Forestry Association Plans Field Day Oct. 19

The hilly terrain of this tract offers many examples for utilizing Best Management Practices. There will also be a tour of TMA's hardwood sawmill at Fairview and a tour of Scott's Chipmill at Bay Springs. Scott will be providing brunch before the tour of their facility.

The Field Day activities will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, October

19th, when the busses will leave from the parking lot of the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Center at Tishomingo.

The Field Day is open to anyone who would like to learn more about the timber industry in Tishomingo County. In order to insure that adequate transportation arrangements are made, you need to pre-register by October 15, 1991, by calling the County Extension office at 423-7016. This should be a good educational opportunity for the young people, as well as adults.

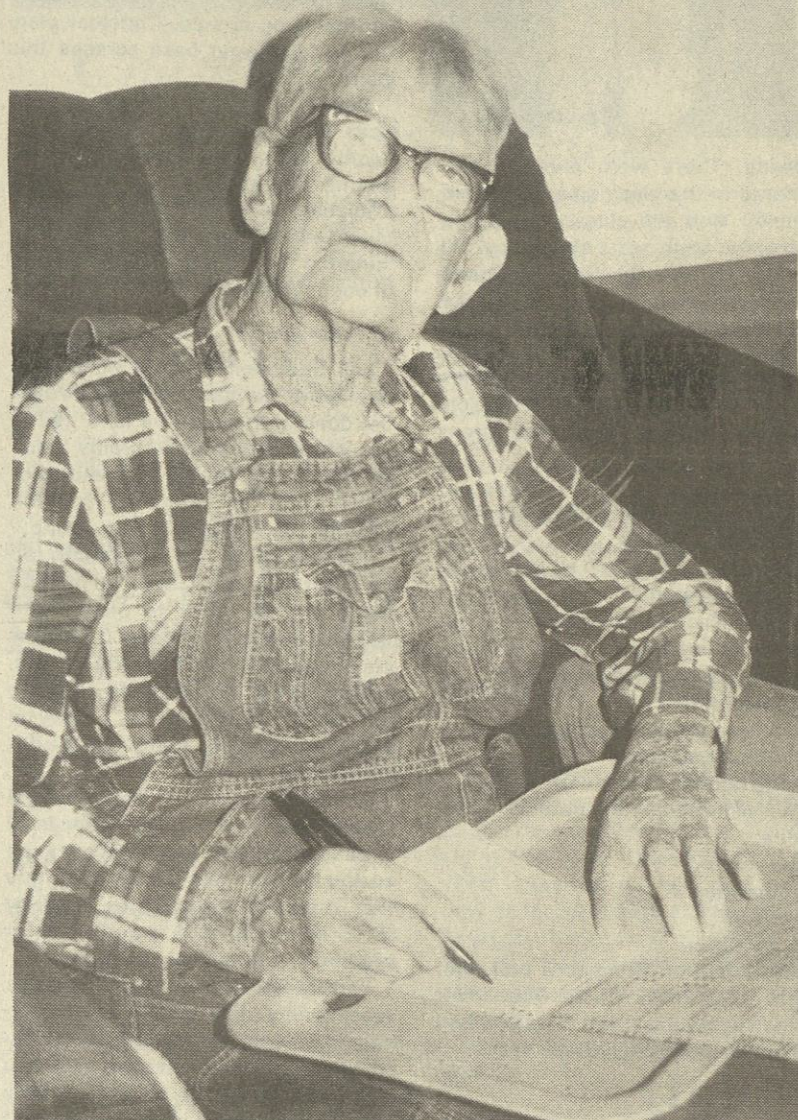

Homemakers Plan Bake Sale & Blood Pressure Checks

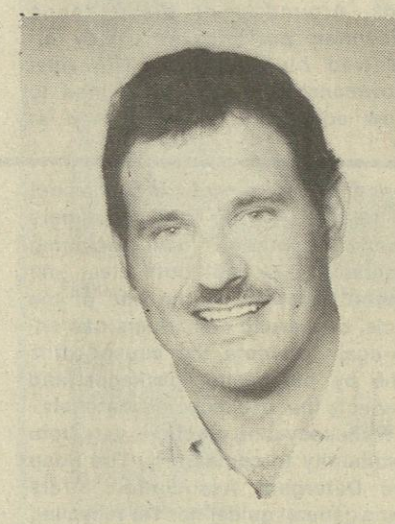

Votes Change County Offices



Johnny Nunley Wins Democratic Primary For County Sheriff

Tishomingo County voters again went to the polls on Tuesday casting ballots in the Second Primary.

Many changes in local government will be made when new officers are sworn in on January 1, 1992.

In the hard fought battle for Tishomingo County Sheriff, a newcomer to politics, Johnny S. Nunley, of Iuka, was victorious over incumbent sheriff, Richard Dobbs. Nunley polled 4,769 votes to Dobbs' 2,933.

Nunley will face Republican candidate for Sheriff, Gary Walls in the November 5 General Election.

In the race for Circuit Court Clerk, incumbent Gerald Parsons defeated Bobbie White by a narrow margin. Parsons tallied 4,032 votes to White's 3,770 votes.

Incumbent tax assessor/collector Horace Ledgewood was defeated by newcomer to politics, Gaylon Lovelace by a close vote of 3,987 to 3,798.

Incumbent supervisors Frank Williams, Jr. and Delanor W. McKee were unsuccessful in their bids for re-election. Williams of the 1st District was defeated by Perry Dale Price. Price tallied 1,042 votes to Williams 704. McKee of the 3rd District was defeated by Danny Ryan by a vote of 955 to 710.

Incumbent 2nd district supervisor Ricky A. Cummings, won his re-election race, defeating Arlie L. South by a vote of 941 to 807.

In the race for 4th District Supervisor, incumbent M.R. Whitehead defeated Jasper E. Ables by a vote of 975 to 546.

In the constable race, northern district, Joe Moyers captured 2703 votes to Steve Rye's 1598.

In the constable race, southern district, Donald Deaton won with a vote of 1703 over Harmon Davis with 1563 votes.

Two Alcorn County men will represent Tishomingo County in the State Capital for the next four years. Incumbent State Representative Mack L. Wadkins of Iuka was defeated by 95 votes on Tuesday. He tallied a total of 4404 votes to Harvey Benderman's, of Corinth, 4499 votes.

In the race for State Senate, district 4, Travis Little defeated JoAnn Biggers by a vote of 10381 to 8885.

At press time totals for the state offices were unofficial and incomplete. Steven A. Patterson was the winner in the State Auditor of Public Accounts office; and Bo Robinson was named the winner of the race for Public Service Commissioner, District 3.

Republican Kirk Fordice captured the Republican nomination for Governor. He will meet incumbent Governor Ray Mabus in the November 5 General Election.

A breakdown of county votes is on page 5 of this issue. All totals are unofficial.

between 6.0 and 6.5 for most crops.

A good soil test is essential in making the decision on how much fertilizer to use. To make a good soil test, sample soil down to depth of six inches. Be sure to take soil from several areas of the field in order to obtain a representative sample. For example, in the 15-acre field, take soil 6 inches deep from at least 10 to 20 places in the field, mix the soil together thoroughly, and send in one full box of soil sample from this mixture. Soil testing is probably one of the most cost-effective tools a grower can employ.

WHEAT

About any way you study this past wheat crop it looks like a disaster and planting intentions do not look like a big acreage for this year. However, the world demand for wheat could make prices a little better before another crop is sold. Consider planting at least your base acreage this year.

Seed Quality - Go with proven practices on the acreage planted. Seed quality is mostly poor, so check around for the best quality seed available. Do not be afraid of carry-over seed if they have recent germination tests. These could be some of our best seed.

Soil Selection - Select fields that have good surface drainage. Wheat just does not do well on land that is frequently water-logged. Some fields will benefit by rowing the field prior to planting in order to provide drainage this winter and next spring.

Planting Dates - Do not get into too big a hurry to plant. Get fields in good shape and be ready to plant when proper planting time arrives. October 1 is the earliest planting date for North Mississippi. If producers have the soil ready to plant, October 15 may be a better planting date for North Mississippi.

Seeding Rates - The normal seeding rate for 6 to 8-inch drills is 16 to 21 seed per foot of row. Study seed quality before making a decision this year. If percent germination is below 80%, some upward adjustment in seeding rate should be made.

Variety Selection - Data from this years variety trials will not be of much help in making variety selections. Instead, rely heavily upon the past 2 to 3 years variety trials to base variety selection. As in the past, do not plant all of your acreage in one variety. Spread your risk by planting at least 2 or 3 of the quality, top-yielding varieties.

ASCS Farm News

FARMERS ARE ASKED TO MAKE NOMINATIONS FOR THE ASC COMMITTEE

Farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 28 to be one the ASC community committee ballot.

The ASC community committee election will be conducted from November 22 to December 2 by mail ballot. The ASC communities in Tishomingo County are Midway, South Burnsville, and Paden.

ASC committees are responsible for managing federal farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals. Tishomingo County farmers have the opportunity to nominate people they feel would best serve the farm community. Farmers have received petition forms by mail and are now submitting them to the county ASCS office.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible farm votes in the ASC community, and must be received in the county ASCS office by the October 29 deadline.

Farmers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASCS office for full details, including eligibility requirements for office holders.

Farmers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as a member of the ASC committee. The election of concerned farmers to positions on ASC committees is essential in the administration of farm programs.

The county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, handicap, or national origin.

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Pharmacy & Your Health

Osteoporosis: Special Problem for Women

Osteoporosis is the most common disease of the bone seen by physicians. An estimated 24 million Americans are affected by this condition. Although men can develop osteoporosis, it is a special problem for women. According to a recent article in *The Journal of Family Practice*, about one-half of all women over the age of 45 and ninety percent of all women over the age of 75 have osteoporosis.

Which women seem to be at greatest risk? The highest risk group includes women who are white or Asian, of low body weight, have small bone structure, and have a family history of the disease. Other risk factors include cigarette smoking, heavy alcohol use, low dietary intake of calcium, and a sedentary lifestyle.

What treatment options are available for at-risk women? Estrogen is the only prescription medicine approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for prevention of osteoporosis. For women who already have the condition, many treatment options are available. Health experts now recommend 1,500mg of calcium daily for postmenopausal women. Calcium, sodium fluoride and vitamin D have been shown to strengthen bone. Parathyroid hormone also has proven to be effective in treating osteoporosis.

Home Economics Tips

RECYCLING PLASTIC CLEANING BOTTLES

A Valuable, Often Overlooked, Resource

With only thirteen percent of our solid waste currently being recycled, there is much to be done to reach the Environmental Protection Agency's goal of reducing the nation's solid waste by twenty-five percent. While recycling of newspapers, glass and metal containers is a way of life in many communities, increased recycling of plastic bottles is necessary if we are to meet our recycling objectives.

Most plastic laundry and cleaning product bottles are recyclable. In addition, the soap and detergent industry already uses both clear and colored recycled plastic in a variety of its containers. For example, many detergent and fabric softener bottles have a layer made of plastic that was recycled from used milk jugs and detergent bottles. In addition, some cleaning products come in bottles made entirely from recycled soda bottles and other containers. In order for more to be done, it is important that more recycled plastic be available.

The consumer is both the beginning and ending point in the recycling cycle. To start the cycle, it is im-

portant to keep recyclable bottles out of the trash. To do this, consumers should encourage local recycling programs to accept both clear and colored plastics. At the end of the cycle, concerned consumers can once again promote the cause - this time by purchasing packages and products that use recycled materials.

While recycling practices vary from community to community, The Soap and Detergent Association offers some general guidelines for recycling laundry and cleaning product bottles. First, use all of the product. If any remains, follow the disposal instructions on the label. If there are no instructions, simply pour the remaining product down the drain, flushing with water. Once the product is disposed of, rinse the container thoroughly just like you would for glass bottles and jars. It's a good idea to crush or flatten the container, if possible. This saves space in the recycling bin and on trucks picking up the recyclables.

In most communities it is not necessary to remove labels from the plastic containers. However, caps and pump spray tops are generally not recyclable. If in doubt, the smart solution is to leave them out.

MARINATED VEGETABLE SALAD

Vegetable Salad:

1 (16 ounce) can French style beans, drained

1 (16 ounce) can small green peas, drained

1 (12 ounce) can white shoe peg corn, drained

1/2 to 1 green pepper, chopped

1 cup chopped celery

1/2 cup chopped red onion

Mix all ingredients together.

Sauce:

1 cup sugar

3/4 cup vinegar

1/2 cup oil

Salt & Pepper

Mix together. Bring to a boil until sugar dissolves. Cool. Pour over mixed vegetables. Chill. This will last about 2 weeks refrigerated.

County Agent's Notes

SOIL TESTING

How can growers save money with minimum work and cost? Soil tests can save growers a substantial amount of money. Soil testing makes the most efficient use of fertilizer. Then you know exactly what fertilizer is needed and the amount needed. Without a soil test you have no idea whether or not your soil has sufficient nutrients for greatest yield potentials.

Soil pH (how sweet or sour is the soil) is probably the most overlooked soil factor. Growers often overlook liming because applying lime doesn't give an immediate large yield response.

Soil pH is important. Applying lime to make the soil less acid leads to better decomposition of organic material, improves the water infiltration rate, and makes the soil work easier. Soil pH values should be

GLAUCOMA SYMPTOMS

When you go for an eye examination, your eye doctor will probably perform a test for the eye disease known as glaucoma. This will be especially important if you are nearsighted, have a history of glaucoma in your family, or are over the age of 40. Glaucoma is a very serious disease that can lead to blindness if not treated soon enough.

In glaucoma, the watery fluid which normally flows through the eye does not drain out as readily as it does in healthy eyes. This causes pressure to build up and may damage the nerve fibers of the optic nerve, resulting in impairment of vision. In testing for glaucoma your eye doctor will measure the intraocular pressure of your eyes to see if it is normal or indicates the early stages of glaucoma.

One of the most dangerous things about glaucoma is that it is difficult to discover in its early stages because of lack of symptoms. That's one important reason why you should have your eyes checked periodically by your eye doctor.

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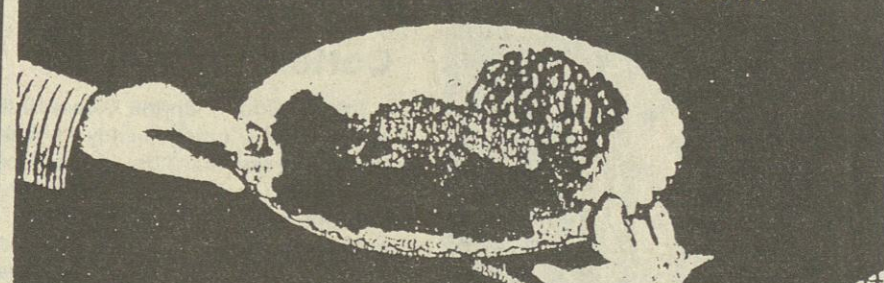
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Clark - Tallakson Plan October 12th Wedding

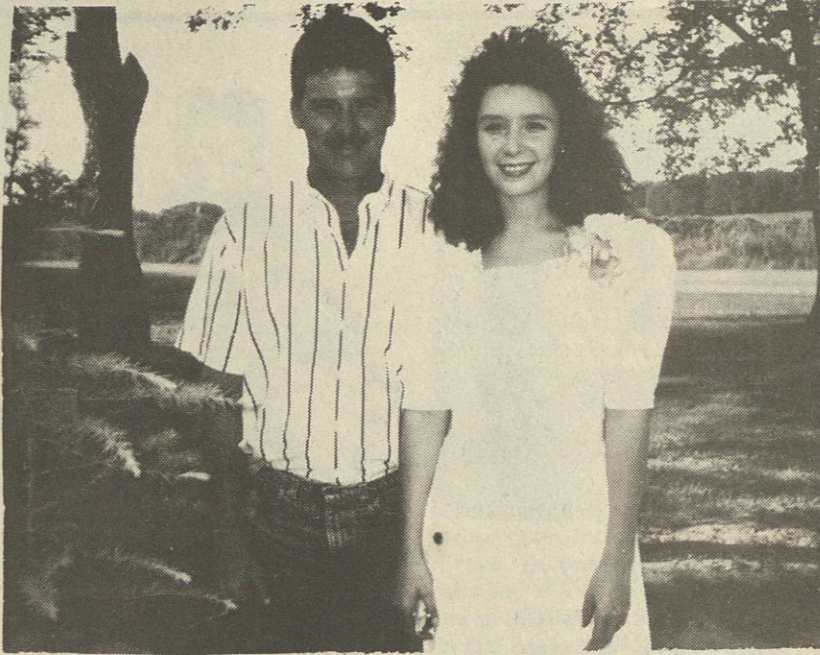

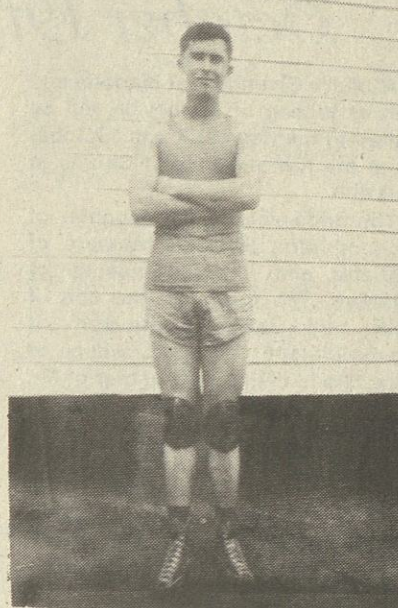

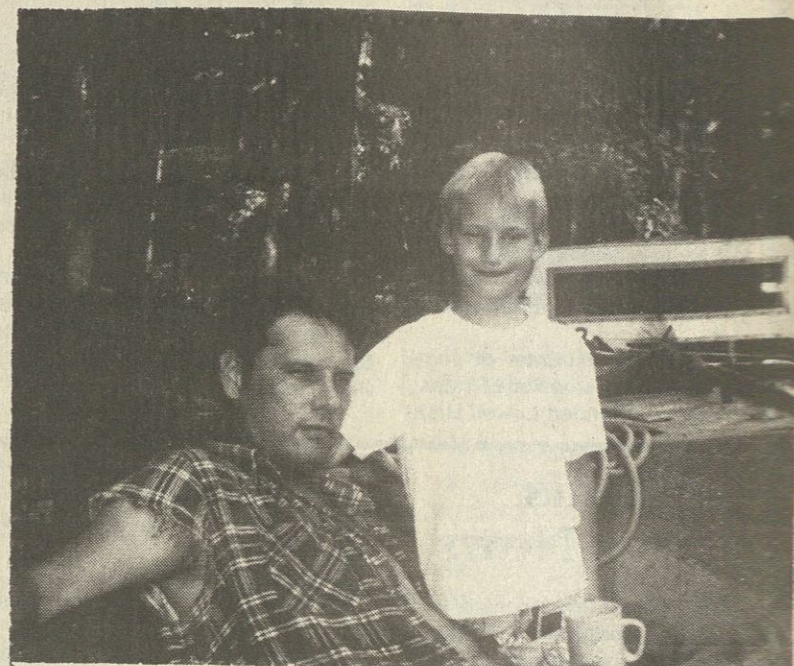

Fire Prevention Measures Suggested To The Elderly

Recognizing that elderly citizens often are particularly vulnerable to fire-related deaths and injuries, the Mississippi Department of Human Services' Division of Aging and Adult Services is emphasizing the need to conduct fire safety inspections around the home in conjunction with

October 6-12 National Fire Prevention Week.

Billie Marshall, director of the Division of Aging and Adult Services, suggests that elderly persons, their families and friends take the following steps recommended by the Fire Prevention Bureau of the Jackson Fire Department:

- *Install and maintain smoke detectors. These detectors should be battery operated, and the battery should be checked at least monthly.
- *Plan an escape route to be used if

fire breaks out. Diagram two routes to the outside from all rooms, particularly bedrooms.

*Be extremely careful with space heaters. People die in Mississippi every year as a result of direct contact, or contact of combustible materials such as clothing, with heaters.

*Use large, deep ashtrays that don't tip over if there are smokers in the home. Smoking is a major cause of fire deaths.

*Store all flammable products in a

cool, well-ventilated place. Dispose of dirty and oily rags or keep them in a closed metal container.

*Always keep the damper open while the fireplace is in use and have the chimney inspected each year. If artificial logs are used, only one should be burned at a time, and always use a fire screen with real or artificial logs.

One area in which older persons are more at risk than any other age group is injury and death from clothing fires. In the event of a fire, the Fire Prevention Bureau recommends that the victim drop to the floor and roll if clothes are ignited. It emphasizes not to run; this will only fan the flames.

Other suggestions from the bureau in case of fire include:

*Get to fresh air as soon as possible. If you must go through a smoke-filled area, crawl on your hands and knees with your head low to avoid breathing the smoke.

*Never call the fire department from a burning home. Get out safely and use another telephone.

*Never go back into the house unless firefighters have assured you that the fire is extinguished and the structure is sound.

"It's important to have an annual Fire Prevention Week to serve as a safety reminder to everyone, but we like to encourage Mississippians, especially our elderly, to practice fire prevention measures all year long," Ms. Marshall added.

The Tower Of Babel

After the flood God wanted the world repopulated. "And God blessed Noah and his sons, and said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth." (9:1) But these people had other plans. They refused to scatter across the earth. Instead, they would build a tower and a city, they would have a name, and they would be one. (11:4-6)

God recognized the strength of the unity of these men. (11:6) But God's recognition of their strength did not make what they were doing right. He confused their language to put an end to their work. "So the Lord scattered them abroad from thence upon the face of all the earth." (11:8)

The lesson is simple: the unity of men is not as important as the doing of God's will. Unity is good. Jesus prayed for it, and Paul commanded it. (Jn. 17:20-21; ICor. 1:10) But neither Jesus nor Paul endorsed unity at the price of truth.

"If any man preach any other gospel unto the than that ye have received, let him be accursed." (Paul, Gal. 1:9) "Every plant which my heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up." (Jesus, Mt. 15:13)

Unity makes for strength and builds faith in Jesus as the Son of God. Jesus prayed before His passion that all believers "may be one...that the world my believe that thou hast sent me." (Jn. 17:21)

However, the approach to that unity is all-important. One of the basic rules in math is not to mix the fruit. Multiplying apples with oranges will not work. First, the oranges have to be converted to apples, or vice versa. Likewise, the common denominator for unity among seekers of the Lord is God's word? "Sanctify them (set them apart from the world) through thy truth: thy word is truth." (Jn. 17:17)

Modern approaches to unity in religion will not be successful unless God's word is given priority. If folks are truly interested in unity, they will sacrifice their names and creeds to become Christians - nothing more, nothing less; and with no more creed than the things which are written. (I Cor. 1:1-13; 4:6)

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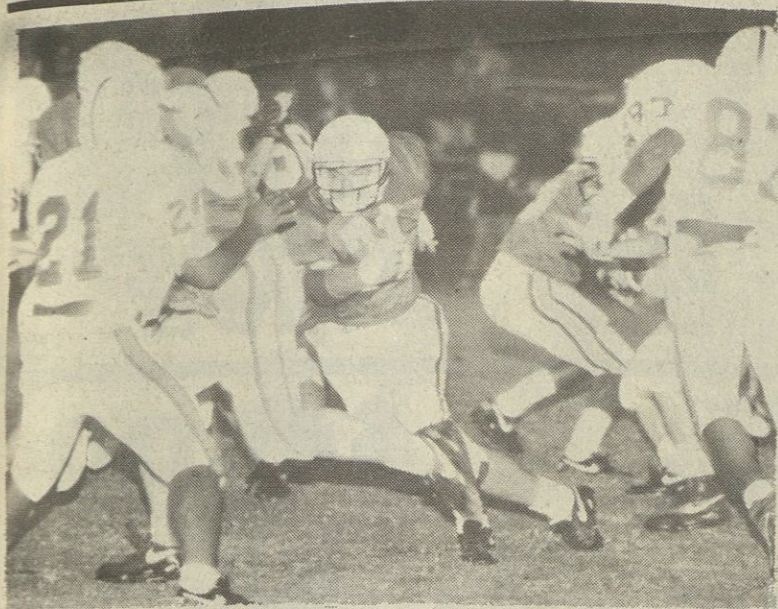
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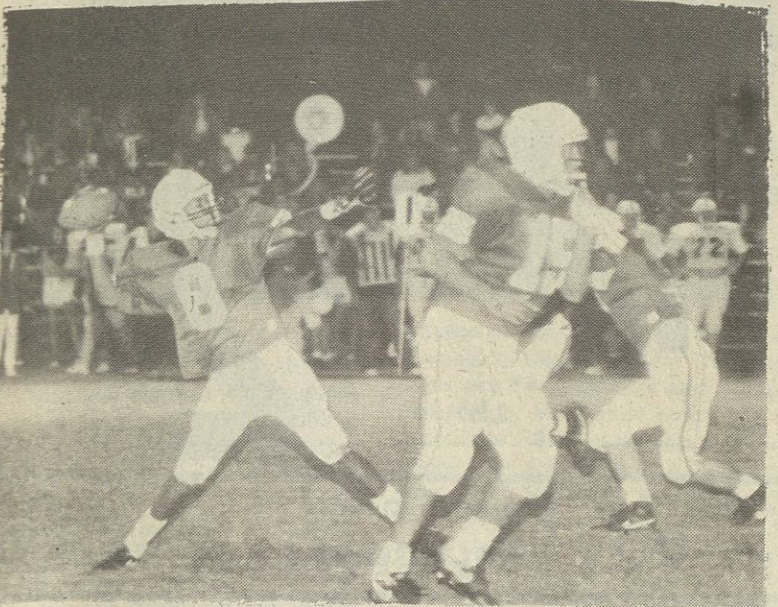

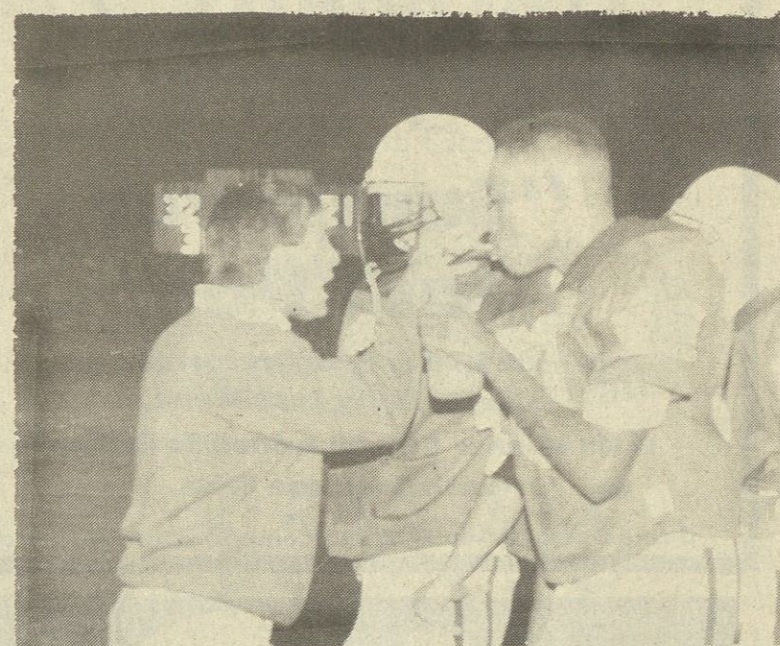

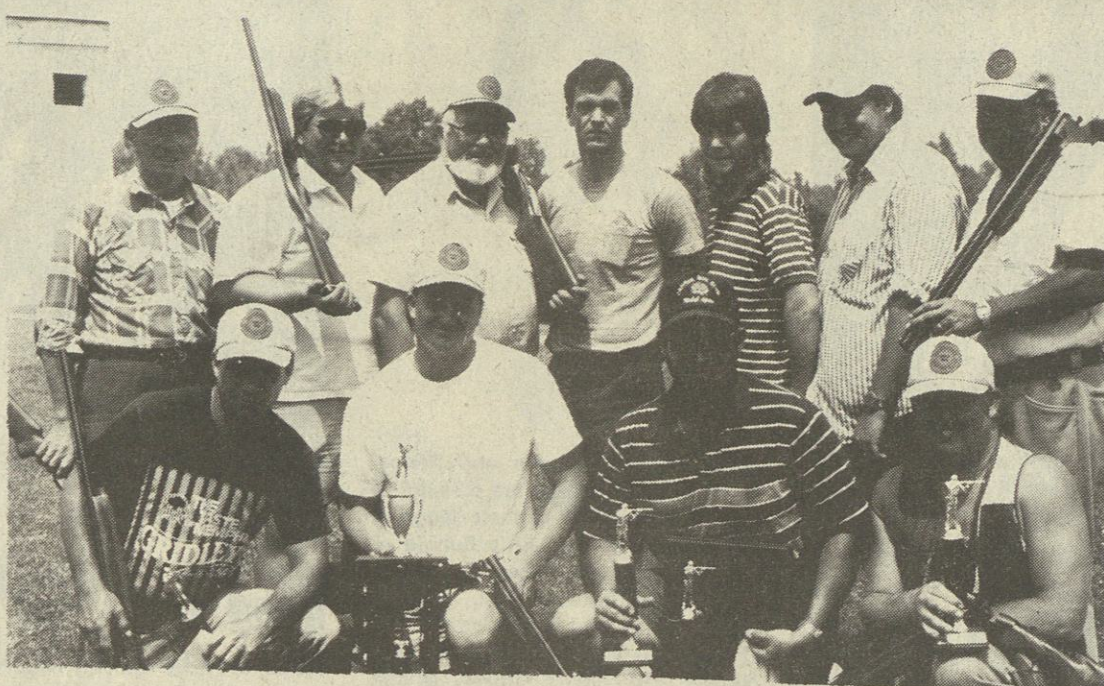

More Hunting Seasons Open

Squirrel hunting gets underway October 12 in Zone II and continues through January 31.

Zone II is that area between Mississippi 82 and Mississippi 84, plus portions of the state south of Mississippi 84 and west of I-55.

The bag limit is 8 squirrels daily. The possession limit is 16. A possession limit is not permitted on the opening day of any season.

Meanwhile, October 12 also is the opening day for rabbit, rail and gallinule.

The Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks expects more than 90,000 rabbit hunters to take to the fields when the season opens. The season will continue through February 28.

The daily bag limit on rabbit is 8 and the possession limit is 16.

Mississippi's second statewide dove season also opens October 12 and will end November 6.

The daily bag limit is 15 and the possession limit is 30.

Shooting hours for dove hunters are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks figures indicate that hunters harvest between 2 and 3 million doves annually.

The season on gallinules and king, clapper, sora and Virginia rails open October 12 and closes December 20.

The daily limit on gallinules is 15 and the possession limit is 30. For king and clapper rails, the daily limit is 15 of either species or in any combination, and the possession limit is 30. For sora and Virginia rails, the daily limit and possession limit is 25 of either species or in any combination.

Conservation officers remind hunters that migratory birds are protected by state and federal laws. Hunters must have their shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells.

Of course, hunters must have a valid hunting license signed and on their person before going afield.

Archery Season For Deer Opens October 1

One of Mississippi's most awaited hunting seasons gets under way October 1, as bowhunters take to the woods deer hunting.

The archery season extends through November 22.

One of the most eagerly awaited of the fall hunting periods, archery season will see more than 60,000 hunters across the Magnolia State pursue whitetail deer.

Last year, more than 25,000 deer were harvested by bowhunters. The bag limit is one buck with antlers visible above the natural hairline per day, not to exceed five per license year.

The bag limit on antlerless deer is one per day, but not more than three per license year.

Archery hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half after sunset.

Hunters must have a valid archery/primitive weapons permit and a hunting license signed and on their person before going afield.
