheese is melted.

## County Agent's Notes

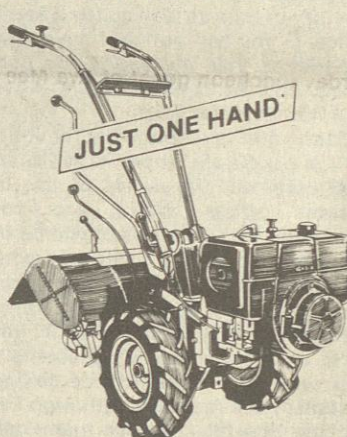
### A SAFE HARVEST

Even if the crop is a bumper one in Tishomingo County, it's still a bust if someone is hurt while trying to harvest. Make safety a priority, from the first swath until the last kernel is dropped in the bin.

Read and heed the words-to-the-wise in safety manuals and instructions. Equipment should be serviced and repaired before starting, not after it's already in the field. Check fuel lines, filter and other systems for leaks and potential malfunctions. Train new workers so they know

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proper procedures for safe operation of equipment. Many accidents occur during the first few days of harvest, so be especially careful while getting harvesting equipment to function.

Remember to wear the appropriate protective clothing to reduce injury and health risk. Take occasional breaks to fight fatigue. You'll have more energy and better concentration. You'll find you can work longer hours without feeling the added strain.

## TOMATO DISEASES

Tomatoes can be susceptible to several diseases this fall. Be on the lookout for signs of infection in your tomato plants.

Tomato spotted wilt is a disease caused by a virus carried by thrips. Infected plants usually have small, dark dead spots on young leaves. They may have blackened shoots and purple streaks on leaves, stems and fruit.

The virus causes the plant to produce fruit that is smaller in size and distorted in shape. Removal of diseased plants, good weed control and insecticide use are recommended control procedures for home gardens.

Root-knot nematodes are microscopic, worm-like creatures that produce knots or galls on roots of tomato plants.

Plants affected by root-knot nematodes may be yellowish and stunted. Their tomato production usually slackens.

The best control for these nematodes is to plant resistant varieties such as Better Boy, Big Seven, and Celebrity.

Resistant varieties can cut down the chances of fusarium wilt disease. The lower leaves wilt first when the tomato plant becomes infected. Wilting and yellowing may occur on one branch at a time. A brown discoloration can be found when such branches are cut open.

## SOIL SAMPLES

Now is a good time to take soil samples for next spring's fertilizer applications. The growing season is

over, the laboratories are not full, and there will be time to shop for the best prices on fertilizer. MOST IMPORTANTLY, there is time to apply limestone and have it react before next spring if it is needed.

### FIRST PAIR OF GLASSES

If you've just begun wearing glasses, you have probably noticed that you are not conspicuous at all. Many people wear glasses, either full-time or for reading, in fact, over one half the population (more than 110 million) Americans do. Also, once they start wearing glasses, they realize that the initial prescription is not intended to last a lifetime.

As you grow older, a great many changes take place in your body, and that includes your eyes. For example, if you have just begun wearing glasses as an aid to reading or working with close figures, the problem may be a weakening in your eyes' near-focusing muscles. This is a normal process of aging. By the time most people reach middle-age, these muscles are not as strong as they used to be. Their vision begins to blur when they read or they suffer from eyestrain and headaches when they read for long periods.

But that first weakness doesn't stop there. As time goes by, your eyes will probably need more help. That's why periodic eye examinations are recommended.

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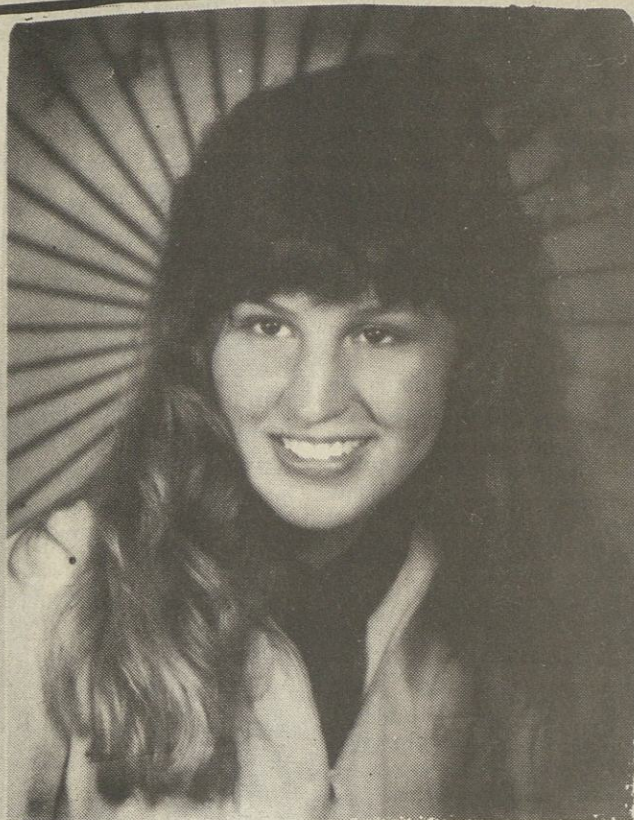

## Dobbs-----

War. I am an honorably discharged veteran. I am a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and I say thanks to all who have served and died for our great country.

I have experience in law enforcement with the City of Iuka, and the county. I have three years and eight months on the job training as your Sheriff. You have taught me well. I have served you well by returning credibility to your Sheriff's Office. The opportunity of being caught had vanished from the county and has now been restored.

Let me point out some of the accomplishments of the last three years and eight months. Records, that can be checked by anyone who wishes, are on file. There has been approximately two hundred and fifty six felony indictments by the various grand juries. Felony indictments are those for which you can receive penitentiary time. There has been a hundred and seventy four drug cases, ninety one of these being felony cases. Several of these are for growing marijuana, cocaine, etc. Offenders have been sentenced for long terms to serve in the penitentiary, as much as ten, fifteen, and thirty years. All can be checked at the Circuit Clerk's Office. There has been several convictions for murder with long sentences handed down by the courts. There has been sixty five felony indictments for burglary or breaking and entering, four for arson, ten for embezzlement, sixty three for grand larceny, and thirteen for sexual crimes. The public jail docket reveals the following arrests: three hundred sixty one DUI's, three hundred eighty eight public drunks, two hundred fifty two for possession of beer, ninety four for possession of whiskey, and five hundred ten warrants have been served by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department which includes bad check warrants. Thirty one have been

arrested for concealed weapons, thirty seven for reckless driving, one hundred forty five for assault, sixteen for malicious mischief, sixty seven for disturbance, nine for petit larceny and thirty two for disorderly conduct. Your old jailhouse is being used. Your county sheriff and sheriff's department with four deputies has been busy. There has been hundreds of thousands of dollars of stolen merchandise recovered and returned to the rightful owners. This includes vehicles, that have been reported stolen as well as household merchandise. County units have patrolled all areas of the county including alleys and streets after the rash of drug store burglaries in the cities. Your sheriff's department has helped solve some of the crimes and have made drug cases in all the cities in the county.

There are policies and procedures that have been adopted to help insure consistency in the performance of personnel as well as the operation of the jail. Prisoners are fed three times a day from the hospital. They have telephones in their cells, and trustees provide ice water and cokes when the request is made by the inmate. They are taken outside when weather permits during visiting hours each week. Members of the clergy are allowed anytime before 11 p.m. in the evening. Any and all medical needs of the inmates are adhered to. All constitutional rights are also adhered to. This department works closely with all agencies, including the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, the Mississippi Highway Patrol, all cities and towns and all enforcement agencies, county, federal, or state. There are ongoing investigations into drugs, as well as other crimes.

As I stated before, credibility has been returned to law enforcement with the Sheriff's Department. I am asking you now to add stability. I need your vote. I need your support and most of all, Ladies and Gentlemen, I need your prayers. Thank you very much. LET'S KEEP THE RIGHT MAN ON THE JOB.

## ASRM Insulation Materials Tested

The team of Lockheed and Aerojet has completed the second in a series of ten sub-scale motor firings designed to test various materials and components for NASA's new Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM) for the Space Shuttle.

The purpose of the test, conducted August 27, at 8:30 p.m. at the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center was to:

- Evaluate the insulating characteristics of a new non-asbestos Kevlar-filled ethylene propylene diene monomer (EPDM) rubber-based materials that will provide thermal protection to the inner wall of the reusable motor case. Candidate materials from four potential suppliers are being evaluated in this and future tests.

- Perform a similar evaluation of a kevlar-filled propellant grain inhibitor which prevents combustion between the motor segment joints. Later tests

will evaluate forward-facing, castable inhibitors.

- Gather additional data on the ballistic characteristics of the propellant. The formula used in the sub-scale tests is a derivative of the high energy, hydroxy-terminated polybutadiene (HTPB) propellant that will power the full-scale ASRM.

The test hardware consisted of a 48" rocket motor loaded with two cartridges of ASRM propellant (approximately 10,000 pounds). The propellant grain inhibitor was fitted to one end of each cartridge. A ten-foot long blast tube assembly, lined with the motor case insulation, was connected to the nozzle end of the motor. Duration of the motor burn was approximately 30 seconds.

Of the ten planned 48" motor tests, five will primarily evaluate insulation materials, and five will primarily support development of the ASRM nozzle.

## Hill Brothers Awarded Contract

Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart has announced the awarding of a contract for erosion control on the back slopes of Highway 350 in Tishomingo County.

Hill Brothers Construction Co. Inc. of Falkner, MS was awarded the contract with the low bid of \$22,550.00.

Stewart said motorists may encounter one lane traffic where trucks enter and leave the work site.

He said the project is to repair the back slopes where washes have occurred on Highway 350 between the Alcorn County Line and Highway 25.

The commissioner asked motorists to observe all construction advisory signs while driving through the project.

The completion date for the project is October 1991.

## MAE Endorses Biggers

The Mississippi Association of Educators (MAE) has endorsed Jo Ann Biggers for State Senator of District 4 in the Mississippi Senate.

"It is time for a change in the Mississippi Legislature," said Joyce Arceneaux, President of the MAE. Mississippi Association of Educators, the largest teachers' organization in the state, has over 13,000 members.

## Federal Funds Awarded Mississippi To Fight Drug Abuse

Gov. Ray Mabus announced today that Mississippi has been awarded \$4,855,000 in federal funds for anti-drug efforts under the Drug Control and System Improvement Grant Program. The funding will be used for programs throughout the state aimed at eliminating illegal use of narcotics and combating drug abuse.

"Improving and enhancing drug control efforts are vital to Mississippi's

well-being and the state's future," Mabus said. "These funds will assist us in our efforts to stem the flow of illegal drugs in the state and provide educational efforts that prevent drug abuse."

The grant program was established by Congress under the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988 to assist states and localities in carrying out programs which improve the criminal justice system and enhance drug control efforts. The department of Public Safety's Division of Public Safety Planning will administer the funds in Mississippi.

"The federal funds, along with the cooperation we receive from other state agencies and local law enforcement officials, will help our ongoing campaign to prevent drugs from destroying the lives of Mississippians," said Roy Thigpen, director of the Division of Public Safety Planning.

Programs to be funded in Mississippi are:

- \*Multi-jurisdictional task forces formed by state and local units of government to combat drug trafficking and abuse. Each participating law enforcement agency contributes personnel and other resources to coordinate the drug-control effort.

- \*Crime prevention programs that inspire communities and other groups to work together in strengthening the state's defenses against crime and drug abuse.

- \*Programs that complement crime-prevention activities by providing assistance to victims of crime, witnesses and jurors.

- \*Upgrading the Mississippi crime lab to increase the capability of drug analysis.

- \*Expansion of information systems for collecting, coding, analyzing and processing data to facilitate the apprehension and prosecution of offenders. This expansion also will promote better state and local cooperation and coordination of drug and violent crime enforcement efforts.

- \*Development of a drug prosecution center to assist local jurisdictions with assets, seizures and forfeitures and with the prosecution of major drug cases.

- \*A jail capacity management program providing alternatives to incarceration for offenders not requiring imprisonment to assure that there is adequate jail space for more serious offenders.

- \*Programs designed to provide additional public correctional resources and improve the corrections system. These include treatment in prisons and jails, intensive supervision programs, long-range corrections and sentencing strategies and programs

which identify and meet the treatment needs of adult and juvenile drug-dependent and alcohol-dependent offenders.

\*The Drug Abuse Resistance Education Program (DARE), a cooperative effort between law enforcement agencies and targeted school districts to teach elementary students to say "no" to drugs, build self esteem, manage stress, resist pro-drug media messages and develop other skills to remain drug free.

\*Enforcement programs targeting street drug sales in urban areas.

\*Drug control evaluation programs which state and local units of government may utilize to evaluate programs and projects directed at state drug-control activities.

## Job Talk

Q. I am about to graduate from college. I wonder if I should take a few months off to take a trip before getting into the job market, or should I get right to the job of finding a job?

A. Even if you are under no economic pressure to find a job quickly, starting your search promptly is a wise policy. A delay may hurt your chances of finding the job you want. A. If you are unemployed through no fault of your own, such as lack of work or inclement weather, and you

are otherwise eligible, you could receive unemployment insurance benefits. Check your local Unemployment Insurance office to be sure.

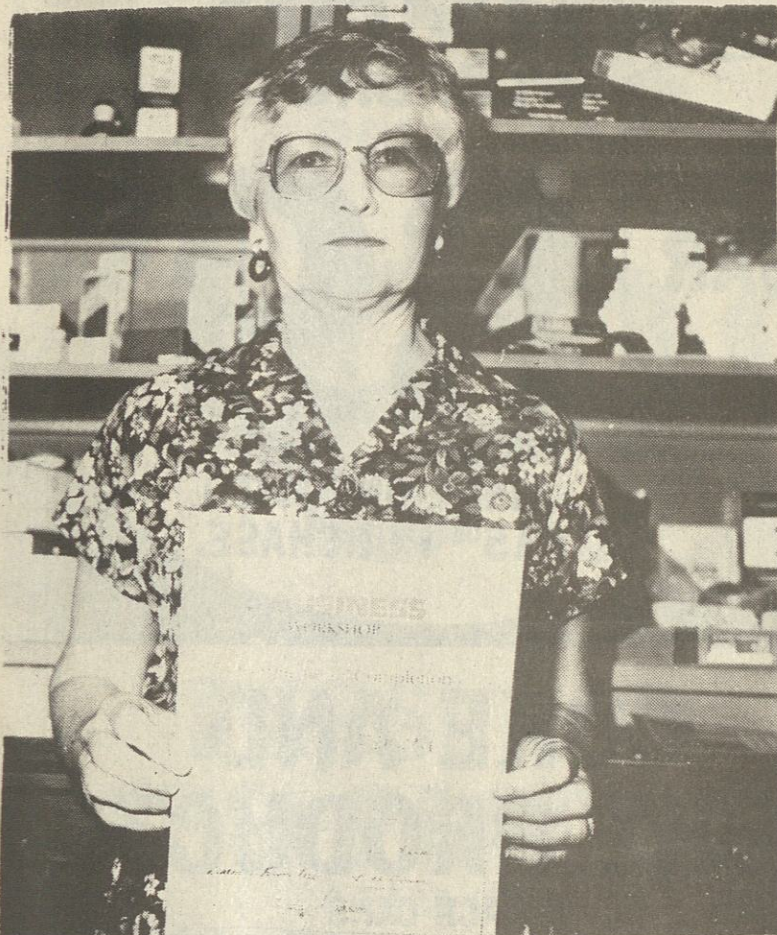

sold it for only about half of its value. Your friend also did not have a timber sale contract to protect the remaining trees and land. The end result was land in need of additional work because of a poor harvesting job.

It wasn't long before your neighbor realized that he only received a portion of what his timber was worth. It was also apparent to him that the logging job left the land in terrible condition. He is extremely upset, and the last thing he wants is to let the whole world know he messed up.

Therefore, when you ask him for advice on making a timber sale, he has two options. He can admit to his shortcomings and the disaster that followed, or he can put you on the same path of destruction. Ego and pride dictate his advice, and he will lead you into the same predicament.

Barber shop advice can literally cost landowners thousands of dollars in lost timber sale revenues, and possibly many thousands of dollars for regeneration. This same scenario can occur in any facet of forest management, including reforestation, thinning, prescribed burning and harvest cutting.

In every case, the landowners are the ones who lose because they tried to cut corners and expenses with barber shop advice.

A well-managed forest is a valuable asset to landowners. It should always be managed using professional foresters and the most up-to-date research available. Many forest landowners have practically thrown away their timber because they didn't know what they had or what they needed to do. The information they needed, however, was as close as the telephone.

Don't manage your forest with barber shop advice. Use the services of professional foresters who have been trained in the art and science of forest management. Simply call your local county forester from the Mississippi Forestry Commission, or your local county extension agent.

Smart business owners know their limitations and seek professional help when needed.

The seminars are designed to provide and update procedural information to help electronic filers meet and maintain the legal and technical requirements to participate in the electronic filing program.

Topics to be discussed at each seminar include eligibility requirements; advertising standards; transmission testing; recordkeeping; direct deposit; refund inquiries; forms and schedules that can/cannot be transmitted electronically; etc. There will also be a question and answer period to address other specific problems or questions.

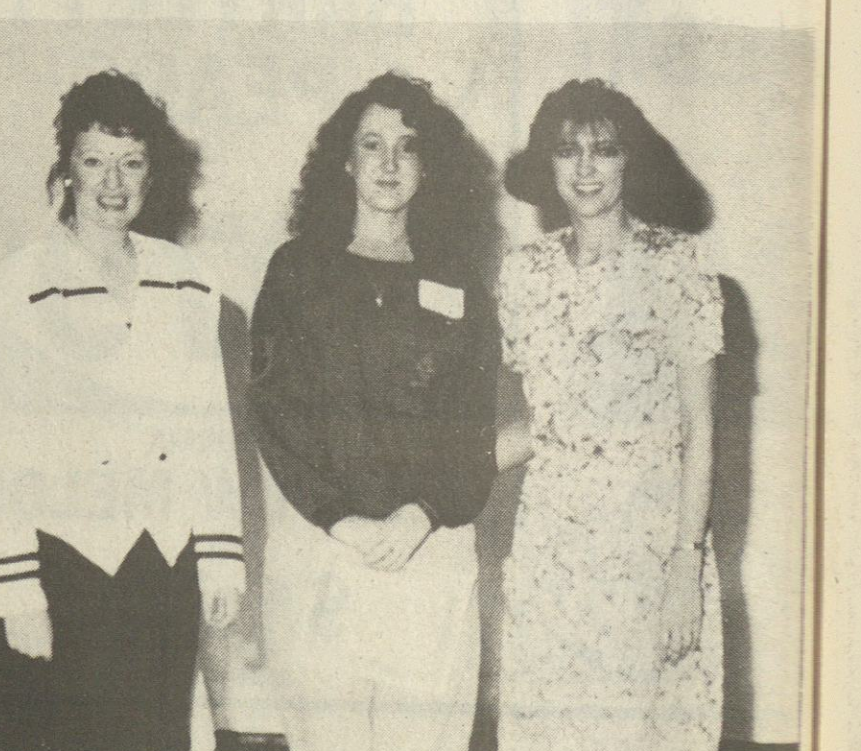

### Costs Our Landowners More Than It's Worth

The old-fashioned barber shop is an American tradition in many parts of the United States, especially in the deep South.

The Andy Griffith television series portrayed the barber shop of the South most accurately. It wasn't just a place to get a haircut, but a time to gather, socialize and keep abreast of what was happening in the community. One only had to visit the barber shop to find out about anything and everything.

The term "barber shop advice" was coined over the years because someone at the barber shop could always tell a person how, when and where to do almost anything. Most of the time this advice was based on mere gossip instead of facts.

Barber shop advice today refers to anyone that will give advice about a topic, even though he or she may not be formally educated about it. In forestry and forest management, this type of advice can be the most dangerous and expensive advice Mississippi landowners can get.

Suppose you are a forest landowner about to make a timber sale. Instead of obtaining the services of a trained forester, you ask your neighbor, who just sold his timber, how to best go about selling your timber.

Your neighbor is a person with the normal ego and pride of most people. He only contacted two buyers when he sold his timber. Consequently he

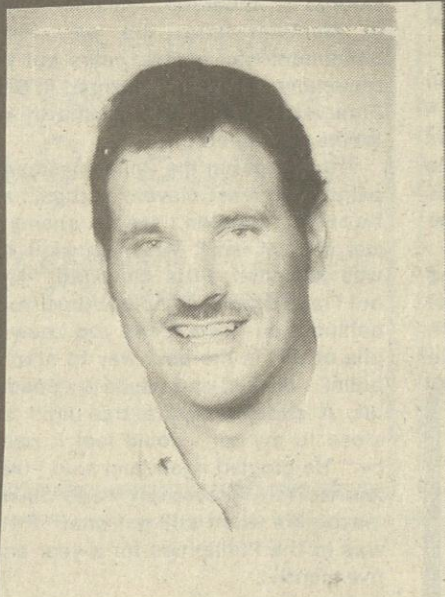

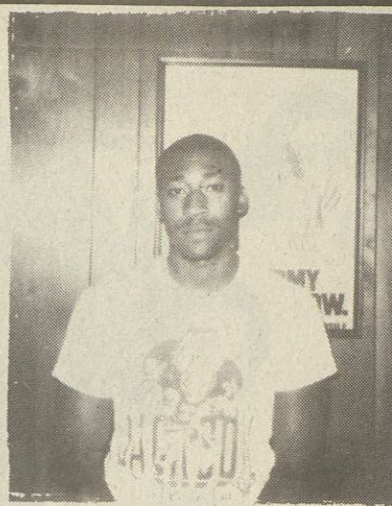

### 4-H Communications

Children, Parents, and Teachers  
A Winning Team For Education  
There's more to education than just sending a child to school. Parents, teachers, and school administrators need to work as partners

in the educational process.

When these important people work together toward common, specific goals - goals they understand and agree upon - the children come out ahead. If children know that parents, teachers, and school administrators all value them as people, want them to learn all they can, and that they will keep close check on their progress, they are motivated to do their best.

To give children the support they deserve, there must be good communication between homes and schools. PTO meetings and parent-teacher conferences offer opportunities to get to know each other by sight, but that is only a beginning. There should be frequent exchanges of brief notes or telephone calls to help keep active goodwill and positive exchange of information.

Communication between parents and teachers requires an investment of time, which usually is in short supply, so parents must decide the importance of their child's education. We make time to do what is most important to us.

Set a positive tone at the beginning of school. Send a note to teachers letting them know your work schedule and the times, and the telephone numbers where you can be reached.

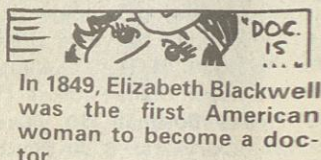
Relate that you would like to know about your child's progress and ask how and when the teacher would like to be contacted. If it is true, tell the teacher that you are glad your child is in his/her room, throughout the year, let school personnel know when

you are pleased with something one of them has done! Be specific. Although many factors contribute to good communication between home and school, the most important aspect is communicating goodwill and a positive attitude.

Be direct and clear in the statements you make. Don't hesitate to ask questions. Each profession has its own language or jargon. Do not be embarrassed about asking what an "I.E.P." or a "cluster" is if these or other unfamiliar terms are used.

If you have time to serve as a volunteer, tell the teacher how much time you can give, your skills, and previous experience. Work out a schedule you can maintain. It is better to keep a weekly commitment than to back out of a daily one.

Address issues when they first arise. Time does heal some problems, but rarely does time solve a school situation. When you have a complaint or concern, discuss it immediately with the person responsible for it, not your friends, who are unable to resolve the issue at hand. Start with the teacher, cafeteria worker, crossing guard, or bus driver...whoever is responsible. Only if the problem cannot be worked out on that level is it appropriate to go to a school administrator.

1960's. One of these interviews is with Mr. M.G. Pitts, a veteran of the Spanish/American War. Mr. Pitts talked about these experiences in a conversation dated August 6, 1989. The following are excerpts from this tape:

Mr. Pitts, a resident of Iuka at the time of the taping, was originally from Saltillo, TN. War was declared in the summer of 1898. Pitts was only seventeen at the time and too young to legally enlist. On the tape, Pitts stated that you had to be 21 to enlist. Mr. Pitts and a few of his friends decided to do the honorable thing when duty called. They lied about their ages on the enlistment papers. Now we know that was not an unusual practice for those times. Many who had never left home longed for adventure, excitement, and a chance to see the world.

Pitts said they left Saltillo for Lexington on a Sunday night in a mule-pulled wagon. The mules gave out about six miles from Lexington because of the sandy roads. The boys walked the rest of the way. They were waiting at the enlistment office when it opened Monday morning and barely made it to the train station enroute to their jumpoff point in San Francisco, the same place they would later be discharged.

Pitts said "The Spanish War probably was fought in Cuba to relieve it from control of Spain." He continued, "so Teddy Roosevelt had to go over there and mop up." When Dr. Coker asked if Pitts had ever seen Teddy Roosevelt, Pitts replied, "Yes, but it was later on with his daughter, Alice, at a political speaking."

Pitts' commanding officer was George S. Anderson. Anderson lived in Memphis after the war. Pitts' enlistment was for two years but he remembered being discharged in San Francisco on June 30, 1899 shortly after the war ended.

Pitts fought in the Philippines campaign in at least eleven "scraps," as he put it. "I couldn't see the enemy; I just shot at 'em." When asked if he was wounded, Pitts chuckled, "No, but I raised my head up one time from behind a dirt trench and you know a pile of dirt is the best way to stop a bullet. I ducked and raised my head a bit. A shot clipped a tree limb so close to my ear I could feel it pass by." He giggled again and said "that learned me to keep my head down, maybe it's why I still got one!" Pitts was in the Philippines for a year and five months.

After the war, Pitts traveled a bit at different times. When asked if he remember when President McKinley was shot, he recalled it vividly. He said a Hughes boy and I had gone out to Texas. We were standing on the railroad platform in Richland, Texas when the station master heard it over the (telephone) wire and went out and told us. Pitts said of McKinley, "he was a fine man and a good president." Pitts favorite president was Teddy Roosevelt. Pitts always voted Republican, right up to Nixon.

Pitts was nearly forty when World War I broke out. He was too old to fight. He had done his job nearly twenty years earlier. Pitts is gone now, so ends that generation of veterans of the Spanish/American War. Contrary to popular belief there are still at least two W.W. I veterans still alive in Tishomingo County. Look for their experiences in future articles.

My thanks to Mrs. Grace Coker and the late Dr. William Coker for this important account of history from someone who was there.

## Byram's Photographs Displayed

Four photographs created by Charles Byram, were recently accepted into the General Collection of the 100th International Exhibition of Professional Photography, held July 14-16 in Dallas.

A native of Tishomingo County, Mr. Byram now resides with his wife, Delyla, in Memphis. She is the daughter of the late Minnie and Elder W.P. Weathers of Paden. Charles is the son of the late C.S. and Mable Byram of Tishomingo.

He began to develop art and photography skills at home near Tishomingo when about 10 years of age. In 1935, Ms. Effie Greene wrote a note at the bottom of his report card. "Charles Owen is an excellent pupil, especially in art and writing. He should be encouraged in art and develop his natural talents." Now, he is a photographic Art Specialist, using airbrush art techniques to restore old photographs. All of his competition entries were in the Art Specialist category.

His titles, Dreaming Thoughtful, Wedding Announcement, Man in Chair, Reflection of Love and more than 2,500 other photographic works constitute the world's largest annual exhibit of professional photography gathered simultaneously under one roof. More than 6,000 entries submitted to Professional Photographers of America, Inc. (PP of A) for entry into the exhibition were judged by 70 eminent photographers.

Mr. Byram made his first effort in competition at The Tennessee Professional Photographers Convention in Nashville last April. The print entitled "Man in Chair", was voted "Best of Show" for the state competition in the Artist category. This print also received an 89 at the PP of A national judging. His work earned him the title of "Artist of the Year" for the State of Tennessee, and "First Timer" Award for the State of Tennessee all six of his entries received a merit at the state level.

He sent four of these entries on to the national level and in recognition of his achievement, PP of A awarded him a merit certificate for each entry accepted into the collection, which can be applied toward the Master of Photography Degree granted by the association.

Founded in 1880, PP of A is the world's oldest and largest association for professional photographers. The organization provides educational services and establishes standards of professional performances for its more than 17,000 individual members and 214 affiliated organizations worldwide.

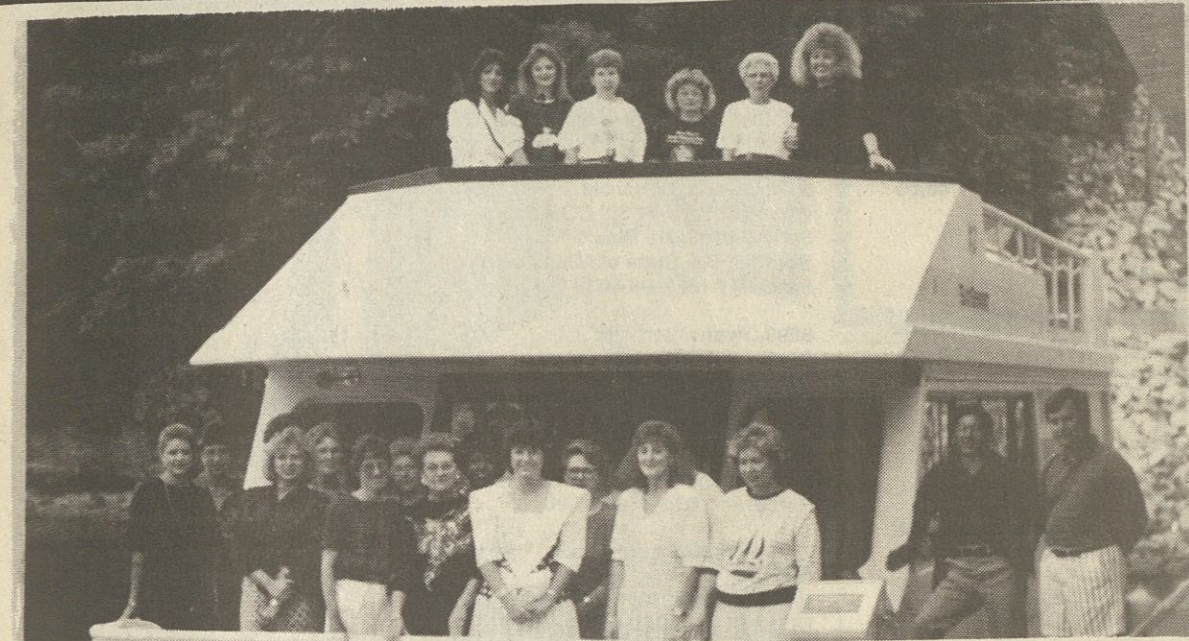

## SOIL CONSERVATION

Late Summer and Fall is a good time to do many types of pasture improvement. These include: 1. liming; 2. fertilizing; 3. preparing land; 4. planting fall seeded forages.

Lime - Many Mississippi soils need lime for good forage production. Most forages grow best at a soil pH of 6 or above. Even though grasses may grow at a lower pH, lime is needed for many acid soils for efficient use of applied fertilizer. Several forages can be planted during September and October. These include ryegrass, the small grains, annual clovers and mixtures of these. Even though bahiagrass does not germinate until the following Spring, seed may be added with these Fall seeded forages.

September and October is the best time to seed tall fescue.

Several varieties of tall fescue may be available for seeding his Fall. Just make sure the seed tag shows 0 percent Endophyte, meaning the seed are free of fungus that badly affects cattle performance. Where possible prepare a good seedbed and remove as much competition as possible to allow this grass to establish. Research and farmer experience is showing that fescue without the fungus requires more attention in establishing and maintaining good stands that did the old fungus infested fescue. Especially, make sure not to overgraze and abuse during establishment if good thick perennial

stands are desired.

## Repot Plants Before Cold Weather Arrives

House plants are a vast group of foliage and flowering plants and small trees that typically aren't frost hardy that plant lovers keep in their homes during winter and outside during summer. At this time of year, these plants are frequently on patios or decks or the pots are set in shady borders.

As the day and night temperatures begin to drop in the next few weeks, thoughts will turn to bringing these plants back indoors where generally the only good feature is that they are protected from freezing.

So, rather than being killed by cold temperatures, these plants are forced to endure well-intentioned over-watering, low light, dust and desert dry air. Many don't endure for long. Their roots rot; their leaves turn yellow and fall off; and eventually, they die.

While it's not time to bring plants indoors, it is time to consider repotting. Many indoor plants thrive in their garden environment and grow new roots, put on new leaves, some flower and many wind up in need of a larger pot. When root systems increase, soil is displaced until in some cases there is little soil left in a pot

cramped with roots.

Repotting house plants isn't a difficult chore unless the plant is a cactus covered with thorns, and then it becomes a "sticky affair." There is a tendency to move plants into pots that are larger than they ought to be. In most cases the new pot doesn't need to be more than 1 inch larger in diameter than the existing pot.

Be sure the new pot has a hole in the bottom to allow water to drain. Porus clay pots aren't always as attractive as some of the glazed or plastic pots, but since they lose water faster they may help save a plant from injury or death by over-watering.

A piece of pot shard placed over the hole in the pot bottom helps to prevent soil loss. If the new pot is deeper than the previous pot, add enough fresh potting soil so the plant will not sit any deeper than it did in its old pot.

To remove a plant from its pot, turn the plant and pot upside down and bring the edge down against a firm surface to dislodge the plant and root mass from the pot. A few gentle taps are generally sufficient. In most cases the roots will keep the root and soil mass from falling apart. It isn't

necessary to remove the existing soil or to separate the roots.

Turn the plant right-side up and place it in the center of the larger pot so there is space between the root mass and the side of the pot. Fill this space with a commercially prepared potting soil. Firm the soil in the space by gently tapping the pot bottom against a firm surface. Water the plant to help settle the soil and then fill in any low places. Place the newly repotted plant in a shady, protected area for a few days.

Most potting soils are a mix of organic and inorganic materials such as peat moss, bark, sand, vermiculite or perlite. The organic materials hold moisture and nutrients while the inorganic materials provide air spaces. The proportions of the various ingredients can vary with the types of plants. For plants that prefer a well-drained soil, you can add a little more sand or perlite to the commercial mix.

Plants that are repotted now, several weeks before they are brought back indoors, will have an easier time adjusting to indoor conditions than those repotted just before being brought back indoors.

The Mobile District, US Army Corps of Engineers hereby gives legal notice that it has requested water quality certification from the Department of Environmental Quality, Bureau of Pollution Control, State of Mississippi for activities associated with the maintenance dredging of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway (TTW) and disposal of the dredged material into an upland area. The proposed action involves hydraulic dredging the TTW navigation channel at approximate Navigation Mile 439.0 and disposal of the dredged material in an upland disposal site. The proposed disposal site is located in Tishomingo County about three (3) miles north of Burnsville, Mississippi, on the west side of the TTW. During heavy rain fall on May 25 and 26, 1991 the levee was breached washing material into the navigation channel. The breach resulted in the formation of a gully about 4.5 acres in size. The proposed action is to place the material removed from the navigation channel into the gully restoring the ground to near original elevations. A weir will be constructed at the southeast corner of the site. The effluent will travel south along the drainage ditch to an existing drop structure and into the waterway.

Water quality certification is being requested for the proposed action in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Federal Regulations, 330.5 (a)(16). This nationwide permit satisfies the technical requirement for a section 404 permit for the return water provided State certification is issued through the section 401 procedures of the Clean Water Act.

In compliance with requirements of Section 401 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251-1341) (the Act), as amended by PL 95-217, the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, has requested certification from the Mississippi Bureau of Pollution Control that the above-mentioned activity will be in compliance with applicable provisions of Section 301 (33 U.S.C. 1311), Section 302 (33 U.S.C. 1312), Section 303 (33 U.S.C. 1313), Section 306 (33 U.S.C. 1316), and Section 307 (33 U.S.C. 1317) of the Act and appropriate requirements of the State law.

## County Unemployment Rises In Mid-June

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County rose to 12.9 percent at mid-June. This compares to a rate of 11.3 percent in May and 14.6 percent in June, 1990.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered approximately 8,300, 170 more than May and an increase of 920 over June one year ago. Of this number, approximately 7,230 Tishomingo County residents held jobs at mid-June while 1,070 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county totaled 3,000, 80 more than the previous month, and 600 more than June, 1990. Nonmanufacturing jobs in the county numbered 3,510, approximately the same as May, but 300 more than June one year ago.

### Congestive Heart Failure Treatment

According to recent statistics published in the *American Heart Journal*, more than 2 million Americans have congestive heart failure. The Governing Body shall have the right, at its option, to cancel its agreement to sell the Bonds if within five (5) days after the tender of the Bonds for delivery the successful bidder shall not have accepted delivery of and paid for the Bonds, and in such event the Governing Body shall retain the successful bidder's good faith deposit as liquidated damages as hereinabove provided.

PAYING AGENT, TRANSFER AGENT, AND REGISTRAR: The successful bidder may designate a bank or trust company located within the State of Mississippi to serve as paying agent (the "Paying Agent") for the Bonds within forty-eight (48) hours of the date of sale of the Bonds, subject to the approval of the Governing Body. The Governing Body's approval of the Paying Agent shall be contingent on a determination as to the willingness and ability of the Paying Agent to perform the duties of registrar and transfer agent and on the satisfactory negotiation of service fees. The Paying Agent shall be subject to change by order of the Governing Body under the conditions and in the manner provided in the Bond Resolution under which the Bonds are issued. Both principal of and interest on the Bonds will be payable by check or draft mailed to registered owners of the Bonds as of the 15th day of the month preceding the maturity date for such principal or interest payment at the addresses appearing in the registration records of the Municipality maintained by the Paying Agent. The Bonds will be transferable only upon the books of the Paying Agent, and payment of principal at maturity shall be conditioned on the proper presentation and surrender of the Bonds to the Paying Agent.

DELIVERY: The successful bidder must designate within fifteen (15) days of the date of sale, or at such other later date as may be designated by the Governing Body, the names and addresses of the registered owners of the Bonds and the denominations in which the Bonds of each maturity are to be issued. If the successful bidder fails to submit such information within the required time, one Bond may be issued for each maturity in the full amount maturing on that date registered in the name of the successful bidder. The Bonds will be delivered at a place to be designated by the purchaser and without cost to the purchaser, and payment therefor shall be made in immediately available funds.

REQUIRED REPRESENTATIONS FROM PURCHASER: It shall be a condition of the obligation of the Municipality to deliver the Bonds that contemporaneously with or prior to delivering the Bonds the Municipality shall receive from the successful bidder a letter in form and substance satisfactory to the Municipality to the effect that:

- The successful bidder is purchasing the Bonds for its own account for the purpose of investment and not with a view toward distribution or resale;
- Said bidder has such knowledge and experience in financial matters that it is capable of evaluating the merits and risks of purchasing the Bonds;
- Said bidder has read and fully understands the Bond Resolution under which the Bonds are issued;
- Said bidder has had an opportunity to obtain, and it has received from the Municipality, all other information and material which it regards as necessary to evaluate the merits and risks of its investments;
- Said bidder recognizes that in this transaction Mr. Richard O. Clark and Watkins Ludlam & Stennis, Jackson, Mississippi, are not responsible for any information contained in or omitted from materials regarding the Municipality, and it acknowledges that it does not look to them to obtain such information on its behalf; and
- While it has no present intention to resell or otherwise dispose of all or any of the Bonds purchased by it, said bidder assumes the responsibility for disclosing all material information in compliance with all applicable federal and Mississippi securities laws in the event of the resale of the Bonds.

LEGAL OPINION; CLOSING DOCUMENTS: The Bonds are offered subject to the unqualified approval of the legality thereof by Watkins Ludlam & Stennis, Jackson, Mississippi, Bond Counsel. In the opinion of Watkins Ludlam & Stennis, interest on the Bonds is exempt from federal and Mississippi income taxes under existing laws, regulations, rulings and judicial decisions with such exceptions as shall be generally required by the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. A copy of the opinion of Bond Counsel, which will be printed on the back of each Bond, together with the usual closing papers, including a non-litigation certificate dated the date of delivery of the Bonds, evidencing that no litigation is pending in any way affecting the legality of the Bonds or the revenues pledged for the payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon, and a transcript of the proceedings relating to the Bonds will be delivered to the successful bidder without charge. The Municipality will pay for all legal fees and will pay for the printing and validation of the Bonds.
