Johnson Withdraws From Race - Cummings and South In Run-off Oct. 8

Bobby Harold Johnson, candidate for second district supervisor, Tishomingo County, and second place finisher in the recent Democratic primary, officially withdrew from the race last week.

According to a spokeswoman for the Circuit Clerk's office, Mr. Johnson withdrew on Thursday, opening up the second place position for the October 8th runoff.

Johnson had received 623 votes in

Tuesday's election winning a runoff slot with incumbent Ricky Cummings, who tallied 767 votes.

State law permits the third runner-up to be placed on the ballot in the event that one of the top two vote-getters withdraws, reports Democratic Executive Committee Chairman, David Bonds.

The third man in the race, Arlie South who had 454 votes, has been notified that his name will appear on the October 8 ballot.

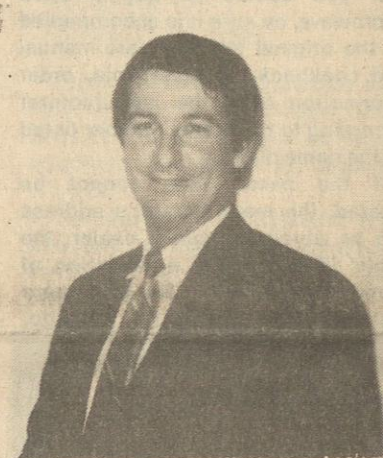

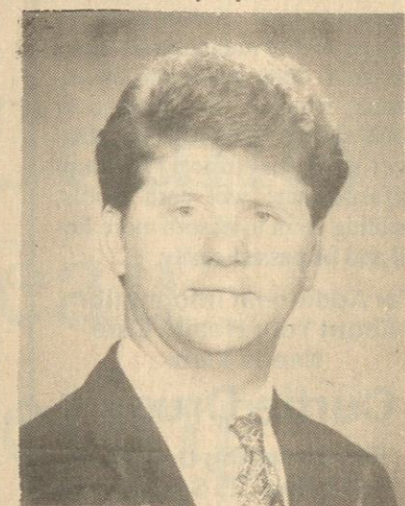

County Agent's Notes

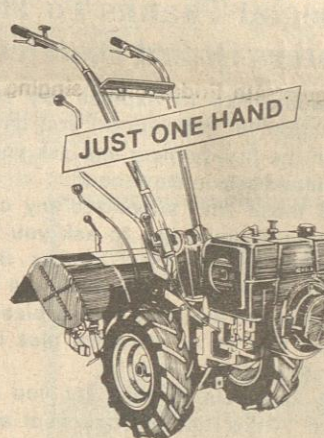
THE DO-IT-YOURSELF REPAIR JOB
Do-it-yourself tools and resources are plentiful because many repairs are increasingly simple. Contractors can be costly, and the trend today is toward self-sufficiency.

Individuals who previously hesitated have found they can make many repairs as satisfactorily as most contractors. This is especially true of women who have discovered that such skills are learned, not innate. Carpentry, electrical and plumbing work are being less mystifying for more children as well.

There are some basic guidelines that every person should follow when undertaking a do-it-yourself home repair.

1. Write down your plan. Sit down and develop a methodical plan unless you can clearly visualize each step from beginning to end. If you are

sidered reliable testing devices.

Ask if the warranty permits redress by a second owner. In an individual sale, microwave manufacturers' warranties usually apply only to the original owner. When a used model is sold by a dealer, the dealer may warranty the used oven to a new owner for a limited period of time. Verbal warranties are difficult to enforce. So it is important to get the agreement in writing.

Check to see if accessories, such as a temperature probe and shelf, are included. If not, find out if and where you can buy them.

An acceptable purchase price can be determined by weighing the estimated remaining life expectancy of the used oven, its condition and its original purchase price with the cost of a new model with comparable features. Also, compare the used microwave oven price with the sale price of a new model or one with fewer features.

If you decide to buy a used microwave, be sure it is accompanied by the original use and care manual and cookbook. If unavailable, order information from the manufacturer according to the model number listed on the name plate.

If the name plate cannot be located, the manufacturer's address can be obtained from a dealer, the public library or the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers located at 20 N. Wacker Dr., Chicago, IL 60606.

Also request the name and address of the original dealer.

RO-TEL POTATO CASSEROLE

HAZY VISION

If you've noticed that your vision has gradually become hazy, you should have your eyes checked by your eye doctor to find out what the problem is. For instance, hazy vision is one of the common signs of cataract development. A cataract is a cloudiness or opacity in the lens of the eye. As the cataract continues to develop, a normally clear lens will become opaque.

Acquired cataracts can result from aging, chemicals, disease, injury, and inflammation, and they usually develop gradually. They can't be treated with medicine. However, cataract surgery is successful in about 95 percent of all cases, even when the patient is elderly. Once the cataract is removed a substitute lens must be used to restore clear vision.

This can take the form of a small plastic lens implanted in the eye or special eyeglasses or contact lenses. To find out what may be causing your hazy vision, have your eyes examined by your eye doctor.

stumped on something, read and ask questions until you find out what you need to know.

2. Safety first! Smashed fingers, debris in your eyes or more serious injuries are not worth the project.

3. Do only one thing at a time.

4. Unless you are an expert, follow directions as given.

5. Get all supplies together before starting the project.

6. When cutting anything, measure twice and cut once. This is the most important rule for keeping down costs. Remember it!

7. Control your temper. Flying wrenches and bashed-in walls are costly, exhausting and dangerous. Take a break. Turn the project over to someone else for a while.

8. Do not force anything. Plastic breaks, wood splits, metal stretches and bends. When it comes to forcing things, we often find we are stronger than we think.

9. Use only tools you know how to use. Most tools are much more effective if you practice a little before letting loose on your intended project. Barging ahead without a trial run is not recommended.

10. See a job through. Frequent breaks in the continuity of work and thought often contribute to inferior craftsmanship. They also can make a job much harder.

Scientist Warns Against Lyme Disease Risk In Fall
The closing of summer does not mean the disappearance of dangerous Ixodes dammini ticks or deer ticks. This known transmitter of Lyme disease remains a threat through the fall.

"We actually see a resurgence of deer ticks in the middle of September."

ber. These ticks are active and feeding well into November in most parts of the country. In more climates they can be active all year, according to Charles Koval, University of Wisconsin -- Extension entomologist and professor in the Department of Entomology at UW-Madison. "As a result, Lyme disease can be actively transmitted in the fall."

Ticks will cluster and cling to the remaining vegetation to warm themselves in colder temperatures, exposing them to high levels of contact with humans and animals.

"The fall season becomes even more dangerous because people tend to get careless and relax their protection safeguards," he adds. "People should definitely be adhering to Lyme disease precautions for themselves and their pets during the fall because the threat of disease transmission is still present."

The following Lyme disease precautions are recommended by the Centers for Disease Control:

*Be aware of and try to avoid habitats -- such as tall grass, bushes and woods.

*Wear appropriate clothing -- such as a hat; tucked in shirt with tight collar and cuffs; and long pants tucked into socks.

*Use a personal repellent.
*Check frequently for ticks while you are outside and immediately after coming inside; remove any attached ticks with a tweezer.

*Inspect pets for ticks and use veterinarian-recommended tick control products.

While there is no Lyme disease vaccine for humans, a vaccine has been developed for dogs and is available through veterinarians. The vaccine can be given to dogs any time of the year, followed by an annual booster.

Laxative Use and Lifestyle Changes

There is no "normal" pattern for bowel movements. And there is no evidence to suggest that a daily bowel movement is a must. While some persons do have a daily bowel movement, others have three a day or only three a week.

Irregularity or difficult bowel movements can be caused by a number of health problems and by certain medications. Prevention of irregularity often can be achieved through changes in lifestyle. Eating fiber-rich foods, getting exercise, and drinking plenty of water are excellent alternatives to the use of laxatives.

There are several nonprescription laxatives from which to choose. Psyllium seed husk is a fiber source that, technically, is not a laxative. It is an excellent daily constipation preventative. Stimulant laxatives such as senna and castor oil stimulate the intestinal muscles, causing waves of contraction and a propulsion of intestinal contents. The lubricant laxatives such as mineral oil coat the stool and make it easier to pass. Saline laxatives such as milk of magnesia act like a sponge to draw water into the intestine, making the passage of stools easier. Stool softener laxatives such as dioctyl sodium sulfosuccinate wet hard stools, enabling them to absorb more liquid and be passed easily.

Home Economics Tips

SHOP AROUND BEFORE YOU BUY A USED MICROWAVE

Used microwaves are suddenly becoming more available as owners decide to replace older models with new, updated ones.

A second-hand microwave range can be a real bargain. But first, look around at new models to become acquainted with current features and prices.

A used range can be a satisfactory alternative to a new microwave if it is needed for a relatively short time before you invest in a new one. Or it could be a good choice as a second unit in the family room a vacation home, office or recreational vehicle.

The projected life expectancy of new microwave ovens is 10 to 14 years (the average is 11 years). However, this can vary, depending on use and care. One should check the age of the used appliance to predict remaining usefulness. Most used microwave ovens are probably six years old or more.

Make sure the oven is in good shape before making your purchase. Operate the oven, using all features to discover if any repairs are needed. If any features fail to operate, get repair estimates from an authorized service agent. These costs could exceed the money you might save by buying a used unit rather than a new one. Do not attempt to repair the oven yourself.

When considering a purchase, check the following: *Ease of operation; *Who used the oven; *Amount of previous use; *Past service record; *Reason for being sold; *Availability of repair parts; *Condition of door seal; *Cleanliness; *General physical condition. (Look for signs of physical abuse.)

Make sure the microwave does not have a radiation leak; this should be checked only with a certified leakage meter. Contact a reputable dealer for testing information. A fee is usually charged for the test. Do not attempt to check leakage with a fluorescent light bulb or a store-purchased survey meter, because these are not con-

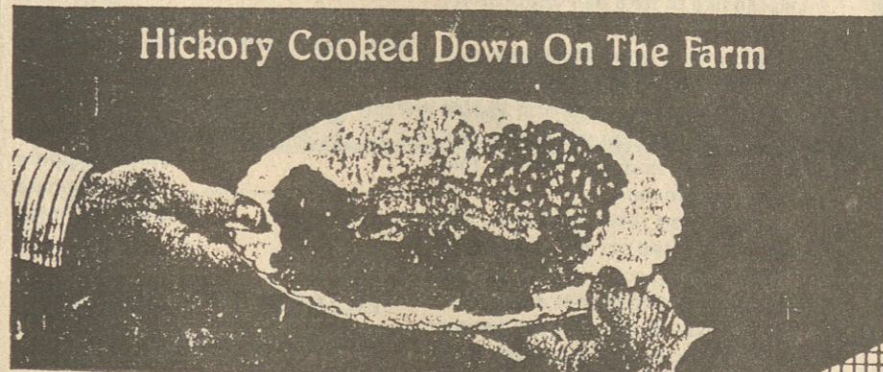

and after there were many wounded and dead soldiers. The McDonald, (at that time, Moore) Home, was used as a hospital as well as Confederate Headquarters for General Price.

The clothes of the wounded that were soiled with blood were taken outside and buried or burned. An addition to the McDonald home was added later and covered these sights. Ted would crawl under the house and dig around for a pocketful of buttons. Thorne remembered him trading the buttons for pencils. "He liked them unsharpened with a new eraser" says Mrs. Mary Burns. "Ted would do a little yard work for me, even though his mother discouraged it." Mrs. Jackson says, "For many years Lyla (McDonald) could not understand why Ted wasn't normal like the rest of her children."

As Mrs. McDonald grew older, she recanted this statement. Her health became frail and all her other children moved off. Ted stayed and lived with his mother. He took care of her until she passed away.

The McDonald home was torn down in the early 1960's. Ted lived in nursing homes after that. He still managed to get around town with his pencils.

Mrs. Jackson, said, "We gave him a surprise birthday party the first year after his mother passed away. When he saw the cake and candles he began to cry."

Ted loved to visit the Jacksons but Mrs. Jackson insisted on him "Being clean from the skin out." She turned him away once because he wasn't clean. She called a cab so he didn't have to walk home. A few weeks later, the director of the nursing home called and asked if it was all right for Ted to spend the night at the Jacksons. "Only if he's clean," replied Mrs. Jackson. The lady replied, "He's been in the tub for two hours and I'm afraid he's going to drown."

I have some of the McDonald family history at the museum, but I'd love to have one of Ted's buttons and pencils on display with the family things. Ted may have been retarded but gave a lot to his family and community. God knows what He is doing.

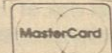

TEACHING THE CRYSTAL CLEAR FACTS

Tishomingo County schoolchildren in the fourth through the sixth grades have the opportunity to learn the crystal clear facts about their drinking water.

As part of the extension service's efforts to educate the public on the issues of water quality and quantity, a five-part instructional unit called Water Riches has been developed from classroom use.

The unit is approved by the State Department of Education and developed to complement established science curriculums. It uses activities related in math, science, language arts, creative arts, creative thinking and social studies to look at water quality and quantity.

This is excellent material. The program includes five educational videos and five newspapers to complete the videos. Teacher's guides and in-service training are available from our office.

The program is based on the same principle that the 4-H program was established on some 75 years ago -- teaching children so they also can teach the adults in their household.

PROTECT FARM CHILDREN FROM INJURY AND DEATH

September is National Farm Safety Month, and although the month is set aside to promote farm safety for all age groups, I am particularly drawn to want to protect our children.

The accident rate is high among children who live and work on farms. Children are at risk because they live, play and work in an environment where many occupational hazards exist and because of their emotional, mental and physical limitations in various age groups:

From birth to 3 years, children are attracted to moving objects, noise and bright colors. They need close supervision to reduce their potential exposure to hazards around the farm. They are particularly vulnerable to machinery entanglements, being run over by vehicles, poisonings, choking and burns.

Children from 3 to 6 years old continue to explore their world with little thought of danger. They get caught up in their own action and may not notice they are close to machinery, large animals or other dangers.

From 7 to 9 years, children begin to recognize common dangers but continue to act before they think. They want to be included in adult's work, yet risk of injury is high.

When 10 to 12 years old, many children are big enough for adult tasks, yet most are not ready to handle emergency situations. They may

not know how to apply the knowledge they have. They react to peer pressure and assume invincibility. Start them out operating a small lawn tractor in controlled, supervised situations.

At 13, some children can begin to handle farm equipment. However, some youth at this age, or older, may not be emotionally or physically capable nor have the experience necessary to operate equipment safely. Each individual's ability must be evaluated.

In all 4-H projects we stress personal safety and safety for those around us. The theme for the National Farm Safety Week is "Safety Protects Agriculture's Greatest Resource -- you." Let's take that theme a little further and work to protect our children too.

Students Will Show Appreciation To Law Enforcement Officers

A time for youths to give law enforcement officers a PAT on the back for a job well done has been designated for Oct. 1-6 by the Department of Public Safety's Division of Public Safety Planning.

"PAT means Police Appreciation Time," said Harriet Freeman, youth program coordinator for Public Safety Planning. "Oct. 1-6 is a time for youths, from elementary school to college, to show their appreciation to local law enforcement officers for the duties they perform every day to make Mississippi a safer place for all of us -- duties such as removing drunk drivers from our highways."

Youth groups such as SADD (Students Against Driving Drunk), Youth to Youth and Peer Helpers will participate in activities in their communities. These activities will include students taking refreshments to police stations and sheriff's offices at shift changes and washing law enforcement vehicles.

"This is an opportunity to close the gap between law enforcement officers and students," Ms. Freeman added. "Hopefully, it will help students recognize and support the important work done by law enforcement officers, and it will make the officers more responsive to the needs of students."

This is the first year for PAT week in Mississippi, but the Division of Public Safety Planning hopes it will be an annual event in Mississippi.

"Law enforcement officers deserve our recognition and gratitude every week of the year," said the division's Office of Highway Safety Director Billy Terrell. "We do feel it is important, though, to set aside one week for students to make a special effort to show their appreciation."

USDA ANNOUNCES RESULTS OF CRP 11TH SIGNUP; 12TH SIGNUP SET FOR JUNE 1992

Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan announced that 1.12 million acres have been tentatively accepted into the Conservation Reserve Program from the 2.35 million acres bid during the 11th CRP signup July 8-19. Total CRP enrollment is now 35.6 million acres.

Of the 1.12 million acres tentatively accepted, 66,151 are to be planted to trees.

Secretary Madigan said CRP was modified by the 1990 Farm Bill to better address protection of environmentally sensitive croplands. "The approved acreage from the 11th signup will provide significant water quality benefits," he said.

He also announced that the 12th CRP signup will be June 15-26, 1992. Bids accepted from the 12th signup will be effective for the 1993 crop year.

The new CRP acreage would be enrolled at an average cost of \$59.14 per acre. Payments will be effective for the 1992 crop year and the first rental payment will be made after October 1, 1992.

The CRP was authorized by the 1985 Farm Bill to take highly erodible cropland out of agricultural production and place it into a conserving use. Program participants receive annual rental payments with the amounts depending on the per acre rental rate and the number of acres under contract.

Based upon final approval, 152,202 acres of land accepted from the 11th CRP signup will be retired in conservation priority watersheds of the Chesapeake Bay, Long Island Sound and Great Lakes. Another 16,397 acres of land will be retired within watersheds targeted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and state water quality agencies.

USDA estimates soil erosion will be reduced by an estimated 15 million tons per year on the land enrolled in the 11th signup.

Of the acres tentatively approved from the 11th signup, 20,674 acres are for useful life easements of 15 to 30 years. Of these 20,674 acres, 13,008

are for wildlife habitat improvement, 417 are for field windbreaks, 380 are for grassed waterways, 279 are for contour grass strips, 3,738 are for salt tolerant grasses, 34 are for shelterbelts, and 26 are for living snow fences.

Number of Bids: 772; Total Acres Bid: 64,183; Bids Approved: 580; Acres Approved: 43,851; Average Annual Rental Payment Per Acre: \$46.55.

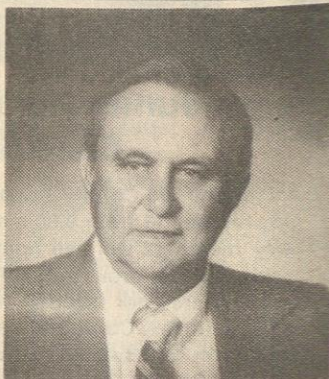

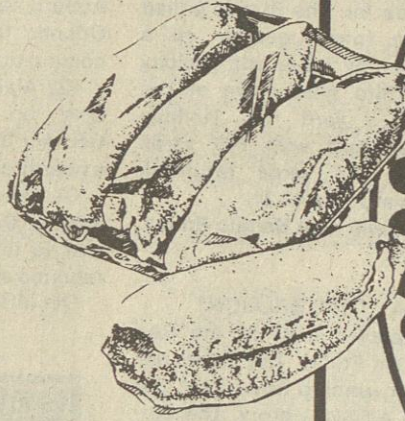

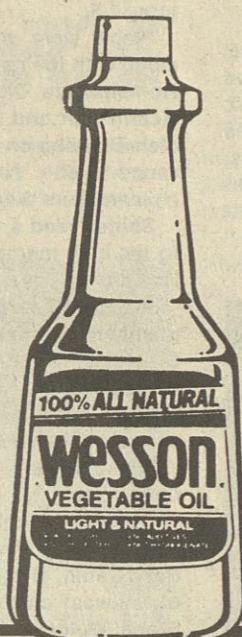

Walleye Ban

The Mississippi Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks proposed Wednesday that it shall be illegal to take walleye by any means except on Pickwick Lake, Divide Section and Bay Springs Reservoir in Tishomingo and Prentiss counties, where creel limits shall remain three per day.

Since construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee waterway, the walleye population has continued to decline because of increased siltation and the destruction of habitat.

The general public is invited to comment on this proposed ban by

writing Fisheries Division, Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, Post Office Box 451, Jackson, MS 39205. Comments must be received by Oct. 18, 1991.

The walleye found in the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, is called the Gulf Coast strain. The survival and preservation of this rare fish is in the hands of the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

In a program developed by the department, native walleye have been taken to a primitive hatchery in north Mississippi.

Since the program began, walleye production has increased each year. However, the department has met the limitations of the primitive facility and is in dire need of adequate hatchery space to maintain the program.

Ron Garavelli, chief of the fisheries

division, said the proposed regulation will help the department preserve the fish for future generations.

"We want to restore the walleye to its pre-Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway levels so that state anglers can once again enjoy this unique fishing opportunity," Garavelli said.

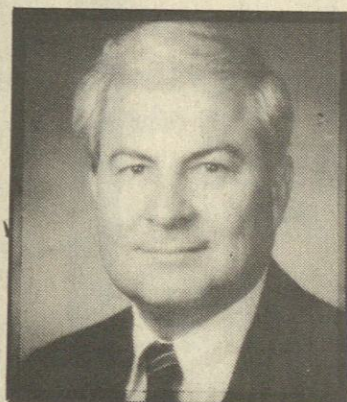

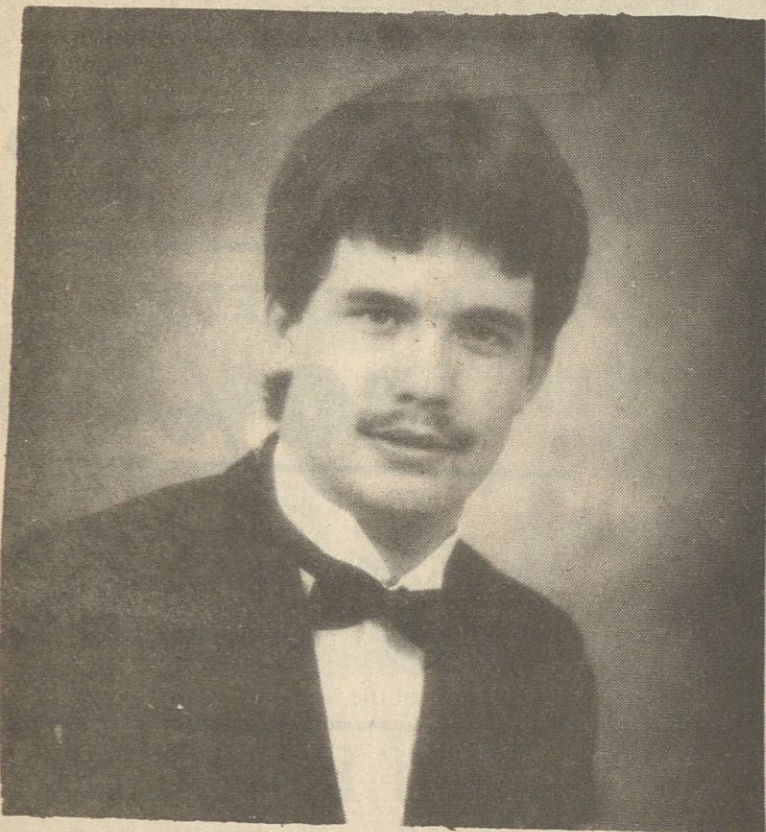

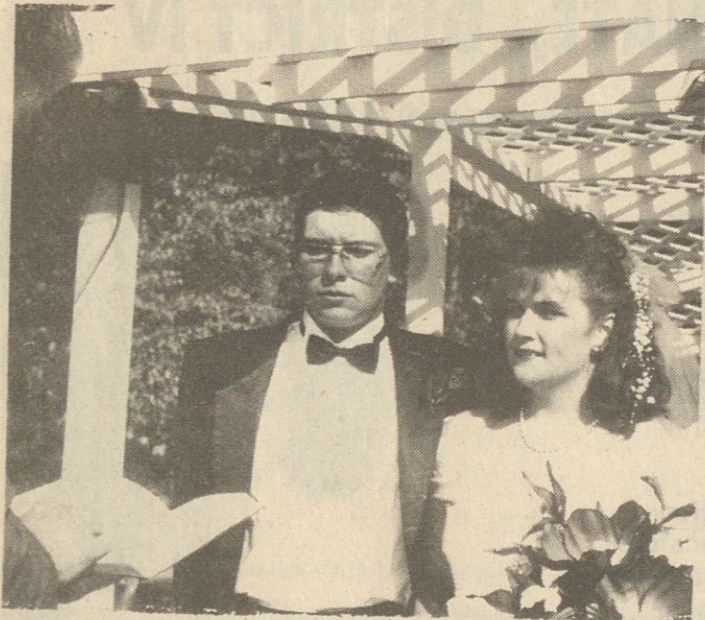

Piggly Wiggly Begins "Tapes For Cash" Program

On Monday, September 30, 1991, Piggly Wiggly #59 of Iuka will begin a "Tapes for Cash" program - a school incentive program that pays cash directly to your child's school. The participating schools include Tishomingo County High School, Tishomingo Elementary/Middle School, Burnsville Elementary/Middle School, Iuka Elementary School and Iuka Middle School. Parents, relatives and others interested in the progress of these schools will collect blue cash register tapes at Piggly Wiggly, Iuka. Each child will turn these tapes in to his or her school. Each school will then redeem the blue register tapes at Piggly Wiggly, Iuka. The principal at each school will coordinate the collection of tapes and will help decide where the money will be spent. Each principal has indicated one or more projects that need outside funding. These include

computers, learning tools and supplies, playground equipment, library books and other items not funded through state, local or federal funds. Our children are our most valuable asset and represent the future of Tishomingo County. Let's help our schools be the best that they can be by helping provide what is needed to teach our children.

In Service

Army National Guard Private Robert J. Rhear has completed an armor crewman course at Fort Knox, Ky. The course is designed to teach the crewman to serve as a member of an armor unit in defensive and offensive combat operations. In addition to basic combat training, the soldier was taught to drive the armored weapon, load and fire the weaponry, perform ammunition supply duties, and to process intelligence and operations data. sportsmen and landowners and damaging the wildlife resource itself. The increased number of outdoor harassment incidents nationwide clearly indicates a problem. On the other hand, sportsmen have found that by working together in a positive fashion through an organization like S.M.A.R.T., they can be much more effective in encouraging outdoor ethics, improving their image, and expressing their wishes to the Legislature and government agencies. The S.M.A.R.T. Council will meet in October to set its legislative agenda and goals for the year, including emphasis on tree stand and gun safety."

S.M.A.R.T. reminds Mississippians

that its hotline (1-800-BESMART) is available for reporting hunting and fishing violations. The Council also encourages sportsmen to display S.M.A.R.T. bumper stickers on their vehicles and to use S.M.A.R.T. written permission cards when hunting on private property. Local Teachers Sue For Re-instatement

A lawsuit has been filed by two former employees of the luka School System. Aubrey Ray former principal of luka High School and James Burns a science teacher at Burnsville High School have filed complaints with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Ray who is in his 40's and Burns who is in his 50's believe they were not hired by the new district because of their ages. Both men are seeking re-instatement.

An opening came up at the new Tishomingo County High School, but Ray was not considered for the position because he had already filed the complaint stated Jim Waide, attorney for Ray and Burns.

Ray is now employed as a principal in Baldwin but wants to work in his home county.

A younger, less experienced teacher was hired in Burn's place. Burns at 53 was the oldest teacher in the system. Burns is seeking back pay and reinstatement as a science teacher with the new district. Burns claims he was not notified that he was not being employed with the new district until May 22, too late to seek another position. Under state law teachers must be notified by April 8 if they are being retained.

Although the new district did not become effective until July 1, the new board had an agreement with the old city and county school boards that covered hiring, Waide said.

Mother and Child Killed In Crash On Trace

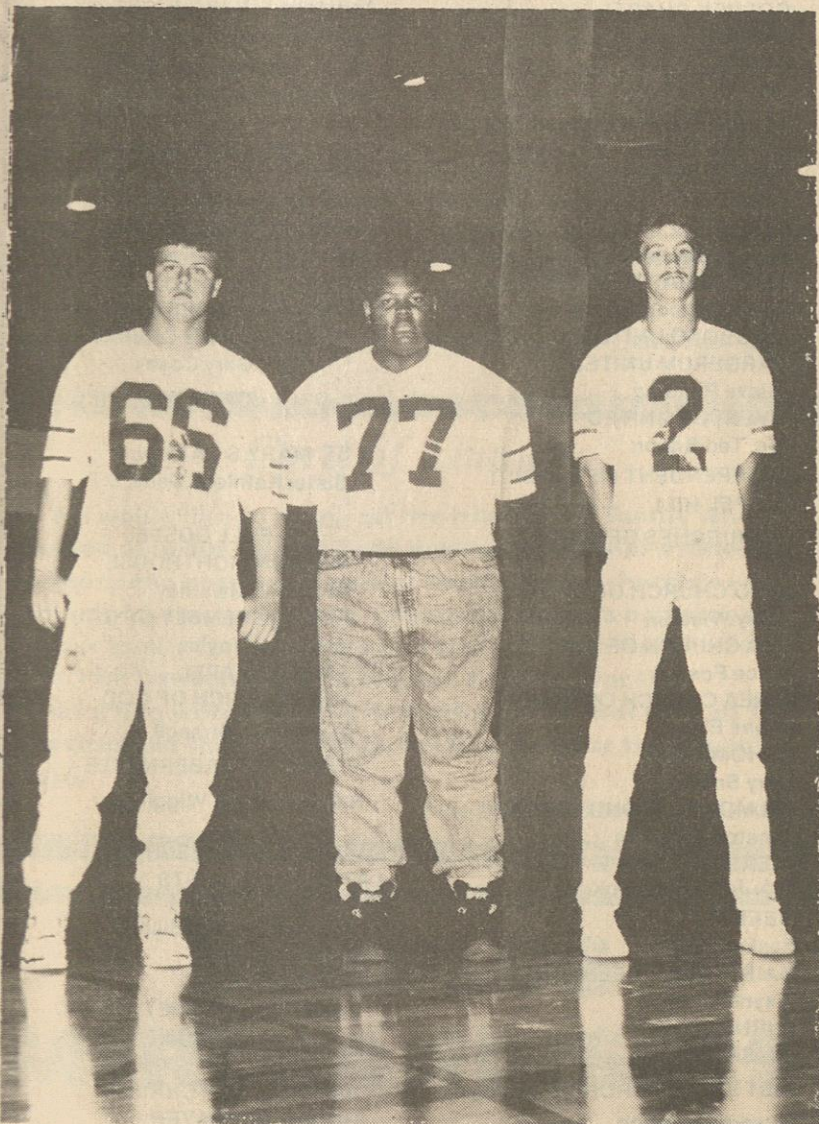

Zone I Squirrel Hunting Opens

Perhaps the most important small game hunting season of the year gets under way September 28 in Zone I counties.

The season continues through Jan. 31.

Zone I is that area in Mississippi north of U.S. 82, plus those portions of Sunflower and Washington counties south of U.S. 82.

The daily bag limit is 8, and the possession limit is 16, with no possession limit permitted on the opening day of any season.

Shooting hours for squirrel hunting are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset. Hunting must have a valid hunting license

signed and on their person before going squirrel hunting.

The Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks says that if squirrel hunting this fall and winter is anything like past seasons, more than 1.7 million fox and gray squirrels will be bagged across Mississippi.

Zone II counties will open October 12 and Zone III counties will open October 26.

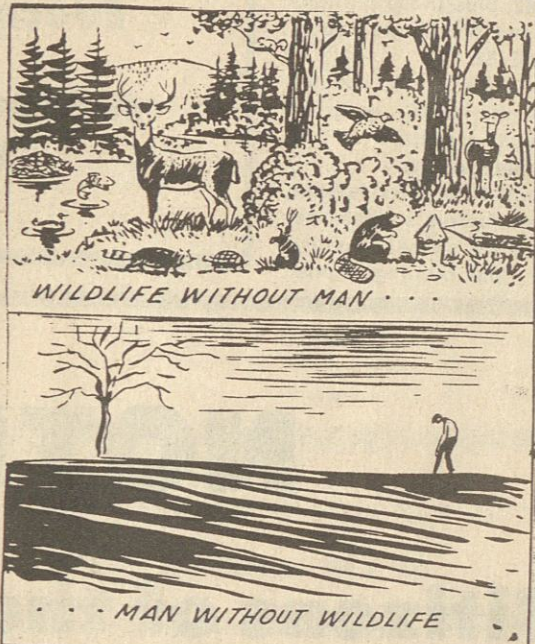

Bottomland Hardwoods Beneficial To Wildlife

A bottomland hardwood forest means different things to different people. There are a few that are aware of the overall importance and far reaching effects of these vanishing bottomland hardwoods.

A person casually passing by may look at a bottomland hardwood forest and see just a swamp, because they flood much of the time. The person might think that these forests are

valueless or wasted lands, but that would be wrong. The many different kinds of flowering and fruit trees and plants in bottomland hardwood forests provide a complex habitat for a large variety of wildlife animals.

Hunters, fishermen and trappers know that bottomland hardwoods are where many animals build their homes. For people who simply enjoy being in the woods and observing the natural resources, the bottomland hardwoods are among the most rewarding wildlife viewing sites.

A bottomland can support two to five times as many game animals as a nearby mixed pine and hardwood forest. There are two factors in bottomland hardwood that are especially favorable to wildlife, these are the abundance of food and cover.

Flooded bottomland is also nurseries for many valuable fish. Their shallow water provide fish such as bass, with many places to lay their eggs, the young fish find plenty of food and bedding places. The small invertebrates such as snails and crawfish found in the shallow water, become food for large animals like frogs and young wood ducks. Some of these provide food for still larger creatures.

Besides offering food and cover for wildlife, the bottomland hardwoods offers living space that is not often found in upland hardwoods or pine forests. The cavities found in the woods of standing or fallen trees are very important to wildlife for nesting and raising their young.

There are many animals that find refuge in bottomland forests, as the size and number shrink, more and more animals will become endangered. The bottomland hardwood forests are part of a large system that includes, the river and their drainage areas, agriculture land, and upland forests.

We must become aware of the great value of these forests and take steps to protect them before they are lost forever. Remember that each piece of bottomland hardwood forest, no matter how small, is part of the land use system and is important. It is not too late to save the remaining lands, but the pressure on them is great, and we must act now.

"As the number of older persons continues to grow, our state is facing new challenges as well as new opportunities that are unprecedented in our history," Ms. Marshall said. Project CARE is part of the National Eldercare Campaign, a multi-year effort to mobilize resources on behalf of older persons at risk of losing their self-sufficiency.

Permanent TVA Jobs Added In The Shoals

TVA is adding about 120 permanent, full-time trades and labor positions at its Power Service Shops here, TVA's Generating Group president Oliver D. Kingsley Jr. has announced.

"By creating permanent annual positions, rather than using fluctuating levels of temporary hourly employees, we will be better able to maintain a well-trained staff to perform turbine maintenance and repair and many other maintenance activities required for TVA's plants," Kingsley said. "Having a more complete, permanent staff at the shops also will ensure more prompt attention to plant needs."

The positions are being filled by machinists, electricians, laborers, teamsters, boilermakers and steamfitters. Many of the employees filling the new positions have worked at the Power Service Shops as hourly employees.

The four Power Service Shops provide a wide variety of services for TVA's nuclear, coal-fired and hydro plants across the Tennessee Valley. The shops are the primary provider of turbine maintenance services to the plants and also provide machine shop services, motor repairs, and other routine and emergency maintenance support. The annual employment level at the shops has grown from about 300 employees two years ago to approximately 550, including the new positions that are being added.

This growth at the shops is indicative of the shops' key role as the primary maintenance support organization for TVA's power plants," said Kingsley.

The new positions will bring the total number of permanent TVA positions in Muscle Shoals to more than 1,450.

Kingsley said employment needs at the shops fluctuate with the workload, and TVA will hire contractors to help out temporarily during peak work periods.

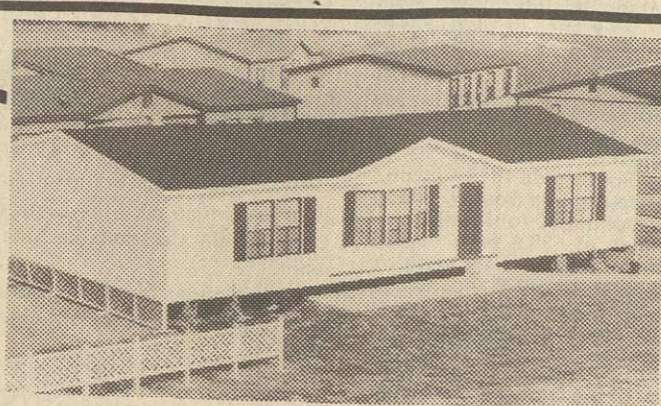

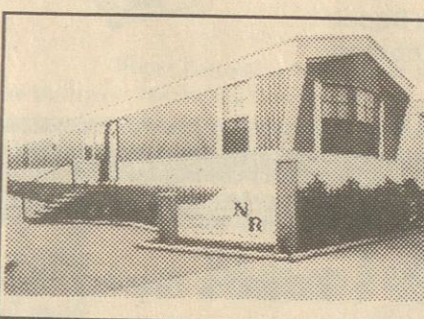
