Iuka Chamber **General Meeting**



Home Economics Tips

MODIFY BEHAVIOR FOR DIET SUCCESS

America is a weight conscious nation. As we become aware of the benefits of diet and exercise on overall health, more Americans are trying to incorporate physical fitness and weight control into their daily lives.

Unfortunately, many times weight control or exercise programs are begun with a great deal of enthusiasm, but in a very few weeks the enthusiasm begins to fade.

Sensible eating along with regular exercise is the basis for a successful weight loss program, but this success can only be achieved by permanently changing behavior. By taking part in a behavior modification program designed to change behavior or habits, individuals become more aware of the things in the environment that trigger improper eating or prevent the success of an exercise program.

A behavior modification program also will help individuals set goals to change behaviors and incorporate positive reinforcement into their lifestyle when the weight control on fitness program is a success.

Awareness is the first step in changing eating habits. Individuals should begin by keeping a record for several days of everything that is eaten. Include where the food is eaten (in front of the television, at the dining room table, sitting at a desk) and the circumstances that occurred while eating.

Restrict eating in the home to one place such as the dining room table. Do not do anything else while eating such as watching television or reading a book.

Emotional stress such as boredom, depression, fear, anxiety and unhappiness all serve as environmental cues to eat. Keeping a record of moods or emotions at the time of eating can help individuals become more aware of the influence of different moods on eating habits.

Once the influence is identified, make a list of projects or acitivites that can be substituted for eating. This may include bicycling, jogging, taking a walk, phoning a friend, writing a letter or many others. The next time an emotional cue to eat occurs, substitute one of the activities on the list.

Goals are an important part of a behavior modification program. Set realistic goals. Include both shortterm and long-term goals. The short term goal may be related to weight loss alone, or it can focus on weight loss and behavior change.

If the long term goal is to lose 25 pounds and exercise for 30 minutes three times per week, a realistic short-term goal is to lose 1 pound per week and use the stairs instead of the elevator. Once a short-term goal is achieved, a reward is in line

A reward system is an important part of a behavior modification program. Food meets emotional needs as well as physical needs. So when food is reduced or eating habits change, it becomes necessary to find other positive, meaningful sub

PRESIDENT BUSH PROCLAIMS FARM SAFETY WEEK

President Bush has proclaimed the week of September 15th through the 21st, 1991 as the 48th annual observance of National Farm Safety Week. The event is co-sponsored by the National Safety Council (NSC), the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and other national local and organizations

In his proclamation, the President said: "The men and women who work in America's agricultural sector make a vital contribution to our Nation's well-being. By providing consumers with a variety of high-quality food and fiber at reasonable costs, they help to keep our work force strong and healthy and, in so doing, help to maintain the Nation's economic productivity and competitiveness. Because we count on farmers and ranchers for so much, both as individuals and as a Nation, it is fitting that we observe National Farm Safety Week--a concerted public awareness campaign aimed at promoting their health and safety.'

Over the years much has been done to improve the safety of agricultural production. Advances in science and technology and increased attention to avoiding safety risks have made farms and ranches safer places to work. Moreover, dedicated professionals and volunteers have been working together to promote health and safety in rural communities. These efforts are reflected by a welcome downturn in farm accident rates. Unfortunately, however, while im-

portant strides have been made in reducing the risks of farming and ranching, agricultural production remains one of our most hazardous industries, with an accident rate that is more than four times the average of all industries. "More must be done to reduce the toll of farm-related accidents," President Bush said.



Tishomingo High School Alumni Elected To Hall Of Fame





Troop 26. The project is being instigated and built by the local community.

The Complex also has plans for a plaza commons in the form of a 150foot diameter solar observatory with 75-foot tall concrete towers marking the summer and winter solstices. The plaza will also include a 70-foot oval sundial with benches as numerals. This oversized math-science instrument will provide students with access to real life illustrations of science, geometry, astronomy.

The third major exhibit at the new education complex is planned. A fullsize train track with boxcar museums will chronicle the community's history and economic development from its early dependence on railroads to the new \$1.5 billion NASA Advanced Solid Rocket Motor facility currently under construction nearby.

The Tishomingo Education Complex is a \$11 million facility serving Tishomingo County students and residents. Funding for the projects was provided by the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development through its Mississippi Major Economic Impact Authority and by local monies.

The magnet high school, serving grades 9-12, opened August 26. When fully completed, the complex will include a university center offering advanced degrees through the University of Mississippi, a NASA Resource Center, a child care facility, and a life-





Tishomingo County Unemployment Drops 6.8 Percent

In Northeast Mississippi, the number of people seeking jobs decreased in July but still remained well above the jobless level for the same period one year ago.

According to the figures from the Employment Security Commission, the average unemployment level for the 15 Northeast Mississippi counties dropped in July to 10.6 percent compared to June's rate of 11.3 percent.



I enjoy watching young 4-H members learn the first basics of home sewing, and then years later watch them model complete outfits made with their own hands.







Looking At Iuka Through German Eyes

Coming to a different country or even to a foreign continent, you are contronted with a new set of values and habits which call for some major or minor adjustment. After one month I can gather some specialties that make luka unique to me:

Riding all the way from the airport in Memphis to tuka occured to me as a neverending drive through the deep green woods of North Mississippi. Then, I realize that people here are lucky because they still have this beautiful countryside. They have the possibility to build nice houses with a big yard while Germans have to build apartment houses that grow higher and higher into the air. There are several national state parks in this area and swinging bridges, canoeing tours and dirt roads evoke a feeling of adventure. I could never discover such an "Indiana Jones-playground" in Germany, instead I would walk through an English garden with cut trees and flower arrangements. I spent a wonderful Labor Day

going out by a Pontoon boat on the Tennessee River, having a picnic and swimming. A similar activitiy in Germany has become a great rarity since there are not many non-polluted, clean lakes and rivers left.

Looking into a German picnic basket, it would include different kinds of firm whole-wheat bread with butter spread and either cheese or cold slices of meat. We often have cold hamburgers, common fruits are apples and bananas and drinks mineral water, juices and beer. You may conclude that there is nothing fancy to it - Germans are not as creative with their food as the Americans are.

Generally, I noticed some interesting details about food not only

Going to the farmer's market, it was completely new to me that the farmers got out their pocket knives and offered bites of vegetables and fruits to me. As for lunch, I took over everybody's favorite in my office: microwave popcorn. That has really brought up a new option.

What about going out on a Friday or Saturday night? American kids are cruising along the strip, in luka they are circling the Mineral Spring Park. Germans are allowed to enter bars and nightclubs when they are 14 and the drinking age is 16. Since they cannot drive until they are 18, there is some restriction to their freedom, too. And I just wish somebody would start the American dating custom in Europe.

The people in luka whom I have encountered were very friendly and helpful. That made it a lot easier to deal with the awkward feeling of being new and a foreigner, too. Thus, I'm very thankful to all the people who took their time, let me stay with them, showed me around or helped me out.

Cook has served nearly 10 years on the Mississippi Association of Supervisors' Nominating Committee. He represents the Northeast Planning and Development District on the committee.



"Then God said, 'Let Us make man in Our image, according to ou likeness ... "' (Gen. 1:26

The General Theory of Evolution proposes that biological life started from non-living matter and evolved to its most advanced form in humans The evolutionist's biggest challenge is to find the mechanism for change from one life form to the other.

For many years after Darwin the answer was Natural Selection, the idea that those best suited to adapt to their environments survived and Passed on their genes. But since Watson and Crick found the code of life, DNA, i living cells it has become apparent that the giraffe did not get a long neck by stretching it for millions of years and changing from generation t generation. The length of his neck is determined by the genetic code i **DNA** molecules

Watson, Crick, and their colleagues have found that the code of life written in a biological alphabet which directs the activities in all living cells This code is not changed through adaptation, only through recemination reproduction. And then it is limited to genes of both parents - recon bination does not make new genes.

One other way it can be changed is through mutation . mistakes that happen in recombination. Mutations are like scrambling the letters in book or firing a bullet into a car engine. Rarely if ever can mutations be beneficial. They are not a serious explanation for the evolution of life. And certainly they do not answer how life and its complex codes got started.

Dr. Francis Crick says concerning the makeup of proteins, "If every prin ted text in the world used exactly the same arbitrary set of letters (which, a we know, is far from the case), we would reasonably conclude that the fully developed script had probably originated in one particular place and been passed on by constant copying. It is difficult not to come to the same con clusion for the amino acids. The set of twenty is so universal that its choice would appear to date back to very near the beginning of all living things. (Life Itself, p. 45.)

The season on coots and mergansers will run concurrent with the duck season. The daily limit on coots is 15, and the daily limit on mergansers is five, only one of which may be a hooded merganser.

The season on Canada geese, white-fronted geese, and brant opens December 7 and continues through Jan. 31, a total of 56 days. The season on lesser snow geese, greater snow geese, and Ross' geese begins Dec. 7 and last through Feb. 14, a total of 70 days.

The goose bag limit during each of the seasons is seven geese to include no more than two Canada geese and two whitefronted geese.

Hunting Canada geese, whitefronted geese, and brant in the Sardis Zone begins Dec. 7 and ends Jan. 12. The daily bag limit is one goose per day and two in possession.

Harvest sweet potatoes in October before the soil temperatures drop below 50 degrees Fahrenheit. Don't leave the harvested potatoes out at night to be chilled by the cool, night air. Place the freshly dug potatoes in a warm (85-90 °F) moist (90 percent relative humidity) place for several days to cure and promote healing of cuts and bruises from harvesting.

Spray pumpkin vines with insecticides (sevin or thiodan, as appropriate) for control of squash bugs, cucumber beetles, and aphids. Mix in a fungicide containing chlorothalonil for downy mildew and leaf spot control or benelate for powdery mildew control. For maximum pumpkin size, keep the plants watered; thin pumpkins to one or two per plant. It is not necessary to remove any fruit from the miniature pumpkins, since increasing fruit size is not of any importance.

There is a good chance for a killing frost to occur in many northern counties (Marshall to Tishomingo), central counties, and south to Perry, Green, and parts of Lawrence, Jeff Davis, and Covington by early November. The coast counties can experience the first killing frost from November 13 to December 2. These dates are based on weather records from previous years.

Physiology Laboratory. Boone recommends monitoring the pulse at the wrist instead.

Some exercisers like to check their heart rate by feeling the carotid artery (on either side of the neck, under the back of the jaw) because it has a bigger pulse than the radial artery in the wrist, making it easier to find and count. The potential problem with carotid palpation (pulse feeling) is that it can cause the heart rate to slow by as much as 12 beats per minute, Boone's research shows.

Such a miscalculation could allow someone to exercise harder than he thinks he is exercising - a real danger for those with heart disease, Boone said.

"The assumption is that a correctly identified heart rate gives you a reflection of the intensity of your workout." Boone said. "A correct palpation technique verifies the benefit of your exercise program. Most people who exercise don't have a prescribed heart-rate range...but for those individuals who have been stress-tested or have been prescribed a certain heart rate range for exercise, it is critical that they stay within that range

"The point of the range is to maintain your exercise at an intensity that is both productive and safe," Boone continued. A certain amount of exercise is good for the heart, but too much can be dangerous, causing further damage or even a heart attack.

While it is possible to obtain an accurate pulse at the neck, Boone said using that location invites two problems. Stroking the neck to find the pulse can produce a massaging effect and activate the "carotid sinus reflex," which lowers the heart rate. Also, pressing too hard on the carotid arteries can lower the heart rate.

Also, never press on both carotid arteries at once, Boone said; it can


